

ADAMS COUNTY 4-H GOVERNING RULES

Adams County 4-H Membership Rules and Requirements:

- 1. Annual Program Fees
 - a. Participation in the Indiana 4-H program requires an annual \$15.00 program fee, which supports insurance, risk management, club management and other programmatic growth opportunities.

Adams County 4-H Council additionally charges a \$5.00 county program fee to support educational resources and programming efforts for the local community.

Members should pay at the time they complete online enrollment, October 1 through January 15.

Mini 4-H K-2 Grade \$5.00 County ---- State 4-H 3-12 Grade \$5.00 County \$15.00 State

- b. Scholarships to cover the costs of county and/or state program fees are available to those who request assistance. Please contact the 4-H Extension Educator to request assistance if needed.
- c. Program fees are not refundable.
- d. Township/County clubs may charge additional club dues, this varies from club to club.
- 2. Members are encouraged to attend a **minimum** of one club meeting.

The purpose of a 4-H Club is to provide positive youth development opportunities to meet the needs of young people to experience belonging, mastery, independence, and generosity (the Essential Elements) and to foster educational opportunities tied to the Land Grand University knowledge base.

- 3. All youth are encouraged to assist with helping make the Adams County 4-H Fair successful, specific help needed include Fair Set-Up, Pre-Fair Judging, working in the 4-H Dining Hall or Clover Center and Fair Clean-Up.
 - Members who do not attend and sign-in at Fair Clean-Up who participate in the 4-H Livestock Auction will have \$50.00 assessed to their auction check, funds will go to the Executive Livestock Committee to be used for livestock facility/project improvements.

Adams County 4-H Projects/Subject Matter Exhibit Rules:

- 1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.
- 2. Members may enroll in a higher division only but will not be eligible to go back to a lower division.
- 3. All 4-H exhibits must me prepared during the current 4-H year.
- 4. Completed 4-H exhibits not in by the designated time will be considered late and not be considered for premiums.
- 5. Open Judging will be observed for <u>subject matter judging</u> which allows youth to interact with the judge to receive constructive comments on your exhibit and to share with the judge their talents. It is not mandatory that youth attend open judging, however it is a great learning opportunity.

The judge will consider the entire exhibit as a unit.

During open judging all exhibits will be placed in a Blue, Red, White or Participation group.

Advanced placings will be offered to those projects which go above and beyond.

6. <u>Closed Judging</u> will be observed for Premium and Champion placings with results made visible opening day of fair. **Premium** ribbons will be awarded to five exhibits in each division/level of each project.

These placings will be selected from the blue ribbon group.


Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion honors will be awarded in each project where the judge deems advanced placement is worthy.

- All first premium winners will be considered for Grand Champion.
- The remaining first premium exhibits and the second premium to the Grand Champion will be considered for the Reserve Grand Champion.
- There will be at least one Grand Champion overall for each project. If there is difference in awards, it will be specified in project rules.
- 7. If a subject matter has three or few members complete for two consecutive years, that subject matter may be dropped due to lack of interest.

Poster/Display Board Guidelines:

Posters projects that do not adhere to the following requirements will result in being counted down a ribbon grade

- 1. All posters must be displayed horizontally and measure 22x28 inches.
- 2. All posters must have a hard backing. (Foam Board, Paneling, etc.)
- 3. All posters must be covered with a clear plastic or acetate.
- 4. A 3⁵ x 4" label will be provided at fair check-in with member information (Name, Grade, Club Name, Division).
 - This label **must** be placed in the lower right corner of the poster, plan accordingly when making your poster.
- 5. Posters, Notebooks, Display Boards must provide a reference list, siting all sources of information.
- 6. Display Boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space.



Philosophy and Expectations:

The Indiana 4-H Youth Development program serves the youth of Indiana by providing a strong educational youth development program. This program delivers educational experiences in a variety of settings. Caring, capable and contributing adults assist in the 4-H program as role models for youth. The rich heritage of the 4-H Program is one to be valued and passed along to future generations.

The Indiana 4-H Youth Policies and Procedures includes certain standards and guidelines to assure that 4-H is a positive youth development program. County 4-H policy is guided by the county 4-H policy making or governing board (i.e., 4-H Council) as provided by the County Extension Board. Legal authority for the 4-H Program rests with the Director of the Cooperative Extension Service at Purdue University. No county 4-H policy may conflict with state 4-H policy or with federal guidelines and requirements.

Deadlines for county and state participation should be carefully constructed so as to encourage rather than to discourage participation. Such deadlines should be well published.

It is the policy of 4-H to be an inclusive organization. No county policy or practice should be used to arbitrarily exclude youth from either membership or participation. Youth should participate in 4-H Youth Development opportunities at levels and times that best suit the youth's development.

Per state and federal guidelines, volunteers and Extension Educators may not require youth to attend 4-H club meetings in order to complete 4-H or exhibit their work.

4-H Mission and Vision

4-H Mission:

The Indiana 4-H Youth Development mission is to provide real-life educational opportunities that develop young people who positively impact their community and world.

4-H Vision:

Indiana 4-H Youth Development strives to be the premier, community-based program empowering young people to reach their full potential.

What is Positive Youth Development?

Positive youth development occurs from an intentional process that promotes positive outcomes for young people by providing opportunities, relationships, and the support to fully participate. Youth development takes place in families, peer groups, schools, neighborhoods, and communities.

The Interagency Working Group on Youth Programs, a collaboration of 21 federal departments and agencies that support youth, created the following definition of positive youth development (PYD):

"PYD is an intentional, pro-social approach that engages youth within their communities, schools, organizations, peer groups, and families in a manner that is productive and constructive; recognizes, utilizes, and enhances young people's strengths; and promotes positive outcomes for young people by providing opportunities, fostering positive youth relationships, and furnishing the support needed to build on their leadership strengths."

Pledge:

The pledge tells what 4-H is about. The 4-H goal is the four-fold development of youth: Head, Heart, Hands and Health. The pledge was adopted by the delegates of the 1927 National 4-H Club Camp in Washington, D.C. State club leaders voted for & adopted the pledge for universal use. The phrase "and my world" was added in 1973.

The saying of the pledge has a prominent place in 4-H activities, at regular 4-H meetings, achievement days and other club events.

Motto:

The 4-H motto, "To Make the Best Better", is intended to inspire young people to continue to learn and grow, to make their best efforts better through participating in educational experiences.

Colors:

The 4-H colors are green and white.

Green, nature's most prominent color, symbolizes growth. White symbolizes purity and high ideals.

4-H Name and Emblem Regulations:

The 4-H Name and Emblem are protected under federal statute Title 18, U.S. Code 707. This provides the 4-H Name and Emblem with the level of protection afforded other Federal marks, such as the Seal of the President of the United States and the Olympic Rings. Congress has delegated to the Secretary of Agriculture responsibility for the proper use of the 4-H Name and Emblem. The Secretary, in turn, has delegated responsibility to the National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA) and, within NIFA, responsibility resides in the Division of Youth and 4-H.

Use of 4-H Name and Emblem

The 4-H Emblem should always appear as a whole image.

- Do not remove any leaves. Do not superimpose another image over the top of one of the leaves. Other images should be moved and appear completely separate from the 4-H Emblem.
- Don't "cut off' a leaf by running it off the edge of the paper in print media or other designs.
- Don't place text or other images over or on top of the 4-H Emblem.
- The 4-H Emblem should not appear screened under words or graphics. No photo, drawing, symbol, work or other figure or object may be placed on or obscure the 4-H Emblem. This includes on web pages, where it should not appear as a "watermark" behind other information.

Using the 4-H Name

The official 4-H Name includes 4-H, 4-H Youth Development, or 4-H Youth Development Program.

When using the term "4-H," it must conform as follows:

- Numeral "4" separated from a capital "H" with a hyphen (not a dash, slash or space).
- Do not replace 4-H with "Four-H."
- Do not use the 4-H Emblem in place of the word "4-H" in a title or text
- Avoid separation of any of the elements of the 4-H Name at the end of sentences.

4-H Eligibility

Purdue Extension is part of the College of Agriculture at Purdue University, cooperating with Indiana's 92 Counties and the United States Department of Agriculture. The 4-H Youth Development program abides with the nondiscrimination policies of Purdue University and the United States Department of Agriculture.

Youth may become 4-H members when they enter the third grade and may continue their membership through the completion of grade 12. Each individual may continue membership for a maximum of ten (10) consecutive years.

Exceptions:

- 1. Youth who enroll in grade three and are advanced academically (thus graduating early) may continue for a total of 10 years ONLY if the enrollment occurs in consecutive years.
- 2. Those youth who are academically advanced and "skip" 3rd grade, may begin the program as a 4th grader and may continue for a total of 10 years ONLY if the enrollment occurs in consecutive years.
- 3. Those youth who enroll in grade three and are retained a grade in school may continue to progress through the 4-H Program by adding subsequent years of participation, but MAY NOT exceed 10 years of participation. For example, if a member is retained one year in school (public, private, or home), their final year of 4-H membership would conclude the summer following their junior year of high school.
- 4. Those youth who entered the program in 3rd grade and for one reason or another leave formal education prior to the completion of 12th grade may continue for a total of 10 years ONLY if the enrollment occurs in consecutive years.
- Additional exceptions may be requested to the State 4-H Leader or his/her designee.

NOTE: 10 years of membership in the 4-H Youth Development Program is an opportunity --- not an entitlement. Those youth who do not enroll as 3rd grade students or meet the exceptions above, conclude their involvement with the program during the summer immediately following the completion of their senior year in high school

An individual's 4-H grade is determined by the school grade in which he or she is classified at the time of year he or she enrolls in 4-H. A member does not advance in 4-H grade until he or she enrolls in 4-H for the subsequent year. Each member should enroll in the division of a project/subject that would best suit his/her interest and potential for personal growth and would enhance their family involvement.

Opportunities in the 4-H program are available to all Indiana youth as defined regardless of race, religion, color, sex, national origin or ancestry, genetic information, marital status, parental status, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, or disability. Married young men and women of 4-H age may participate in any of the 4-H projects and activities. However, married persons must participate by the same terms and conditions and/or guidelines as unmarried participants. Membership in 4-H is gained by annually enrolling through a Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service Office located in each of Indiana's 92 counties.

The Indiana 4-H Youth Development program year is October 1 to September 30 annually. Enrollment is an annual process attained by completing individual 4-H enrollment via the 4-H Online enrollment process. Statewide 4-H Online enrollment occurs annually October.

Youth Needing Special Accommodations:

4-H programs should be designed to consider the needs of participants to create a sense of belonging and feeling of inclusion among all youth. Accommodations may include youth with special needs (e.g., cognitive, learning, physical differences), or there may be other accommodations requested. The 4-H Health Form asks for this information. For accommodations or requests, please contact the Purdue Extension 4-H Youth Educator for any actions which may be necessary or appropriate.

A series of Inclusive 4-H resources are available on the Indiana 4-H Website to help staff, volunteers, and families provide the best opportunities possible for all youth regardless of their level of abilities.

Marriage Status and Parental Status:

Married individuals and parents who meet school grade requirements to participate in Indiana 4-H are eligible to fully participate in the 4-H program and are eligible for all benefits therein.

Residence:

Indiana youth typically enroll in 4-H Youth Development programs in the county or state in which they reside. However, individuals living in one county may join 4-H in another county. There must be educational or social reasons for an individual joining 4-H in a different county than that of their primary residence. During a single program year, a 4-H member enrolled in a given project may enroll and exhibit that project only in one county of enrollment.

In the event that a project is not offered in the county of primary 4-H enrollment, a 4-H member may enroll in that specific project in a different county. Approval of this special exception rests with the 4-H Extension Educator in consultation with the State 4-H Office. Participation in 4-H related activities and events (i.e., judging, performing arts, auction) must be in the county of primary 4-H enrollment.

The above policy is not intended to provide an escape mechanism for 4-H members and families who are unwilling to follow the terms and/or conditions in their current county of 4-H membership. Decisions regarding 4-H membership in a non-resident county (a county you do not live in), rest with the 4-H Extension Educator in the receiving county in consultation with the State 4-H Office.



4-H Project and Competitive Events Guidelines

Competition and Youth Development

4-H's mission is to empower youth to reach their full potential through working and learning in partnership with caring adults. Many volunteers and staff work to assist youth in developing knowledge, skills and attitudes that enable them to become productive and contributing members of society.

It is important for adults to keep this goal in mind and recognize that youth need to learn how to complete projects, not someone else. While there are obviously differences in the abilities of 3rd grade student as compared to a 12th grader, the potential for youth to learn is always greatest when youth are responsible for completing the various aspects of their project.

In competitive events, parents and others focusing on winning the competition and not on developing the youth can overlook the mission of youth development. The following principles should be recognized for determining rules regarding 4-H members doing their own work.

- Help from family members is appropriate for some aspects of the project. However, the exhibitors should have increased responsibility as they mature in their project skills.
- Teamwork is a life skill and working together with other 4-H members is appropriate.
- Professionals or individuals who are paid to do similar work and are older than 4-H age and not related to the youth, should not be involved in aspects of the project that are directly related to exhibition and competition. Along with principles, the following questions should be asked for determining rules regarding 4-H members doing their own work:
 - * Is the 4-H member capable of completing the work, even if the level of expertise is different from other youth or adults?
 - * Are other youth of similar age capable of completing the work? Is the assistance offered by other exhibitors or family members focused on competition for exhibition or is the youth involved in the process and able to improve his/her own skills?

Project Exhibitions

Exhibition of 4-H projects/subjects in local, county, or state exhibits/fairs, in person or virtually, is voluntary on the part of the exhibitor. The exhibition of 4-H projects/subjects provides 4-H members an opportunity to display their 4-H projects/subjects, enter into competition, and participate in an educational/social environment with peers. With exhibition also comes the responsibility for abiding by the terms and conditions pertaining to the respective 4-H project.

Project Experience

A 4-H experience may include a variety of options and must not be misinterpreted solely as exhibition of a project at a local, county, or state fair. There are a number of ways that a young person may participate in the 4-H Youth Development Program in addition to the club-based option. Participating in 4-H opportunities enable the youth to build skills that will serve them well through their adult lives.

Some of these participation options do not include the preparation of a specific exhibit by an individual that would be on display at a fair or similar event. In some cases, the youths' actual participation may be the final product that results in their completion of a year of 4-H. Some examples of this participation include working as a team to develop a robot for a workshop or challenge; completing a Spark Club experience; participating in State 4-H Band or Chorus; taking part in a science training or experiment; participating in an after school 4-H experience; etc.



4-H is for YOU!

Language of "completing" a 4-H experience should be avoided or required a specific output. Every 4-H'ers experience may be different. 4-H members are considered complete in their 4-H educational experience for the year when they have (1) completed the 4-H member enrollment process prior to the established and published date for enrolling; and (2) had an officially recognized 4-H volunteer/Extension Educator verify the existence of the completed project/subject or the member's participation in a 4-H educational experience – this could be in the form of an exhibit, poster, report, presentation, etc. Or, a member may choose to submit a completed record sheet in lieu of an exhibit to complete the club- or fair-based 4-H project/subject. The 4-H record sheet will be based on printed or web-based educational materials (used by Indiana 4-H Youth Development) and submitted prior to the established and published date.

Though exhibiting in local, county, and state exhibits/fairs is not required for project completion, as it does not necessarily relate directly to content and skills learned in the development of the 4-H project, project exhibition is encouraged as a continuation of the educational experience.

Per state and federal guidelines, volunteers and Extension Educators may not require youth to attend 4-H Club meetings in order to complete 4-H or exhibit their work, unless required by the state 4-H office for safety.

Competitive Event Definition and Criteria

A 4-H competitive event is one in which 4-H members compete individually or as teams for special recognition. The 4-H Name and emblem are used to name and promote the event. The term "event" is used for 4-H divisions/classes and activities that are part of a larger program, which includes non-4-H competitive events, as well as those events exclusively 4-H. 4-H competitive events include judging contests, presentations, project exhibits and other performance events open to 4-H members. When competition is a major part of an event, it must be understood that competition is secondary to the education and development of youth.

Criteria for competitive events in 4-H include:

- Sponsored/co-sponsored and/or conducted by Purdue University Extension Professionals and/or approved 4-H Volunteers (adult and youth volunteers).
- Approved by and/or conducted by Extension staff responsible for the event.
- Rules and regulations established by or approved by Extension staff responsible for the event.
- Open to participation by 4-H members from county, group of counties, district, state, region, or nation.
- Participants must be enrolled in 4-H during current 4-H year.
- Approval has been obtained to use the 4-H name and emblem.
- Utilize 4-H name and emblem in promotion & recruitment.
- Provide a safe and healthy environment with a positive educational experience for youth.

Exhibition Requirements

4-H project exhibitions occur through a variety of methods. Some examples include county fairs, career development events, and other statewide competitive events. Some competitive events have specific requirements (e.g. state robotics, career development events, performing arts, tractor operator skills, etc). Guidelines for specific competitive events can be found on the Indiana 4-H website.

A county may not disqualify a youth from exhibition based on additional requirements added at the local/county level (e.g. green folders, record of achievements, record sheets, missed deadlines, incorrect classes, and/or missing or incorrect paperwork) for state 4-H projects which earn promotion to the Indiana State Fair.

4-H Opportunity for All

The Indiana 4-H Program is a federally-assisted program and as such, all programs, activities, events and competitions (state, area, county, local) must be non-discriminatory according to federal law. Additionally, the 4-H Program may not accept sponsorships, donations, or awards that are based on discriminatory practices.

Gender specific competitions and awards are not permissible under Title IX (Non-discrimination on the Basis of Sex) of the Educational Amendments enacted by Congress in 1972. This act states:

"No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subject to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

All Purdue Cooperative Extension Service programs and methods shall be implemented in a manner that ensures nondiscrimination on the basis of gender for all participants.

This means that the practice of arranging competitions or awarding trips, scholarships, etc. on the basis of gender categories is not acceptable in 4-H Youth Development Programs.

In all cases, the requirements for competitions must provide equal access for all youth and must not be designed to create barriers to participation.

Royalty Contests

4-H Fair Queen and/or King contests (or contests sponsored by 4-H Fair Associations and subcommittees thereof) where the awards are based upon a combination of factors related to personal appearance, poise and talent of participants are permissible activities.

These 4-H events may not however, discriminate against any participant based upon race, color, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, parental status, or marital status.

Criteria for selection of a 4-H Fair Queen/King can be based upon the candidate's appearance, poise, and talent.

Criteria for selection of a 4-H Fair Queen/King cannot be based upon the candidate's 4-H enrollment, accomplishments or achievements.

It is recommended that these contests are called royalty contests to highlight compliance with Title IX requirements and allow individual contestants to select their title (e.g. Queen, King, etc).

Those individuals who are selected to represent their county at the Indiana State Fair Queen Contest must meet the guidelines for that activity. The Indiana State Fair Contest is not a Purdue University Cooperative Extension/Indiana 4-H sponsored activity.



What is a 4-H Club?

4-H Club Definition:

A 4-H Club is an organized group of at least five youth from three different families who meet regularly with adult volunteers or staff for a long-term, progressive series of educational experiences.

4-H Club Purpose:

Purpose of a 4-H club is to provide positive youth development opportunities to meet the needs of young people to experience belonging, mastery, independence, and generosity (Essential Elements) and to foster educational opportunities tied to the Land Grant University knowledge base.

Structure of 4-H Club

- Enrolls at least 5 youth members from at least 3 families.
- Conducts a minimum of 6 regular club meetings per year, with many holding 9-12 regular meetings throughout most or all of the year, and often supplemented by project meetings, camps, fairs, and other 4-H learning activities.
- Selects youth officers or youth leaders to provide leadership to the club.
- Meets in any location community center, library, public housing site, school, afterschool program, military installation, and/or many other places – that is easily accessible to all participants.
- Adapts to and supports mobility of youth and parents linking them to 4-H programs in other counties and states.
- Meets interests and needs of youth in same-age or cross-age groupings and using single project or multiple project formats.
- Is advised by adult staff or volunteers who have been screened and trained.

County 4-H Program Governance

Establishing policies for County 4-H Programs

Purdue Extension holds responsibility in cooperation with the county 4-H governing entities (4-H Council and/or Fair Board) for developing 4-H policies for all County 4-H programs, fairs, and events. These policies must be consistent with the 4-H mission, affirmative action regulations, grade definitions, enrollment, methods of participation, and place of residence.

4-H Extension Educators are placed in the county by Purdue University to work and communicate with local governing bodies and ensure that State and National 4-H policies are upheld.

Local 4-H program and fair policies must be in compliance with, and will not supersede, State and National 4-H policy; however, fairs may design local classes and events that enhance the educational mission of the 4-H program. For example: Classes and events designed for Mini 4-H must not be competitive at any level in the organization.

In addition, fair policies should strive to offer programs that are:

- In the best interest of all youth
- Educational
- Inclusive to all families
- Fun



Structures of County 4-H Governing Entities

Three primary structures of 4-H Governing Entities are found in Indiana Counties. All entities within the county (4-H Council, 4-H or non 4-H Fair Board, and the Purdue Extension Office) should maintain open communication with each other to ensure that all roles and responsibilities related to the 4-H Program are fulfilled successfully. Because of the unique characteristics of these structures, a county should be reluctant to adopt practices from other counties without knowing how the structures have been implemented in these other counties.

Two entities, with a separate 4-H Council and 4-H Fair Board

In this structure, the 4-H Council focuses on working in conjunction with the County 4-H Extension Educator to provide guidance and support for the year-round County 4-H Youth Development Program, including 4-H delivery methods such as clubs, projects, in school, after school, and camps.

Adams Count

Structure

A separate 4-H Fair Board is responsible for the year-round operation and maintenance of the fairgrounds property, which the Fair Board may own and/or manage. The Fair Board works in conjunction with the County 4-H Extension Educator and 4-H Council to establishing the dates and schedule for the annual 4-H Fair exhibition. The 4-H Fair Board also follows a process that allows other Purdue Extension and non Extension groups to utilize the facilities and fairgrounds throughout the year.

One entity fulfilling responsibilities of both a 4-H Council and a 4-H Fair Board

This structure of a single board has an entity that is sometimes referred to as an Ag Association or a Fair Association. The single board is responsible for working in conjunction with the County 4-H Extension Educator to provide guidance and support for both the year-round County 4-H Youth Development Program and the planning and operation of the annual 4-H exhibition at the 4-H Fair. This entity may own and manage the property on which the fair is held. It is highly recommended that this affiliate type have a committee strictly focused on support of the 4-H Youth Educator and year-round, educational programmatic needs of the community.

A 4-H Council and a non 4-H Fair Board

In this structure, the 4-H Council fulfills the duties outlined above, while working in conjunction with the County 4-H Extension Educator and with a Fair Board that is not affiliated with the 4-H program. The non 4-H Fair Board is separately organized and operates separately from Purdue University. Its responsibilities are similar to those defined for the 4-H Fair Board above.

A facilities use agreement is in place between the non 4-H Fair Board, the 4-H Council, and the County Purdue Extension Office to outline the procedures under which Purdue Extension, including the 4-H Program, may utilize the facilities on the fairgrounds.

Club Leader

Livestock Committee Member

- TIME COMMITMENT VARIES, DEPENDING ON THE PROJECT AND THE DESIRE OF THE VOLUNTEER TO PROVIDE EDUCATIONAL WORKSHOPS, ASSISTANCE TO MEMBERS.

Board Member

4-H COUNCIL

- RESPONSIBLE FOR FACILITATING THE 4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM FOR THE YOUTH OF ADAMS COUNTY THROUGH PURDUE EXTENSION ADAMS COUNTY.
- TERMS ARE 3 YEARS IN LENGTH, MAY SERVE A MAXIMUM OF 2 TERMS

- Maintain integrity of Premier Showmanship experience.

4-H LIVESTOCK COMMITTEES

- Responsible for providing educational opportunities for youth involved in program.
- Assist with rule changes and judge suggestions at yearly Livestock Review Meeting.
- Carry out fair responsibilities to provide for an educational, fun and fair event for youth.

Grievance/Appeal Guidelines for County 4-H Program Issues: (Activities, Programs, Projects)

The grievance procedures outlined in this document are utilized as part of an internal process of the Indiana 4-H Youth Development program when grievances of 4-H members, their parents/guardians, or 4-H volunteers cannot be resolved via reasonable conversation. This policy affords the opportunity in those unique situations to allow voice or opinion to be heard when there is a dispute regarding 4-H participation, activities or programs. This is not a mechanism for complaints against individual 4-H members (or their families), 4-H volunteers, judging officials for competitive events, or Purdue Extension staff. All resulting decisions will be made in accordance with the Indiana 4-H Program's stated mission to be an inclusive organization designed to encourage and maximize youth participation. The rights of the individual filing the grievance are limited to those provided by Indiana 4-H Program policy.

Purdue University, as the Land Grant University in Indiana, is charged (by the United States Department of Agriculture) with implementing the 4-H Program in communities across the State of Indiana. Purdue Extension Educators in each Indiana county represent the university in local communities and have the responsibility of assuring all 4-H volunteers meet basic university criteria as they serve as representatives of the university. Purdue Extension Educators additionally provide oversight to 4-H volunteers including the assurance that Indiana 4-H Policies and Procedures are appropriately implemented in 4-H Program delivery.

Individual county 4-H policies and procedures should be created and reviewed to assure they do not contradict established statewide 4-H policies and procedures. If a contradiction is discovered during the grievance process, Indiana 4-H Program policy shall be followed in determining the grievance outcome.

- 1. Grievances are made by completing the Indiana 4-H Grievance/Appeal form with the burden of proof being the responsibility of the individual filing the grievance. The completed grievance/appeal form and supporting documentation shall be presented to the president of the 4-H policy-making body (e.g., 4-H Council) or the Purdue Extension Educator who works with the 4-H Program. (NOTE: concerns regarding staff, volunteers, members, or other individuals are not issues for which a grievance may be filed. 4-H volunteers are assigned by the 4-H Extension Educator. Concerns regarding 4-H volunteers, members, or other individuals should be addressed directly with the Purdue 4-H Extension Educator).
- 2. Grievances pertaining to 4-H activities, programs or projects shall be filed within 14 days of an incident or occurrence. Grievances pertaining to county fair related issues are often time-sensitive and must be filed within 24 hours of the incident.
- 3. The grievance process occurs in the county where the issue or concern arises and offers two opportunities for a concern to be heard and reviewed.
 - A. The grievance is initially heard by an unbiased, representative grievance sub-committee. It is the Purdue Extension Educator assigned to 4-H Programming who shall annually work with the chair of the county 4-H Council to determine this committee's membership to include a combination of 3-6 of the following:

 1 Representative of the 4-H Council
 - 2 4-H Volunteers serving as a 4-H Club Organizational Leader
 - 1 Representative of the County Extension Board Member
 - 1 4-H Adult Volunteers knowledgeable in the subject matter (project) of concern
 - This individual will vary dependent on the issue raised with the grievance.
 - 1 Youth Representative
 - Up to 3 Community Leaders
 - B. The person filing the grievance may appeal the decision of the 4-H Grievance Committee to the State 4-H Program Leader or designee. The Program Leader or designee will review the facts in evidence and render a decision. This is the **second and final level** in the appeal process.

The intent of a two-level process is to assure different individuals have the opportunity to hear and act on the grievance. ALL individuals involved at any level of the grievance procedure are reminded of the importance of keeping discussions regarding grievances confidential.

To maintain the confidentiality of the parties involved, the grievance hearings at each level will be closed to the public. Only the individuals who have filed the grievance, the members of the grievance committee, and the Purdue Extension Educators will be present during each level of the grievance process, ***The grievance process is internal to the Indiana 4-H Youth Development Program and meetings of the grievance committees are not subject to Indiana's Open Door Policy.

The Purdue Extension Educator assigned to work with the 4-H Program has the obligation to inform all parties that there is a grievance procedure if there are disagreements with policies.

The practice of charging fees from those filing grievances shall be eliminated and all counties will utilize the Indiana 4-H Grievance/Appeal Form as part of the grievance process.

ADAMS COUNTY 4-H LIVESTOCK RULES & REQUIREMENTS

Animal Identification, Ownership and Exhibition

- 1. Exhibition of 4-H projects in local, county or state exhibits/fairs is considered a privilege and is voluntary on the part of the exhibitor. The exhibition of 4-H projects provides 4-H members an opportunity to display their 4-H projects, enter into competition and participate in an educational/social environment with their peers. With exhibition also comes the responsibility for abiding by all of the terms and conditions pertaining to the respective 4-H project. Not following the established terms and conditions of the projects will be grounds for exclusion from the competition/exhibition or the project itself.
- 2. 4-H animals are expected to be in the possession and regular care of the 4-H member who owns/leases them (unless other arrangements have been agreed upon by the County 4-H Extension Educator) from the animal ID deadline until the conclusion of the county and/or state fair.
- 3. All animals must be identified in Indiana 4HOnline or via official paper enrollment form (based on species) by May 15 Indiana 4-H Animal Ownership deadline in order to show at the Adams County 4-H Fair, some species require ID days.

4-H Online

- A single animal can only be included in one 4-H Online family profile.
- Animals are automatically dual-enrolled with each sibling listed in a family profile, therefore it is important that a single animal only be listed once in 4-HOnline.

Livestock Identification Day Schedule

4-H Market and Commercial animals must be individually identified and verified under the supervision of the county 4-H program at county identification events by May 15 each year (or the following business day if the 15th falls on a weekend of holiday). The following are required to attend an identification day to be weighed in and identified for exhibition. Additional information will be sent specific to each species to all youth enrolled in the project prior to ID Day.

Beef	March 2, 2024	7:30 - 10:30 AM	Adams County 4-H Fairgrounds
Goats	April 20, 2024	6:30 - 7:30 PM	Adams County 4-H Fairgrounds
Starter Calf	April 27, 2024	7:30 - 10:30 AM	Adams County 4-H Fairgrounds
Sheep	April 28, 2024	2 - 4 PM	Adams County 4-H Fairgrounds

Livestock purchased after an Adams County specific Identification Day but prior to May 15th can still be accepted for exhibition. In order to get the animal identified, contact the specific species committee President immediately after purchase to arrange for a date to present proof of purchase and a date to have animal(s) identified. Arrangements must be made, identification completed and animal entered into 4hOnline by May 15. (Dairy Starter Calves intended for County Only are excluded from this due to beginning weight limits).

4. Temporary guardianships established for the intent of animal exhibition or grooming purposes are not permitted and shall results in immediate disqualification.

5. For 4-H Breeding Animals:

Family corporations and/or partnerships of 4-H members with one or more parents, siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles, or legal guardians are acceptable.

- 6. 4-H Breeding Beef, Boer Goats, Dairy Goats, Sheep and Swine must be registered in one of the following methods:
 - a. In the 4-H members' name;
 - b. John Smith and Sons;
 - c. John Smith, Sons and Daughters;
 - d. John Smith and Family (family includes sons, daughters, and legal guardian youth only);
 - e. Mark Smith (brother) and Mary Smith (sister);
 - f. Family corporations, where the 4-H members' name appears as a holder of stock in the corporation, and proof of same must be supplied on or before the ID deadline;
 - g. Family partnership where the 4-H members father, mother, brother, sister, aunt, uncle, grandparent, and/or legal guardian is also in the family partnership and the 4-H member's name appears on the legal, notarized partnership. A copy of the written document must be on file with the Extension Office before ID deadline.
- 7. For 4-H Dairy Cattle:
 - Family corporations and/or partnerships of the 4-H member with unrelated persons or dairy operations are acceptable.
- 8. Dairy Cows (as long as the animal is being shown by same 4-H'er from 2020 and forward), Heifers, Horses, Ponies, Alpacas and Llamas may be leased (subject to approval) after submitting the appropriate Indiana 4-H Lease paperwork by the animal enrollment deadline (uploaded online at v2.4honline.com). 4-H Dairy Heifers, Horses, Ponies, Alpacas and Llamas are only eligible to be leased by a single 4-H member in a 4-H program year.
- 9. 4-H animals exhibited after the May 15 (or the following business day if the 15th falls on a weekend or holiday) State 4-H animal ID deadline at any show by anyone other than the individual whose 4-H enrollment record is connected to the ID of the animal in Indiana 4-H Online will not be eligible to be shown at the Adams County 4-H Fair or in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. This term/condition does not apply to siblings, who may show each other's animals at any show during the year without jeopardizing State Fair eligibility. 4-H animals that are selected by 4-H Extension Staff or 4-H Adult Volunteers for use in Supreme Showmanship contests (Master Showmanship, Round Robin, etc.) may be used in those county events without jeopardizing State Fair eligibility. This policy applies to all 4-H animal projects. For animal projects without State ID Deadlines, the person who enters them in the Indiana State Fair 4-H show is the equivalent of the owner of the animals.

ADAMS COUNTY 4-H LIVESTOCK RULES & REQUIREMENTS

- 10. 4-H exhibitors having an entry in livestock shows at the Adams County 4-H Fair are expected to show their own animals. In cases where this cannot be done, the owner may request another Adams County 4-H member to serve as a substitute showman. Substitute showmen must be approved by the County 4-H Extension Educator.
- 11. 4-H Exhibitors may receive clipping and grooming assistance from their immediate family (father, mother and siblings), from a current Indiana 4-H member and from individuals on the Indiana Approved Animal Grooming Assistance Program.
- 12. 4-H animals purchased, sold or offered for sale after the enrollment deadline and prior to the Indiana State Fair (including animals that have gone through a "Premium Only Auction"), shall not be eligible to show at the Adams County 4-H Fair or in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. Sale of products of animals (milk, cheese, wool, etc.). in lieu of the animal, are considered equivalent to a "Premium Only Auction."
- 13. In the event that a 4-H members' auction animal dies after it is unloaded and weighed in at the Adams County 4-H Fair, the 4-H'er may be granted the privilege to "sell" in the Livestock Auction and earn Premium dollars.
- 14. All livestock not being consigned or sold in the Adams County 4-H Livestock Auction may leave the fairgrounds after Auction Set-Up is complete. Livestock with an appointment at Manley Meats will be the only exception and will only be allowed to leave on a trailer supplied by Manley's and on the approved list.

Paperwork and Certification Requirements

1. Livestock Workshops

Members exhibiting livestock are required to attend at least 1 pre-approved "worksheet replacing workshop" or complete a Livestock Record Sheet for each species enrolled in.

Workshop Verification or Livestock Record Sheet must be completed and into the Extension Office by 4 PM on July 1.

- Adams County 4-H Livestock Workshops
 Attendance will be taken at each workshop to verify fulfillment of the learning opportunity.

 Each livestock committee will be responsible for submitting the list of attendees to the Extension Office.
- Additional Outside Educational Workshops
 Sometimes educational opportunities arise that could qualify as a "worksheet replacing workshop"; in this event the Extension Office will advertise as they come along or youth may reach out 4-H Youth Development Extension Educator to seek **prior** approval of such opportunities.

2. Fair Entry

Members must complete Fair Entry at adamscountyindiana.fairentry.com for all livestock intended for exhibition at the Adams County 4-H Fair by 4PM on July 1. Those members not completing Fair Entry by the posted deadline will have the opportunity to receive feedback from the exhibition class only.

3. Quality Assurance Certification

Livestock members enrolled in Beef, Dairy, Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, Starter Calf and Swine must complete the Indiana 4-H Quality Livestock Cares (QLC) Certification by July 1st. This is an annual program that can be completed by attending an in-person workshop offered, additional details provided in the Adams County 4-H Newsletter and in individual species enrollment packets for specific session information.

Drug & Alterations Principles

- 1. At no time shall animal exhibits have any substance present or alteration that violates standards established by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) or provides any potential performance enhancing quality or any potential showing advantage.
 - Tampering, Altering, and/or Misrepresentation and Unethical Fitting relative to any 4-H exhibit is prohibited.
 - Coloring that alters or misrepresents breed characteristics, pumping air or other substances to alter conformation; methods to induce artificial fill; performing surgical and/or non-surgical procedures to alter the animal's configuration or natural conformation of any part of the animal's body.
 - The following generally accepted management practices are allowed: hoof trimming, dehorning, removal of hair, castration, branding, tattooing, ear notching and docking of tails).
- 2. No drugs may be administered to a 4-H animal exhibit at the Adams County 4-H Fair except those administered by a Veterinarian, 4-H member, or 4-H parent **after approval** of the Committee Chairperson. The procedure must be witnessed by the Committee Chairperson/or designee and documented by completing an Animal Medication Treatment Report Form. Additionally, please know that medication withdrawal times must be adhered to for animals being sold in the auction and market trucks (if available).

Overnight Policy

Effective January 1, 1998, there will be no liability coverage provided to 4-H volunteers and staff during overnight stays at fairs unless each 4-H/Youth participant is accompanied by his/her parent or legal guardian at all times. The time normally associated with overnight is that time when the fair shuts down for the evening or by midnight and until early morning feeding of animals (early morning is normally construed as morning light in our summer season). Adults/volunteers officially assigned to watch 4-H projects overnight at county/state fairs are still covered by Purdue University liability insurance. However, this is not to be confused with aforementioned policy regarding 4-H youth. County 4-H Councils, Extension Boards and /or Fair Boards not abiding by this policy do so at their own risk and should seek their own liability insurance.

4-H'ers demonstrate their livestock knowledge and showing abilities.

Sheep Beef Goats Starter Calf Swine

Participants will be Premier Showmanship Contest winners of the current year in Beef, Dairy, Goats, Horse and Pony, Poultry, Sheep, Starter Calf and Swine. All eight contestants must earn the opportunity to participate.

In the event a Premier Showmanship winner qualifies for the Supreme Showmanship contest in more than one species, the member must represent the first species in which they qualify.

The runner-up in the subsequent species will then be eligible for the Supreme Showmanship contest.

All Supreme Showmanship winners are eligible to repeat; however they must earn their spot into the Supreme Showmanship contest through a specific species yearly.

Each species will be shown under the appropriate guidelines of that species.

4-H members are prohibited from showing their own or any family member's animal in supreme showmanship regardless of whether the animal is in the ring or not.

Participant and animal assignments will be made by random drawing prior to each species portion of the contest.

A representative from each species committee will be responsible for selecting enough animals for all contestants.


- 4-H Members selling in the livestock auction must:

 - Assist with Fair Cleanup, Friday at conclusion of fair.
 - Send thank you notes to all auction buyers and supporters shortly after fair.
- Exhibitors will be permitted to sell once through the 4-H Livestock Auction, unless earning the privilege to sell a maximum of twice.

The following are the **only exhibitors** who may sell twice in the auction:

• 2 Grand Champions

- 1 Dairy Supreme or Reserve/1 Grand Champion
- 1 Grand Champion/1 Reserve Grand Champion
- 1 Dairy Supreme/1 Reserve Grand Champion
- 1 Dairy or Horse & Pony Showmanship Winner/one other specie
- Members are required to be present to sell their own animal. Any exception must be approved by the species committee and/or 4-H Youth Development Extension Educator as soon as issue arises.
- Please review specific rules listed under each species. However, these auction rules take precedence over rules listed in specific species.
- All members who sell in the auction are guaranteed to at least receive market price for their animal.
- All animals sold through the auction and consigned, will go to the consignee without exception.
- Everything sold through the Auction is subject to 3% (off the gross) auction fee.






Exhibit Guidelines:

1. Mini 4-H is for all youth in Kindergarten thru 2nd grade.

- Mini 4-H members must enroll online at v2.4honline.com and pay county program fees annually during the open enrollment window October 1 thru January 15. There is no Indiana State 4-H program fee for Mini 4-H.
- All Adams County Mini 4-H members must complete the Universal Adams County Mini 4-H Record Sheet each year. Completed record sheet must be turned in to the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1.

There is no State Fair entry for Mini 4-H Exhibition.

Mini 4-H Non-Competitive Policy:

Mini 4-H is a program designed to encourage positive development of children, Kindergarten through second grade. Mini 4-H is available in the majority of counties in Indiana. The goal of Mini 4-H is to help young children explore friendships outside the family; explore the way in which things work; practice both small and large muscle control; and think about the ways people work together on projects.

The Non-Competitive learning environment for Mini 4-H includes:


- 1. Planned learning activities in which children are invited to be active and explore material and ideas without the pressure of completing an specific product or exhibit.
- 2. Low adult/leader to child ratio that allows time for adult/leaders to provide individual, positive encouragement and assistance.
- 3. Simple, interesting activities that are fun.
- 4. Encouragement of children to participate in a group activity by sharing and or displaying their activity projects.
- 5. Rewards that are identical and/or ribbons of the same color for everyone. Do not judge projects, but instead discuss them with the child.

- a. The safety and well being of our 4-H youth is of the utmost importance. Although kindergarten is specified as the time when a child may begin participation in some 4-H events and activities, parents are encouraged to take into consideration their child's physical and mental development before agreeing to let the child begin to show, work with, or care for animals. Each child matures at a different rate and children in grades K-2 may still be too young to begin showing, working with or caring for animals.
- b. The State 4-H Youth Department at Purdue University has agreed to allow Mini 4-H members in grades K-2 to participate in some animal projects subject to certain conditions. Each county may determine its own programs, classes, and participation requirements subject to the following safety guidelines:
 - Mini 4-H members, in grades K-2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less. Mini 4-H members may show, work with, or care for animals over 300 pounds when they are assisted by a parent, legal guardian, or another adult designated in writing by the parent or legal guardian.
 - Mini 4-H members in livestock are not required to own the animals they participate with in Mini 4-H. Additionally, Mini 4-H'ers can not bring their own animal except in the Horse and Pony, Rabbit and Poultry projects. For all other livestock projects Mini 4-H'ers must show an animal that has been brought to the fair by a regular 4-H member.
 - Mini 4-H members exhibiting horses must wear ASTM or SEI standard F1163(or above) certified helmets whenever mounted. The parent/guardian is responsible to see that this specified headgear is properly fitted with the approved harness in place and fastened whenever a rider is mounted.
 - If the guidelines stated in this policy are not followed for a particular event or activity, then such event or activity shall not be considered to be a 4-H event or activity and shall not be under the auspices of Extension 4-H educators or covered by Purdue University.

Mini 4-H Posters

- 1. All mini poster must be displayed horizontally and must be exactly 14" high x 22" wide.
- 2. Posters should NOT have a stiff backing for Mini 4-H.
- 3. All posters must be covered with clear plastic or acetate. This will protect the poster and add to the attractiveness of the display. (Sleeves available to purchase at Extension Office)
- 4. A 3" x 4" label will be provided with member information at the time of check-in (name, grade, club name, etc.). This label must be placed in the lower right corner of the poster,

plan accordingly when making your poster and leave a spot for the 3x4 label.



Bicycle

Utilize Mini 4-H project manual to base exhibit work on. Mini 4-H'er must select a different exhibit each year in project.

Poster/Project Ideas:

- Draw a picture of you and your bike based on one activity in this manual.
- Take a picture of you and your bike. Add a picture of: traffic signs, ways you use your bicycle, rules of the road, bicycling is fun, or labeling bike parts.
- Draw a picture or take a picture of your bicycle helmet. Tell why it is important to wear a helmet.
- Decorate your bicycle as though it were going to be in a parade. Have pictures taken of you with your decorated bicycle and use them for your exhibit.
- Plan a short trip to the grocery store, to a friend's house, etc. Make a map showing your route. Draw traffic signs, speed limits, danger points, corners, one-way streets, etc. Include a picture of yourself with your bicycle, things you need for your trip, and anything else you can imagine for your exhibit.
- Write a story about you and your bicycle. Include all the things you and your friends can do
 with your bicycles. You may want to add pictures to decorate your exhibit.

Bugs

Utilize Mini 4-H project manual to base exhibit work on. Mini 4-H'er must select a different exhibit each year in project.

Poster/Project Ideas:

- Design and make your own bug using materials around your house.
- Make a poster or book showing the life cycle of a bug.
- Make a poster showing bugs that live in groups on one half and bugs that live alone on the other half.
- Make a poster or an insect and spider. Label the body parts.
- Make a poster of a picture of a butterfly. Be sure to make the designs on the wings symmetrical.

Collections

Utilize Mini 4-H project manual to base exhibit work on. Mini 4-H'er must select a different exhibit each year in project.

Poster/Project Ideas:

• Collect and exhibit 5 items or 5 pairs of items.

These articles can be rocks, coins, insects, salt and pepper shakers, pencils, or any kind of fun collection. Attach a 3x5-inch card to your collections display that tells what you collected and why you collected the item(s).

- * If you take Collections more than one year, add 5 more articles to your collection each year.
- Go to a museum or library and look around at the collections of things.

Write a short report on your visit.

Here are some thing that you might want to put in your report:

- * Why do museums collect articles? List some things they collect.
- * Ask someone who works at a museum how they get things for their collections.
- * What is the best collection of items/ What is the most unusual?

Exhibit Rules and Requirements:

- 1. All Adams County Mini 4-H members must complete the universal Adams County Mini 4-H Record Sheet each year. Completed record sheet must be turned in to the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1.
- 2. Show one Dairy Heifer which has not freshened at the Adams County 4-H Fair owned by a 4-H member.
 - a. The heifer you show at the 4-H Fair will **NOT** be your own heifer. The heifer must belong to a regular 4-H member enrolled in the Dairy project. Additionally the heifer must be shown by the regular 4-H member in the current show, meaning that an older 4-H member cannot bring an extra heifer just for the Mini 4-H member to show.
- 3. The 4-H Dairy Show is Wednesday of the 4-H Fair. All Mini 4-H members will show together. The members will be judged on showmanship, with each member receiving a ribbon.
- 4. Mini 4-H members will **NOT** sell in the 4-H Auction.
- 5. Mini 4-H members, in grades K-2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less. Display of 3 color photos, number each picture. Photos must be 1 of an Animal, 1 of a Person and 1 of Scenery A title of your choosing placed at the top of the poster.

2nd Grade

Display of 5 photos (Color and/or Black & White), number each picture.

Photos must be a mixture of vertical and horizontal placement and a variety of subjects.

A title of your choosing placed at the top of the poster.

Plants and Flowers

Utilize Mini 4-H project manual to base exhibit work on. Mini 4-H'er must select a different exhibit each year in project.

Poster/Project Ideas:

- A house plant. Attach a small label that tells the kind of plant.
- Exhibit **two (2)** full blooms of either <u>zinnias or marigolds</u> you grew. Put your flowers in any kind of plain, disposable vase or bottle. (Aluminum foil may be used to cover the vase or bottle if you need to).
- Exhibit a colored flower. See Activity 6 for directions.

Poultry

Exhibit Rules and Requirements:

- 1. All Adams County Mini 4-H members must complete the universal Adams County Mini 4-H Record Sheet each year. Completed record sheet must be turned in to the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1.
- 2. Show one chicken, turkey, duck, goose, or any other type of poultry of any age/gender at the Adams County 4-H Fair. a. Mini 4-H'ers may show their own or a regular 4-H members project animal.
 - b. All poultry must not exhibit symptoms of disease that may be infectious or contagious.

 Poultry will be inspected by the 4-H Poultry Committee upon arrival at the fairgrounds and any birds showing signs of parasites, disease or in bad health will be sent home.
 - c. Poultry will stay the duration of the fair. Cage will be assigned and provided and it 4-H'ers responsibility to feed and water birds daily(bring own pans).
- 3. Mini 4-H Poultry participants are encouraged to attend the Poultry Club meetings. It is recommended that you talk and work with older 4-H members in the poultry project as a helpful mentor.
- 4. The 4-H Poultry Show is Tuesday of the 4-H Fair. All Mini 4-H members will show together. Mini 4-H members must be present to show their own poultry.
 - Poultry will be judged on care, cleanliness, and general fitness, with each member receiving a ribbon.
- 5. Mini 4-H members will **NOT** sell in the 4-H Auction.
- 6. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less.

Rabbit

Exhibit Rules and Requirements:

- 1. All Adams County Mini 4-H members must complete the universal Adams County Mini 4-H Record Sheet each year. Completed record sheet must be turned in to the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1.
- 2. Show one rabbit (can be any age and either a buck or a doe) at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
 - a. Mini 4-H'ers may show their own or a regular 4-H members project animal.
 - b. Pedigreed rabbits are required for exhibition. No crossbred rabbits are eligible to exhibit in the 4-H Rabbit Show due to following American Rabbit Breeder Association (ARBA) standards.
 - c. All rabbit must not exhibit symptoms of disease that may be infectious or contagious.

 Rabbits will be inspected by the 4-H Rabbit Committee upon arrival at the fairgrounds and any rabbits showing signs of parasites, disease or in bad health will be sent home.
 - d. Rabbits will stay the duration of the fair. Cage will be assigned and provided and it 4-H'ers responsibility to feed and water rabbits daily(bring own pans).
- 3. The 4-H Rabbit Show is Wednesday of the 4-H Fair. All Mini 4-H members will show together. Mini 4-H members must be present to show their own rabbit. Rabbits will be judged on care, cleanliness, and general fitness, with each member receiving a ribbon.
- 4. Mini 4-H rabbits will **NOT** sell in the 4-H auction.
- 5. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less.

Saddle Up

- Color and identify pictures of Breeds of Horses from Activity 2. Make a poster with these pictures.

- Make a poster showing how to measure a horse & telling a horse diet. Can be pictures/drawing/clipping from magazines.

Sheep

Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less. Mini 4-H members may only show, work with, or care for animals over 300 pounds when are assisted by a parent, legal guardian, or other adult designated in writing by parent or legal guardian.



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Aerospace

Project Superintendent: Doug Habegger, 417-2405

Description: The 4-H aerospace program provides youth with educational information about aerospace that

develops skills and knowledge such as principles of flight, model rocket construction, attention

to detail, creativity and critical thinking.

State Fair Entries: One (1) Rocket, Remote Control Aircraft or Drone per Level

One (1) Poster/Display Board per Level

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. "Ready to Fly" and E2X rockets are not permitted. Rockets may be exhibited with a base, but launch pads are not permitted. All rockets must weigh less than 3.3 pounds and considered an amateur rocket according to FAA regulations. Remote control aircraft or drones may be constructed from a kit or purchased ready-to-fly.

The power source (rocket engine, battery pack, etc.) is to be removed before being placed in public exhibition.

3. Rockets will not be launched and remote control aircraft or drones will not be flown at fair.

- 4. All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.
- 5. Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.
- 6. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Exhibit Guidelines:

Beginner-Grades 3-5

Exhibit one of the following:

- 1. Construct a rocket of your choice designed for a model rocket enthusiast with a difficulty level that is appropriate for the suggested grade level. Rockets cannot be ready-to-fly (RTF) or have plastic fins.

 Cluster engine rockets and rockets that take an engine D or above are not permitted in this level.
- 2. A poster or display board on any topic in the manual. Similar topics not included in the manual are permissible.
- 3. Learn to fly a remote control aircraft or drone of your choice that is age/grade appropriate and compliant with FAA regulations, federal and state laws, and local ordinances. This exhibit choice is to include a notebook or poster including how the aircraft/drone was used and aerospace skills learned. Displaying the aircraft or drone is optional. Other topics could include how a quadcopter operates, controls used to fly a quadcopter, UAV regulations administered by Federal Aviation Administration, commercial and emergency uses of UAVs and more.

Intermediate-Grades 6-8

Exhibit one of the following:

- 1. Construct a rocket of your choice designed for a model rocket enthusiast with some experience and with a difficulty level that is appropriate for the suggested grade level. Rockets cannot be ready-to-fly (RTF) or have plastic fins. Cluster engine rockets and rockets that take an engine E or above are not permitted in this level.
- 2. A poster or display board on any topic in the manual. Similar topics not included in the manual are permissible.
- 3. Construct or learn to fly a remote control aircraft or drone of your choice that is age/grade appropriate and compliant with FAA regulations, federal and state laws, and local ordinances. This exhibit choice is to include a notebook or poster including how the aircraft/drone was used and aerospace skills learned. Displaying the aircraft or drone is optional. Other topics could include interviewing a certified UAV pilot who works in law enforcement, EMS, fire, Purdue Extension, commercial or other application or creating a flight plan or interfacing with other computer software.

Advanced-Grades 9-12

Exhibit one of the following:

- 1. Construct a rocket of your choice designed for an experienced model rocket enthusiast and with a difficulty level that is appropriate for the suggested grade level.
- 2. A poster or display board on any topic in the manual. Similar topics not included in the manual are permissible. Rockets cannot be ready-to-fly (RTF) or have plastic fins.
 - Cluster engine rockets and rockets that take an engine G or above are not permitted in this level.
- 3. Construct or learn to fly a remote control aircraft or drone of your choice that is age/grade appropriate and compliant with FAA regulations, federal and state laws, and local ordinances. This exhibit choice is to include a notebook or poster including how the aircraft/drone was used and aerospace skills learned. Displaying the aircraft or drone is optional. Other topics could include using "stitching" software to produce an orthomosaic map for a research purpose, identifying Department of Transportation Aeronautical Chart features and explain importance to a drone pilot, how to obtain a drone pilot license, or more. (If 16+, 4-H'er could obtain a license by completing/passing FAA Part 107 UAV licensing test.)

Description: The Alfalfa and Mixed Hay project introduces youth to crop production.

Encouraging youth to foster relationships with local farmers or be actively involved in their family

Alfalfa and/or Mixed Hay production.

State Fair Entries: County Project Only, No Indiana State Fair Entries

Project Guidelines:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. This project will be divided into two(2) categories; youth may bring one (1) entry in each category if choose:

a. Alfalfa

b. Mixed Hay

3. 4-H member must be actively involved in the production of no less than one acre of hay. It is encouraged to have the soil tested and follow fertilization recommendations for optimal yield.

4. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

1. Exhibit a high feeding quality, good color, leafy and free from weeds sample:

a. Alfalfa

Animal Education

Description: Youth can learn about livestock and companion animals through a variety of experiences such as

3-D display, poster or notebook. Animal ownership or exhibition is not required.

State Fair Entries: One (1) Entry per Level in each of the offered divisions (Cat, Dog, Llama, Poultry and Rabbit)

Project Requirements:

Description: The Aquatic Science Project helps youth learn about raising aquarium fish. 4-H'ers learn basics of

aquarium set-up, maintenance and how to select fish for your aquarium by hands on trial and error.

State Fair Entries: County Project Only, No Indiana State Fair Entries

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Exhibit Guidelines:

1. Members must have cared for fish at least four weeks prior to the fair.

- Members should exhibit fish in a small, simple bowl with uncluttered surroundings and at least one flat side for viewing. Aquariums are not to exceed 15 gallons.
- 3. Completed Aquatic Science Manual is required and must be turned in at time of judging with exhibit.

Beginner-Grades 3-5

- 1. Learn feeding habits of your fish.
- 2. Learn proper accessories needed for an aquarium.
- 3. Learn care of your aquarium.
- 4. Exhibit:
 - a. One or two pair of fish in an aquarium.

A pair of egg-layers is considered one male and one female. If impossible to determine sex, just exhibit two fish.

A "pair" of live-bearers consists of two females and one male.

In all cases the fish in the pair should be about the same size. For large fish, (such as goldfish), exhibit only one fish.

- b. Members should choose fish that are proportional in size to the aquarium.
- c. Members must have a backing on the tank.
- d. Plants, gravel, and lights are optional.

Intermediate-Grades 6-8

- 1. Learn what kinds of fish are compatible with one another for an aquarium.
- 2. Choose a variety of compatible fish for a community aquarium.
- 3. Study the natural surroundings of your fish.
- 4. Exhibit:
 - a. A community aquarium.
 - b. Gravel, plants, background and lights are required.

Advanced-Grades 9-12

- 1. Choose an aquarium from one of the following subclasses:
 - a. Educational
 - b. Beautiful-Natural
 - c. Beautiful-Artificial
 - d. Spawning
 - e. Other
- 2. Exhibit:
 - a. Aquarium in the subclass of your choice. Include a short description explaining why subclass was chosen.
 - b. Members should use gravel and a background in aquarium.
 - c. Lighting and some plants are suggested, depending on the display.

Arts and Crafts Projects

Description: Allows youth to grow and practice self-expression and self-reflection while expressing creativity

in a wide range of mediums such as painting, drawing, models, and craft work.

State Fair Entries: Two (2) Entries Arts and Crafts

Two (2) Entries Fine Arts Two (2) Entries Needlecraft

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. A 4-H member may enroll in any of the 3 specific craft projects:

- a. Arts and Crafts, General
- b. Fine Arts
- c. Needlecraft
- 3. All arts and craft exhibits must include a 4-H Craft Information Card, 4-H 618A.

Craft Information Card describes work completed so the judge can more accurately evaluate the exhibit. This is used for judging purposes only, should be attached to back/underside of project for judge to view.

4. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Arts and Crafts

Youth may exhibit any art or craft that does not meet exhibit guidelines in Construction and Architectural Replica, Fine Arts, Model Craft or Needlecraft projects.

This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.
- 3. Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.
- 4. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Division I (1st year in Barbecue)

- 1. Barbecue at least two times for family and/or friends.
- 2. Exhibit a poster with 5-7 pictures of member barbecuing. Include captions to explain the process.

Division II (2nd year in Barbecue)

- 1. Barbecue at least three times for family and/or friends.
- 2. Exhibit a poster with 5-7 pictures of member barbecuing. Include captions to explain the pictures along with two recipes.

Division III (3rd year in Barbecue)

- 1. Demonstrate barbecuing to your 4-H Club or any group of ten or more people.
- 2. Barbecue at least three times in addition to the demonstration. Prepare at least two types of meat.
- 3. Exhibit a poster with 5-7 pictures illustrating a barbecue demonstration given to a 4-H Club or group. Include captions to explain the pictures along with three recipes.

Division IV (4th year in Barbecue)

- 1. Give a demonstration on cutting meat into various sizes for proper barbecuing.
- 2. Barbecue at least four times. At one of these, plan and serve a complete menu for three people.
- 3. Exhibit a poster with 5-7 pictures illustrating the member barbecuing and serving a small group of 3-7 people. Include captions to explain the pictures along with menu and four recipes.

Advanced Division (5th year in Barbecue)

- 1. Teach at least one other person how to safety plan, prep and barbecue meals for themselves and others.
- 2. Barbecue at least four times, one of which is to a larger group (nine or more people).
- 3. Exhibit a poster with 5-7 pictures illustrating serving a large group, including pictures of the members own barbecue. Include captions to explain the pictures along.
- 4. Additionally include on poster:

Meal Menu (at least one of the below must be grilled)

- Fruits and Vegetables
- Meats
- Breads and Pastries
- Desserts
- Drinks

Beef

Project Superintendent: Paul Bluhm, 223-2142

Description: 4-H Beef project provides youth with a fun and hands-on learning experience which develops skills in

nutrition, health care and animal husbandry. Responsibility, record keeping, problem solving, disease prevention and decision making are just a few of the many life skills gained in 4-H animal projects.

State Fair Entries: All animals for State Fair must be properly identified and enrolled.

State Fair entry is open online at exhibitorscorner.indianastatefair.com May 16 - July 1.

General Rules:

1. All 4-H General Rules, Livestock Rules and Health Regulations apply.

- 2. All steers, market heifers and & non-registered heifers must be individually identified during the county identification day under the supervision of the Extension Staff at the start of the project. Animals will be weighed and tagged with an official Adams County eartag.
- 3. All animals must be identified, owned, under the care of the 4-H'er and enrolled online by end of day on May 15.
- 4. Universal Adams County 4-H Record Sheet **AND** Workshop Verification OR Livestock Record Sheet **AND** Fair Entry is due into the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1. 4-H'ers not completing this requirement will have the opportunity to receive feedback from the exhibition class only and unable to sell in the 4-H Auction at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
 - a. 4-H'ers enrolled in both Beef and Starter Calf projects will only need to attend one workshop to count towards both Beef and Starter Calf Paperwork Requirements. 4-H'ers not attending a workshop will need to complete the Livestock Record Sheet for both Beef and Starter Calf.
- 5. All cattle must be properly dehorned. In addition all steers must be properly castrated or banned.

Animals will be inspected upon arrival at fair by a Beef/Starter Calf Committee member. Decision of committee is final.

- 6. All Dairy and Dairy/Beef Cross animals will be genomic tested during the county identification day to determine breed composition. Testing will be completed by a 4-H volunteer by collecting a DNA tissue sample from the ear of the animal. Testing will cost \$14 per animal, partially funded through sponsorship and fundraising. The test will identify % dairy genetics versus % beef genetics.
 - Cattle test results showing 75% and higher dairy genetics will show as a Dairy Steer
 - Cattle test results showing 40% to 74.9% dairy genetics will show as a Dairy/Beef Cross Steer
 - Cattle test results showing 39.9% or lower dairy genetics will show as a Beef Steer

If genomic tests results are in a different class than what the 4-H member declared at County ID Day, the 4-H Extension Educator will contact the 4-H member about results to inform the new class the animal is assigned. Animals only need to be tested once; If a starter calf is genomic tested one year and comes back the following year as a Beef project, we will use the test from the previous year to determine where your animal will show at the fair assuming it has all original ear tags(County 5-Digit and RFID) at May 15 enrollment deadline.

7. Any situation not covered by these rules shall be handled by the proper representatives of the 4-H Beef/Starter Calf Committee and the 4-H Extension Educator.

Entry Procedures and Fair Exhibition Specific Rules:

- 1. Each member may show a maximum of 3 Market animals and 3 Breeding animals at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- 2. Beef/Starter Calf members will unload/weigh-in 45 minutes prior to scheduled check-in, to allow for help with fair entry.
- 3. A 4x6 (landscape) picture of yourself and the animal you plan to sell in the auction must be turned in during Saturday check-in at fair. 4-H'ers Name and Animal ID must be on the back of the picture.
- 4. Steers will be weighed only once, immediately upon stepping from transportation to the fairgrounds, and this weight will be the official show/auction weight. A representative from the family must be at the scales at time of weigh-in, re-weigh requests must be brought before the committee **immediately** after first weigh in.
- 5. 4-H Member must confirm at fair weigh-in the appropriate class was registered for when completing Fair Entry. This includes confirmation of showing in a Born & Raised, Purebred, Crossbred or Any Other Breed (AOB) class.
- 6. Because of space limitations, steers can be allocated only one tie place per animal.
 - a. All stalls will be assigned by committee after set-up on Monday prior to fair.
 - b. Exhibitors are responsible for the cleanliness of assigned stalls throughout the entire duration of the fair.
 - c. Do not leave buckets of water or feed in front of animals.
 - d. Tie Out location will be provided; cattle are not permitted to go to trailers at night.
- 7. Breeding Heifers will have the option to arrive Saturday during livestock check in OR be trailed in on show day. Breeding Heifers arriving Saturday during livestock check-in will be assigned a stall and will stay the duration of fair. Breeding Heifers arriving on day of show will not be assigned a stall and will work off the trailer; designated trailer parking will be made available by the Adams County 4-H Fair Board.
 - a. 4-Hers who plan to bring Breeding Heifers for show day only must:
 - Check-in and turn in entry ticket(s) at scales on Saturday livestock check-in by 2PM.
 - Be checked in with a Beef Committee member by 1PM on day of show.
 - Be released at conclusion of Beef Show, after trailer area is cleaned up and inspected by Committee Member.

Classes:

1. Breeding Animals:

Must be two heifers per breed to make a class, or they will be placed in an All Other Breeds class.

- If no other All Other Breed heifers, the heifer will stay in previously determined class.
- Exception Born and Raised Class minimum head requirement waived to promote local breeders.

a. **Purebred** Heifers must have registration papers from their breed association and be identified by

registration number or dam registration number and birthdate.

Purebred Breeding classes will be shown by breed then date of birth.

b. **Commercial** Non-Registered Heifers must be tagged and weighed during Beef ID Day.

Commercial Heifers will be shown by weight.

c. **Born and Raised** See Born and Raised Class Information

2. Market Animals:

Must be two market animals per breed to make a class, or they will be placed in an All Other Breeds class.

- If no other All Other Breed market animals, the animal will be placed in the crossbred class.
- Exception Born and Raised Class minimum head requirement waived to promote local breeders.

a. Market Beef

• **Beef Steer** Beef Steer classes will be shown by breed then weight.

• Market Heifer Market Heifer classes will be shown by weight.

Market Heifer will show against Market Steers for Grand Champion Market Beef

• Born and Raised
b. Dairy Steer
See Born and Raised Class Information
Dairy Steer classes will be shown by weight.

Dairy Steers will be divided into four divisions; Division 1-4.

The four divisions champions will compete for Grand Champion Dairy Steer.

c. Beef/Dairy Cross Market Animal

Beef/Dairy Cross classes will be shown by weight.

Beef/Dairy Cross Market Animals will be divided into four divisions; Division 1– 4. The four divisions champions will compete for Grand Champion Beef/Dairy Cross Market Animal.

3. Adams County Born and Raised Steers and Heifers (Beef Breeds Only):

- a. In order to qualify for the class the animal must be a beef breed animal and born and raised in Adams County. The dam must reside in Adams County and must be owned by an Adams County resident.
- b. 4-H members wanting to show their animals in the Born & Raised class for Adams County must have a completed Adams County 4-H Beef Born and Raised Form turned into the Extension Office by May 15.
- c. The Beef Committee will make the final determination if there is an animal in question.

Additional Award:

Rate-of-Gain: award will be given to the exhibitor whose market animal has the highest weight gain per day from the spring county identification day until check-in at county fair.

Showmanship:

- 1. Showmanship is on a volunteer basis with members strongly encouraged to participate.
- 2. Members must currently be enrolled in the Beef project and show their own animal in showmanship.
- 3. Showmanship will be divided into 4 classes:
 - a. **Junior** (**Grades 3-5**) Junior winner will compete in the Intermediate division the following year. Junior winner cannot repeat as Champion Junior Beef Showman.
 - b. **Intermediate (Grades 6-8)** Intermediate winner will compete in Senior division the following year. Intermediate winner cannot repeat as Champion Intermediate Beef Showman.
 - c. **Senior (Grades 9-12)** Senior winner will compete in Premier division the following year. Senior winner cannot repeat as Champion Senior Beef Showman.
 - d. **Premier** The Premier Showman will be selected from the current Beginner, Intermediate and Senior Showman and any past Senior and Premier Showmanship winners still enrolled in 4-H. The winner will represent the beef species in the overall Supreme Showman contest.

A Premier Showmanship runner-up will be selected and announced.

Auction:

- 1. Members must inform the committee of their intent to sell or take the animal home within 30 minutes of the completion of the Beef Show. Informing the committee can be done at the announcers stand the day of the show.
- 2. Cattle must weigh at least 1000 pounds to sell in the auction.
- 3. All non-auction animals will be released after auction set-up on Thursday.
- 4. The Grand Champion Beef Steer will sell first and the Grand Champion Dairy Steer second, this will be rotated each year. (Even years Dairy Steer first, Odd years Beef first.) The Reserve Grand Champion will sell in the same order as above followed by Grand Champion Born and Raised, Reserve Grand Champion Born and Raised, Showmanship (Premier, Senior, Intermediate, Junior), Rate of Gain, Top 3-5 Overall and then remaining animals by back tag number.
- 5. Exhibitors are responsible for providing each animal left at the fairgrounds a completely serviceable halter or tie rope for securing the animal after the sale. The retention of this equipment will be attempted but not assured.

Beekeeping

Project Superintendent: Position Available

Description: This project will help youth learn beekeeping, the types of bees, the honey and wax they produce,

the plants that attract bees and the equipment a beekeeper needs.

State Fair Entries: One (1) Educational exhibit per county

One (1) Honey exhibit per member, unlimited number of county entries

Project Requirements:

 Adams County 4-H members must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet along with completing Fair Entry by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

- 2. All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.
- 3. Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.
- 4. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Notes:

- 1. No bee hives may be brought to the Adams County 4-H Fair or Indiana State Fair.
- 2. Honey water content will be measured.
- 3. Fill level: the honey should be filled to the jar shoulder; not over, nor under.
- Chunk honey should go in a wide-mouth jar, preferably one specially made for chunk honey (see beekeeping catalogs).
- 5. Be careful to distinguish "chunk honey" (comb in jar) from "cut comb" (comb only in box).
- 6. Honey (including chunk, cut comb and comb) must be collected since the previous county fair.

Exhibit Guidelines:

Educational Poster or Display (Grades 3-12)

1. Create an educational poster, notebook or display about any manual activity or on any beekeeping topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate. Youth can also design an complete an independent study activity.

Single Honey Product (Grades 3-12)

Exhibit one (1) of the following:

- 1. Extracted Honey: 2 one-pound jars, shown in glass or clear plastic, screw-top jars holding 1 pound of honey each.
- 2. Chunk Honey (comb in jar): 2 one-pound jars (wide-mouth glass or clear plastic).
- 3. Cut-Comb Honey: 2 one- pound boxes (These are usually 4 1/2" x 4 1/2" in size).

Two Honey Products (Grades 3-12)

Exhibit two (2) of the four (4) kinds of honey listed below:

- 1. Extracted Honey: 2 one-pound jars (glass or clear plastic).
- 2. Chunk Honey (comb in jar): 2 one-pound jars (wide-mouth glass or clear plastic).
- 3. Cut-Comb Honey: 2 one-pound boxes. Boxes are usually 4 1/2" x 4 1/2"
- 4. Comb Honey: 2 sections (honey built by bees in frames of wood commonly called "sections.") Boxes usually 4 1/2" x 4 1/2".

Bicycle

Project Superintendent: Mark Mesing, 701-2442

Description: The 4-H bicycle project teaches safe riding habits **State Fair Entries:** County Project Only, No Indiana State Fair Entries

Project Requirements:

- 1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.
- 2. Bicycle project is divided into two (2) divisions:
 - a. Junior (Grades 3-7)
 - b. Senior (Grades 8-12)
- 3. A letter and packet with Bicycle Rodeo information will be sent to all enrolled Bicycle project members mid/late June. This packet will include obstacle course maps and information necessary for the Bicycle Rodeo event.
- 4. Bicycle helmets are mandatory at all 4-H Bicycle events.
- 5. Premiums and Grand Champions will be awarded per division.

Cake Decorating

Project Superintendent: Paige Watters, 827-8136

Description: The Cake Decorating project allows youth to utilize their artistic ability and expressions as

they learn decorating techniques and skills including colors, shapes, techniques, designs, etc.

State Fair Entries: One (1) Exhibit per Level

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. Cake Decorating project is divided into three (3) levels:

a. Beginner (Grades 3-5) b. Intermediate (Grades 6-8) c. Advanced (Grades 9-12)

- 3. The cake decorating project provides skills-based educational experiences that provide an opportunity for mastery before building on that experience to develop more advanced skills. While the defined grades are intended to be a guide, older youth enrolled in this subject for the first time may start in a lower grade skill level with permission by the county extension educator, followed by an appropriate level the following year.
- 4. Skills and techniques demonstrated should be age/grade appropriate. While it is not to say a beginner level member cannot master an advanced level skill, it would be rare and unique. Therefore, exhibited cakes must demonstrate the minimum five techniques from their given level outlined in Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills and Techniques, 4-H 710A, but may also include higher/lower level techniques that have been mastered. Any higher/lower level techniques will not be counted as part of minimum five, but nevertheless will be evaluated for quality.
- 5. All exhibited cakes must be created using a Styrofoam, foam, or other solid dummy.
- 6. Unless otherwise stated, cakes are to be iced using royal icing or buttercream. Buttercream icing will not withstand environmental conditions and may become soft, melt, not withhold its shape, and colors may bleed when being displayed an extended period of time.
- 7. When displaying a cut-up cake or tiered cake, the exhibitor must include a diagram and description indicating how the cake was assembled. This diagram and description can be attached to or written on the skills sheet.
- 8. All exhibits must include a completed Cake Decorating Skills Sheet (4-H 710A) and must accompany the cake for the judge's reference during judging. Skills sheets are for judging purposes only.
- 9. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Exhibit Guidelines:

Beginner-Grades 3-5

- 1. Minimum of five beginner level skills are to be demonstrated.

 A list of skills can be found on Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills & Techniques, 4-H 710A.
- 2. Cakes must be on a cake board strong enough to support cake (approximately 3/8" thick) and 2-4" larger than the cake. For example, if the cake is 8" in diameter, then the cake board must be 10-12" in diameter.
- 3. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath.
- 4. Cakes exhibited in the beginner level are to be a single tier/layer, no more than 5" tall, and may be round, square, or rectangular and the cake board is to be no more 12"x12".

Intermediate-Grades 6-8

- 1. Minimum of five intermediate level skills are to be demonstrated. Cake may include additional skills from beginner level. A list of skills can be found on Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills & Techniques, 4-H 710A.
- 2. Cakes must be on a cake board strong enough to support cake (approximately 3/8" thick) and 2-4" larger than the cake. For example, if the cake is 9"x13" rectangular, then the cake board must be 11"x15" to 13"x17" rectangular.
- 3. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath.
- 4. Cakes exhibited in the intermediate level are to be a single or double tier/layer, no more than 12" tall and be any shape. The cake board is to be no more than 24"x24".
 - a. Youth may choose to decorate an inverted (upside down) character pan or create a 3-dimensional cake. It is also permissible to cut-up pieces of Styrofoam, foam, or other solid material to create a new shape, like a butterfly or castle for example.

Advanced-Grades 9-12

- 1. A minimum of five advanced level skills are to be demonstrated. Cake may include additional skills from the beginner and intermediate levels. A list of skills can be found on Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills & Techniques, 4-H 710A.
- 2. Cakes must be on a cake board strong enough to support cake (approximately ½" thick) and 4" larger than the base cake. For example, if the cake is 26" in diameter, then the cake board must be 30" in diameter.
- 3. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath.
- 4. Cakes exhibited in the advanced level may be multiple layer and/or tiered and may include multiple cakes, like a wedding cake. Cakes may be any shape, no more than 36" tall and the cake board is to be no more than 36"x36".
 - a. Youth may choose to create a character or 3-dimensional cake by cutting-up pieces of Styrofoam, foam, or other solid material to create a new shape. Dowel rods, plates, etc. should be used to support multiple layers and tiers.
 - b. Fondant icing and gum and sugar paste is permissible.

Cats

Project Superintendent: Position Available

Description: The 4-H Cat provides youth a fun and hands-on learning experience which develops life skills as

well as teaches valuable information about caring for an animal. Subjects such as general care, nutrition, housing and health care are all learned through caring for your 4-H Cat project. Youth also have the opportunity to develop responsibility, decision making and nurturing skills through

active participation in the 4-H Cat project.

State Fair Entries: All animals for State Fair must be properly identified and enrolled. State Fair entry is

March 1 - July 1 at the lowest fee rate. Increased Indiana State Fair entry fees assessed to entries

made July 2 - show day.

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. All 4-H General Rules, Livestock Rules and Health Regulations apply.

3. All animals must be accompanied by a certificate of vaccination (form 4-H 777) signed by a licensed, accredited veterinarian indicating that within one year of the date of exhibition the animals have been vaccinated for feline panleukopenia, feline rhinotracheitis and calcvirus and have been tested negative and vaccinated for feline leukemia. Vaccination must be given at least two weeks prior to and within one year of exhibition.

Certificate of Vaccination Form must be completed and turned in at the time of check-in.
4-H'ers missing requirements will not be permitted to participate in the Adams County Cat Show.

- a. All animals over 3 months of age must be vaccinated for rabies and distemper by a licensed, accredited veterinarian. Vaccination must be given at least two weeks prior to and within one year of exhibition.
- b. All 4-H animals must have the claws clipped or be declawed.
- c. Check for ear mites one month before the fair.
- d. No animals may be exhibited that test positive for or showing symptoms of any communicable diseases.
- e. Pregnant or lactating female cats will not be permitted to show.
- 4. A 4-H member may enter and show a maximum of two (2) animals in the 4-H Cat Show.

Each animal may be shown in only one class. The same animal may also be entered in the costume class.

- 5. Animals must be collared and on a leash or halter for show. It is suggested that animals be brought in a well ventilated box or carrier. No cats/kittens will be left at the fair, they will only be needed during actual show.
- 6. Each 4-H'er's animal will be judged on health, cleanliness, grooming, personality and if all categories are equal, the judge will choose a winner by its "star quality."

Division Descriptions:

Kitten 4-8 months on day of show, a kitten turning 8 months old on show day will be considered a cat

Cat 8 months of age or older on show day.

Purebred Cats of a recognized breed, kept pure for many generations. Cat must have a current

registration number from one of the national cat registries, such as Cat Fanciers Association.

Long Haired Animal whose coat has long top hairs, with a thick wooly under coat.

The length of hair on an animals' tail is often used as a determining factor.

Hair length is normally 1 1/2" long.

Short Haired Animal whose coat has only short hairs, a smooth, textured coat.

Animals' tail hair is usually less than 1 1/2" long.

Special Costume Class (optional):

1. There is only one costume class, open to all ages.

- 2. 4-H members may use their creativity to dress their feline friend in a 4-H appropriate costume, members may dress up along side their feline friend if desired.
- 3. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Awards:

1. Ribbons will be awarded based on the judging of your animal.

2. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Child Development

Project Superintendent: Position Available

Description: The Child Development project provides members with knowledge, skills and an understanding of

human development, relating to others and self care. It also provides information on basic job skills

for babysitting and introduces careers related to child development.

State Fair Entries: One (1) Entry per Level

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. Activities may be designed to be displayed on the floor, but please be considerate of space availability. Each item is to be labeled with the 4-H member's name, county and club so fair staff can keep all components together if it needs to be moved after judging is complete.

3. All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.

4. Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.

- Title page naming the activity.
- Pages explaining how activity was developed and is to be used.
- Photographs showing how the activity was used along with assembly.
- Explanation of skills learned and any additional information to share with the reader.

Display Notes:

- May be table top or floor style, not to exceed 36"x36"x36".
- Must be self-supporting to be viewed by the public.
- Project activity cards need to be included with your display. (Example on page 40 of manual)

Exhibit Guidelines:

Level A-Grades 3-4

1. Exhibit a poster, display or notebook about a manual activity. Other similar activities permissible.

Level B-Grades 5-6

1. Exhibit a poster, display or notebook about a manual activity. Other similar activities permissible.

Other similar activities designed to help develop physical, emotional or cognitive skills are permissible.

Exhibit a poster, display or notebook about a manual activity.

Collections

Description: Collections can be defined as the gathering of similar items, articles, objects, etc. This project

provides an avenue for collectors to exhibit one of their most enjoyable items/memories.

State Fair Entries: County Project Only, No Indiana State Fair Entries

Project Guidelines:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Exhibit Guidelines:

1. 4-H Collections members enrolling in the project multiple years may start a new collection each year or add to an existing collection. In order to exhibit same collection multiple years, member must add newly acquired items to exhibit.

2. A detailed notebook would be helpful for all divisions to share information about the collection. Members should have a story in the notebook describing the collection. Include records of when and where each collectible was found.

3. Collection display must not exceed 48" high x 30" wide. Project display must be self-supporting to be viewed by the public. If the collection is too valuable or too large to exhibit; 4-Hers may share their collections be displaying several photos and more information in a notebook or poster as their exhibit.

Beginner-Grades 3-5

1. Create and exhibit a poster, display and/or notebook showing off your collections.

Intermediate-Grades 6-8

1. Create and exhibit a poster, display and/or notebook showing off your collections.

Senior-Grades 9-12

1. Create and exhibit a poster, display and/or notebook showing off your collections.

Construction and Architectural Replica

Project Superintendent: Position Available

Description: Allows youth to learn life skills and grow in project knowledge while expressing creativity when

designing replicas.

State Fair Entries: One (1) Entry Overall

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. All arts and craft exhibits must include a 4-H Craft Information Card, 4-H 618A. Craft Information Card describes work completed so the judge can more accurately evaluate the exhibit. This is used for judging purposes only, should be attached to back/underside of project for judge to view.

3. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Exhibit Guidelines:

1. Exhibits can include farm scenes, town models, building replicas, or similar items and can be constructed from building blocks (Lego), erector sets, or other materials. The product should be constructed to scale as much as possible. Consider adding a clear cover to protect the exhibit while being displayed to the public.

2. Exhibitors should be considerate of space. This exhibit will most likely be displayed on an 8' long table top with two or three exhibits per table. Exhibits too large to safely move or requiring lots of space should be exhibited using photographs and a description of work in a notebook.

3. If an exhibitor is concerned about their creation being damaged while on display, they should consider constructing a clear plastic cover to encase the exhibit.

1. Create and exhibit one age/grade appropriate artistic scene or replica.

Intermediate-Grades 6-8

1. Create and exhibit one age/grade appropriate artistic scene or replica.

Advanced-Grades 9-12

1. Create and exhibit one age/grade appropriate artistic scene or replica.

Consumer Clothing

Project Superintendent: Rozann Schmidtke, 623-6020

Description: Consumer Clothing project is designed to teach clothing selection, wardrobe planning, care of

clothing and personal grooming.

State Fair Entries: One (1) Notebook per Level

One (1) Participant per Level to model in Indiana State Fair Fashion Revue

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

- 2. Members will be expected to model their purchased outfit and accessories at the county level at time of judging. Consumer Clothing judging project is judged on: Notebook 40%, Interview 30%, Garment on 4-H'er 30%.
- 3. Members are requested to participate in the Showcase of Fashions on Sunday evening to show off their project work. Informational packets will be mailed to all youth enrolled in Consumer Clothing project with information and request for a short bio to read while modeling at Showcase of Fashions. (Participation is not required)
- 4. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Exhibit Guidelines:

Notebooks:

- The front of the notebook is to include the 4-H members name, county, club and level.
- Personal info such as phone number, mailing address, etc. should not be included in any notebook documentation.
- Members must be present at time of judging for interview and to model the outfit for the judge. Members will leave
 their outfit for exhibit along with the project binder; please wear or bring other clothes to change into to allow for your
 outfit and for after judging.

Beginner-Grades 3-5

- 1. Complete one (1) activity from each group in the manual and share your results or answers in a notebook. Type or write neatly results/answers in a notebook and label each activity to discuss it with the judge.
- 2. With help from a parent or mentor, purchase an item of clothing to wear with other clothes in your wardrobe Examples might be: slacks, blouse, jeans, shirt, sweater or sweatshirt. Choose an accessory to go with your purchase; accessories could be shoes, belt, jewelry, socks or similar items.

Intermediate-Grades 6-8

- 1. Complete one (1) activity from each group in the manual and share your results or answers in a notebook. Type or write neatly results/answers in a notebook and label each activity to discuss it with the judge.
- 2. Purchase and accessorize a casual or school outfit. Accessories may be purchased or currently own.

Advanced-Grades 9-12

- 1. Complete one (1) activity from each group in the manual or similar activity of choice and share your results or answers in a notebook. Type or write neatly results/answers in a notebook and label each activity to discuss it with the judge. If completing an activity not included in the manual, be sure to include your notebook an explanation describing how the activity was developed and intended objectives.
- 2. Purchase and accessorize an outfit of your choice. Accessories may be purchased or currently own.

Dairy

Project Superintendent: Judy Mudd

Description: 4-H Dairy project provides youth with a fun and hands-on learning experience which develops skills in

nutrition, health care and animal husbandry. Responsibility, record keeping, problem solving, disease prevention and decision making are just a few of the many life skills gained in 4-H animal projects.

State Fair Entries: All animals for State Fair must be properly identified and enrolled.

State Fair entry is open online at exhibitorscorner.indianastatefair.com May 16 - July 1.

General Rules:

1. All 4-H General Rules, Livestock Rules and Health Regulations apply.

2. All animals must be identified, owned, under the care of the 4-H'er and enrolled online by end of day on May 15.

a. Any one animal may not be enrolled by more than one 4-H member, except for siblings.

3. Each 4-H members' dairy cattle (registered and grade animals) enrollment must contain the Registration Number (or Dam's Registration Number), Birthdate, RFID Tag/Tattoo and Ear Tag identification (if required for registration by the respective breed association) for each animal they are enrolling in the 4-H program.

a. If RFID tag(s) are used as the sole identification of an animal, the RFID tag(s) used must be approved by each of the respective breed associations. Contact your respective breed association for ear tag identification requirements.

- b. If a Dairy member lists the dam's registration number on his/her dairy enrollment, then the animal's name, date of birth and dam's registration number listed on the enrollment must all match the corresponding information on the animal's registration certificate during check-in.
- c. Enrollments will not be accepted that list "Papers Applied for."
- d. Dairy animals that are not registered should select "Grade" (Non-Registered Cattle) when entering that animals information on the 4hOnline animal enrollment site. These animals will show as grades at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- 4. In the event that animal identification information does not match at time of fair entry with what was entered online the 4-H'er has the option to take the animal home or show as grade.
 - a. Hard copies of registration papers are due at time of fair check in. DOB, RFID Tag/Tattoos, registration numbers need to all correspond with hard copy registration papers.
- 5. Universal Adams County 4-H Record Sheet **AND** Workshop Verification OR Livestock Record Sheet **AND** Fair Entry is due into the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1. 4-H'ers not completing this requirement will have the opportunity to receive feedback from the exhibition class and unable to sell in the 4-H Auction at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- 6. Any situation not covered by these rules shall be handled by the proper representatives of the 4-H Dairy Committee and the 4-H Extension Educator.

Entry Procedures and Fair Exhibition Specific Rules:

- 1. A 4-H member may enroll a maximum of three animals per age group per breed.
 - a. A 4-H member may enroll, enter and show more than one breed.
 - Adams County 4-H Fair recognized breeds: Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey, Milking Shorthorn.
- 2. During check-in at the Adams County 4-H Fair, the following must be provided:
 - a. Registration Certificates (no photocopies, carbons, or fax copies) for Dairy Cows. Only Certificates recognized by the respective National Breed Associations will be accepted. Pedigrees or other such documents are NOT acceptable.
- 3. Fair Check-In
 - Dairy Heifers will be accepted between 1-6 PM on Saturday, July 16.
 - Dairy Cows will be accepted between 11 PM on Tuesday, July 19 and 8 AM on Wednesday, July 20.
 - Please note that the unloading and check-in process MUST be started prior to closing of check-in window.
 - Committee members, whose immediate family has 4-H animals, should have a third party to assist in the entry process. Any discrepancy needs to be checked on by a third party to resolve any problems.
- 4. 4-H Dairy members must work 2 hours at the Clover Center or Dining Hall to receive their premium money.

County Lease Requirements:

- 1. 4-H members can exhibit both owned and leased dairy animals and can lease both heifers and cows for exhibition at the Adams County 4-H Dairy Show. Please note that this rule differs when exhibiting at the Indiana State Fair.
- 2. To be eligible to show, each leased dairy animal must:
 - Be enrolled at v2.4honline.com by the end of the day on May 15
 - Must be listed on the official 4-H Dairy Cattle Lease Agreement form, form must be completed and on file at the Adams County Purdue Extension Office by 4:00PM on May 15.
 - The registration number, tattoo and/or ear tag listed on 4-HOnline MUST match what is listed on the lease agreement.

Classes:

- 1. Awards for best female in each breed will be supplied by sponsors or the 4-H Dairy Calf Club.
- 2. Grade animals will be shown with Registered and are eligible for premiums, but not eligible for champions.

3. Dairy classes are divided as follows:

Additional Awards:

Herdsman Award:

- Criteria includes cleanliness of alleys, stalls, pens, bedding must be adequate, bright, dry, clean and in place. Animals clean, securely tied and penned.
- Selection will be made by an impartial person and three (3) 4-H Dairy members will be awarded day of show.

Halter Winner:

- Every 4-H Dairy member that participates in Junior, Intermediate or Senior Showmanship is eligible to win a new halter, those participating (and not winning) in showmanship will be placed in a random drawing for the halter.
- These awards were established by memorial funds by various respective families. Three (3) 4-H Dairy members will be awarded day of show.

Showmanship:

- 1. Showmanship is on a volunteer basis with members strongly encouraged to participate.
- 2. Members must currently be enrolled in the Dairy project and show their own animal in showmanship.

The exhibited animal must be enrolled on the 4-H Dairy member's enrollment and must have been previously exhibited by the 4-H Dairy member contestant on the day of show.

- 3. Showmanship will be divided into 4 classes:
 - a. **Junior (Grades 3-5)** Junior winner will compete in the Intermediate division the following year. Junior winner cannot repeat as Champion Junior Dairy Showman.
 - b. **Intermediate (Grades 6-8)** Intermediate winner will compete in Senior division the following year. Intermediate winner cannot repeat as Champion Intermediate Dairy Showman.
 - c. **Senior (Grades 9-12)** Senior winner will compete in premier division the following year. Senior winner cannot repeat as Champion Senior Dairy Showman.
 - d. **Premier** The Premier Showman will be selected from the current Beginner, Intermediate and Senior Showman and any past Senior and Premier Showmanship winners still enrolled in 4-H. The winner will represent the Dairy species in the overall Supreme Showman contest. A Premier Showmanship runner-up will be selected and announced.

Auction:

- 1. The Supreme and/or Reserve Champion Dairy cow may sell once in her lifetime. The 4-H member will sell a plaque along with a basket of dairy products (milk, cheese basket, etc.) with 3% of the proceeds going toward the auction fund. The remainder of proceeds will be divided as follows: 50% to 4-H member and 50% to Adams County Dairy Club. In the event that the Supreme Champion Dairy animal does not sell in the auction the Reserve Supreme Champion animal will have the opportunity to sell.
- 2. Senior, Intermediate and Junior Showmanship winners will also sell in the auction. The 4-H member will sell a plaque along with a basket of dairy products (milk, cheese basket, etc.) with 3% of the proceeds going towards the auction fund. The remainder of the proceeds will be divided as follows: 50% to 4-H member and 50% to Adams County Dairy Club.
- 3. Dairy members must inform the committee of their intent to sell in the auction within 30 minutes of the last livestock show they exhibit in.
- 4. All non-auction animals will be released after auction set-up on Thursday.

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. This project is open to your imagination, subject matters could include but not limited to:

Creative Writing, Dance, Family Vacation, Hobbies, Inventions, Science, Small Engines, Sports, Theatre, Tractor or Automobile Restoration, Soil and Water Conservations, Crops (Corn, Soybeans, Wheat and Oats), etc.

a. The exhibit should be one that can NOT be exhibited through any other 4-H project.

If the judge or project superintendent determines the project fits in any other area, there will be every attempt to

move it to the other project area.

b. The project can not be a live animal of any kind.

3. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Project Superintendent: Carol Garringer, 849-2532

Description: The 4-H Dog project provides youth with a fun hands-on learning experience that develops life skills as

well as teaches valuable information about properly caring for their animal. Youth have the opportunity to develop responsibility, decision making and nurturing skills through active participation in project.

State Fair Entries: All animals for State Fair must be properly identified and enrolled. State Fair entry is May 16 - July 1

at the lowest fee rate. Increased Indiana State Fair entry fees assessed to entries made July 2 - show day.

Project Requirements:

1. All 4-H General Rules, Livestock Rules and Health Regulations apply.

- 2. All 4-H dogs must be accompanied by the original and current Certificate of Vaccination (4-H671) completed and signed by a licensed, accredited veterinarian indicating the dog has been vaccinated for rabies, distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus, leptospirosis, and kennel cough prior to participating in any 4-H Dog Club event.
- 3. Universal Adams County 4-H Record Sheet AND Workshop Verification OR Dog Record Sheet is due into the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1. 4-H'ers not completing this requirement will have the opportunity to receive feedback from the exhibition class.
- 4. A 4-H dog may not be exhibited if they are showing symptoms of any communicable disease or parasites, including ticks and fleas. Animals will be checked prior to show.
- 5. Dogs must be at least 6 months old and must live with the 4-H member that is showing the dog.
- 6. Members need to train and work hard with their dogs. The more time you put into practicing, the better the team will be. Attendance at Adams County 4-H Dog Club practices are VITAL for success; additional training/info is given weekly. Members are expected to participate in the Adams County 4-H Dog Show. Open shows encouraged to gain experience.
- 7. Members must have control of their dog and be in charge of him/her at all times. Members must have:
 - Metal training collar for their dogs. It should be about 2" longer than the measurement of the dog's neck.
 - A six foot leather or nylon leash.
 - Dogs on a leash at all times, unless training or showing in off-leash exercises.
- 8. A dog displaying signs of aggression will not be allowed to train or show with the group in the interest of safety to others associated with the Dog Club. Dogs that bite will be disqualified from all further activities and will be sent home.
- 9. Members are responsible for cleaning up after their dogs at all 4-H events and practices.
- 10. If dogs are in heat, members should NOT bring them to practice/training, but the members should come to practice. I f dogs come in heat on show day, the dog committee will decide if it will be permitted to show.
- 11. Members that have been in the project for one year are eligible to try out for Drill Team.

 To be on Drill Team, a member and their dog must be able to perform first year exercises well and unforced.

Classes:

- Class 1A- For 4-H'ers with no previous formal dog training experiences with a dog which has received no obedience training prior to January 1 of the current year.
- Class 1B- For 4-H'ers with previous dog training experience, (4-H or otherwise) coming back with a new dog, or for 4-H'ers with no experience whose dogs have had training which disqualifies them for 1-A.
- Class 2A- For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed 1-A or 1-B.
- Class 2B- For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed 2A, and are not ready for third year work. (at leader's discretion)
- Class 3A- For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed second year work.
- Class 3B- For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed 3A, but are not ready for fourth year work. (at leader's discretion)
- Class 4A- For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed third year work.
- Class 4B- For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed 4A, but are not ready for fifth year work. (at leader's discretion)
- Class 5A- For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed fourth year work.
- Class 5B- For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed 5A, but are not ready for sixth year work. (at leader's discretion)
- Class 6A- For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed fifth year work.
- Class 6B- For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed 6A, and wish to repeat.
- Class Leader Dog A- For 4-H'ers with no previous formal dog training experience with a leader dog.
- Class Leader Dog B- For 4-H'ers with previous dog training experience (4-H or otherwise) coming back with a leader dog.

Veterans Class- For 4-H members whose dogs are at least 7 years old or are physically challenged.

The dog must have completed at least class 2B in previous years. Dogs who are physically challenged must be accompanied by a letter from a veterinarian stating that the dog is unable to perform jumping and/or retrieving exercises. A dog may not be shown in any other obedience class at the Adams County 4-H Fair Dog Show once they have competed in the Veteran's Class.

2. Youth are encouraged, but not required to complete activities found on the 4-H electric web page.

- 3. All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.
- 4. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

A completed copy of the "Exhibit Skills & Knowledge Sheet" must accompany the project. Skills sheets are for judging purposes only.

You can also learn how to collect, preserve, and identify insects.

Collection Exhibits Guidelines:

Collections are to include the following:

- Title as Insect Collection year in Entomology
- Order refer to ID-401.
- Display Mounted insects are to have been legally and personally collected in the United States and displayed in an 18"x24" collection box displayed horizontally. Collections including multiple boxes are to be numbered 1 of 3, etc. ID 401 A-F cards (for grades 3-8) and 401-I cards (for grades 9 12) are to be placed inside the display box in an attractive manner.
- Identification Collection display boxes are expected to contain the specified number of insects, families, and orders specified (see chart below). Il insects must be in the adult stage and be properly mounted on insect pins or be contained in vials as directed.
- Pin Labels Each pin or vial must contain two labels:
 - 1. Top label is to include collection date, location, and collector name.
 - 2. Bottom label is to include common name and other optional identification data.
- Box Labels (computer generated or neatly printed) are used for orders and families as required (see specific exhibit guidelines) and are to be placed flat against the bottom of the box. Insects must be properly grouped directly under the correct order and family box label. For example, all insects belonging to a particular order must be placed under that order label. Orders to be used are listed in the reference book ID- 401. If family level identification is required, the insects should be further grouped together under that family label.
- Educational Box One (1) additional box (educational), based on the specific theme (see specific exhibit guidelines), is required for grades 9-12, in addition to the insect collection boxes. This box can be created in any manner chosen (without the mounting, pinning or identifying restrictions specified above).

Judges evaluating collections exhibits should judge based on educational content, scientific accuracy, eye appeal and creativity.

Monarch Butterfly Statement:

Monarch butterflies are now officially on the threatened species list. While we know that collecting Monarch butterflies for 4-H collections or displays does not constitute a significant risk to their population when compared to the effects of climate change, pesticide contamination and habitat loss, capitalizing on this opportunity to discuss their decline is an excellent way to bring public focus to this important issue. We want our youth (and all IN citizens) to recognize the Monarch butterfly, understand its biology and be empathetic to its conservation.

Therefore, we have instituted the following update to our youth and 4H Entomology programs. Effective immediately, we no longer encourage students to 'collect' Monarch butterflies for exhibits, displays or 4-H insect collections. But, rather than simply removing the Monarch butterfly from the list of 150 insects that 4-H students are to recognize, we want to highlight it so that students really do learn to recognize them and understand their peril. After all, the more we are familiar with this species, the more apt we will be to assist and support the conservation of this iconic species.

Intermediate (4th-6th Year in Entomology)

 - 4th Year 40 insects, exhibit a minimum of 6 orders, mounted (pins or vials).

This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.

State Fair Entries: Ten (10) Foods Baked Entries (2 Level A, 2 Level B, 3 Level C and 3 Level D)

Ten (10) Foods Preservation Entries (2 Level A, 2 Level B, 3 Level C and 3 Level D)

Project Guidelines:

- 1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.
- 2. 4-H'ers may exhibit in one or both of the Foods categories: Foods Baked and/or Foods Preservation
- 3. Refer to the Purdue Extension Food Preservation web site for resources and Purdue Extension educators trained to answer food preservation questions.
- 4. Premiums will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.
- 5. Grand Champions will be awarded in Foods and Food Preservation as follows:

Baked: Two (2) Grand Champions Awarded (1 - Level A/B Baked and 1 - Level C/D Baked)
Preserved: Two (2) Grand Champions Awarded (1 - Level A/B Preserved and 1 - Level C/D Preserved)

Follow Purdue Extension Food Safety Policy

- Fillings, frostings, glazes, and meringues are not permitted to contain cream cheese, sour cream, heavy cream, or whipped cream if they are not fully cooked/baked. These items are only allowed IF the final product is cooked/baked. Additionally, raw milk, raw milk products or uncooked eggs/egg whites are not permitted.
 Eggs/egg whites that have been cooked to 160°F (i.e. pasteurized or included as part of a batter and baked) are acceptable. No home-canned fruits, vegetables, or meats are permitted as ingredients in food products.
- 2. Fresh-cut, uncooked, fruits and/or vegetables are not permitted to be used in food products or used as garnishes for the product. Foods should be transported to the competition in a way that minimizes contamination and maintains the quality of the food (i.e. foods that are judged as frozen should remain frozen at all times).
 - Baked food products should be covered during transport and displayed on a paper or foam plate, or another
 type of disposable container. Pies, casseroles and other similar items are to be baked in a disposable pan.
 Cakes and sticky items may be displayed on a cardboard strong enough to support item and covered in foil,
 plastic, wax paper, etc.
 - Preserved food products should be displayed in an appropriate container, preferably disposable. Containers
 will not be returned to the exhibitor.
- 3. A completed recipe card is to be submitted with each exhibit. Recipe cards are for judging purposes only and identifies all ingredients that were used in each part of the product. Any ingredient that could be a potential allergen must be clearly identified. (milk, eggs, peanuts, tree nuts, fish, crustacean shellfish, wheat, soy and sesame etc.).
- 4. Each food product (could be on back of recipe card) must be labeled with the following information:
 - Name
 - Address
 - Contact Information (phone and/or email address)
 - Date the food product was made
- 5. Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods. If cuts are present, the wound should be bandaged and a single use food service glove worn on the hand during all stages of food production. Contestants should not be preparing food exhibits for competition within 48 hours of recovering from any illness. People experiencing symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, fever, and/or jaundice should not be allowed to prepare food.
- 6. Judges and individuals who will consume products from county and/or state competitions should be informed that they are at risk for foodborne illness since the established policy cannot guarantee that an entry has been properly prepared or handled before, during or following the competition. The food products for competitions are home produced and processed and the production area is not inspected by the Indiana Department of Health. Tasting of a food product is solely at the discretion of the judge and consumers.
 - Judges are <u>NOT</u> to taste any home preserved foods such as low-acid or acidified foods like green beans, tomatoes or tomato products, jams/jellies/fruit preserves or fermented products produced in the home.
- 7. Baked food products may be from a boxed mix following the instructions, a boxed mix with added ingredients, or ingredients combined from scratch.
- 8. Since it is illegal in the State of Indiana for youth under the age of 21 to purchase or consume alcoholic beverages, 4-H members are to use recipes that do not include an alcoholic beverage as an ingredient. A suitable non-alcoholic or imitation product may be substituted.

 - -Include index card with recipe and instructions for cooking.

 - -Display in freezer bag or freezer container. (NOTE: Freezer containers will not be returned.)
 - -Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
 - -Include index card with instructions for defrosting and cooking.
- c. One (1) container of frozen fruit or vegetable juice.
 - -Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
 - -Include index card with instructions for defrosting and cooking.
- d. One (1) container of frozen soup.

 - -Include index card with recipe and instructions for defrosting and cooking.
- e. A frozen ready-to-eat breakfast sandwich, burrito or similar item.
 - -Display on covered cardboard inside freezer bag.

Level C-Grades 7-9

Foods Baked

Choose one (1) of the baked products below, or a similar baked product of choice.

It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement.

- a. Three (3) yeast bread sticks or yeast rolls (any shape, medium size not a sweet roll)
- b. Three (3) yeast bread sticks or yeast rolls (any shape, medium size not a sweet roll), using a whole grain flour mixture. Participants are expected to learn how to knead bread dough by hand and allow it to rise appropriately. It is NOT acceptable to use a home bread maker.
- c. A yeast bread loaf or braid. Participants are expected to learn how to knead bread dough by hand and allow it to rise appropriately. It is NOT acceptable to use a home breadmaker.
- d. A yeast bread (can be loaf, braid) using a whole grain flour mixture such as whole wheat, rye, oat bran, etc. Participants are expected to learn how to knead bread dough by hand and allow it to rise appropriately. It is NOT acceptable to use a home breadmaker.
- e. Homemade pizza using a yeast dough. Judges are not expecting this item to be presented hot out of the oven.
- f. One package of an, invented healthy snack (such as a granola bar, popcornsnack, trail mix, etc.). Your snack must include at least 2 food groups from MyPlate. Exhibit must include your snack product and a separate folder containing a marketing plan with product name, recipe, how it will be packaged, a package design, where it will be sold and suggested selling price. Style your snack for a photo shoot and include the picture in your marketing plan. Label should include product name, date, quantity, and serving size.

It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement.

- a. A single or double crust baked fruit pie (no graham cracker crust). (Note: Custards, cream, cream cheese frosting and fillings, and raw egg white frosting are not acceptable in an exhibit because they are highly perishable when left at room temperatures.)
- b. A baked food product for a catered meal or special event in which organizers have requested low fat and/or reduced sugar items. Exhibit will include your food product and a notebook outlining how this product is to be used at the event, menu, supplies to buy, preparation schedule, equipment, table layout, etc. A table display is optional.
- c. Select a condition in which people have to specifically modify their eating habits (diabetes, heart disease, Celiac disease, food allergies, etc.) Prepare a baked food product appropriate for someone with this condition. Exhibit will include your food product and a notebook summarizing the condition or allergy, nutrition considerations involved with the condition, a description of your baked item, and an explanation of how it fits within the nutrition considerations. Make sure to note any ingredients that could cause an allergic reaction.
- d. Prepare an entrée casserole that meets four MyPlate requirements for a meal. Use care when transporting to prevent spoilage. Judges are not expecting this casserole to be presented hot out of the oven.
- e. An international or ethnic food of choice. This may be a cold or hot product. Use care when transporting to prevent spoilage. Judges are not expecting this product to be presented hot out of the oven.
- f. A specialty pastry.
- g. Create a baking mix and provide a sample of the baked product. Include an index card with instructions, wet ingredients needed, and baking instructions.
- h. An educational poster, notebook or display about a food or nutrition topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.
- i. Any other similar baked item.

- 2. All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.
- 3. Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.
- 4. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

State Fair Entries: One Entry per Division

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

- 2. Forms for this project are found on the Indiana 4-H Web site www.extension.purdue.edu/4-H click on "projects" and then on Genealogy to reach downloadable forms. This project is organized into divisions and not grades for a youth cannot start in Division 3 without first completing Division 1 and Division 2. This is a project that builds on the previous division information in order to be successful in building your family tree. If you are using a genealogical commercial software program, you may need to type in or hand write in information required by the Indiana 4-H genealogy project.
- 3. The exhibit will consist of no more than four (4) notebooks for Division 1-4 and first year Advanced Division. (If a notebook requires additional space, label it as notebook x, continued.)
 Those notebooks are:
 - Book #1 Appropriate size notebook or binder, contains introduction sheet, pedigree charts and family group sheets
 - Book #2 Appropriate size notebook or binder, contains additional information worksheets and diary of work
 - Book #3 Appropriate size notebook or binder, contains supporting documents, pictures, etc.
 - Book #4 Appropriate size notebook or binder, contains Advanced Division options only (Begin using this notebook in first year of the advanced division or the fifth year of project enrollment.)
 - Another notebook should be maintained and kept in a secure place at home to keep original personal and legal documents as well as previously exhibited work.

Note – Youth may consolidate information in order to have fewer notebooks. In this case indicate on the cover the notebook numbers included and use dividers to separate information by notebook number as well as contents as indicated below.

- 4. Notebooks should be tabbed and in the following order:

- 6. So the notebook exhibit can be displayed to the public and to minimize the potential of identity theft, original legal documents are <u>NOT</u> to be included in the exhibit notebook. Instead, a photocopy of any legal document is to be included in the notebook and all identifiable information (like social security numbers) except for names is to be completely marked out. Original legal documents are to be kept in a secure location by the 4-H member and his/her family.
- 7. All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H members exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. Reference notations are to be made in the "source" column of the Family Group Sheet and on each document.
- 8. If information on a family member is unknown, an additional information worksheet for each required ancestor is still required. Write "unknown" or "NIA" (no information available) in PENCIL for each sheet of unknown ancestors or list several ancestors on a page and insert page in proper numerical order.
- 9. After exhibiting the first year of the ADVANCED Division, only the Advanced Division notebook (Book #4) with ALL OPTIONS (no pedigree charts, no family group sheets, no additional information sheets, no documents from Divisions 1-5) needs to be exhibited each year the genealogy project continues.
- 10. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

 - Sources of information filled in on family group sheets (see section "Recording the Information" in the Indiana 4-H Genealogy Resource Guide, 4-H 748).
- 2. Book #2 (Ancestors 64-255 information)
 - Additional Information worksheets
 - Diary of your work
- 3. Book #3 (Ancestors 64-255 information)
 - Any documents or pictures pertaining to these generations; correctly labeled.
- 4. Book #4
 - One new advanced level option (see next page). Advanced division exhibitors must include ALL options submitted in prior years, with each option labeled with the year completed.

Advanced Division Year 2 and Beyond

For each year past the 5th year of enrollment in Genealogy, follow the Advanced Division (Year 2 and beyond info).

- 1. For each additional year in the Advanced Genealogy division, continue to add ancestors to your pedigree charts. Exhibit Book #4 that contains advanced division options and a second diary of work. If additional ancestry information was found in the seventh and eighth generation, exhibit Book 1 noting ancestors completed this year along with Books 2 and 3 demonstrating this year's work.
- 2. Additionally complete one of the following Advanced Level Options that has not been completed previously: Explain the information received as to how it relates to you and your ancestors.
 - Copies of documents obtained in previous divisions are acceptable and should be utilized in the option chosen if needed
 - A migration map of your eight-generation ancestors. You should have at least one map per family line with charts or explanations of the migrations.
 - A timeline historical report of a family line. Show how this family fits into history. Document your report as well as possible with dates, records, places or maps, pictures, etc. Be sure to include proper labels and sources.
 - A census history of a family line. Census abstract forms can be found on several websites. Download forms to
 abstract the census. Your notebook should contain copies of the census and the completed abstract form for each
 census.
 - A history of your family's religious background for any family line or lines. Include a brief history of the denomination. Include baptism, confirmation or profession of faith and membership records. Also include information or history of the congregations involved. Be sure to include proper labels and sources.
 - A history of your family's military service for a family line. Include supporting documents when possible. These documents could include military records, (muster rolls, discharge papers, etc.), pension records, and bounty land records, as well as maps and pictures. Be sure to include proper labels and sources.
 - A research paper on a famous ancestor. Prove your relationship to this person with documentation. Try to include pictures and anecdotes to enhance your paper.
 - Complete a family line or lines back as many generations as possible beyond eight generations (ancestors 256 and beyond). Include pictures, maps and documents. Be sure to include proper labels and sources.
 - A timeline historical report of another family line not previously completed. Document as well as possible as in Option B. You need to state at the beginning that this is a second family historical report on such ancestor.
 - A history of your family's military service for a family line not previously completed. Include supporting documents as in Option E. You need to state at the beginning that this is a second family military history report on such ancestor.
 - Family DNA history. (This can be a very expensive option) Please include charts and explanations. i.e. use pie charts, ethnicity estimates, approximate percentage regionally, number of countries searched, genetic percentage, family tree, graphs, etc.
 - Any other genealogy related activity of choice.

Geology

Project Superintendent: Trudy Eisenmann, 223-9588

Description: Geology involves studying the earth's crust, its layers, and their history. Youth learn to identify

Indiana rocks, minerals, and fossils.

State Fair Entries: One (1) Entry per Level

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

- 2. All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.
- 3. Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.
- 4. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Exhibit Guidelines:

- 1. Specimens may be displayed in a 24"x 18"x 3" collection box, displayed horizontally.
- 2. You may purchase your specimens and may display rocks, fossils, and minerals. If you purchase a specimen, indicate where and when you purchased it and the location where you would expect to find the specimen. If you collect a specimen, indicated the county and township where you found it.
- 3. Posters and display boxes will be exhibited "standing up" at the Indiana State Fair. Therefore, you need to mount your specimens securely. Subject matter experts suggest the following methods: soaking ½ cotton ball in Elmer's glue, hot glue, or clear tub sealant. Place the cotton ball in your box and put your rock (or fossil or mineral) on the cotton ball and let sit. It will take 1-2 weeks for Elmer's glue to fully harden. Specimens mounted with Elmer's glue can be removed by soaking the cotton ball in water. Glue remaining on the rock may be brushed off with an old, damp toothbrush.
- 4. When exhibiting rocks, show a fresh surface (recently cracked or broken) to help judges identify rocks.
- 5. Labels Include the specific geographical location where you would expect to find any specimens as well as where you actually acquired it (found, purchased, etc.).
- 6. Do not identify your specimens any further than phylum and class. There is one exception to this for fossils which are identified to phylum OR class. Class should only be used for fossils of mollusks, backboned animals, and arthropods.

1. Create an educational poster, notebook or display about any manual activity or on any geology topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.

Description: Gift Wrapping project allows youth to utilize creativity and imagination by learning bow making

wrapping odd shape packages and creating a gift out of household items through project work.

State Fair Entries: One (1) Entry

Project Guidelines:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. All gift wrapping exhibits must include a 4-H Craft Information Card, 4-H 618A. This information card is to describe work completed so the judge can more accurately evaluate the exhibit. Craft information cards are for judging purposes only and should be attached to the back or underside of the project for the judge to view.

3. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Exhibit Guidelines:

- All Gift Wrapping projects must have been wrapped by 4-H'er since the end of the previous year's fair.
- Package are for exhibit purposes only and should not contain a gift at exhibition time.
- It is recommended to use double stick tape and all bows must be handmade (no purchased bows).

Beginner-Grades 3-5

- Grade 3 One rectangular package (shirt box) using a self made bow and commercial wrapping paper.
- Grade 4 One cubic (six equal square sides) package larger than 6" x 6" x 6" using self-made bow and commercial wrapping paper.
- Grade 5 One small box suitable for a ring or pin using a self-made bow and commercial wrapping paper.

Intermediate-Grades 6-8

- Grade 6 One cylindrical package, using a self-made bow or other decorations and commercial wrapping paper.
- Grade 7 A series of two or three packages in a tiered effect coordinated as one complete package.

For example: 3 stacked cylinders; 2 rectangular boxes; 1 box and 2 cylinders; etc., each wrapped individually. The tier must be securely tied or fastened together in such a way so that the individual packages will not easily move. Use self-made bows or other decorations and commercial wrapping paper.

Grade 8 One package with **top** and **bottom** of box/container **wrapped separately** and properly folded liner inside. Use self-made bows or other decorations and commercial wrapping paper.

Advanced-Grades 9-12

Choose one of the following categories to exhibit:

Categories can be done in any order and 4-H'ers encouraged to select a different category each year in the advanced division.

- 1. One package wrapped in materials other than wrapping paper. The outside wrapping materials must be part of the gift item. For example: dishtowels, scarf, baby blanket, diapers, etc. The materials must be wrapped around some sort of box or container that would conceal or enclose the rest of the gift item. Do not put the rest of the gift in the box or container.
- 2. One creative exhibit of any shape that has been covered in some fashion. Your outside decorations and/or "wrapping" are not a part of the gift. The package does not have to be a box, but a container that would conceal or enclose a gift item. The container should be covered in some fashion such as fabric, paper, cardboard, foil, plastic, leather, cellophane, etc. Do not use commercial wrapping paper. You do not need to have bows if they are not in keeping with the design of your package.
- 3. One decorated or disguised display which is the gift. The actual gift item is decorated or disguised in some way. For example: a clothes basket made to look like a jack-o-lantern, a jar of preserves made to look like 'Santa', an umbrella made to look like a tree, etc. or the actual gift item can be folded or arranged in some way that is a package in itself. For example: bath towels folded to look like a wedding cake, a table cloth folded into a bag with barbecue tools or kitchen items inside, baby blanket folded into a bunting with baby items inside, etc. All items used in the display must be part of the gift.
- 4. One self-made gift bag. Do **not** use commercial wrapping paper. Examples of some materials to use: construction paper, grocery bag paper, wall paper, fabric, etc. Gift bag may or may not be decorated depending on materials used.
- 5. One package of any size wrapped **only** in self-made decorations and paper. This category is different from the creative exhibit above in that you must use some sort of paper to put your own creative design on such as roller painting, stenciling, pulling, potato printing, spin art, etc. Use a self made bow or other decoration. This category will be judged on the neatness and creativity of paper design along with the proper wrapping.

projects.

State Fair Entries: All animals for State Fair must be properly identified and enrolled.

State Fair entry is open online at exhibitorscorner indianastate fair com May 16 - July 1.

General Rules:

1. All 4-H General Rules, Livestock Rules and Health Regulations apply.

- All market/commercial animals must be individually identified during the county identification day under the supervision of the Extension Staff at the start of the project. Market animals will be weighed and tagged with an official Adams County ear tag. Other ear tags may be left in if they contain number's, but must be removed if they contain
- 3. All animals must be identified, owned, under the care of the 4-H'er and enrolled online by end of day on May 15.

a. Any one animal may not be enrolled by more than one 4-H member, except for siblings.

- Registered and non-registered does must be tattooed for identification purposes. Make sure to contact a leader prior to enrollment deadline with tattooing questions.
- Universal Adams County 4-H Record Sheet AND Workshop Verification OR Livestock Record Sheet AND Fair Entry is due into the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1. 4-H'ers not completing this requirement will have the opportunity to receive feedback from the exhibition class only and unable to sell in the 4-H Auction at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- All members will be required to attend at least 1 safety meeting to be eligible to show at the Adams County 4-H Fair. Safety meetings will be conducted during all scheduled meetings, excluding out of county workshops.
- A goat exhibitor fee must be paid to an Adams County Goat Committee Member prior to check-in to be eligible to show at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- Any situation not covered by these rules shall be handled by the proper representatives of the 4-H Goat Committee and the 4-H Extension Educator.

Entry Procedures and Fair Exhibition Specific Rules:

- 4. All non-auction animals will be released after auction set-up on Thursday.
- 5. The Grand Champion Boer/Boer Cross Market Goat will sell first, followed by the Grand Champion Dairy Wether. This will be rotated each year. (Even years: Dairy Wethers will be first. Odd Years: Boer/Boer Cross Market Goats will be first). The Reserve Grand Champion will sell in the same order as above followed by Showmanship (Premier, Senior, Intermediate, Junior), Rate of Gain and then remaining animals by back tag number.

The Adams County 4-H Horse & Pony Committee leaders reserve the right to measure and verify the identification of any horse/pony entered in the Adams County 4-H Program.

2. Certificate of Vaccination (4-H 1031W) must be turned into the Extension Office or directly to the Horse and Pony booth by May 15th; or at the first 4-H event your horse/pony participates in (if prior to May 15th).

Meetings/Workshops/4-H Pre-Fair Show/4-H Fair Show Guidelines:

- 1.4-H Members are required to keep their equine reasonably under control in the barns, make-up ring and show arena, this is mandatory for the safety of all. 4-H members may be led up to the gate; but not into the ring. The member must enter the arena in a controlled manner, start and stop the horse/pony inside the arena. The gate MUST be closed behind exhibitor and NOT opened until the exhibitor has finished the course. No horse/pony will be allowed into the arena until the previous exhibitor has been excused to the make-up ring. If a situation arises where safety is a concern for the 4-H member, other exhibitors, or spectators, the 4-H member should be encouraged to not enter the class(es).
- 2. 4-H Members are required to have the following attire at all 4-H events, whenever mounted or driving:
 - Properly Fitted SEI or ASTM F1163-15 Standard Certified helmet
 The 4-H member is responsible for a properly fitted helmet with the approved harness fastened in place whenever
 mounted or driving (helmets are permitted in Halter & Showmanship classes). Original tags must be present in all
 approved helmets.
 - Long pants (Chaps optional)
 - Boots with heel (Spurs optional)
 - Long sleeve shirts with a collar (required while showing)
 - No cell phones or other electronic devices are allowed while mounted on a horse or pony.
- 3. The 4-H horse/pony may only be ridden or driven by the 4-H member, on the day of the 4-Ĥ show.

- 4. Horses/ponies may NOT be tacked/untacked in the aisle. Riding of horses/ponies in the barn aisle is NOT permitted. 4-H members must walk horses through the barn and mount outside in make-up area or the arena.
- 5. Quirts, bats, crops and spurs are permitted, in some classes, but must be used behind the cinch and ONLY used in the make-up area or the arena. 4-H Members are advised to use these carefully and wisely. Hitting a horse/pony in front of the cinch will result in an automatic disqualification.
 - *For all rules regarding used of crops, whips or spurs refer to the current Indiana 4-H Horse & Pony Handbook.

4-H Fair Specific Guidelines

- 1. Each 4-H member may show a maximum of one horse or pony in the following categories at the 4-H Pre-Fair show and/or the Adams County 4-H Fair: Western Pleasure, English Pleasure, Contesting, Driving.
- 2. 4-H members are responsible for feeding, care of their horse/pony and cleaning of their stall during the fair. Two bales of shavings will be provided for each member, by the Horse and Pony Club; additional shavings are allowed, but must be provided by the member.
- 3. NO stallion over one year of age, as of January 1 of the current year, will be allowed on the 4-H fairgrounds.
- 4. Walk/Trot classes provide a starting place for a child regardless of age or disability who has limited experience. Walk/Trot classes enable inexperienced youth to participate on a horse in a manner that is safe for them and the other riders. Youth without disabilities are encouraged to move beyond this class within a two year time table.
 - a. Exhibitors entering in a Walk/Trot class may not enter in any classes that requires a lope or canter during the Halter/Pleasure Show. Two strides a lope or canter is considered a disqualification.
 - b. No High Point awards given for Walk/Trot classes.
- 5. Stalling
 - a. Each Regular 4-H member is guaranteed one stall for the 4-H Fair, maximum of 4. Stalls are assigned each year, by committee. Special stalling requests will be taken into consideration; requests must be made by June 1 to stalling chair.
 - b. One horse/pony must be in the 4-H member's stall during each day of the 4-H Fair.
- 6. Any equine taken home each night of the fair after 8PM MUST be returned to the stall by 10AM the following morning.
- 7. State Fair & Non-State Fair Classes are divided as follows:
 - a. Junior (grades 3-5)
 - b. Intermediate (grades 6-8)
 - c. Senior (grades 9-12)

Please note that classes with less than 3 participants will be combined or cancelled.

8. All non-auction animals will be released after auction set-up on Thursday. Members must clean their stall and have it approved by the 4-H Horse and Pony Leader(s) in charge of dismissal before their equine will be released to go home.

Premier Showmanship/Versatility:

- 1. Premier Showmanship/Versatility class will be open to all youth and will consists of:
 - a. Showmanship
 - b. Ranch Pleasure
 - c. Barrels
- 2. The winner of the Premier Showmanship/Versatility class will represent the Horse and Pony species in the overall Supreme Showman contest. A Premier Showmanship/Versatility runner-up will be selected and announced.

Auction:

1. The Premier Showmanship winner will sell in the auction. The 4-H member will sell a gift basket (provided by the Horse and Pony Club) with 3% of the proceeds going towards the auction fund. The remainder of the proceeds will be divided as follows: 50% to 4-H member and 50% to Adams County 4-H Horse and Pony Club.

State Fair Entries: County Project Only, No Indiana State Fair Entries

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. All items prepared for exhibit for this project must be made in a microwave oven. Bring the entire product or the specific number of items indicated along with recipe card to judging. Foods should be transported to the competition in a way that minimizes contamination and maintains the quality of the food.

3. Premiums will be awarded for each grade. With one Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion awarded overall.

Follow Purdue Extension Food Safety Policy

- 1. A completed recipe card is to be submitted with each exhibit. Recipe cards are for judging purposes only and identifies all ingredients that were used in each part of the product. Any ingredient that could be a potential allergen must be clearly identified. (milk, eggs, peanuts, tree nuts, fish, crustacean shellfish, wheat, soy and sesame etc.).
- 2. Each food product (could be on back of recipe card) must be labeled with the following information:
 - Name
 - Address
 - Contact Information (phone and/or email address)
 - Date the food product was made
- 3. Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods. If cuts are present, the wound should be bandaged and a single use food service glove worn on the hand during all stages of food production. Contestants should not be preparing food exhibits for competition within 48 hours of recovering from any illness. People experiencing symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, fever, and/or jaundice should not be allowed to prepare food.
- 4. Since it is illegal in the State of Indiana for youth under the age of 21 to purchase or consume alcoholic beverages, 4-H members are to use recipes that do not include an alcoholic beverage as an ingredient. A suitable non-alcoholic or imitation product may be substituted.

State Fair Entries: Two (2) Entries

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

- 2. All arts and craft exhibits must include a 4-H Craft Information Card, 4-H 618A. This information card is to describe work completed so the judge can more accurately evaluate the exhibit. Craft information cards are for judging purposes only and will not be returned to the exhibitor.
- 3. If multiple pieces make up the exhibit, a photograph of the complete exhibit should be attached to the exhibit so the total exhibit can properly be displayed. For safety purposes any craft exhibit that resembles a sword, knife, or look-a-like weapon will be judged but will not be displayed.
- 4. Exhibits must be a small scale replica made of injected styrene plastics with approximately 25% of the surface painted. Wood, paper, clay die-cast, or snap together models are not permitted. Screws and pre-painted or predecaled factory models are not permitted. Exhibits made from building blocks (Lego) are not permitted.
- 5. If the model is being built from a kit, include a copy of the instructions with the information card. Original instructions should be kept by the exhibitor in a safe location at home.
- 6. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

State Fair Entries: Beginner Level Two (2) Entries

Intermediate Level Three (3) Entries Advanced Level Three (3) Entries

Project Requirements:

- 1. Adams County 4-H members must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet along with completing Fair Entry by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.
- 2. All images are to be original images taken by the 4-H member during the current program year.
- 3. Members will be allowed to enter a maximum of 2 photography exhibits with only one entry per class. For example, an Intermediate member may enter one poster of color prints and one color salon print but not 2 entries of a color salon print. The same print can not be used in more than one exhibit.
- 4. Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.
- 5. Premiums will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section. One Grand and One Reserve Grand Champion will be chosen for each level.

Exhibit Guidelines:

- 1. **Print board exhibits** are to include 10 photos (no larger than 5"x7") mounted on a poster. Number each print 1-10. Prints may be a mix of digital and/or standard development.
 - Create a title of choice for the print board exhibit.
 - Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.
- 2. **Salon prints** are to be no larger than 11"x14", mounted on a standard 16"x20" salon mount, and displayed vertically. Salon prints are to be placed in a clear plastic sleeve and captions are not recommended. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.

- 3. Images may be taken with a film camera, digital camera, cell phone, or other electronic device. Altering of images by any other means besides the device it was taken with is to be entered in the **creative/experimental** category. Creative/experimental exhibits must include the original photo on the back side of the board, a description of how the image was altered, and equipment/software used to alter the image.
- 4. Editing photos such as cropping, color adjustment, and other enhancements are considered to be part of the normal photography educational learning process and are permissible. So judges can better evaluate a photography exhibit, the 4-H member is asked to attach to the back of their salon or print board exhibit the make and model of camera used and a description of any editing.
- 5. A photo that has been modified to change the original intent, meaning or story captured should be entered in the creative or experimental class. Photos exhibited as creative or experimental are to attach to the back of their exhibit the make and model of camera used, software or other tools used to change the photo, a description of how the photo was changed, and copy of the original photo before editing.
- 6. Sepia tone photographs (mono chromatic) are to be entered as black and white photos.

Description: The 4-H Poultry Project provides youth a fun and hands-on learning experience that develops life

skills, as well as teaches valuable information about their birds including raising and processing.

State Fair Entry: County Project Only, No Indiana State Fair Entries

General Rules:

- 1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.
- 2. Members are encouraged but not required to attend a Poultry Club meeting to learn about poultry production.
- 3. Broiler and Processing Specifics for project:
 - A minimum of 25 broiler strain chicks are to be started in order to be a participant in this project.
 - Straight run chicks, not sexed cockerels, are used in the project.
 - Chicks should be started in May and should be processed at 6 to 8 weeks of age.
 - Average combined weight of three dressed broilers should be between 10-15 pounds.
 - Any broiler class combined weight exceeding 15lbs. will not be considered for Grand or Reserve Grand Combined weight exceeding 15 lbs. will be sold at 15 lbs.
 - All members must have their birds professionally processed.

No shrink wrap or injections of any kind is allowed.

All broilers should be bagged in standard bags from processor.

- 4. Members will take the broilers home after judging is completed and may bring back for the auction.
- 5. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Poultry—Live Birds

Project Superintendent: Kathy Palacios, 750-4858

Description: 4-H Poultry project provides youth with a fun and hands-on learning experience which develops skills in

nutrition, health care and animal husbandry. Responsibility, record keeping, problem solving, disease prevention and decision making are just a few of the many life skills gained in 4-H animal projects.

State Fair Entries: All animals for State Fair must be properly identified and enrolled.

State Fair entry is open online at exhibitorscorner.indianastatefair.com May 16 - July 1.

General Rules:

1. All 4-H General Rules, Livestock Rules and Health Regulations apply.

- 2. All birds must be in the members' possession by May 15th of the current year, except for commercial meat (broilers, roasters and duck classes.) 4-H members must fill out the Official 4-H Poultry Enrollment Form and turn into the Extension Office by 4:00 PM on May 15th.
- 3. Universal Adams County 4-H Record Sheet **AND** Workshop Verification OR Livestock Record Sheet **AND** Fair Entry is due into the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1. 4-H'ers not completing this requirement will have the opportunity to receive feedback from the exhibition class only and unable to sell in the 4-H Auction at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- 4. Only Poultry Breeds recognized in the most current American Standard of Perfection will be recognized in the exhibition classes. Birds not recognized in the American Standard of Perfection will show together in the All Other Breed Class.
 - a. There will be an American Standard of Perfection book available for 4-H'ers to view at Poultry Club meetings and at the Adams County Extension Office.
 - b. All birds must come from a NPIP certified flock or be blood-tested by a certified tester from ISPA prior to the fair. All birds over 1 year old must be blood-tested. Proof of NPIP compliance must be submitted before birds allowed to pen.
- 5. Any situation not covered by these rules shall be handled by the proper representatives of the 4-H Poultry Committee and the 4-H Extension Educator.

Entry Procedures and Fair Exhibition Specific Rules:

- 1. Members will have full responsibility for the care of their birds while at the Adams County 4-H Fair. Shavings for bedding will be provided by a local sponsor.
- 2. All birds must be free from external parasites and be cleaned/washed upon arriving at the fair.
- 3. 4-H Poultry may only show in one category in a given year.

Birds may not show in both the Commercial and Exhibition Classes in a given year.

- 4. An exhibitor is allowed to show a maximum of 24 entries in the Commercial and Exhibition classes. This maximum number excludes participation in Showmanship and Egg classes.
- 5. A 4 x 6 (landscape) picture of yourself and the animal you plan to sell in the auction must be turned in at fair check-in 4-H'ers Name and Animal ID must be on the back of the picture.

Classes:

Poultry divided into 4 categories:

- 1. Commercial Meat
- 2. Commercial Egg Production
- 3. Exhibition
- 4. All Other Breeds Poultry This class is for Poultry not recognized in the most current American Standard of Perfection. Grand Champions in Commercial Meat, Commercial Egg Production and Exhibition categories only.

Commercial Meat Classes

Proof of receipt for all Commercial Meat birds must be submitted to Poultry Committee by July 1 to prove age of birds. Exhibitor will be allowed to exhibit 3 entries in each class subdivision.

- 1. Commercial Meat
 - a. Broilers Exhibit two birds of the same sex, 6-12 weeks of age and not over 5.6 pounds on entrance day.
 - b. Roasters Exhibit two birds of the same sex, 6-12 weeks of age and 5.6 to 10 pounds on entrance day.
 - c. Waterfowl
 - 1. Ducks (Pekins and AOC) Exhibit one bird, 8-12 weeks of age.
 - 2. Geese (Embden and AOC) Exhibit one bird, 22-28 weeks of age.
 - d. Turkeys Exhibit one bird, minimum of 15 pounds and maximum of 28 weeks of age.
 - e. An overall Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be selected from the Commercial Meat Classes. Only live birds from the Commercial Meat Category will be allowed to sell in the Livestock Auction.

Commercial Egg Production Category

Exhibitor will be allowed to exhibit 3 entries in each class subdivision.

1. Commercial Egg-Hen Classes

Judging will be on animal egg production. Exhibit 2 female birds (hens of the same breed in laying condition hatched before July of the prior year). Hens must be blood tested.

- a. White egg layers
- b. Brown egg layers

2. Commercial Egg-Pullets Classes

Judging will be on animal egg production. Exhibit 2 female birds hatched after July 1st of the prior year.

3. Commercial Egg Classes

Exhibit 6 eggs in a foam egg carton. Eggs will be judged on uniformity and marketability.

- b. Brown eggs
- c. Other eggs

An overall Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion from the Commercial Egg Production will be selected. This category will not be selling in the Livestock Auction.

Exhibition Birds Category

Exhibitor will be allowed to exhibit 3 birds in each class subdivision.

Classes will be subdivided into breed, sex and age. Exhibition birds are judged to breed standards.

- a. Modern Game
- b. Old English Game

- e. All Other Combs Clean Legged
- f. Feather Legged

2. Standard Large Fowl

Exhibitor will be allowed to exhibit 3 birds in each class subdivision.

Classes will be subdivided into breed, sex and age. Exhibition birds are judged to breed standards.

- a. American Breeds
- b. Asiatic Breeds
- c. Continental Breeds
- d. English Breeds
- e. Mediterranean Breeds
- f. All Other Standard Breeds (A.O.S.B.)

3. Waterfowl

Exhibitor will be allowed to exhibit 3 birds in each class subdivision.

Classes will be subdivided into breed, sex and age. Exhibition birds are judged to breed standards.

- a. Light Weight Ducks
- b. Medium Weight Ducks
- c. Heavy Weight Ducks
- d. Bantam Ducks
- e. Light Weight Geese
- f. Medium Weight Geese
- g. Heavy Weight Geese

4. Game Birds

Exhibitor will be allowed to exhibit 3 birds in each class subdivision.

Classes will be subdivided into breed, sex and age. Exhibition birds are judged to breed standards.

- a. Partridge
- b. Pigeon
- c. Quail
- d. Guineas
- e. Pheasants
- f. Turkeys
- g. Peafowl
- 5. A Champion and Reserve Champion will be selected from each of the Exhibition Classes. An overall Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be selected from the Exhibition Class Champions.

All Other Breeds Poultry

- 1. Any bird that is not recognized in the current American Standard of Perfection will show in the All Other Breed Poultry Class. Exhibitors are allowed to exhibit a maximum of 3 single birds in this class.
- 2. A Champion and Reserve Champion All Other Breeds Poultry will be selected; however, these classes do not compete for any other awards.

Showmanship:

- 1. Showmanship is on a volunteer basis with members strongly encouraged to participate.
- 2. Members must currently be enrolled in the Poultry project and show their own animal in showmanship.
- 3. Showmanship classes will be divided into four classes:
 - a. **Junior** (**Grades 3-5**) Junior winner will compete in the Intermediate division the following year. Junior winner cannot repeat as Champion Junior Poultry Showman.
 - b. **Intermediate (Grades 6-8)** Intermediate winner will compete in Senior division the following year. Intermediate winner cannot repeat as Champion Intermediate Poultry Showman.
 - c. Senior (Grades 9-12) Senior winner will compete in premier division the following year. Senior winner cannot repeat as Champion Senior Poultry Showman.
 - d. **Premier** The Premier Showman will be selected from the current Beginner, Intermediate and Senior Showman and any past Senior and Premier Showmanship winners still enrolled in 4-H. The winner will represent the Poultry species in the overall Supreme Showman contest. A Premier Showmanship runner-up will be selected and announced.

Auction:

- 1. Exhibitors may sell only once through the 4-H auction. Members must inform the committee of their intent to sell or take the animal home within 30 minutes of the completion of the Poultry Show.
- 2. Only those animals showing in the Commercial Meat Classes are eligible to sell in the Livestock Auction. These include Broilers, Roasters, Ducks, Geese and Turkeys.
- 3. Auction Poultry–Live Birds will not go through the auction ring with the 4-H'er.
- 4. The Grand Champion will sell first, then the Reserve Grand Champion followed by Showmanship (Premier, Senior, Intermediate, Junior) and then remaining animals by back tag number.

skills in nutrition, health care and animal husbandry. Responsibility, record keeping, problem solving, disease prevention and decision making are just a few of the many life skills gained in 4-H

animal projects.

State Fair Entries: All animals for State Fair must be properly identified and enrolled.

State Fair entry is open online at exhibitorscorner.indianastatefair.com May 16 - July 1.

General Rules:

- 1. All 4-H General Rules, Livestock Rules and Health Regulations apply.
- Rabbits must be in possession and under the care of the 4-H member by May 15th.
- 3. All rabbits must be in the members' possession by May 15th of the current year. 4-H members must fill out the Official 4-H Rabbit Enrollment Form and turn into the Extension Office by 4:00 PM on May 15th.
- 4. All rabbits must be accompanied with pedigree papers proving that parents are a specific breed; no crossbred rabbits are eligible to exhibit in the 4-H Rabbit Show due to following American Rabbit Breeder Association (ARBA) standards.

 a. All non pedigree rabbits can be shown in the Small Animals show.
- 5. All 4-H rabbits must be permanently marked and have a legible ear tattoo in the rabbit's left ear at time of enrollment. This procedure helps exhibitor keep record of the rabbit breeding and helps straighten out mix-ups which might occur at the show.
- 6. Universal Adams County 4-H Record Sheet **AND** Workshop Verification OR Livestock Record Sheet **AND** Fair Entry is due into the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1. 4-H'ers not completing this requirement will have the opportunity to receive feedback from the exhibition class only and unable to sell in the 4-H Auction at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- 7. Any situation not covered by these rules shall be handled by the proper representatives of the 4-H Rabbit Committee and the 4-H Extension Educator.

Entry Procedures and Fair Exhibition Specific Rules:

- 1. Each member may only enter a maximum of 2 Meat Pens, 2 Single Fryers and 1 Rabbit per class per variety.
- 2. A 4x6 (landscape) picture of yourself and the animal you plan to sell in the auction must be turned in during Saturday check-in at fair. 4-H'ers Name and Animal ID must be on the back of the picture.
- 3. All rabbits will be inspected by rabbit committee upon arrival at the fairgrounds. Rabbits will be sent home if in bad health.
- 4. Pens will be assigned by the Rabbit Committee. Shavings will be provided.
- 5. All rabbits must be taken care of during the fair by the 4-H member and be fed, watered, and cared for daily.
- 6. Only 4-H members must be responsible for removing rabbits from pens, bringing their rabbits to the show table and returning them to pens on the day of judging. Members must also handle his/her rabbit in show.

Classes

Meat Pens:

- 1. A meat pen is constituted of three rabbits of the same breed (no crossbred rabbits eligible in the 4-H Rabbit Show), between the ages of 8 to 12 weeks and weigh between 3 ½ to 5 ½ pounds each, for a total of 10 ½ to 16 ½ pounds for the pen.
- 2. The meat pen and fryers will be tattooed at an Adams County 4-H Rabbit Identification Meeting. Each rabbit must have a different tattoo. No Exceptions.
- 3. Both the sire and dam of the litter must be on the identification form completed and turned into Extension Office by May 15.
- 4. One dam(doe) must accompany each litter. The sire (buck) may be the father of several litters if sired by that buck. The buck must belong to the family showing the litter. Both the sire and dam are required to show at the fair. Members who enter 2 meat pens will be required to show the sire and dam of each meat pen, thus making it necessary and permissible to show 2 senior does and 2 senior bucks in the same class.
- 5. Any exception to the weight must be approved by the committee.

Single Fryer:

- 1. Class will consist of one rabbit that weighs between $3\frac{1}{2}$ and $5\frac{1}{2}$ pounds.
- 2. This individual rabbit can be a part of the fryer pen, but will not be sold at the auction.

Breeding Classes:

- 1. Must be tattooed, in the left ear.
- 2. Must be in good physical condition, no sickness.

Auction:

- 1. Exhibitors may sell only once through the 4-H auction. Members must inform the committee of their intent to sell or take the animal home within 30 minutes of the completion of the Rabbit Show. Informing the committee can be done at the announcers stand the day of the show.
- 2. 4-H'er may sell a meat pen in auction; which consists of 3 rabbits.
- 3. All non-auction animals will be released after auction set-up on Thursday.
- 4. The Grand Champion will sell first, then the Reserve Grand Champion followed by Showmanship (Premier, Senior, Intermediate, Junior) and then remaining animals by back tag number.

Recycling

Project Superintendent: Position Available

Description: The 4-H Recycling Project, youth will explore why it is important to recycle and be able to use

creativity and imagination to make something out of recycled products for exhibit.

State Fair Entry: One (1) Entry

Project Guidelines:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

2. All recycling artwork exhibits must include a 4-H Craft Information Card, 4-H 618A. This information card is to describe work completed so the judge can more accurately evaluate the exhibit. Craft information cards are for judging purposes only.

3. All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.

4. Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.

5. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Exhibit Guidelines:

- 1. Exhibit must be no larger than 24" high and must rest on a sturdy base which is no more than 24" square.
- 2. A list of all materials used must accompany the exhibit.
- 3. Recycling projects will be judged on workmanship, appropriateness for age and creativity.

Beginner-Grades 3-5

- 1. Choose one of the following:
 - a. Exhibit a poster identifying what items can be recycled and why it is important to recycle.
 - b. Exhibit a poster showing how to set up a home recycling center.

 Include pictures of your home recycling center and document how well this works in your household.
 - c. Exhibit artwork made entirely from recycled products. Bonding agent does not need to be a recycled product.

Intermediate-Grades 6-8

- 1. Choose one of the following:
 - a. Research a landfill identifying past and present technology, exhibit a research paper or poster showing what was learned.
 - b. Exhibit a poster identifying alternatives to waste (Example: Reuse Christmas wrapping paper, etc.)
 - c. Exhibit artwork made entirely from recycled products. Bonding agent does not need to be a recycled product.

Advanced-Grades 9-12

- 1. Choose one of the following:
 - a. Exhibit a poster identifying and explaining the seven recycling codes used on plastics.
 - b. Research hazardous wastes in your home. Exhibit a poster listing findings and show alternatives less hazardous.
 - c. Exhibit a poster designed as an advertisement to promote recycling.
 - d. Exhibit artwork made entirely from recycled products. Bonding agent does not need to be recycled.

Scrapbooking

Project Superintendent: Position Available

Description: The 4-H Scrapbooking project allows youth to creatively express themselves through the design of

a scrapbook, highlighting moments and memories that are important to them. Members experience

planning, organizing and presentation skills as they work through their exhibit.

State Fair Entry: One (1) Entry

Project Guidelines:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

- 2. All scrapbooking exhibits must include a 4-H Craft Information Card, 4-H 618A. This information card is to describe work completed so the judge can more accurately evaluate the exhibit. Craft information cards are for judging purposes only.
- 3. Judging will be divided into three (3) divisions:

a. Beginner Grades 3-5 b. Intermediate Grades 6-8 c. Advanced Grades 9-12

4. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Exhibit Guidelines:

- 1. Album
 - a. All albums should be 8½" by 11" or larger in size. (12" by 12" is the most common size).
 - b. All albums must have a front and back cover with pages firmly attached between the covers.
 - c. All pages are to be numbered and covered with plastic protection.
 - d. Scrapbook albums must have 10 pages completed for judging. Only completed pages with photos, memorabilia, documentation, decoration, etc. will be eligible for judging.

Incomplete or unfinished pages will not be eligible for judging, or count toward the 10 page total.

- 2. Journaling, Memorabilia and Photos
 - a. Journaling is required on every page-without it you have pages of photographs and memorabilia, not a book of memories. Photos and memorabilia are more complete, more meaningful and more fun with detail, emotion and humor that only words can provide. Use neat, personal, clear handwriting and avoid using excessive computer generated text. It is fine to include some digitally printed journaling, but make sure to have your own handwriting in your album.
 - Beginner: label photos and memorabilia with names, dates, places, etc.
 - Intermediate: label photos and memorabilia with names, dates, places, etc., and capturing memories with

captions or words recording the happenings of the photos or memorabilia.

• Advanced: label photos and memorabilia with names, dates, places, etc., and capturing memories with

captions or words recording the happenings of the photos or memorabilia and storytelling. Write thoughts, feelings and tell a complete story or memory on each page. Not every photo has a complete story as choose these descripts of storytelling when decigning pages.

has a complete story, so choose those deserving of storytelling when designing pages.

b. **Memorabilia** adds meaning, texture and variety to the scrapbook and gets more fascinating with time. These are items that tell an important part of the story and add significantly to the interest of the page. Members may add memorabilia throughout the book and have two pages dedicated to it entirely.

- c. Photographs should be the focus of the album and eight of the ten pages should contain one or more photographs for all divisions.
 - Photos and memorabilia must be included in each scrapbook, but not necessarily on each page, i.e. some pages may only contain photos, while others may contain only memorabilia.
 - Keep in mind the proper placement of photos, etc. in the album. You are telling a story, so use chronology (order of occurrence) or themes to organize the album.

Sewing

Project Superintendent: Rozann Schmidtke, 623-6020

Description: The sewing project teaches fabric selection, pattern selection and sewing machine use to construct

items used around the home or garments/outfits to be worn by the 4-H member or another person.

State Fair Entry: Sewing - Wearable Sewing Non-Wearable

One Exhibit each from 3-7 Grades
One Exhibit each from 3-12 Grades
One Exhibit from each Senior Category

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

Members will be allowed to enter in one or both of Sewing project categories (Wearable and Non-Wearable), with a max of 1 entry per category.

3. Older youth enrolled in the 4-H sewing project for the first time may not feel comfortable demonstrating their assigned grade level skills. In this instance the county 4-H Youth Development Educator may, at the request of the 4-H member and parent, assign the member to a lower level grade level to develop fundamental skills.

4. Provide a completed sewing skills card (Project Exhibit Card), with the exhibit. Skills sheets are for judging purposes only.

5. Premiums will be awarded: Grand Champions will be awarded:

Wearable 3-7 Grades: Premiums for each grade Wearable A/B and Wearable C/D

Wearable 8-12 Grades: Premium awarded per category

Non-wearable: Premiums awarded for each grade Non-Wearable in Level A/B and Level C/D

Wearable

Grade 4

Non-Wearable

1. Create one non-wearable sewn item, or set of items, demonstrating at least 2 skills from Sewing Skills and Techniques, 4-H-925-SC-W, in addition to those learned in the prior grade.

Wearable

1. Create one clothing article to be worn by the 4-H member or another person demonstrating at least 2 skills from Sewing Skills and Techniques, 4-H-925-SC-W, in addition to those learned in the prior grade.

Grade 5

Non-Wearable

1. Create one non-wearable sewn item, or set of items, demonstrating at least 3 skills from Sewing Skills and Techniques, 4-H-925-SC-W, in addition to those learned in prior grades.

1. Create one clothing article or a simple two piece outfit to be worn by the 4-H member or another person demonstrating at least 3 skills from Sewing Skills and Techniques, 4-H-925-SC-W, in addition to those learned in prior grades.

1. Create two garments that can be worn together to be worn by the 4-H member or another person demonstrating at least 4 skills from Sewing Skills and Techniques, 4-H-925-SC-W, in addition to those learned in prior grades.

Grade 7

Non-Wearable

1. Create one non-wearable sewn item, or set of items, demonstrating at least 5 skills from Sewing Skills and Techniques, 4-H-925-SC-W, in addition to those learned in prior grades.

Wearable

1. Create an outfit that can be worn by the 4-H member or another person demonstrating at least 5 skills from Sewing Skills and Techniques, 4-H-925-SC-W, in addition to those learned in prior grades.

Senior Sewing Category

Grades 8-12

- 1. Youth may enter an exhibit in one or more senior sewing exhibit categories.
- 2. Create an outfit from one of the categories defined below that can be worn by the exhibitor or another person demonstrating at least 6 skills from Sewing Skills and Techniques, 4-H-925-SC-W, in addition to those learned in prior grades.
- 3. All senior sewing outfits exhibited in Fashion Revue must be made and worn by the exhibitor.
- 4. Definition of an outfit— An outfit is a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look such as:
 - -One or two piece dress -One or two piece pant suit -A three piece combination (pants, vest & blouse or shirt)

Exhibit Options:

Non-Wearable

1. Create one non-wearable sewn item, or set of items, demonstrating at least 6 skills from Sewing Skills and Techniques, 4-H-925-SC-W, in addition to those learned in prior grades.

Wearable

Choose one or more from the Senior Sewing wearable exhibit options below: Choose one of the following:

1. Informal/Casual Wear

A complete outfit of 1 or 2 pieces suitable for school, weekend, or casual, informal activities.

In this category, a complete outfit is defined as a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - such as one or two piece dress, or one or two piece pant suit, or a combination, such as pants, vest, blouse or shirt.

2. Dress Up

This is suitable for special, church, or social occasions that are not considered to beformal. It may be an outfit of one or more pieces with or without its own costume coat or jacket (lined or unlined). This is not an outfit that would be worn to school, weekend, or casual, informal activities.

3. Suit or Coat

The suit consists of two pieces including a skirt or pants and its own lined jacket. It is not a dress with jacket as in "dress up wear". The coat is a separate lined coat. It will be judged separately as a coat with its own accessories.

4. Separates

Consists of three garments that must be worn as a coordinated complete outfit. In this category, a complete outfit is defined as a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - a three piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt. Each piece should be versatile enough to be worn with other garments.

5. Formal Wear

This outfit may be one or more pieces suitable for any formal occasion, such as proms, weddings and formal evening functions.

6. Free Choice

A complete outfit comprised of garments that do not fit in the other classifications. A complete outfit is defined as a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - such as one or two piece dress, or one or two piece pant suit, or a three piece combination, such as pants, vest, blouse or shirt. Individual garment examples include: tennis wear, swim wear, athletic or sportswear, lounge wear, riding habits, historic, dance, theatrical, or international costumes, capes, and unlined coats.

Sewing Fashion Revue

Project Superintendent: Rozann Schmidtke, 623-6020

Description: This project teaches youth skills to present themselves in a professional manner by providing an

opportunity for youth to model the outfit constructed in the 4-H sewing project.

State Fair Entries: 6 Participants in grades 8-12 with a maximum of 2 per category.

An exhibitor may participate in only 1 Senior Fashion Revue category at State Fair.

Project and Exhibit Guidelines:

1. Judging will be divided into two divisions: Junior (Grades 3-7) Senior (Grades 8-12)

- 2. Fashion Revue categories are: Informal or Casual Wear, Dress Up, Free Choice, Suit or Coat, Separates and Formal Wear 4-H members may enter in only one Fashion Revue category per year, 4-H'ers may repeat a category only once.
- 3. Model the garment or outfit constructed for the sewing project. All garments modeled must have been made by the member since the previous year's 4-H fair. Accessories may be purchased or selected from what you currently have.
- 4. Youth qualifying to exhibit the same garment or outfit in Indiana State Fair Sewing and Fashion Revue must choose which project they wish to participate as one cannot exhibit the same garment or outfit in both projects at state fair.
- 5. Premiums will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.
- 6. One (1) Grand and Reserve Grand Champion will be chosen for each Division.

Sheep

Project Superintendent: Holly Neuenschwander, 525-4041

Description: 4-H Sheep project provides youth with a fun and hands-on learning experience which develops

skills in nutrition, health care and animal husbandry. Responsibility, record keeping, problem solving, disease prevention and decision making are just a few of the many life skills gained in 4-H

animal projects.

State Fair Entries: All animals for State Fair must be properly identified and enrolled.

State Fair entry is open online at exhibitors corner indiana state fair com May 16 - July 1.

General Rules:

1. All 4-H General Rules, Livestock Rules and Health Regulations apply.

- 2. All market/commercial animals must be individually identified during the county identification day under supervision of the Extension Staff at the start of the project. Market animals will be weighed and tagged with an official Adams County ear tag. Other ear tags may be left in if they contain number's, but must be removed if they contain names.
- 3. All animals must be identified, owned, under the care of the 4-H'er and enrolled online by end of day on May 15.

a. Any one animal may not be enrolled by more than one 4-H member, except for siblings.

- 4. Copies of Purebred Registration Papers for all purebred ewes you plan to bring to the Adams County 4-H Fair must be turned into the Extension Office by 4:00 PM on July 1st. Any ewes that do not have registration papers or if ear tags/tattoos do not match registration papers; the animal will show in the commercial class.
- 5. Universal Adams County 4-H Record Sheet **AND** Workshop Verification OR Livestock Record Sheet **AND** Fair Entry is due into the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1. 4-H'ers not completing this requirement will have the opportunity to receive feedback from the exhibition class only and unable to sell in the 4-H Auction at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- 6. Any situations not covered by these rules shall be handled by the proper representatives of the 4-H Sheep Committee and the 4-H Extension Educator.

Entry Procedures and Fair Exhibition Specific Rules:

- 1. Each member may show a maximum of four breeding ewes and three market lambs at the Adams County 4-H Fair. 4-H members may not show the same ewe lamb as both a market lamb and a breeding ewe in the 4-H Sheep Show in any given year. A ewe lamb can, however, be shown as a market lamb one (1) year and then shown as a yearling breeding ewe the following year.
- 2. Sheep pens will be assigned by the committee prior to fair. Any/all penning changes will be made by Sheep Committee.
- 3. A 4x6 (landscape) picture of yourself and the animal you plan to sell in the auction must be turned in during Saturday check-in at fair. 4-H'ers Name and Animal ID must be on the back of the picture.
- 4. The committee or veterinarian will check all sheep for fungus and disease at the scales. Members must comply with health rules and regulations to be eligible for the fair. No blankets/covers permitted on sheep at weigh-in.
- 5. All market lambs must be slick-sheared within ¼ inch before they will be weighed at fair check-in.
- 6. Market lambs will be weighed only once at Saturday check-in and this will be the official weight for the class and the auction weight. Re-weigh requests must be brought before the committee **immediately** after first weigh in.
- 7. Any lambs showing evidence of testicular tissue are ineligible to exhibit.
- 8. No paint and/or polish will be permitted at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- 9. Towels cooled with ice water only may be used. NO bags of ice or isopropyl alcohol (in any form) may be used.
- 10. Sheep walking must stay around the 4-H show barns. No parking lot walking of sheep.

Classes

Must be two (2) of a breed to make a class, or they will be placed in an "All Other Breeds" class.

1. Breeding Ewes:

- a. Purebred Ewes
 - i. Will show by breed, broken by age classes. (Lambs, Yearling and Aged based on registration paper information)
- b. Commercial Ewes
 - i. Will show by weight, broken by age classes. (Lambs, Yearlings and Aged)
- c. Purebred Breed Champions and Commercial Champion will compete in Grand Champion Drive and be eligible for Top 5 Breeding Ewe placings.
- d. Ewe Age Breaks for Classes:
 - i. Ewe Lambs Fall Lambs (Must be born September 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023) and Spring Lambs (Must be born on or after January 1, 2024) will show together.
 - ii. Yearling Ewes Must have not reached 2nd year of birth by Adams County Sheep show date.
 - iii. Aged Ewes

2. Market Lamb:

- a. Market Spring Lamb
 - i. Classes will be divided by weight by the committee.
 - ii. Each of the winners from the Market Lamb Classes will be in the Grand Champion Drive. Top 5 placings will be selected in the Grand Champion Drive.

3. Fleece Show

- a. Fleece must be submitted by 9AM on Thursday, July 13 to the 4-H Expo Hall.

 All Fleece will be judged during Pre-Fair Judging, will be displayed in the 4-H Expo Hall during 4-H Fair and available for pick-up during exhibit check-out at the conclusion of fair week.
- b. Exhibitors may enter a maximum of 2 fleece.
- c. Fleece will be divided into 3 categories:
 - i. Fine
 - ii. Medium
 - iii. Long
- d. All Fleece must be labeled:
 - i. 4-H'ers Name
 - ii. Breed
 - iii. Sheep Gender
- e. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Showmanship:

- 1. Showmanship is on a volunteer basis with members strongly encouraged to participate.
- 2. Members must currently be enrolled in the Sheep project and show their own animal in showmanship.
- 3. Showmanship will be divided into 4 classes:
 - a. **Junior** (**Grades 3-5**) Junior winner will compete in the Intermediate division the following year. Junior winner cannot repeat as Champion Junior Sheep Showman.
 - b. **Intermediate (Grades 6-8)** Intermediate winner will compete in Senior division the following year. Intermediate winner cannot repeat as Champion Intermediate Sheep Showman.
 - c. Senior (Grades 9-12) Senior winner will compete in premier division the following year. Senior winner cannot repeat as Champion Senior Sheep Showman.
 - d. Premier The Premier Showman will be selected from the current Beginner, Intermediate and Senior Showman and any past Senior and Premier Showmanship winners still enrolled in 4-H. The winner will represent the Sheep species in the overall Supreme Showman contest.
 A Premier Showmanship runner-up will be selected and announced.

Auction:

- 1. Exhibitors may sell only once through the 4-H auction. Members must inform the committee of their intent to sell, consign or take the animal home within 30 minutes of the completion of the Sheep Show. Informing the committee can be done at the announcers stand the day of the show.
- 2. Lambs must weigh no more than 160lbs to sell in the 4-H Auction or sold for consignment.
- 3. Exhibitors are responsible for taking their own auction animals to the northwest swine barn following clean up at 11AM on Thursday.
- 4. All non-auction animals will be released after auction set-up on Thursday.
- 5. The Grand Champion Market Lamb will sell first, then the Reserve Grand Champion Market Lamb, followed by Showmanship (Premier, Senior, Intermediate, Junior), Rate of Gain and then remaining animals by back tag number.

Shooting Sports (Poster/Educational Display Option)

Description: The 4-H shooting sports project teaches safe operation of firearms and archery equipment.

State Fair Entries: One (1) Exhibit per Level

Project Requirements:

1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.

- 2. All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.
- 3. Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.
- 4. Live ammunition is not allowed to be exhibited (no powder or primer). Firearms or ready to shoot bows are not allowed to be exhibited. Unstrung bows are permissible.
- 5. An arrow with its arrowhead attached must be displayed in a secure case. An arrowhead without the arrow attached must be displayed in a secure case. An arrow may be displayed unsecured if its arrowhead is removed. Modern broadhead arrows are not allowed to be exhibited.
- 6. Displays involving firearms or bows may be exhibited as a photographic display on a poster or in a notebook following grade level guidelines. Handmade items must include information explaining how the item was made and its intended use. Photos are encouraged.
- 7. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

State Fair Entries: County Project Only, No Indiana State Fair Entries

Project and Exhibit Guidelines:

1. Adams County 4-H members must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet along with completing Fair Entry by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue. Completed record sheet must be turned in by the established and posted date.

2. Animals requiring special permits to hold in captivity will not be allowed.

a. Small animals suitable for exhibit in this project are household pets normally housed in a cage. Examples are: gerbils, guinea pigs, hamsters, mice, rats, hedgehogs, frogs, turtles, lizards, hermit crabs, non-venomous snakes and birds (canaries, parakeets, parrots). Others not listed must be approved by 4-H Council, written request submitted by July 1.

3. Small animal chosen for exhibit must be in 4-H member's possession and care by May 15th.

4. Members must be able to talk about and handle their pet for judging, members are to provide their own cage and equipment which they will want to exhibit during judging to show the animals habitat.

5. Small Animals will only be at the Adams County 4-H Fair during judging and released to go home after judging.

6. Judging will be divided into 3 divisions: Beginner (Grades 3-5) Intermediate (Grades 6-8) Advanced (Grades 9-12)

7. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Sportfishing

Project Superintendent: Jackie Bollenbacher, 301-6176

Description: 4-H Sportfishing teaches safe habits and youth develop an appreciation for natural resources.

State Fair Entries: One (1) Entry per Level

Project Requirements

- 1. Adams County 4-H members must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet along with completing Fair Entry by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue. Completed record sheet must be turned in by the established and posted date.
- 2. All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.
- 3. Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.
- 4. Judges evaluating exhibits should recognize individual differences and creativity, therefore using information in this document as a guide rather than a requirement.
- 5. Premiums and Grand Champions will be determined by the method stated in the Adams County 4-H Governing Rules under the General Project Rules section.

Starter Calf

Project Superintendent: Paul Bluhm, 223-2142

Description: 4-H Starter Calf project provides youth with a fun and hands-on learning experience which develops

skills in nutrition, health care and animal husbandry. Responsibility, record keeping, problem solving, disease prevention and decision making are just a few of the life skills gained in 4-H animal projects.

State Fair Entries: All animals for State Fair must be properly identified and enrolled.

State Fair entry is open online at exhibitorscorner.indianastatefair.com May 16 - July 1.

General Rules:

1. All 4-H General Rules, Livestock Rules and Health Regulations apply.

2. All Starter Calves must be individually identified during the county identification day under the supervision of the Extension staff at the start of the project. Animals will be weighed and tagged with an official Adams County eartag.

- a. Dairy and Dairy/Beef Cross Starter Calves must weigh no more than 300 lbs. at April ID day to be eligible to exhibit at the Adams County 4-H Fair. Dairy Starter Calves intended for State Fair only may be heavier than the Adams County 300 lb. limit, but must still be tagged at April ID day.
- Beef Starter Calves do not need to physically attend the April ID day, however exhibitors must secure official ear tags for Beef Starter Calves at the Extension Office and have calves tagged by the May 15 deadline.
 Beef Starter Calves must be under 600 lbs. at fair weigh in.
- 3. All animals must be identified, owned, under the care of the 4-H'er and enrolled online by the end of the day on May 15. Any one animal may not be enrolled by more than one 4-H member, except for siblings.
 - a. The animal can be purebred dairy, dairy crossbred, dairy/beef crossbred, beef crossbred, or purebred beef. Any combination of dairy will be shown as a dairy animal. Any animal with beef blood will be shown as a beef animal.
 - b. The calf can be a steer or market heifer. However, heifers will be entered and shown in only one 4-H livestock show and cannot be shown in beef or dairy breeding classes.
- 4. Universal Adams County 4-H Record Sheet **AND** Workshop Verification OR Livestock Record Sheet **AND** Fair Entry is due into the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1. 4-H'ers not completing this requirement will have the opportunity to receive feedback from the exhibition class only and unable to sell in the 4-H Auction at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
 - a. 4-H'ers enrolled in both Beef and Starter Calf projects will only need to attend one workshop to count towards both Beef and Starter Calf Paperwork Requirements. 4-H'ers not attending a workshop will need to complete the Livestock Record Sheet for both Beef and Starter Calf.
- 5. All Starter Calves must be properly dehorned and castrated or banned prior to fair. Freshly castrated calves will not be allowed to show. **No clamping will be allowed.** Animals will be inspected upon arrival at fair by a Beef/Starter Calf Committee member, their decision is final.
- 6. All Dairy and Dairy/Beef Cross animals will be genomic tested during the county identification day to determine breed composition. Testing will be completed by a 4-H volunteer by collecting a DNA tissue sample from the ear of the animal. Testing will cost \$14 per animal, partially funded through sponsorship and fundraising.
 - The test will identify % dairy genetics versus % beef genetics.
 - Cattle test results showing 75% and higher dairy genetics will show as a Dairy Steer
 - Cattle test results showing 40% to 74.9% dairy genetics will show as a Dairy/Beef Cross Steer
 - Cattle test results showing 39.9% or lower dairy genetics will show as a Beef Steer

If genomic tests results are in a different class than what the 4-H member declared at County ID Day, the 4-H Extension Educator will contact the 4-H member about results to inform the new class the animal is assigned.

Animals only need to be tested once; If a starter calf is genomic tested one year and comes back the following year as a Beef project, we will use the test from the previous year to determine where your animal will show at the fair assuming it has all original ear tags(County 5-Digit and RFID) at May 15 enrollment deadline.

Any situation not covered by these rules shall be handled by the proper representatives of the 4-H Beef/Starter Calf
Committee and the 4-H Extension Educator.

Entry Procedures and Fair Exhibition Specific Rules:

- 1. Each member may show a maximum of three starter calves at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- 2. Beef/Starter Calf members will unload/weigh-in 45 minutes prior to scheduled check-in, to allow for help with fair entry.
- 3. A 4 x 6 (landscape) picture of yourself and the animal you plan to sell in the auction must be turned in during Saturday check-in at fair. 4-H'ers Name and Animal ID must be on the back of the picture.
- 4. The Starter Calf barn is to be filled before putting calves in the cattle barn, without exception.
- 5. Starter Calves will be weighed only once, immediately upon stepping from transportation to the fairgrounds, and this weight will be the official show/auction weight. A representative from the family must be at the scales at time of weigh-in, re-weigh requests must be brought before the committee immediately after first weigh in.
- 6. Because of space limitations, calves can be allocated only one tie place per animal.
 - a. All stalls will be assigned by committee after set-up on Monday prior to fair.
 - b. Exhibitors are responsible for the cleanliness of assigned stalls throughout the entire duration of the fair.
 - c. Do not leave buckets of water or feed in front of animals.

Classes:

1. Dairy Starter Calf

Dairy Starter Calf classes will be shown by weight.

Dairy Starter Calf classes will be divided into four divisions: Division 1-4.

The four division champions will compete for Grand Champion Dairy Starter Calf.

2. Beef Starter Calf

Beef Starter Calf classes will be shown by weight.

One Grand Champion Beef Starter Calf will be selected.

3. Beef/Dairy Cross Starter Calf

Beef/Dairy Cross classes will be shown by weight.

Beef/Dairy Cross classes will be divided into four divisions: Division 1-4.

The four division champions will compete for Grand Champion Beef/Dairy Cross Starter Calf.

Additional Awards:

Rate-of-Gain award will be given to the exhibitor whose calf has the highest weight gain per day from the spring county identification day until check-in at county fair

Showmanship:

- 1. Showmanship is on a volunteer basis with members strongly encouraged to participate.
- 2. Members must currently be enrolled in the Starter Calf project and show their own animal in showmanship.
- 3. Showmanship will be divided into 4 classes:
 - a. **Junior** (**Grades 3-5**) Junior winner will compete in the Intermediate division the following year. Junior winner cannot repeat as Champion Junior Starter Calf Showman.
 - b. **Intermediate (Grades 6-8)** Intermediate winner will compete in Senior division the following year. Intermediate winner cannot repeat as Champion Intermediate Starter Calf Showman.
 - c. **Senior (Grades 9-12)** Senior winner will compete in premier division the following year. Senior winner cannot repeat as Champion Senior Starter Calf Showman.
 - d. **Premier** The Premier Showman will be selected from the current Beginner, Intermediate and Senior Showman and any past Senior and Premier Showmanship winners still enrolled in 4-H. The winner will represent the Starter Calf species in the overall Supreme Showman contest.

A Premier Showmanship runner-up will be selected and announced.

Auction:

- 1. Exhibitors may sell only once through the 4-H auction. Members must inform the committee of their intent to sell or take the animal home within 30 minutes of the completion of the Starter Calf Show. Informing the committee can be done at the announcers stand the day of the show.
- 2. Starter Calves must weigh at least 300 lbs. to sell in the 4-H Auction.
- 3. Once a member sells a Starter Calf through the 4-H Auction that member or an immediate family member cannot show that animal the following year in the Beef project. Animals shown but not sold may return the following year for the Beef project provided the animal meets the project requirements.
- 4. All non-auction animals will be released after auction set-up on Thursday.
- 5. The Grand Champion Beef Starter Calf will sell first and the Grand Champion Dairy Starter Calf second, this will be rotated each year. (Even years Dairy Starter first, Odd years Beef Starter first.) The Reserve Grand Champion will sell in the same order as above followed by Grand Champion Born and Raised, Reserve Grand Champion Born and Raised, Showmanship (Premier, Senior, Intermediate, Junior), Rate of Gain, Top 3-5 Overall and then remaining animals by back tag number.
- 6. Exhibitors are responsible for providing each animal left at the fairgrounds a completely serviceable halter or tie rope for securing the animal after the sale. The retention of this equipment will be attempted but not assured.
- 7. All non-auction animals will be released after auction set-up on Thursday.

Description: 4-H Swine project provides youth with a fun and hands-on learning experience which

develops skills in nutrition, health care and animal husbandry. Responsibility, goal setting, record keeping, problem solving, personal safety, disease prevention and decision making are just a few of

the many life skills gain in 4-H animal projects.

State Fair Entries: All animals for State Fair must be properly identified and enrolled.

State Fair entry is open online at exhibitorscorner.indianastatefair.com May 16 - July 1.

General Rules:

1. All 4-H General Rules, Livestock Rules and Health Regulations apply.

2. All animals must be identified, owned under the care of the 4-H'er and enrolled online by the end of the day on May 15. Any one animal may not be enrolled by more than one 4-H member, except for siblings.

- 3. Universal Adams County 4-H Record Sheet **AND** Workshop Verification OR Livestock Record Sheet **AND** Fair Entry is due into the Extension Office by 4PM on July 1. 4-H'ers not completing this requirement will have the opportunity to receive feedback from the exhibition class only and unable to sell in the 4-H Auction at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- 4. Purebred Registration Papers for all 4-H purebred animals are required. Family corporations and/or partnerships of 4-H members with one or more parents, siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles or a legal guardian are acceptable.
 - a. Copies of Purebred Registration Papers for all purebred hogs you plan to bring to the Adams County 4-H Fair must also be turned into the Extension Office by 4:00 PM on July 1st.

Any purebred papers not received by such date will be eligible to show as crossbred only.

5. Any situation not covered by these rules shall be handled by the proper representatives of the 4-H Swine Committee and the 4-H Extension Educator.

Entry Procedures and Fair Exhibition Specific Rules:

- 1. Each member may show a maximum of four pigs at the Adams County 4-H Fair.
- 2. All Pens will be assigned by the Swine Committee. 4-H Swine families are welcome to bring and set-up tack during the optional pen set-up Friday evening prior to fair 6-8PM only. Members that do not set up Friday night may unload and set-up during check-in Saturday morning.
- 3. The swine committee requests that pigs be clean when bringing them to the fair. If pigs are too dirty, the swine member may be asked to clean them in the wash rack before they will be weighed.
- 4. A 4 x 6 (landscape) picture of yourself and the animal you plan to sell in the auction must be turned in during Saturday check-in at fair. 4-H'ers Name and Animal ID must be on the back of the picture.
- 5. All Breeds represented will select a champion. The Breed Champions and Champion Crossbred will be in the Grand Champion Drive. Top 5 placings will be selected in the Grand Drive (both the barrow and the gilt show).
- 6. 4-Her's are responsible for cleaning the pens which they were assigned at check in. Please note, absolutely no pen cleaning during the swine portion of the auction due to heavy traffic in moving swine throughout the barn.

Adams County Born and Raised Recognition:

- 1. Adams County Born and Raised recognition is for swine which have been Born and Raised in Adams County. The Honor System is a requirement in order for success of this class. The swine committee will make the final determination if there is an animal in question.
- 2. All Adams County Born and Raised swine are eligible, however must meet following enrollment requirements:
 - a. All swine must be enrolled online at v2.4honline.com by May 15th.
 - b. The 4-H member must additionally have the official Adams County Born and Raised form completed, signed and into the County Extension Office by 4:00 PM on May 15th.
- 3. Awarding of Adams County Born and Raised Barrow and Gilts:
 - a. If both the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Barrow/Gilt is Adams County Born and Raised, those exhibitors will automatically be announced Grand and Reserve Champion Born and Raised.
 - b. In the event both the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Barrow/Gilt is not Adams County Born and Raised, the Born and Raised class will be offered.
 - To be eligible to show in this class, the barrow/gilt must place in the top five of the regular barrow/gilt class. Only the highest placing barrow/gilt would then return for the Champion and/or Reserve Champion Adams County Born and Raised class.
 - c. Awards will be given to: Champion Born and Raised Gilt, Reserve Champion Born and Raised Gilt, Champion Born and Raised Barrow and Reserve Champion Born and Raised Barrow.

Market Barrows:

- No age limit on barrows shown at the Adams County Fair.
 - a. All swine intended for exhibition at the Indiana State Fair must be born on or after December 1, 2023.
- Barrows will be divided into crossbred and purebred classes and will be shown according to weight.
- Barrows will have the following rules:
 - a. Barrows weighing less than 200lbs. or more than 300lbs. may be entered and shown, but will show for exhibition only and will not be able to sell through the 4-H Livestock Auction, members must remove their own animals during the livestock release time.
 - b. Crossbred barrows weighing 200 to 300 lbs. will be divided into four divisions with a champion and a reserve in each division. There will be a Champion/Reserve Champion selected in each crossbred barrow division. A Champion/Reserve Crossbred Barrow will be selected from the four division classes; with that winner competing for Grand Champion Barrow.
 - c. Crossbred Barrow Divisions will be:

Division 1: 200-225 lbs. Division 3: 251-275 lbs. Division 2: 226-250lbs. Division 4: 276-300 lbs.

Breeding Gilts:

- No age limit on gilts shown at the Adams County Fair.
 - a. All swine intended for exhibition at the Indiana State Fair must be born on or after December 1, 2023.
- Gilts will be divided into crossbred and purebred classes.
 - a. Purebred Gilts will show by age weighing 200-350lbs.
 - b. Crossbred Gilts will show by weight, weighing 200-350lbs.
- Gilts will have the following rules:
 - a. Gilts weighing less than 200lbs or more than 350lbs may be entered and shown, but will show for exhibition only and will not be able to sell through the 4-H Livestock Auction, members must remove their own animals during the livestock release time.
 - b. Crossbred gilts weighing 200 to 350 lbs, will be divided into five divisions with a champion and a reserve in each division. There will be a Champion/Reserve Champion selected in each crossbred gilt division. A Champion/Reserve Crossbred Gilt will be selected from the four division classes; with that winner competing for Grand Champion Barrow.
 - c. Crossbred Gilt Divisions will be:

Division 1: 200-230 lbs. Division 4: 291-320 lbs. Division 2: 231-260lbs. Division 5: 321-350 lbs.

Division 3: 261-290lbs.

Showmanship:

- Showmanship is on a volunteer basis with members strongly encouraged to participate.
- Members must currently be enrolled in the Swine project and show their own animal in showmanship.
- Showmanship will be divided into 4 classes:
 - a. Junior (Grades 3-5) Junior winner will compete in the Intermediate division the following year. Junior winner cannot repeat as Champion Junior Swine Showman.
 - b. Intermediate (Grades 6-8) Intermediate winner will compete in Senior division the following year. Intermediate winner cannot repeat as Champion Intermediate Swine Showman.
 - c. Senior (Grades 9-12) Senior winner will compete in premier division the following year. Senior winner cannot repeat as Champion Senior Swine Showman.
 - d. Premier The Premier Showman will be selected from the current Beginner, Intermediate and Senior Showman and any past Senior and Premier Showmanship winners still enrolled in 4-H. The winner will represent the swine species in the overall Supreme Showman contest.

A Premier Showmanship runner-up will be selected and announced.

Auction:

- 1. Exhibitors may sell only once through the 4-H auction. Members must inform the committee of their intent to sell or take the animal home within 30 minutes of the completion of the Swine Show. Informing the committee can be done at the announcers stand the day of the show.
- Swine must weigh minimum 200-350lbs to sell in the auction.
- All non-auction animals will be released after auction set-up on Thursday.
- The Grand Champion Barrow, will sell first and the Reserve Grand Champion Barrow second. The Grand Champion Gilt, will sell in the same order as above followed by Grand Champion Adams County Born and Raised Barrow, Reserve Grand Champion Adams County Born and Raised Barrow, Grand Champion Adams County Born and Raised Gilt, Reserve Grand Champion Adams County Born and Raised Gilt, Showmanship (Premiers, Senior, Intermediate, Junior), Rate of Gain, Top 3-5 Overall and then all others will be by back tag number.
- All pigs sold in the auction will be loaded on the truck and taken to the packer. (If market truck is available)
- a. In the event an animal is condemned by packer the 4-H member will not receive carcass payment for that animal.

Tractor and Mower Safety Operator Skills (Driving Option)

Project Requirements:

- 1. Adams County 4-H members **must turn in completed Universal Record Sheet** along with completing **Fair Entry** by 4PM on July 1. Members missing the deadline may compete, with the highest possible ribbon placing being a blue.
- 2. Tractor and Mower Safety and Operators Skills is organized into three (3) disciplines, 4-H members may only participate in one (1) discipline each year.
 - a. Ag Tractor
 - b. Lawn & Garden
 - c. Zero Turn Lawn & Garden
- 3. Each discipline will be divided by age: Juniors (Grades 3-7) Seniors (Grades 8-12)
- 4. Members must compete in the Adams County Tractor Operators Contest, which will be held in accordance with state operators' rules during the Adams County 4-H Fair.
 - a. Dates, locations and times for practice sessions held during 4-H Pre-Fair Judging week will be announced in specifically to all enrolled members via a letter in the mail.
- 5. There are interactive quiz questions along with rules, parts identification pictures and written quiz question packets on the State 4-H website at https://www.extension.purdue.edu/4-H/projects/index.html.
- 6. There are updates/changes almost yearly so members need to check it out to get the latest changes. Senior division members need to learn both the Junior and Senior written exam questions and parts.
- 7. The operator skills component is an educational and training activity conducted by adult 4-H volunteers. A parent or guardian is encouraged to be present when their child is operating a tractor. The adult 4-H volunteer has the authority to deny a child the opportunity to participate in the operator skills option when it is deemed a child is unable to safely operate a tractor due to size, weight, or any other reason that could place the child and/or others in harm.


