

- Large Bulky and/or Heavy State Fair Projects are the responsibility of the member to bring to the state fair,





Ag Day 2023: Coming Soon!

September 26 & 27 at the Harrison County Fairgrounds

Ag Day is a free educational experience based around agriculture for all 3rd grade students in Harrison County. Students can be enrolled in the Harrison County School District, Private School, or homeschooled as long as a chaperone is present. At this event, students will visit several stations with activities about sustainability, engineering, technology and production, farming, natural resources and more! Students will become familiar with how agriculture sustains our way of life. Lunch is provided by our generous sponsors. We also provide activities, books, fact sheets, educational materials and fun learning goodies for each student to explore once they return to their homes and classrooms.

What is Citizenship Washington Focus?



This trip is an exciting experience for 4-H members and all youth to go to the nation's capital and learn more about the meaning of citizenship. Listening, learning, sharing, receiving, caring and touring combine to provide a deeper respect and understanding for our American heritage and the principles, processes and structures of the U.S. government.

Each delegate will take part in workshops on contemporary issues and topics such as international affairs, human relations, government, ecology and conservation, family life and dating, community development, drama and creative expression, economics, agricultural policy, leadership, and careers.

4-H member must be at least 15 years of age and in 9th grade or higher by the first day of the trip. The trip to Washington, D.C., will be made by Purdue charter bus. Indiana delegate registration is \$1,600.00 per person and includes transportation, lodging, meals as part of the conference registration package, and special Indiana tours. Interested youth must contact their county 4-H Extension educator.

Say Thank You

4-H Members,

Please be sure to thank everyone who has positively impacted you this year. This includes adult 4-H volunteers, club leaders, superintendents, coaches, committee members, council members, fellow 4-H members, parents, sponsors, office staff, educators, or anyone else who has helped you this year!



Youth that had just participated in a clinic at the fair start writing thank you notes the organizations and volunteers that helped made the experience possible.

How to Write a Thank You Letter

- 1. Start with the greeting followed by a comma. Use Mr., Mrs. or Ms. followed by the sponsor's name. If the sponsor is a business, use the company's full name.
- 2. State why you are thanking them.
- 3. Make it personal: What did you learn in the project, why you chose to take this specific project, other information about your project.
- 4. Say thank you again.
- 5. End with a closing remark such as: Sincerely, With appreciation, With gratitude, Yours in 4-H, With sincere thanks. Use a comma following your closing remark.
- 6. Finally add your signature. Make sure it can be easily read.

EXAMPLE

Dear Sponsor,

Thank you very much for sponsoring the Garden project at the 4-H fair. I garden with my Dad and enjoy the time we spend outside. This was the first year we planted eggplant and I found it very interesting watching it grow. I was so happy to learn that I won the Grand Champion. Thank you again for your interest in 4-H.

4-H Point Sheets Due

Point Sheets are Due September 1

4-H traditional members earn points each year from September 1 through August 31, by completing all their projects, holding club office, participating in various activities, and by promoting 4-H. The Points Sheet (see appendix in your 4-H Handbook) allows members to track their participation. Use a new form each year and keep a copy for your records. Points Sheet forms are available at the Extension Office and in your 4-H Handbook. Only 4-H activities are submitted on this form. FFA and school activities do not apply. Completed forms are filed at the Extension office. Points sheets are due each year to the Extension Office by September 1st. Late Point Sheets points are not accepted after the deadline.
