

Stock the Trailer

Thank you to our Harrison County 4-H Clubs and Families, our community businesses and fair goers, we officially collected 3,040 pounds of food for Harrison County Community Services through the Farm Credit Mid-America and Rural 1st Stock the Trailer program.

Poultry Judging CDE


4-H and FFA Members compete as a team or individual. Classes of live birds and eggs will be judged along with egg candling and oral reasons.

The Poultry Judging teams from Harrison County participated in the Area 2 CDE on April 4th at the Clark County Fairgrounds. Students evaluated the quality of whole hen carcasses, graded exterior, and interior egg quality, judged pens of laying hens, answered questions about processed chicken products, and identified parts for processing of the chicken. Placing first in the junior team division were Regan Kamer, Lilly Kintner, and Sophie Hoehn. Placing fourth in the junior team division were Anna Sauerheber, Neil Sauerheber, and Owen Hoehn. Regan Kamer earned first place junior individual and Sophie Hoehn placed 5th. All members are part of the Blue River All-Stars 4-H Club. The teams were coached by Whitney Sauerheber.



Milk Quality and Products CDE

This event is open to 4-H and FFA members and is designed to teach youth skills necessary in the dairy foods career area. Youth will identify cheese, off flavors in milk, evaluate ice cream, problem solve, identify milk fat content in products, perform a California Mastitis Test, and will complete a knowledge exam.











Forestry CDE

WHAT IS MINI 4-H?

What is Mini 4-H?

Mini 4-H is a noncompetitive 4-H program for youth in grades K-2. Mini 4-H is designed to introduce you and your child to the 4-H program and is an excellent way for children to learn by doing and to exhibit projects at the fair. Mini 4-H members also have the opportunity to attend club meetings, workshops on the odd months of the year (including geneology, cooking, painting, gardening, decoupage, felt craft, and more!), and a summer day camp just for Mini 4-H'ers.

The noncompetitive learning environment for Mini 4-H includes:

- 1. Planned learning activities in which children are invited to be active and explore materials and ideas without the pressure of completing a specific product or exhibit.
- 2. Low adult/leader to child ratio that allows time for adults/leaders to provide individual positive encouragement and assistance.
- 3. Simple, interesting activities that are fun.
- 4. Encouragement of children to participate in a group activity by sharing and or displaying their activity projects.
- 5. Rewards are identical ribbons of the same color for everyone.

There is no limit to the number of projects youth can sign up for, however, try not to overwhelm a child with too many projects.






FOODS: Make your own trail mix, cook no-bake cookies and bake with biscuits! Learn how to make great treats your family will love.






GARDENING: Growing a vegetable garden does not have to be boring. You can plant hot and spicy peppers or cool cucumbers! Grow something you've never eaten before.

Steps of the 4-H Enrollment Process



1. Create 4-H Online Account

First step is to create a profile on www.V2.4honline.com

*Returning members will log-in and use 4-H Online to enroll annually. Refer to pages 16 & 17 for 4-H Online instructions.



2. Start attending 4-H Meetings & Join a Club

In 4-H Online, to enroll, you get to choose a 4-H Club. You can now start attending club meetings! You can contact any club leader to find out meeting dates, times, and locations! You can also join more than one club. Refer to the club guide on pg. 21.



3. Get involved/Explore Your **Project Interest Areas**

There are many ways to be involved in 4-H. From attending club meetings, going to project workshops, becoming a Junior Leader and attending Career Development Events, the possibilities are endless. This will help you determine which projects to exhibit at the 4-H Fair. Keep a look out for opportunities to get involved in 4-H!



4. Enter your projects on FairEntry and Exhibit at 4-H Fair

Use the knowledge and skills that you've gained in 4-H to make your culminating projects for the Harrison County 4-H Fair. Your projects will be entered into FairEntry online following guidelines in the handbook and project manuals. See pg. 23 for Harrison County project options and pg. 29 for FairEntry instructions

4-H ONLINE: YOUTH AND MINI MEMBERS

Open Enrollment Begins October 1

The 4-H Program Year starts on October 1st! Enroll to join us for a great program year by going to v2.4HOnline.com. Traditional 4-H Members, Mini 4-H Members, and Adult Volunteers must enroll each year to participate in the program. Start the year off right by getting your enrollment done early. Step by step instructions are included in the newsletter, in your email, on our website at extension.purdue.edu/Harrison, and on our Facebook page.



Enrollment Eligibility/Membership/Residence

Enrollment in Indiana 4-H is open to any youth enrolled in grades 3-12. Grade is defined as the school grade the child is enrolled on January 1 of the 4-H year. A child may enroll in only one 4-H program in Indiana, regardless of their place of residence. In other words, youth are not required to participate in their own county's program and may participate in a different county program provided they have properly enrolled. The only exception to this is if their county of primary 4-H enrollment does not offer a project or statewide activity they want to participate in, then the child can enroll in a second county provided they meet Indiana 4-H policy requirements.

Annual 4-H Enrollment/Re-Enrollment

Enrollment is an annual process attained by completing the appropriate county 4-H enrollment process. 4-H Online enrollment is October 1 through January 15 at v2.4honline.com. After January 15, contact the Extension Office. 4-H enrollment is open to youth in grades 3-12 for a maximum of 10 consecutive years. 4-H members may drop or add projects through 4-H Online, through May 15. There is a \$15 4-H program fee (Mini 4-H is free), payable at the time of enrollment.

Adding a New Family Member

Enter the member's information. Click the Next button. Complete the "About You" form with requested information Click the Next button. Select your method of participation Click the Finish button. If you have selected that you will be participating as New or Returning Club Member, continue to Youth and Mini 4-H Member Enrollment. If you are participating as an Adult Volunteer, continue to the Adult Volunteer Enrollment instructions.

Logging in to an Existing Account

Go to v2.4HOnline.com Enter your email address and password. Click Sign-In Continue to Youth and Mini 4-H Member Enrollment to re-enroll youth members, to Adult Enrollment to re-enroll adult members or to Adding New Members to add new Family Members. If you have forgotten your password, click "Reset Password?" to receive an email with a link to set a new password.

What's the Difference Between Fair Entry and 4-H Online?

4-H Online is the program enrollment website. This is where you register for the 4-H program year as well as the projects, project animals, and events you will be participating in throughout the year. Fair Entry is the fair entry database. This is where you submit the projects or animals you specifically intend to exhibit or show at the county fair. Fair Entry does not open until later in the year, and you must have your projects registered on 4-H Online before submitting them on the Fair Entry database.

How can Families Help?

- The 4-H program encourages parents, grandparents, guardians, and family members to help the 4-Her with his/her projects. Here are some suggestions:
- Help youth select projects that relate to their interest/hobbies.
- Attend club meetings with your child.
- Give encouragement and supervision, but allow the 4-Her to do their own work.
- Help youth develop a record keeping system for their project work. (This may mean finding a special place for records and 4-H materials in the home and reviewing that information periodically with them.)
- Read the 4-H Newsletter/4-H emails and help them stay on top of dates, deadlines, rules, etc
- Be willing to help whenever possible for the club as extra adult hands, hostess, driver, chaperone, etc. as the need arises.
- Be positive. Praise them when they succeed & be there to help when they struggle. Let them learn!
- Seek help from Extension Staff, Club Leaders, fellow 4-Hers, as well as people with specific expertise in project areas.
- HAVE FUN!

Did You Know?

In most 4-H projects, 4-H members are divided by their level, which is usually based on their grade level. Divisions include:

Minis: Grades K-2 Juniors: Grades 3-5

Creating A New Account:

- 1. Go to **v2.4HOnline.com**.
- 2. Click "Don't have an account?" if you have never enrolled in 4-H before using 4-H Online.
- 3. Select Indiana from the drop-down menu.
- 4. Choose your county from the drop-down menu.
- 5. Complete your family's information.
- 6. Click the Create Account button.
- 7. Enter your family's address information.
- 8. Click the Verify button.
- 9. If you create a new account and an existing account is found, click the Confirm button and continue to Logging in with an existing 4-H Online account.



- 1. Select the member's Grade and click Next.
- 2. Select to Confirm that you would like to enroll as a Club Member.
- 3. Click the Select Clubs button.
- 4. Select the County in which your Club is located.
- 5. Click Add next to the Club you would like to join.
- 6. Repeat steps 1-3 to add all of the Clubs in which you would like to participate.
- 7. If you have enrolled in more than one club, be sure the Primary club is marked correctly. If not, click the Change to Primary button to mark a different Club as your Primary Club.
- 8. Click the trash can icon to remove a Club from the list.
- 9. Once all of your Clubs are added, click Next at the bottom of the screen.
- 10. Click Select Projects.
- 11. Select the Club with which you want your project to be associated.
- 12. Click the Add button next to the project you want to add to the member's enrollment.
- 13. Repeat steps 10-12 for each project in which you would like to participate.
- 14. Click the trash can icon to remove any projects.
- 15. Click the Next button once all the member's projects have been added.
- 16. Click "Show Questions"
- 17. Complete the enrollment questions. Some of the questions will be completed for you based on what you entered when you created your record.
- 18. Complete the Health form fields and Consents.
- 19. Click the Next button at the bottom of the screen when you are done.
- 20. Complete the Consents
- 21. Click the Next button at the bottom of the page when you are finished.
- 22. If applicable, review the fees for the member.
 - a. For the 2023-2024 4-H year, the 4-H Council has generously decided to cover the enrollment fees for all youth. Be sure to click the "Pay By Check" option in the Payment step to allow enrollment fees to be covered.
- 23. Review the enrollment information.
- 24. Once you have verified that the clubs and projects are listed correctly, click the Submit button.

You will receive an email to let you know your enrollment has been submitted. You will receive another email when your County Extension office has approved your enrollment. You may view the enrollment status on the Member List. Any enrollments that have fees to be paid by credit card will process when the County Extension Office approves the enrollment. Should the transaction be declined, you will receive an email notification. It will include a link to login so that you may add another card or change your payment method.

If you are returning to 4-H, your Volunteer record will be listed on the family Member List. Click "Enroll Now" under the Program in which you would like to enroll. If you are a new volunteer, click "Add Member" and follow the steps for "Adding a New Family Member," then continue to Step 1 below. If you are a new volunteer, you will need to fill out an application and contact the office first.

- 1. Click the Select Volunteer Types (blue button at the bottom of the screen) to indicate how you are planning to participate in the program throughout the year. At least one Volunteer Type is required during the enrollment process. You may add additional Volunteer Types later, if needed.
- 2. Select a Volunteer Type in the dropdown box.
 - a. program volunteer general volunteer
 - b. club volunteer- club leaders
 - c. project volunteer project leaders
- 3. Click Add next to your Volunteer Type Role.
- 4. When you are finished, click the Next button.
- 5. Click Show Questions button and complete demographic Questions section.

- Completion of all lessons will take a total of less than an hour. You can exit at any time and come back to complete, but know you will not be approved until all lessons are finished.
- Launch the course and allow each training to completely run through all slides before exiting.
- **Note** you cannot skip through the slides, you must go through each one as it follows to get credit at the end. Also if prompted to click NEXT or CONTINUE at the end of each one do so until it takes you back to 4-H Online.

What Happens Now?

Now that your child is enrolled in 4-H or Mini 4-H, they can officially begin taking part in activities, workshops, and club meetings. They will also start to receive important emails and the bimonthly CloverPrint Newsletter! There are other important documents (see below) they'll need to start their 4-H year, so stop by the office to pick those up and ask any questions!



Join a Club/Attend Club Meetings:

After enrolling in 4-H Online, a 4-H member (and family) attends monthly club meetings. At these meetings, members plan club events, vote on items, swap ideas and information on project areas and do fun and educational activities.

Beyond local club participation, 4-H families can participate in a variety of county sponsored events, such as project workshops, camps, county fair and more!

CloverPrint Newsletter:

A 4-H newsletter is emailed every other month to alert families of upcoming events. Be sure to read it!

You will start to receive emails from 4-H Online regarding various important dates, events, and club updates. It is important to check your email often to avoid missing any important information that may apply to the 4-H member.

Workshops:

The Extension Office offers regular workshops ranging in topics from pottery, painting, photography, to sewing, floriculture, and leathercraft. These are a chance to learn a new skill or knowledge in a particular project area. Check our Facebook, website, and Cloverprint newsletter for workshop opportunities.

Handbook:

The 4-H Handbook is handed out every year to all 4-H families. The handbook includes instructions, rules, and resources to ALL projects (including livestock and other animals) that can be entered in the annual 4-H Fair. This is a super important handbook to have as every 4-H member will refer to it for all of their fair entries.

Check our project list in the 4-H Handbook to determine which projects are exciting to you. Choose projects that you may be interested in or want to learn more about. Refer to your handbook and project manuals for specific project information and guidelines.

Project Manuals:

Project manuals are specific to the projects you choose to enter into the fair. They offer guidelines and possible ideas for your projects that you choose. Not all projects receive project manuals.

Record Book:


In your first year in 4-H, you will receive a binder to hold important documents such as the Record Sheet and Point Sheet for each year.

Record Sheet:

Your record sheet is a paper that you fill out each year to track what you have done throughout each 4-H year. You will keep this sheet in your record book.

Point Sheet:

A 4-H member's Point Sheet is how you track your project's winnings and participation in 4-H activities in the 4-H year. You will accumulate points to earn special prizes over time.

HARRISON COUNTY 4-H CLUBS

What is a 4-H Club?

A group of young people led by screened volunteers and administered by Extension who participate in 4-H learning experiences, educational activities, and events.

Types of clubs include:

Community Club- A general interest club that gives members a well-rounded experience

<u>Special Interest Club-</u> A club with a focus on a specific project area such as Animals, Robotics, or Shooting Sports

<u>SPARK Club-</u> A short-term, special interest club that meets for at least six hours and focuses on one topic of interest to youth.



How Do I know which Club to Choose?

You can choose any club you like! Before making your decision, call the club's leader. 4-H members are able to choose a primary and a secondary club, though you are not required to have a secondary. You can choose a club based on personal interests like animals, robotics, or shooting sports (just to name a few). You could also join a club that a friend or family member is in. Of course, you can always call the 4-H Educator or the Club Leaders with questions about choosing your new club.

PREPARING FOR FAIR

There are several important things to prepare when approaching the fair in the summer. Here is a general list of what needs to be done in the months approaching fair:

<u>4-H T-shirt Orders</u>: Every year, all mini and standard 4-H'ers are able to order their FREE sponsored t-shirts to wear during the fair. Don't miss out on your custom annual 4-H t-shirt!

<u>Project Manuals:</u> As your 4-H'er is signing up for projects in 4-H Online, the Extension Office staff start pulling out any manuals and paperwork they'd need for different projects. Some projects do not require manuals. Be sure to stop by the Extension Office to pick these up.

<u>Handbook:</u> The 4-H Handbook is updated and handed out every year. Along with your project manuals, make sure you stop by the Extension Office

<u>Indiana 4-H Quality Livestock Care Training:</u> Youth in grades 3-12 showing Cattle, Poultry, Sheep, Goats, Swine, or Rabbits at the County Fair or the Indiana State Fair are required to complete this training for exhibition. Make sure to check with your 4-H educator for training dates each year.

<u>Weigh-In Day:</u> Any Market Beef (Beef steers, Beef Market heifers, Dairy Market steers) must attend weigh-in day.

<u>ID Day:</u> ID Day is for all other livestock (beef feeders, dairy feeders, market goats, market sheep, any breeding animals that need tags, rabbits that need tattoos).

<u>Horse Vaccine Forms:</u> The vaccination form must be filled out completely prior to any horse participating in workshops, ride nights or the completion show. Forms available online (https://extension.purdue.edu/4-H/ docs/projects/horse/horse-vaccination-form.pdf) or in the Extension Office. This includes Mini 4-H members.

<u>Livestock ID Forms</u>: Be sure to check with the Extension Office to pick up your ID forms for any animal planned on being shown. ID forms must be filled out prior to shows and fair check-in.

<u>4-H Online Deadline:</u> Be sure to have the 4-H'er fully enrolled and all projects selected by the set deadline.

<u>FairEntry Deadline</u>: Don't wait until last minute to enter ALL projects and livestock into FairEntry.



4-H ANIMAL INFORMATION

The variety of Animal Science projects develop both subject specific skills and life skills. As students raise and care for an animal they learn about the nutrition and management of specific species, while fostering decision-making, nurturing, self-motivation, and resiliency life skills. Project based activities encourage 4-H members to participate in research and develop relationships with veterinarians, nutritionists, animal managers, and researchers allowing them to learn through their own experiences.

Animal Identification

4-H Members (Grades 3-12) must identify all Beef and Dairy Cattle, Goats, Horses, Sheep, and Swine in the 4-H Online system to be eligible for exhibition. Complete the following steps to identify your livestock and/or companion animals on v2.4HOnline.com. Please contact your species superintendent with questions.

- 1. Login to your family profile at v2.4HOnline.com
 - a. If you've forgotten your password, please use the 'Reset Password' option on v2.4HOnline.com and you will be sent a new temporary password.
 - b. If you've forgotten your email, please call the Purdue Extension Office.
- 2. Click "View" next to the Member's record from whom you would like to add an animal.
- 3. Click Animals in the navigation pane.
- 4. Click the blue Add an Animal button.
- 5. Click on Add New Animal to start adding a new animal.
- 6. Select the appropriate animal type from the drop down menu.
- 7. Enter the required Tag, Tattoo, Photos, and/or Animal Name and Click Save

- 8. Read the instructions for Animal ID requirements for County Fair and Indiana State Fair Exhibition.
- 9. Click "Show Questions" after reading the instructions.
- 10. Required fields are indicated, but be sure to complete all other visible fields as applicable.
- 11. Click next once completed.
- 12. Upload any files necessary for the particular Animal type.
- 13. Click next once completed.
- 14. Once the entered information is correct and reviewed, click the Submit button.
- 15. The animal info will display on the screen with the status, created, modified, and submitted date and time stamp (local time). You will also receive a confirmation email upon submission.

Indiana 4-H Quality Livestock Care

Youth in grades 3-12 showing Cattle, Poultry, Sheep, Goats, Swine, or Rabbits at the County Fair or the Indiana State Fair are required to complete this training for exhibition.

Alternatively, IN 4-H will accept online YQCA certification. If you choose to complete the YQCA option, you will register for the online course at https://yqcaprogram.org/. The cost of the online YQCA course is \$12. After completing the course, you must email your certification to the Extension Office to receive credit.

4-H Indiana State Fair: DNA Samples

Beef and Dairy Cattle, Meat Goats, Sheep and Swine must submit DNA hair samples by May 15th to Harrison County Extension to be eligible for Indiana State Fair 4-H Animal Shows.

Animal Projects


WHAT IS FAIR ENTRY?

FairEntry works in cooperation with 4-H Online, so you will use the same username and password. Families will use this data management system to pre-enter specific projects for the fair. FairEntry will be used to create project labels, check in sheets, judging sheets, show programs, media reports, ribbon placings, award placings and more. For projects by grade level you will use the grade you were in as of January 1st. Follow the instructions below to guide you through the FairEntry process.

Fair Entry Instructions

- Go to FairEntry.com
- Select "Find Your Fair" and find the 2024 Harrison County 4-H Fair
- Select the GREEN box to sign in with your 4-H Online credentials
- · Choose that you would like to register as an individual
- Choose the dot next to the name of the member you are registering and click "continue"
- Answer any required questions and review the exhibitor registration info, making any necessary corrections. DO NOT transfer to your 4-H Online account.
- Click "Continue to Entries"
- Click "Add an Entry" box to the right of the exhibitor's name
- Select the Department, Division, and Class you would like to enter
- To correct errors, click the "Change" button. Once reviewed click "Continue"
- Select the 4-H Club you are in and click "Continue"
- Enter the description of your exhibit and click "Continue"
- Answer any additional questions required for that entry and click "Continue"
- Decide if you'd like to add another entry, register another exhibitor, or continue to payment
- To register an animal entry from your 4-H Online account, select "Add an Animal".
- Click "Choose an Existing Animal Record" box to enter an animal that was identified in 4-H Online.
- Select the animal you would like to enter.
- If you want to switch to a different animal, click "Remove From Entry Box". If correct, click "Continue"
- Review your invoice, either in summary format or detail format. If correct, click "Continue"
- Select the green "Continue" box
- Confirm your entries one last time. You can see a summary of exhibitors in your family, or their entries in detail. Make sure all entries for each exhibitor in your family are listed before you submit the entries. Once you submit, you cannot edit your entries.
- Click continue to confirm and submit your entries by clicking the green "Submit" button.

You will receive a confirmation email once you have submitted your entries!

4-H COMMON TERMINOLOGY

4-H: The youth development program of Extension designed for young people age 5-19 (Grades K-12); members participate in clubs, activities, and events and complete project work with a group or on their own.





4-H Camp: This three day, two night camp takes place each summer and is open to 4-H members in grades 3-8. The 4-H members participate in many outdoor activities as they learn by doing. We camp at the Country Lake Christian Retreat Center in Henryville, Indiana with 4-H members from Clark, Crawford, Floyd, Lawrence, Jackson, Orange, Scott and Washington Counties. Those in grades nine and above may apply to be Camp Counselors.

4-H Council: Assists Extension staff to determine program priorities and policies for local 4-H and Extension Programs; the council is made up of local volunteers with a variety of backgrounds and expertise.



4H Online: The 4-H database that manages 4-H enrollment of youth, animal identification, and trip participation.

Animal Identification: This is the process by which members ensure their animal has the correct identification (tag, tattoo, etc) and report this to the Extension Office.





County 4-H Fair: The county fair provides an opportunity for 4-H members to exhibit and display the items that demonstrate what they have learned through their project meetings and experiences over the enrollment year. This is a major event where many people see what 4-H members accomplish.

County Extension Educators: An Extension Staff member with subject matter expertise; youth development or 4-H educators oversee the 4-H program.





Drop/Add Deadline: To be eligible to complete an exhibit at the fair, a member must be enrolled in that project category through 4HOnline by May 15.

Enrollment: A 4-H member enrollment must be completed annually for each 4-H member. This is the process of updating information in 4HOnline and paying the enrollment fee. This must be completed by January 15th each year.





Exhibits: A completed project, trained animal, or presentation prepared for evaluation or display at the county fair, contest, or competition.

FairEntry: The 4-H database that manages exhibit entries for the county fair. FairEntry deadline is May 22nd by 4:30pm.



4-H COMMON TERMINOLOGY CONTINUED:

Record Book: A binder where members store their record sheets to help them keep track of their 4-H involvement. The record book encourages organization and is a good reference tool for when they complete trip and scholarship applications.





4-H Handbook: This book contains all of the project guidelines, exhibit requirements, and 4-H policies. It is updated annually and is posted on the Purdue Extension-Harrison County Website

Junior Leader: A 4-H member in grades 7-12 who attends Junior Leader meetings to learn leadership skills. Junior Leaders also participate in social activities, community service, and help their 4-H clubs and leaders.





<u>Life Skills:</u> Abilities youth learn to help them live successful, productive lives; 4-H youth programs provide learning opportunities for young people to gain life skills, practice them, and use them throughout their lives.

Mini 4-H: A noncompetitive 4-H program for youth in grades K-2. Mini 4-H is designed to introduce you and your child to the 4-H program and is an excellent way for children to learn by doing and to exhibit projects at the fair. Mini 4-H members also have the opportunity to attend club meetings, workshops, and a day camp just for Mini 4-H'ers during the summer.





Poster: Many exhibits involve creating a poster. Posters must follow the guidelines listed in the Harrison County 4-H Handbook. The Extension Office sells the foam boards and clear sleeves that meet the requirements.

<u>Projects:</u> A 4-H project is an area you want to learn more about during the year. There are projects on just about any topic you would like to study and explore, from art to woodworking, from computers to rabbits, and from clothing to small engines. 4-H members should take at least one project each year and complete the records for that project. A member is encouraged to exhibit at the fair when their project is complete.





Performing Arts Contest: An event of fun and learning centered around the talents of individual clubs as well as individual 4-H members. This event takes place in the spring.

Project Manual: Most projects have manuals which provide educational material and/or learning activities for members. These are available from the Extension Office.





Record Sheets: The record sheet packet is for a 4-H member to summarize things they have learned through their project. It helps them keep track of what they have learned and encourages record keeping.

Ten Year Member: A member who has completed 10 consecutive years of regular 4-H, which is the longest amount of time a member can participate.



WHAT HAPPENS AFTER FAIR?

Just like <u>before</u> the fair, there are several important things to do <u>after</u> the 4-H fair is complete!

Exhibit Hall Projects Going to State Fair:

If you have 4-H projects going to State Fair, first of all, CONGRATULATIONS!

Now that your project will be competing at the state level of 4-H, there's a great opportunity to make adjustments and/or improvements to your project. Your project has a judge scorecard with how the judge scored your project at the county fair and has comments on how you may improve your project. Take advantage of those comments!

The Extension Office will announce when your project will need to be dropped off to be taken to the State Fair.

After the State Fair is done, the Extension Office staff will pick up the projects and bring them back to the Extension Office for you to pick back up again with your State Fair ribbons and pin!

Point Sheets Due September 1st:

4-H traditional members earn points each year from September 1 through August 31, by completing all their projects, holding club office, participating in various activities, and by promoting 4-H. The Points Sheet (see appendix in your 4-H Handbook) allows members to track their participation. Use a new form each year and keep a copy for your records. Points Sheet forms are available at the Extension Office. Only 4-H activities are submitted on this form. FFA and school activities do not apply. Completed forms are filed at the Extension office. Points sheets are due each year to the Extension Office by September 1st.

Late Point Sheets points are not accepted after the deadline

Award Applications:

There are a few awards that 4-H members are able to apply for like the Citizenship Award, Member of the Year Award, and Club of the Year Award. Feel free to contact the Extension Office to find out more about how to apply!

Annual 4-H Banquet and 4-H Council Elections:

It's time to recognize our 4-H members and volunteers! Every year in October, we hold an Annual 4-H Banquet and 4-H Council elections at the Talmage Windell Agricultural Building at the Fairgrounds.

The 4-H council generously caters a delicious meal to all those who attend. YUM! Be sure to contact the Extension Office to make your reservations that are required to receive a dinner ticket and partake in the meal.

The Silent Auction is another spotlight at the Awards Banquet. We encourage clubs, businesses, and individuals to donate items, gift certificates, baskets, etc. Please bring items to the Extension Office.

Are you an approved Harrison County 4-H Volunteer? Wanting to help or get more involved with the 4-H program? Why not run for a position on the 4-H Council! WHAT IS 4-H COUNCIL?

What is 4-H Council?

The primary purpose of the 4-H Council is to provide a non-formal educational 4-H program for the youth of Harrison County through the Cooperative Extension Service of Purdue University.

The specific functions are:

- To facilitate 4-H program planning for Harrison County, including needs assessment, program implementation, recognition, and evaluation
- To help support development of accurate and relevant curriculum materials
- To provide for volunteer staff development including recruitment, orientation, and recognition
- To provide for and assist with member recruitment and recognition;
- To provide for and assist with program visibility
- To provide continuing financial support
- To support staff development for the Extension professional
- To assure the 4-H Program is operating cooperatively with other youth-serving educational programs
- To establish 4-H policies consistent with state and national policies and to resolve conflict relating to 4-H policy and program
- To appoint appropriate committees as needed to implement or modify 4-H programs and activities
- To have a Fair Review meeting to discuss improvements that should be made for the next 4-H year's Fair and to the facilities on the grounds.
- To generously grant requested supply funds for workshops for both traditional 4-H and Mini 4-H.

When does 4-H Council meet?

The Harrison County 4-H Council meets the first Monday of each month starting at 6:30pm. During the fair, there are added meeting dates as needed. Public is welcome to attend.
