This unit covers the types of local, state and national support you can expect as a volunteer.

County Staff



At the local level, 4-H Extension Educators work with volunteers, parents, youth and community partners to deliver all aspects of the county 4-H Youth Development program. Most county Extension offices also have Extension Educators focusing on areas such as Agriculture and Natural Resources, Health and Human Sciences, and Economic and Community Development. County support staff provide assistance to these Educators.

Please take time to introduce yourself to the 4-H Educator and County Extension staff. Become familiar with the county Extension office location and obtain the address, phone number, web address, and e-mail addresses of staff members.

Volunteer-Staff Partnership



Volunteers play an important role within 4-H's organizational structure. This partnership between 4-H staff and screened volunteers provides nonformal educational programs and experiences for thousands of youth across the state.

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Indiana 4-H Youth Development



Indiana 4-H is housed at Purdue University's West Lafayette campus as a part of the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service.

Campus-based Extension faculty and specialists are responsible for coordinating the state-wide Indiana 4-H Program with the County 4-H Extension Educators. It takes a lot of people working together to provide youth with positive 4-H experiences.

The State 4-H Program Leader, along with other faculty and staff, work together to apply knowledge and research to program development and evaluation while supporting 4-H staff and volunteers in every county.

Funding Sources

4-H is supported by a combination of federal, state and county funds. Substantial support also comes from private sources on the local, state and national levels.

The National 4-H Council and the Indiana 4-H Foundation are not-for-profit organizations that support the 4-H Youth Development Program by working to acquire resources.

If web access is an issue, libraries, friends or family, or the county Extension office may be able to provide internet access.

4-H Communication



There are multiple ways to receive communication about the 4-H program. Your primary source of communication will come through your County Extension Office.

A statewide newsletter, 4-H Volunteer Vision, is also published monthly, containing some information and programming suggestions for you to share with your 4-H members and their families.

Indiana 4-H is also on Facebook and Twitter. Like or Follow us to keep up-to-date on 4-H information.

Other communication may happen via email, text, blog, phone or direct mail. Talk to 4-H program staff about the best way for you to receive information.
