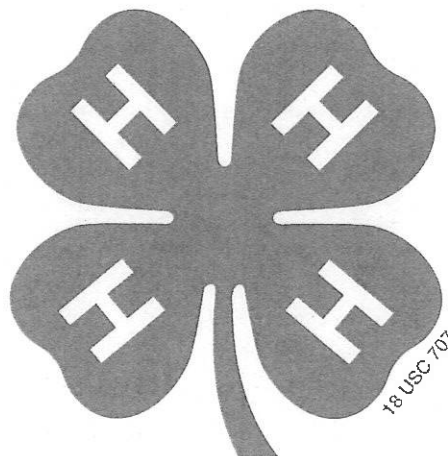

President

1. Preside at club meeting.
2. Handle all the business of the club meeting.
3. Help keep order during the meeting.

Vice President

1. Take charge of meeting when president is absent.
2. Serve as chairman of the program committee.

Secretary

1. Keep complete report of all meetings.
2. Keep record of attendance of all members.
3. May send out notices of meetings.

Treasurer

1. Bank charges. (Check: Club might use bank that does not charge organizations.)
2. Pay bills and make financial report at each meeting. Have an audit done each year.

Song Leader

1. Have charge of music and lead songs at each meeting.

Recreation Leader

1. Be responsible for planning and carrying out the recreation program for the club.

News Reporter

1. Be responsible for club news and report to the community about 4-H.
2. Get acquainted with the newspaper editor or writer.

Health and Safety Leader

1. Be responsible for the health and safety lessons for your club. (See 4-H-196)

The 4-H club emblem and colors

The 4-H Club emblem is a four-leaf clover with the letter "H" on each leaf. The four "H's" stand for Head, Heart, Hands, and Health. The leaves of the clover are green and the "H's" are white. The white is for purity. Green is nature's most common color.

How to write 4-H club minutes

Minutes are the record of what a club does at its meetings. Minutes of your 4-H club should include the following facts:

1. Kind of meeting, whether regular or special.
2. Name of your club.
3. Number of members present and names of special guests.
4. Answer to roll call.
5. Statement that the minutes of the last meeting were or were not read and approved.
6. A record of all business carried on, including motions made, who made them, and whether motions were carried or lost.
7. Record of committees appointed, who is serving on the committee, and the committee reports.
8. Names of persons taking part and what they did on the program.
9. Record of demonstrations presented, project work done, special features on the program, and recreation.
10. Time and place of next meeting.

Article I

The name of this club shall be the _____

Article II

The national 4-H club motto, "To Make the Best Better," and the national emblem, a 4-leaf clover bearing an "H" in each leaf, will be the motto and emblem of this club.

Article III

The purposes of this club are to interest young people in opportunities for learning through 4-H Club projects and activities, and to help them to become good citizens of their community.

Article IV

Youth may become 4-H members when they enter the third grade and may continue membership through the completion of grade 12.

Article V

All boys and girls living in _____
County who are in grades 3-12, inclusive, are eligible for membership. All youth who become members shall have equal access to programs and activities.

Article VI

The officers of this club shall be a president, a vice president, a secretary-treasurer, a news reporter, a recreational leader, a song leader, and a health and safety leader.

Article VII

The duties of the officers are listed on page 5 of this book.

Article VIII

Committees for special purposes may be appointed by the president or elected by the membership at any meeting.

Article IX

The club shall be under the direction and guidance of a local 4-H volunteer approved by the County Extension Office.

Article X

The regular meeting of this club will take place at _____ on the _____
of each month.

Article XI

The order of business for all regular meetings will be as follows:

1. Call to order by president.
2. Roll call. Response as announced.
3. Reading minutes of last meeting.
4. Additions or corrections to the minutes.
5. Old business, reports of committees, etc.
6. New business.
7. Discussions, demonstrations, talks, or musical numbers, etc. Local leaders summarize and report on plans.
8. Motion to adjourn to take up the work period or the recreational period.

Article XII

Roberts' Rules of Order shall govern the meeting of the club.

Article XIII

The 4-H club year is continuous from one annual 4-H exhibit to the next.

Article XIV

This constitution may be changed by a majority vote at any time.

The following ideas may be considered when setting goals.

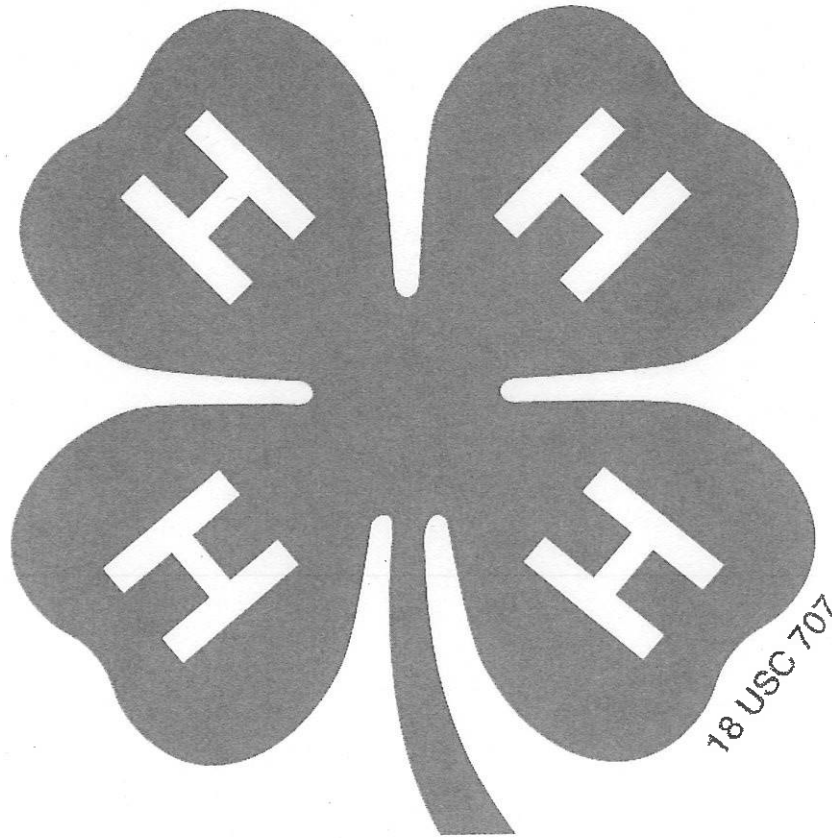
