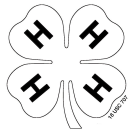


# 4-H SHEEP WORKSHEET

Use Chapter 5 “Health Maintenance and Diseases to answer the following questions:

1. Today is May 15. You have a Suffolk market lamb weighing 95 pounds named “Benny” with ID 92123. The vet has looked at him and determined that he has worms. He gives you Levisale to treat “Benny” for worms. Complete the chart using the following dosage information. Give 2mL per 100 pounds not to exceed 10 mL in one shot. Withdrawal time is 10 days prior to market.

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4. Think of a health concern that you have had with one of your sheep either this year or in the past. How did you make sure that you care for your animal in a way that was safe and by disease maintenance standards?

5. At the sheep weigh-in your lamb weighed 66 pounds. When you check it in at the county fair it weighs 124 pounds. It was 70 days between the events. What is your lambs Average Daily Gain? Show your work in the space provided.

6. Describe the difference in feeding Ewes during the three different stages of pregnancy.

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7. Describe what you feed your sheep and how you decided what to feed them.
