Practical New Year's Resolutions for Farmers and Ranchers

2026 is set to begin in a few short days and so are New Year's Resolutions. Farmers and ranchers are a unique population in that, with each new season, they are recommitting to their goals and contributing to a safe, sustainable food supply. Below are a few practical resolutions agricultural producers can make that will lead to positive change in the New Year.

Improve Your Farm's Sustainability by Exploring Innovative Technology

From sensors and drones to self-driving and GPS enabled tractors, farmers are using technology to their advantage to produce food more sustainably. Agricultural technology is not limited to large-scale farming corporations, though. Several technologies are available to small farmers that can make a huge difference, from managing sales to testing soil health. Here is a list of impactful technologies to implement around your farm.

Prioritize Your Physical and Mental Health

Agricultural work can be both physically and mentally draining. If you or someone you know is struggling with anxiety, depression, or another mental health challenge, you are not alone. Here are a few ideas to prioritize your health as an agricultural producer:

- Take the beginning of 2026 to create a schedule as to when you'll take some time for yourself and your family.
- Take care of your body through regular exercise. This not only helps your physical health, but can reduce symptoms of stress and anxiety.
- Ask for and offer help if needed by assessing your mental health. Participating in mental health training, especially for rural communities, can be beneficial for agricultural workers.
- Make time to do something fun at least once a week. Having interests outside of the farm can bring you happiness.

Keep Better Track of Your Farm Records

Successful farm managers establish a record-keeping system and strategically maintain accurate records. The New Year is a perfect time to improve your bookkeeping skills to help plan for the rest of 2026 and beyond. Aside from tracking your expenditures and income, evaluating which products work best for you financially is key. Using available resources such as other farmers, your county extension office, and educational information from organizations such as SARE and USDA is also necessary for good record-keeping.

Support the Farming Community

Farmers are a tight knit group and can rely on one another for support. The New Year is a great opportunity to become a vendor at a local farmer's market, join an online forum or group of producers, or actively engage in social media platforms to promote your farm and the local operations in your community.

2026 SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Senior Year Scholarship

Available to 4-H members in their senior year of high school

Club Scholarship

Available to 4-H members entering Purdue University majoring in the College of Agriculture or select majors in the College of Health and Human Sciences

Purdue Horticulture & Landscape Architecture Scholarship

Available to a 4-H member majoring in horticulture or landscape architecture at Purdue University and studied plant science in 4-H.

Accomplishment Scholarship

Available to 4-H members in grades 10-12 of high school and the year immediately following high school graduation. The purpose of the 4-H Accomplishment Scholarship is to recognize youth who have excelled in life skills development through their 4-H activities and involvement.

Categories: Animal Science—Meat and Milk Production; Animal Science—Companion and Small Animal Production; Citizenship; Communications; Engineering and Technological Science; Healthy Living, Food and Nutrition Science; Leadership Development; and Plant and Environmental Science. Three additional categories are reserved for applicants demonstrating life skills development in more than one of the previously listed categories. Those are Premier Achievement, Premier Citizenship, and Premier Leadership.

Eligibility: Applicants must be in grade 10, 11, 12, or their first year immediately following 4-H enrollment eligibility at the time applications are due. While an applicant does not have to be a current 4-H member, they must demonstrate multiple years of involvement in Indiana's 4-H Youth Development Program.

Youth who have previously been awarded a \$1,000 accomplishment scholarship are only eligible to compete in the Premier Achievement, Premier Citizenship, and Premier Leadership categories. Youth who have previously been awarded a \$2,000 scholarship are no longer eligible to compete in any category.

Awards: A minimum of thirty \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded to youth based on their demonstration of life skills development in these eight categories: Animal Science—Meat and Milk Production; Animal Science—Companion and Small Animal Production; Citizenship; Communications; Engineering and Technological Science; Healthy Living, Food, and Nutrition Science; Leadership Development; and Plant and Environmental Science.

A minimum of one \$2,000 scholarship will be awarded in each of these categories: Premier Achievement; Premier Citizenship; and Premier Leadership.

OR at the Extension Office with cash or check.

(Extension Office cannot take credit cards).

AIR RIFLE & ARCHERY UPCOMING DATES

Pistol/Rifle disciplines are always on Thursday nights. Archery disciplines are always on Tuesday nights. All classes take place at the Exhibit Hall with the exception of .22 Rifle (advanced students) which takes place at the Auburn Conservation Club.

Air Pistol (Beginner and Advanced) always runs in the fall, currently starting October 16, 2025, at 6:30 pm at the Exhibit Hall. Open to all regular 4-H members (3rd-12th grades). Runs for 8 weeks (with Thanksgiving off). Members must be enrolled in 4-H before arriving for the first night. Cost is \$25 on the first night of class. All equipment and materials are provided. Class usually ends around 8:00 pm. Early arrival is appreciated to help setup, and early arrival is strongly encouraged on the first night to complete sign-in/admin. Description of the course as reflected in the Handbook remains the same. Completion of Beginner course is required before moving to Advanced course.

Beginner Air Rifle will start in January (exact date TBD but will be 2nd or 3rd Thursday of the month). Open to all regular 4-H members (3rd-12th grades). Runs for 8 weeks (with Thanksgiving off). Members must be enrolled in 4-H before arriving for the first night. Cost is \$25 on the first night of class. All equipment and materials are provided. Class usually ends around 8:30 pm. Early arrival is appreciated to help setup, and early arrival is strongly encouraged on the first night to complete sign-in/admin. Description of the course as reflected in the Handbook remains the same. Completion of Beginner course is required before moving to Advanced course.

Advanced Air Rifle will begin 1-2 weeks after the Beginner course concludes. Also runs for 8 weeks,

same time, same location. Completion of the Beginner course (in the same or a previous year) is a prerequisite to the Advanced course. Cost is \$25. All equipment/materials are provided.

.22 Rifle runs after the Advanced course, typically mid-May through June, at the Conservation Club. Completion of at least 1 year of the Advanced course is required before participation in .22 Rifle (can be done in the same year). Cost is \$25. All equipment/materials are provided but students may utilize their own rifle/equipment, upon instructor approval.

Archery is divided into levels 1, 2, and 3. The beginner course is Level 1 and it will start in January, roughly commensurate with Air Rifle. Level 2 will start shortly after Level 1 completes, roughly commensurate with Advanced Air Rifle. Level 3 is taking place right now. Advancement is at instructor discretion. The course is based on the NASP program and all equipment is provided at the Level 1 course. Cost is \$25. As students advance, utilization of their own equipment is permitted, at the instructor's discretion.

Note class/course cost. Households can receive a discount (\$5 for each additional child) but they must make the request at sign-in, the instructors will not automatically know.

Information is primarily disseminated through email--to receive the emails, members must be on the Shooting Sports Club enrollment list. Most information is then also posted to our Facebook page. Individual courses might establish their own text/messaging setup that is specific to that course for purposes of cancellations, etc.





New Year's Resolutions for Gardeners

Happy New Year, everyone! While January is the month to plan and dream about your yard and garden, smart gardeners know that a wish list drawn up in winter can feel overwhelming by spring.

Instead, grow your garden a few steps at a time each year: pick five of these resolutions and plan accordingly. Next year, five more, and so on...until you've built the garden of your dreams.

- Hang a bird feeder.
- Build a compost bin.
- Invest in an excellent pruner.
- Order seeds for heirloom tomatoes so you can grow your own.
- Try a new plant combo that pleases you.
- Prune a crabapple or pear tree into an espalier.
- Ask your grandparents what they grew in their gardens.
- Swap seeds with fellow gardeners at our Seed Swap.
- Build a raised bed.
- Plant a fruit tree...or two.
- Start a compost pile.
- Test your soil.
- Plant flowers in Pantone's color of the year: Cloud Dancer.
- Switch to organic fertilizers for your lawn.
- Weave native plants into your flower beds.
- Save on grocery bills by planting your own herbs.
- Take a vegetable gardening class in April.
- Order a mushroom log and grow your own fungi.
- Sign up for a community garden plot.
- Add window boxes to your home, fence, or balcony.
- Install a rain barrel.
- Plant more flowers for bees and pollinators.
- Start a rain garden under your downspouts.
- Plant milkweed for monarch butterflies.
- Leave your grass clippings as natural mulch on your lawn.
- Eat outside as often as possible.
- Show a child how to plant sunflowers.
- Support your local growers at farmers' markets.
- Learn to recognize and appreciate a "good" bug.
- Plant a climbing rose.
- Plant turmeric in honor of the 2026 Herb of the Year.
- Provide a water source for bees and butterflies.
- Experiment with edible landscaping: mix vegetables and flowers together in beds and borders.
- Transform a balcony or patio into a container garden.
- Grow three new varieties of lettuce.
- Rethink all that lawn.
- Plant a berry-bearing tree or shrubs to feed the birds.
- Share your veggie and flower harvest with the neighbors.
- Preserve your vegetable harvest by learning how to can.
- Rake and save fallen leaves for winter mulch for your garden beds.
- Add a dwarf conifer to your yard.
- Grow your own garlic.
- Add allium bulbs in fall to deter deer.
- Save seeds from flowers and vegetables to plant next year.
- Give plants as gifts all year long.
- Invite your kids into the garden.

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
