Monthly Gardener Checklist May 2022

HOME (Indoor plants and activities)

• Many indoor plants can be moved to shady locations outdoors but only after the danger of frost has passed. Plants will dry out more often outdoors, so keep a close eye on soil moisture. Sinking the pots in soil will help slow down moisture loss.

• Now is a good time to take cuttings of houseplants to increase a collection or share with friends. Stick cuttings to root in media, such as vermiculite, perlite, or potting soil. Roots grown in water tend to be weak from lack of oxygen and do not adjust well to planting in soil.

• Fertilize houseplants according to label directions. Foliage plants require relatively high nitrogen fertilizer; flowering houseplants respond best to fertilizer high in phosphorus.

YARD (Lawns, woody ornamentals & fruits)

- Prune early spring-flowering trees and shrubs after flowers fade.
- Plant balled-and-burlapped or container nursery stock, and water thoroughly.
- Remove and destroy overwintering bagworms from landscape trees and shrubs.

• Follow a spray schedule to keep home-orchard crops pest free. While trees are in bloom, use fungicide sprays without insecticide to avoid injuring bees. Follow label directions. More information is available in <u>Managing Pests in Home Fruit Plantings</u> (Purdue Extension publication ID-146-W).

• Thin apple tree fruits, if needed, about three weeks after petal fall. Apples should be about 8 inches apart. Mother Nature may have taken care of thinning fruit set this year!

• Apply fungicides to roses to control diseases such as black spot.

• Purdue turf experts recommend that if you are going to fertilize your lawn in May, apply 3/4-1 pound of nitrogen (N) per 1,000 square feet with a product that contains 50% or more of slow-release fertilizer. Try to schedule the application prior to a rain or irrigate following application to move the fertilizer off leaf blades.

GARDEN (Flower, vegetables, & small fruits)

• Plant frost-tender plants after the danger of frost has passed for your area. This includes warm-season vegetables (such as tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, and vine crops) as well as most annual flowers and tender perennials (such as cannas, gladiolus, dahlias, tuberous begonias, and caladiums).

- Pinch chrysanthemums and annual flower plants to keep them compact and well-branched.
- Make successive plantings of beans and sweet corn to extend the harvest season.
- Thin seedlings of early-planted crops such as carrots, lettuce, spinach, and beets to their proper spacing.
- Harvest early plantings of radishes, spinach, and lettuce.
- Both asparagus and rhubarb season may be delayed this year due to the slow progression of spring.
- Harvest asparagus by cutting or snapping spears at or just below soil level.
- Harvest rhubarb by cutting or grasping the stalk and pulling it up and slightly to one side.
- Control cucumber beetles (which are carriers of bacterial wilt) as soon as cucumber plants germinate or are transplanted to prevent disease.
- Remove blossoms from newly set strawberry plants to allow better runner formation.
- Remove unwanted sucker growth in raspberries when new shoots are about a foot tall.

Meeting Minutes

Wednesday, March 23, 2022

EDUCATION PRESENTATION

Thirty-four Extension Master Gardeners and guests attended the March meeting virtually via Zoom. The in-person meeting at Minnetrista was cancelled.

Extension Educator Laurynn Thieme provided a presentation titled "Greenhouses: Extending the Garden Season".

Laurynn discussed the purpose of greenhouses, the history of greenhouse cultivation, and described the various greenhouse structures. Laurynn said that greenhouses allow gardeners to grow in controlled micro-climates rather by natural hardiness zones. This allows gardeners to expand the diversity of plants they can grow.

Laurynn described several aspects that can be controlled by the use of a greenhouse. They include temperature, water, humidity, light, air/ wind, fertility, and pest management.

Laurynn described various greenhouse structures including cold frames & hot boxes, plastic much, low tunnels & floating row covers, and walk-in tunnels such as hoop houses, caterpillar tunnels, and high-tunnels.

CALL TO ORDER

The business meeting was called to order by President Sarah Kreps as 7:52 p.m.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The February meeting minutes were approved as submitted in the March newsletter.

TREASURER'S REPORT

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Delaware Co. Farm Fest

Sarah Kreps acknowledged and thanked volunteers. Sarah indicated that over 1,000 cups planted with seeds were distributed to children over the two-day festival. Sarah apologized to volunteers for the wet soil. She said that the soil was frozen when it was picked up and didn't have enough time to properly dry and thaw. Several children who attended the event on Tuesday with their class came back with their parents on Wednesday to partake in the activities again.

Mini Master Gardener Kids Camp

Dottie Kreps and Martha McClurg are cochairpersons for the event. Dottie reported that four separate camps will be scheduled for June and July. The camps will be for two hours and include an educational lesson and special activities. The camps will be hosted at the Eaton Public Library, Ross Community Center, Yorktown Civic Square, and Maring-Hunt Public Library. Final dates will be announced at a future meeting.

Indianapolis Hosta Society's **Annual Hosta Sale & Leaf Show Saturday, June 4 | Noblesville**



Time to Complete: 2-3 hours Grade Level: K-5

Materials:

- Scrap paper
- Wooden frame (build your own or use an old picture frame)
- Window screening (one piece slightly larger than the frame and several smaller pieces)
- Staples (for tacking the screen to the frame)
- Blender (to make the paper pulp)
- Old towels or rags
- Sponges
- Wildflower seeds



This handmade, Earth-inspired paper is made with recycled paper and embedded with wildflower seeds – a fun & meaningful way to celebrate Earth Day and a beautiful gift for family & friends.

INSTRUCTIONS

Important Preliminary Step: Making paper is a wet, messy process! Cover surfaces with plastic to waterproof them. Have plenty of old towels, rags, sheets, and sponges for both making the paper and cleaning up afterwards. Note that the dyes in colored papers can stain surfaces like countertops, so protect them, too.

Step 1: Gather scrap paper — including office paper, envelopes (remove any plastic windows), colored paper, and uncoated gift wrap. If possible, use paper from the recycle bin (rather than new paper) to make this activity the most sustainable. For Earth-inspired paper, choose shades of blue and green, as well as white. You can use small amounts of glossy or coated papers as well as newspapers, but don't make them the primary ingredient. Printed office paper often yields a grayish homemade paper, so consider your color scheme and include papers in those colors.

Tear the paper into pieces about an inch square (or smaller). Cover the paper with warm water and let it soak for at least two hours.

Step 2: In the meantime, make the mold — the paper-maker's term for a frame inset with a piece of screen. We recommend using an old 8"x10" wooden picture frame and some scraps of window screen. Use scissors to cut the screen so it's an inch or two larger than the frame in all directions. Holding the screen taut, staple it to the frame.

Step 3: Cut a few additional pieces of screen larger than the frame. You'll use these for transferring and drying the paper.

Step 4: Once the paper is fully saturated, transfer some to a blender. In this case, we're using an immersion blender with a food chopper attachment. Add enough water to almost cover the paper. Blend until the resulting pulp resembles cooked oatmeal. Repeat this step for each of the individual colors you plan to use.

Step 5: Cover your waterproof surface with several layers of felt, towels, rags, or old sheets. These will absorb the water. Note that the fabric may get stained from the colored paper. Place the mold (the wood frame with screen) on the fabric. Apply the pulp to the screen and press. To create an Earth-themed paper, add colors in sections to represent land (green), ocean (blue), and clouds (white).

Step 6: Place a piece of screen over the pulp and press firmly with a dry sponge to soak up some of the water. This damp paper is ready for seeds.

Step 7: Sprinkle wildflower seeds onto the damp paper.

Step 8: Place a piece of screen on top and press using a rolling pin (you could also use a flat-sided jar or bottle) to embed the seeds into the paper. Some of them may fall off once the paper is dry, but there will be plenty to grow.

Step 9: You can allow your Earth Day papers to dry, and then give them as gifts to celebrate our planet!

When it's time to plant, place the paper seed-side up in a container filled with moist potting mix. Spritz the paper with water to thoroughly moisten it. Then cover the container with plastic wrap; this will hold in the moisture and help seeds germinate.

As soon as you see the first sprouts, remove the plastic and place the pot in a bright spot or under grow lights. Check the plants daily and keep the paper and soil consistently moist.
