Mortality Composting:

A successful pile depends on creating the right environment for microbes, which need proper moisture, oxygen, particle size, carbon-to-nitrogen (C:N) ratio, pH, and temperature to do their job. An effective pile should be aerobic, have little to no odor, and break down carcasses quickly. The compost must reach 110-160°F for proper decomposition. Moisture should stay between 50-65%, while oxygen levels remain 5-10%—closer to 10% as temperature increases.

Pile design matters.

The base should be porous to allow airflow and absorb liquids. High-carbon materials include sawdust, hay, shavings, or leaves; high-nitrogen options include animal bedding, corn stover, or cotton gin trash.

Aim for a starting C:N ratio of 20-30:1 and pH between 5.5-8.2. The cap layer should be fine material, such as sawdust or straw, to contain odor and heat.

The pile's center should include more than just carcasses-materials like animal bedding mixed with silage (moisture 44-60%, C:N 35-38:1) help balance texture and nutrients. Once built, it's difficult to add moisture, so adjustments must happen during construction or turning.

Monitor pile temperatures daily with multiple at least 5 readings from both outer and inner zones. A well-built pile should reach 140 degrees easily, have no odor or pests, and efficiently decompose mortalities.
