Welcome to Mini 4-H! You are now a member of the Elkhart County 4-H family! We hope that you will have lots of fun learning new things in your 4-H career.

Mini 4-H is designed for youth in Kindergarten through Second grade. It will give you a taste of the $4-\mathrm{H}$ program as well as help you to explore a variety of project areas.

Mini 4-H'ers you may enroll in one project each year. This manual contains fun, age appropriate activities to complete throughout the $4-\mathrm{H}$ year. These activities will help you to learn about the project you have chosen. Additionally, the manual contains all instructions needed for the exhibit you will be preparing for the Elkhart County 4-H Fair in July.

There is no competition in the Mini 4-H program. Each child who completes a project for the Fair will receive the same blue completion ribbon, certificate and $4-\mathrm{H}$ pin. Judges comment sheets are provided only as a way to help you do your very best on future projects.

Mini 4-H does not have regular monthly meetings. Try to attend the special activities planned especially for YOU! These will give you a chance to meet the project leaders, have some hands-on fun, and ask questions about your important Fair display. Mini 4-H is FUN! You will enjoy it.

Once you enter the third grade you can join a regular 4-H club that meets monthly. You must enroll each year of your $4-\mathrm{H}$ career.

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## What is a Pet?

If a creature is four-footed or two-footed, if it crawls, flies, swims or hops, you can bet someone has it as a pet. Caring for a pet can be a lot of fun and also educational. To find out about your pet, get a good book from the library, book store, pet shop or talk to other people who raise them. This will help you get the detailed information you need to know about your special pet.

NOTE: In Mini 4-H, dogs \& cats are included in the Pet Animal project. Once you are old enough for regular 4-H, (in grade 3) you may not enter dog or cat posters in the Pet Animal project. Dogs and cats have their own 4-H clubs which you must join if you plan to enter your dog or cat or a poster about these animals. The Pet Animal project in regular 4-H only includes animals that do not have their own 4-H club.


## ACTIVITY 1 - CHOOSING A PET

## Materials needed for this activity: none

What you will do:

1. Read the Helpful Hints for Selecting a Pet.
2. Think about these things before getting a pet.


## Helpful Hints for Selecting a Pet

1. Before you select a pet, consider what kind is best for you and your family. Select a pet that can adapt to your home and to the people in it. Find out what kinds of pets are popular with your friends and neighbors.
2. It is easier to train a young pet rather than an older one. However, you can train a grown pet if you have patience and time.
3. If you live in a small house, apartment or trailer, small pets are best. You may be happier with a bird, small dog, cat, fish, turtle or hamster.
4. You can buy pets from breeders, dealers, pet shops, private owners or you may adopt a pet from the humane animal shelter.
5. If you get a pet and you decide you do not want it, give it to a good friend or take it to the animal shelter for adoption. Unwanted pets should never be turned loose as they will have nobody to care for them.
6. Be sure your pet is healthy. Have it examined by a veterinarian (a special doctor that cares for animals) as soon as possible. A veterinarian is your pet's best friend. It is important that you get one for your pet.

## ACTIVITY 2 - WHAT DOES YOUR PET NEED?

Pets are not all fun. They depend on you to give them the things they need to live. In this activity, you will learn the things you need to do for your pet.

## What you will do:

1. Read about the things your pet needs every day.
2. Color the pictures.

## Food

Animals are like you. They need good, clean food and they like to be fed on time.


## Water

Your pet needs to have clean, fresh water all the time.


## Shelter

Some pets need a special place to live and play. Your pet's cage needs to be kept clean and safe.


## Grooming

Some pets need to have their fur cleaned and brushed for them.


## Health \& Safety

Your pet needs to see the veterinarian if he is hurt or needs a shot to stay healthy. Keep your dog on a leash or inside a fence so they will not run into the street and get hurt.


## Exercise

It is important to exercise your pet. For some pets, this means taking them out for a walk. Others need special equipment.


Training
You will want to train your pet not to run into the street and to listen to your commands. Some pets can learn tricks.


Love
Pets give us friendship in return for our caring for them.

## What to Exhibit Pets

1. Make a Pets poster. Your poster must be exactly $11 \times 14$ inches, displayed horizontally (wider than it is tall) and attached to a stiff backing (like cardboard). You may use foam board. Foam board is already stiff and does not require additional backing. Your poster must be covered with clear plastic. This can be a poster sleeve. If you have made a three dimensional item, you may use clear vinyl. Your poster must have a title.


NOTE: No oversize posters will be accepted for exhibition. No un-mounted items will be accepted for exhibition.
2. You poster can be about you and your pet. You can use pictures of you and your pet. You must include a short story of what you do to care for your pet.

## OR

3. You can use drawings or pictures cut from magazines of a pet you would like to own. You must include on your poster a short story telling what you would need to do to care for the pet you choose.

NOTE: If you are unable to pick your project up on Project Release Day, the Monday following the close of the fair, please make arrangements to have it picked up. All projects must be removed from the exhibit building on that day. There is no available storage space for unclaimed projects.

All posters must include: (both are found on page 16)
$>$ Record Sheet (attached to the back of the poster).
$>$ Exhibit Tag (attached in the lower right front corner of the poster).
