Learning Beyond Training:

The program goes far beyond basic commands. You'll delve into:

- **Dog Care:** Learn to assess vital signs, understand dog body systems, manage the needs of older dogs, and even identify dog ownership laws.
- **Responsibility & Planning:** Create a dog care budget, research common dog health problems, conduct a safety inventory for your dog, and select the right food.
- **Project-Based Learning:** Develop an exhibit on a specific topic like dog breeds, safety tips, or proper socialization - all while honing your research and presentation skills.

Requirements & Contact:

All participating dogs must have the completed 4H671W Dog Vaccination form. You can find it online at <https://extension.purdue.edu/4-H/projects/4-h-project-dog.html> or by contacting the Extension Office.
