• All Exhibits, except foods {baked and preserved) and garden/herbs, are due in the Exhibit Hall or 4-H Centennial Hall.

Monday, August 5 -9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

- Windsheild pass required for drop off. Pick up at Extension Office.
- Foods Exhibits (baked products and preserved items) due in the Exhibit Hall, 2nd floor.
- Garden due in Centennial Hall, lower level
- Herb Exhibits due in Exhibit Hall, 1st floor near front foyer.

Take each item (garment, poster, jar, etc.) to the building and area where it will be checked-in. Please be sure that each entry tag is securely attached so there will be no delays. Pick up your State Entry Tags at the Extension Office. DO NOT use your county tag!

Unloading will be at the back of the 4-H buildings, at the breezeways and back doors. DO NOT drive in front of the buildings. Building diagrams are located on the 4-H Hub under State Fair.








Dog Show

What is Mini 4-H?

Mini 4-H is a noncompetitive 4-H program for youth in grades K-2.

Mini 4-H is designed to introduce you and your child to the 4-H program and is an excellent way for children to learn by doing and to exhibit projects at the Fair. Mini 4-H members also have the opportunity to attend club meetings, workshops, and a summer day camp just for Mini 4-H'ers.

<u>The noncompetitive learning environment for Mini 4-H includes:</u>

- 1. Planned learning activities in which children are invited to be active and explore materials and ideas without the pressure of completing a specific product or exhibit.
- 2. Low adult/leader to child ratio that allows time for adults/leaders to provide individual positive encouragement and assistance.
- 3. Simple, interesting activities that are fun.
- 4. Encouragement of children to participate in a group activity by sharing and or displaying their activity projects.
- 5. Rewards are identical ribbons of the same color for everyone.

There is no limit to the number of projects youth can sign up for, however, try not to overwhelm a child with too many projects.




DINOSAURS:

The children learned from Marcia Gliottone and Karen Schwartz presenting the puppet Harrison and how agriculture effects his daily life.
