Carcass Workshop

Ten youth participated in the 4-H Carcass Project Workshop on March 9th. ANR Educator, Ariel Camm led a presentation discussing what carcass is, the carcass scanning procedure, wholesale vs. retail, USDA meat cuts, and marbling. She then had a fun, educational, and interactive activity identifying meat cuts. 4-H volunteer, Kyle Nix, discussed beef and pork cut examples with real meat to talk about marbling, back fat, the color of meat, and how to score meat cuts. As Kyle was quizzing them on what meat cuts were from what animal, they were thrown off when they were presented deer as a meat! Everyone was very engaged and had a fun time learning more about what to look for in their market animals' carcass scans at the fair.





Pesticide Applicator Program

On March 20th at Purdue Extension Harrison County, 31 participants continued their education credits towards their PARP license. Speaker, Glenn Longabaugh discussed nitrogen and phosphorus in the soil, Bill Johnson covered weed identification and management, and Richard Beckort spoke about worker protection and certification requirements. All participants learned a lot of useful information in this session to take back to there land and implement. Thank you to the Indiana Corn and Soybean Alliance for sponsoring this program!







Quality Livestock Care

Throughout March, April, and May, ANR Educator, Ariel Call, taught a total of 61 4-H youth attended the Indiana Quality Livestock Care Training at the Extension Office. Everyone learned various topics that will help them to properly take care of their livestock. They learned the relationship between livestock producers in 4-H and Agriculture, proper show ring ethics, relationships between veterinarians, how to maintain the wellbeing of animals, and what to look for when detecting diseases.

Master Gardeners Spring Workshop

The Harrison County Master Gardeners 2024 Spring Workshop was a huge success this year! Over 60 participants came out to the Extension Office to start the day with a homemade breakfast and had the opportunity to learn from several engaging guest speakers. The first session was led by Master Gardeners, Kim Tate and Ron Byerley. Participants learned about propagating plants from seed and cuttings and did a hands-on planting demonstration allowing each guest to plant a tomato start to take home. Charlie Logsdon, Wildlife Biologist at Roundstone Native Seed, shared information about getting started with native plantings on a home garden scale or thousands of acres and discussed many of the services they offer to ensure quality product, informed decision-making, and satisfied clients. Soil Health Specialist, Megan Ayers, captivated the audience with her dynamic presentation on the importance of soil health and the knowledge and services offered by her team.

If participants didn't know Indiana's Four Soil Health Principles when she started, they knew them by the end! The workshop ended with an interactive Q&A session and Plant Sale at the Master Gardeners' greenhouse. Livestock & Poultry 101

Livestock & Poultry 101 lasted over the span of 4 weeks in 4 sessions total with 7 participants.

This was a great program for beginners, anyone new to livestock, or those who may be looking to venture into new territory in expanding their farm. It was an opportunity to learn research-based information pertaining to all aspects of animal care and husbandry.

This workshop allows producers to make informed decisions before acquiring livestock and to incorporate best practices once those animals become part of the farm operation. The first 2 general sessions talked about various topics such as why you want to raise livestock, feed components, VCPR (vet client patient relationship), pastures, types of hay, grasses, fencing, different animal types, tagging, and budgets.

The last 2 sessions were more specific to certain species: 1 session for beef cattle and 1 session for sheep & goats.

These species-specific sessions targeted information about the species background, health issues, birthing, breeds, and specific nutrients.

Ariel's presentation was packed with essential information and also allowed the opportunity for any individual questions to be addressed and open discussions to occur.



The Art of Crafting Caramel

On June 11th at the Extension Office, Harrison County ANR Educator, Ariel Camm, and Clark County ANR Educator and owner of Summer Solstice Farms, Heidi Potter, hosted a fun and interactive workshop about raising dairy goats, dairy goat farm management, and how to make goat milk caramel with delicious samples to take home! Summer Solstice Farms is located in Southeastern Indiana, where Heidi raises dairy goats, chickens, Dexter cattle, and vegetables!

Everyone had a great time exchanging stories about dairy goat farming.

Participants ranged from beginners who may be interested in or thinking about dairy goats to seasoned dairy goat producers, and those who just like caramel!

ANR & HHS Collaboration



Beef: Farm to Table

ANR Educator, Ariel Camm, and HHS Educator, Tara Beckman, had the opportunity to visit almost 70 students at North Harrison High School and Corydon Central High School to discuss beef: how it relates to agriculture and consumer-end uses.

Ariel Camm spoke to students about Expected Progeny Differences, Wholesale and Retail cuts, Dressing Percentages, and USDA Grades in beef cattle. This helped to tie in how important selecting genetics are in beef cattle and what desired traits producers are looking for.

Tara Beckman discussed nutritional info related to beef. Together, she and the students identified safe food handling practices, and Tara demonstrated those during a steak preparation. Finally, students developed an understanding of resources as it relates to various cuts of meat and ideal food preparation methods.

Special thanks to North Harrison High School and Corydon High School for inviting us and providing the cuts of steak in order for students to see, smell, and sample what they were learning.



Grow It, Cook It: Onions

On March 12th, eleven people participated in the Grow It, Cook It session featuring Onions!

This fun workshop helped everyone gather a better understanding of growing and cooking onions.

HHS Educator, Tara Beckman, gave tips on cooking onions, nutrition they provide along with other recipe ingredients. health benefits, and how to select and store them. She prepared a scallion flatbread, healthy french onion dip, and had pickled red onions to sample.

ANR Educator, Ariel Camm, presented information about varieties of onions, diseases, and pests. She also spoke about how to plant onions by leading an activity that had participants plant their own onion sets. They could then take those onions home and have onion sets to grow in their gardens.

Overall, participants grew their understanding in producing and consuming onions!

Grow It Cook It: Brussel Sprouts

On April 9th, seven participants came out for the Grow It, Cook It session featuring Brussels Sprouts!

This fun workshop helped everyone gather a better understanding of growing and cooking Brussels sprouts.

HHS Educator, Tara Beckman, gave tips on cooking Brussels, nutrition they provide along with other recipe ingredients, health benefits, and how to select and store them. She prepared a Brussels sprout, cranberry, and couscous salad and roasted Brussels to sample.

ANR Educator, Ariel Camm, presented information about Brussels sprouts, diseases, and pests. She also spoke about how to plant Brussels sprouts by leading an activity that had participants plant their own Brussels sprout seeds-- thanks to the generous seed donation by Tractor Supply Company. Participants could then take those Brussels sprouts starters home and grow in their gardens.

Overall, participants grew their understanding in producing and consuming Brussels sprouts!

Where Does Your Money Go?

HHS/CD Educator, Tara Beckman, recently partnered with Genesis House in Corydon to offer "Where Does Your Money Go?" (WDYMG). WDYMG is a two session program designed to help consumers better understand how they spend their money. Program activities include determining your priorities and habits, identifying spending leaks, as well as creating a spend-savings plan. Between Sessions 1 & 2, the 16 participants were encouraged to track their expenses using the tools and resources discussed and provided during Session 1. In a combined total, during the two weeks between sessions, participants were able to save \$1700 and reduced the amount of money they spent on spending leaks by \$750!

As you can see, great financial education, conversations, insights, and knowledge aimed toward accomplishing each individual's unique financial goals were the cornerstones of each session!



Conflict Management

HHS/CD Educator, Tara Beckman, recently had the opportunity to join colleagues in Orange County for their Community Leadership Program. Tara led the Conflict Management session, which gives participants the opportunity to explore different conflict styles, learn to diagnose types of conflict, and gain strategies for managing conflict effectively. In total, there were 20 participants representing various sectors with their county--all aiming to continue strengthening their capacity to more effectively lead.



4 Sessions of Well-Being

During the months of April and May, HHS/CD Educator, Tara Beckman, spearheaded a new partnership with Hickory Treatment Center in Corydon. Hickory Treatment Center, renowned for its comprehensive 28-day alcohol and drug addiction recovery program for men, welcomed the collaborative approach to addressing substance use disorder. These sessions provided essential tools and insights to support individuals in their journey towards renewed health and stability. The sessions included topics related to nutrition, financial education, employability skills for working adults, and the benefits of sleep.

Collectively, there were 7 sessions during those two months (excluding a holiday week within that period), with a total of 230 participants engaging throughout the series. This program emphasized the desire to work toward a community-wide recovery-oriented system of care (ROSC).

Reducing Barriers: Empowering Communities Through Partnership

We are excited to share a recent development in our collaboration with the Harrison County Public Library, which has had a profound impact on our programming. Their generous sponsorship has eliminated the need for a program registration fee that was previously charged to cover program costs.

This change has significantly lowered barriers for participants, allowing more individuals to engage in our educational offerings without financial constraints. As a result, we've been able to expand our reach, while continuing to address topics identified by the community as critical to their well-being with research-based information and resources.

By removing this financial hurdle, we are empowering more people to participate actively in our programs and foster personal growth. Together, we ensure greater accessibility to programming, reaching a diverse range of community members and providing equitable opportunities for all. Accessing Free Grant Assistance: Supporting Communities Through the Great Lakes TCTAC Initiative



Purdue University is partnering with the Great Lakes TCTAC (Great Lakes Environmental Justice Thriving Communities Technical Assistance Center) in order to provide free technical assistance, training, and support to communities, stakeholders, and organizations looking for help to find, apply for, or manage funding for community-driven climate, energy-related, and environmental justice projects. The objective of this partnership is to help historically underserved and disproportionately burdened communities locate and apply for funding opportunities and grants. Therefore, on June 6th, HHS/CD Educator, Tara Beckman, alongside Assistant Program Leader for Community

Development and Sustainable Communities Extension Specialist, Kara Salazar, hosted a free regional Great Lakes TCTAC Workshop at the Harrison County Extension Office for anyone interested.

Currently, there are unprecedented state and federal funding opportunities available that focus on climate resiliency and environmental health, providing benefits for generations to come. This partnership, which was discussed in great lengths on June 6th, will support organizations in successfully navigating opportunities to access the resources they need to lead in clean energy transition, pollution clean-up, and green workforce development.

When HHS/CD Educator Tara recommended that NEP staff Cindy and Katie connect with her partner Genesis House, we were eager to find ways to work together. After our initial meeting with Genesis House staff, Cindy began NEPA classes, and Katie pursued the staff's idea to start a garden space. When Cindy talked about fresh herbs in one of her classes with the residents, they were very interested, so we decided to make a small herb garden instead of jumping into raised beds. This will reinforce Cindy's teachings on eating and cooking healthier, by providing easy access to fresh flavors for their group meals.

Katie visited a NEPA class to get their feedback and have the residents choose what they would like for shelving and pots, and what herbs they wanted to grow. They were ambitious! We showed them 7 herb options and they wanted to try and grow all 7! Through a bit of creativity, we were able to get every supply donated for this herb garden. Local Tractor Supply and Rural King locations donated pots, soil, seeds, a watering can, shears, gloves, and plant ID markers. An Extension Educator donated leftover lumber that she had from a home project, which a local contractor then used to donate his time and build us a shelf that matched the one the ladies wanted. A local school garden club even donated a lavender plant that they had grown for a fundraiser that was in a hand painted pot! Katie created a set of info cards on a ring that could hang in the house kitchen that gives info on herb selection, storage, cooking, and QR codes for recipes.

We decided to have a "garden party" on planting day. Cindy brought a delicious watermelon pizza recipe, and had really fun outdoor games for physical activity that everyone got really involved in. It was a really hot day, so the watermelon was super refreshing! We worked together to plant each of the herbs from seeds in pots, and we planted a few "ready to eat" pots of herbs donated from Meijer for their kitchen window to be used immediately. We covered caring for the plants, and encouraged them to let Cindy know when an herb is looking ready to harvest so she can plan her next lesson to be tailored to using that herb.

This was such a fun project full of joy. We are excited to hear about what the ladies cook with their new herbs, and are looking forward to following their progress and watching them (and their new herb plants) grow!
