The Hendricks County Extension Homemakers (HCEH) and the Hendricks County HHS Educator, Amanda Marciano-Feutz have had very busy year!



I'm proud to report that we have gained 18 new members this year (so far) for a total of 138 members. We participate in the following year-round activities: First Books (monthly reading children's books to head-start students; all students get a copy of the book read), Make-A-Difference Day, Helping Hands Day (a mostly monthly extension of Make-A-Difference Day), Hendricks County Teacher Grants (monthly), Dine-to-Donate fundraisers, celebrating the residents of Cypress Manor (County Home) and Hendricks County Chorus "Trebelmakers" in their community concerts.

Additional activities we have participated in during this year began with the Hendricks County Fair. Our Open Class exhibits had over 160 registered participants and over 600 items entered for judging. During the County Fair we staffed a Homemaker Booth and had 'giveaways' to encourage interest in HCEH. One 'giveaway' was a quilt made from the past year's open class quilt square contest. In addition, we used a QR code to elicit responses for a survey where the random winner received a \$100 grocery card. During the 2024 Fair we had Adult and Children's baking contests and HCEH participated in a CHOPPED contest which benefited local Community food resources. Finally post-judging, we auctioned off items submitted in our Culinary A and Culinary B categories as a fundraiser. This is one of our largest fundraising opportunities of the year.

As we began the Fall season, we started with a retreat for HCEH Council members titled "Review, Refresh, Renew" during which we reviewed the IEHA Mission Statement and discussed how our County supports this Mission through education, leadership development and volunteer community support. We discussed and set goals for the year. Later in the Fall we participated in the local craft/ food fair, by making/selling cheeseballs (1st time fundraiser)-which was a success! We raised over \$600 for Scholarships.

As cooler weather set-in, we celebrated IEHA week, held leader lessons and participated in District Day. Before the close of the year, we collected scarves, hats, gloves and socks which were provided to local agencies/ groups to support those in greatest need.

Our largest fundraiser of the year is our Holiday Fest (December) which includes a 'cookie-walk', vendor booths and lunch made by one of the HCEH clubs. This year we secured a larger area at the Fairgrounds for the event and added some 'new' items. It was one of the most financially successful years the event has had. Hopefully you can come and join in the fun this coming December.

As we have moved into 2025, we are in the process of selecting three high school seniors for \$1000 scholarships, having a membership booth at a local Master Gardner event, preparing for Achievement Day in May, planning a Heritage Skills trip to the Eiteljorg Museum in Indianapolis-also in May and possibly holding a Spring/ early Summer fundraiser all before the County Fair in July.

In addition, our HCEHs have participated in educational events lead by our County HHS Educator which include leader lessons, Dining with Diabetes, A Matter of Balance, Be Heart Smart, Mediterranean Diet and Cooking with Herbs.

One of the most effectual actions we took during this year was to implement the use of a "Square Card Reader". This device allows us to accept credit and debit card payments at our fundraiser events, for a nominal service fee. We initiated this option at our Fall 2024 fundraising event and feel we are now able to meet customers where they spend their money more effectively.

I'm very proud to be a homemaker and excited about the future of this organization. We as HCEH are working diligently to meet and exceed the mission of IEHA

CORNER:

Quick Guide to Reading the Nutrition Facts Label

Understanding the Nutrition Facts label is key to making informed food choices that support your

health. Here are the most important tips to help you use the label effectively:

1. Check the Serving Size

Start by looking at the serving size and the number of servings per package. All nutrient information on the label is based on this amount—if you eat more, adjust the numbers accordingly.

2. Calories Count

Review the calories per serving and compare them to your individual daily needs. While 2,000 calories is a general reference, your needs may be higher or lower.

3. Use % Daily Value (%DV) as a Guide

- 5% or less = Low (aim low for saturated fat, trans fat, sodium, and added sugars)
- 20% or more = High (aim high for fiber, vitamin D, calcium, iron, and potassium)

4. Watch Key Nutrients

Limit:

- Saturated fat and trans-fat (linked to heart disease)
- Added sugars (limit to less than 10% of daily calories)
- Sodium (high intake can raise blood pressure)
- Focus on getting enough:
- Dietary fiber, calcium, iron, potassium, and vitamin D

5. Understand Nutrition Claims

Terms like low sodium, reduced fat, and good source of have specific meanings. For example:

- Low sodium = 140 mg or less per serving
- Good source = 10–19% DV of a nutrient
- High in = 20% or more DV

6. Read the Ingredient List

Ingredients are listed by weight, with the most abundant first. This is useful for identifying added sugars, whole grains, or potential allergens.

Reading the label helps you choose foods that fuel your body, meet your nutritional needs, and support long-term health.


