Did you get a chance to see the warm homemakers Christmas tree? All the homemakers came through again. We had more warm items than would fit on the tree. We had 6 garbage bags full. They were taken to Brownsburg, Pittsboro, Danville, Coatesville Police Departments and the Hendrick County Sheriff Office. There were a total of 492 items: 126 hats, 61 scarves, 162 pairs of socks, and 143 sets of gloves.

Teacher Grant Updates

Our November winner of a HCEH Teacher Grant is Laura Searcy of Cascade High School. Mrs. Searcy has been teaching in the Agricultural Department for 10 years and is also the Director of the Cascade FFA Chapter.



In her classes the students learn a wide variety of skills such as small engine repair, welding, construction, and the agriculture curriculum. The welding department at Cascade is used by grades 9-12 as well as the FFA Chapter, who were the district winners for the past two years. Mrs. Searcy will be using the grant to purchase several new pairs of welding gloves to replace the current ones, which were purchased ten years ago and are well worn and have small holes in the fingertips.

The latest project for her classes is creating beautiful picnic tables, which are very sturdy.

CULTURAL ARTS TOUR AT HENDRICKS LIVE IN PLAINFIELD HENDRICKS COUNTY SYMPHONY CONCERT SUNDAY, JUNE 28, 2026, 3:00 P.M. STAR SPANGLED SPECTACULAR

The program for this concert has not been determined, but last June the program included the 1812 Overture, the Stars and Stripes Forever, The Battle Hymn of the Republic, and America the Beautiful. It is anticipated that the 2026 concert will include most of this music and other patriotic pieces. The Hendricks County Chorus will also perform.

The concert is 2 hours in length with an additional 20-minute intermission. Concessions are available, but only credit card purchases are accepted. There is no bag policy. Free parking is available at the Plainfield Downtown Parking Structure at 125 N Center St Plainfield, IN 46168. ADA parking is available in the parking lot directly behind the Town of Plainfield Government Center at 206 W Main St Plainfield, IN 46168. All tickets are the same price regardless of where you sit.

Ticket prices for the June concert have yet to be determined and tickets will not be available to purchase until April 1. The price will be set the first part of February. **More information with a payment/reservation form will be e-mailed to each member, including mailbox members, in February and will be in the Homemakers' Happenings in February. If a club member does not have e-mail, please see they get this information.** Once you receive the information you will have approximately one month to return the payment/reservation form. There are only two performances of this concert, and they sell out very quickly. Therefore, tickets will be purchased on April 1. The theater will have a list of those who have purchased tickets. You will go to the Will Call Window at the theater just before the concert to pick-up your ticket. The building opens one hour before the concert. Theater doors opens 30 minutes before the concert.

Praline Crunch Snack Mix

8 cups Crispix cereal
2 cups itty bitty pretzels
2 cups pecan halves
1 cup butter
2 1/4 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup corn syrup
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 teaspoon salt



- Preheat oven to 200°F.
- In a large mixing bowl, add the cereal, pretzels, and pecans. Set aside.
- In a medium-sized saucepan, combine the butter, brown sugar and corn syrup. Cook on medium-high heat until it comes to a boil.
- Reduce the heat to low-medium and let the mixture boil for 5 minutes; remove from the heat.
- Stir in the vanilla and salt.
- Pour the mixture over the cereal and pecans and stir until the pieces are evenly coated, being careful not to crush the cereal.
- Divide the mixture between two sheet pans* and spread out evenly.
- Bake for 1 hour, stirring each pan of praline crunch every 15 minutes.

Remove from the oven and give each pan a good stir (this will help prevent big clumps). Let cool and store in an airtight container.
