Why Join 4-H Junior Leaders?

Serving as a Junior Leader is an honor, an opportunity, and a <u>responsibility.</u> 4-H Clubs are most successful when your enthusiasm, energy, and ideas are combined with the experience of your Adult 4-H Leader or Junior Leader Advisor, other club members, and your Extension Educator.

Leadership is the ability to be able to influence the thinking and actions of people. It is the willingness to try a new job and see it through. Leadership does not depend upon the amount of talent you have, but upon what you do with your ability and how you get along with other people. YOU can be a leader if you have the desire, the willpower, and the urge to develop the qualities and characteristics that make a leader.

Your adult leader will supervise your work and be a source of help when you have questions or problems. However, they cannot make you a leader – you must develop yourself with the help of your leader.

To be a leader calls for the best that a person has to offer. It is a challenge TO LEARN< TO TRAIN< AND TO DEVELOP the natural talents that you may have. If you do this, you will have the respect of others, possess poise, have confidence, the ability to think clearly, and the skill to carry out the responsibility.

There are several reasons why you might want to be a 4-H Junior Leader:

- You can help younger 4-H members to have some of the same opportunities that you have had in 4-H Club work.
- You can help to develop a local and County 4-H Club program.
- You can develop your ability to work with others.
- · You can make new friends.
- You may become eligible for 4-H trips, awards, and scholarships.
- You can develop your abilities to plan, to organize, and to reason.
- You can become better acquainted with the entire 4-H club program.
- You can be a leader in your community

Junior Leaders as Mentors

Being a 4-H Junior Leader is a good way to serve as a mentor to one or two younger 4-H members. A mentor is a person who provides guidance and support to someone else. Mentors can help develop the capabilities and character of other 4-H'ers. They help younger members set goals for the year and assist them in reaching the goals they set.

Some of the characteristics good mentors have include setting their own personal goals, keeping promises and handling mistakes responsibly in their own lives. Mentors acknowledge the accomplishments of others and serve as informal coaches to others with which they work.

- 2. With the assistance of the local 4-H Club Leader, member must complete at least <u>five</u> local club leadership activities. <u>(Describe and have leader initial on page 4.)</u>
- 3. Assist the 4-H Adult Leader in any way possible.

County

- 1. Complete the local requirements listed above.
- 2. Attend at least **four** County Junior Leader meetings.
- 3. Actively assist as a Junior Leader with at least <u>seven</u> additional county, area, state, or national activities. (Describe on page 5.)
- 4. Pay Junior Leader Club dues, if any are assessed.
- 5. Complete record book, <u>have leader fill out page 6 and sign</u>, and turn in to the Extension Office by due date.
- 6. <u>IMPORTANT!! You are not considered complete unless pages 4-6 are filled out and turned in on time!</u> For those of you who like to be camp counselors, first consideration is given to those Jr. Leaders who complete their manual and turn it in on time.
