4-H offers year round programming designed to grow leaders through hands-on learning. With local clubs throughout the county, kids can take part in community service projects, build friendships, and develop leadership skills close to home. A variety of **after school programs** give kids a chance to explore science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) concepts, such as 3D printing and coding, or some focus on nutrition, physical fitness, and whole person health. Be on the lookout for a program at a school near you! 4-H also offers many camps and trips to help kids develop an understanding of the world around them. Area camp brings together youth from East Central Indiana to build friendships and make memories that will last a lifetime. State trips such as 4-H Round-up and Academy bring kids together from across Indiana to take part in career exploration. National trips bring together kids from across the country to address the challenges facing our nation. Career Development Events (CDEs) help kids build skills in critical thinking, decision making, and public speaking. And of course, 4-H wouldn't be complete without the **project based learning** that allows kids to dive deep into a subject of interest to them. 
Welcome to a new year. The 2022 Jay County 4-H key word is communication. Communication from the leaders, the members, the parents and the office. Communication is a two-way street and includes listening as much as it does talking. I encourage everyone to communicate any and all ideas to continue to improve our 4-H program. I also encourage everyone to remember who the program serves: our youth. At times it is necessary to step out of our comfort zone and put bias aside to consider what best suits the needs of the kids and the program. As a parent myself, I remind all parents of some certain ways to help teach our children responsibility, work ethic, and leadership while elevating them to be their best.

- Know the rules -Every year a rule book is printed so everyone is aware of what is expected, to be followed by everyone equally.
- Allow children to do their projects themselves Parents can offer advice, oversee, and share their personal wisdom, but one of the key opportunities in 4-H is learning responsibility and that starts with letting kids do their own work.
- Be supportive and involved Allowing your child to do their own projects does not mean don't be involved. Support your child and learn with them.
- Allow your child to practice and participate Practice at home, attend workshops, go to meetings will provide your child ways to learn and share experiences with peers.
- Have proper equipment For first year families, ask questions if you're not sure what your child might need to be successful. It does not mean new and expensive equipment. Again, do not be afraid to ask questions and learn with your child.
- Keep your attitude in check Your child looks to you on how to be a good winner as well as a good loser. Set the bar high and lead by a good example.
- Be a spectator Once your child is in the ring, become a spectator and sit and watch from the stands. Do not be a sideline coach. Experience can be a tremendous teacher and motivator.
- Don't be a complainer Not everyone will agree with a judge. Again, remember your child looks to you as how to react. Sometimes saying nothing can be the best example we give our kids.
- Please do not complain about the competition Many of these kids are friends and classmates outside of the showring. What happens in the ring should not impact how kids feel about each other out of the ring.
- Honor your child Negative criticism does not do anyone any good. Kids are going to make mistakes. Parents can use these as positive teaching moments to help their child learn and improve but always do it in a positive manner.

Included is the chart for Animal ID Requirements for the Indiana 4-H State Fair. Remember, we follow all state guidelines, except for the DNA requirement.

The following table lists the different animal species and the respective form of identification that is required for a 4-H member to be eligible to show in the 4-H livestock shows at the 2022 Indiana State Fair. The animal ID information must be entered in the Indiana 4-H Online enrollment system by the respective deadlines. Missing, incomplete or incorrect animal ID information could result in state fair ineligibility for that particular animal.


REMINDER FOR LIVESTOCK MEMBERS:
