Yet another busy month in the world of Jennings County ANR! I began the month strong with a Forestry and Natural Resource Training for myself out at SEPAC. This education will be beneficial as I continue to receive consultation calls. The second week of May was filled with field trip festivities for 3rd graders out at the Muscatatuck National Wildlife Refuge. The students learned all about Pollinators, The Water Cycle, Wildlife, Wetlands, and more! It was great to get to see the students enjoy nature and learn more about the great outdoors that Jennings County has to offer. Again this year the Boy and Girls Club and I will have a community garden out at Country Squire Lakes. ### June Garden Calendar

<u>Lawns, Woody Ornamentals, and Fruits</u> Prune spring-flowering shrubs after blooms fade.

Apply fungicide to prevent and control black spot on roses.

Water newly planted trees and shrubs. Water deeply every seven to 10 days when rain is lacking.

Remove faded flowers and seed pods on lilac and other spring-flowering shrubs.

Many fruit trees experienced freeze damage to flower buds, but a few trees may still have some fruit set. In a normal year if there is a heavy crop, don't be alarmed by a June drop of some fruit. It is a natural thinning process for most trees to prevent excessive loads, although there might not be as much to thin this year. If your trees did manage to set a heavy crop, thin the remaining fruit or prop up heavy branches to avoid breakage. Most fruit should be spaced 6 to 8 inches apart on a branch.

Mow grass regularly but mow high. Unless excessive, leave lawn clippings on the lawn.

To keep the lawn green and growing, water as needed to supply a total of 1 to 1.5 inches of water per week. If left unwatered, lawns will turn brown and become dormant during extended hot, dry spells, but will green up again when conditions are more favorable.

### Indoor Plants and Activities

Indoor plants will require more frequent watering and fertilizing as they increase their summer growth.

You can move houseplants outdoors to a shady location, but pay close attention to their watering needs.

Cut garden flowers for indoor beauty. Recut the stems again just before placing in water. Add a floral preservative, and change the solution frequently.

Root cuttings of houseplants and garden plants to increase your collection or share with a friend.

### Flowers, Vegetables, and Small Fruits

Discontinue harvesting asparagus and rhubarb around mid-June to allow foliage to develop and store carbohydrate reserves for next year's harvest. Fertilize after last harvest and water as needed to promote healthy growth.

Mulch to control weeds and conserve soil moisture after soil has warmed. You can use many materials, including straw, chopped corncobs, bark chips, shredded paper, and grass clippings.

### June Garden Calendar Continued

Blanch (exclude light from) cauliflower when heads are just 2 inches in diameter. Tie leaves up and over the developing head.

Control weeds. They're easier to pull when they are still young. Start seeds of cabbage, Brussels sprouts, broccoli, and cauliflower for fall garden transplants.

Plan now for your Halloween pumpkin. Determine the days to harvest for the particular cultivar you want to plant (usually on the seed packet) and count backward to determine the proper planting date.

Harvest spring plantings of broccoli, cabbage, and peas.

Remove cool-season plants, such as radish, spinach, and lettuce, because they will bolt (that is, form seed stalks) and become bitter during hot summer weather.

Continue planting carrots, beans, and sweet corn for successive harvests.

For staked tomatoes, remove suckers (branches that form where the leaf joins the stem) while they are 1 to 1.5 inches long to allow easier training. No need to remove suckers on caged plants.

Remove the spent blooms of peony, iris, delphiniums after they fade. Pinch the shoot tips of chrysanthemums, impatiens, petunias, and coleus to promote bushier growth.

Remove the tops of spring-flowering bulbs only after they have yellowed and withered.

Continue planting gladiolus for a succession of bloom.

Pick strawberries from the garden.

Protect ripening strawberries from birds by covering with netting.

Supplement natural rainfall (as needed) to supply a total of 1 to 1.5 inches of water per week to the garden.

### ServSafe Food Manager 1-Day Class & Examination

### ServSafe educates food service workers about food safety.

ServSafe Food Protection Manager is their highest certification. It satisfies Indiana requirements to become a Certified Food Protection manager and focuses onfive aspects:

- Foodborne microorganisms and allergens
- · Personal hygiene
- Purchasing, receiving, and storage
- · Preparing, cooking, and serving
- · Facilities, cleaning/sanitation, and managing pests

The full 1-day training includes a manual and proctored exam. You must score 70 percent or greater to earn the certificate. The certification is valid for five years. . A photo ID with signature is required to take the exam (driver license, state ID, student ID, military ID, employee ID, U.S. green card, or valid passport).

I hope everyone is enjoying the sun and warmer weather. Our office has been working hard to prepare for the Jennings County Fair coming up in a few weeks. As we approach the summer, I encourage everyone to get out enjoy your favorite physically active hobbies! It's a great time for walking, swimming, gardening, tennis, basketball...you name now's the time to enjoy it!

Here's an update of what has and will be happening with the Nutrition Education Program in Jennings County recently:

1. The Jennings County 4-H Council is leading the charge on the Stock the Trailer food drive! To collect food and raise funds during the county fair, you can donate food to get your favorite community leader to kiss a pig or donate money to nominate a friend to show an animal at the fair. This food and money collected will benefit Good Samaritan Food Pantry, Jennings County Coordinating Council, and St. Vincent de Paul.

2. The Bike & Pedestrian Master Plan is officially part of the Jennings County Comprehensive Plan. In their meeting on Thursday, May 18th the plan was given its final approval by the Jennings County Commissioners. To celebrate, the Local Advisory Committee for the plan is hosting a reception at the Jennings County Historical Society on Thursday, June 8th from 4:30pm-6pm. Come join us to hear more about the plan!

3. June's Walk with a Doc will be held on Friday, June 16th at 4pm at Tripton Park in North Vernon. Come join Dr. Jen Stanley and Dr. Dashrath Gautam to hear about the health topic of the month and enjoy a walk with others.

4. The Connection IN Health community assessment has begun in Jennings County. For those who don't know, this is an opportunity to provide feedback through a survey or interview with a group that provides assistance on public health efforts throughout the state of Indiana. In September, we'll have meetings to hear about the information they collect and then the chance to decide how to use \$10,000 in our community to address chronic disease prevention. So stay tuned on that!

5. Summer Walks 2 Jennings start this month the week of June 18th!! Check out the information on the next few pages to see where we will walk on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays all summer long.

### Dear 4-H Families & Volunteers,

It's June which means Fair time is here! Below you will find lots of information pertaining to the fair and events throughout the summer. The office staff is so excited for the fair and can't wait to see you all exhibit your 4-H projects and animals.

**Training Reminder:** If you plan to exhibit, Beef, Dairy, Goats, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, or Swine and have not yet completed Indiana 4-H Quality Livestock Care (IQLC) or Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA), then your must complete the online YQCA training. Proof of training completion must be submitted to the Extension Office Staff prior to checking in it at the fair.

**State Fair Static Projects:** If you have a static project selected for State Fair, we will be trying something different for this year. If you wish for the Extension Office to transport your project to the State Fair, we will keep the project at the Extension Office until it returns from the State Fair. This will eliminate the need for you to return the project to the Extension Office later in the summer. Obviously, some projects may need to be redone for the state fair (Cake Decorating, Foods, etc.) or you may want to make improvements to your projects based on the judges suggestions from the county fair. These projects should be returned to the Extension Office by July 10. Foods and Garden projects must be turned into the Extension Office no later than 8:30am on July 31 to be taken to the State Fair.

As always, please let us know if you have any questions or need assistance.

### 2023 Static Project Changes

Dear 4-H members and volunteers,

This year static project check-in will look differently than it has in the past. Due to circumstances regarding access to the community building which are out of our control, we have made adjustments to accommodate. Although things will look different than they have in the past, I have confidence that we will have a great 4-H project display this year. Please read the following information carefully so that you are aware of the changes that will take place for this year. A full schedule is listed at the end of the letter.

The biggest change taking place is the location of check-in and judging, static projects check-in will take place at <u>Sand Creek Elementary</u>. Mini 4-H and early check in will be Friday, June 9<sup>th</sup> from 5:00pm-7:00pm. Open judging and check-in will be Saturday, June 10<sup>th</sup> from 10:00am-12:00 noon. Junior Leaders may have their projects judged from 9:30am-10:00am.

Although judging and check-in is taking place at Sand Creek, the projects will be displayed at the Fairgrounds in the Community Building throughout fair week. This means that projects will be moved from Sand Creek to the Community Building on Sunday afternoon and Monday morning.

Although it is a short drive from one place to the other, some 4-H members may be asked to transport certain projects to the community building themselves. Any 4-H member whose project is fragile, larger than 2-foot square, or heavier than 40 pounds may be asked to transfer their project from Sand Creek to the Community Building. On the same note, any 4-H member may opt to move their project on their own. Each 4-H member will have the opportunity to communicate if they would like to transfer their project on their own as they enter the building for check-in. Likewise, if we expect you to transfer your project due to its fragile nature, size, or weight, we will communicate this upon check in as well. It is important to remember 4-H members and volunteers acting on behalf of the 4-H Council are not responsible for any damage that may occur to a project once it is checked-in, which includes transfer from Sand Creek to the Community Building.

4-H members who choose to transfer their project themselves or who are asked to transfer their project will be able to do so from 2:00pm-6:00pm Sunday, June 11<sup>th</sup> or 7:00 am-9:00 am on Monday, June 12<sup>th</sup>. If projects are not moved by 9:10 am on Sunday, June 11<sup>th</sup>, the project will be moved regardless of 4-H member preference. If accommodations to these times are needed, please contact the Extension Office.

Some other schedule and location changes have been made to accommodate. These include the following:

BBQ project judging will be Friday, June 9<sup>th</sup> at the Pavilion. Participants may set-up at 3:00pm and judging will take place at 5:00pm.

The Cat Show will be Friday June 9<sup>th</sup> at the Show Arena. Registration will begin at 6:00pm and the show will begin at 6:30pm.

With these above changes being made, we will need 4-H members and volunteers to help with setting up the community building and transferring projects from Sand Creek to the Community Building. We will have access to the Community Building on Sunday, June 11<sup>th</sup> at 8:00 am. At this time, we will begin setting up the Community Building for projects to be displayed throughout fair week. The goal will be to have the Community Building set-up by noon and ready to begin arranging projects as soon as possible.

Any 4-H members, volunteers, or parents who are not occupied with livestock check-in are encouraged to lend a hand at any point in this process. Whether you can help for an hour or the whole day, any help is appreciated. If you are able to help, please let the Extension Office know so that we can allocate our resources properly. However, if you plan to assist other 4-H members from across the state be sure to check the requirements for the county in which they exhibit in. This is a requirement for the Indiana. State Fair which allows you to assist any 4-H member in any animal species. The animal grooming policy at the Indiana State Fair is described below:

• 4-H Exhibitors may receive clipping and grooming assistance from members of their immediate family (father, mother and siblings), from a current Indiana 4-H member, and from individuals enrolled in the Indiana 4-H Approved Animal Grooming Assistance Program. Temporary guardianships are not permitted and shall result in immediate disqualification.
