

What's New with ANR?

April has been a busy month for ANR Programming. April 12th was Ag Day for all of the 4th graders in Jennings County. Ag day took place at the fairgrounds where 9 different stations gave each of the kids a taste of agriculture. Some stations were quite

literal in the sense that every student got to try ice cream at the dairy station, and corn chips as well as popcorn at the crop station. In addition to those two stations, there were sheep & goats, horses, beef & swine, rabbits, farm safety, Rose Acres talking egg production, and even a station that talked about how the farm creates our pizza! The students gave great feedback about all of the stations but of course, they were especially interested in the dairy station and its free ice cream. Another great station was the farm safety station which demonstrated grain bin accidents and tractor turnovers utilizing miniature models. A special thanks to Rebecca at Jennings SWCD, Anita with Farm Bureau Ag in the classroom, Jennings County FFA, Farm Bureau- Jenning County, Sand Creek Elementary, and some of our 4-H livestock exhibitors! All of these folks helped to make the day a great success for the 4th graders. A week later on April 19th, all of the educators in our office along with Farm Bureau Ag in the Classroom helped to provide a field trip for Graham Creek Kindergartners! This day consisted of learning about meat goats and getting to see some new baby goats, which the kids were very excited about! The kindergartners also learned about making strawberry jam, creating

healthy smoothies with our blender bike, creating some positive crafts, and having lots of fun with physical activity. Meanwhile, a second-grade class at Graham Creek and I began an adventure on March 28th of starting some chicken eggs in an incubator. The students knew on the 21st day in the incubator they could expect to see some eggs hatching. During the 21 days prior, twice weekly I visited the classroom to candle the eggs with the students. They drew pictures and described the development. They observed the incubator daily to make sure that the temperature remained



at 100 degrees and the humidity stayed higher than 40% but less than 60%. On the 18th day, they removed the egg turner which had been in place from day 1. They helped to increase the humidity to prep for hatching which would hopefully happen on Monday! On Monday, April 17th, the kids had their first hatcher which they called Mr. Peep. Mr. Peep was a solo chick for his first day of life. He then had some brothers and sisters join him the next day. 18 brothers and sisters were born throughout the following day! Students have enjoyed the first week of their chicks' life and will now be saying goodbye as they make their way to their new homes! April has been an exciting month, but I do look forward to what May holds in store as I prepare for year 2 of the community garden project at the CSL Clubhouse! I am also very excited about the fun programs we have in store with the Boys and Girls Club this summer!

May Garden Calendar

Lawns, Woody Ornamentals, and Fruits

Prune early spring-flowering trees and shrubs after flowers fade.

Plant balled-and-burlapped or container nursery stock, and water thoroughly.

Remove and destroy overwintering bagworms from landscape trees and shrubs.

Follow a spray schedule to keep home-orchard crops pest free. While trees are in bloom, use fungicide sprays without insecticide to avoid injuring bees. Follow label directions.

Thin apple tree fruits, if needed, about three weeks after petal fall. Apples should be about 8 inches apart. Mother Nature may have taken care of thinning fruit set this year!

Apply fungicides to roses to control diseases such as black spot.

Purdue turf experts recommend that if you are going to fertilize your lawn in May, apply 3/4-1 pound of nitrogen (N) per 1,000 square feet with a product that contains 50 percent or more of slow-release fertilizer. Try to schedule the application prior to a rain or irrigate following application to move the fertilizer off leaf blades.

Indoor Plants and Activities

Many indoor plants can be moved to shady locations outdoors but only after the danger of frost has passed. Plants will dry out more often outdoors, so keep a close eye on soil moisture. Sinking the pots in soil will help slow down moisture loss.

Now is a good time to take cuttings of houseplants to increase a collection or share with friends. Stick cuttings to root in media, such as vermiculite, perlite, or potting soil. Roots grown in water tend to be weak from lack of oxygen and do not adjust well to planting in soil.

Fertilize houseplants according to label directions. Foliage plants require relatively high nitrogen fertilizer; flowering houseplants respond best to fertilizer high in phosphorus.

Flowers, Vegetables, and Small Fruits

Plant frost-tender plants after the danger of frost has passed for your area. This includes warm-season vegetables (such as tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, and vine crops) as well as most annual flowers and tender perennials (such as cannas, gladiolus, dahlias, tuberous begonias, and caladiums).

Pinch chrysanthemums and annual flower plants to keep them compact and well-branched.

Make successive plantings of beans and sweet corn to extend the harvest season.

Thin seedlings of early-planted crops such as carrots, lettuce, spinach, and beets to their proper spacing.



Harvest early plantings of radishes, spinach, and lettuce.

Both asparagus and rhubarb season may be delayed this year due to the slow progression of spring.

Harvest asparagus by cutting or snapping spears at or just below soil level.

Harvest rhubarb by cutting or grasping the stalk and pulling it up and slightly to one side.

Control cucumber beetles (which are carriers of bacterial wilt) as soon as cucumber plants germinate or are transplanted to prevent disease.

Remove blossoms from newly set strawberry plants to allow better runner formation.

Remove unwanted sucker growth in raspberries when new shoots are about a foot tall.

Boys & Girls Club Farmers' Market Experience

Growers & Meat Producers Needed!!

Purdue Extension-Jennings County is seeking a variety of local growers and meat producers that are interested in participating in a Farmer's Market experience with the Boys & Girls Club of Jennings County!

VECETABLES

Program Details:

- Grant funds awarded from the IDOH will be used to purchase locally sourced fruits, veggies and proteins for special events with the Boys & Girls Club
- There will be a total of 25 events over the next 3 years!
- July-November 2023: Monthly event at the B&G Club CSL Clubhouse
- May September 2024 & 2025-we will be adding a 2nd location in 2024!: Monthly events at the B&G Clubhouse at CSL and NVE!
- A budget of approximately \$2500 per event will be used to purchase locally sourced fruits, veggies and proteins prior to each event. <u>That's over \$60K that will go to our local growers/producers over the next 3 years!</u>
- A special meeting will be arranged each year to negotiate pricing of goods from all growers/producers participating. A memorandum of understanding will then need signed acknowledging the annual price negotiations in order to participate. (SEE BELOW FOR OUR FIRST GROWERS MEETING INFO!)
- Growers/Producers will be paid monthly for goods sold for each event. An invoice will need to be provided to PU Extension each month for payment.
- Growers/Producers will not be required to be present at the monthly event, however, are highly encouraged to attend for community engagement.
- Monthly pick up/deliveries of goods will be arranged prior to each scheduled event for those that opt out of being in event attendance.
- Interested parties will need to contact the Extension office by April 30 each year with a list of anticipated fruits, veggies, and proteins they plan to offer.

Here's an update of what has and will be happening with the Nutrition Education Program in Jennings County recently:

- 1. The Jennings County Food Security Coalition hosted a showing of The Working Hungry documentary on Wednesday, March 29th at the Park Theater! Thank you to all who have enrolled in 4-H! The fair is quickly approaching which means there is lots to complete over the next month. This newsletter contains several important dates and information regarding the fair and other summer events.

<u>May 15:</u>

We all should know by now that May 15 is an important date in Indiana 4-H. Here is a list of what all should be completed by May 15...

- All project changes should be made in 4-H Online. You may add /drop projects from what you originally decided until then.
- Animal ID information MUST be entered into 4-H Online.
- If you plan to exhibit livestock at the Indiana State Fair, DNA envelopes must be turned into the office by 4:00pm on May 15.
- Horse & Pony Vaccination Forms are due. Upload these into 4-H Online and submit a copy to the office/JC Riders Club leaders.
- Seniors! Plain Dealer questionnaire and 4-H Scholarships is due to the extension office by May 15.
- Planning to attend 4-H Camp? Must be signed up via 4-H
 Online and have payment to the Extension Office by May 15.

Stop by the Office:

2023 handbooks, project manuals, exhibit cards, record sheets, skills cards, electric kits, poster boards and sleeves can all be picked up from the Extension Office.

<u>Fairentry</u>

Fairentry will be open May 16-25. All 4-H members and Mini 4-H Members should complete Fairentry by May 25. A mailing with specific instructions on how to complete Fairentry will be sent to 4-H Families by May 16.

What will I do at 4-H Camp? You will make new friends, do science experiments, make crafts, play gaga, 9 square in the air, go swimming, learn new songs, have a campfire and so much more!

Who attends 4-H Camp? 4-H members ranging from 3rd to 12th grade from 8 Southeastern Indiana Counties attend 4-H camp.

How long will I be at 4-H Camp? 4-H Camp is an overnight experience. Campers arrive on Tuesday and leave camp on Friday afternoon.

Do I have to be in 4-H to attend 4-H Camp? Yes, you must be a 4-H member to attend 4-H Camp. This doesn't mean you have to exhibit a project/animal at the fair. You can enroll in 4-H online at <u>v2.4honline.com</u>. There is a \$20 enrollment fee. Call the Extension Office for instructions and more details.

How do I sign up for 4-H Camp? Once you have enrolled as a 4-H member, paid, and been approved you can sign up in 4-H Online under the events tab. 4-H Camp sign-up closes on May 15. Contact the Extension Office for instructions and more details.

How much does 4-H Camp cost? The total cost is \$220 but, you only pay \$55 as the Jennings County 4-H Endowment sponsors most of the camp fee!

2023 Static Project Changes

Dear 4-H members and volunteers,

This year static project check-in will look differently than it has in the past. Due to circumstances regarding access to the community building which are out of our control, we have made adjustments to accommodate. Although things will look different than they have in the past, I have confidence that we will have a great 4-H project display this year. Please read the following information carefully so that you are aware of the changes that will take place for this year. A full schedule is listed at the end of the letter.

The biggest change taking place is the location of check-in and judging, static projects check-in will take place at <u>Sand Creek Elementary</u>. Mini 4-H and early check in will be Friday, June 9th from 5:00pm-7:00pm. Open judging and check-in will be Saturday, June 10th from 10:00am-12:00 noon. Junior Leaders may have their projects judged from 9:30am-10:00am.

Although judging and check-in is taking place at Sand Creek, the projects will be displayed at the Fairgrounds in the Community Building throughout fair week. This means that projects will be moved from Sand Creek to the Community Building on Sunday afternoon and Monday morning.

Although it is a short drive from one place to the other, some 4-H members may be asked to transport certain projects to the community building themselves. Any 4-H member whose project is fragile, larger than 2-foot square, or heavier than 40 pounds may be asked to transfer their project from Sand Creek to the Community Building. On the same note, any 4-H member may opt to move their project on their own. Each 4-H member will have the opportunity to communicate if they would like to transfer their project on their own as they enter the building for check-in. Likewise, if we expect you to transfer your project due to its fragile nature, size, or weight, we will communicate this upon check in as well. It is important to remember 4-H members and volunteers acting on behalf of the 4-H Council are not responsible for any damage that may occur to a project once it is checked-in, which includes transfer from Sand Creek to the Community Building.

4-H members who choose to transfer their project themselves or who are asked to transfer their project will be able to do so from 2:00pm-6:00pm Sunday, June 11th or 7:00 am-9:00 am on Monday, June 12th. If projects are not moved by 9:10 am on Sunday, June 11th, the project will be moved regardless of 4-H member preference. If accommodations to these times are needed, please contact the Extension Office.

Some other schedule and location changes have been made to accommodate. These include the following:

BBQ project judging will be Friday, June 9th at the Pavilion. Participants may set-up at 3:00pm and judging will take place at 5:00pm.

The Cat Show will be Friday June 9th at the Show Arena. Registration will begin at 6:00pm and the show will begin at 6:30pm.

With these above changes being made, we will need 4-H members and volunteers to help with setting up the community building and transferring projects from Sand Creek to the Community Building. We will have access to the Community Building on Sunday, June 11th at 8:00 am. At this time, we will begin setting up the Community Building for projects to be displayed throughout fair week. The goal will be to have the Community Building set-up by noon and ready to begin arranging projects as soon as possible.

Any 4-H members, volunteers, or parents who are not occupied with livestock check-in are encouraged to lend a hand at any point in this process. Whether you can help for an hour or the whole day, any help is appreciated. If you are able to help, please let the Extension Office know so that we can allocate our resources properly. 
Static Project Exhibit Card Update

Due to the change in the size of the State Fair project exhibit cards, we have updated the format of our county exhibit card. This year they will be approximately 3" wide by 5.5" tall. All exhibit cards should still be placed in the bottom right-hand corner of all posters. Exhibit cards for other non-poster projects should be placed in the bottom right-hand corner or in any other place that makes sense based on the project.







2. Place a completed exhibit card vertically in the lower right corner of the poster. Exhibit Cards are approximately 3" wide by 5.5" tall. These can be picked up from the Extension Office or at Project Check-in.

THIS IS NOT A REQUIREMENT IN JENNINGS COUNTY.

However, if you plan to assist other 4-H members from across the state be sure to check the requirements for the county in which they exhibit in. This is a requirement for the Indiana. State Fair which allows you to assist any 4-H member in any animal species. The animal grooming policy at the Indiana State Fair is described below:

 4-H Exhibitors may receive clipping and grooming assistance from members of their immediate family (father, mother and siblings), from a current Indiana 4-H member, and from individuals enrolled in the Indiana 4-H Approved Animal Grooming Assistance Program. Temporary guardianships are not permitted and shall result in immediate disqualification.

To enroll in the Approved Animal Grooming Program, simply complete the 5 Animal Ethics and Adult Expectations online modules attached in this Qualtrics survey, complete your application via this Qualtrics Survey, and also submit a copy of your Indiana driver's license via this Qualtrics. 
