2025 Fair Wrap-Up

The Kosciusko County Community Fair for 2025 is officially behind us. Our number of exhibitors, entries, and visitors to the building were all down. I think the close proximity of the Fourth of July holiday played a significant role in that situation. We had 156 exhibitors, down from 187 last year, and they entered 597 items, down from 764 last year. This is a significant drop, but even though the building looked rather empty, our fantastic department superintendents made their areas neat, clean, open, and inviting. The building looked great, and we heard many positive comments. For the past couple of years we've partnered with the Leesburg Lions Club to give out ice cream coupons to those who take our little "quiz". This year we tested fair goers on their knowledge of Kosciusko County. Some thought the questions were hard, and others thought they weren't so bad, but everyone seemed to enjoy the challenge. And I'm sure they enjoyed the delicious ice cream. So, all in all, this year's fair was a very enjoyable event.

Fair awards were again presented on Friday evening, along with the raffle drawing. For the second year in a row, we presented an award to the exhibitor with the most entries who is not an extension homemaker, as well as the traditional awards. Herscher Club was the winner of the \$50 check for the club with the highest average number of entries per member (7.8), and certificates were given for second (M&M's, 5.1) and third (Atwood Home Study, 2.1). Awards for the clubs with the most entries were given to M&M's (51 entries, \$20 cash award), Herscher Club (47 entries), and Atwood Home Study (31 entries). This year's extension homemaker reporting the most entries and earning a \$20 cash award was Connie Fribley with 26 entries. June Thomas Swanson was second with 22 entries, and Darlene Lash was third with 17. The non-extension homemaker with the most entries was Cynthia Bartley (14) who also received a \$20 cash award. Congratulations to all the winners!

We raised \$350 through the silent auction this year. The three baskets, donated by Rural Neighbors, M&M's, and Clunette Crossroads, generated a lot of interest, and the number of bids was very encouraging. The silent auction is important because it contributes to the maintenance and activities of the Home and Family Arts Building as well as helping to fund our scholarships. Thank you so much to those who assembled and donated these baskets. You are much appreciated!

"My Quilt"



My Mother gave me this quilt kit sometime in the 1980's. Back then, I was a busy mom with children at home and didn't have much time for it. Every now and then I'd pick it up and work on the cross-stitching, but progress was slow.

At the time, we were living in Marana, Arizona. I had a good friend named Thelma and together we took some quilting classes. Thelma went on to become a master quilter-but I didn't quite follow in her footsteps!

In 1994, I went through a divorce and moved back to Indiana. I don't remember touching the quilt at all during those years.

In 1997, I remarried and was busy with a full-time job, so again the quilt sat unfinished. When my husband and I retired in 2007, we began spending our winters back in Arizona. I re-

connected with Thelma, and one day she asked me about the old quilt. I told her I still had it but wasn't sure what to do with it. She insisted: "You need to finish that quilt!" With her encouragement, I finally got serious about it. And on February 13,2014, after decades of starts and stops, I finished it at last.

My only regret is that my Mother never got to see it completed.
