A contest for a creed was sponsored in 1930 by the State Association. From the 60 entries submitted, the Association chose the one written by Mrs. C.W. Horne of Hendricks County. In writing the creed, Mrs. Horne voiced the sentiment of every member of the Extension Homemakers clubs with the hope that this valuable work would go on forever.

CLUB COLLECT by Mary Stewart

Keep us O Lord from pettiness; let us be large in thought, in word and deed. Let us be done with fault-finding and leave off self-seeking. May we put away all pretense and meet each other face to face, without self-pity and without prejudice. May we never be hasty in judgment and always generous. Let us take time for all things; make us grow calm, serene and gentle. Teach us to put into action our better impulses straight forward and unafraid. Grant that we may realize that it is the little things that create differences; that in the big things of life we are one. And may we strive to touch and know the great human heart common to us all, and O Lord God let us not forget to be kind.

"The Collect was written in 1904 as a personal prayer for the day and without any organization in mind. I was entering my first job out of college. It was offered for publication under the title, "A Collect for Club Women". I felt that a woman working together with wide interest for large ends was a new thing under the sun and that perhaps they had need for special petition and meditation of their own." – Mary Stewart (1941)

WHAT IS EXTENSION?


The Health and Human Sciences program is a section of the Extension Service. It is sponsored by Purdue University, the U.S. Depart of Agriculture, and Kosciusko County.

This education program is FREE! We urge others to participate in the health and human sciences activities on good nutrition, child development, family relations, home management, time management, use of money and more.

Membership in Indiana Extension Homemakers (IEHA) includes membership in The Associated Country Women of the World (ACWW), Country Women's Council USA (CWC), and National Volunteer Outreach Network, Inc. (NVON).

We help reach other homemakers in our community and interest them in becoming Extension Homemaker club members. All homemakers are welcome.

Membership is open continuously.



CWC and ACWW

The Country Women's Council of the USA (CWC)'s objective is to unite into a cooperative, working organization, the societies affiliated with the Associated Country Women of the World (ACWW). The rural and urban members represent varied races, nationalities, and creeds. They believe that communication based on friendship and understanding will advance peace



and progress. They believe that the quality of life is improved for all people through the following:

- The relief of poverty
- The advancement of education
- The relief of sickness and the protection/preservation of health.
 - Meet for discussion on matters pertaining to ACWW
 - Recommend on policies and activities, always considering the international character of ACWW
 - Further these objectives in the ACWW constitution.



The ACWW is one of the largest international development organizations for rural women, working with 420 member societies and affiliates in 82 countries worldwide.

This network allows us to engage at the local, national, and international level with the aim of achieving these goals:

- TO RAISE the standard of living for rural women and their families through education, training, and community development programs.
- **TO PROVIDE** practical support to our members and help them set up income-generating schemes.
- **TO SUPPORT** educational opportunities for women and girls and help eliminate gender discrimination.
- TO GIVE rural women a voice at an international level through our links with UN agencies and bodies.

Each society is autonomous and may take individual action as it desires.

i-LEaD - Indiana Leadership and Development

The i-LEaD program is designed for the new, emerging leader who wishes to grow in his/her confidence and leadership skills. The program has three levels and the levels must be taken in succession.

LEVEL I – Personal Leadership. Focuses on the individual. Participants will develop an understanding of leadership, assess their own skills, and develop a personal philosophy of leadership.

LEVEL II – Interpersonal Leadership. Focuses on the you and me. Participants focus on the development of communication skills, team building, and group decision-making and trust.

LEVEL III – Group Leadership. Focuses on community. Participants grow in their ability to become leaders by studying effective boards and committees and how to develop.

I-LEaD is an individual leadership development program. You need not be a member of a team to attend or any previous training. The objective is to have you grow in your leadership ability.







CONSTITUTION OF KOSCIUSKO COUNTY EXTENSION HOMEMAKERS

(Revised January 2022)

ARTICLE I Name

The name of this organization shall be the Kosciusko County Extension Homemakers Association, affiliated with Purdue Extension Service.

ARTICLE II Objectives

The objectives are to promote the study and teaching of Health and Human Sciences in the home, the public school, and the community, through continuing education; to encourage 4-H club work for youth; to provide volunteer support for any home or community betterment project; and to promote leadership development.

ARTICLE III Membership

Membership in this organization is open to all persons regardless of race, color, sex, religion, national origin, age, or disability.

ARTICLE IV Dues

The county dues shall be established by the Executive Board, due and payable on a date designated by the Executive Board. This date will be in the program book. Members belonging to more than one club will pay county and state dues only once. Local club dues will be paid to each club.

Anyone joining an Extension Homemaker club from July 1 – December 31 pays full dues. Anyone joining after December 31 will pay half dues for the remainder of the club year. Dues are not refundable

ARTICLE V Officers

Section 1 – Anyone making application for a county office must have served as a local club president except Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer, which must have served in that role at the local club level.

Section 2 – Officers of this association shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, and Past President. They shall be elected by April 1st, but shall not take office until July 1st.

Section 3 – The Executive Board shall consist of all officers as listed in Section 2. They shall attend all President's Council meetings; assist in organizing new clubs; act on matters of an emergency nature; with the newly elected officers, decide on the budget; decide on county membership dues; set up goals for the new year; and review officer and committee duties.

Section 4 – The President's Council shall consist of the Executive Board and the local club presidents.

Section 5 – The President (or proxy) of each club shall have one vote.

Section 6 – Any eligible members of the Kosciusko County Extension Homemakers Association may be elected to serve, not to exceed two (2) years in the same county office.

Section 7 – If vacancies occur in the Executive board, replacements shall be made by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE VI Duties of Officers

Section 1 – The President shall preside at all Council and Executive meetings; appoint all committee chairmen; and have general supervision of all matters pertaining to the interests of this association.

Section 2 – The Vice President shall perform all the duties of the President in her absence, and help out assist whenever possible to prepare for the following year.

Section 3 – The Secretary shall keep a record of the minutes for each meeting, and read the minutes when requested. The Secretary shall conduct correspondence as directed by the President.

Section 4 – The Treasurer shall keep a roll of the association membership and be custodian of all association funds and shall pay all bills authorized by the budget. Additional expenditures not in the budget need to be voted on by the Executive Board. The books shall be audited once each year by the audit committee.

Section 5 – The Assistant Treasurer shall chair the Fundraising committee and assist the Treasurer in any way possible.

Section 6 – Recommendations of duties for officers and committee chairmen in the Association will be on file in the Purdue Extension Office and in the County President's files.

ARTICLE VII Meetings

There shall be no less than four meeting dates set by the Executive Board for the President's Council. The Executive Board will meet as needed.

ARTICLE VIII Committees

Section 1 – The county president and the Extension Educator, Health and Human Sciences, are ex-officio members of all committees.

Section 2 – Standing committees will get recommendations for activities from the state and local officers. Ad Hoc committees may be appointed by the President as necessary with prior approval by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IX Dissolution

Kosciusko County Extension Homemakers will, in the case of dissolution, assign all assets to a Kosciusko County charity.

ARTICLE X Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a majority vote of the President's Council present at any regular meeting and must be in the minutes of the previous meeting.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I Quorum

A majority of the Executive Board and the President's Council members present shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE II Rules of Order

The business of the Association shall be conducted under the revised Robert's Rules of Order.

COINS FOR FRIENDSHIP

Coins for Friendship is a voluntary contribution made of local clubs. The funds are used to promote better understanding, good-will, and friendship among the women of the world. Donations are shared between the state IEHA and the ACWW and CWC for their ongoing projects. Funds retained in the state are used for the Exchange Homemaker Program, as well as donations to the International Peace Gardens, Elsie Zimmer Memorial Fund, and the international meetings. Funds forwarded to ACWW and CWC are joined by funds from other countries and are used to help support grants given by the United Nations for field work in developing countries or informing member societies of help available through these grants. They help ACWW members speak for rural women and homemakers at UN meetings or arrange seminars in literacy, nutrition, and child care in developing nations. These funds are used around the world for projects that provide skill training for women, fight disease and malnutrition, and provide safe water. "Coins for Friendship" donations are due to IEHA State Treasurer by June 15th. The County Treasurer needs to receive these donations, along with the dues, by May 1st. The donations are divided as follows:

60% to General Funds

25% ACWW and CWC

15% to Scholarship & Exchange Homemaker Fund

NICKELS FOR LEADERSHIP - helps Indiana clubs!

Nickels for Leadership is a voluntary contribution and is used for leadership workshops for our Indiana members.

District and regional workshops are planned for any interested IEHA member. Extension Homemakers are very generous with scholarships for others, and Nickels for Leadership provides leadership training and self-enrichment for county officers and members. This contribution will benefit our organization by offering the members continuing training. This is a voluntary contribution and may be sent to the county treasurer along with your dues each year.

History of Indiana Extension Homemakers

ADOPTED BY INDIANA LEGISLATURE

MARCH 11,1963

In 1910, Purdue University gave leadership to organize home economics extension in Indiana. Families were contacted through Farmer's Institutes. Women's auxiliaries grew out of this movement and from this, the home economics clubs developed. Leaders in the counties initiated classes for farm women. In 1919, there were 10 classes. These groups later became known as home economic clubs and now are known as extension homemakers.

In 1913, the women leaders from various counties in attendance at a conference at Purdue University voted to organize a State Home Economics Association for the purpose of encouraging more co-educational groups for homemakers and to promote the teaching of "domestic science" in the local schools.

By 1927, a total of 389 extension clubs with a total of 10,142 members were established. The Indiana Extension service is the largest organized program of its kind in the nation. It is sponsored by Purdue University and Kosciusko County.

Currently, extension consumer and family science programs, activities and events (including those in club leader training, special events, and activities) are provided to all clientele and on a non-discriminatory basis without regard to race, color, or national origin, sex, or handicap.

Organizational Structure of Indiana Homemakers Clubs

Local Members belong to local Extension Homemaker Clubs. Members are represented by County Extension Homemaker Councils in 10 Districts which includes our Michigan City District, made up of Elkhart, Kosciusko, Lake, LaPorte, Marshall, Porter, Starke, and St. Joseph counties.

Ten districts make up the Indiana Extension Homemakers Association (IEHA). IEHA joins other states in the National Volunteer Outreach Network (NVON) with membership in the Associated Country Women of the World (ACWW) and Country Women's Council (CWC).

Kosciusko County belongs to the Michigan City District whose current District Representative is Michelle Blough.
