Current County Presidents had the opportunity to meet incoming District President Cathy Wilkymacky, a retired children's librarian. DeeAnna proudly led the Pledge, and the Treasurer's Report by Brenda Mestach reflected a healthy balance of \$2,046.89. The group learned about *A Rosie Place for Children*, a cause we supported with both tangible and monetary donations. A highlight of the day was a lively and practical session with Kristen Sharpe of Sharpe Realty on "How to Declutter Your House." Her best advice? Start with an *area*, not your whole house. 

# Spring Fling 2025: A Right Royal Celebration – Queen for a Day



# Port-A-Pit Fundraiser



The Kosciusko County Extension Homemakers held their Nelson's Chicken BBQ Fundraiser on May 9<sup>th</sup>, 2025. The clubs sold 537 chicken presale tickets and 180 presale potatoes. This was down from last year in both categories. We decreased the number of cases of potatoes, but decided to order 1000 chickens once again.

It was a beautiful but chilly day, which we were thankful for, although a few of us went home sunburned. Due to our traffic cones, and our own personal traffic cop (DeeAnna) we were able to end the day without any vehicular accidents.

We were there the latest we have ever been, cleaning up after 5:30, but gone by about 6:00. Several of us there were planning and willing to purchase additional chickens and potatoes at the end of the day if there were extra, which we did.

Presale ticket money and donations collected equaled \$6395.00, the day of the sale we took in \$6375.00 for a total deposit of 12,770.00, minus the \$7534.00 invoice from Nelson's, minus \$300.00 to start the cash box left us with a total of \$4936.00. This total is a little over what we made last year, but day of sale we were gifted 190.00 in donations, which accounts

for some of the increase.

I want to thank all of you that worked that day for a 2 hour shift, Shannon Shepherd and especially Sue Martin and our awesome board. They were there all day with me and I depend on them and their individual strengths.

I enjoyed working with all of you, and look forward to doing it again next year on May 1st, a week earlier than in past years due to Nelson's already having someone on their schedule for the second Friday in May. I know! Don't they know that's OUR Friday?? The nerve! Anyway, remember to thank J. B. Furniture for sharing their parking lot with us and other groups in our community for these

sales.


