Educational Post:

Spring & Summer Allergies: What Older Adults Should Know

As flowers bloom and trees green up, pollen levels rise—bringing seasonal allergies with them. For older adults, these allergies can be more than just a nuisance.

Why it matters:

- Symptoms like congestion and fatigue can mimic or worsen other conditions.
- Chronic illnesses (like asthma, COPD, or heart disease) can be aggravated by allergic reactions.
- Some allergy medications may interact with prescriptions or cause drowsiness and confusion.

Tips to stay comfortable and safe:

- Monitor local pollen forecasts and limit outdoor time on high-count days.
- Use saline sprays and HEPA filters to keep airways clear and clean.
- Consult your doctor before starting any new allergy medication.

Staying proactive with allergy care helps you stay active, social, and feeling your best all season long!

Recipe Corner



Bow Tie Pasta Salad

Yields: 10-12 serving(s) | Prep Time: 10 mins | Total Time: 15 mins

Ingredients

1/2 tsp. kosher salt, plus more for pasta water
1 lb. bow tie pasta
1 1/2 cups frozen peas
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup sour cream or Greek yogurt
1/4 cup olive oil
1/4 cup chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley
3 Tbsp. yellow mustard
2 Tbsp. fresh lemon juice
1 tsp. honey
1/2 tsp. ground black pepper
1/2 lb. deli ham, cubed
1/2 lb. cheddar cheese, cubed
1 red bell pepper, chopped
4 green onions, sliced thin



Directions

1. Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil. Add the pasta and cook for 1 minute longer than package directions. In the last minute of cooking, add the peas to the boiling water with the pasta. Drain, rinse with cold water, and let cool.
2. In a very large bowl, whisk together the mayonnaise, sour cream, oil, parsley, mustard, lemon juice, honey, salt, and pepper until well combined. Fold in the pasta, peas, ham, cheese, bell pepper, and green onion.
3. Cover and refrigerate until ready to eat.

Tip: If you don't have time to make your own dressing, use 1 ¾ cups of your favorite creamy bottled salad dressing.

Coffee Filter Hydrangeas

Materials Needed:

- Scissors
- Pencil
- Baking Sheet
- 12 Coffee Filters
- Small bowls
- Water
- Eye dropper
- Liquid watercolor paint
- Glue gun
- Green pipe cleaner

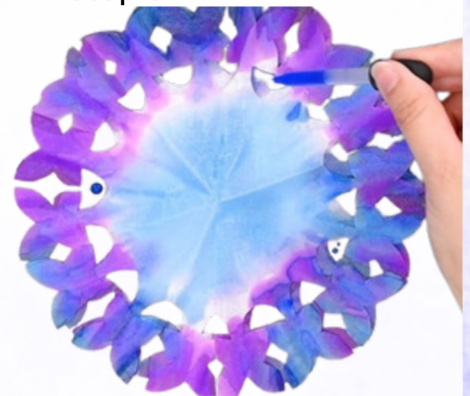
Instructions:

1. Begin by creating a stack of two coffee filters. Fold each filter in half, then fold them in half again, and repeat this process two more times.
2. On the top (open) section of the filters, sketch petal shapes, this should look like a butterfly shape with a tree trunk coming out of the bottoms. Carefully cut out the petal designs. Unfold the filters once, then snip between the petals to separate them. Continue unfolding and cutting until all petals are distinct.
3. Repeat step 2 to cut a total of 12 filters.
4. Layer 4 filters on a baking sheet.
5. In a small bowl, mix 10 drops of liquid watercolor paint with about 2 tablespoons of water. Do this for any additional colors you wish to use (the photo below features blue and purple).
6. Using an eye dropper, apply blue paint to the center of the filters, then surround it with purple on the outer petals, alternating between the colors.
7. Allow the filters to dry overnight or place them in a low-temperature oven to speed up the process.
8. Attach the first coffee filter to a pipe cleaner stem. Bend the end of the pipe cleaner (about 1/4 inch) to create a closed "U" shape.
9. Insert the single end of the pipe cleaner through the center of one filter (you may need to cut a small hole in the center of each filter for easier passage).
10. Pull the pipe cleaner through until the filter reaches the end of the "U."
11. Apply a few dots of hot glue around the pipe cleaner.
12. Gently scrunch the bottom center of the filter, shaping it into a "V" form. Hold the coffee filter in place until the glue sets. Continue this process with all but the last few filters.
13. For the remaining filters, scrunch them in the opposite direction to create an upside-down "V." You can add hot glue to the base of the final coffee filter to simplify attachment.
14. After adding the last filter, fluff the flower and separate the petals so they appear natural. Your beautiful hydrangea is now complete!

WHEN TO PLANT PERENNIALS:

You can plant perennials anytime, but the best time to plant is fall and spring. This allows the plant to get well-established before winter or very hot, dry summers. We prefer fall because the soil is already warmed. Planting in the summer is okay, but you'll need to water frequently.

JUNE

Named for the Roman goddess Juno, patroness of marriage and the well-being of women.

7 FACTS ABOUT THE JUNE SOLSTICE:

1. "Solstice" derives from Latin, meaning the Sun "stands still" as it reaches its northernmost point.
2. The Sun stops advancing north at the Tropic of Cancer, named for its past position in the constellation Cancer.
3. The Sun's path on the solstice is curved, unlike its straight path during equinoxes.
4. The midday Sun is highest but is gradually getting lower due to Earth's decreasing tilt.
5. The longest day isn't the latest sunset or earliest sunrise; those occur before and after the solstice.
6. In India, the solstice marks the end of a 6-month period of easier spiritual growth.
7. The Sun rises farthest left and sets farthest right, illuminating unique spots in homes.

BONUS SUN-THEMED FACTS:

1. The Sun primarily emits infrared energy, which we feel as heat.
2. Among visible emissions, green light is the strongest, making our eyes most sensitive to that color.

Weather Almanac

HAIL

Hail forms in strong thunderstorms with intense updrafts and high moisture. Updrafts carry raindrops to cold areas of the cloud where they freeze into ice. These ice particles can gain additional layers from supercooled water before falling as hail when too heavy for the updrafts to support. Stronger updrafts result in larger hailstones.

WEATHER HISTORY:

- **May 1, 1972:** Severe summer drought began in the eastern US, lasting until September.
- **May 22, 1980:** Temperature reached 106°F in Williston, South Dakota.
- **May 24, 1990:** A tornado in Barton County, Kansas, blew 88 railroad cars off the tracks.
- **May 29, 1986:** Hailstones up to 3 inches caused over \$65 million in damages in Montreal, Quebec.
- **May 31, 1889:** Johnstown, Pennsylvania, experienced the worst flood disaster in US history, resulting in over 2,100 deaths.

INTENSITY SCALE:

- **H0:** Pea size, no damage
- **H1:** Leaves & petals punctured/torn
- **H2:** Leaves ripped from trees/plants
- **H3:** Glass panes broken; cars dented
- **H4:** Windows broken; small branches broken
- **H5:** Windows smashed; small animals injured; large branches broken
- **H6:** Shingles breached; metal roofs scored; wooden frames broken
- **H7:** Roofs shattered; cars seriously damaged
- **H8:** Roofs destroyed; small trunks split; serious injuries
- **H9:** Concrete roofs broken; large trunks split; risk of fatalities
- **H10:** Brick houses damaged; high risk of fatalities

TORNADOES

Tornadoes form from severe thunderstorms, particularly supercells, which have a rotating updraft known as a mesocyclone. They develop when warm, moist surface air meets cooler, dry air, creating atmospheric instability. Wind shear causes the rising air to rotate horizontally, and as the storm strengthens, this rotation can tilt vertically, leading to the formation of a tornado when it reaches the ground.

WEATHER HISTORY:

- **June 6, 1982:** Connecticut & Rhode Island received 5-10 inches of rainfall in 24 hours
- **June 11, 1939:** a tornado struck St. Jean-sur-Richelieu, Quebec, damaging houses and trees, and affecting decorations for King George and Queen Elizabeth's visit the next day.
- **June 16, 1957:** a 10-day heat wave ended with 3 days of 100°F in Valley Forge, Pennsylvania.
- **June 16, 1984:** a flash flood carried 64 cars a quarter-mile in Westby, Wisconsin.

INTENSITY SCALE:

- EF0:** Light damage | 65-85 MPH
- EF1:** Moderate damage | 86-110 MPH
- EF2:** Considerable damage | 111-135 MPH
- EF3:** Severe damage | 136-165 MPH
- EF4:** Devastating damage | 166-200 MPH
- EF5:** Incredible damage | over 200 MPH
- The original F scale was developed by Theodore Fujita to classify tornadoes based on wind damage. An Enhanced F scale (EF) was implemented in the US in 2007. The EF scale uses 3-second gust estimates based on a more detailed system for assessing damage, taking into account different building materials,
