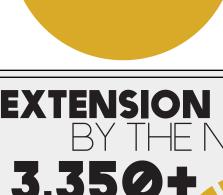

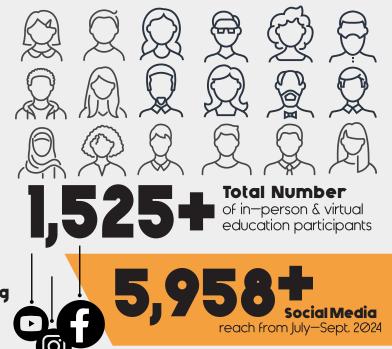

Lawrence County Community Involvement

Lawrence County Baby Shower

Purdue Extension-Lawrence County had a presence at the Lawrence County Community Baby Shower on August 17 at Hope Resource Center. Meal kits were purchased by IU Health Bedford for participants of the Baby Shower. Funding and bags for the food were provided by Caresource. The Purdue Extension-Lawrence County CWC provided

guidance on the recipe selected and distributed the meals at the event. A total of 23 vendors participated and 88 moms were signed up to attend.



The Arc Lawrence County

In September the CWC was contacted by The Arc Lawrence County to present education to their clients and staff about nutrition. The Nutrition Education Program Advisor (NEPA), J.J. Goldsberry talked with the group about healthy snacks and provided about 35 people with a sample snack of sliced apples and pumpkin yogurt dip. The lesson led to a request for another in October that will be taught by the Lawrence County Health and Human Sciences Educator. We are excited for this new partnership and look forward to working more with The Arc in the future.





Food For Health Program

In July, a Food as Medicine program was offered to residents at Cambridge Square Apartments. The Community Wellness Coordinator, Annie Eakin, received funding for this program from a Lawrence County Community Foundation Pennington Grant. Funding was utilized to purchase meal kits prepared by Lost River Market and delivered to residents who registered for the program. For four weeks, participants engaged in lessons from the Eat Smart, Live Strong (ESLS) curriculum. Taught our Nutrition Education Program Advisor (NEPA), this curriculum is designed to help older adults improve their health and well-being by increasing their fruit and vegetable consumption while participating in daily physical activity. The NEPA demonstrated preparations of the food.

Each week, a new recipe was introduced and participants were taught how to add vegetables to common or familiar meals. One such meal was Garden Sloppy Joes. Traditionally, we think of Sloppy Joe as meat, sauce, and bun, but the recipe added diced vegetables to make the meal more filling and healthier. On average, 30 residents participated and received meal kits. Residents were excited to go home with supplies and knowledge to make the meal. When the NEPA returned, the residents shared how much they enjoyed the their meal kits and it's preparations.

4-H Junior Leader Officer Retreat

In September, Lawrence County 4-H hosted a successful Junior Leader Officer Retreat to kick off the new 4-H year. The retreat, attended by the eight elected officers of the Junior Leaders, provided a comprehensive leadership training experience. Using a statewide curriculum she

co-authored, our 4-H
Educator led the
retreat, ensuring the
officers were
well-prepared to lead
their peers throughout
the year. This
curriculum, which
focuses on developing
core leadership skills,



specific officer roles, teamwork, and personal growth, was presented by the Educator at the National Extension Conference on Volunteerism earlier this spring.

The need for such leadership programming is critical. Research shows that teen leadership opportunities, such as the Junior Leaders, foster important life skills, including communication, problem-solving, and responsibility. These programs not only benefit the individual participants but also strengthen the broader 4-H community, by creating a pipeline of engaged, empowered youth leaders. As these teens transition into leadership roles, they model positive behavior for younger members and contribute to a more vibrant and inclusive 4-H program.

This retreat marks the beginning of a year-long journey for our Junior Leaders to grow as individuals, serve the community, and support the development of their peers in Lawrence County 4-H.

Yoga and Mindfulness Program-Hoosier Uplands Afterschool

In September, Extension Educators delivered a yoga and mindfulness program to approximately 50 students, K-5, at Mitchell Schools. The program introduced basic yoga poses that student can practice daily to calm their minds, slow their

breathing, and relax their bodies. These techniques were highlighted as valuable tools for managing feelings of anxiety, fear, anger, or worry.

During the session, they discussed the importance of mindfulness in maintaining overall health and staying present. Yoga, which requires focus on both the body and mind, serves as an ideal activity for practicing mindfulness. The students were highly

engaged, participating enthusiastically in the exercises. Each child created and took home a self-drawn page featuring three of their favorite yoga poses, encouraging them to continue practicing at home or in school.

This initiative is part of Purdue Extension– Lawrence County's ongoing commitment to providing social and emotional learning programs throughout the school year. In collaboration with the Hoosier Uplands After School Program, educators will continue the partnership by offering similar monthly programs, equipping children with strategies to enhance their emotional well-being and physical health.





AGRICULTURE & NATURAL RESOURCES



Land of Limestone Master Gardeners

The Master Gardener Program in Lawrence County is a community-driven initiative designed to enhance gardening knowledge and promote sustainable horticultural practices. Sponsored by Purdue University, the program trains volunteers in various aspects of horticulture, including plant care, soil health, pest management, and sustainable gardening techniques.

Certified Master Gardeners share their expertise through outreach activities such as workshops, demonstrations, and community gardening projects. They collaborate with local schools to establish educational gardens, teaching students about nutrition and environmental stewardship. Some recent activities in which the Land of Limestone (LOL) Master Gardeners have

participated in leading are lessons at Green Thumb Garden Club and tending to the donation garden with Lawrence County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD). The garden resulted in donating 398.4 lbs of produce to L.I.F.E. Food Pantry and Becky's Place. Additionally, Master Gardeners support community gardens that provide fresh produce to underserved populations, improving food security in the area. In the last three months LOL Master Gardeners have contributed almost 200 hours of volunteer time, along with almost 100 additional hours furthering their education.

The program not only enriches the community's agricultural knowledge but also fosters connections among residents, promoting collaboration and shared learning. By empowering local volunteers, the Master Gardener Program contributes to a healthier, more sustainable community in Lawrence County.
