

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# Cheer Plates Help Bring Our Friends and Neighbors a Brighter Day Home and Hobby Club

Another project Home & Hobby has undertaken for many years is Cheer Plates. Except for the years when the pandemic upset the apple cart, we'd pick a winter month and plan to bring in 3-4 dozen cookies to share. A member would bring bananas, mandarin oranges and apples to add to the gifts. After our regular February meeting on Valen-

tine's Day, the ladies set the different cookies around the table at Kepler's and made sure one of each variety was placed on a plate in a bag. This year Norma Clark brought along felted hearts she'd sewed that were also added in. Following the meeting, several members delivered goodies to those they wanted to



remember. Long visits were often as valuable to the recipient as the treats.



children living in the dump. The supplies and uniforms these children will use for school will be free if their parents volunteer a few hours a month. Although there are gangs around, the school is a safe zone. Honduran hospitals do not have food service, and people cannot afford to stay in hotels while they await their loved ones' healing, so they sleep outside. The mission women fed the folks at the hospital, and they visited the maternity ward where they handed out clothing, diapers and receiving blankets, some made by the ladies of Home & Hobby. They mentored at risk kids that can easily fall through the cracks, as schools don't call parents or authorities with kids don't show up to class. They encouraged teen girls to stay in school, put God first rather than let a man lead them down a bad path. Rachel enjoyed seeing the monkeys and hearing their wakeup calls at 5:30 each morning.

Lisa shared how she first took a mission trip to Honduras in 1982, and she returned for five years, marrying a local man, but then having to leave there since she'd been very ill with malaria five times in one year while carrying their daughter. She shared her love for this third world country that industrialization is very slow to touch. She in particular wants to help young girls there, so she has funded a nonprofit named Flores Y Mariposas (Flowers and Butterflies) to help transform junior high and high school girls and keep them a bit safer from pedophiles.

On display were items from Honduras including items made of Mahogany which grows there. The little dresses and receiving

blankets made by Home & Hobby were also on display. After some visiting, the meeting dispersed around 8:30. Thank you to Rebecca, Rachel, Gabby, Lisa and others who helped bring this program and meal to us.



#### International Night Educates Attendees on Honduras

Thirty-seven Extension Homemakers and their guests met at Memories Banquet Hall Thursday, March 16 at 6 PM to taste the wonderful food of Honduras. Speakers Gabby Umbaugh, Lisa Flores and Rachel Hartman prepared it all for us...parboiled then fried yucca, empanadas, enchiladas, Honduran tacos and bread, Tres Leches cake and flan along with homemade lemonade actually made with limes, Horchata and Honduran coffee. The food was tasty and the company excellent.

Rebecca Hartman emceed the program. County President Sandy Feece welcomed everyone, and Norma Clark gave an invocation before we partook. Then Gabby shared about the physical features of her beloved home country. It's only the size of Tennessee and has a population between 700,00-800,000. Their tropical climate grows the most wonderful fruits year around. She misses bananas, pineapple, mangoes, coconuts and watermelon, saying ours just do not compare. Her country also grows coffee, chocolate, sugar cane and palm oil. They got their first female president last year.

Rachel enlightened us on the day-by-day work that was undertaken on a missionary trip she, Gabby and Lisa took with four other women in late January. They visited the city dump, taking food to the people who live there with no running water and only piled trash for their shelters. They helped build a classroom for the

We'd learned that newborns were being sent home from their hospitals in paper bags, so we started stockpiling flannel and serging the edges to give these tiny children a better start in life. dresses to Honduras and got pictures of the girls modeling their new clothes.

We're still working on these items that get shipped to Honduras monthly, but we also are making breast cancer pillows, gowns for Hospice patients, baby blankets that help new moms locally and lap robes for residents at local homes. The weather this year has allowed us to meet every Tuesday which is quite a blessing.

We enjoy passing the time visiting, and Doris makes sure the water gets heated for tea and everyone knows when it's lunch time. The ladies have been meeting

like this for many many years and have benefited many organizations in Plymouth, Rochester and other local communities. Between 3:30 and 4, the table gets down-sized, tools and fabric placed away and everyone leaves until the following Tuesday.

From February 1, 2022 to January 31, 2023, we made: 31 hospital gowns, 68 lap robes, 35 cancer pillows, 27 baby blankets, 179 clothing protectors (for Marshall-Starke), 97 burp cloths, 229 receiving blankets, 75 baby book bags (that Marshall County Reading Council fills with books for newborns at our local hospitals), a doll blanket and bear and 27 little dresses. In addition, other members put together 12



bags of goodies that are handed to those who adopt cats and dogs at the Humane Society. In all, we have disbursed 782 products in a year.
