

4-H HISTORY

Over 100 years ago, 4-H began and has since grown into the largest youth development program in the nation. It prepares young people to be leaders in their community and around the world through hands-on experiences alongside their peers and caring adults. Backed by a network of more than 6 million youth, 540,000 adult volunteers, 3,500 professionals, and more than 60 million alumni, 4-H delivers research-based programming around positive youth development. Reaching every corner of our nation 4-H is delivered through America's 109 land-grant universities and the Cooperative Extension Service. In Indiana, 4-H can be found in all 92 counties as delivered through Purdue Extension. Community clubs, afterschool programs, school enrichment, camps/workshops, and special programs are all ways youth across Indiana can be involved with the 4-H program.

HOW DO I JOIN?

4-H enrollment opens on October 1 every year. Enroll online at v2.4honline.com.

Interested individuals need to visit v2.4honline.com to create a profile, select clubs and sign up for projects. For help selecting a club check out the next section! Returning members will log into their v2.4honline.com account, enroll for the upcoming year, and make any necessary changes.

The 4-H program is open to all youth in grades 3-12 and has a \$20 annual program fee. Mini 4-H is available to any youth in grades K-2 with no fee to enroll.

What's the difference between v2.4honline.com and FairEntry.com online systems?

v2.4honline.com is the online registration system for all youth who enroll in the 4-H program. v2.4honline enrollment opens October 1st annually. This system collects your program fees and allows members and volunteers to sign up for 4-H projects, clubs, and opportunities. Members will also utilize their 4honline profile to submit scholarships and to register for events, programs, and trips.

FairEntry is a system to help organize the 4-H Fair, print exhibitor labels, and make show bills among other tasks. FairEntry tells exactly what projects will be exhibited at the fair. The FairEntry program opens in early June and closes around the 20th of June. All members exhibiting will login to FairEntry and sign up using descriptive details for the exhibits so that classes and judging can be completed. All exhibitors sign-up their exhibits in their respective classes.

4honline and FairEntry save information and profiles making it easier for returning members! Members may add or drop projects every year.

The Learning Experiences

4-H is about creating experiences that help youth, and adults, learn in new ways and gain new experiences. Below, you will find the general learning experiences while involved in the 4-H program:

4-H Meetings

are held for a variety of reasons. Most organized community clubs meet monthly to discuss general business, conduct recreation, and learn something new. Some groups may meet more often.

4-H Projects...

should fit individual member's interests and into the member's home and community life. By "project" we mean work done with articles made, crops grown, animals, or some other definite undertaking planned and carried out by the 4-H'er. The Extension Office will provide a list of projects available to members and leaders. Through project work, 4-H members can learn improved ways of doing things, which serve as examples for others and for the community. Members can also learn about subjects that interest them as possible career choices.





4-H Activites

such as demonstrations, public speaking, exhibiting, and tours that center on 4-H projects. They supplement the project and add greater depth to it. Various activities related to project areas are planned and conducted on county, state, and national levels. Singing at a nursing home, playing softball, and making dog toys/treats for a local humane society are all examples of these types of activities.



4-H Events

are most often thought of as once-a-year happenings, such as an annual recognition program for youth and adults, a music/drama festival, a family 4-H picnic, the fair, state level competitions or summer camp. During these types of events, 4-H members might present aspects of their 4-H projects and activity work. Career Development Events such as Skill-A-Thon are open to new members.



What Clubs are Right For Me?





Any 4-Her can be in one or as many clubs as they wish! Clubs provide the opportunity for face-to-face project review/questions, community service, program updates, and much more. Club meeting attendance is not required to be in 4-H, but we encourage members to attend their club meetings.

All 4-H Clubs will pass along important program updates. However, some clubs are dedicated to special interest areas and others are general community clubs.



Fall Achievement Awards

OUTSTANDING LEADERSHIP (2): Two awards to 4-H'ers that demonstrate outstanding leadership, enthusiasm and drive to get things done in the 4-H Program, school and community. They must be a Martin County Junior Leader.

OUTSTANDING 4-H AGRICULTURE: This award will go to the 4-Her that has the highest annual points in the Agricultural related activities/projects for the current 4-H year. Activities/projects include: Career Development Events reported on the annual point sheet. Completed projects of: Animal Education, Beef, Cat, Dairy, Dairy Beef, Dairy Goats, Dog, Horse and Pony, Llama and Alpaca, Meat Goats, Poultry, Pygmy Goats, Rabbit, Sheep, Swine, Veterinary Science, Lawn & Garden Tractor Safety Operator Skills, Tractor Safety & Operator Skills, Zero-Turn Safety & Operator Skills, Woodworking. 4-H members must complete at least 5 of the projects listed to be considered for this award.

OUTSTANDING 4-H EXPRESSIVE ARTS: This award will go to the 4-Her that has the highest annual points in the Expressive Arts record for the current year. The projects include: Arts and Crafts, Cake Decorating, Construction & Architectural Replica, Fine Arts, Llama and Alpaca Craft, Model Craft, Needle Craft, Performing Arts & Photography. 4-H members must complete at least 3 of the projects listed to be considered for this award

OUTSTANDING 4-H FAMILY & CONSUMER SCIENCE: This award will go to the 4-Her that has the highest annual points in the Family & Consumer Science record for the current year. The projects include: Cake Decorating, Consumer Clothing, Fashion Revue, Garden, Home Environment, Sewing, Non-Wearable, Sewing, Wearable, Child Development, Foods, Baked, Foods, Preserved & Health. 4-H members must complete at least 3 of the projects listed to be considered for this award.

OUTSTANDING 4-H CONSERVATION OF NATURAL RESOURCES: This award will go to the 4-Her that has the highest annual points in the Natural Resources record for the current year. The projects include: Beekeeping, Entomology, Floriculture, Garden, Forestry, Geology, Shooting Sports, Soil & Water Science, Weather & Climate Science & Wildlife. 4-H members must complete at least 3 of the projects listed to be considered for this award.

HORSE & PONY 4-H JR. HIGH POINT: One Junior Horse & Pony 4-H member who has the highest points in the Horse & Pony project during the current year.

HORSE & PONY 4-H SR. HIGH POINT: One Senior Horse & Pony 4-H member who has the highest points in the Horse & Pony project during the current year.

HORSE & PONY 4-H MENTAL ATTITUDE AWARD: The 4-H member who best exhibits the following: leadership; personal responsibility; staying positive in word and deed; encouragement and assistance to others, especially as a new or younger member.

4-H ACHIEVEMENT (2): The highest over-all 4-H accumulative points in county (two recipients). Includes all 4-H related activities the 4-H members participated in, including this years' 4-H program year as verified on completed annual point sheet.

OUTSTANDING 4-H FIRST YEAR MEMBERS (2): This award will go to two youth 4-H members who are in their first year as regular 4-H members. This award includes projects completed, activities, placing's, special awards and record book grades as verified on completed annual point sheet.

OUTSTANDING 4-H SIXTH YEAR MEMBERS (2): This award will go to the two youth 4-Hers who have the most total points accumulated during their six years of participating in the 4-H Program. The point total includes projects completed, activities, placing's, and special awards as verified on completed annual point sheet.

TOP NOTCH 4-H 10 YEAR MEMBER: This award will go to the 4-Her who has the most total points accumulated during their ten years of participating in the 4-H Program. The point total includes projects completed, activities, placing, and special awards as verified on completed annual point sheet.

OUTSTANDING 4-H LIVESTOCK BUYER: The recognition is awarded to the top buyer at the 4-H Auction. This award can be won by the same individual or business in consecutive years.

For Parents: Why 4-H?

FOR PARENTS: Why 4-H?



4-H Parents/Guardians

Parents are encouraged to share their different talents, means, and available time with the 4-H Program. Not all people do the same thing well. It takes some analysis to find who can and will do certain tasks. For example, the parent who will never appear in a public meeting may be willing to build a booth or float, etc.

The most successful 4-H members have the interest and support of their parents or another caring adult. Often parents are willing to help, but are not sure how, when, or where they may get involved. Below are some suggestions for how parents can support 4-H members at home and in the community. We embrace learn by doing for all!

- **1.** Learn about the 4-H Program what it stands for, how it operates, how it is funded.
- **2.** Advise your child in selecting 4-H projects. Help your child understand how many projects will be reasonable to complete in a given year.
- **3. Show your interest** in and enthusiasm for the projects selected. Find out what is suggested for the members to do and learn in that project(s).
- 4. See that when a project is started, it is also completed.
- **5. Know and help your member meet all deadlines!** Deadlines are in place to provide an equitable and organized 4-H program; your help is needed.
- 6. **Be an example!** Help your 4-H member be a good sport and appreciate the successes of others.
- 7. Encourage your 4-H member when they succeed and even more when they fail. Help them see progress achieved and knowledge gained, not just the end result.
- 8. Stay informed about 4-H through information that comes to members of your family. Be a 4-H booster in your community.
- 9. Make 4-H club work FAMILY work. Encourage youth to do their work and carry their own tasks to completion. Be their guide only.

- 10. Provide transportation to local meetings and county events in which your child and others of the club are interested. Or, provide refreshments for meetings or special functions.
- **11. Attend 4-H meetings** and other special events.
- **12.** Help your **4-H** member find a way to participate in special events that interest them such as county contests, camps, fairs, displays, shows, etc.
- **13.** Support your local 4-H volunteers. Get acquainted with them. Let them know you appreciate their efforts.
- **14. Offer your services** to assist the local volunteer. You have knowledge and skills that are needed in 4-H.
- **15.** If the need arises, **help find local volunteers for your 4-H club.** Several kinds of volunteers are needed: organizational, project, and more. Consider helping in one of these ways yourself. Applications are available in your local Extension Office.



4-H Opportunities

4-H members can take part in short-term specific interest workshops that focus on anything from robotics to food science! 4-H members also have access to numerous scholarships, educational opportunities, and can build life skills through community involvement. Most of all, 4-H is real life experience which is exemplified by our motto, "Learn by Doing."

4-H Activities

Trips: A variety of fun learning trip opportunities are available. They are often offered at low or no costs thanks to generous sponsors. Some popular trips are:

4-H Round-Up: students in grades 7-9 who explore a variety of careers at Purdue University. Participants will get a taste of college life and live in Purdue Residence Halls for two nights. Attendees meet new people across the state and have a blast!

4-H Academy: a program held at Purdue University specifically designed to offer high school students hands-on, exciting opportunities to learn about science and related careers.

Citizenship Washington Focus: This is an exciting experience for high school 4-H members to go to the nation's capital and learn more about the meaning of citizenship. Listening, learning, sharing, receiving, caring and touring combine to provide a deeper respect and understanding for our American heritage and the principles, processes and structures of the U.S. government.

Camp: Youth in grades 3-8 attend a three day 4-H Camp and participate in swimming, boating, crafts, and more. Older 4-H members have the opportunity to serve as camp counselors.

Scholarships: Several educational scholarships are available for 4-H youth. Workshops are held annually to help 4-H members prepare applications.

Junior Leaders: Youth in grades 7-12 can participate in the Jr. Leaders to develop leadership skills and expand their relationships. Members organize and conduct a variety of activities, participate in community service projects, and have fun.

Performing Arts Festival: Have talents? 4-H members may perform a skit, play a musical instrument, dance, or perform gymnastics. May be individual or group performances.

Judging Contests: 4-H members compete in livestock skill-a-thon, dairy, horse and pony, soils, entomology, crops, forestry, and/or wildlife judging contests.

Spark Clubs: Short-term educational experiences are based on a specific topic area in a presentation called Spark Clubs. Topics vary, such as Robotics, Agricultural, Journalism, Theater, Hiking, Babysitting, and Veterinary Basics.

Verbal Communication & Demonstration: Effective communication drives all aspects of day-to-day life. 4-H members learn about the process of communications and the different modes of communication and strengthen their own communication skills.

4-H Vocabulary

4-H

The youth development program of Extension designed for young people Kindergarten through twelfth grades; members participate in clubs, activities, and events and complete project work with a group or on their own.

4-H Council

Assists Extension staff to determine program priorities and policies for local 4-H and Extension Programs; the council is made up of local volunteers with a variety of backgrounds and expertise.

4-H Online

The 4-H database that manages 4-H enrollment of youth, animal identification, and trip participation, among other purposes.

Animal Identification

This is the process by which members ensure their animal has the correct identification (tag, tattoo, etc) and report this to the Extension Office. It is critical that you have it done by the deadlines, May 15th annually online and tagging is prior.

Club

A group of young people led by screened volunteers and administered by Extension who participate in 4-H learning experiences, educational activities, and events. Types of clubs include:

- Community Club- A general interest club that gives members a well-rounded experience
- Special Interest Club- A club with a focus on a specific project area such as Animals, Robotics, or Shooting Sports
- SPARK Club- A short-term, special interest club that meets for at least six hours and focuses on one topic of interest to youth.

Open/Conference Judging

The type of judging that often happens at county fair. 4-H members meet with a judge for project evaluation; the judge asks questions about what the 4-H member learned while working on the project and gives the member feedback.

County 4-H Fair

The county fair provides an opportunity for 4-H members to exhibit and display the items that demonstrate what they have learned through their project meetings and experiences over the enrollment year. This is a major event where many people see what 4-H members accomplish.

County Extension Educators

An Extension Staff member with subject matter expertise; youth development or 4-H educators oversee the 4-H program.

Drop/Add Deadline

To be eligible to showcase an exhibit at the fair, a member must be enrolled in that project category through v2.4Honline.com by June 20th.

Enrollment

A 4-H member enrollment must be completed at v2.4honline.com annually for each 4-H member. This is the process of updating information in 4HOnline and paying the enrollment fee. This ideally would be completed by January 15 each year for the full program experience.

Exhibits

A completed exhibit for a 4-H project, including a trained animal or presentation prepared for evaluation or display at the county fair, contest, or competition. Some exhibits have multiple components, such as a recipe card for food projects, skill card for crafts, etc.

FairEntry

The 4-H database that manages exhibit entries for the county fair.

Green Record Book

A green folder where members store their record sheets to help them keep track of their 4-H involvement. The green record book encourages organization and is a good reference tool for when they complete trip and scholarship applications.

Handbook

The book that contains project guidelines, exhibit requirements, and 4-H policies. It is updated annually, is posted on the Purdue Extension Martin County website, and available in office.

Junior Leader

A 4-H member in grades 7-12 who participates in 4-H Junior Leader Activities to learn leadership skills. Junior Leaders participate in social activities, community service, and help their 4-H clubs and leaders.

Life Skills

Abilities youth learn to help them live successful, productive lives; 4-H youth programs provide learning opportunities for young people to gain life skills, practice them, and use them throughout their lives.

Mini 4-H

A noncompetitive 4-H program for youth in grades K-2. Members can attend club meetings, complete projects, and create exhibits for the county fair.

Poster

Many exhibits involve creating a poster. Posters must follow the guidelines listed in the Martin County 4-H Handbook. The Extension Office sells the foam boards and clear sleeves that meet the requirements.

Projects

A 4-H project is an area that you want to learn more about during the year. There are projects on just about any topic you would like to study and explore, from art to woodworking, from computers to rabbits, from clothing to small engines.

Project Manual/Book

Projects have manuals/record sheets that provide educational material and/or learning activities for members. These are available from your club leader and/or the Extension Office.

Record Sheets

Each project has a record sheet for a 4-H member to summarize things they have learned through their project. It helps them keep track of what they have learned and encourages record keeping. Record sheets are optional and encouraged.

Ten Year Member

A member who has completed 10 years of regular 4-H, which is the longest amount of time a member can participate. Special recognition occurs for ten year members.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What do I need to do to be a member?

Get Up, Show Up, and Never Give Up!

To be an active 4-H member simply complete your online registration preferably in the October 1st-January 15th window, pay the required fees, complete your online profile, and have a meaningful experience. You do not have to exhibit at the fair to be considered an active 4-H member. 4-H members can attend a one-time workshop, participate in trips, or simply join to make new friends!

There are over 70 projects you can complete!

How do I know what projects to choose?

What do I need to exhibit at the fair?

To exhibit at the fair 4-H members need to have completed their 4-H online profile within the enrollment window. 4-H members will select the projects they are interested in 4-H online. In June, the Fair Entry program will open. Members will log into Fair Entry and register for the projects they are bringing to the fair.

Mini 4-H members can exhibit projects at the fair and can choose from any of the projects listed on the Mini 4-H page of the guide. Contact our office or go online to get a copy of our mini 4-H member guide. Mini 4-H members are invited and encouraged to attend club meetings, mini day camp and other great activities!
