Behavior Policies

There are many opportunities for 4-H members, volunteers, parents and the public to participate in 4-H events and activities. When involved in such experiences members, volunteers, parents, and the public are expected to follow all terms and conditions/rules and regulations as outlined by those responsible for the specific program or activity. When attending, participating, or acting on behalf of the 4-H program, all persons are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with accepted standards of social behavior, respect the rights of others, and refrain from any conduct which may be injurious to the 4-H program.

The following actions constitute misconduct for which persons may be subject to disciplinary penalties and/or dismissal from the program:

1. Dishonesty in connection with any 4-H activity by cheating or knowingly furnishing false information.
2. Alteration or unauthorized use of 4-H records.
3. Obstruction or disruption of any 4-H activity or aiding and encouraging other persons to engage in such conduct.
4. Failure to comply, aiding or encouraging other persons not to comply with specific terms and conditions of a given project, contest, or activity.
5. Failure to comply with directions of 4-H officials acting in the proper performance of their duties.
6. Inhumane treatment of 4-H animal projects.

In all 4-H activities, the following constitute a violation of behavioral expectations:

1. Possession or use of fire crackers, gun power, illegal firearms, chemicals or other materials that can be used to create an explosive mixture.
2. Misuse of fire equipment or sounding a false fire alarm.
3. Physical or verbal abuse of any person or conduct which threatens or endangers the health or safety of any person.
4. Theft of or malicious damage to property.
5. It is a policy of 4-H INC to **NOT** allow possession of alcoholic beverages on the Fairgrounds, nor the distribution of alcohol, drugs, tobacco and tobacco-like products, or other dangerous substances. ***If possession of alcoholic beverages or other drug related substances is reported, the City Police will be called.**
6. Lewd, indecent, or obscene conduct.
7. Unauthorized entry, use or occupancy of any facility.
8. Any conduct which threatens or interferes with maintenance of appropriate order and discipline or invades the rights of others.

When violations occur at County, State or National 4-H events, the following procedures will be followed.

- a) **The parents/guardians will be contacted to arrange transportation home for the violator(s) and**
- b) **The local Extension Educator will be notified.**

Penalties: If, in the opinion of the Montgomery County 4-H Inc. Board or Montgomery County Purdue Extension or their designee, evidence of alteration, excessive outside help, unethical preparation, or misconduct is noted, the exhibit and/or 4-H member may be disqualified, all premiums and awards forfeited, or the 4-H member may be subject to a disbarment from participation in that project or other related 4-H projects, events, or activities. Enforcement may be selective which does not waive the state 4-H Youth Program's right to enforce collectively at a future date and appropriate circumstance.

- **Any Montgomery County 4-H situations not covered by these policies shall be handled by the County 4-H Youth Development Extension Educator or their designee as appropriate.**

It is a policy of 4-H Inc. to NOT allow possession of alcoholic beverages on the Fairgrounds. If possession of alcoholic beverages is reported, the City Police will be called.

No Smoking within 8 feet of any of the 4-H Buildings or Livestock barns.

No bicycles, nor non-exhibit animals allowed on fairgrounds.

Any trailers left on the Fairgrounds after the Horse and Pony Show will be towed at the owner's expense.

No individuals, other than nighttime security, may be on the fairgrounds from midnight until daylight.

4-H: WHAT IS IT?

The overall objectives of 4-H Clubs are to:

1. Gain new knowledge, skills, and attitudes through real life experiences.
2. Realize the satisfaction and dignity of work.
3. Develop leadership talents and abilities.
4. Learn and recognize the value of decision-making process.
5. Explore career opportunities and continue needed education.
6. Practice helpful living and constructive use of leisure time.
7. Appreciate nature and apply conservation principles.
8. Strengthen personal standards and citizenship ideals.
9. Cultivate desire and ability to cooperate with others.

These objectives are met by working on individual projects, attending trips and award programs by becoming involved in the FFA and 4-H judging activities and by working with other persons, both youth and adult.

THE INDIANA 4-H PROGRAM PHILOSOPHY

The Indiana 4-H program serves the youth of Indiana by providing a strong educational youth development program. This program delivers educational experiences in a variety of settings. Caring, capable, and contributing adults assist in the 4-H program as models for young people. We treasure the rich heritage of 4-H and want to ensure that 4-H is available to future generations of Indiana youth. This document sets out certain standards and guidelines to be used to assure that 4-H is good for our youth. County 4-H policy is guided by the county 4-H policy-making or governing board (4-H Inc.) as provided by the County Extension Board. Legal authority for the 4-H program rests with the Director of Cooperative Extension, Purdue University. No county 4-H policy may conflict with state 4-H policy or federal requirements.

It is the policy of 4-H to include as many youth as possible. No county policy or practice should be used to arbitrarily exclude youth from membership. Youth should participate in 4-H youth development opportunities at levels and times that best suit the youth's development and support family involvement.

SUPPORTER-VOLUNTEERS AND DONORS

The 4-H program could not be possible without the help of the many 4-H supporters. A BIG THANK YOU goes out to all of them.

4-H Volunteers are individuals who have been appointed to program responsibility by Purdue CES personnel and give their services to the program without pay. Volunteers must apply and be screened utilizing the Step-by-Step Process for 4-H Youth Development Volunteer screening and selection.

There are also many donors that make the 4-H program function. A donor is considered a person who gives of their money toward the program. A list of Auction and Fund Drive Donors are listed in the back of this book. Thank you to all of you and any that we may have missed.

RESIDENCE

Indiana youth typically enroll in 4-H in the county or state in which they reside. However, individuals living in one county may join 4-H in another county. There may be educational or social reasons for an individual joining 4-H in a different county than that of their primary residence. During a single calendar year, a 4-H member enrolled in a given project is expected to enroll and exhibit that project only in one county of enrollment.

In the event that a project is not offered in the county of primary 4-H enrollment, a 4-H member may enroll in that specific project in a different county. Approval of this special exception rests with the county 4-H policy-making or governing board (i.e. 4-H Inc. and/or the Extension Board of the receiving county). Participation in 4-H related activities and events (i.e. judging, performing arts must be in the county of primary enrollment.

The above policy is not intended to provide an escape mechanism for troubled 4-H members and families who are unwilling to follow the terms and/or conditions in their current county of 4-H membership. Decisions regarding 4-H membership in a non-resident county (a county you do not live in, rests with the Montgomery County 4-H Inc. and /or the Extension Board in the receiving county.

HOW IS MEMBERSHIP OBTAINED IN 4-H?

Enrolling on-line

All 4-H families have the responsibility of enrolling themselves in 4-H using the 4-H Online system. This system is a state system and is also used in many other states nationally. Annually, 4-H enrollment begins October 1. The website for the enrollment is: <https://v2.4honline.com>

4-H families must enter the website and set up a family profile. Only 1 profile should be made for the family and include everyone that resides in that household. You must create a password that has a minimum of 8 characters with letters & number/symbols. That password will be used every time you enter the system. **PLEASE MAKE SURE YOU HAVE THAT PASSWORD AVAILABLE YEAR AFTER YEAR.**

Mini 4-H

What is Mini 4-H?

This program is for children in Kindergarten – 2nd grade. It is a three-year program designed to encourage youth to join 4-H when they are in third grade.

There is no fee for Mini 4-H.

4-H

Youth may become 4-H members when they enter the third grade and may continue their membership through the completion of grade 12. A member may continue membership for maximum of ten (10) years.

An individual's 4-H grade is determined by the school grade in which he or she is at the time of enrollment. A member does not advance in 4-H grade until he or she enrolls in 4-H for the subsequent school year. Each member should enroll in the division of a project that would best suit his/her interest and potential for personal growth and would enhance their family involvement or in their grade level for those projects that enroll by grade.

Opportunities in the 4-H program are available to all Indiana youth as defined regardless of race, religion, color, sex, national origin or disability. Married young men and women of 4-H age may participate in any of the 4-H projects and activities. However, married persons must participate by the same terms and conditions and /or guidelines as unmarried participants. Membership in 4-H is gained by annually enrolling through a Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service Office located in each of Indiana's 92 counties.

Fees and Payment

The 4-H club year usually extends from one annual 4-H exhibit to the next. The State requires a \$15 fee be accessed which may be paid for by credit card online or you may pay by check or cash in the office. For families of more than 3 children, the maximum limit of the fee is \$45.

CREDIT CARD PAYMENT IS ONLINE ONLY!

A 4-H member may add or drop a project(s) adjusting their 4-H Online enrollment until that project's scheduled fair check-in closes. Animals requiring a May 15 identification cannot be added to 4-H Online after the May 15 deadline.

JUNIOR LEADERS

WHAT IS THE JUNIOR LEADER ORGANIZATION & WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO JOIN?

The Junior Leader project allows 4-H members in grades 7-12 the opportunity to provide their adult 4-H volunteers with additional assistance in their 4-H clubs and related activities while serving as mentors and role models to the younger 4-H members by sharing their experiences with them. There are also a variety of opportunities offered for Junior Leaders to meet and serve the community.

CLUB/PROJECT REQUIREMENTS

To be eligible to complete Junior Leaders, and to hold an office position for the next year, a member must meet these requirements:

1. All members are encouraged to attend all meetings.
2. Complete the record sheet and turn into the Extension Office by the designated date. The entire record must be filled out completely.
3. Complete local responsibilities, service work, as assigned by the club leader.

PERSONAL LEADERSHIP ACTIVITIES

The purpose of Junior Leaders is to equip the members with the necessary skills so that he or she may be of maximum value to others. The following questions should help you evaluate your own skills, as well as other areas where more work is needed.

1. How have you helped the adult leader in your local 4-H club?
2. List the ways in which you have helped the younger members in 4-H.
3. What is your strongest leadership trait?
4. How could you be a more effective leader?
5. How could you make a positive impact in your local club next year?

The Junior Leader Volunteers will assist the Junior Leader Officer Team in planning the monthly meetings and trips for the members of the club. Special awards and trips are designed for the most industrious Junior Leader members.

WHAT ARE THE RESPONSIBILITIES FOR ALL 4-HERS?

The following is a list of responsibilities that is a general rule of acceptance for members of 4-H Clubs:

1. Enroll in 4-H starting October 1st. NOTE: 4-H animals MUST be enrolled as a project during this time. All animals (with the exception of dogs, cats, and small animals) must be properly ID'd and enrolled by May 15. The animal IDs are described later in the book.
2. Select 1 or more projects, with the assistance of your club leader and parents/guardians if needed.
3. Complete the work outlined for each project that you enrolled in.
4. Attend your local 4-H club meetings.
5. Learn the 4-H Club Pledge and Motto.
6. Take part in your local and county 4-H activities and events.
7. Inform parents/guardians of activities and events.
8. 4-Hers are highly encouraged to exhibit their projects at their local county fair.
9. You **MUST** turn in project record sheets in order to complete the project. You may pick up the record sheets at the Extension Office. Some record sheets, as well as the Record of Achievement that is in the front of your record book, are available online at www.extension.purdue.edu/4-H/projects/index.html. Keep record sheets in your Green Record Book. Completed Green Record Books must be shown to your 4-H Club Leader before project check-in dates.

WHAT IS THE 4-H CLUB POLICY?

A club should have five or more members and one or more adult leaders. The club should have officers, particularly a president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer. Other offices you may wish to consider are: reporter, song leader, health & safety and recreation leader. A club should have a minimum of six meetings. The club should also have an Achievement Night Program following the 4-H Fair where recognition is given to the members. This Achievement Night is to be conducted BEFORE NOVEMBER 1.

In Montgomery County, 4-H Club activities are under the direction of 4-H Incorporated, which was organized in 1941. The membership is composed of fourteen directors at-large, three 4-H Leader representatives, plus two representatives from the Junior Leaders. Each director is elected to a three year term and the terms of office are staggered so that directors are elected annually.

The purpose of 4-H Inc. is to bring together, in a formal organization, persons interested in promoting the 4-H Club Program for girls and boys of Montgomery County. Also, to sponsor, promote and produce public entertainment, shows, exhibits, and to solicit contributions for the purpose of promoting interest in the 4-H Clubs, Inc., provided that all profits derived there from shall be used solely for the activities of 4-H Clubs, Inc.

GRIEVANCE/APPEAL GUIDELINES FOR COUNTY

4-H PROGRAM ISSUES: (ACTIVITIES, PROGRAMS, and PROJECTS)

The grievance procedures outlined in this document are utilized as part of an internal process of the Indiana 4-H Youth Development program for use when grievances of 4-H members, their parents/guardians, or 4-H volunteers cannot be resolved via reasonable conversation. This policy affords the opportunity in those unique situations to allow voice or opinion to be heard when there is a dispute regarding 4-H participation, activities or programs. This is not a mechanism for complaints against individual 4-H members (or their families), 4-H volunteers, judging officials for competitive events, or Purdue Extension staff. All resulting decisions will be made in accordance with the Indiana 4-H Program's stated mission to be an inclusive organization designed to encourage and maximize youth participation. The rights of the individual filing the grievance are limited to those provided by Indiana 4-H Program policy.

Purdue University, as the Land Grant University in Indiana, is charged (by the United States Department of Agriculture) with implementing the 4-H Program in communities across the State of Indiana. Purdue Extension Educators in each Indiana County represent the university in local communities and have the responsibility of assuring all 4-H volunteers meet basic university criteria as they serve as representatives of the university. Purdue Extension Educators additionally provide oversight to 4-H volunteers including the assurance that Indiana 4-H Policies and Procedures are appropriately implemented in 4-H Program delivery.

Individual county 4-H policies and procedures should be created and reviewed to assure they do not contradict established statewide 4-H policies and procedures. If a contradiction is discovered during the grievance process, Indiana 4-H Program policy shall be followed in determining the grievance outcome.

1. Grievances are made by completing the Indiana 4-H Grievance/Appeal form with the burden of proof being the responsibility of the individual filing the grievance. The completed grievance/appeal form and supporting documentation shall be presented to the president of the 4-H policy-making body (e.g., 4-H Inc. Board) or the Purdue Extension Educator who works with the 4-H Program.

(NOTE: concerns regarding staff or volunteers are not issues for which a grievance may be filed. 4-H volunteers are assigned by the 4-H Extension Educator. Concerns regarding 4-H volunteers or other individuals should be addressed directly with the Purdue 4-H Extension Educator.)

2. Grievances pertaining to 4-H activities, programs or projects shall be filed within 14 days of an incident or occurrence. Grievances pertaining to county fair related issues are often time-sensitive and must be filed within 24 hours of the incident.
3. The grievance process occurs in the county where the issue or concern arises and offers two opportunities for a concern to be heard and reviewed.
 - a. The grievance is initially heard by an unbiased, representative grievance sub-committee. It is the Purdue Extension Educator assigned to 4-H Programming who shall annually work with the chair of the county 4-H Inc. Board to determine this committee's membership to include a combination of 3-6 of the following individuals: one representative of the 4-H Inc. Board; two 4-H volunteers serving as a 4-H club organizational leader; one member of the County Extension Board; one 4-H volunteer knowledgeable in the subject matter (project) of concern (this individual will vary dependent on issue raised with the grievance); one youth representative; and up to three community leaders. The Purdue Extension Educator assigned to 4-H shall convene the group.
 - b. The person filing a grievance may appeal a decision of the 4-H Grievance Committee State 4-H Program Leader or designee. The Program Leader or designee will review the facts in evidence and render a decision. This is the second and final level in the appeal process.

**The intent of a two level process is to assure different individuals have the opportunity to hear and act on the grievance. ALL individuals involved at any level of the grievance procedure are reminded of the importance of keeping discussions regarding grievances confidential.

To maintain the confidentiality of the parties involved, the grievance hearings at each level will be closed to the public. Only the individuals who have filed the grievance, the members of the grievance committee, and the Purdue Extension Educators will be present during each level of the grievance process, ***The grievance process is internal to the Indiana 4-H Youth Development Program and meetings of the grievance committees are not subject to Indiana's Open Door Policy.

The Purdue Extension Educator assigned to work with the 4-H Program has the obligation to inform all parties that there is a grievance procedure if there are disagreements with policies.

The practice of charging fees from those filing grievances shall be eliminated and all counties will utilize the Indiana 4-H Grievance/Appeal Form as part of the grievance process.

DEADLINES, PARTICIPATION, EXHIBITION, COMPLETION, GREEN BOOKS AND ACHIEVEMENT CARDS

Deadlines:

The proper compliance with established, stated, and published final dates and deadlines is considered an appropriate expectation of 4-H membership. Submitting things on time and following the rules is part of the 4-H learning experience and is considered a reasonable thing to do. Individuals not complying with these expectations may lose awards and privileges. This is especially true in animal projects where animal ownership, raising, and identification have a specific time period as part of the project requirements. Members not complying with established and published dates and deadlines for exhibition may be denied exhibition privileges as well as premiums or awards for that project.

Participation:

Attendance and participation at 4-H meetings is highly encouraged as a part of the overall educational experience. However, attendance or participation at club meetings cannot be required as criteria for project completion. 4-H meetings should be of the quality that a 4-H member should want to attend, participate, and learn something beneficial. Also, rewarding 4-H clubs, 4-H members, and 4-H volunteers for attendance and participation in meetings, tours, and activities should be significant enough to cause the 4-H member to see the advantage of reacting positively. 4-H volunteers and members of local clubs may establish goals for attendance, exhibits, completion, etc. to meet the criteria established for awards and recognition as long as they do not conflict with stated county, area and/or state policies.

Exhibition:

Exhibition of 4-H projects in local, county or state exhibits/fairs is considered a privilege and is voluntary on the part of the exhibitor. The exhibition of 4-H projects provides 4-H members an opportunity to display their 4-H projects, entertain wholesome competition and enjoy an education/social environment with their peers. With the privilege of exhibition also comes the responsibility for abiding by all of the terms and conditions pertaining to the respective 4-H project. Not following the established terms and conditions for the projects may result in the member being lowered one placing.

Project Completion:

The completion of a 4-H project must not be misinterpreted as exhibition of said project at a local county or state fair. 4-H members are considered complete in their 4-H educational experience for the year when they have:

1. Completed 4-H member enrollment Online at 4-H Online prior to the established and published date for enrolling,
2. Had an officially recognized 4-H leader/extension educator verify existence of the completed project/subject or the member's participation in a 4-H educational experience - this could be in the form of an exhibit, poster, report, presentation, etc. Or, a member may choose to submit a completed record sheet in lieu of an exhibit to complete the club-or fair-based 4-H project/subject. The 4-H record sheet will be based on printed or web-based educational materials (used by Indiana 4-H Youth Development) and submitted prior to the established and published date.

Green Record Books:

4-H Green Record Books may be obtained from the Montgomery County Extension Office. They should be used to contain the Record Sheets that are required to be filled out and signed by a leader for each project. Failure to fill out the record sheets result in an incomplete on your permanent record. Separate Green Record Books are needed for the Dog and Horse & Pony Clubs.

Record of Achievement:

The "Record of 4-H Achievement" sheet can be picked up at the Extension Office. It is used to keep an accurate record of your projects. The information on this card will be used to put grades on your permanent records that are kept in the Extension Office. The records are used at the time of selecting awards and scholarships and checking completion of your projects. The 4-Her should record the year, division and placing of each project on the card and place it in the front of your Green Record Book. Also, add any record of accomplishments, meetings attended, 4-H trips, activities and awards on the back of your card. Following is an example of the "Record of Achievement Card."

4-H TRIPS AND ACTIVITIES FOR 4-HERS

The younger 4-H members (grades 3-6) are eligible for all local and county events and county phases of area, state and national programs. The older 4-H members (grades 7-12) are entitled to participate in state and out-of-state activities and for the state awards in national contests. A brief listing of the activities available follows. These activities generally require that the 4-H member apply or register to participate. Some of the workshops are limited as to the number that may apply. A listing of the workshops and trips can be found on the county website or 4-H Online.

Each year 4-H Inc. conducts a Fund Drive to help offset the cost of the trips and activities offered by the state and county 4-H Programs. The Fund Drive usually starts in December and lasts through the beginning of February. 4-H Inc. and 4-H members of Montgomery County greatly appreciate the donations received.

4-H Academy @ Purdue

This is a 3-day workshop conducted in June at Purdue. Delegates will be accepted on a first-come, first served basis until the specific specie and/or workshop limit is reached. Indiana 4-H members who are in grades 9-12 of the current year are eligible for the workshop. A delegate may attend more than once, as long as they register for a different species group each time.

The objectives for 4-H Academy @ Purdue are as follows:

- To develop life skills through interaction with others.
- To teach the scientific principles of Animal Sciences to young people.
- To prepare delegates to assist and/or teach others in their local communities what they learned from Purdue faculty and staff.
- To increase awareness of Animal Industry issues.
- To inform participants about careers in animal agriculture and educational opportunities at Purdue University.

Indiana 4-H Day at the Statehouse

This one-day event is held in February at the Statehouse in Indianapolis. Indiana 4-H members who are in grades 7-12 of the current year are eligible for this trip. Youth will learn about their state government through a day full of civic engagement and leadership. Participants will tour the statehouse, meet representatives, and have the opportunity to serve as student pages. Registration will be done through 4-H Online.

4-H Camp

The 4-H camp is for members who are in grade 3-6. The camp is held in June. The individual pays for their own expenses for the 3-day camp, including a fee that will be determined yearly per 4-Her. The following activities are usually part of the program:

- Boating
- Campfires
- Recreation
- Swimming
- Nature Studies
- Vesper programs
- Craft trainings such as:
 - Leather
 - Plaster
 - Painting

4-H/FFA Judging Contest

General: Contests are available at the Area, State and National levels.

- Purdue puts out a book called the “4-H/FFA AG JUDGING HANDBOOK” or 4-H 98, which describes all contests. This book is also the Official Rule Book for Area IX and State Contests.
- For more information, contact the County Extension Office

National 4-H Conference Trip

- 4-H members in grades 10 and above are eligible to apply; 1-3 selected annually.
- To help selected youth and adults develop to their maximum potential by providing opportunities to participate actively in 4-H program development outside their states and at national levels.
- To assist states in the further development of a system for involving youth, volunteers, and professional staff in 4-H program planning in their states.
- To provide an opportunity for Conference delegates to update elected and appointed government officials, national associations, donor groups, etc. on current developments in 4-H programs at national, state and local levels.
- To provide an opportunity for inputs of youth, volunteers, and professional staff into National 4-H Program Development Committee deliberations.
- To provide a system for an exchange of 4-H programming ideas among states at a national gathering of delegates from each state.

National 4-H Congress Trip

- For 4-Hers Grade 10 (at time of due date) through final year of 4-H eligibility.
- Must be a current 4-H member and in at least the 3rd year of membership at the time of applying.
- Winners will be notified.

National 4-H Dairy Conference

This program is in Madison, WI. Selection is made on the basis of Dairy Achievement Records. Participants should be in grades 10-12. All expenses are paid. Applicants must write a brief story about their dairy operation and management practices. Be sure to include a completed copy of "My Record of Achievement." Objectives:

- To increase understanding of the dairy industry.
- To learn about additional vocational and professional opportunities in the dairy industry.
- To practice good citizenship, group participation, and leadership responsibilities.
- To develop additional individual initiative and competence in areas of special interest and aptitude in the dairy field and related areas.

Indiana 4-H Ambassador

The Indiana 4-H Ambassador program was created to empower teen 4-H leaders with the knowledge, skills, and aspirations necessary to be effective advocates for Indiana 4-H Youth Development. 4-H Ambassadors' current leadership abilities will be strengthened and expanded so that they may serve as positive role models for younger youth; build meaningful partnerships with other 4-H teens, adults, and professionals, as well as community partners and sponsors; and promote the 4-H mission in Indiana.

The vision of the Indiana 4-H Ambassador program is that every Indiana teen 4-H member will have the personal initiative, program resources, and leadership opportunities to be a positive role model and vocal advocate for the 4-H program in our state.

Details

- Must be an active 4-H member, currently in grades 9-11.
- Serve a two-year term
- Promote and represent 4-H to potential members, families, the public, and community partners through outreach, marketing, and public relations.
- Support and organize 4-H events at the county or state level, including planning, coordination, and promotional activities.
- Build leadership and civic engagement skills by facilitating discussions, teaching others, collaborating with teams, and applying civic concepts in activities.

4-H Round-Up

This is a 3-day conference held annually in June on the Purdue University Campus. It is for 4-Hers who have completed grades 7- 9.

It is three days of educational experiences where delegates can:

- Experience in-depth “action learning”
- Develop leadership abilities
- Learn about college life

About 1200 4-H members from throughout Indiana attend this conference where they stay in student dormitories and attend the program sessions and events.

4-H Inc. may pay a portion of the Round-Up fees.

4-H Queen Contest – Miss Montgomery County

Each entrant in the 4-H Queen Contest must meet certain criteria as listed below:

- Must be at least 16 years of age on or before the first day of the Indiana State Fair Queen Pageant. (This date is determined by the Indiana State Fair Board).
- Must be a member of a Montgomery County 4-H Club and attend at least one (1) 4-H Club meeting. A signed note from a 4-H Club Leader will be required.
- No professional model is eligible for the Miss Montgomery County Queen Contest. Anyone who has paid for pageant coaching while a contestant of the Miss Montgomery County Queen Contest is ineligible.
- Any contestant selected as Miss Montgomery County cannot compete again.

The contestants are expected to participate in several workshops and practices prior to the contest as scheduled by the Queen Director and Queen Committee. A list of attendance will be given to the judges and may impact their decision. The Queen and her court will have their County Fair responsibilities scheduled by the Director and Committee. The Queen will represent Montgomery County in the Indiana State Fair Queen Contest.

* The First Runner-Up will be the representative if the Queen is unable to do so for any reason.

* *All contestants in the Indiana State Fair Queen contest must be a citizen of Indiana and the United States. One of the Queen’s parents must also be an Indiana resident.*

A Queen’s Handbook will be provided by the Queen Contest Committee.

To be eligible, the 4-Her must be a graduating senior pursuing a secondary education, be a current, active Sheep Project member of no less than 6 years and have physically exhibited sheep the majority of those years.

William McClamroch Scholarship

This scholarship is awarded to a 4-H boy or girl who will attend college. The criteria are leadership skills, civic involvement, and commitment to the principles of 4-H. An application form can be picked up at the Extension Office. The award is presented during the 4-H Fair based upon selection by the McClamroch family. The scholarship will be paid jointly to the individual and the chosen educational institution.

Montgomery County Beef Scholarship

Montgomery County Beef Association will award a \$500 scholarship for any 4-Her continuing their education. They must exhibit a beef animal at the County Fair or State Fair each of the 10 years they are in 4-H.

Laurenz Greene Horticulture and Landscape Architecture

Available to 4-H members entering Purdue University Department of Horticulture and Landscape Architecture pursuing an undergraduate degree in Horticulture, Turf Management and Science, Sustainable Food and Farming Systems or Landscape Architecture. Applicants must have studied at least 4 years' horticulture and/or plant science related subject matter/project through Indiana 4-H Youth Development. Selection is based on the member's overall 4-H achievement.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR ANIMAL EXHIBITORS NON-ENROLLMENT ANIMALS

Animal ownership rules apply to all animals. Leased animals, other than horses, cannot be shown by the owner from May 15 through the Indiana State Fair.

Livestock ID:

1. The 4-H member must be enrolled in Montgomery County 4-H. The 4-H member must have ID'd their animals in 4-H Online by May 15. There will be NO paper livestock enrollment forms available. ALL animals (Beef, Dairy Cattle, Sheep, Swine, Goats, and Horses) must be ID'd on-line. If this is not possible from your home, please contact the Montgomery Co. Extension office for assistance.
2. **Any animal ID not completed by May 15th deadline will prohibit the 4-H member from showing at the county and State Fair.**
3. Animals may not be enrolled by more than one 4-H member except for brothers and sisters. 4-H members with Beef, Horse & Pony, Sheep, Goats and Swine may co-enroll; however, animals may be entered and shown by only one 4-H member. All animals to be entered and shown by a 4-H member must be enrolled on the 4-H member's on-line enrollment.
4. DNA hair sampling, ear notching etc. required by each species must be done by the deadlines given.
5. No online enrollments are needed for dogs and poultry (chickens, pigeons, waterfowl), but animals need to be in 4-Hers ownership prior to May 15th. All other 4-H livestock must be ID'd in 4-H Online by May 15th.

Livestock Release:

Any exhibitor removing his/her exhibit before the release time without permission will be barred from exhibition of this project the following year. This excludes Dairy Cows in milk.

Green Record Book:

A Green Record Book, with a Record Sheet for each project, signed at least once by the 4-H Leader, is required to check in all projects. The Green Record Book should be NOT be turned in and should be kept at home. A Project Completion Card will be brought to check-in instead. See paragraph below for more information. **4-Hers failing to have their project record sheets signed by their 4-H Club Leader will receive an “incomplete.”**

Project Completion Card:

A Project Completion Card is required to check in all livestock and building projects. The Project Completion Card will be provided by the 4-H leader upon reviewing and signing the project record sheet for each project PRIOR to the day of all project check-in. DO NOT bring your Green Record Book to the building projects check-in or livestock check-in, but please bring any other exhibit forms as required by the individual species. (Please see species-specific information.)

Livestock Exhibition:

Exhibition may be completed by one or more of the following: (Project completion must include a completed record sheet per project.

1. Participation in the 4-H species show
 - a. Consult general record rules for each livestock species for maximum number of animals that can be exhibited. Rabbit meat pen count as one exhibit. Cow/calf counts as one exhibit. Egg layers & pigeon pairs count as one exhibit.
 - b. Educational Poster - Posters should be educational and could be developed around the educational topics in the manual or according to the directions of each particular project.
 - c. Action Demonstration

Livestock Ownership and Registration Requirements:

Each 4-H member must continuously own his/her own exhibit from the state enrollment date until show day at the county and/or State Fair. Registration certificates must show that the exhibitor has owned the animal either entirely or in part according to the following methods of registration, continuously from the state enrollment date until show day at the county and/or State Fair.

Acceptable registrations are:

1. In the 4-H member's name
2. John Smith & Sons
3. John Smith, Sons, & Daughters
4. John Smith & Family (family includes sons, daughters, and legal guardian youth only)
5. Mark Smith (brother) & Mary Smith (sister)
6. Family Corporations, where the 4-H member's name appears as a holder of stock in the corporation, and proof of the same must be supplied on or before the enrollment date.
7. Family partnership where the 4-Hers father, mother, brother, sister, aunt, uncle, grandparent, and/or legal guardian is also in the family partnership and the 4-H member's name appears on the legal notarized partnership. A copy of the written document must be attached to the enrollment form before the enrollment deadline.
8. 4-H breeding beef, Boer goats, dairy goats, sheep, and swine WILL NOT be accepted in the State Fair if they are registered in a father's name only, farm name only, or partnerships with unrelated persons (such as 'Smith View', 'Smith Oak', 'John Doe & Williams Smith' (4-H member), 'Long Oak' & 'William Smith')
9. Horses, ponies, and dairy may be leased, subject to approval of both the county 4-H Horse/Dairy committee and the respective County Extension Educator.
 - For the 4-H dairy cattle, partnerships of the 4-H member with unrelated persons or dairy operations are acceptable (i.e. John Doe and William Smith (4-H member), or Long Oak and William Smith, may not be exhibited by more than one person from May 15th until the conclusion of the State Fair 4-H Dairy Show. This person must be the exhibitor of the animal in current State Fair 4-H Dairy Show or the animal will be ineligible for this show. 4-H dairy cattle will not be accepted in 4-H classes at the State Fair if they are registered in the father's name only or in the farm name.
 - 4-H Dairy members can show leased heifers in the 4-H Dairy show at the Indiana State Fair. The dairy lease program is only for 4-H members who do not own their own dairy cows and/or heifers. Only dairy heifers that will be less than two years-of-age at the time of the Indiana State Fair 4-H Dairy Show may be leased. Just like the 4-H Horse and Pony lease program, leasing a dairy heifer will be considered the equivalent of ownership. The 4-H member should be regularly involved in the care of the heifer, regardless of where the heifer is kept, and the 4-H member should have exclusive show rights to the heifer during the 4-H lease period from May 15 until the 4-H Dairy Show at the Indiana State Fair.
 - Leased 4-H dairy heifers must be registered (to be shown at the Indiana State Fair 4-H Dairy show, although it is not necessary to have the registration paper transferred to the 4-H member's name) by May 15th and their registration paper and a lease agreement signed by them and the person they are leasing the heifer from. The lease agreement must be placed in the country office by May 15. The 4-H member must bring the original copy with them to the State Fair check-in if going to the State Fair.

10. 4-H animals purchased, sold or offered for sale after the animal enrollment deadline and prior to the Indiana State Fair, shall not be eligible to be shown in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair.
11. 4-H animals exhibited after the animal deadline (May 15th for all animals) at any show by anyone other than the 4-H member that enrolled the animal will not be eligible to be shown in the 4-H show at the Montgomery County Fair and/or Indiana State Fair. This term/condition does not apply to siblings and parents, who may show each other's animals at any show during the year without jeopardizing State Fair eligibility. This policy applies to all 4-H animal projects. **Horse and Pony members need to refer to Horse and Pony ownership rules for County and State Fair eligibility.** For animal projects without statewide enrollment requirements, the person who enters them in the Indiana State Fair 4-H show is the equivalent of the enroller of the animal.
12. 4-H animals are expected to be in the personal possession and regular care of the 4-H member who owns/leases them (unless other arrangements have been agreed upon by the county 4-H Inc.) from the animal enrollment deadline until the conclusion of the county and/or State Fair.

Premise ID Requirements

ATTENTION: New Livestock Members

Please note that **Premise ID** numbers will be required on all 4-H livestock enrollment for the following animals: Beef, Boer Goats, Dairy, Dairy Goats, Meat Goat Wethers, Pygmy Goats, Sheep and Swine. Exhibitors of Cats, Dogs, Horses, Poultry, and Rabbits are exempt. **If you do not have a required Premise ID number, you will not be eligible to show your livestock at the Montgomery County Fair and the Indiana State Fair.** Premise ID numbers will also be required for the 4-H Livestock Auction for Beef, Boer Goats, Dairy, Dairy Goats, Meat Goat Wethers, Poultry, Pygmy Goats, Sheep and Swine.

Instructions for Indiana State Fair 4-H Entries

Complete list of State Fair Rules are in the Indiana State Fair 4-H Livestock Entry books which are available at <https://www.indianastatefair.com/p/state-fair>.

1. **To enroll in the Indiana State Fair**, please see the Indiana State Fair website and follow the directions. See individual entry books for specific entry deadlines for Beef, Cat, Dairy, Dog, Goats (all types), Horse & Pony, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep, and Swine. The website is: <https://www.indianastatefair.com/p/state-fair>.
2. Exhibitors of Beef, Dairy Cattle, Goats (all types), Sheep and Swine must have **Premises ID Numbers** when signing up for State Fair. Horse and Pony and Poultry will be requested to voluntarily provide a Premise ID. Exhibitors of Cats, Dogs, Mules and Rabbits are exempt from this rule.
3. Any animals sold through the county's livestock auction are ineligible to be shown at the Indiana State Fair.
4. Show officials reserve the right to require mandatory drug, steroid and tissue testing and examination as a condition for entering. Refusing the tests will result in disqualification.

Animal Abuse

Any exhibitor using excessive abuse on his/her exhibit animals will be eliminated from the show, all premiums forfeited, and may be ineligible to show that specie at the Montgomery County 4-H Fair the following year. Excessive abuse shall include burning, stabbing, gouging, punching, use of electric shocker, ice and/or rubbing alcohol, either one applied directly or indirectly, or other treatment considered cruel and inhumane treatment to show animals.

If an animal requires medication or assistance, the 4-Her must contact the species Superintendent before any action is taken. Such medical assistance is to be done under supervision of the Superintendent. 4-H market animals shall not contain any identifiable or unidentifiable foreign substance including: drugs, steroids, or chemicals, greater than those standards established by the USDA or FDA as permissible for sale for consumption as human food both on the day of the show and the day of shipment to market from the fair. If any 4-H market animal or 4-H animal exhibit tests positive for any of the above, the exhibitor of that animal will be disqualified and forfeits all awards, trophies, and premiums including auction money, and will be banned from showing any 4-H animals at the Montgomery County Fair for a period of 1 year including the following year, no matter who administered the drugs or foreign substance (including injected fat, air etc. The Montgomery County 4-H Inc. board reserves the right to hire an independent veterinarian to examine any 4-H animal exhibit for abuse, tampering, altering or misrepresenting the natural look of the animal. When signing the 4-H enrollment, this gives 4-H Inc. the right to examine or have examined any 4-H animal exhibit. See the current Animal Affidavit (4-H 836) for a list of drug withdrawal times.

Grooming

All livestock exhibits are intended to provide the basis for each 4-H member to learn the discipline of daily feeding requirements and the requirements in preparation for exhibits at the Montgomery County Fair.

Exhibiting at the County Fair is not required to complete a 4-H project, but instead is considered a privilege. The 4-H member may complete the project by turning in his/her Green Record Book and project records.

Any 4-Her needing assistance in preparing their animal for show may contact the Project Superintendent. The Superintendent will request groomers to assist with animals that are not in direct class or breed competition against members of the groomer's family.

REMINDER:

4-HERS FAILING TO COMPLETE PROJECT RECORD SHEETS AND HAVE THEM SIGNED BY THEIR 4-H CLUB LEADER WILL RECEIVE AN INCOMPLETE ON THEIR PROJECT AT THE COUNTY LEVEL.

LIVESTOCK RULES FOR MONTGOMERY COUNTY

1. A Completion Card is required to check in all projects. The Completion Card will be provided by the 4-H leader upon reviewing and signing the project record sheet for each project prior to the day of check-in. All project record sheets should be kept in the Green Record Book. DO NOT bring your Green Record Book to project check-in. Extra record sheets are available in the Extension Office. Once a 4-H member's completed Green Record Book is signed off by their 4-H Club Leader, the 4-H member will keep that book for recording future 4-H activities, awards, etc. Please fill in all placings, awards, and activities on your Record of Achievement card in the record book. 4-Hers failing to complete their Green Record Book and have it signed by their 4-H Club Leader will receive an incomplete in the project.
2. Indiana 4-H Livestock Ownership on-line ID is due by the tagging date for Beef Steers, Dairy Beef and non-registered Beef Heifers born on or before August 31st of the previous year. The online enrollment period will start January 1st and ends May 15th. ID for registered heifers, dairy, sheep, swine, goats, and horses is due online by May 15th. No on-line ID's are needed for Dogs and Poultry (Chickens, Pigeons, and Waterfowl).
3. All exhibitors must remove from the premises any livestock or poultry that exhibit symptoms of disease that may be infectious or contagious when requested by the 4-H Inc. Board. Failure to meet all health requirements will necessitate removal of all animals presented by exhibitor.
4. Premise ID is required or Proof of Application must be attained by July 1, 2026.
5. Exhibitors must show their own exhibit, except when they have two or more animals in the same class. In case of sickness, a substitute may show the animal upon approval of the General Fair Superintendent. The substitute must be a 4-H Club member from Montgomery County.
6. No animal may be shown by more than one exhibitor.
7. All 4-H records must include a feed record and data on all animals shown in the County and State 4-H Club Shows.
8. Any livestock sold privately or offered for sale at Public Auction prior to the Indiana State Fair is not eligible to show in 4-H classes at the Indiana State 4-H Fair.
9. **No early releases are allowed from the County Fair except for dairy cows in milk.**
10. All breeding animals must be purebred (except crossbred heifers and gilts, grade ewes, and commercial does).
11. No testicular tissue can be visible.

13. All exhibitors in the cattle barn are to hang fans blowing towards the north in order to assist air flow.
 - a. All cattle pens in the barn, as well as tie-out areas, must be kept clean. Manure is to be disposed of in the provided dumpsters.
14. If livestock pen assignments are not received by published deadline, a late fee will be charged. Refer to your pen assignment request papers for the amounts.
15. All breed class winners will show for breed champion, and the second place to the breed champion may compete for reserve breed champion. All breed champions will show in the grand drive and compete for the overall top 5 from from Beef, Sheep, and Swine. All breed champions will show in the grand drive. Beef, Sheep, and Swine will compete for the overall top 5.
16. To exhibit beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, meat goats, dairy goats, pygmy goats, poultry, and rabbits, 4-H members must be certified through the Indiana 4-H Quality Livestock Care program. This is an annual program that is completed in-person. Alternatively, youth can complete online modules for the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals program. Please contact the Montgomery County Extension for more information. Any exhibitor failing to complete Indiana 4-H Quality Livestock Care or YQCA before arriving at the fair to check-in their animal(s) will not be permitted to advance through the fair's check-in process until YQCA has been completed online.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES:

Please see individual species for individual health requirements General Requirements for all species.

Please call the Indiana State Board of Animal Health at 1-317-544-2400 with questions concerning animal health requirements.

A. Limitations on Exhibition

This section describes limitations on exhibiting animals in Indiana. There may be other exhibitions limitations that are described in the specific-species requirements.

1. Failure to meet all animal health requirements will result in removal of animals from the exhibition premise.
2. The following animals are not eligible for exhibition in Indiana:
 - a. Animal that originates from a herd that is under quarantine.
 - b. An animal prohibited from exhibition under any law or order.
 - c. Any animal classified as a brucellosis "suspect".
 - d. Animals showing signs of any infectious or communicable disease or that are a health hazard to persons or other animals.
 - e. Any animal that does not meet state animal health requirements.
3. Any animal that develops or shows signs of any infectious or communicable disease during exhibition must be removed from the premises, including the surrounding exhibition grounds. An owner who is disputing the exclusion of his/her animal(s) from exhibition may not exhibit the animal in question pending any appeal.
4. The State Veterinarian is authorized to make the final determination as to an animal's eligibility for exhibition. The state veterinarian may order removal of any animal from the exhibition grounds.
5. Exhibition organizers may impose health requirements in addition to those prescribed by BOAH. Added requirements may not contradict requirements imposed by BOAH.
6. Exhibition organizers may have a licensed and accredited veterinarian review animals and animal health documentation during the exhibition.

B. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection

1. For animals that originate in Indiana, a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI)(commonly known as a "health paper") is not required by BOAH for exhibition. Contact the exhibition organizer to determine if a CVI is necessary to meet the organizers exhibition requirements.

2. For animals that originate outside of Indiana, the exhibitor must have a properly completed CVI for all animals prior to entry. This requirement applies to all domestic animals (except fish and poultry).

- a. CVI's must be completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian who has personally inspected the animals.
- b. A CVI for any animal is valid for 30 days from the date it is issued by a licensed and accredited veterinarian. *Animal(s) must be inspected by a licensed and accredited veterinarian no more than 10 days prior to the date in which the CVI is issued.*
- c. CVIs must clearly include a description of each animal including the age, sex, and breed of the animal, and the official individual identification.
- d. CVIs must accompany the animal while on the exhibition premises.

3. Identification

Please refer to each individual species on page 32 for ID requirements. All exhibition animals must be permanently and individually identified unless otherwise notes. Official ear tags approved by the USDA that bear the US shield. All official identification and any additional identification devices should be recorded on the CVI.

4. Testing

All tests required for exhibition must be conducted at the Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (ADDDL) at Purdue University, a laboratory approved by the Indiana State Board of Animal Health, or a state or federal-approved laboratory.

Showmanship

Beef, Dairy, Pygmy Goats, Meat Goats, Horse & Pony, Poultry, Rabbit, Sheep, and Swine. (You must use your own animal and have exhibited it during their Show.)

- All grades specified pertain to grade 4-Hers was in at the time of 4-H enrollment in January.
- Alternates will be chosen for each species in each age division.
- Advanced registration on the day of the show will be required.
- Classes may be broken at the discretion of the specie superintendent. (Beef will be broken if there are 10 or more entries in a division.)

Junior Showmanship for those 4-Hers in grades 3 -5. Previous Junior Showmanship winners are ineligible. They must move up to the Intermediate Level.

Intermediate Showmanship is for those 4-Hers in grades 6-8. Previous Intermediate Showmanship winners are ineligible and previous Junior winners are eligible. Winners must move up to the Senior Class.

Senior Showmanship is for those 4-Hers in grades 9 and up. Previous Intermediate Showmanship winners are eligible. Previous Senior winners are eligible unless he/she has won the Overall Showmanship.

Once an individual has been declared a Senior Showmanship winner for a species, that person is not eligible to compete in another species for senior showmanship during the current year.

Overall Showmanship

The Senior Showmanship winners from Beef, Dairy, Dairy/Pygmy Goat, Meat Goat, Horse & Pony, Sheep, and Swine are eligible to show in this contest. Participants must remain in the show arena throughout the entire contest.

One - seven judges will be used at the Superintendents' discretion to judge this contest.

With the exception of Horse and Pony, if animals from other species are not equal to the number of participants in the Overall Showmanship Contest, that species will not be represented in Overall Showmanship. However, the Senior Showman winner for that species may still participate. Furthermore, animals in the contest cannot belong to any of the participants. If a species does not have individual representation for Overall Showmanship, then that species will not be represented or exhibited as part of the Overall Showmanship contest.

LIVESTOCK AUCTION

1. Sign-up for all Auction animals will be done at time of check-in.
2. Beef, Dairy Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat, Champion Meat Pen of Rabbits, and Overall Grand Champion Poultry make up the Livestock Auction.
 - a. **5% of the sale price will be deducted from the 4-H checks on all livestock animals.**
 - i. The money from these deductions will be used to upgrade the livestock facilities and help pay for auction expenses.
3. A 4-H member shall be permitted to **SELL ONLY ONE OF HIS/HER ANIMALS IN THE SALE** except Rabbits, where the Champion Meat Pen may sell.
4. Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion ONLY (excluding Grand and Reserve Grand Montgomery County Bred & Raised Beef) may be INSERTED into the Auction or SUBSTITUTED for an animal signed up previously for the Auction. The exhibitor of the Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion will be allowed to sell only ONE (1) as stated in Rule 4. The Reserve Grand Champion may not precede the Grand Champion in the Auction. The cut-off time for insertion or substitution will be 8:00 a.m. on sale day. If the Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion wishes to be pulled from the Auction, another animal may be substituted. If the animal is of a different species, it will go to the end of that species sale order.
5. 4-H animals purchased, sold or offered for sale after the May 15th Livestock Enrollment deadline, and prior to the Indiana State Fair (Including animals that have gone through a “Premium Only Auction”), shall not be eligible to show in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair.
6. An exhibitor must sell his/her own exhibit, except in the case of illness. A substitute may sell the animal upon approval of the 4-H Inc. President. If a 4-Her has a substitute sell his/her animal without permission of the 4-H Inc., he/she will not be allowed to participate in the auction the following year. There must be an announcement stating this substitute is a 4-H Club member from Montgomery County.
7. Any animal sold through the 4-H Auction must have been previously shown in the respective 4-H Livestock Show.
8. 4-Hers will have numbers assigned at random for order of sale.
9. For the last specie in the auction: Any 10-year member selling in that specie must be in the upper 75% of the sale order.

Checks for the Auction will be mailed as soon as payments from all buyers have been received.

They will NOT be given out the night of the Auction!

All Auction Buyers are expected to settle accounts within 7 days of the Sale.

Livestock Projects

Reminder: State Fair livestock entries are due June 1 for beef, sheep and swine, but you only need to enter the number of animals, not the classes. Dairy cattle, Boer goats, dairy goats, meat goats, dogs, cats, pigeons, poultry, pygmy goats, rabbits, waterfowl and horse & pony are due July 1.

Beef health requirements:

1. SEE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.
2. No cattle may be exhibited that are showing signs of warts or ringworm.
3. **Testing**
 - a. **Cattle that originate within Indiana** do not need a brucellosis test or a tuberculosis test for exhibition in Indiana.
 - b. **Cattle that originate outside of Indiana** do not need a brucellosis test or a tuberculosis test for exhibition in Indiana as long as the state of origin is classified as brucellosis free **AND** tuberculosis free by the USDA.
 - i. Cattle from states that are NOT designated as free by the USDA must meet additional requirements for entry into Indiana. Contact the Indiana State Board of Animal Health for specific information.

Beef ID

1. **All Beef (including calves) must be ID in 4-H Online** to be eligible to show at the County or State Fair.
2. All Steers, Dairy Beef Steers and Crossbred Heifers must be taken to the 4-H Fairgrounds in Crawfordsville at the beef tagging dates designated for tagging and weighing. A spreadsheet will be given to you at this time for your records. Please use this sheet with the information to ID the beef on-line. If online is not available to you, please contact the Montgomery Co. Extension Office for assistance.
3. A MAXIMUM of 7 Beef calves may be shown per 4-H member.

Identification

All exhibition animals must be permanently and individually identified by an acceptable method. Official ear tags are tags approved by the USDA. Official ear tags must bear the US shield to be considered official identification (Official ear tags placed before March 11, 2017 that do not have the US shield will be accepted.) Official identification acceptable for specific species of livestock exhibited in Indiana are as follows:

CATTLE

Three different forms of USDA-approved identification are recognized by BOAH.

- 840 tags may or may not be RFID (radio frequency identification), 15 digits, beginning with 840
- NUES (brite) tags, steel or plastic
- Official USDA program tags, such as orange calf hood vaccination tags

No foggers or misters allowed.

Beef Heifers

1. Registered Heifers must be enrolled and identified PRIOR TO MAY 15TH OF THE CURRENT YEAR. They must be identified on the enrollment form with an 840-RFID tag and a tattoo.
2. ALL Registered Heifers MUST have registration papers from their breed association and be identified by registration number or dam registration number and birth date at time of enrollment.
3. A member may show both Purebred and Crossbred Heifers. The member may enter NO MORE than 3 heifers per class.

Crossbred Heifers

1. Crossbred Heifers (Commercial Heifers) may be entered at the State Fair.
2. Crossbred Heifers will be divided by weight rather than age to determine classes.

Purebred Heifers

1. Will be shown in the following heifer age groups:
 - a. Sr. Yearling.....Sept. 1 to Dec. 31, 2024
 - b. Jr. Yearling.....Jan. 1 to Apr. 30, 2025
 - c. Summer Yearling.....May 1 to Aug. 31, 2025
 - d. Senior Calf.....Sept. 1 to Dec. 31, 2025
 - e. Jr. Calf.....Jan. 1 to Mar. 31, 2026
2. If seven (7) or more Heifers are in one class, the class may be divided based on age.

Beef Steers

1. All purebred steers and heifers will be required to have an official breed registration certificate for each animal. Heifer breed classes will be determined based off of Indiana State Fair guidelines and/or the Beef Committee's discretion.
2. Copies of each purebred animal's registration paper must be attached to the Pen Assignment form.
3. All Market Steers and Commercial Heifers must have an 840-RFID tag and a 5-digit county tag. All calves will be checked for ear tags at the County Fair and the State Fair before they can be unloaded.
4. Weight classes will be determined after all Steers are weighed. There will be no more than 15 animals in any one class.
5. All steers must be dehorned.
6. All steers must have been born on or after January 1 of the previous year.
7. The rate-of-gain award will be open to Beef Steers and Dairy Beef Steers.
8. Any Beef animal that has to be led with a bull nose ring will not be allowed to unload!
9. All lost identification tags MUST be replaced BEFORE the 4-H Fair!

Cow/calves

1. A class will be offered if there are enough entries, as determined by the Beef Committee.
2. Rules are the same as for Beef Heifers except for classes.
3. Classes will be determined by the Beef Committee based on the number of entries.
4. Cows should be no more than 5 years old within the year.

Beef Grooming

Beef Grooming will be held every year. The competition is based on individuals or teams of two working on the same animal. There is competition for Junior (grades 3-5), Intermediate (grades 6-8), and Senior (grades 9-12) groomers. The winner of each division of the Grooming Contest must move on to the next division of the contest the next year. The Senior division winners will not be eligible to participate again after having won their division.

Cat Health Requirements:

SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES

1. No cats may be exhibited that test positive for or show any symptoms of any communicable diseases.
2. Each cat presented for exhibition must be accompanied by a certificate of vaccination or other statement that is signed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian and that indicates the vaccinations each animal has been given. A certification of veterinary inspection may be used to document vaccinations but is not required. (You may pick up the Certificate of Completion at the Montgomery Co. Extension office or from your leader. It must be brought by the 4-H member to the 4-H Cat Show)
3. All cats must be vaccinated at least 2 weeks prior to the Cat Show. Vaccinations are good for 1 (one) year. Cats must:
 - a. Be vaccinated for feline panleukopenia
 - b. Be vaccinated for feline rhinotracheitis
 - c. Be vaccinated for calicivirus
4. All cats must be tested for the feline leukemia virus within one hundred eighty (180) days of exhibition or vaccinated within 1 year of the show.
5. All cats over 3 months of age must be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed and accredited veterinarian in accordance with the state rabies vaccination law.
6. The Board of Animal Health recommends, but does not require that:
 - d. Exhibitors consult with their veterinarian about preventative program for heart worms for all of the cats.
 - e. Cats have a negative fecal exam for parasites not more than thirty days prior to exhibition.
 - f. Exhibitors consult with their veterinarian about vaccination for feline immunodeficiency virus (FIV) prior to exhibition.
7. **NOTICE: Indiana State 4-H imposes vaccination requirements for Cat Show participants beyond the requirements of the Indiana State Board of Health Minimum Requirements. Check with your local 4-H County Extension Educator for those requirements.**

Poster Exhibit Topics: The following suggestions are ideas for development of educational cat poster. 4-Hers need not be limited by or to just these mentioned topics.

Novice: Cat care, cat breeds, litter training, treating my cat with care and respect, cat responsibilities, grooming skills, training my cat, de-clawing good or not, neutering/spaying, I lost my cat, determining cat costs, traveling with my cat, my cat's safety.

Junior: National cat fancier associations, a cat clinic, here comes the judges, training with extra praise, let's decide for my cat, careers related to cats, should my cat have kittens?, types of cat food, feeding my cat, things I've learned, insect pests, cat tails talk, symptoms of ill health, my visiting pet therapy program, cats get old too! – saying goodbye.

Senior: Understanding a cat show, planning a cat business, am I a role model?, cat genetics, cat organs and systems, exploring careers, learning about leadership, my cat quiz bowl, teaching others, having fun learning, it's the law!, protecting our environments, issues of animal welfare/rights.

Project Rules:

1. Only ONE animal per exhibitor may be shown.
2. A cat being shown in the cat project must belong to the 4-H member or a member of their immediate family.
3. Refer to Certification of Vaccination for list of inoculations required. The certificate with the name of the veterinarian giving them shall be attached to the 4-H Cat Record Sheet. Papers will be checked at the Fair.
4. Vaccinations MUST be received by 2 weeks prior to the cat show. Those vaccinated after that date will not be allowed to show.
5. Each member is encouraged to exhibit his/her animals at the Fair. The cat is to be brought in a suitable cage or pet carrier. Kitty litter may be included but not required. Height of the cage is to permit the cat to stand but can be no larger than the 18" x 24". Each cat must wear a collar.
6. The Record Sheet must be submitted with the animal.
7. Cats will be brought to the Fairgrounds for the show only and return home.
CATS WILL BE DISPLAYED DURING THE SHOW ONLY!!
8. Cats with claws MUST have nails trimmed for judge's safety.
9. Exhibitors in either of the Purebred classes must present pedigree or registered papers at check in.
10. ONLY the cat will be exhibited, NO binders, scrapbooks, etc. will be judged.
11. Cage decorations for the Cage Decorating Class must be in or on the cage. No tabletop decorations. Cages are subject to the cage/carrier size limit of 18" x 24".

Exhibit requirements:

1. Each animal will be suitably caged in a cage furnished by the 4-H member; Cats MUST be on a leash when not caged!
2. Household Pet Classes:
 - a. Short Hair Cat over 8 months
 - b. Long Hair Cat over 8 months
 - c. Kitten – 4 to 8 months
 - d. Purebred over 8 months
 - e. Purebred Kitten 4 to 8 months
 - f. Costume class – both the exhibitor and the cat should be in costume for this class.
 - g. Cage Decorating Class
3. Animals will be judged on the following points:
 - a. Head – Well shaped
 - b. Body – Well shaped with no excess fat
 - c. Eyes – Good color with no discharge
 - d. Ears – Free of mites; clean & well-shaped
 - e. Coat – Color, Condition and free of fleas
 - f. Legs & Feet – Condition and Claws clipped
 - g. General Physical Condition
 - h. Balance - Physical & Temperamental

1. All Dairy Animals will be enrolled on the INDIANA 4-H DAIRY OWNERSHIP, ON-LINE ANIMAL ENROLLMENT and ID.
2. A maximum of seven (7) head, and two (2) breeds, may be shown by a 4-H Club Member. (Two (2) County Rule only.) Ayrshire, Jersey, Milking Shorthorn, Guernsey, Brown Swiss and Holstein are the breeds offered at the Montgomery County 4-H Fair.
3. All Dairy breeds will have the same age classification as the State Fair, subdivided as follows:

5 year old and over- Ayrshire, Jersey, and Holsteins	Born prior to August 31, 2021
4 year old and over Brown Swiss, Guernsey and Milking Shorthorn	Born prior to August 31, 2022

2 year old cow	Born September 1, 2023 to February 29, 2024
Junior 2 year old cow	Born March 1, 2024 to August 31, 2024
Fall yearling	Born September 1, 2024 to November 30, 2024
Winter yearling	Born December 1, 2024 to February 28, 2025
Spring yearling	Born March 1, 2025 to May 31, 2025
Summer Yearling	Born June 1, 2025 to August 31, 2025
Fall calf	Born September 1, 2025 to November 30, 2025

Spring calf	Born March 1, 2026 or later, at least 4 months old

4. Cows in milk will be tied the morning of the Dairy Show. ALL COWS THAT ARE IN MILK PRODUCTION WILL BE RELEASED AFTER THE SHOW.
5. SENIOR CALVES MAY SHOW ALL IN ONE CLASS. The Superintendent has the right to divide this class, if necessary.

- All animals for State Fair must be registered. They must be identified at time of enrollment with a Registration number, OR Dam's registration number, and birthdays. In addition, they also must have an 840-RFID tag and DNA hair sample.
- All animals not registered should be so indicated as "NOT REGISTERED" in the identification column on the Enrollment Form.

Dairy Beef means raising a Dairy Steer for meat purposes. The Steers used in a Dairy Beef project must be 100% Dairy animals. (Holsteins, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Ayrshire, Milking Shorthorn, or any cross of the six).

- All 4-H Beef Rules apply to the 4-H Dairy Beef Project.
- Each member may exhibit two (2) Steers in each Dairy Beef class.
- Steers may be divided into classes by weight.
- Steers must be born after August 1, 2024 (must be under 2 years of age).
- Steers must be dehorned to show at the 4-H Fair.
- Steers will be judged by the Beef Judges during the Beef Show. A minimum of 2 Purebred Dairy Beef Steers are required for a breed to be shown. If the minimum is not met, the animal will be shown in All Other Breeds Class.
- All Dairy Steers must be tagged and weighed on the announced date (see Beef Information). They must be properly ID'd and enrolled in the 4-H Online system by the May 15 deadline.
- The Champion Dairy Beef Steer will be eligible to compete in the Champion Beef Steer Show.

The 4-H Dog Project provides fun, hands-on learning experiences that develop life skills, encourages youth to develop good character, discipline, and a feeling of self-worth while learning about canine care, responsibility, and the sport of dog showing. Youth have the opportunity to develop responsibility, decision-making, nurturing, and communication skills through active participation. The dog serves as a tool in the growth of each individual and is a unique conduit to open interactions between the members. The dog show provides an opportunity for a member to exhibit what he or she has accomplished. Members, who spend months working their dog perfecting skills in training, can put their proficiency to a test, demonstrating the dog's usefulness as a companion while behaving in a public place in the presence of other dogs.

Dogs health requirements:

SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES

1. No dog may be exhibited showing any symptoms of a communicable disease and are parasite free (including fleas).
2. Female dogs in season will not be admitted.
3. Each dog presented for exhibition and before attending classes must be accompanied by a Certificate of Vaccination or other statement that is signed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian and that indicates the vaccinations each animal has been given.
4. Vaccinations must be current. All dogs must have received a Rabies & DHPP vaccination either one (1) or three (3) years prior to exhibition. Leptospirosis and Bordetella (Kennel Cough) must be received within one (1) year of the date of exhibition.
 - a. Rabies
 - b. DHPP
 - c. Leptospirosis
 - d. Bordetella (Kennel Cough)
5. All dogs 3 months of age and over must be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed and accredited veterinarian in accordance with the state rabies vaccination law.
6. The Board of Animal Health recommends, but does not require that:
 - a. Exhibitors test their dogs that are six (6) months of age and older for heart worms. It is recommended that dogs that test positive for heart worms not be shown. Exhibitors should implement a preventative program for heart worms.
 - b. Dogs have a negative fecal exam for parasites not more than thirty days prior to exhibition.

NOTICE: Indiana State 4-H imposes vaccination requirements for Dog Show participants beyond the requirements of the Indiana State Board of Health Minimum requirements. Check with your local 4-H County Extension Educator for those requirements.

General Rules:

1. Each participant can show one dog. They must show in obedience to participate in showmanship or agility.
 - a. A participant may show two dogs at the county level after the 4-H member has completed level 1B/2A and with leader approval. Both dogs must be shown in obedience to participate in showmanship or agility.
 - b. At the state level, a 4-H member may show two dogs ONLY if one is the 4-H obedience trained dog and the second is trained through the 4-H Service Dog Program (leader dogs/guide dogs).
2. Dogs may be of any breed or mixed breeds and any size. Some larger breeds may be at a disadvantage in agility due to the standard size of equipment like the height of the tunnel, or width of dog walk
3. Each dog may only be shown by one child. At the county level, a second child in the same household may show the same dog as “exhibition only” but will not receive a placing.
4. A dog being shown in the dog project must belong to the 4-H member or a member of their immediate family.
5. Dogs can be any age, but puppies must have been born by January 1 of the current year in order to compete at the State level. Puppies are welcome to show at County Level as long as they have received their vaccines including Rabies and have a current Certificate of Vaccination Form.
6. All dogs must be vaccinated.
7. Each trainer is to keep a complete record of his/her dog, including feeding costs, health care costs, training record and time spent grooming.

Training Program:

1. It shall be the responsibility of the Member to sign the roll book at each class.
2. Members are encouraged to attend all training classes due to the progressive nature of the training. Members are HIGHLY ENCOURAGED to attend at least 3 obedience classes and 5 agility classes in order to show at County Fair. Classes can be made up with prior arrangements with the leaders.
3. Members must have a 6-foot lead (preferably leather) and a proper fitting training collar (nylon or chain choker type or flat buckle collar), a martingale or equivalent for showmanship, and a flat buckle collar for agility that are all acceptable for exhibition.
4. Members are expected to practice at home a minimum of 30 minutes per day. This is best as two 15-minute or three 10-minute sessions.
5. Female dogs in heat/season must not attend class. 4-H members are still encouraged to attend class and continue to work with their dog at home. Unfortunately, females in heat are not allowed to show at the County or State shows.
6. Puppies too young for Rabies vaccination are allowed to participate in training as long as they have received vaccines standard for their age (minimum of 1 DHPP vaccine). Members assume the risk of exposing the puppy to serious illness (that could result in death) if they are not yet fully vaccinated.
7. All classes, exercises and judging will comply with State Fair Rules.

Obedience:

Dog obedience is the ability for a dog to follow commands taught by their handler. Basic obedience exercises include heeling, sit, down, stay, and recall (come). Obedience training is also a great way to train the dog to behave appropriately in social situations at home and abroad.

The handler/dog team may begin at any eligible level and progress from there. Teams are encouraged to move out of repeatable classes when ready. A team may skip up class(es) if they desire but may not move back to a lower class than the one they entered in previous years. A handler who re-enters a class that is not repeatable will do so for exhibition only (no placing).

In any given year, a 4-H dog must be shown at the same obedience level at the Indiana State Fair 4-H Dog Show that the dog was entered in as a part of the county 4-H program (excluding exhibition only). Each year the member and their dog will progress to the next level as they master obedience exercises specific to each level. Leaders will not hold members back if they are ready for a level above where they should be showing.

- Obedience Classes: 1A (not repeatable)
- 1B (only repeatable with a new dog)
- 2A (not repeatable with same dog)
- 2B (repeatable until ready to move up)
- 3A (not repeatable with same dog)
- 3B (repeatable)
- 4A (not repeatable with same dog)
- 4B (repeatable)
- 5A (not repeatable with same dog)
- 5B (repeatable)
- 6A (not repeatable with same dog),
- 6B (repeatable)
- Veterans - for dogs who are at least 7 years old or are physically challenged. Must have completed at least level 2B prior to entering veterans. A dog may not be shown in any other class once they have been shown in Veterans so they remain in that class the remainder of their 4-H tenure.

Full descriptions of each class and fully detailed rules to showing in obedience can be found in the Dog Obedience Guide “Showing in Dog Obedience” 4-H-1009-W.

Showmanship:

Showmanship is concerned with how well the dog is shown by the handler. The dog’s conformation or its being purebred is of no importance. The emphasis is on the handler’s presentation of the dog standing still and in motion. The handler must convey knowledge and understanding of the dog’s breed or the breed chosen as that which the dog most resembles. The handler should present the dog according to the chosen single breed standard. The handler and dog appear to be part of a team. They work well together, move fluidly, and give an overall picture of being one unit.

Showmanship Classes:

- **Junior:** This class is for any 4-H exhibitor who is in the third, fourth, or fifth grade on January 1 of the current year. Once an exhibitor is the Junior Showmanship winner at the state fair, he/she is only eligible to compete in Intermediate or Senior Showmanship in future years.
- **Intermediate:** This class is for any 4-H member in the sixth, seventh, or eighth grade on January 1 of the current year or for showmanship winners in the previous class. Once an exhibitor is the Intermediate Showmanship winner at the state fair, he/she must compete in Senior Showmanship in future years.
- **Senior:** This class is for any 4-H member in the ninth grade or above on January 1 of the current year or for showmanship winners in the previous class.

Details and more information can be found in the “Indiana 4-H Dog Showmanship Guide” 4-H-716-W.

Agility:

Dog Agility Program is part of the 4-H Dog project. Youth learn to guide their dogs through an obstacle course against time without touching the dogs or obstacles. The program allows youth to learn to communicate clearly and quickly with their dogs, build teamwork skills, develop mental acuity, and learn dog training and showing skills for the exciting dog sport of agility. Dogs must be at least 15 months old to compete but can start training on obstacles prior to that age (no jumps). Dogs must also exhibit in obedience in the same show to be eligible to exhibit in agility. Dogs disqualified in obedience may not compete in agility. If a dog completes agility before being disqualified in obedience, the agility score sheet is changed to disqualified. Dogs otherwise qualified but disqualified as the result of accident or injury are eligible, as long as the disfigurement does not interfere with functional movement. Dogs should be physically sound. Blind dogs, meaning dogs that don't have useful vision, are not eligible. No dog shall compete if it is taped or bandaged, or in any way has anything attached to it for medical purposes.

Agility Classes:

A dog may be entered in only one agility class. Each class offers five divisions based on the dog's height at the withers.

- 4 Inches: For dogs 11 inches and under at the withers
- 8 Inches: For dogs 14 inches and under at the withers
- 12 Inches: For dogs 18 inches and under at the withers
- 16 Inches: For dogs 22 inches and under at the withers
- 20 Inches: For dogs over 22 inches at the withers

**Dogs 7 years and older may be entered as Agility Veterans and jump one height division lower than their actual height division. Once taken, the Agility Veteran designation remains with the dog for the rest of its 4-H show career. The Agility Veteran designation is independent of the Obedience Veteran class.

- **Class Beginning A:** Neither the 4-H member nor dog have previously participated in agility. The course is run on leash. The team must use a 6-foot leash. This class is not repeatable.
- **Class Beginning B:** for either the 4-H member or dog has previously participated in agility. The 4-H member may have participated with another dog, or the dog may have participated with another 4-H member. The course is run off leash. The dog should repeat Beginning B until it can perform Intermediate-level work.
- **Class Intermediate A:** is for 4-H members who have not participated in Intermediate agility in a previous year. The course is run off leash. This class is not repeatable.
- **Class Intermediate B:** is for 4-H members who have participated in Intermediate agility with the current or a different dog in a previous year. The course is run off leash. The dog should repeat Intermediate B until it can perform Advanced-level work.
- **Class Advanced A:** is for 4-H members who have not participated in Advanced agility in a previous year. The course is run off leash. This class is not repeatable.
- **Class Advanced B:** is for 4-H members who have participated in Advanced agility with the current or a different dog in a previous year. The course is run off leash. The dog should repeat Advanced B until it can perform Excellent-level work.
- **Class Excellent:** is for 4-H members and dogs exhibiting more advanced handling skills over the same obstacles as those in the Advanced classes. The course is run off leash.

Full rules and detailed descriptions of obstacles and classes can be found in “Indiana Dog 4-H Agility Rules” 4-H-1020-W

Drill Team:

Drill Team is a State Fair Competition only. Drill Team is a choreographed routine of obedience exercises and showmanship movements set to music. A drill team consists of 4-H exhibitors and their dogs. Handler and dog equal one unit and teams must have a minimum of 4 units, with a maximum of 20 units. A 4-H member may participate on only one drill team in any given year. A club may enter a total of two drill teams. All members of the drill team must be accompanied by their 4-H obedience dog while performing in the drill team ring. Drill Team members must commit to showing at the State Fair in a minimum of Obedience and Drill Team. Drill Team requires additional training time after regular training sessions and extended training between County and State Fair. Participants and parents must be seriously committed to attending all Drill Team practices.

Sheep & Goats health requirements

SEE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.

1. Blankets must be removed from all sheep at the time of arrival.
2. All sheep wethers must be presented slick shorn for inspection at arrival.
3. No goats may be exhibited that are showing signs of being infected with ringworm. For more information on sheep and goat health requirements, call the Indiana Board of Animal Health (317)544-2400.

Goats Identification:

Please use this chart as a resource to ensure that your goats are properly identified for how you intend to show them. ALL goats must meet the Indiana Board of Animal Health identification requirements for exhibition, which are:

- A. Official Scrapie identification tag, with US shield
- B. Official Scrapie tattoo
 - i. Must begin with the state postal code along with a unique animal ID number.
- C. Registration tattoo
 - i. Tattoo must be noted on the registration paper and accompany the animal.
- D. Registration microchip
 - i. Electronic implant must be noted on the registration paper and accompany the animal.

Tattoos will be verified at check-in. Tattoos must be legible & match the listed tattoos on the registration paper. In order to make tattoo verification easier, please make sure tattoos are dry and extra ink has been removed before check-in. Pygmy goats may be microchipped as long as the exhibitor provides a scanner and the goat is scanned at tag-in, check-in, and before entering the show arena.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION CONCERNING ACCEPTABLE REGISTRATIONS CAN BE FOUND IN THE “OWNERSHIP AND REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS” SECTION OF THIS HANDBOOK.

For goats which CANNOT physically wear an ear tag (i.e. gopher/elf ear LaManchas), a scrapie tag may be attached to a safe, non-detachable collar, as long as the collar or ear tag must be cut to be removed. This form of identification is only acceptable for County Fair and will NOT be accepted for State Fair exhibition.

Goat Requirements:

1. All goats must be enrolled on 4-H Online by MAY 15.
2. 4-H members may enter more than one breed of goats.
3. Each 4-Her may exhibit seven (7) goats (Breed or Total?) at the County Fair.
4. Goats may be of grade or registered stock for the County Fair. Full Blood Boer Does & Percentage Boer Does MUST be registered to show as such. Unregistered Boer will be shown in the Commercial Meat Doe class. Copies of Registration papers must be turned in ahead of time (by email or dropped off, etc). Registration papers are required for the State Fair. 4-H animals may not show on a signed transfer.
5. All goats must wear a collar or choker chain.
6. All goats must have trimmed hooves and clean presentation. Dairy Goats must be cleaned clipped leaving the tail in a pom-pom or brushed out.
EXCEPTION: Kids under 6 months of age need not be clipped entirely.
7. Boer Goats/Meat Goats can be shown with natural horns. The horns must be tipped or the animal can be disbudded.
8. Pygmy Goats can be shown with natural horns.
9. Intact male goats are not permitted. No testicular tissue can be visible.
10. Goats for 4-H must be owned and under the care of the 4-Her no later than May 15th.
11. All exhibitors must keep pens and walkways clean at all times.
12. Age of animal determined from date of the next Montgomery County 4-H Goat Show.

Dairy Goat

Breed Classes: Alpine, LaMancha, Nigerian Dwarf, Nubian, Oberhasli, Saanen, Sable, Toggenburg, Recorded Grade.

- Senior Does - 1 year to under 2 years
- Senior Does - Over 2 years

A Champion and a Reserve Champion Kiko Doe will be selected, and will later compete in the Meat Doe Grand Drive.

Myotonic Does:

The following breeding classes will be offered for Myotonic Does:

- Junior Does - Under 6 months
- Junior Does - 6 months to under 1 year
- Senior Does - 1 year to under 2 years
- Senior Does - Over 2 years

A Champion and a Reserve Champion Myotonic Doe will be selected, and will later compete in the Meat Doe Grand Drive.

Meat Doe Grand Drive:

This will consist of each Champion and Reserve Champion from the meat breeds - Full Blood Boer, Percentage Boer, Commercial, Kiko, Myotonic. A Grand Champion Meat Doe, Reserve Grand Champion Meat Doe, Third Overall Meat Doe, Fourth Overall Meat Doe, and Fifth Overall Meat Doe will be selected.

Program Policy

The 4-H Horse and Pony project provides youth with a fun hands-on experience that develops life skills as well as teaches valuable information about properly caring for their animal. Subjects such as general management, training, nutrition, housing, and health care are presented in the curricular materials, through workshops and activities such as horse bowl, hippology, judging, and in preparation of the exhibit. Youth also have the opportunity to develop responsibility, decision-making, nurturing, and communication skills through active participation in the 4-H Horse & Pony Project. Our club abides by the Program Policies and Class Specifications Show & Equipment Rules found in the Indiana 4-H Horse and Pony Handbook (4-H 661), except in cases where the Montgomery County 4-H Inc. Board has approved an adaptation that would expand opportunities for membership and/or participation in the Horse and Pony club. The 4-H 661 Handbook is available in the Extension Office (One (1) copy of per family). All reasonable accommodations will be made for any child with a disability in accordance with the Guidelines for Accommodation of Children with Disabilities in the Indiana 4-H Horse and Pony Project (4-H 915-W).

Any situation not covered by these policies shall be handled by the proper representative of the Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service and/or the Montgomery County 4-H Inc. Board.

Horse Health and Identification Requirements

SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.

For more information on horse health requirements for exhibition in the State of Indiana, contact the Indiana Board of Animal Health at (317) 544-2400, or visit their website at <https://www.in.gov/boah>.

1. 4-H horses and ponies exhibited must be vaccinated and meet current Indiana State Health Requirements and/or regulations. A current Certificate of Completion of Indiana 4-H Requirements for Exhibition of 4-H Horse and Pony (4-H-1031-W) is required and a copy must be on file with or presented to a club leader prior to unloading a horse at any Montgomery County 4-H Horse and Pony event the animal attends.
 - a. Horses coming from outside the State of Indiana within 12 months of the date of exhibition must test negative for E.I.A. Equine Infectious Anemia (Coggins test) and be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection that indicates the results of the E.I.A. test. A suckling foal accompanying a dam that has tested negative for E.I.A. within twelve months of the exhibition is exempt from the E.I.A. testing requirements.
2. Animal Identification:
 - a. The physical description of the animal including: name, age, breed, color, gender, distinctive markings, cowlicks, scars, blemishes, biometric measures, brands, tattoos, etc., must be entered on the record sheet.
 - b. A color photograph (clearly showing the face and all four feet) must be attached to the record sheet.

Ownership

1. Exhibitor must be enrolled during the current year in the 4-H project exhibited and their animal(s) must be under the 4-H member's ownership or leased by May 15. Ownership/lease must be maintained continuously until the completion of the County Fair. Records must be started by May 15th. No animal may be substituted or traded for the original animal after May 15th, unless approval has been granted by the Montgomery County 4-H Inc. Board.
2. 4-H animals are expected to be in the personal possession and regular care of the 4-H member who owns/leases them unless other arrangements need to be made so a 4-Her has the opportunity to participate in this project.
3. Leasing is considered the equivalent of ownership of the 4-H project animal. The 4-Her should be regularly involved in the care of the horse, regardless of where stabled, and the 4-Her should have first right of show use.
4. Any Horse or Pony shown after May 15 by anyone other than the 4-Her will not be eligible to show at the Indiana State Fair but will be eligible for County Fair as long as the animal is signed up by the May 15 deadline and meets all other criteria. This term/condition does not apply to siblings and parents who may show each other's animals at any show during the year without jeopardizing State Fair eligibility.

Measurement Procedures

1. Exhibitor must be enrolled during the current year in the 4-H project 1. If a member selects that their horse is 56" and under, then the pony must be measured by a certified measuring individual. The date of measurement is to be determined by a club leader.
2. Any animal not measured by a certified measuring individual will be shown in the over 56" classes.

Show Eligibility Requirements

1. The 4-Her must be enrolled in Montgomery County 4-H and in good standing.
2. Official Indiana 4-H Horse & Pony Enrollment must be completed by May 15 online at <https://v2.4honline.com>.
3. The 4-H exhibitor is responsible for the accuracy and completeness of the 4-H Horse & Pony Enrollment Entry. If the entries are incorrect or inaccurate, the 4-H member will not be able to exhibit the affected animal at the County Fair without prior approval of the representative of the Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service and/or the Montgomery County 4-H Inc. Board.
4. If a horse or pony is leased, a copy of the lease must be uploaded at the time of enrollment or on file at the Montgomery County Extension Office by May 15.
5. The Horse & Pony member will show his/her record book to the leader(s) for signature so they can receive their exhibitors' number to be able to show their animal. It is the responsibility of the 4-Her to record placings, awards, etc. and to turn in their books upon completion of the fair show. Fair awards will be announced after each class and given to exhibitors when they turn in their record book.
6. It is highly recommended that 4-H Horse & Pony members attend at least one (1) regular Horse & Pony club meeting and one (1) Open Arena/Clinic. A copy of the schedule can be picked up at the Extension Office or by contacting a 4-H Horse & Pony club leader.

Fair Show Rules

1. 4-H members requiring special accommodation are encouraged to show horses and will be allowed assistance and rule modifications when appropriate.
2. Although early sign-up is strongly encouraged and will ensure an exhibitor's name is listed on the fair show program, class entries can be made up until the first contestant enters the ring.
3. Classes offered are subject to evaluation. Classes may be added to avoid exclusion or may be deleted due to lack of participation. Classes with large numbers may also be split into cuts with a final round at the discretion of the judge.
4. Exhibitors are responsible for checking in at the gate just prior to their class and safely entering the arena. Exhibitors not present may be disqualified after a 1-minute gate call at the discretion of the judge.
5. At the Montgomery County Fair, 4-H members must show their own animals. In the case of a medical emergency or conflict with the showing of other species, the 4-H member may have their animal shown by another 4-H Horse & Pony exhibitor (in conformation classes only). Approval of the Horse & Pony club leader must be granted prior to the showing of the animal by a substitute showman.

Fair Show Rules

6. 4-H Horse & Pony exhibitors may enter a maximum of five (5) horses at the Montgomery County Fair.
 - a. Only one (1) horse per exhibitor may be entered in a group class.
 - b. Exhibitors may show up to three (3) animals in a halter class and may be assisted in handling the additional animal(s) by another properly enrolled 4-H Horse & Pony member. Mare and foal winners are not eligible for champion and reserve. Only champions will be considered for grand champion.
 - c. Up to three (3) horses per exhibitor may be entered in an individual class where only one (1) horse at a time is being shown in the arena.
7. Only 4-H Horse & Pony members may lead, ride, or drive 4-H animals on fair grounds during an approved 4-H show or event. Only the member's parent/guardian or an approved adult volunteer may assist a member by leading their horse to the gate for a show class. During non-show open arena events, the member's parent/guardian or an approved adult volunteer may lead, ride, or drive their horse during warm up, only if it is deemed necessary for the member's safety or the safety of others. Adults must lead by example and wear protective headgear whenever mounted or driving on the Montgomery County Fair Grounds.
8. All participants in the ring while a class is being judged shall be 4-H members (an exception is made for Pleasure Driving and for assisted classes). Adults serving in this capacity must be approved 4-H volunteers or family members.
9. Ribbons previously won will not be worn in any class.
10. Any exhibitor (or their parents, teachers, etc.) who breaks a governing rule may be barred from showing and/or forfeit any prizes.
11. Ring courtesy dictates that exhibitors must maintain a safe distance between animals in their halter and performance classes.
12. Exhibitors in a Walk-Trot class may show in a class that requires the canter or lope at the same show as long as it's not in the corresponding class, e.g., Walk-Trot Trail class exhibitor may not show in the Walk-Trot-Lope Trail class.
13. Contesting horses will be brought to the arena in a controlled manner as determined by the judge before beginning the pattern. Assistance may be given by one person of the contestant's choice. Failure to enter or leave the arena in a safe, controlled manner may result in disqualification at the discretion of the judge.
14. Versatility
 - a. Exhibitors are allowed two (2) helpers. Helpers must be properly attired in closed toe shoes (long pants and boots are recommended but not required).
 - b. Exhibitors (one horse/one rider combination) will compete in four (4) classes: Hunter Under Saddle (HUS), Western Horsemanship (WH), Western Pleasure (WP), and Barrel Racing (BR).
 - c. Exhibitors will be scored and ranked in all portions of the competition (example: if there are 15 exhibitors, rank will be from 1 (best) to 15 (worst)).
 - d. All classes will be judged per the current edition of the Indiana Horse & Pony Handbook, with the exception that all participants in each class will be placed with regard to their performance in that discipline. Contestants that would otherwise have not been placed due to disqualification will be placed but will not be placed higher than any participant who is not disqualified.
 - e. The quickest barrel time will receive the lowest score and the slowest time will receive the highest score.

- a. To determine final placing, the rank score from Hunter Under Saddle, Western Horsemanship, Western Pleasure, and Barrels will be added. The contestant with the lowest overall score will win. In the case of a tie in the rank scores, the tied exhibitors will re-run the Barrels and the exhibitor with the lowest time will win.
 - b. Horse/Rider combination who wins is not eligible to win again.
15. Horse & Pony Supreme Showmanship will be a separate class and will be shown primarily on Western day unless there is a conflict or that show day has been rescheduled after the fair. All senior members are allowed to show unless they have won Overall Supreme Showmanship in the past or won Showmanship with a different species in the same year. Also, any Intermediate Showmanship winner who has won their division and moved up to the Senior Level is also eligible.
 16. All 4-H Horse & Pony members must clean up after their animals and themselves during and after each Horse & Pony event.
 17. The show judge shall be charged with the authority to interpret 4-H rules. All judging will be done from the ring except in contesting, over fences, color guard, and dressage classes. All classes shall be judged by the current edition of the Indiana Horse & Pony Handbook (4-H 661); therefore, exhibitors should secure a copy from the county Extension Office. Decision of the judge shall be final.

The Indiana State Fair Board determined that qualification was no longer required for the Indiana State Fair 4-H Horse and Pony show. Following is the State Fair entry process:

1. It is strongly recommended that 4-H members successfully complete the skills and exhibit at an area or county show for any class they wish to enter at the State level.
2. More details regarding the Indiana State Fair 4-H Horse and Pony show is available in the current version of the State Fair 4-H/FFA Premium Book.

A 3-dimensional exhibit is preferred for poultry science projects. Poultry science displays must occupy a space no larger than 30" deep x 48" wide x 72" high.

Poultry health requirements:

SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.

1. All poultry presented for exhibition shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection or an appropriate National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) certificate.
2. All poultry (except for waterfowl) presented for exhibition must meet **ONE** of the following requirements:
 - a. Test negative for pullorum-typhoid within 90 days prior to the date of their exhibition.
 - b. Be hatched from eggs originating from certified NPIP pullorum typhoid clean parent flocks.
 - c. Originate from a flock where the entire flock is certified NPIP pullorum-typhoid clean.
 - d. **No poultry may be exhibited showing signs of an infectious or communicable disease.**
 - e. **No mite, lice or maggots.**
3. **No poultry may be exhibited showing excessive signs of external parasite infestation.**

For more information on poultry health requirements, call the Indiana State Board of Animal Health at (317)544-2400.

General Rules:

1. All birds must be enrolled on a county enrollment form by May 15.
2. The exhibitor must show all entries!
3. It is recommended that 4-H birds be hatched prior to April 15. Poultry, Waterfowl are to be owned by May 15.
4. In each 4-H Commercial Class, two (2) pullets or two (2) hens of the same breed, constitute one (1) entry. Classes are as follows: white egg shell pullet, white egg shell hen, brown egg shell pullet, brown egg shell hen.
5. In each Exhibition 4-H Chicken Class, 2 pullets or 2 cockerel, or 2 hens or 2 cock birds of RECOGNIZED STANDARD BREEDS, INCLUDING BANTAMS CONSTITUTES ONE ENTRY. These birds can be of different or the same breed. Birds may not be crossbred birds or they will be disqualified. If the bird cannot be found in the Poultry Standard of Perfection book they will not be able to be shown.
6. In each Waterfowl Class for both ducks and geese, one (1) male or one female constitutes one (1) entry. Classes are by breed and may only have two (2) entries per breed and only one (1) breed per class.
7. Each 4-H member may exhibit a MAXIMUM of 24 entries total.
 - a. A maximum of one (1) entry per each Commercial class and a maximum of two (2) entries per each Exhibition class.
 - b. A maximum of six (6) entries in the Waterfowl classes with no more than two (2) entries per class (i.e. Pekin Ducks, Rouen Ducks, Bantam Ducks, Other breeds of ducks, Embden Geese, Toulouse Geese, and other breeds of Geese.)
 - c. The only classes that will be offered at the county fair are those that are listed above.
 - d. All birds must be free of external parasites (mites & lice). Any bird with parasites will be sent home.
8. Dirty birds will be lowered one placing.
9. All entries must be on the pen assignments. No switching after the pen assignments are in. No changes will be made at the fair. The NPIP Clean Flock form MUST be turned in to the Extension Office with the pen assignments to be eligible to show.
10. No props may be used in show cages at the time of the show, ie. carpets, cardboard, food. Birds must be placed in cages as set up.

Chickens:

(All Chickens must be dry when entered at the Fair)

4-H Commercial Chicken Classes:

Description of Classes:

- **Pullets** - White egg shell class & brown egg shell class. Two birds shown as a pair of the same breed that are less than one (1) year the day of the show.
- **Hens** - White egg shell class & brown egg shell class. Two birds shown as a pair of the same breed that are more than one (1) year of age the day of the show.

4-H Exhibition Chicken Classes (chickens bred for Exhibition Purposes)

These birds will be judged according to the American Standard of Perfection authorized by the American Poultry Association.

Standard Breed and Bantams Breed Classes are as follows:

- Two (2) Pullets less than one (1) year of age day of show
- Two (2) Cockerels less than 1 (one) year of age day of show
- Two (2) Hens more than one (1) year of age day of show
- Two (2) Cocks more than one (1) year of age day of show

May show the same or different breed in the same class.

Waterfowl:

These birds will be judged according to the American Standard of Perfection.

Classes are as follows:

- **Young Male** - Under 1 year of age old
- **Male** - Over 1 year of age
- **Young Female** - Under 1 year of age old
- **Female** - Over 1 year of age

Maximum of two (2) entries per class and one breed in each class.

One Drake

One Hen

Emden, Toulouse, & All Other Breeds of Geese:

Meat Birds:

Broilers - 2 birds of the same sex, 6 - 8 weeks, and under 5 1/2 pounds on show day.

Rabbits health requirements:

SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.

Subject to health inspection on the grounds.

No rabbit may be exhibited showing signs of infectious or communicable disease.

No rabbit may be exhibited showing signs of external parasite infestation. (lice or mites)

Rabbit Identification: Tattoo

Rabbit Rules:

1. A 4-H member may enter and show and maximum of 6 entries with (1) entry per class, plus a meat pen, which makes a total of 7. One meat pen per member, which is made up of 3 rabbits of the same breed and same variety. Meat pens will be housed in one cage. They must weigh between 3 ½ to 5 ½ pounds and they may not exceed 10 weeks of age at show date. There is a limit of 2 breeds per 4-Her. **ALL RABBITS SHOWN MUST BE PUREBRED!** Pedigree papers will be checked when animals are checked in.
2. All classes will be judged according to ages and weights as established by the American Rabbit Breeders Association, Inc.
3. It is not necessary for a rabbit exhibit to have been a county champion or a selected winner to enter and compete at the State Fair.
4. **Substitutions after pen assignment deadline will only be accepted if they are within the same class.**
5. 4-H Rabbits sold or purchased privately or offered for sale at public auction after May 15 and prior to the County 4-H Fair shall not be eligible to show.
6. All rabbits, except meat pens, must be owned and tattooed prior to May 15th.
7. 4-H Rabbits shown at other shows after May 15 under different ownerships will not be allowed to show.
8. Any Rabbit showing signs of disease will be barred from the show!
9. **ALL RABBITS MUST BE TATTOOED! THE TATTOO MUST BE IN THE LEFT EAR! NO EXCEPTIONS!**
10. All 4-H members will carry only their own rabbits to and from the judging table on the day of the show. The only exception allowed is to show other livestock at the same time. **ONLY EXHIBITORS** will be allowed in the show arena area.
11. 4-Hers must clean and water Rabbits **TWICE DAILY.**
12. **EACH MEMBER WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR CLEANING UNDER THEIR RABBIT CAGES TWICE DAILY.**

Rabbit Ambassador Contest:

Novice – 4-H member in the 3rd or 4th grade on January 1st of the current year

Junior – 4-H member in the 5th or 6th grade on January 1st of the current year

Intermediate – 4-H member in the 7th or 8th grade on January 1st of the current year

Senior – 4-H member in the 9th or 10 grade on January 1st of the current year

Master- 4-H member in the 11th grade or above on January 1st of the current year

Supreme- 4-H member who has won Master but is still 4-H eligible.

Requirements:

1. 4-Hers must have shown in and been nominated from their respective county to go on to the State Fair level. 4-Hers with special needs must indicate the need for accommodation on their Rabbit Ambassador Entry form.
2. Each county may nominate only five (5) contestants. Category winners are not eligible in the same category again. Winners are eligible to compete in the next higher category the following year. Winners of the Master division may come back in the Supreme division.
 - 1) **One Novice** - Grades 3 or 4
 - 2) **One Junior** - Grades 5 or 6
 - 3) **One Intermediate** - Grades 7 or 8
 - 4) **One Senior** - Grades 9 or 10
 - 5) **One Master** - Grades 11 or above
3. In the event that the nominated contestant is unable to participate, one (1) alternate in each division may be substituted provided written or verbal confirmation comes from the County Extension Office to the 4- H Rabbit Show Manager at the Indiana State Fair.
4. No resource or reference material may be used during the contest by the participants. Contestants must provide a #2 pencil for writing purposes.
5. Questions for the contest will be taken from the following publications:
For All Levels:
 - a. Ohio State Rabbit Resource
 - b. Standard of Perfection 2011-2115 (published by ARBA) Note: this is a new edition
6. Tie scores will be broken as follows:
 - a. Highest test score, then, if necessary,
 - b. Highest breed identification score, then, if necessary,
 - c. Oral test given by a committee of three (3) people appointed by rabbit ambassador chairperson.
7. Decision of the judges/Contest Committee shall be final.
8. In the event there is a conflict of information, the Standard of Perfection is considered the authority.

4-H Rabbit Ambassador Contest Procedures:

1. Test – 100 points

- a. Questions may be true-false, multiple choice or a combination there of
- b. Answers are recorded on a scantron form (ours will probably be graded by hand)

2. Breed Identification – 60 points

- a. Identify and classify ten (10) rabbits according to show room classification and class.
- b. Show room classification refers to the term used to enter the rabbit in a show thereby indicating how it is shown. Specifically, the Netherland Dwarf rabbit is shown by variety and should be identified by variety only. The Jersey Woolly breed is shown by groups and should be identified by group only.

3. Showmanship – 100 points.

- a. Each contestant must furnish his/her own rabbit and bring the rabbit to the judge in a carrier. Rabbit must be tattooed.
- b. The rabbit should be in a solid bottom carrier.
- c. Contestants should refer to the 4-H Rabbit Ambassador Contest Showmanship Score Sheet as a resource. This form will be available in the Extension Offices or on the 4-H website. (www.four-h.purdue.edu)

Sheep & Goats Health Requirements:

1. Blankets must be removed from all sheep at the time of arrival.
2. All sheep must be sheared within 5 days of check-in of the local 4-H fair. This excludes all female fitted wool breeds. Sheep must be presented slick-shorn for inspection at arrival.
3. No sheep or goats may be exhibited that are showing signs of being infected with ringworm.

Sheep Identification

Market Lambs – Must have:

- Official Scrapie identification tag with US shield
- 5-digit county visual tag
- 840- RFID tag and DNA hair sample (if exhibit at Indiana State Fair)
- Purebred market lambs must be born of purebred parents of the same breed and exhibit characteristics consistent with that breed.

Breeding Ewes (Lambs & Yearlings) - Must have:

- Official Scrapie identification tag with US shield
- 5-digit county visual tag/tattoo/or flock tag (tag number must correspond to tag number listed on the registration papers of purebred ewes).
- 840- RFID tag and DNA hair sample (if exhibiting at Indiana State Fair)
- Except for commercial ewes, all purebred breeding sheep must be registered, the registration number recorded with the breed association, and the papers in possession of the exhibitor. The breeder's tag/tattoo must be worn if required by breed association.

Exhibitor Requirements:

1. Must have all livestock enrolled on 4-H Online by May 15th.
2. Must be Quality Assurance Trained before county fair livestock check-in or date specified by extension staff, whichever comes first.
3. Substitute and/or additional showmen must be a Montgomery County 4-H Livestock project member and approved by the superintendent.

General Rules

1. The sheep project will be operating by modified Indiana State Fair rules. For any questions or clarifications, please contact the Sheep superintendent or the 4-H Youth Development Extension Educator.
2. All wethers and all ewes must be tagged by the date 4-H Inc. has set.
 - a. If you purchase a lamb after the tag date, you will need to make arrangements with barn superintendent and 4-H Youth Educator to get them tagged/scanned before May 15.
3. Premise ID is required or Proof of Application must be attained by July 1.
4. Any sheep showing signs of sore mouth, ringworm, foot rot, any contagious disease or sickness will NOT be admitted to the fairgrounds. Barn superintendents may request veterinarian assistance if necessary. All sheep must have tails docked (except Jacobs, Dorpers, and St. Croix due to breed characteristics).
5. All exhibitors may show a maximum of eight (8) animals of which no more than four (4) may be market lambs.
6. Sheep designated for the 4-H auction will be ineligible for any further 4-H exhibitions including the Indiana State Fair. All animals must be removed from the grounds upon release, including auction animals.
7. All sheep must be unloaded and presented without blankets for close inspection by designated staff at fair check-in.
8. All sheep must arrive show ready:
 - a. All market lambs (including ewe lambs shown as market lambs) MUST be slick shorn at a uniform length (1/8 inch or less) with no wool between hock/knee and ears upon arrival.
 - b. The following breeding ewes: Whiteface Cross, Blackface Cross, Dorset Advantage, Shropshire, Southdown, and any unregistered ewe or ewe lamb MUST be slick shorn at a uniform length (1/8 inch or less) with no wool between hock/knee and ears upon arrival.
9. Exhibitors shall keep their pens and aisle areas clean at all times.
 - a. Only Household type fans shall be used inside the barn.
 - b. Canopies/Tents may be set up no earlier than 24 hours before the designated livestock check in date (i.e.: Livestock check in at 4pm Friday = Tents can be set at 4pm or later Thursday). Canopies/Tents set up earlier will be removed.
10. Pens shall be completely cleaned prior to departure.
11. All sheep must stay on fairgrounds property during the fair.
12. A market lamb or breeding ewe identified in a particular breed may be changed to the commercial or crossbred division before final entries are made. A sheep identified as a commercial or crossbred animal will not be allowed to switch to a purebred classification after May 15.
13. Painting (market and breeding) is allowed following check-in, paint and/or coloring sheep prior to check-in is prohibited; violations to this rule will result in the disqualification of the animal.
 - a. The check-in committee will visually inspect all animals for signs of disease or illness, and appropriate breed characteristics. The superintendent will resolve any issues discovered by the committee.

- Classes will be posted in the Sheep Barn no later than the morning before the show day until 11 am. Corrections to class postings can be made until that time. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to ensure their sheep are in the correct classes. Changes will not be made after noon on the day before the show. Programs will be printed at noon and no further changes will be made.
- ONLY yearling ewes may be shown in the ring by exhibitors. If two exhibitors are used, the 4-H exhibitor who owns the ewe being shown must hold the ewe's head.

4-H Market Lamb Qualifications:

1. Exhibitors may show a maximum of four (4) market lambs. (Exhibitors may not show more than a total of 8 animals at the county fair)
2. All market lambs must be under one (1) year-of-age on show day and still have their lamb's teeth intact.
3. 4-H members may not show the same ewe lamb as both a market lamb and a breeding ewe at the fair. A ewe lamb can, however, be shown as a 4-H market lamb one (1) year and then shown as a yearling breeding ewe the following year.
4. Any lambs showing evidence of testicular tissue may be ineligible
5. Market Lambs must arrive show ready. Specifically, slick shorn at a uniform length (1/8 inch or less). Market lambs may not be shown with wool over 1/8 of an inch in between the hock/knee and ears. If this includes belly wool.
6. All sheep will be unloaded and presented without blankets for close inspection by designated department staff.
7. 4-H market lambs are not allowed to be shown with ear tags that display wording of any kind and will be covered up during check-in. Only official, county issued, five-digit ear tags and scrapie tags will be permitted.
8. Painting (Market & Breeding) is allowed following check-in, paint and/or coloring sheep prior to check-in is prohibited; violations to this rule will result in the disqualification of the animal.
9. Classes will be divided using the lamb's weight.
10. Purebred market lambs must be born of purebred parents of the same breed and exhibit characteristics consistent with that breed.
11. All class winners will show for breed champion, and the second place animal to the breed champion may compete for reserve breed champion.
12. All breed champions will show for grand champion Market Lamb. Once a Breed Champion is selected for any position in the overall selection that respective Reserve Breed Champion will be allowed to enter the ring for contention.

4-H Breeding Ewe Qualifications:

1. A 4-H exhibitor may show a maximum of six (6) ewes. From these six ewes a 4-H exhibitor may show, a maximum of two (2) ewes per age division per breed (i.e. spring ewe lambs, fall ewe lambs, and yearling ewes}. Divisions (fitted, slick) within a breed count against the total for that breed. e.g. 1 slick yearling ewe and 1 fitted yearling ewe of the same breed equals the maximum for that breed. (Exhibitors may not show more than a total of 8 animals at the county fair).
2. Ewe lambs must have been born after September 1st of the previous year. Fall Ewe lambs are born between September 1st and December 31st of the previous year; Spring Ewe lambs are born on or after January 1st of the current year; Yearlings are over 1 year of age but not more than 2 years of age.
3. Animals exhibited in the ewe lamb classes must still have their lamb's teeth intact. Lambs with broken mouths or showing evidence of yearling teeth, will show in a yearling class. Determination of yearling ewes' teeth will be at the discretion of the judge.

4. All sheep will be unloaded and presented without blankets for close inspection by designated department staff.
5. All breeding sheep may be exhibited either shorn or with full fleece except for Dorset Advantage, Shropshire, Southdown, Blackface Cross and Whiteface cross ewes. All Dorset Advantage, Shropshire, Southdown and Blackface Cross and Whiteface cross ewes must be slick shorn for exhibition.
6. Ewes in any slick sheared class must arrive show ready. Specifically, slick shorn at a uniform length (1/8 inch or less). Slick Shorn Ewes may not be shown with wool over 1/8 of an inch in between the hock/knee and ears. This includes belly wool.
7. A separate class for slick sheared ewe lambs will be offered for the Dorset, Suffolk, Hampshire, and Oxford breeds. The slick shorn class will be shown as the first class of ewe lambs in each breed. The Dorset, Suffolk, Hampshire, and Oxford breeds will also offer a slick shorn class for yearling ewes and this class will show before the fitted yearling ewes.
8. All ewes must be identified with an ear tag or tattoo.
9. Except for Blackface Cross and Whiteface Cross ewes, all breeding sheep must be registered, the registration number recorded with the breed association and the papers (no photocopies, carbon or FAX copies except a FAX directly from the national breed association to the 4-H Extension Educator) in the possession of the exhibitor. The breeder's tag/tattoo must be worn if required by the breed association. If the exhibitor does not have papers the ewe will be shown as a black or white face cross.
10. Painting (Market & Breeding) is allowed following check-in, paint and/or coloring sheep prior to check-in is prohibited; violations to this rule will result in the disqualification of the animal.
11. All Black and White face cross ewe lambs and yearling ewes will be weighed for class designations.
12. Ewe lambs shown as 4-H market lambs will not be eligible to show in 4-H breeding ewe classes.
13. ONLY Yearling ewes may be shown in the ring by two exhibitors. If two exhibitors are used, the 4-H exhibitor who owns the ewe being shown must hold the ewe's head.
14. All class winners will show for breed champion, and the second place animal to the breed champion may compete for reserve breed champion.
15. The champion ewe in each breed will compete for the Grand Champion Ewe. Once a Breed Champion is selected for any position in the overall Ewe selection that respective Reserve Breed Champion will be allowed to enter the ring for contention.

Fraud and Deception Rules:

1. The Sheep Superintendent has the right to resolve any unforeseen matters not covered by general terms and conditions listed in the Montgomery County 4-H Info Book.
2. Tampering, altering, and/or misrepresentation relative to any exhibit is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, breeding, age, ownership, and/or method of preparation for completion. (Ex. In livestock, this includes, but is not limited to, coloring that alters or misrepresents breed characteristics, pumping and filling)
3. Unethical fitting of animal exhibits is defined as the administration of any substance (to included, but not limited to, drugs, blood, oils, steroids, air, chemical substances) or performance of any surgical or nonsurgical procedure altering the animal's configuration or natural conformation of any part of the animal's body, or rendering its tissues unfit for human consumption is prohibited.
4. The direct application of ice, alcohol, Freon or any other chemical refrigerant to the hide of a lamb is strictly prohibited. Any other applications deemed inhumane or cruel will not be tolerated. These deceptive, fraudulent practices will cause the exhibitor and their animal(s) to be disqualified immediately.
5. An exhibitor or person representing an exhibitor may not take exception to the decisions of the Superintendent or Judge in an unprofessional and/or public manner.

Small Animals

The purpose of the 4-H Small Animal project is to give youth an opportunity to learn about the care of an animal. It will be your responsibility to feed, water, and care for your pet. Any animal that is offered as a project cannot be exhibited as a small animal, with the exception of non-pedigreed rabbits.

Swine health requirements:

SEE HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.

1. Brucellosis Testing
Swine from Indiana do not need a brucellosis test. Swine from outside the state do not need a brucellosis test as long as the state of origin is classified brucellosis free by the United States Department of Agriculture.
2. Pseudorabies Testing
Swine from Indiana do not need a pseudorabies test.
Swine from outside the state do not need a pseudorabies test as long as the state of origin is classified pseudorabies free by the United States Department of Agriculture.

For more information on swine health requirements, call the Indiana Board of Animal Health at (317)554-2396.

Swine Identification:

- Official ear tag
- Ear notch, if the ear notch has been recorded in the book of record of a purebred registry association
- Tattoo, if the tattoo is registered with a swine registry association

General Rules

All swine must have standard ear notches for breeding and exhibitions AND be entered in 4-H Online by May 15. If there are fresh ear notches found in any of the swine exhibitor's pig's ears, then they will not be able to show at the Montgomery County 4-H Fair nor the Indiana State Fair. In addition to the ear notches, DNA hair samples will be required for all swine to be eligible for the Indianan State Fair. Collection envelopes will be supplied this spring. DNA hair samples will be due in the county office by May 15 for any barrow/gilt that the 4-H member wants to be eligible for the state fair. It is the 4-H member's responsibility to collect an adequate sample and turn into the county.

No two (2) animals of the same breed from the same family may have the same ear notches UNLESS the superintendent is contacted by May 15.

For the Montgomery County 4-H Fair, if there is an identification error with what is entered into 4-H Online, there will be an opportunity to file a grievance within 24 hours of the incident to the 4-H Grievance Committee. See the Grievance/Appeal Guidelines for County for more details about this process.

1. The exhibitor may show a maximum of six (6) animals of any breed not to exceed four (4) animals of one sex.
2. All animals must be farrowed on or after December 1 of the year prior to the year of the show.
3. Swine must be kept penned during the Beef Show.
4. Altering of a pig's natural color (black to white, white to black, red to black, sandy to white, etc) will result in disqualification for that animal. Any further action will be decided by the 4-H Grievance Committee.
5. All purebred gilts and barrows must turn in a copy of purebred registration papers with pen assignment postcards to the Extension office. See Livestock Ownership and Registration Requirements for acceptable formats of registration names. Failure to turn in copies of purebred registration papers will result in those animals being shown in the crossbred divisions. Purebred gilts will be shown by age, but classes will not be split by month. Purebred barrows will be shown by weight. There must be more than three (3) pigs in a breed to have multiple classes of that breed.
6. Crossbred barrows and gilts will be divided into light and dark divisions that will be further divided by weight into classes and will compete against one another for a singular Crossbred Champion. Classification verification will be conducted by the Swine Superintendent and committee. The guidelines for each division are as follows:
 - a. Light Cross – A pig with white and/or blue only.
 - b. Dark Cross – All other colors, (black, red, and sandy), excluding solid white or blue.

Mini 4-H

Exhibit Requirements:

Mini 4-Hers can participate in workbook activities in livestock projects and may be able to show at the fair as part of the mentor-ship program if they qualify. Mini 4-H Record Sheets should be placed in the Green 4-H Record Book and kept for your personal records.

NOTE: All posters for Mini 4-H projects are 14”x22”.
Use foam poster boards for stability while displaying poster at the fair. These boards can be purchased at the Extension Office.

General Rules and Regulations for Exhibitors

1. A Project Completion Card is required to check in all projects. The Project Completion Card will be provided by the 4-H leader upon reviewing and signing the project record sheet for each project prior to the day of check-in. All project record sheets should be kept in the Green Record Book. **DO NOT** bring your Green Record Book to project check-in. Extra record sheets are available in the Extension Office. Completed Green Record Books should then be kept by the 4-Her in a safe place for use in subsequent years.
2. All exhibits must be checked in within the allotted time period. **Late exhibits will automatically be lowered one ribbon placing.** Exhibits arriving too late to be judged will receive a Green Ribbon.
3. Projects not meeting minimum requirements of the specific projects will be lowered one placing.
4. If a 4-H member takes more than one division of a project, the higher division only will be exhibited. Your Leader will check the lower divisions for completion.
5. Blue ribbons will not be awarded to exhibits that, in the opinion of the Judge, are unworthy of them. Only blue-ribbon projects will be selected for champion and reserve champion. The two most outstanding exhibits in each project area will be awarded Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion. The judge is not required to give any champions if projects are not worthy.
6. Projects selected to exhibit at the State Fair will receive a sticker to indicate selection based on State Fair entry rules as listed under each project. An alternate may also be selected for each State Fair entry.
7. Superintendent makes the final decision. That decision may be appealed.
8. **ALL ARTICLES ARE TO REMAIN IN THE EXHIBIT BUILDINGS UNTIL CHECK-OUT TIME.** Please remove all exhibits at check-out time.
9. All 4-Hers will have an exhibit tag provided for them. Posters should also include 4-Her's name on the back. Display an exhibitor tag in the lower right corner. **CHECK WITH PROJECT REQUIREMENTS FOR ANY EXCEPTION**
10. See page 91 for information on the "Displaying A Project." These directions should be followed for ALL posters unless otherwise specified. Posters will be lowered one placing if not displayed horizontally, be the correct size, and properly covered.
11. All posters, 3-ring binders, and display boards **MUST** include a reference list indicating where the information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include website links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended that this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, added as the last page of a binder, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.

Completion Requirements:

Exhibition may be completed by one or more of the following:



1. Display Project
2. Educational Poster (see below for “Proper Poster Preparation”) Posters should be educational and be developed around the educational topics in the manuals.
3. Action Demonstration

Displaying a Project:

When displaying a project be sure to complete a record sheet (can be picked up at the Extension Office. The record sheet should be signed by a leader and placed in a Green Record Book prior to the fair. Your Leader will then provide you with a Project Completion Card. Bring the Completion Card (or a photograph of both sides on your phone to project check-in on the dates and times announced. Do not bring your Green Record Book. Failure to supply a Project Completion Card with your project will result in an incomplete on your project and on your permanent records. Also a Record of Achievement Card should be placed in the front of your Green Record Book to record your placings before the end of the fair. To see an example to how to fill out the “Record of Achievement” card, please refer to page 17.

Educational Posters:

Posters must be displayed horizontally and meet all size and preparation requirements as given below. Posters that do not meet these requirements will be lowered one placing.




- Posters for 4-H must be 22 x 28 inches. (Mini 4-H posters should be 22 x 14 inches.) Stiff backing must be attached or the use of the proper size of foam board is acceptable. The thickness of the poster board plus backing must be no more than ¼ inches. Objects may be placed on the board giving it a 3-D effect.
- Stiff backing may be Masonite, wall paneling, plywood, foam-core or piece of heavy cardboard with no folds, all with the appropriate thickness. It is also acceptable to use poster board that is already attached to foam-core. It is best if the poster board is attached to the backing with rubber cement. If you use rubber cement, you can usually use the backing again.


- You may either fasten the poster board to the backing before or after attaching pictures, labels, leaves, etc. Attaching the poster board before putting anything on it works best. After cementing the two together, make sure to let them dry for a few days. If not, the cement may retain moisture and ruin your poster.
- Leave a 2”x 4” space for the exhibitor tag in the lower right hand corner of the poster. This space will be used for the exhibitor tag should the poster be chosen for State Fair. The 4-Hers name and club should be put on the back of the poster board. Display an exhibitor tag in the lower right corner. CHECK WITH PROJECT REQUIREMENTS FOR ANY EXCEPTION
- When finished, cover the poster with clear plastic that is heavy enough not to wrinkle. **DO NOT USE PLASTIC FOOD WRAP!! Plastic sleeves for this purpose are available at the Extension Office or you can purchase plastic at a home center.** Lay a sheet of plastic (approximately 28”x 34”) on a hard surface. Place the poster face down on the plastic. Wrap the plastic edges around to the back side of the poster and tape in place. Masking tape works best. The final thickness of your poster should not exceed 1/4 inch with the exception of objects placed on the poster that makes a 3-D effect. A frame kit can also be used as long as it is the correct size.
- Posters must have a title on them. If noted under the specific project information, (ex. Photography project), then use that title listed. Otherwise, the title should describe the poster or activity. Subtitles may be added to explain poster topic. If the project manual or other materials are to be exhibited with the poster, attach a manila envelope to the back of the poster and put the manual inside.
- Posters should be educational and should be developed around the educational topics in the manuals.
- Posters should “tell a story” or be informative to the audience. Will the viewer of your poster learn something from the exhibit?
- When designing your poster, you should consider: lines, shapes, textures, colors and placement of items.
- Pictures, graphics, and artwork are encouraged.
- Make sure the poster accurately meets the guidelines and objectives of the activities in the manual.
- Information printed directly off the web will not be accepted.
- Materials included in the poster need to be educational, both for the youth and the audience, and should demonstrate that the youth was able to take what he or she learned from their research (experiment, or on the web, in the library, etc.) and/or activities to create the poster.

Display Board

Some projects have an option of making a display board for your project. A Display Board consists of a three-sided display not to exceed 30" deep x 48" wide x 72" high. Three-dimensional items may be attached to the board. Consult your project requirements for other size requirements.

3-Ring Binders

Binders need to be a sturdy 3 ring binder (with stiff covers. No report covers or similar styles. Make sure the 3-ring binder accurately meets the guidelines and objectives of the activities in the manual. Information printed directly off the web will not be accepted.

Materials included in the binder need to be educational, both for the youth and the audience, and should demonstrate that the youth was able to take what he or she learned from their research (experiment, or on web, in library, etc. and/or activities to create the 3-ring binder. Work should include references where appropriate. Pictures, graphics, and artwork are encouraged.

Interactive Demonstration

Any 4-H member may participate in the Interactive Demonstration. This is designed for the novice person, and the topic can be related to any 4-H project. The 4-H member will provide a short demonstration of no more than 3 minutes that will actively engage members of the audience how-to-do skill development. Examples include, but are not limited to, how to use a measuring cup, how to use a ruler, how to knead dough, how to clean grooming clippers, how to crop a photo, etc. Props are permitted. Live animals and PowerPoint displays are NOT permitted. Although participants will not be judged, and adult will watch the 4-H member's interactive demonstration and will provide feedback to the member. The 4-H member will continually repeat their how- to interactive demonstration for the designated time period, typically 45-60 minutes.

Any 4-H member wishing to participate in an Interactive Demonstration at the county level, will be eligible to go the Indiana State Fair and participate in the State Interactive Demonstration. The interactive demonstration is a non- competitive event at the Indiana State Fair. Refer to the Indiana State Fair 4-H handbook for the date, time, and location of each event. Check with your county extension educator for information about entering your county contest.

A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.

Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. The poster must be mounted on a firm backing to add stiffness to the exhibit, for example: a foam core board. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.

Judges evaluating exhibits should recognize individual differences and creativity, therefore using information in this document as a guide rather than a requirement.

Rockets may be exhibited with a base, but launch pads are not permitted. All rockets must weigh less than 3.3 pounds, and considered an amateur rocket according to FAA regulations. 2. Learn to fly a remote control aircraft or drone of your choice that is age/grade appropriate and compliant with FAA regulations, federal and state laws, and local ordinances. This exhibit choice is to include a notebook or poster including how the aircraft/drone was used and aerospace skills learned. Displaying the aircraft or drone is optional. Other topics could include how a quadcopter operates, controls used to fly a quadcopter, UAV regulations administered by Federal Aviation Administration, commercial and emergency uses of UAVs, and more.

Construct a rocket of your choice designed for a model rocket enthusiast with some experience and with a difficulty level that is appropriate for the suggested grade level, or a poster or display board on any topic in the manual. Similar topics not included in the manual are permissible. Rockets cannot be ready-to-fly (RTF) or have plastic fins. Cluster engine rockets and rockets that take an engine E or above are not permitted in this level.
2. Construct or learn to fly a remote control aircraft or drone of your choice that is age/grade appropriate and compliant with FAA regulations, federal and state laws, and local ordinances. This exhibit choice is to include a notebook or poster including how the aircraft/drone was used and aerospace skills learned. Displaying the aircraft or drone is optional. Other topics could include interviewing a certified UAV pilot who works in law enforcement, EMS, fire, Purdue Extension, commercial or other application. Other options could include creating a flight plan or interfacing with other computer software.

Advanced – (Grades 9-12, suggested)

Exhibit Requirements for Advanced:

1. Construct a rocket of your choice designed for an experienced model rocket enthusiast and with a difficulty level that is appropriate for the suggested grade level, or a poster or display board on any topic in the manual. Similar topics not included in the manual are permissible. Rockets cannot be ready-to-fly (RTF) or have plastic fins. Cluster engine rockets and rockets that take an engine G or above are not permitted in this level.
2. Construct or learn to fly a remote control aircraft or drone of your choice that is age/grade appropriate and compliant with FAA regulations, federal and state laws, and local ordinances. This exhibit choice is to include a notebook or poster including how the aircraft/drone was used and aerospace skills learned. Displaying the aircraft or drone is optional. Cake Decorating

Exhibit Introduction

The cake decorating subject provides skills-based educational experiences that provide an opportunity for mastery before building on that experience to develop more advanced skills. This subject area is divided into three levels: Beginner (Grades 3-5), Intermediate (Grades 6-8), and Advanced (Grades 9-12). While the defined grades are intended to be a guide, older youth enrolled in this subject for the first time may start in a lower grade skill level with permission by the county extension educator, followed by an appropriate level the following year.

Skills and techniques demonstrated should be age/grade appropriate. While it is not to say a beginner level member cannot master an advanced level skill, it would be rare and unique. Therefore, exhibited cakes must demonstrate the minimum five techniques from their given level outlined in Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills and Techniques, 4-H 710A, but may also include higher/lower level techniques that have been mastered. Any higher/lower level techniques will not be counted as part of the minimum five, but nevertheless will be evaluated for quality. All exhibited cakes must be created using a Styrofoam, foam, or other solid dummy. Unless otherwise stated, cakes are to be iced using buttercream or royal icing. Buttercream icing will not withstand environmental conditions and may become soft, melt, not withhold its shape, and colors may bleed when being displayed an extended period of time.

When displaying a cut-up cake or tiered cake, the exhibitor must include a diagram and description indicating how the cake was assembled. This diagram and description can be attached to or written on the skills sheet. All exhibits must include a completed Cake Decorating Skills Sheet (4-H 710) and must accompany the cake for the judge’s reference during judging.

Beginner (Grades 3-5, suggested)

A minimum of five beginner level skills are to be demonstrated. A list of skills to choose from can be found on the Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills and Techniques, 4-H 710A sheet. Cakes must be on a cake board strong enough to support the cake (approximately 3/8" thick) and 2-4" larger than the cake. For example, if the cake is 8" in diameter, then the cake board must be 10-12" in diameter. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath. Cakes exhibited in the beginner level are to be a single tier/layer, no more than 5" tall, and may be round, square, or rectangular and the cake board is to be no more 12"x12".

Intermediate (Grades 6-8, suggested)

A minimum of five intermediate level skills are to be demonstrated and the cake may include additional skills from the beginner level. A list of skills to choose from can be found on the Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills and Techniques, 4-H 710A sheet. Cakes must be on a cake board strong enough to support the cake (approximately 3/8" thick) and 2-4" larger than the cake. For example, if the cake is 9"x13" rectangular, then the cake board must be 11"x15" to 13"x17" rectangular. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath. Cakes exhibited in the intermediate level are to be a single or double layer, no more than 12" tall and may be any shape. Youth may choose to decorate an inverted (upside down) character pan or create a 3-dimensional cake. It is also permissible to cut-up pieces of Styrofoam, foam, or other solid material to create a new shape, like a butterfly or castle for example. The cake board is to be no more than 24"x24".

Advanced (Grades 9-12, suggested)

A minimum of five advanced level skills are to be demonstrated and the cake may include additional skills from the beginner and intermediate levels. A list of skills to choose from can be found on the Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills and Techniques, 4-H 710A sheet. Cakes must be on a cake board strong enough to support the cake (approximately 1/2" thick) and 4" larger than the base cake. For example, if the cake is 26" in diameter, then the cake board must be 30" in diameter. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath. Cakes exhibited in the advanced level may be multiple layer and/or tiered and may include multiple cakes, like a wedding cake. Youth may choose to create a character or 3-dimensional cake by cutting-up pieces of Styrofoam, foam, or other solid material to create a new shape. Dowel rods, plates, etc. should be used to support multiple layers and tiers. Fondant icing, gum, and sugar paste is permissible. Cakes may be any shape, no more than 36" tall and the cake board is to be no more than 36"x36". A minimum of five advanced level skills are to be demonstrated and the cake may include additional skills from the beginner and intermediate levels. A list of skills to choose from can be found on the Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills and Techniques, 4-H 710A sheet.

Public Speaking – 3 junior and 3 senior per county.
Creative Writing – 3 exhibits per county, one per level.

Effective communications drives all aspects of day-to-day life. Youth are to learn about the process of communications, to learn about different modes of communications and to strengthen their own communications skills. As you explore the world of communications and the manuals, you will enjoy learning more about yourself and others. Youth completing this project are expected to participate in a variety of experiences allowing them to develop communication skills rather than create an exhibit to be displayed at the county or state fair.

A series of 4-H manuals is available with activities designed to develop communication skills at a specific grade level. Module 1 is for Beginner Level youth in grades 3-5. Module 2 is for Intermediate Level youth in grades 6-8. Module 3 is for Advanced Level youth in grades 9-12. Suggested activities to develop communication skills include:

- Complete an activity from the grade appropriate manual.
- Give a demonstration or presentation at a club meeting.
- Participate in a verbal communication event. See verbal communication section below.
- Submit a news release to local news media about a 4-H event or topic.
- Participate in a radio interview.
- Present information about 4-H to a civic organization or similar group.
- Participate in the Indiana 4-H Spread the News workshop (Grades 9-12).
- Participate as an actor in a community theater.
- Other activities that demonstrate communication skill development.

Verbal Communication Events

The following verbal communication events and activities are offered to 4-H members as a way to teach presentation and public speaking skill development. They are often used in 4-H meetings, and a county 4-H youth development program may choose to offer these as competitive events. The demonstration, informative presentation, professional persuasive presentation and public speaking are competitive events at Indiana State Fair. Artificial Intelligence (AI) may be used, with parent permission, when creating this speech or presentation and is to be documented as a reference. A majority of the work to create this speech or presentation is to be the 4-H member's original work.

The following apply to all state fair communication events:

- Members may use a PowerPoint, Prezi, or other digital presentation, signs, and other props that will enhance their presentation when giving their how-to demonstration to the audience from a stage or stage-like setting.
- If digital media will be used to enhance the presentation, contestants are encouraged to provide their own laptop computer. If the laptop is not equipped with a standard HDMI external video connection, the contestant will need to supply an appropriate adapter. While a standard PC laptop will be available, the quality and compatibility of the digital media cannot be guaranteed as PowerPoint will be the only digital media available at state fair.
- Live animals are not permitted at state fair.
- There is no interaction with the audience.
- Questions may be asked of the contestants by the judges following the presentation.
- Events that have a team category, it is for two (2) people and will be determined by the highest grade level of any member of that team. If a team is awarded the State Fair Achievement Trip, only those team members in grades 9-12 will be permitted to attend the trip.
- The State Fair Achievement Trip may be awarded in each event to a maximum of the top three (3) blue merit senior individual members and top (1) blue merit senior team at the discretion of the judges. Trip winners must be of blue merit quality.

Refer to the Indiana State Fair 4-H handbook for the date, time, and location of each event. Check with your county extension educator for information about entering these events.

Demonstration

- All 4-H members are encouraged to present a demonstration at their club or county level.
- This contest allows the 4-H member to show the audience step-by-step procedures how-to-do something related to any 4-H project.
- Examples of a demonstration include how to take a prize winning photograph, how to give an intramuscular antibiotic injection or shot, how to design a mini-barn blueprint, how to construct a garment, how to develop a wildlife rehabilitation plan, how to treat a cat for fleas, etc.
- Junior members (grades 3-8) have 5-7 minutes to present their demonstration, while senior members (grades 9-12) will present their demonstration in 5-10 minutes.
- Categories will be Junior Individual, Senior Individual, Junior Team, and Senior Team.

Informative 4-H Presentation

- This contest allows the 4-H member to present a topic of their choice related to a 4-H event, project, or activity to the audience.
- Examples of an informative 4-H presentation include the benefits of attending 4-H Round-Up, State 4-H Junior Leader Conference, 4-H Academy, or Citizenship Washington Focus; the impact of a community service project on the 4-H members involved and their community; why a family should enroll their children in 4-H; how 4-H prepares a young person for the workforce or college, etc.
- Junior members (grades 3-8) have 5-7 minutes to present their informative presentation, while senior members (grades 9-12) will present their informative presentation in 5-10 minutes.
- Categories will be Junior Individual and Senior Individual.

Professional Persuasive Presentation

- Contestants will be required to research a public issue in their community, collect data showing how this issue is or could affect their community, formulate a plan to address this issue, and present it in a professional manner using electronic digital media such as PowerPoint, Prezi, etc.
- Contestants are to submit two (2) sets of accompanying handouts at registration. These handouts will be provided to the judges.
- It is suggested that youth practice by presenting their professional presentation to service clubs, 4-H council or fair board, government officials, or other boards.
- Examples of public issues could be the lack of accessibility to trails or public parks, congested traffic locations, public health issues, impoverished neighborhoods, school dropout rates, the size of farm machinery outgrowing the size of roads, etc.
- Junior members (grades 3-8) will present in 5-7 minutes and senior members (grades 9-12) will present their professional presentation in 5-10 minutes.
- Categories will be Junior Individual, Senior Individual, Junior Team and Senior Team.

Public Speaking

- This contest allows the 4-H member to give their prepared speech to an audience from a stage or stage-like setting.
- Props, signs, and PowerPoint presentations are not permitted.
- The topic can be of the 4-H member's choice.
- Junior members (grades 3-8) have 3-5 minutes to give their speech while senior members (grades 9-12) will give their speech in 5-7 minutes.

Creative Writing

- This exhibit allows youth to express creativity while developing writing skills. Examples include a story, autobiography, biography, journal entry, poetry, children's story, skit or play, fiction in verse, alternative history, song lyrics, movie script, creative nonfiction and more. Writing must be authored by the 4-H member and can be fiction or non-fiction.
- Exhibits are to be displayed in a notebook or binder appropriately labeled on the front with the title, 4-H member's name, grade in school, club and county. The notebook or binder is to include a title page and authored work. While most creative writing exhibits will not require research, a bibliography giving credit to sources is to be included with any research article.
- Work can be handwritten or typewritten.
- Illustrations or photos may be included to enhance the writing.
- Writing should not include excessive blood, gore, violence or sexual themes and must be appropriate for all ages to read.

Creative Writing Exhibit Class Guidelines:

Beginner (Grades 3-5 suggested)

Create and exhibit one age/grade appropriate item. While length or word count is not required, at least one-page or 250 words is appropriate for most beginners.

Intermediate (Grades 6-8 suggested)

Create and exhibit one age/grade appropriate item. While length or word count is not required, at least two-page or 500 words is appropriate for most intermediate members.

Advanced (Grades 9-12 suggested)

Create and exhibit one age/grade appropriate item. While length or word count is not required, at least three pages or more than 750 words is appropriate for most advanced members.

Entries:

Champions: One champion and reserve champion will be selected from each level.

Youth enrolled in the computer project will select one of the below subject categories to study, regardless of grade. Youth may choose to create an exhibit demonstrating skills learned during the year. Artificial Intelligence (AI) may be used, with parent permission, when creating this exhibit and is to be documented as a reference. The majority of the work to create this exhibit is to be the 4-H member's original work. Check with your county Purdue Extension Office to determine if a computer will be available during judging and if there will be an opportunity to explain your exhibit to the judge. Exhibits qualifying for state fair are to be submitted on a thumb drive securely attached to a notebook/portfolio describing accomplishments, skills learned, design ideas, budget, a summary of what was done, screenshots showing the development and final project, etc. as the exhibitor will not be able to discuss their work with a judge. Poster and display board exhibits are permissible. Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect content. The poster must be mounted on a firm backing to add stiffness to the exhibit, for example: a foam core board. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right-hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff. Youth may continue in the same subject category in subsequent years, expand the previous year's topic, or choose a new topic. Subject categories are:

- Programming, Block- and Text-based Programming
- Hardware and Networking Design/Install/Repair
- Computer Forensics
- Web Design and Computer Entrepreneurship
- Graphic Design, Computer Art, and 3-D Printing
- Robotics
- Videography

Software submitted to be reviewed by a judge must be compatible on both PC and Mac platform. If additional software other than Microsoft Office Suite is required to view the member's work, that software must be provided by the member and comply with all manufacturer copyright laws. Apps can be Android or IOS compatible.

All notebooks/portfolios must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be the last page of a notebook or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.

Judges evaluating exhibits should recognize individual differences and creativity, therefore using information in this document as a guide rather than a requirement.

Programming, Block- and Text-Based Programming:

Youth can submit programming projects in a language of their choosing. Some popular choices include, but are not limited to:

- Block-based: Scratch, Code Studio, Alice, etc.
- Text-based: Python, JavaScript, C/C++, C#, ASP.net, R, Go, Java, PHP, Perl, Ruby, etc.

- More robust demonstration of beginner skills

- Correct syntax
- Functions
- Algorithms
- Any other similar skill

Advanced Grades 9-12 – Create a program using programming language of your choice. You should comment your work and it must include at least ten different commands. Skills this program could use are:

- Parameters
- Recursion
- Interact with databases
- Classes
- Objects
- Methods
- Inheritance
- More robust demonstration of Intermediate Skills
- Integrate multiple languages into one program
- Demonstrate utilization of a version control system
- Any other similar skill

Graphic Design:

There are three divisions; Beginner (Grades 3-5), Intermediate (Grades 6-8) and Advanced (Grades 9-12). Youth are to use a software program to create or design an item that requires graphic design or artistry. The name of the software and version is to be included with the exhibit. Exhibits are to be age/grade appropriate. Ideas include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Logo design
- Promotional brochure
- Computer altered photographs/images – Photographs taken by the 4-H member and altered by the 4-H member using a computer are to be entered in the Photography project as a creative/experimental exhibit. Youth must obtain permission from the owner before altering someone else’s photograph/image and include a copy of that permission with the exhibit to insure there is no copyright violation.
- T-shirt or apparel screen printing design
- Promotional brochure

3-D Printing:

Beginner (Grades 3-5)

- Youth can use premade designs with minor modifications. Youth should document the modifications, and cite any sources used for the project.

Intermediate (Grades 6-8)

- Youth can use premade designs with modifications. Youth should document the modifications, and cite any sources used for the project.

Advanced (Grades 9-12)

- Youth are to use a software program to create or design an item printed using a 3-D printer. Youth are encouraged to design and create their own work in totality.
- If youth use a pre-made template, modify enough so that the majority of the design is completed by the 4-H member. Youth must cite any sources used for the project.

All divisions should include:

- o The name of the software and version
- o Printer make and model
- o Notebook detailing steps as well as the files you printed
- o Exhibits are to be age/grade appropriate

Robotics:

Suggested exhibits include, but are not limited to, a notebook including a printout of code with requirements marked, a flowchart showing how the robot works, images of the robot being built and the final robot in action, a video, a live demonstration, or other applicable exhibits. A notebook detailing your steps/process is highly recommended.

Beginner – Grades 3-5

- Create a flowchart
- Build a robot
 - o Use block- or text-based program to operate
 - Sequential programs
 - Events at beginning
 - o Use at least one basic sensor
- Model and demonstrate robot behaviors using a simulation environment (e.g. VEXcode VR [<https://vr.vex.com>])

Videography:

Suggested exhibits include A completed video project (e.g., documentary, commercial, short story, instructional, or innovation video are a few suggestions), A notebook or portfolio detailing the process, which should include:

- Planning steps
- Storyboarding
- Script
- Equipment/software used
- Editing steps
- Reference list (sources, interviews, websites, etc.)

Beginner – Grades 3-5

- Create a flowchart of the video process
- Build a simple video project using basic editing tools
- Use block- or text-based programs for any automation or effects
- Demonstrate sequential planning and basic events (e.g., opening credits, transitions)
- Use at least one basic effect or technique (e.g., fade-in, title screen)

Intermediate – Grades 6-8

- Create a flowchart with sub-routines (e.g., scenes, chapters)
- Include at least two advanced effects or editing techniques
- Use at least three events in the video (e.g., transitions, overlays, audio cues)
- Create at least two loops or repeated elements (e.g., recurring theme music)
- Ensure smooth operation and flow of the video

Advanced – Grades 9-12 above guidelines plus:

- Use text-based editing or scripting tools for advanced logic
- Incorporate multiple (three or more) events and loops
- Include at least three sub-routines (e.g., intro, body, conclusion)
- Special consideration for original work (not using templates or kits)

Additional Notes:

- All divisions should encourage creativity and originality.
- Exhibits must be age/grade appropriate.
- Judges should use these guidelines as a reference, not a strict requirement, and recognize individual differences and creativity.

State Fair Entries: One entry per county.

Exhibits can include farm scenes, town models, building replicas, or similar items and can be constructed from building blocks (Lego), erector sets, or other materials, and to include a Craft Card. The product should be constructed to scale as much as possible. The exhibit can be no larger than a standard 8' long table. A county 4-H program may implement a smaller size limit if available facility space merits.

Exhibitors should be considerate of space. Exhibits too large to safely move or requiring lots of space should be exhibited using photographs and a description of work in a notebook.

If an exhibitor is concerned about their creation being damaged while on display, they should consider constructing a clear plastic cover to encase the exhibit.

Judges evaluating exhibits should recognize individual differences and creativity, therefore using information in this document as a guide rather than a requirement.

Beginner (Grades 3 , 4 , 5 suggested)

Create and exhibit one age/grade appropriate artistic scene or replica.

Intermediate (Grades 6 , 7 , 8 suggested)

Create and exhibit one age/grade appropriate artistic scene or replica.

Create and exhibit one age/grade appropriate artistic scene or replica.

Consumer Clothing judging is done during the week following the Queen Contest. A public “Consumer Clothing” Fashion Revue is held during the Fair. 4-Hers must participate in the private judging in order to exhibit at the fair and be in the public revue. 3-ring binders are to be turned in at the private judging.

Project Requirements:

Artificial Intelligence (AI) may be used, with parent permission, when creating this exhibit and is to be documented as a reference. A majority of the work to create this exhibit is to be the 4-H member’s original work.

All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member’s exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.

The notebook is to include the following items and information:

- Outside front cover – 4-H member name, county, club and level.
- Photo of 4-H member wearing their purchased outfit.
- Narrative describing decision making process when purchasing this outfit and accessories, and how they complement your existing wardrobe.
- One page or section outlining each of the five manual activities completed. Information is to include a description of the activity, skills learned, challenges completing the activity and how you worked to overcome each challenge, problems that occurred and how that problem was solved, how this activity will help you later in life and any other information.
- Any additional information or documentation such as place of purchase, other vendors explored, how an adult mentor assisted and any other information. Receipts are not required, but if included be sure personally identifiable information such as mailing address, phone number, etc. are altered and not visible.
- The notebook exhibit is not to include prior year(s) information.
- Youth may choose to model their purchased outfit and accessories at the county level. Modeling at state fair is limited to one entry per level from each county and will be judged separate from the notebook.

Judges evaluating exhibits should recognize individual differences and creativity, therefore using information in this document as a guide rather than a requirement.

Definition of an Outfit:

An outfit is a garment or garments that, when put together, make a complete look.

For example: one or two piece dress, a one or two piece pant suit, or three piece combination such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt. An outfit does not require additional garments in order to be worn. Outfits have no more than four (4) pieces.

Beginner (Grades 3, 4, 5 suggested)

With the help of a mentor or parent, purchase and accessorize an outfit of your choice. Accessories may be purchased or selected from what you currently have.

With the help of a mentor or parent, purchase and accessorize an outfit of your choice. Accessories may be purchased or selected from what you currently have.

Advanced (Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 suggested)

Complete five activities in the manual, or similar activity of choice and share your results or answers in a notebook using exhibit guidelines above, labeling each activity. Collection Exhibit Guidelines:

Specimens may be displayed in a collection box no larger than 24"x 18"x 3", displayed horizontally. Collections are to include the following:

- Title as Insect Collection year in Entomology
- Order – refer to ID-401, page 57.
- Display – mounted insects are to have been legally and personally collected in the United States and displayed in an 18"x24" collection box displayed horizontally. Collections including multiple boxes are to be numbered 1 of 3, etc. ID 401 A-F cards (for grades 3-8) and 401-I cards (for grades 9 - 12) are to be placed inside the display box in an attractive manner.
- Identification – Collection display boxes are expected to contain the specified number of insects, families, and orders specified (see chart below). All insects must be in the adult stage and be properly mounted on insect pins or be contained in vials as directed.
- Pin Labels - Each pin or vial must contain two labels:
 1. Top label is to include collection date, location, and collector name.
 2. Bottom label is to include common name and other optional identification data.
- Box Labels – Box labels (computer generated or neatly printed) are used for orders and families as required (see chart below) and are to be placed flat against the bottom of the box. Insects must be properly grouped directly under the correct order and family label. For example, all insects belonging to a particular order must be placed under that order label. Orders to be used are listed in the reference book ID- 401. If family level identification is required, the insects should be further grouped together under the correct family label.
- Educational Box – One additional box (educational), based on the specific theme (see chart below), is required for grades 9-12, in addition to the insect collection boxes. This box can be created in any manner chosen (without the mounting, pinning or identifying restrictions specified above).

Judges evaluating collection exhibits should judge based on educational content, scientific accuracy, eye appeal and creativity.

Fashion Revue - Consumer Clothing

This project teaches youth skills to present themselves in a professional manner by providing an opportunity for youth to model the outfit purchased in the 4-H consumer clothing project.

State Fair Entries:

3 entries per county, one per level.

Exhibit Guidelines:

All garments and outfits modeled in Consumer Clothing Fashion Revue must have been purchased by the 4-H member modeling that same garment or outfit.

Definition of an Outfit:

An outfit is a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - such as one or two piece dress, or one or two piece pant suit, or a three piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt.

An outfit does NOT require additional garments in order to be worn.

Outfits have no more than four (4) pieces.

All garments modeled in Fashion Revue must be worn with undergarments. Swimsuits must be lined or worn with undergarments. The Fashion Revue Committee and or the 4-H Building Superintendent may require a model to add undergarments or a “cover-up” before judging or the public presentation. Refusal to do so will result in the participant not being allowed to model. The garment may still be entered in construction.

Judges evaluating exhibits should recognize individual differences and creativity, therefore using information in this document as a guide rather than a requirement.

Beginner (Grades 3, 4, 5 suggested)

Model the garment or outfit purchased for the consumer clothing project. Accessories may be purchased or selected from what you currently have.

Intermediate (Grades 6, 7, 8 suggested)

Model the garment or outfit purchased for the consumer clothing project. Accessories may be purchased or selected from what you currently have.

Advanced (Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 suggested)

Model the garment or outfit purchased for the consumer clothing project. Accessories may be purchased or selected from what you currently have.

Fashion Revue - Sewing

Each county can send six (6) Senior exhibits to the State 4-H Fashion Revue (maximum two per category). An exhibitor may participate in only one senior fashion revue category at state fair. On the county level, if there are no entries in a category, counties may send a second participant to the State Fashion Revue from another category.

County Guidelines for selections of Senior Fashion Revue State Fair and Alternates:

1. A participant in Senior Fashion Revue may be selected for State Fair exhibit in only ONE CATEGORY.
2. An individual may be selected as an ALTERNATE TO STATE FAIR IN ONLY ONE CATEGORY.
3. No participant may be selected as a STATE FAIR WINNER AND AN ALTERNATE TO STATE FAIR.
4. The Junior and Senior Fashion Revue Overall Award Winners are selected by the Fashion Revue Judge(s). (See criteria under fashion revue awards.) The winners may or may not be a category/division winner. The Fashion Revue Awards may only be received once.

General Rules:

1. There will be two (2) Fashion Revues, Junior and Senior.
2. **Junior Fashion Revue** – Grades 3-7, suggested. **There is no Junior class at State Fair.**
 - a. Model the garment or outfit constructed for the sewing project. Accessories may be purchased or selected from what you currently have.
3. **Senior Fashion Revue** – Grades 8-12, suggested
 - a. Categories on next page
4. Seniors may model in all six categories. Note: A 4-Her may win in more than one category (Champion or Reserve Champion) on the county level, but can go to the State Fair in only ONE category. The 4-Her must decide which contest to enter by noon on Monday of the County Fair and communicate the decision to the Montgomery County Senior Fashion Revue Chairperson.
5. Enrollment in the Fashion Revue project is required. This will be done through 4-H Online and FairEntry.
6. The Fashion Revue is a two-party activity. The Private Fashion Revue is held during the week following the Queen Contest and all judging is done at this time. The Public Fashion Revue is held during the County Fair. All ribbons and awards are given at this time. A member participating in Public Fashion Revue must be in the Private Revue.

Definition of an Outfit:

An outfit is a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - such as one or two piece dress, or one or two piece pant suit, or a three piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt.

**An outfit does NOT require additional garments in order to be worn.
Outfits have no more than four (4) pieces.**

All garments modeled in Fashion Revue must be worn with undergarments. Swimsuits must be lined or worn with undergarments. The Fashion Revue Committee and or the 4-H Building Superintendent may require a model to add undergarments or a “cover-up” before judging or the public presentation. Refusal to do so will result in the participant not being allowed to model. The garment may still be entered in construction.

Judges evaluating exhibits should recognize individual differences and creativity, therefore using information in this document as a guide rather than a requirement.

Rules for the State Fashion Revue:

1. A participant must be a 4-H member in grades 8-12 of the current academic year.
2. All garments and outfits modeled in Fashion Revue, except consumer clothing entries, must have been constructed by the 4-H member modeling that same garment or outfit.
3. A ready-made blouse or shell is acceptable in the Suits category. Suits include 2 pieces made by the member.
4. Handcrafted garments made in the 4-H Crafts projects may be modeled in Fashion Revue whenever the finished garment(s) meet the requirements of a Fashion Revue classification. To be eligible, the craft item must be part of a whole outfit made by the 4-H member, fitting the Fashion Revue category.
5. An entrant may enter only one State 4-H Fashion Revue classification.
6. Youth qualifying to exhibit the same garment or outfit in Indiana State Fair Sewing and Fashion Revue must choose which project they wish to participate as one cannot exhibit the same garment or outfit in both projects at state fair.
7. An official State Fair Entry is required.

Senior Categories (Grades 8 - 12 suggested)

Informal or Casual Wear: A complete outfit of 1 or 2 pieces suitable for school, weekend, or casual, informal activities. In this category a complete outfit is defined as a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - such as one or two piece dress, or one or two piece pant suit, or a combination, such as pants, vest, blouse or shirt.

Dress Up: This is suitable for special, church, or social occasions that are not considered to be formal. It may be an outfit of one or more pieces with or without its own costume coat or jacket (lined or unlined). This is not an outfit that would be worn to school, weekend, or casual, informal activities.

Free Choice: A complete outfit comprised of garments that do not fit in the other classifications. A complete outfit is defined as a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - such as one or two piece dress, or one or two piece pant suit, or a three piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt. Individual garment examples include: tennis wear, swim wear, athletic or sportswear, lounge wear, riding habits, historic, dance, theatrical, or international costumes, capes, and unlined coats.

Suit or Coat: The suit consists of two pieces including a skirt or pants and its own lined jacket. It is not a dress with jacket as in "dress up wear". The coat is a separate lined coat. It will be judged separately as a coat with its own accessories.

Separates: Consists of three garments that must be worn as a coordinated complete outfit. In this category a complete outfit is defined as a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - a three piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt. Each piece should be versatile enough to be worn with other garments.

Formal Wear: This outfit may be one or more pieces suitable for any formal occasion, such as proms, weddings, and formal evening functions.

Interpretation Statement:

- A wrap (cape, shawl, etc.) which would be worn during the entire formal occasion may be modeled in the formal category. If the wrap is designed to be worn only to and from the occasion, the total outfit can be modeled in Free Choice. However, if the formal wrap is to be judged on its own merit, it should be placed in the appropriate category.
- If a wedding outfit is considered a formal by the participant, it may be worn in the Formal category. However, if the participant considers the outfit to be a costume, it may be worn in Free Choice.

NOTE: Division I and II members may purchase young seedling plants to grow or use homegrown flowers for their exhibits. Division III, IV, V classes may include purchased or homegrown flowers. Planters **MUST** have drainage and provide for water retention (i.e. have a saucer under the pot) **EVEN ON HANGING BASKETS!!**

Each Level (A, B, C, D) of the Floriculture project serves more than one grade. You should do a DIFFERENT activity and exhibit each year that you are in the project.

Exhibit Guidelines:

Artificial Intelligence (AI) may be used, with parent permission, when creating this exhibit and is to be documented as a reference. A majority of the work to create this exhibit is to be the 4-H member's original work.

All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the way references are listed.

Posters are to be 22"x28" and displayed horizontally and placed in a clear plastic sleeve or covered with clear plastic to protect contents. The poster must be mounted on a firm backing to add stiffness to the exhibit, for example: a foam core board. Display boards should be designed to sit on a table using no more than 36" of tabletop space. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.

Floral arrangements can be constructed using fresh flowers and greenery grown yourself or purchased, flowers and greenery dried yourself or purchased, or artificial flowers or greenery.

Judges evaluating exhibits should recognize individual differences and creativity, therefore using information in this document as a guide rather than a requirement.

Level A: (Grades 3, 4 suggested)

Floral Option - Create a simple bud vase (1-3 stems of main flower plus appropriate filler and/or greenery) or simple round arrangement (small, compact round cluster of flowers plus appropriate filler and/or greenery).

Educational Display Option - Create a poster, notebook or display about one of the following:

1. Chronicle your work in your flower garden (planning, planting, care, harvest, arrangement made with your flowers)
2. Describe how you planned or designed your garden, including how you chose the kinds of flowers.
3. Explain how you harvested your flowers, cared for them, and used them in an arrangement.
4. Explore and explain: pollination - what it is, why important, different ways it occurs or transplanting - what, how, things to watch out for; or role of insects with flowers (good, bad or both).
5. Explore and explain seed germination.
6. Explore and explain how to care for a 'sick' plant.
7. Report on interview with a floriculture professional (what do they do, types of jobs, type of training, hours worked, etc.)
8. Describe an experiment you did and the results.
9. Describe a community service project you did related to your flowers project.
10. Another similar activity.

Level B: (Grades 5, 6 suggested)

Floral Option - Create a mixed planter that includes 3 or more kinds of plants, make an item from dried plants, or display a house plant (flowering or non-flowering) you've grown.

Educational Display Option – Create a poster, notebook or display about one of the following:

1. Report how you harvested your flowers and/or herbs, cared for them, dried them, and used them.
2. Explore and explain: insects and your flowers and/or herbs.
3. Explore and explain: starting seeds indoors -- the process and pros and cons.
4. Explore and explain: perennials -- what are they, how are they used, benefits or drawbacks.
5. Investigate and describe a butterfly garden -- what types of plants, benefits to insects and butterflies, etc.
6. Describe how you planned or designed your garden, including how you chose the kinds of plants, any problems, successes.
7. Describe your houseplant - how you cared for, transplanted to larger pot, any problems, or successes.
8. Explore and explain: plant biology -- form and function, growth, photosynthesis, etc.
9. Explore and explain: how to grow plants indoors -- things to consider, common problems and solutions.
10. Explore and explain: environmental effects related to plants (such as light, water, soil, or temperature).
11. Describe an experiment you did and the results.
12. Explore and explain topics from "Imagine That" -- plants around the world, information about different cultural uses of plants, different ways you used your plants/herbs/flowers.
13. Another similar activity.

Level C (Grades 7, 8, 9 suggested)

Floral Option – Create a terrarium, combination or European planter (3 or more kinds of plants), corsage, boutonniere, or specialty arrangement in a container (using dried flowers, roses, or lilies as the primary content).

Educational Display Option – Create a poster, notebook or display about one of the following:

1. Explore and explain: vegetative propagation -- how to, different types, problems and solutions, different uses of.
2. Explore and explain: plant nutrients -- what are they, why does the plant need them, what happens if the plant has too much or too little, planters or containers vs. garden.
3. Investigate the design of multiple plant containers -- how to, things to consider, selecting plant materials, uses of.
4. Describe how you created your corsage or boutonnieres; or dried arrangement. Be sure to include appropriate information on design principles and how they are used to create your arrangement.
5. Explore and explain: floral tools and materials (how to use, what they are, care of tools, different uses of a tool or material).

6. Explore and explain: preserving cut flowers -- how, problems, uses of and/or diseases related to cut flowers.
7. Illustrate, explore and explain how you dry flowers or other plant materials and/or describe different methods and/or how, why use them.
8. Explore and explain: medicinal uses and toxicity of fresh and dried flowers and plants.
9. Describe an experiment you did and the results.
10. Describe a career exploration activity you did, such as job shadow, interview with a professional.
11. Describe a community service activity you did related to your flowers project -- what you did, why, results, etc.
12. Another similar activity

Level D: (Grades 10, 11, 12 suggested)

Floral Option - Create a seasonal arrangement, modern or contemporary arrangement, bridal bouquet, special occasion centerpiece, or plant you have propagated and grown yourself.

Educational Display Option – Create a poster, notebook or display about one of the following:

1. Describe how you created your arrangement, include information on the design principles utilized.
2. Explore and explain how you utilize different flowers to make a similar style arrangement for different seasons (tulips in spring, mums in fall, etc.) or how to utilize similar flowers to make different styles of arrangements.
3. Explore and explain: the cost of arrangement and/or a cost comparison with flowers (different types flowers, different time year, etc.).
4. Explore and explain: forcing flowers (bulbs, branches, etc.).
5. Explore and explain: marketing in the floral industry (large or small business) and/ or a market survey and results, and how they can benefit the floral industry.
6. Explore and explain: how to start a business related to the floral industry and may include a business plan.
7. Explore and explain the origins of flowers and/or the floriculture industry around the world.
8. Explore and explain: tissue culture, biotechnology, or traditional breeding of new flower types -- what are they, how are they used, pros and cons.
9. Explore and explain: be a plant detective -- what kinds of problems might you have in growing and caring for flowers, and how to solve.
10. Describe an experiment you did and the results.
11. Describe a community service activity you did related to your flowers project: how, why, results.
12. Another similar activity.

Champions:

- 2 champions and 2 reserve champions will be selected for levels A & B for both Foods (Baked) and Food Preservation.
- 3 champions and 3 reserve champions will be selected for levels C & D for both Foods (Baked) and Food Preservation.

Members should complete a minimum of three (3) activities, each from a different “bite” category each year they are in the project.

All exhibits receiving a ribbon placing of “Blue*” (aka Honor Group) and above are eligible to participate in the Foods Auction. All participating exhibits will be sold with their recipe card. For exhibits that are highly perishable or deemed unsafe by the Foods Auction Committee and/or the Montgomery County Board of Health, only the recipe card will be sold. This includes all Foods (Preserved) exhibits except canned jams and salsas. Exhibitors of canned jams and salsas may bring an extra, unopened jar to be sold in the auction. Extra baked items may also be brought to the auction to supplement the exhibit to be sold (i.e., extra cookies or muffins). The 4-Her shall indicate their desire and availability to participate in the Foods Auction in Fair Entry.

ALL 4-Hers MUST BE PRESENT TO SELL THEIR EXHIBITS IN ORDER TO RECEIVE THE FUNDS MADE FROM THE SALE!!

The 4-Her will receive 95% of the sale price. The remaining proceeds are used by Montgomery County 4-H, Inc. to support programming needs and supplies.

For food competitions: Fillings, frostings, glazes, and meringues are not permitted to contain cream cheese, sour cream, heavy cream, or whipped cream if they are not fully cooked/baked. These items are allowed as ingredients in food products IF the final product is cooked/baked. Additionally, raw milk, raw milk products or uncooked eggs/egg whites are not permitted. Eggs/egg whites that have been cooked to 160°F (i.e. pasteurized or included as part of a batter and baked) are acceptable. No home-canned fruits, vegetables, or meats are permitted as ingredients in food products.

Foods should be transported to the competition in a way that minimizes contamination and maintains the quality of the food (i.e. foods that are judged as frozen should remain frozen at all times).

Recipes must be provided that identifies all ingredients that were used in each part of the product. Any ingredient that could be a potential allergen must be clearly identified. Each food product must be labeled with the following information:

- Name
- Date the food product was made

Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods. If cuts are present, the wound should be bandaged and a single use food service glove worn on the hand during all stages of food production. Contestants should not be preparing food exhibits for competition within 48 hours of recovering from any illness. People experiencing symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, fever, and/or jaundice should not be allowed to prepare food.

Judges and individuals who will consume products from county and/or state competitions should be informed that they are at risk for food-borne illness since the established policy cannot guarantee that an entry has been properly prepared or handled before, during or following the competition. The food products for competitions are home produced and processed and the production area is not inspected by the Indiana Department of Health. Tasting of a food product is solely at the discretion of the judge and consumers. Judges are NOT to taste any home preserved foods such as low-acid or acidified foods like green beans, tomatoes or tomato products, jams/jellies/fruit preserves or fermented products produced in the home.

A completed recipe card is to be submitted with each exhibit. Recipe cards are for judging purposes only and will not be returned to the exhibitor. Laminating, wrapping the recipe card in plastic, or placing it in a clear plastic bag is optional. Since it is illegal in the State of Indiana for youth under the age of 21 to purchase or consume alcoholic beverages, 4-H members are to use recipes that do not include an alcoholic beverage as an ingredient. A suitable non-alcoholic or imitation product may be substituted.

Judges evaluating exhibits should recognize individual differences and creativity, therefore using information in this document as a guide rather than a requirement.

Perishable baked exhibits entered for State Fair competition will not be displayed and instead will be donated to a central Indiana homeless shelter.

Frozen exhibits entered for State Fair competition will not be displayed and instead will be donated to a central Indiana homeless shelter. Home-canned exhibits will be displayed but will be disposed at the state fair's conclusion.

Baked food products may be from a boxed mix following the instructions, a boxed mix with added ingredients, or ingredients combined from scratch. Youth are to place their name, county and club on the bottom side of their plate, pan or other container and the official entry tag provided will be placed with the exhibit.

Baked food products should be covered during transport and displayed on a paper or foam plate, or another type of disposable container. Pies, casseroles and other similar items are to be baked in a disposable pan. Cakes and sticky items may be displayed on a cardboard strong enough to support the item and covered in foil, plastic, wax paper, or similar substance.

Preserved food products should be displayed in an appropriate container, preferably disposable. Containers will not be returned to the exhibitor.

Exhibit Class Guidelines:

Level A, Baked (Grades 3 , 4 suggested, Baked)

Choose one or more of the baked products below, or a similar baked product of choice. It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement. Exhibits entered at state fair will be donated to local homeless shelters after being judged and not displayed.

- Three uniced snack sized cookies.
- Three standard sized unlined muffins.
- Three standard sized unlined muffins containing an ingredient that is a source of Vitamin A or C.
- Three snack sized granola bars.
- Three snack sized brownies or blondies.
- An educational poster, notebook or display about a food or nutrition topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.
- Any other similar baked item.

Level A, Preserved (Grades 3 , 4 suggested, Preserved)

Choose one or more of the preserved products below, or a similar preserved product of choice. It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement. Exhibits entered at state fair will be donated to local homeless shelters and not displayed.

- A package of 3 baked or unbaked, snack-sized (approximately 2"-3" individual size) frozen cookies. Display in freezer bag or freezer container. (NOTE: Freezer containers will not be returned.) Include index card with recipe and instructions for defrosting or baking. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.

- One package of frozen berries. Display in freezer bag or freezer container. (NOTE: Freezer containers will not be returned.) Include index card with recipe and instructions for cooking or defrosting. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
- One package of dehydrated fruit or vegetable. Display in an appropriate bag or container. Include index card with recipe and instructions for cooking or defrosting. Label with name of product, quantity, and date dehydrated.
- An educational poster, notebook or display about a food or nutrition topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.
- Any other similar preserved item.

Level B, Baked (Grades 5, 6 suggested, Baked)

Choose one or more of the baked products below, or a similar baked product of choice. It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement. Exhibits entered at state fair will be donated to local homeless shelters after being judged and not displayed.

- A single layer cake without frosting.
- A single layer reduced-fat cake without frosting. Reduce the amount of fat in the recipe by using a fruit puree or baby food fruit product that does not contain yogurt.
- A standard loaf-sized quick bread.
- A standard loaf-sized quick bread containing an ingredient that is a source of Vitamin A or C.
- A coffee-cake.
- A coffee-cake containing an ingredient that is a source of Vitamin A or C.
- Three biscuits or scones that are plain, sweet or savory.
- Three biscuits or scones that are plain, sweet or savory using a whole grain flour mixture.
- Three biscuits or scones that are plain, sweet or savory containing an ingredient that is a source of Vitamin A or C.
- Three no-yeast, any shape pretzels (shaped, stick or nugget).
- Three no-yeast, any shape pretzel with a whole grain flour mixture (shaped, stick or nugget).
- Three no-yeast breadsticks.
- Three no-yeast cinnamon rolls or other flavored roll without icing or glaze.
- A no-yeast sweet bread without icing or glaze.
- An educational poster, notebook or display about a food or nutrition topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.
- Any other similar baked item.

Level B, Preserved (Grades 5 , 6 suggested, Preserved)

Choose one or more of the preserved products below, or a similar preserved product of choice. It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement. Exhibits entered at state fair will be donated to local homeless shelters and not displayed.

- One uncooked frozen mini-pizza using whole-grain pita bread, English muffin, bagel, or already prepared crust (no larger than 7" in diameter) with toppings of your choice. Include at least 4 MyPlate food groups on your pizza. Meat toppings such as hamburger, sausage, bacon, etc. must be cooked. Display on covered cardboard inside freezer bag. Include index card with recipe and instructions for cooking. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
- One package of any frozen vegetable or combination vegetables. Display in freezer bag or freezer container. (NOTE: Freezer containers will not be returned.) Include index card with instructions for defrosting and cooking. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
- One container of frozen fruit or vegetable juice. Include index card with instructions for defrosting and cooking. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.

- A frozen ready-to-eat breakfast sandwich, burrito or similar item. Display on covered cardboard inside freezer bag. Include index card with recipe and instructions for cooking. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
- An educational poster, notebook or display about a food or nutrition topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.
- Any other similar preserved item.

- Three yeast bread sticks or yeast rolls (any shape, medium size – not a sweet roll)
- Three yeast bread sticks or yeast rolls (any shape, medium size - not a sweet roll), using a whole grain flour mixture. Participants are expected to learn how to knead bread dough by hand and allow it to rise appropriately. It is NOT acceptable to use a home bread maker.

- A yeast bread loaf or braid. Participants are expected to learn how to knead bread dough by hand and allow it to rise appropriately. It is NOT acceptable to use a home bread maker.
- A yeast bread (can be loaf, braid) using a whole grain flour mixture such as whole wheat, rye, oat bran, etc. Participants are expected to learn how to knead bread dough by hand and allow it to rise appropriately. It is NOT acceptable to use a home bread maker.
- Homemade pizza using a yeast dough. Judges are not expecting this item to be presented hot out of the oven.
- One package of an, invented healthy snack (such as a granola bar, popcorn snack, trail mix, etc.). Your snack must include at least 2 food groups from MyPlate. Exhibit must include your snack product and a separate folder containing a marketing plan with product name, recipe, how it will be packaged, a package design, where it will be sold and suggested selling price. Style your snack for a photo shoot and include the picture in your marketing plan. Label should include product name, date, quantity, and serving size.
- Prepare an entrée casserole that meets three MyPlate requirements for a meal. Use care when transporting to prevent spoilage. Judges are not expecting this casserole to be presented hot out of the oven.
- An educational poster, notebook or display about a food or nutrition topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.
- Any similar baked item.

Level C, Preserved (Grades 7 , 8 , 9 suggested, Preserved)

Choose one or more of the preserved products below, or a similar preserved product of choice. It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement. Exhibits entered at state fair will be donated to local homeless shelters and not displayed.

- One container of freezer jam. Include index card with recipe and instructions for storing. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
- One jar of a canned tomato product using the Hot Pack Method for a boiling water bath canner, such as tomato juice, catsup, barbecue sauce, or salsa. Include index card with recipe and instructions for cooking or using the product. Label with name of product, quantity, and date canned. Canned products must have the ring on the jar top to protect the seal. Note: Only food preservation products made using USDA approved recipes and techniques are acceptable.
- One jar of a canned pickled product or canned pickles. Include index card with recipe, processing, and storage instructions. (Products using a fancy pack are not accepted.) Label with name of product, quantity, and date canned. Canned products must have the ring on the jar top to protect the seal. Note: Only food preservation products made using USDA approved recipes and techniques are acceptable.
- Frozen yeast dough (bread loaf, roll balls, sticks, pizza, etc.). Include index card with recipe and instructions for defrosting and cooking. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
- An educational poster, notebook or display about a food or nutrition topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.
- Any similar preserved item.

Level D, Baked (Grades 10 , 11 , 12 suggested, Baked)

Choose one or more of the baked products below, or a similar baked product of choice. It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement. Exhibits entered at state fair will be donated to local homeless shelters after being judged and not displayed.

- A single or double crust baked fruit pie (no graham cracker crust). (Note: Custards, cream, cream cheese frosting and fillings, and raw egg white frosting are not acceptable in an exhibit because they are highly perishable when left at room temperatures.)
- A baked food product for a catered meal or special event in which organizers have requested low fat and/or reduced sugar items. Exhibit will include your food product and a notebook outlining how this product is to be used at the event, menu, supplies to buy, preparation schedule, equipment, table layout, etc. A table display is optional.
- Select a condition in which people have to specifically modify their eating habits (diabetes, heart disease, Celiac disease, food allergies, etc.) Prepare a baked food product appropriate for someone with this condition. Exhibit will include your food product and a notebook summarizing the condition or allergy, nutrition considerations involved with the condition, a description of your baked item, and an explanation of how it fits within the nutrition considerations. Make sure to note any ingredients that could cause an allergic reaction.
- Prepare an entrée casserole that meets four MyPlate requirements for a meal. Use care when transporting to prevent spoilage. Judges are not expecting this casserole to be presented hot out of the oven.
- An international or ethnic food of choice. This may be a cold or hot product. Use care when transporting to prevent spoilage. Judges are not expecting this product to be presented hot out of the oven.
- A specialty pastry.
- Create a baking mix and provide a sample of the baked product. Include an index card with instructions, wet ingredients needed, and baking instructions.
- An educational poster, notebook or display about a food or nutrition topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.
- Any other similar baked item.

Level D, Preserved (Grades 10 , 11 , 12 suggested, Preserved)

- One container of a thaw and eat frozen prepared appetizer. Include index card with recipe and instructions for defrosting. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
- One container of a thaw and eat frozen prepared dessert. Include index card with recipe and instructions for defrosting. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
- An educational poster, notebook or display about a food or nutrition topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.
- Any other similar preserved item.

Create an educational poster, notebook or display about any manual activity or on any forestry topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.

Intermediate (grades 6 , 7 , 8 suggested)

Create an educational poster, notebook or display about any manual activity or on any forestry topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate.

Advanced: (Grades 9 , 10 , 11 , 12 suggested)

Create an educational poster, notebook or display about any manual activity or on any forestry topic of choice that is age/grade appropriate, prepare a herbarium collection that contains at least 25 native Indiana forest leaves, or prepare a herbarium collection that contains at least 25 native Indiana forest shrubs. Youth can also design and complete an independent study activity.

Herbarium Collections - Collect 25 terminal twigs and at least two leaves, if space allows (only one compound leaf is required), from native forest trees. Mount the specimens on 11 ½" x 16 ½" paper. One leaf on the twig must be mounted to show the back side of the leaf. Label each sheet with the following: common name, scientific name, where collected, county where collected, date collected, name of collector, and specimen number. Cover each specimen.

There are no specific references given for these exhibits. Youth are encouraged to use Extension publications, the Internet, books, and forest specialists when collecting and identifying specimens.

The herbarium collection must be accessible to the judges. Do not cover it under the plastic that covers your poster. Youth may want to attach a folder or other holder over your poster to hold the mounted, covered specimens.

This project is organized into divisions, not grades, for a youth cannot start in Division 3 without first completing Division 1 and Division 2. This is a project that builds on the previous division information in order to be successful in building your family tree. If you are using a genealogical commercial software program, you may need to type in or hand write in information required by the Indiana 4-H genealogy project. See 4-H forms on the 4-H website link above.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) may be used, with parent permission, when creating this exhibit and is to be documented as a reference. A majority of the work to create this exhibit is to be the 4-H member’s original work.

The exhibit will consist of no more than four (4) notebooks for Division 1-4 and first year Advanced Division. (If a notebook requires additional space, label it as notebook x, continued.) Those notebooks are:

- Book #1 – Appropriate size notebook or binder, contains introduction sheet, pedigree charts and family group sheets
- Book #2 – Appropriate size notebook or binder, contains additional information worksheets and diary of work
- Book #3 – Appropriate size notebook or binder, contains supporting documents, pictures, etc.
- Book #4 – Appropriate size notebook or binder, contains Advanced Division options only (Begin using this notebook in first year of the advanced division or the fifth year of project enrollment.)
- Another notebook should be maintained and kept in a secure place at home to keep original personal and legal documents as well as previously exhibited work.

Note – Youth may consolidate information in order to have fewer notebooks. In this case indicate on the cover the notebook numbers included and use dividers to separate information by notebook number as well as contents as indicated below.

Notebooks should be tabbed and in the following order:

1. Book #1 - Introductory Page; Pedigree Charts; Family Group Sheets

- 2.. Book #2 - Additional Information Worksheets; Diary of Your Work
3. Book #3 - Any Other Documents (label with ancestor numbers on tab)
4. Book #4 – Advanced Division Options (label each tab separately with the specific option); Diary of Your Work (this will be a second diary describing work done for each advanced division option)

Pedigree Charts, Family Group Sheets, Additional Information Worksheets, and Diary Sheets are to be placed in the notebook back-to-back in sheet protectors to save space, reduce the information being damaged, and reduce the number of sheet protectors required.

So the notebook exhibit can be displayed to the public and to minimize the potential of identity theft, original legal documents are NOT to be included in the exhibit notebook. Instead, a photocopy of any legal document is to be included in the notebook and all identifiable information (like social security numbers) except for names is to be completely marked out. Original legal documents are to be kept in a secure location by the 4-H member and his/her family.

All posters, notebooks, and display boards must include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H members exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. Reference notations are to be made in the “source” column of the Family Group Sheet and on each document.

If information on a family member is unknown, an additional information worksheet for each required ancestor is still required. Write “unknown” or “NIA” (no information available) in PENCIL for each sheet of unknown ancestors or list several ancestors on a page and insert page in proper numerical order.

After exhibiting the 1st year of the ADVANCED Division, only the Advanced Division notebook (Book #4) with ALL OPTIONS (no pedigree charts, no family group sheets, no additional information sheets, no documents from Divisions 1-5) needs to be exhibited each year the genealogy project continues.

 - A Family Group Sheet for your parents and each pair of grandparents. Sources of information **MUST** be filled in on family group sheets (see section "Recording the Information").
 - Book #2 (Ancestors 1-7 information)
 - Four (4) "Additional Information Worksheets": one(1) for you, the 4-H member
 - one (1) for your parents
 - one (1) for each set of grandparents (total = two worksheets)
 - A diary of your work
 - Book #3 (Ancestors 1-7 information)
 - Any documents or pictures pertaining to these three generations. Documents must be labeled with ancestor name and ancestor number. Pictures need to be labeled with ancestor name, plus names of all known people, place and date picture was taken, as well as ancestor numbers.

- You may purchase your specimens and may display rocks, fossils, and minerals. If you purchase a specimen, indicate when and where you purchased it and the location where you would expect to find the specimen. If you collect a specimen, indicate the county and township where you found it.

Notes:

- Posters and display boxes will be exhibited "standing up" at the Indiana State Fair. Therefore, you need to mount your specimens securely. Subject matter experts suggest the following methods: soaking ½ cotton ball in Elmer's glue, hot glue, or clear tub sealant. Place the cotton ball in your box and put your rock (or fossil or mineral) on the cotton ball and let sit. It will take 1-2 weeks for Elmer's glue to fully harden. Specimens mounted with Elmer's glue can be removed by soaking the cotton ball in water. Glue remaining on the rock may be brushed off with an old, damp toothbrush.
- When exhibiting rocks show a fresh surface (recently cracked or broken surface) to help judges identify the rock.
- Labels - Include the specific geographical location where you would expect to find any specimens as well as where you actually acquired it (found, purchased, etc.).
- Do not identify your specimens any further than phylum and class. There is one exception to this for fossils which are identified to phylum OR class. Class should only be used for fossils of mollusks, backboned animals, and arthropods.

Judges evaluating exhibits should recognize individual differences and creativity, therefore using information in this document as a guide rather than a requirement.

1. All exhibitors should inconspicuously label articles that could be easily lost from the project exhibit (such as books, curtain rods, figures, etc.).
2. Do not bring valuable articles that could be easily stolen or lost.
3. Exhibitor should bring proper size bulbs to be used in lamps.
4. Plastic covering on shades to protect them from dust during the fair should bear a note stating that plastic covering will be removed for use at home.

We suggest including pictures showing where the item will be used. Also, we encourage 4-H members to include pictures of themselves doing the project, but this is not required. Always place your identification information in the notebook and on the furniture.

Design Board and Notebook – Standard 22" x 28" poster, displayed horizontally with a firm backing. Design boards must be covered with plastic to protect and help hold items in place. An identification name tag must be attached in the lower right corner. The notebook is to help explain the who, what, when, where, why, and how of the chosen design. This can be a "before and after project" or "plan in the future" project.

Portfolio – Standard notebook (3-ring binder). If 4-H members choose to do this option more than one year, we suggest that they keep the previous year's materials in the notebook. Place materials for the current year in the front, with the previous year's materials clearly marked or labeled at the back. Always place your identification information in the notebook.

Other Information:

Color samples – These can be paint samples from a paint or hardware store, or color samples the 4-H member makes with paints or colored pencils.

Other samples – Many hardware or home improvement stores have free samples of wall coverings, flooring, counter tops, and cabinet materials that can be used with the 4-H member's design board or portfolio.

Colored pencils – We suggest using colored pencils when coloring the design board or portfolio. Colored pencils are what professionals use! Keep in mind that the entire area does not need to be colored in, but be sure to apply enough color to adequately express design ideas. Other methods for coloring will also be accepted. These could include (but are not limited to); crayons, watercolor pencils, markers, or printing on the computer.

Print board exhibits are to include 10 photos mounted on a poster as described above, each no larger than 5”x7”. Number each print 1-10. Prints may be a mix of digital and/or standard development. Create a title of choice for the print board exhibit. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.

Salon prints are to be no larger than 11”x14”, mounted on a standard 16”x20” salon mount, and displayed vertically. Salon prints are to be placed in a clear plastic sleeve and captions are not recommended. Space should be left in the lower right hand corner to place an exhibit tag provided by Purdue Extension staff.

Creative/experimental exhibits are photos that have been modified to change the original intent, meaning or story captured should be entered in the creative or experimental class. Replacing any pixels of the original digital image is to be entered in the creative/experimental category. This includes, but not limited to, using artificial intelligence (AI), any erasing tool, healing tool, patch tool, or any tool that replaces any of the original pixels. Photos exhibited as creative or experimental are to attach to the back of their exhibit the make and model of camera used, software or other tools used to change the photo, and a description of how the photo was changed, and copy of the original photo before editing.

Editing photos such as cropping, color adjustment, and other enhancements are considered to be part of the normal photography educational learning process and are permissible. So judges can better evaluate a photography exhibit, the 4-H member is asked to attach to the back of their salon or print board exhibit the make and model of camera used and a description of any editing.

Older youth enrolled in the 4-H sewing project for the first time may not feel comfortable demonstrating their assigned grade level skills. In this instance the county 4-H youth development educator may, at the request of the 4-H member and parent, assign the member to a lower level grade level to develop fundamental skills.

Youth and their mentor/volunteer leader/instructor should use this chart as a guide when deciding appropriate skills to incorporate in a sewing wearable or non-wearable article, garment or outfit for exhibit. While this list is a guide, it is not meant to be an all-inclusive list and youth should demonstrate skills they are most comfortable mastering. For example, some youth in a 4th grader might feel comfortable attempting 6th grade level skills, but it is unlikely a 4th grade level exhibitor will be able to successfully master the 10th grade level skills. Exhibited items must demonstrate the minimum skill techniques from their given grade level but may also include higher/lower level techniques that have been mastered. Any higher/lower level techniques will not be counted as part of the minimum skills, but nevertheless will be evaluated for quality. Youth are encouraged to utilize a number of resources such as web sites, print material, social media, and television shows when learning sewing skills and techniques. Skills learned from these types of resources may be demonstrated provided they are age/grade appropriate.

Provide a completed sewing skills card, 4-H 925c-W, with the exhibit. Skills sheets are for judging purposes only and will not be returned to the exhibitor.

Judges evaluating exhibits should recognize individual differences and creativity, therefore using information in this document as a guide rather than a requirement.

DEFINITION OF AN OUTFIT: An outfit is a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - such as one or two piece dress, or one or two piece pant suit, or a three piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt.

Wearable:

Informal or Casual Wear: A complete outfit of 1 or 2 pieces suitable for school, weekend, or casual, informal activities. In this category a complete outfit is defined as a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - such as one or two piece dress, or one or two piece pant suit, such as pants, vest, blouse or shirt.

Dress Up: This is suitable for special, church, or social occasions that are not considered to be formal. It may be an outfit of one or more pieces with or without its own costume coat or jacket (lined or unlined). This is not an outfit that would be worn to school, weekend, or casual, informal activities.

Free Choice: A complete outfit comprised of garments that do not fit in the other classifications. A complete outfit is defined as a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - such as one or two piece dress, or one or two piece pant suit, or a three piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt. Individual garment examples include: tennis wear, swim wear, athletic or sportswear, lounge wear, riding habits, historic, dance, theatrical, or international costumes, capes, and unlined coats.

Suit or Coat: The suit consists of two pieces including a skirt or pants and its own lined jacket. It is not a dress with jacket as in "dress up wear". The coat is a separate lined coat. It will be judged separately as a coat with its own accessories.

Separates: Consists of three garments that must be worn as a coordinated complete outfit. In this category a complete outfit is defined as a garment or garments that when put together make a complete look - a three piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt. Each piece should be versatile enough to be worn with other garments.

Formal Wear: This outfit may be one or more pieces suitable for any formal occasion, such as proms, weddings, and formal evening functions.

Non-Wearable:

Create one non-wearable sewn item, or set of items, demonstrating at least 6 skills, in addition to those learned in prior grades.

Important Notes:

- Firearms or ready-to-shoot bows are not allowed to be exhibited. Unstrung bows are permissible.
- Live ammunition is not allowed to be exhibited (no powder or primer)
- An arrow with its arrowhead attached must be displayed in a secure case. An arrowhead without the arrow attached must be displayed in a secure case. An arrow may be displayed unsecured if its arrowhead is removed. Modern broadhead arrows are not allowed to be exhibited.
- Displays involving firearms or bows may be exhibited as a photographic display on a poster or in a notebook following grade level guidelines.
- Handmade items must include information explaining how the project was made and its intended use. Photos are encouraged.

Exhibit a poster showing at least four well-known athletes in the sport you have chosen. Each athlete should have a brief description of who they are, what team they play for, and a list of their accomplishments in the sport.

Division 6: Grade 8

Exhibit a sport safety poster. This may include safety items to wear, helmet, gloves, etc. that are not a required part of the sport uniform or safety techniques that can be used to avoid injury. You may show a first aid kit with items that are to be kept close by, etc.

Division 7: Grade 9

Exhibit a poster showing an offensive or defensive play or position used while playing the sport. Each player should be labeled with the proper position. The poster should have the name of the play or position and describe its effectiveness when playing the sport.

Division 8: Grade 10

Exhibit a poster showing a proper diet for an athlete in training. The poster should show a three-day menu with the proper nutrition requirements.

Division 9: Grade 11

Exhibit a poster showing a workout schedule for an athlete in training for a particular sport. The program shown should be for three days. Illustrations may be used.

Division 10: Grade 12

Exhibit a report on the history of the sport. The report should include such things as:

1. When and where the sport was first played
2. Legend athletes in the sport
3. How the sport has changed over the years, etc.

The report should be typed, have a cover page, and exhibited in a clear plastic cover.
