1. Harris Hall Horticulture Building will be open daily during the fair. On Sunday, the building will open at 12:00 p.m. During non-show days, the building will open at 12:00 p.m. Building will close daily at 9:00 p.m. Please note that there is a gate fee when entering the Putnam County Fairgrounds.
2. **All entries must be in Harris Hall before entry time is over for each specified exhibit. Times are listed on page 4. No exhibit may be altered by the exhibitor once entry time has closed.**
3. The Superintendent shall have the right to remove any entry, or part thereof, at any time.
4. All entries will be released on Friday, July 28th from 6:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m. and from 9:00 a.m. – 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, July 29th. **NO EXHIBITS WILL BE RELEASED EARLY. NO GARDEN OR OPEN-CONTAINER EDIBLE EXHIBITS WILL BE RELEASED TO EXHIBITORS.** Due to health concerns, all edibles will be disposed of.
5. Exhibiting is open to residents of Putnam County, Putnam County Extension Homemakers Club members, Putnam County Master Gardener members and parents of Putnam County 4-H members. Putnam County 4-H members are encouraged to participate.
6. **Only one entry, per person, per class is permitted.** Children age 4 thru 2nd grade will enter exhibits in the Lil' Sprouts Program.
7. Judges are not required to award prizes to unworthy exhibits, whether or not there is competition.
8. An Overall Rookie Exhibitor award and Overall Harris Hall Exhibitor award are given out based on points earned by exhibiting in Harris Hall.

9. The Putnam County Fair & 4-H Club Association will not be responsible for the loss or damage to exhibits including added accessories. Containers will not be judged except in Artistic Arrangements and Market Exhibits. If using valuable containers and/or accessories in any exhibit, do so at your own risk.
10. All entry tags must be uniform and will be furnished. Sample entry tags appear on pages 11, 19, 25, 30, and 32. Please do not fold up the bottom of the entry tag. A special entry tag will be provided for Lil' Sprouts. An example of the Lil' Sprouts tag does not appear in the book.
11. Participants are allowed to use mailing labels on entry tags to complete the address portion of the tag.

13. If you have any questions during fair, a Harris Hall Volunteer in a green apron will be happy to help. The Putnam County Master Gardeners serve as Harris Hall Volunteers/Hosts.

- D. A Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion ribbon for Overall Garden will be chosen from among the Champion Garden entries listed in C above and all other first and second place Garden entries (not listed in C above) and respective Reserve Champions. Market Exhibit and Novelty winners are not included.
- E. Champion and Reserve Champion will be awarded in each Novelty category.
- F. A Rookie Garden (by points) award is given to the rookie garden exhibitor with the most garden points.
- G. Largest-by-weight cabbage and pumpkin (exhibited in squash – other) may be entered in two classes.

Each exhibitor must furnish their own container (examples of containers are baskets, soup bowls, etc.) and Putnam County Fair will not be responsible for the loss or damage to the container. Exhibit must contain at least 3-6 vegetables and/or herbs, any variety. **Must contain a recipe.** Provide one example of each vegetable that will be used for the recipe. You do not need to provide the amount called for in the recipe.

SINGLE CUT FLOWER SPECIMENS

Department Head – Yvonne Clifford

All single cut flower specimen exhibits must be entered and in place on Saturday, July 22nd from 8:00 a.m. – 10:30 a.m. No entries will be accepted after the entry time is over. **Judging will begin at 12:00 pm.** An attempt will be made to live stream the judging to the Putnam County Master Gardener Facebook page.

- A. “Cut specimen” means that the bloom has been severed from the parent plant with a section of stem and foliage attached. Stem length will vary in proportion to the size of the bloom and the nature of the plant. Stems are to be cut at an angle.
- B. Flowers are to be clean, fresh and free of pollen. Specimens may be groomed for presentation.
- C. Flowers are of one variety and are uniform in size.
- D. Containers will be provided for all entries.
- E. No foliage should be under water. Leaves should be clean, healthy and undamaged.
- F. Count to make sure you have the right number of blooms as specified in each category. **Remember to remove buds as specified; buds are considered another bloom.**
- G. No purchased flowers or greenery. All must be from home sources.
- H. ***Please include species and/or variety name on tag.***
 - I. The first and second places in each major category will be considered for Champion and Reserve Champion, respectively.
- J. A Champion and Reserve Champion ribbon will be awarded in each category.
- K. An overall Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be selected from the Champions and Reserve Champions.
- L. An Overall Rookie Cut Flower Exhibitor award is given to the rookie exhibitor with the most cut flower points.

22. ROSE

Leave foliage on. Should be open $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ (should not be shown in bud stage.)

- a. Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora, Red, 1 bloom
- b. Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora, Pink, 1 bloom
- c. Hybrid Tea or Grandiflora, Yellow, 1 bloom

- A. The first and second places in each category will be considered for Champion and Reserve Champion, respectively.
- B. A Champion and Reserve Champion ribbon will be awarded in each category.
- C. An overall Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be selected from the Champions and Reserve Champions.
- D. Containers must have been planted at least 6 weeks prior to the fair.
- E. We strongly encourage individuals not to exhibit any plant listed on the Indiana Invasive Plant List, located at: <https://www.entm.purdue.edu/iisc/invasiveplants.php>
- F. A stand will be provided for the Hanging Plant categories.
- G. No accessories allowed except in fairy gardens.

- A. Children from age 4 through 2nd grade are eligible to exhibit.
- B. Exhibitor may bring one of all three vegetables and one of all three cut flowers.
- C. Ribbons in each class will be awarded.
- D. Only cut flowers and produce is to be exhibited. **NO PLANTS.**
- E. **NO VEGETABLE EXHIBITS WILL BE RELEASED TO EXHIBITORS. Due to health concerns, exhibits will be disposed of.**

- C.** An Overall Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be selected from Champions and Reserve Champions.
