

# 4-H Committees for Youth & Adults

The 4-H program relies on 4-H volunteers to help carry out the Indiana 4-H Youth Development Program. In Steuben County, there are seven committees that stem from the 4-H Fair Board. You do NOT have to be a Fair Board Member to serve on a committee! Email or call Tami to join one!

**AUCTION**—Review the past auction, decide if any changes need to be made, and plan the future auction. Distribute advertisement and assist in performing the auction. Become familiar with FairEntry which is used for the auction. Meets 1-2 times during the year to plan, during the 4-H Fair, and at least once a few days after the 4-H Fair to enter add-ons, clean computers, print bills, mail receipts, and print checks.

**AWARDS**—Select recipients of 4-H awards and delegates for 4-H trips. Select trophies and special awards and help secure trophy sponsors, if needed. Meets approximately 2-3 times during the year; many items are handled via email.

**CAMPING**—Plan, organize, and manage fair week camping. Budget and plan for future electric and water lines. Meets 1-2 times in Spring/Summer.

**FINANCE**—Develop a funding structure, determine potential donors, and coordinate appropriate communication to/from donors. Consult with memorial fund donors on their funding wishes. Create and maintain a 4-H Fair Board budget.

**GROUNDS**—Ensure the fairgrounds are in tip-top shape before, during, and after the fair. Attend designated work days to help with various items (painting, raking, repairing bleachers, picking rocks, etc.). Help secure trash removal during and after the 4-H Fair. Secure restroom cleaners for the week of the 4-H Fair. Move bleachers to the appropriate areas. May meet once, with work being done at various times.

**PARKING & GATE**—Contact volunteers and organizations to work the entrance gates during fair week and assist with the parking of vehicles during the large entertainment events. Collect and count funds each day during the fair. May meet once, with everyone assisting with parking during the 4-H Fair.

PROGRAM & PUBLICITY—Establish the activi-

ties/programs for the 4-H Fair, including Family Fun Day, evening entertainment, and any other activities that might attract crowds and/or be of public interest. Be present during fair week to assist with the activities/programs. Decide how to advertise the 4-H Fair and accompanying events (billboards, yard signs, radio, newspapers, parades, etc.). Members will make the proper advertisement contacts and then distribute the promotion material when the time arrives. Meets approximately 4-5 times.

Indiana 4-H announced in mid-October that there would be no changes to animal ID in 2023. So, plan on the same tags, tattoos, registrations papers, etc, in the coming year. As ID days become available, we will share those dates, but as a rule of thumb, plan on the following:

- Fat Cattle in March
- Small Calves in April
- Sheep & Goats in early May
- Self-tagging for Swine
- Supers/Volunteers to help tattoo Rabbits, as needed

The first reading of the 2022-2023 rule changes took place October 17th at the Steuben County 4-H Fair Board Meeting. The reading was simply held to check for clarity. Voting for approval or disapproval of the suggestions will take place Monday, November 14, 2022 at 7 pm as part of the regular business meeting of the 4-H Fair Board. All those submitting a rule change (or a like-minded representative) must be present November 14th in order for the rule change to be considered.

# Suggested 4-H Fair Book Rule Improvements/Changes for Steuben County 4-H, 2022-2023

Please note: The suggested rules listed below are only suggestions at this point, offered by community individuals. Final rule changes will be posted in mid- to late November. In addition, some rules and requirements may change in the Fair Book at the request of greater entities, such as the Indiana Board of Animal Health and the Indiana 4-H Staff. Simply reviewing rule changes posted in the newsletter is not sufficient. Each 4-H member is responsible for reading rules that pertain to them when the 2023 Fair Books are posted.

#### **GENERAL**

• If a project has five or less exhibits entered at the time in which FairEntry closes, the judge hired for that project will be dismissed from judging duties, and a volunteer or Extension Staff member will serve as the judge.

#### GENERAL, AWARDS

- · Eliminate all Reserve Grand Champion trophies. Keep ribbon and award, but no trophies. All exhibits.
- Eliminate silver tray awards.
- Eliminate Fashion Revue Champion and Reserve Champion ribbons by grades and categories. All participants receive yellow, blue, red,
  white depending on scoring and then a Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion awarded to Junior Exhibit Class and Grand
  Champion and Reserve Grand Champion awarded to Senior Exhibit Class.
- Add Supreme winner (ribbon only) to the six Indiana 4-H project areas: Animal Science (Animal Education, Vet Science), Communication and Expressive Arts (4-H Resume, Arts and Crafts, Cake Decorating, Collections, Communications, Construction and Architectural Replica, Consumer Clothing, Creative Arts, Fine Arts, Home Environment, Model Craft, Photography, Scrapbooking, Sewing and Fashion Revue), Engineering and Technological Science (Aerospace, Electric, Small Engine, Tractor Safety and Operator Skills, Video Gaming and Computer Coding, Woodworking, Zero-Turn Mower Safety and Operator Skills), Healthy Living (Child Development, Foods, Health, Shooting Sports, Sportfishing), Leadership and Citizenship (Genealogy), and Plant and Environmental Science (Beekeeping, Crops, Entomology, Floriculture, Forestry, Garden, Geology, Soil and Water Science, Weather and Climate Science, Wildlife. These six Supreme awards will encompass all static projects. \*list will likely be re-evaluated based on project totals per category.

#### BEEF: BEEF FEEDERS, DAIRY BEEF: DAIRY FEEDER STEERS, DAIRY BEEF: STARTED CALF

- Delete p. 122, Exhibit Requirement #4 which refers to the limited number of calves a member may exhibit.
- Delete p. 129, Exhibit Requirement #2 which refers to the limited number of calves a member may exhibit.
- Update p. 131, Exhibit Requirement #2 to read: A member may enroll twenty and exhibit two calves in any combination of started ealf, dairy feeder and/or beef feeder. For example, a member may show one started ealf and one beef feeder, or two beef feeder, or two started ealves, etc. The only breeds accepted for started calves are purebred calves of the five recognized dairy breeds—no crossbreeds (Holstein, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Jersey & Ayrshire).

#### **GOATS**

- Page 134, Exhibit Requirements, add "For the purposes of showmanship classes only, pygmy goats will be considered a meat breed."
- Page 135, Showmanship classes to be replaced with:
  - Dairy Breed Showmanship: Senior Showmanship-Grades 9-12, Intermediate Showmanship-Grades 6-8, Junior Showmanship-Grades 3-5, Champion Of Champions Showman-winner of senior showmanship in past and present years.
  - Meat Breed Showmanship: Senior Showmanship-Grades 9-12, Intermediate Showmanship-Grades 6-8, Junior Showmanship-Grades 3-5, Champion Of Champions Showman-winner of senior showmanship in past and present years.
- If the two suggestions above are approved, then update page 152, General Showmanship #5 whereas "goats" will be replaced with "dairy goats, meat goats" and update page 152, Large Animal Supreme Showmanship Contest #1 and #7 whereas "goats" will be replaced with "dairy goats, meat goats".

#### HORSE & PONY

Update p. 138, Project Requirement #20 to read: Spurs, coats, vests, jackets, and chaps are optional in all performance classes. No split
reins are allowed in contesting classes.

#### **POULTRY**

- Page 143, under Project Requirements, add: With the exception of showmanship, each bird can only be shown in one specific class.
- Page 144, under Egg Production, add Egg Class: 6 eggs of the same color from your poultry, displayed in an egg carton. One entry per exhibitor. Eggs can be brown, white or all other colors.
- Page 144, under Exhibition, update to read:
  - Standard Exhibition: Exhibit up to 2 birds, Hen and/or Rooster, must be different gender, variety, or breed, per subclass (maximum


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of 12 birds). Subclasses are as follows: American, Asiatic, Continental, English, Mediterranean, and All Other. All birds must be 1 year or older.

- Exhibition Bantams: Exhibit up to 2 birds, Hen and/or Rooster, must be different gender, variety, or breed, per subclass (maximum of 12 birds). Subclasses are as follows: Modern Game, Old English Game, Single Comb Clean Legged, Rose Comb Clean Legged, Other Comb Clean Legged, and Feather Legged. All birds must be 1 year or older.
- Exhibition Ducks Drake/Hen: Exhibit up to 2 ducks, Hen and/or Drake, must be different gender, variety, or breed, per subclass (maximum of 8 birds). Subclasses are as follows: Heavy Weight, Medium Weight, Light Weight, and Bantam. All birds must be 1 year or older.

#### AUCTION

- Update page 155, #8 to read, "Members must indicate their initial auction intent to the project superintendent or designated volunteer in FairEntry by July 4th, and they will verify their intent at livestock check-in, with a final verification posted after livestock check-in.
- Premium auction only all animals go home.
- Pens left unclean by members who are not sending an item through the auction will be invoiced \$25, and the funds will be distributed to
  the corresponding project as a means of financial support.

While many volunteers stay with us for years, when a volunteer signs on, they are only making a one year commitment that can be renewed or declined each year. Some volunteers don't even volunteer for a year...they volunteer in an "episodic" role where they help with a one-time project or a few weeks max. # Donate to a State University: Make Your Giving Work For You

The end of year is a time that many begin to finalize tax considerations and reflect on the past calendar year. You may receive a return of a 50 percent direct credit to your tax bill when donating up to \$200 per individual and \$400 for couples filing jointly, given to an Indiana funded university. Because Purdue Extension is part of a state funded university, one can make a donation to the local Extension Office that would qualify. Therefore a \$100 contribution to Purdue Extension-Steuben County would cost one only \$50. You can also specify how you would like the money to be used (i.e. 4-H, afterschool programming, volunteer development, agriculture or natural resources programming, parenting classes, mental health programming, community development activities, etc.). Some limitations do exist. For example funds donated for awards or scholarships would not be eligible for the additional direct state tax deduction. Give the Extension office a call and ask about this excellent way you can support community programs for minimal cost to your pocket due to the additional state tax break.

One can also make a donation to the Steuben County Master Gardeners and/or the Steuben County 4-H Fair Board. While this option is not eligible for the 50% state tax credit that a state funded university or college provides, it is a great option in that the these not-for-profit entities fall under the general state and federal income tax deduction via a reduction in taxable income. A donation to these entities not only helps the group, but allows for more education and events in our community.
