Get together with other K, 1st, and 2nd graders to create and explore things, play games, and share stories. Youth from all across the county come together to form the Tiny Clovers Mini 4-H Club, and it is a great way for youth to begin building friendships outside their already established circle of friends at school or in the community. The Mini 4-H program offers multiple opportunities in which youth can work as a team, and these team-like activities lead to many giggles and future friendships. Members are strongly encouraged to participate in meetings and workshops. Typically, the Tiny Clovers Mini 4-H Club meets for six months, once a month, totaling six meetings. These meetings will help Mini 4-H'ers learn hands-on skills.

Online enrollment is conveniently available at v2.4honline.com. Mini 4-H'ers may take an unlimited number of projects. Enrollment is open annually October 1-January 15. Each family will begin receiving the Clover Connection, the Steuben County 4-H monthly newsletter, after enrolling.

4-H Fair

All the time and effort you put into your project will pay off when you display your project at the Steuben County 4-H Fair in July. Plan on talking to our project judge about your Mini 4-H project(s) during the annual 4-H Fair.

Fun Facts

The 4-H emblem is a four-leaf clover with an "H" in each leaf. Clover is a plant that grows in fields, yards, and along roadsides. Most clovers have three leaves. Sometimes, if you look very carefully, you may find a special clover with four leaves. A four-leaf clover is used as the emblem for 4-H to let everyone know 4-H is a special kind of group. The four H's stand for Head, Heart, Hands and Health.

The 4-H colors are green and white. The four-leaf clover is green and the "H" in each leaf is white. White symbolizes purity and high ideals. Green is nature's most abundant color and symbolizes life and growth.

The 4-H motto is "To make the best better." When something is better than all of the others, it is the best. Think about a time when you did your best. Maybe you threw a ball farther than you have ever thrown it before. Now, think about some ways you could do better. You may be able to throw farther by practicing for a while or by watching and learning from someone else. 4-H encourages you to always try to do better, even if you are doing the best you have ever done.

Mini 4-H Exhibit Guidelines

Mini 4-H members are encouraged to complete the record sheet corresponding to each project they select. If possible, we would appreciate it if your record sheet could be turned in to the Extension Office by the last business day of June so that we can work on preparing for your exhibit to arrive in July. All projects must have name label attached at the time of exhibition so that we can identify whose project is whose.

Mini 4-H Exhibit Options

Animal Education Poster Exhibit a 14"x22" poster (displayed horizontally) teaching others about the animal of your choice. Topic suggestions include: the animal's anatomy (internal or external), habitat, appropriate animal care, breeds of the selected species, etc.

Beef/Dairy Steer

Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie's regularly scheduled show (likely to take place at the very beginning or very end of the show; check with the superintendent). The animal must be owned by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member's 4HOnline record. No animal is permitted to be identified in 4HOnline for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. The animal may not be auctioned or consigned by the Mini 4-H member. Per Indiana 4-H policies: Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may only show, work with, or care for animals over 300 pounds when they are assisted by a parent, legal guardian, or another adult designated in writing by parent or legal guardian." (The word assisted means that the adult has control of the animal at all times.)

Beef Feeder/Dairy Feeder Steer

Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie's regularly scheduled show (likely to take place at the very beginning or very end of the show; check with the superintendent). The animal must be owned by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member's 4HOnline record. No animal is permitted to be identified in 4HOnline for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. The animal may not be auctioned or consigned by the Mini 4-H member. Per Indiana 4-H policies: Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may only show, work with, or care for animals over 300 pounds when they are assisted by a parent, legal guardian, or another adult designated in writing by parent or legal guardian." (The word assisted means that the adult has control of the animal at all times.)

Cake Decorating (use decorating tips; no gel icing)

Decorate one small sweet treat (cookie, brownie, cupcake, etc.) and display it on a small disposable plate in a plastic bag.

Cat/Kitten

Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie's regularly scheduled show. The animal must be owned by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member's FairEntry record. No animal is permitted to be identified in FairEntry for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. Per Indiana 4-H policies: Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less.

Collections

Exhibit a few items (5-10) of your favorite collection. You may exhibit the actual items in a shoebox, or take photos of the items and display them in a binder or photo album.

Legos/Construction Toys

Exhibit a Lego or other construction toy creation or kit no larger than 12" x 12".

Crafts

A craft or art object no larger than 12" x 12" that was completed this year.

Dairy

Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie's regularly scheduled show (likely to take place at the very beginning or very end of the show; check with the superintendent). The animal must be owned or leased by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member's 4HOnline record. No animal is permitted to be identified in 4HOnline for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. The animal may not be auctioned or consigned by the Mini 4-H member. Per Indiana 4-H policies:

Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may only show, work with, or care for animals over 300 pounds when they are assisted by a parent, legal guardian, or another adult designated in writing by parent or legal guardian.” (The word assisted means that the adult has control of the animal at all times.)

Dog

Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie’s regularly scheduled show. The animal must be owned by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member’s FairEntry record. No animal is permitted to be identified in FairEntry for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. Per Indiana 4-H policies: Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less.

Entomology (Insects)

Collect, identify and display 3-7 insects of your choice, pinned to a piece of Styrofoam in a shoe box.

Foods

Exhibit a homemade trail mix, rice crispy treat, or cookie displayed on a small disposable plate in a plastic bag.

Garden

Exhibit 3 nearly identical vegetables you grew in your garden or pot at home (i.e. 3 green beans of the same length, 3 tomatoes of the same size, etc.)

Goat

Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie’s regularly scheduled show (likely to take place at the very beginning or very end of the show; check with the superintendent). The animal must be owned by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member’s 4HOnline record. No animal is permitted to be identified in 4HOnline for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. The animal may not be auctioned or consigned by the Mini 4-H member. Per Indiana 4-H policies: Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less.

Horse and Pony

Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie’s regularly scheduled show (likely to take place at the very beginning or very end of the show; check with the superintendent). The animal must be owned or leased by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member’s 4HOnline record. No animal is permitted to be identified in 4HOnline for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in

grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. The animal may not be auctioned or consigned by the Mini 4-H member. Per Indiana 4-H policies: Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may only show, work with, or care for animals over 300 pounds when they are assisted by a parent, legal guardian, or another adult designated in writing by parent or legal guardian.” (The word assisted means that the adult has control of the animal at all times.) Mini 4-H members exhibiting horses must wear ASTM or SEI standard F1163 (or above) certified helmets whenever mounted. The parent/guardian is responsible to see that this specified headgear is properly

Photography

Exhibit a 14” x 22” poster (display horizontally) showcasing your photography skills with 5 photos. Aim for colorful photos of people, nature, animals, and/or unique objects.

Poultry

Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie’s regularly scheduled show (likely to take place at the very beginning or very end of the show; check with the superintendent). The animal must be owned by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member’s FairEntry record. No animal is permitted to be identified in FairEntry for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. The animal may not be auctioned or consigned by the Mini 4-H member. Per Indiana 4-H policies: Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less.

Rabbit

K-2nd Grade: Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie’s regularly scheduled show (likely to take place at the very beginning or very end of the show; check with the superintendent). The animal must be owned by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member’s FairEntry record. No animal is permitted to be identified in FairEntry for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. The animal may not be auctioned or consigned by the Mini 4-H member. Per Indiana 4-H policies: Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less.

Scrapbooking

Exhibit 1-2 scrapbook pages of any size in which the Mini 4-H member displays at least one photo per page.

Sewing

Exhibit a simple sewing project sewn by the Mini 4-H member such as a simple pillow, tote bag, skirt, lap blanket, etc.

Sheep

Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie's regularly scheduled show (likely to take place at the very beginning or very end of the show; check with the superintendent). The animal must be owned by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member's 4HOnline record. No animal is permitted to be identified in 4HOnline for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. The animal may not be auctioned or consigned by the Mini 4-H member. Per Indiana 4-H policies: Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less.

Started Calf

Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie's regularly scheduled show (likely to take place at the very beginning or very end of the show; check with the superintendent). The animal must be owned by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member's 4HOnline record. No animal is permitted to be identified in 4HOnline for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. The animal may not be auctioned or consigned by the Mini 4-H member. Per Indiana 4-H policies: Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less. Mini 4-H members may only show, work with, or care for animals over 300 pounds when they are assisted by a parent, legal guardian, or another adult designated in writing by parent or legal guardian." (The word assisted means that the adult has control of the animal at all times.)

Swine

Exhibit one animal in a non-competitive class during the respective specie's regularly scheduled show (likely to take place at the very beginning or very end of the show; check with the superintendent). The animal must be owned by a current 4-H member in grades 3-12 and be identified on the current member's 4HOnline record. No animal is permitted to be identified in 4HOnline for the sole purpose of this Mini 4-H option, but rather it must be identified with the exclusive intent to be exhibited by a 4-H member in grades 3-12. The class will not be placed, but the judge will be encouraged to provide feedback and critique. The animal may not be auctioned or consigned by the Mini 4-H member. Per Indiana 4-H policies: Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less.
