The fall 2023 Master Gardener Basic Training Course started in September. The program will run through the second week of November. We have 16 students this year and the program is going very well. The Master Gardeners were part of two different "GrowLocal" garden tours. Close to 200 second graders plus teachers at Vinton and Miller Elementary participated. The Bi-State Agriculture group met to plan out our winter education schedule. Our Community Wellness Coordinator, Betsy Coffing, has been busy. Both at work and at living life!

August was filled with many meetings leading to new partnerships with local schools, Tippecanoe County Women, Infants & Children, Lafayette Transitional Housing Center (LTHC), Purdue nursing faculty, and the Briarwood Apartments of Lafayette food pantry and garden.

In September, she attended "The Working Hungry Viewing and Discussion" at the Long Center for the Performing Arts. This 30-minute film tells the story of three Indiana families struggling with food insecurity and explains why systemic solutions are needed to make sure that no family experiences hunger in our community. After the screening, community leaders discussed how to address food insecurity in our community through systemic change, and band together to urge our elected officials to take action. The program was sponsored by Lafayette Urban Ministry, Bread for the World, and Food Finders Food Bank, Inc.

Betsy also took some time to travel! She was out of the state on vacation a majority of September, traveling to Utah and Colorado with her husband, son, and in-laws.

4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

The Indiana 4-H Youth Development mission is to provide real-life educational opportunities that develop young people who will have a positive impact in their communities and the world.

JUNIOR LEADERS

Junior Leaders is a project that is offered through 4-H for any member that is in Grade 7 or above. Junior Leaders is based on community service opportunities, especially related to the 4-H program and the county fair. Junior Leaders also serve as mentors and role models for younger 4-H members by interacting with them and sharing their experiences.

In order to complete the Junior Leaders project, you need to gain 100 points or more. Junior Leaders earn points by volunteering at different events and attending meetings, approximately one hour of time equals 10 points. Additionally, if a Junior Leader earns more than 125 points, they qualify for the Junior Leader Achievement Trip.

The Junior Leader Achievement Trip takes place in the fall following the county fair. The Junior Leader trip is completely funded by the Junior Leader Pop Stand at the county fair, so the trip is free to all Junior Leaders who qualify. On November 4, around 40 Junior Leaders will be heading to Chicago for the day. They will be making visits to the Albanese Candy Factory, Shedd Aquarium, and Medieval Times.

LIVESTOCK SKILLATHON

Area 9 hosted their first Career Development Contest of the academic year, the Livestock Skillathon. The Livestock Skillathon was hosted at Benton Central on September 14th. During this contest, youth identify livestock breeds, livestock equipment, livestock feeds, and livestock meats. Additionally, they answer questions related to the livestock industry and livestock facts.

Tippecanoe County had three teams participate: One FFA team from McCutcheon High School and two FFA teams from William Henry Harrison High School.

ROBOTICS TEAM

Tippecanoe County 4-H kickstarted a Robotics Club this fall led by Corey Seliger and Jake Guffey. The club consisted of a Senior Team (Gracken) including Isabelle Seliger and Gunnar Berger and a Junior Team (Robotics Alliance) including Grace Madsen and Jackson Fallon. These teams met together several weekends to plan for the upcoming Robotics Competition.

Both of these teams were able to compete at the 4-H Robotics Competition held at the Hamilton County Fairgrounds on September 9. The Senior Team ended up placing first in their division. The Junior Team went on to take home third place while also having the top-scoring notebooks in their division. Congratulations to everyone involved!



4-H ENROLLMENT

Enrollment for Indiana 4-H begins October 1 and members are encouraged to be enrolled by January 15 to receive important updates. Drop/Add Deadline for livestock and non-livestock projects will be May 15.

The 4-H program fee is \$15 per child, and \$45 max per family. The program fees cover insurance, project curriculum development, and club enrichment activities.

The same enrollment dates will apply to Mini 4-H (K-2). However, there is no county program fee for Mini 4-H.

FROM OUR KITCHEN TO YOURS: THE JOY OF SHARING HOMEMADE CREATIONS

Home is where the heart is, and what better way to warm your heart and soul than with a delicious, homemade meal. In a world filled with fast food and pre-packaged convenience, there's something truly special about preparing a dish from scratch in the comfort of your own kitchen. There's a unique sense of joy that comes from taking a cherished family recipe or a personal culinary creation and offering it to others. It's more than just sharing ingredients and instructions; it's about sharing a piece of ourselves and our culture.

Megan Skiba submitted this recipe to her church's cookbook when she was a young 4-Her in elementary school, and ended up being published in the cookbook. As you can tell by the state of the recipe card, Megan and her family have continued to use this recipe throughout all of these years. One tip Megan learned in 4-H through the Food project is to make sure that you so not over mix the muffin batter. You should immediately stop mixing right when the dry ingredients become moistened with the wet ingredients.

CHOCOLATE CHIP MUFFINS

- 1 stick butter, softened ²/₃ cup sugar 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/4 tsp. baking soda
- 1/4 top. salt 2 top. orange juice
- 2 lg. eggs
- ²/₃ cup buttermilk
 - 2 cups flour 1 cup semi-sweet chocolate
 - cup semi-sweet ch chips
- 1 T. sugar
- 1 tsp. cocoa powder

Coat 12 muffin tin cups with cooking spray. In large bowl, on medium, beat butter, sugar, baking powder, baking soda, salt and orange juice until well blended. Beat in eggs, then buttermilk, until blended (batter will look curdled). Stir in flour until blended (don't overmix) Add chocolate chips to batter. Spoon into muffin tin. In small bowl mix 1 tablespoon sugar and cocoa powder. Sprinkle sugar/cocoa mixture on top of each muffin. Bake for 16-18 minutes at 400°.
