Who Can Apply?

4-H'ers currently in grade 10 through 1st year after the last year of 4-H eligibility. NOTE: You can apply during your freshmen year at college.

How Do You Apply?

Step 1 - Complete a one page cover letter, 2 page resume and one page demographics page in one electronic file.
Submit by Jan. 25 in v2.4honline.com under events for the specific scholarship.

Step 2 – If you make the semi-finalist, you will:

- ✓ **Interview Finalist Video** – 1 – 2 minute video demonstrating life skills developed in 4-H. Video will be viewed by Scholarship Comm. prior to the interview.
- ✓ interview by Zoom on **March 16, 2024**.

Three Premier Categories (3 - \$2,000)

- ✓ Premier Achievement - Demonstration of life skills development and overall 4-H achievement in multiple categories.
- ✓ Premier Citizenship - Demonstration of life skills developing one's citizenship in multiple categories.
- ✓ Premier Leadership - Demonstration of life skills developing one's leadership in multiple categories.

NOTE: For the Indiana 4-H Accomplishment Scholarship, a 4-H'er may enter 3 categories (project, overall and / or combination of project and overall), but may win in only one category per year. After a 4-H'er wins in a project category, then he/she may apply in only premier categories. Once you win in a premier category, you are ineligible for competition in this scholarship program. ***Although there may be some overlap in skills obtained, each application needs to be unique if applying in multiple categories.

Preparing the Scholarship Application

A. Resume

1. Gather resource materials: 4-H Record of Achievement, Achievement Project Book, Your Scrapbook or photo album.
2. Select a project area(s)
3. Select 5 life skills.

4. Use Resume Worksheet (yellow) and list 5 examples of each life skill.

Example:

Life Skill - Teaching

Examples:

- Club Demonstration on Making a Pizza - 40 members learned how to make a quick and nutritious snack.
- Foods Workshop - Assisted project leader with foods workshop. Taught 12 first year members how to successfully bake cookies.
- Mini Workshop - Taught 30 mini 4-H'ers how to make a fruit kebab.

5. Turn examples into bullet point (power statements). Note: For each life skill, you will need 5 bullet points (power statements) – one about each example.

- The first 2 bullets should be project specific; bullets 3-4 could be other 4-H examples and the last bullet or 2 can be school and home examples.

NOTE: The more project specific and 4-H specific examples, the better.

- Use a consistent format - always start with an action verb;
- Use a thesaurus or a power verb from additional lists (green).
- Create WOW statements (salmon) - show results and, where possible, use numbers. Each statement should include: topic, background information, action verb and results.

Example:

Activity - Participated in Super Saturday. Brought my project from last year. (Life skill – Communication)

WOW - Recruited potential 4-H'ers by presenting detailed information on the "Foods" project at the County Super Saturday 4-H Promotional Event. This event was attended by 150 people, which included about 85 potential 4-H'ers.

Activity - Fed my animals daily. (Life Skill - Time Management)

6. Format (Examples of 4 Styles - cream sheets)

- Top: Name, Address, Phone Number, e-mail address – make sure it is one you check and the name is appropriate in a professional setting;
- Skills should stand out;
- Font large enough to read (Font size must be a minimum of 10 point.);
- Must only be 2 pages;
- Goals - include a short term and long term;
- Awards - keep to minimum and only what is project related. Remember: Review team wants to know what you learned, **not** what you earned.

B. Cover Letter (Blue)

1. Introduces you to the reader.
2. Mention at least 3 of the life skills, and bold them, but do not repeat the same examples that are in the resume.
3. Needs to catch interest and make the reader want to read more.

C. Demographics Page (white)

1. Not judged. However, do NOT have spelling errors.
2. It is used if you win to introduce you.
3. When listing projects, list your main projects first especially those related to the scholarship. Include number of years in the project. Also list events and activities. Refer to the beginning of this packet for a list that has the majority of offerings.

Evaluation Process

- Team of 4-6 people (Educators) score each of the applications in a project category.
- During the first round, each of the applications is worth 20 points. The resume is worth twice as many points as the cover letter. However, everyone reads the cover letter first.
- Three or more applicants in each category will be invited to participate in the Interview Process.
- The top scores after the Interview process will receive the scholarship.

New in 2021 – Interview Finalist Video – 1 – 2 minute video demonstrating life skills developed in 4-H. Video will be viewed by Scholarship Comm. prior to the interview.

Interview

- You must be a semi-finalist to compete in the Interview Process.
- The interview process is for 10 minutes. You are to give a 2-3 minutes speech. Then, the team (4-6 Educators) will ask questions for about 3-4 minutes. They use the rest of the time 2 – 3 minutes to score the interview.

Suggested Time Frame

January 15 - First draft due in Extension Office

By January 18 - First draft is returned to you.

By January 22- Submit second draft to Ext. Office. Ask your English teacher to read your draft for grammatical mistakes

January 23 - Second draft is returned to you.

Jan. 25 - Final draft is due in 4-H on-line under event registration in the family tab. **Must be uploaded by midnight.** This is a state deadline.

Mar. 1 - Semi-finalists are notified

Mar. 16 - Interviews by Zoom

Scholarship Committee's General Tips for Cover Letter & Resume

The committee (in the past) has liked:

- ☺ Heart warming 4-H stories with evidence of learning.
- ☺ Evidence that you have learned a skill in 4-H.
- ☺ State & national trips and awards combined with evidence of learning.
- ☺ A resume & cover letter that is very specific to the project category.
- ☺ Showing specific knowledge in the category from your 4-H project.
- ☺ Entrepreneurship
- ☺ Uniqueness ... professional look, limited graphics
- ☺ That you followed directions (1 page cover letter, 2 page resume, etc.)

The committee (in the past) has NOT liked:

- ☹ Lists of awards ... a focus on winning, not learning.
- ☹ The same resume used over and over in multiple areas.
- ☹ Lists of what you did without stating what you learned.

A Few Thoughts from 2023 Judging

Make sure obvious how your projects relate to the category.

I am applying for the Healthy Living, Food, and Nutrition Science category. My involvement in Microwave, Food Preparation and Shooting Sports has allowed me to gain life experience pertaining to healthy living in the following areas: *Personal Safety, Responsibility, Learning to Learn, and Character.*

Make sure – submitted version has no notes or corrections needed

Focus first on life skills learned in 4-H, THEN talk about how you've used those skills in other projects or organizations.

As an officer in my 4-H Club starting in the 6th grade, I learned about how to coordinate and lead a club business meeting. This includes how to plan and follow a meeting agenda, maintain order, and use basic parliamentary procedure. I have been able to apply these skills since being elected an officer in National Honor Society during my Junior year of high school.

Creating “WOW” Statements About Your Skills

For each of your examples, you should include: Topic, Background Information, Action Statement and Results. The results are the most important part of the example. Yet, many people forget this part of their examples. Which of the following examples say “WOW”?

Photography Example:

- A. Reporter for 4-H club. Took pictures at club meetings.
- B. Took pictures at the club meetings and sent them to the newspaper.
- C. Promoted six Junior Leader Service projects in the Carroll County Comet, which has a circulation of 3,500 families.

Super Saturday Example:

- A. Participated in Super Saturday. Assisted with our club booth.
- B. Spoke to 4-H’ers about the 4-H food project at our club booth at Super Saturday.
- C. Recruited potential 4-H’ers by presenting detailed information on the “Foods” project at the County Super Saturday 4-H Promotional Event. This event was attended by 150 people, which included about 85 potential 4-H’ers.

Animal Example:

- A. Fed my animals daily.
- B. Tended to my animals daily (feeding and grooming).
- C. Executed the daily routine of feeding, grooming and exercising my own horses, as well as maintaining clean stalls. The health of my horses is extremely important to me, and these activities help keep them at their best.

Time Management Example:

- A. Coordinated my 4-H and school activities.
- B. Coordinate my schedule for ten 4-H projects and my school athletic activities.
- C. Scheduled events for 4-H, school, FFA, volunteer work, part-time jobs, and homework while maintaining an A-B average in school.

Citizenship Example:

- A. Participated in Junior Leader Service projects.
- B. Participated in Junior Leader Service projects: Toy Store, collected 87 storybooks for WIC Christmas Party and collected 5000 Valentines with Extension Homemakers.
- C. Coached parents in selecting gifts for their children at the annual “Toy Store” for needy families. Every year, Junior Leaders join efforts with the area churches and other civic groups to help approximately 125 needy families.

For all scenarios example C sounds much more impressive because results were given.
