Fair Camping Information



Youth are not permitted to stay at the fair overnight unless parents (or guardians) have reviewed the policy set forth by the Tipton County Fair Board. If you camped at the fair in 2022 and would like to camp at the same spot as last year vou should have received information from the Purdue Extension Office. Cost for 4-H families to camp for the week is \$100.00. All others is \$30/night. Campers may be parked from Sunday, July 9- Sunday, July 16. Campers staying before or after those dates will be charged the regular \$30/night fee. After June 19, fair camping will "open up" to other interested campers according to availability. IT COSTS HOW MUCH?

Can we go through the drive-through on the way to practice?"

"Sure, it's on the way and I'm hungry too!"

How many times has a situation like this occurred with you? It's certainly happened to me! As we are in the middle of summer, maybe it feels too hot to cook at home or the sports practices are still going on for your family. While it may be easy to go through the drive-through, it can be costly. With that in mind it is important to look at our spending habits and how they affect our food dollars. April was Financial Literacy Month and there is a lot of money spent on eating out.

Data from the Bureau of Labor shows that Americans on average spent \$3,000.00 on eating out in 2015. That total rose until 2020. If on average we only ate out a third less of the time we'd save \$1,000.00 which would be a great start of an emergency fund. According to CNBC, 56% of Americans do not have enough savings to cover an \$1,000.00 emergency expense.[1]

So, what can you do? Meal planning. To-go snacks. Both are great ways to help your food budget. EatGatherGo.org has some great tips for meal planning.[2] Map out your meals, everything from food to snacks, to beverages. Plan for a balanced diet. Make a grocery list, and don't shop when you're hungry. Love your leftovers. Prepare to-go snacks instead of stopping at convenience stores, drive-throughs, and if going to after-school activities, avoid the concessions.

Garden Calendar for July

HOUSE PLANTS

- It is a great time to set more tropical houseplants outside in the shade to receive humidity (make sure they are getting watered more if outside)
- It is time to propagate plants through cuttings
- Don't forget this is their growing season so watering and fertilizing may need to be increased

LAWN, FLOWERS, AND TREES

- Newly planted plants will need watered more this month.
- Try to prevent from planting larger trees, especially in root ball or burlap at this time
- Remove waterspouts and suckers from the base of trees
- Mow your lawn 1/2" higher then normal especially when the water conditions are low. This helps with the stress of the plant and reduces the browning when it dries out.
- Try not to collect clippings from your lawn

GARDEN

- Don't forget to supplement rain water when there is dry weeks.
- Harvest crops such as tomatoes, squash, okra, peppers, beans, and cucumbers frequently to encourage further production.
- Harvest summer squash while small and tender for best quality.
- Make sure potato tubers, carrot shoulders, and onion bulbs are covered with soil to prevent them from developing a green color and off flavors.
