Dear 4-H Sheep Exhibitor:

As you prepare your sheep project, please read over this letter carefully to ensure that you're meeting all the requirements for the project. Also, be sure to read the Livestock section of the handbook for all terms and conditions as some changes have occurred. Animal Identification:

Enclosed you will find the animal ID instructions to identify your animals in 4-HOnline. Ensure that your animals have met the animal ID requirements listed below. You can find a video on animal ID at <https://extension.purdue.edu/4-H/projects/animal-identification.html>.

Animals not enrolled by May 15 cannot be exhibited at the county or state fair.

If you plan to take sheep to the State Fair, DNA hair samples are required to be turned into the Purdue Extension Office by May 15 in a specific envelope. Instructions are enclosed. A video outlining DNA collection can be found here: <https://extension.purdue.edu/4-H/projects/animal-identification.html>. Envelopes may be obtained from the Purdue Extension Office.

Sheep Tagging

It is a new requirement that all sheep that need tags must come to a Tagging Day. The Tagging Day will be held on **Saturday, May 2 from 9 – 11 am** at the 4-H Center Animal Barns. If you cannot attend the Tagging Day, please reach out to the superintendent to make other arrangements so that the tag is in the animal's ear by the deadline listed above. County tags cost \$1 and RFID tags are \$1.25. Please bring payment (correct change) and your premise ID number when you come to Tagging Day. We are required to send premise ID information to the Indiana Board of Animal Health. If you do not have a premise ID, see the next page for instructions to obtain one. **Please let your superintendent know if you plan to attend tagging day by completing a quick survey at <https://tinyurl.com/26Tagging> so we can prepare accordingly.**

Lease Agreements:

If you are leasing your animal, 4-H members are required to submit a copy of their Animal Lease Agreement to the Purdue Extension Office by **May 15**. A sample lease agreement is available online <https://tinyurl.com/leaseagreementanimal> OR at the Purdue Extension Office.

Indiana 4-H Quality Livestock Care Training:

To exhibit beef cattle, dairy cattle, dairy goats, meat goats, poultry, pygmy goats, rabbits, sheep, and swine, 4-H members must be certified through the Indiana 4-H Quality Livestock Care training OR the online Youth for the Quality Care of Animals program (YQCA) by **July 1**. You can find details on trainings on the enclosed flyer.

Premise ID Number:

All 4-H members exhibiting animals at the fair must have a premise ID number for the location where their animals are kept. Registering your premises may be done online, at no charge, and takes only about 5 minutes. If you need a premise ID, visit the Indiana State Board of Animal Health's (BOAH) website: www.in.gov/boah and click on "Premises Registration". You will need this number when entering your animals into 4HOnline and at Tagging Day.

Be sure to carefully read the State Fair requirements to ensure that your animal meets the requirements and you understand the fee schedules.

INDIANA 4 - H QUALITY LIVESTOCK CARE

To exhibit BEEF CATTLE, DAIRY CATTLE, SWINE, SHEEP, MEAT GOATS, DAIRY GOATS, PYGMY GOATS, POULTRY, and RABBITS, 4-H members must be certified through the Indiana 4-H Quality Livestock Care training OR the online Youth for the Quality Care of Animals program (YQCA) by **July 1, 2026**.

This certification must be done on an annual basis. Members must be registered BEFORE attending a training. Members may attend any training dates listed on this flyer OR a training in another county OR complete the online YQCA training

Sheep and Meat Goat DNA Hair Sample Collection Instructions

Please read instructions completely before beginning process. This is an eligibility requirement for the 4-H sheep and 4-H meat goat shows at the Indiana State Fair. Collection Envelopes are available from your County Extension Office. Envelopes should be turned into your County Extension Office by May 15th.

- Clean the hair collection area to remove dirt and other contaminants. Make sure the area is dry before collecting hair. DO NOT SUBMIT WOOL- this will not be accepted.

SHEEP:
 - Recommended site is a tuft of hair on the leg of the animal between the toes. NO WOOL WILL BE ACCEPTED!
 - It seems that the longer the hair, the more likely you will be to get follicles.GOAT:
 - Hair may also be collected from other coarse areas of longer hair on goats. Including: over the withers, chest, rump, tail, fetlock, or poll of your 4-H Meat Goat.
 - Use pliers to pull the hair. Make sure pliers are clean and dry.
 - Pull the hair directly away from the animal, not at an angle. This will allow the follicle to come out with the hair.
 - Do not cut the hair from the animal as the roots must be present for DNA analysis.
 - Repeat pulling process. 5 pulls may be necessary to get enough hair (a minimum of 40 hairs).
 - Visually inspect hairs to ensure follicles are attached. If follicles are not present, discard sample and start over.
 - Place the sample directly into the self-sealing collection envelope and complete the appropriate information on the front of the envelope. Avoid touching the hairs and using plastic bags.
 - Repeat the process for remaining animals. Clean/disinfect pliers and hands between collections to prevent contamination of sample. Animals that are co-enrolled with siblings only need one sample. Just be sure to list all siblings on the envelope.
 - The sealed collection envelopes with the information completed on the front of envelope should be turned into the County Extension Office at the same time as the animal ID deadline in Indiana 4-H Online (**May 15th**)
 - A “how-to” video will be available soon on the Indiana 4-H Sheep Project page and Indiana 4-H Goat Project page.
 - Please refer to the Indiana State Fair 4-H Entry Book for more information on the DNA and other project requirements.

Animal Identification


4-H members (Grades 3 – 12) must identify all Beef and Dairy Cattle, Goats, Horses, Llamas, Sheep and Swine in the 4-H Online system by the species deadline or earlier county deadline if applicable to be eligible for exhibition.

- Beef and Dairy Beef Steers, Beef Heifers, Beef/Dairy Feeder Calves, Dairy Cattle, Goats, Horses, Llamas, Sheep, and Swine must be entered into 4-H Online no later than May 15, 2025.

Animal Identification in 4-H Online

Please complete the following steps to identify your livestock in the 4-H Online system.


1. Login to your family profile at: <https://v2.4honline.com> using your family email address and password associated with your 4-H enrollment record.
 - a. If you have forgotten your password, please use the 'Reset password' option on the 4-H Online login page, and you will be sent a new temporary password.
 - b. If you have forgotten your family email address or turned in a paper 4-H enrollment form, please contact your local Purdue Extension Office for assistance.
2. Click View next to the Member's record for whom you would like to add an animal

3. Click Animals in the navigation pane.
4. Click the blue "Add an Animal" button. (even if you have previous year animals that can be registered again, click "Add an Animal")






5. Click on "Add New Animal" to start adding a new animal **or** if you have animals that carry over from the previous year you **"Register"** those. Animals that can be registered from previous years **must be REGISTERED** every year by completing this step. You cannot select a previous year and assume they are there. Animals that carry over are Dairy Cattle Females, Horse&Pony, Llama&Alpaca, Dairy Goat Females, and Pygmy Goats (move onto step 9 if registering previous animal).
6. Select the appropriate animal type from the drop-down menu.
7. Enter the required Tag, Tattoo, or Animal Name as directed for the first step that will then allow you to proceed to the remaining identification process. (see Key) →
8. Click Save.

9. Read the on-screen instructions for Animal ID requirements for County Fair and Indiana State Fair Exhibition.
10. Click on the button "Show Questions" after reading the instructions.
11. Required fields are indicated, but be sure to complete all other visible fields as applicable.
12. Click next once completed. If animals have been carried over, the ID information will already be there.
13. Upload any files if required or necessary for the particular Animal type. For animals that are carried over, new photos and files must be uploaded each year.
14. Click next once completed.
15. Review the entered information. Use the Back button at the bottom of the page to return to the previous screen to make corrections if needed.
16. Once the entered information is correct and reviewed, click the Submit button.
17. The animal information will display on the screen with the status, created, modified, and submitted date and time stamp (local time). You will also receive a confirmation email upon submission.
18. To add more animals for the same member repeat steps 3-17. To add animals for another member return to the Member List and View another member.

****Note**** Members are able to edit Animal ID information until the species specific Animal ID deadline of **May 15, 2025**. Click on the Animals tab from your account at any time to view the status for all of the animals for a member in the family.

Family Enrollment of Animals

Animals are automatically co-enrolled within the same family (Siblings and step-siblings). The animals may be identified under a single 4-H member in 4-H Online and be exhibited by a different sibling listed in the same family profile. **With this capability in 4-H Online, animals do not need to be entered under each 4-H member in the family.** The exhibit management program will allow a member to select to exhibit any animal identified by the family in 4-H Online. It is suggested that at least 1 animal be identified by each member enrolled in the project.
