A Cache of Info for CFOs

Indiana confined feeding operations (CFOs) operate under a diverse set of county and state regulations. To keep lawmakers, industry leaders, and concerned citizens up to date, Paul Ebner, associate professor of animal sciences and Purdue Extension Specialist, and postdoctoral researcher Yingying Hong have created a website for the latest CFO rules and scientific research.

"A lot of the information on CFOs — what they are, how they are regulated — is pretty straightforward," Ebner says. "In some cases, though, we explain, 'Here is the research we have right now and what we know, and here are the conclusions we can draw.'"
