Coming to You Soon: Geological Carbon	Carbon Capture and Sequestration (CCS) will
Sequestration	likely play a major role in achieving the goal of
Priness Hall B	net-zero carbon emissions. One place to
	sequester carbon is deep underground in
	porous bedrock. The Mount Simon sandstone
	formation underlays the entirety of Indiana and
	has the capacity to store a massive amount of
	carbon dioxide. Contractors working on behalf
	of BP have begun seismic testing to characterize
	and inventory the available pore space under
	Benton County and representatives of BP are
	approaching landowners to initiate the process
	of securing leases. We have had to scramble to
	learn the basics of CCS and quickly put in place a
	zoning ordinance covering potential CCS

	projects. The task of responsibly educating
	residents about the potential risks and rewards
	is ongoing and continues to evolve.
