4-H: A Different Kind of Youth Organization

- Q. What is 4-H?
- A. 4-H is a leader in youth development, which began on the local level in response to evolving needs for new kinds of educational experiences for youth. From the beginning, this youth-serving organization offered "hands-on" learning activities for young people so they might become productive citizens. Youth participants in 4-H activities have opportunities to offer positive contributions to our diverse and changing society. 4-H uses the far-reaching Cooperative Extension System network to offer youth programs and activities to diverse groups of young people in all 3,150 counties across our nation.
- Q. What is the 4-H Youth Development Education program?
- A. The 4-H Youth Development Education program provides co-educational "hands-on" learning experiences in subject areas of interest to youth. Young people who participate in 4-H programs develop citizenship awareness and leadership skills as they learn about new subject areas. Kids in 4-H have fun while they learn! Non-formal educational activities help young people fully develop their skill and talents. Whether they are learning about photography, the environment, job skills or public speaking, young people practice a variety of skills in 4-H that will last a lifetime.

4-H is a Community Program

- Q. How did 4-H evolve?
- A. 4-H began as a simultaneous response to needs throughout the country, rather than as the idea of one individual. The basis for this activity was to offer agricultural education to rural youth by organizing boys and girls clubs and through "learning by doing".
- Q. Is there a 4-H program in my community?
- A. There are Cooperative Extension 4-H staff in nearly all 3,150 counties across the United States. These county 4-H staff help people in local communities by providing information about projects and programs. They can tell you about fun and interesting "hands-on" learning opportunities available for youth in your community.

4-H - Its Character and Design

- -4-H has youth development education as its central focus.
- -4-H uses subject matter from the land grant university system to enhance youth development.
- -4-H is a non-formal education program emphasizing experiential learning.
- -4-H enables youth, parents, and families to work cooperatively to encourage learning.
- -4-H employs a variety of <u>delivery methods</u> including clubs, special interest groups, school enrichment programs, short-term programs, individualized study, and mass media.
- -4-H programs are designed to meet locally significant needs through <u>input</u> from the citizens involved.
- -4-H fosters involvement of adult volunteers to extend its programs to the youth of the state.
- -4-H, through the direct interaction of youth and adults, <u>provides positive role models</u> and mutually rewarding educational growth opportunities on a continuing basis.

Youth Development: Our Foundation

Youth development describes the philosophical view of young people that forms the foundation of programs and activities. Youth development views young people as growing, changing persons who are developing mastery of their world within a context of ever changing intellectual and emotional consciousness, in contrast to a philosophical view of children as "small, empty vessels" to be filled with knowledge and values imparted by all-knowing adults. The process of growing, changing, and developing skills and abilities is particularly critical during adolescence.

The Mission of 4-H

The mission of today's 4-H is to help youth and volunteers in their development through experiential educational programs, using the knowledge and educational base of Purdue University and the United States Department of Agriculture. It is accomplished through direct involvement of youth, adults, and the community. **4-H educational programs are designed to empower young people to become independent and participating members of their family and community by creating experiences to build self-confidence, developing inquiring minds, encouraging interpersonal cooperation, developing concern for the community, and teaching decision-making through real life participation.**

Goals of Indiana 4-H

During the next decade, the youth development education program of the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service will strive to attain these goals:

Goal 1: To use subject matter of Purdue University and the land-grant university system to teach youth life skills that are necessary to function effectively in the rapidly changing world.

4-H builds on these major life skills. As youth and adults alike develop these skills, their own self-esteem will be enhanced.

Goal 2: To disseminate the knowledge and expertise of the faculty and staff of the land-grant university to willing adults who function as teachers, leaders, and role models for young people in communities across Indiana.

Goal 3: To educate 4-H adult and youth participants through practical hands-on methods (experiential education).

Goal 4: To be recognized as the state's highest quality community-based, non-formal educational program for youth.

Goal 5: To foster maximum youth participation in planning, conducting, and evaluation of 4-H educational programs.

Goal 6: To identify priority youth development issues within the context of the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service thrusts and develop educational programs consistent with our mission and goals to address these issues.

Goal 7: To significantly increase private support to 4-H at all levels of the program.

INDIANA 4-H PROGRAM STATEMENT OF POLICY

THE INDIANA 4-H PROGRAM PHILOSOPHY AND EXPECTATIONS:

The Indiana 4-H program serves the youth of Indiana by providing a strong educational youth development program. This program delivers educational experiences in a variety of settings. Caring, capable, and contributing adults assist in the 4-H program as models for young people. The rich heritage of the 4-H program is one to be valued and passed along to future generations.

The Indiana 4-H/Youth Policy and Procedures Book sets out certain standards and guidelines to be used to assure that 4-H is a positive youth development program. County 4-H policy is guided by the county 4-H policy-making or governing board (i.e., 4-H council) as provided by the county extension board. Legal authority for the 4-H program rests with the Director of Cooperative Extension Service at Purdue University. **No county 4-H policy may conflict with state 4-H policy or with federal guidelines and requirements.**

Deadlines for county and state participation should be carefully constructed so as to encourage rather than to discourage participation. Such deadlines should be well published. Members not complying with established and published dates and deadlines for exhibition may be denied the opportunity to exhibit.

It is the policy of 4-H to be an inclusive organization. No county policy or practice should be used to arbitrarily exclude youth from either membership or participation. Youth should participate in 4-H youth development opportunities at levels and times that best suit the youth's development and support family involvement.

4-H MISSION AND VISION

4-H Mission: The Indiana 4-H Youth Development mission is to provide real-life educational opportunities that develop young people who positively impact their community and world.

4-H Vision: Indiana 4-H Youth Development strives to be the premier, community-based program empowering young people to reach their full potential.

4-H Club Membership: Youth may become 4-H members when they enter the third grade and may continue their membership through the completion of grade 12. Each individual may continue membership for a maximum of ten (10) consecutive years.

Exceptions:

- (1) Youth who enroll in grade three and are advanced academically (thus graduating early) may continue for a total of 10 years ONLY if the enrollment occurs in consecutive years.
- (2) Those youth who are academically advanced and "skip" 3rd grade, may begin the program as a 4th grader and may continue for a total of 10 years ONLY if the enrollment occurs in consecutive years.
- (3) Those youth who enroll in grade three and are retained a grade in public school may continue to progress through the 4-H Program by adding subsequent years of participation, but MAY NOT exceed 10 years of participation. For example, if a member is retained one year in school (public, private or home), their final year of 4-H membership would conclude the summer following their junior year of high school.
- (4) Those youth who entered the program in 3rd grade and for one reason or another leave formal education prior to the completion of 12th grade may continue for a total of 10 years ONLY if the enrollment occurs in consecutive years.

NOTE: 10 years of membership in the 4-H Youth Development is an opportunity --- not an entitlement. Those youth who do not enroll as 3rd grade students or meet the exceptions above, conclude their involvement with the program during the summer immediately following the completion of their senior year in high school.

An individual's 4-H grade is determined by the school grade in which he or she is classified regardless of the time of year he or she enrolls in 4-H. A member does not advance in 4-H grade until he or she enrolls in 4-H for the subsequent school year. Each member should enroll in the division of a project that would best suit his/her interest and potential for personal growth and would enhance their family involvement.

Opportunities in the 4-H program are available to all Indiana youth as defined regardless of race, religion, color, sex, national origin or ancestry, marital status, parental status, sexual orientation or disability. Married young men and women of 4-H age may participate in any of the 4-H projects and activities. However, married persons must participate by the same terms and conditions and/or guidelines as unmarried participants. Membership in 4-H is gained by annually enrolling through a Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service Office located in each of Indiana's 92 counties.

The Indiana 4-H Youth Development program year is October 1 to September 30 annually. Enrollment is an annual process attained by completing individual 4-H enrollment via the 4HOnline enrollment process. Statewide 4HOnline enrollment occurs annually October 1 through January 15.

Residence: Indiana youth typically enroll in 4-H in the county or state in which they reside. However, individuals living in one county **may** join 4-H in another county. There may be educational or social reasons for an individual joining 4-H in a different county than that of their primary residence. During a single program year, a 4-H member enrolled in a given project is expected to enroll and exhibit that project only in one county of enrollment.

In the event that a project is not offered in the county of primary 4-H enrollment, a 4-H member may enroll in that specific project in a different county. Approval of this special exception rests with the 4-H Extension Educator. Participation in 4-H related activities and events (i.e., judging; share-the-fun) must be in the county of primary 4-H enrollment.

The above policy is not intended to provide an escape mechanism for troubled 4-H members and families who are unwilling to follow the terms and/or conditions in their current county of 4-H membership. Decisions regarding 4-H membership in a non-resident county (a county you do not live in), rest with the 4-H Youth Educator in the receiving county.

Note: In a statement from our federal partner in Washington, DC, the following statement appears: "Anytime there are procedures for exclusion of individuals from events which use the 4-H name there are potential challenges to enforcement of the exclusions. The challenges have a substantial potential to prevail and they frequently result in negative publicity for the organization. Therefore, before choosing a policy of exclusion it is wise to evaluate the exclusion being considered, to be sure there is an overwhelming educationally based need for the exclusion".

Extension employees and volunteers are obligated to eliminate (and should not create) any practices that limit, deprive, or tend to deprive any youth of opportunities for membership and/or participation in the Indiana 4-H program.

GUIDELINES FOR EXHIBITION AND COMPLETION:

Following are policies that govern exhibition and completion of 4-H projects:

Exhibition: Exhibition of 4-H projects in local, county or state exhibits/fairs, in person or virtually, is voluntary on the part of the exhibitor. The exhibition of 4-H projects provides 4-H members an opportunity to display their 4-H projects, enter into competition and participate in an educational/social environment with peers. With exhibition also comes the responsibility for abiding by all of the terms and conditions pertaining to the respective 4-H project.

Completion: The completion of a 4-H experience may include a variety of options and must not be misinterpreted solely as exhibition of a project at a local, county, or state fair. There are a number of ways that a young person may participate in the 4-H Youth Development Program in addition to the club-based option. Participating in these 4-H opportunities enable the youth to build skills that will serve them well throughout their adult lives.

Some of these participation options do not include the preparation of a specific exhibit by an individual that would be on display at a fair or similar event. In some cases, the youths' actual participation may be the final product that results in their completion of a year of 4-H. Some examples of this participation include working as a team to develop a robot for a workshop or challenge; completing a Spark Club experience; participating in State 4-H Band or Chorus; taking part in a science training or experiment; participating in an after school 4-H experience; etc.

4-H members are considered complete in their 4-H educational experience for the year when they have (1) completed the 4-H member enrollment process prior to the established and published date for enrolling; and (2) had an officially recognized 4-H volunteer/Extension Educator verify the existence of the completed project/subject or the member's participation in a 4-H educational experience. Additionally, 4-H members who participate in a club- or fair-based 4-H project/subject will submit a completed 4-H record sheet based on printed or web-based educational materials (used by Indiana 4-H Youth Development) prior to the established and published date.

Though exhibiting in local, county, and state exhibits/fairs is not required for project completion, as it does not necessarily relate directly to content and skills learned in the development of the 4-H project, project exhibition is encouraged as a continuation of the educational experience."

Extension employees and volunteers are obligated to eliminate (and should not create) any practices that limit, deprive, or tend to deprive any youth of opportunities for membership and/or participation in the Indiana 4-H program.

Guidelines for Animal Exhibits: Each 4-H member shall own his/her own 4-H exhibit. Ownership, personal possession, and regular care of the animal must be in effect on or before the county and state enrollment deadlines and continuously until after the 4-H show at the county and/or state fair.

- 4-H animals are expected to be in the possession and regular care of the 4-H member who owns/leases
 them (unless other arrangements have been agreed upon by the county 4-H Extension Educator) from the
 animal ID deadline until the conclusion of the county and/or state fair.
- For 4-H breeding animals, family corporations and/or partnerships of 4-H members with one or more parents, siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles or a legal guardian are acceptable.
- For 4-H dairy cattle, family corporations and/or partnerships of the 4-H member with unrelated persons or dairy operations are also acceptable.
- Dairy heifers, horses, ponies and llamas may be leased subject to approval of both the county 4-H dairy, horse and pony, or llama committee and the respective County Extension Educator. 4-H animals (horse and pony, dairy, alpacas, and llamas) are only eligible to be leased by a single 4-H member in a 4-H program year.
- 4-H animals purchased, sold or offered for sale after the animal ID deadline and prior to the Indiana State Fair (including animals that have gone through a "Premium Only Auction"), shall not be eligible to show in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. Sale of products of animals (milk, cheese, wool, etc.) in lieu of the animal, are considered equivalent to a "Premium Only Auction".

- 4-H animals exhibited after the May 15th State 4-H animal ID deadline at any show by anyone other than those whose 4-H enrollment record is connected to the ID of the animal in Indiana 4H Online will not be eligible to be shown in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. This term/condition does not apply to siblings and parents, who may show each other's animals at any show during the year with jeopardizing State Fair eligibility. 4-H animals that are selected by 4-H Extension Staff or 4-H Adult Volunteers for use in supreme showmanship contests (Master Showmanship, Round Robin, etc.) may be used in those county events without jeopardizing State Fair eligibility. This policy applies to all 4-H animal projects. For animal projects without State ID deadlines, the person who enters them in the Indiana State Fair 4-H show is the equivalent of the owner of the animals.
- Temporary guardianships established for the intent of animal exhibition or grooming purposes are not permitted and shall result in immediate disqualification.

Behavioral Criteria and Form for 4-H Events and Activities: (Recommend distributing with health forms for trips/activities.) To Four-H members, volunteers, parents and the public: When attending, participating or acting in behalf of the 4-H program, all persons are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with accepted standards of social behavior, to respect rights of others, and to refrain from any conduct which may be injurious to the 4-H program. The following actions constitute misconduct for which persons may be subject to disciplinary consequences and/or dismissal from the program:

- a) Dishonesty in connection with any 4-H activity by cheating or knowingly furnishing false information.
- b) Alteration or unauthorized use of 4-H records.
- Obstruction or disruption of any 4-H activity or aiding and encouraging other persons to engage in such conduct.
- d) Failure to comply or aiding or encouraging other persons not to comply with specific rules of a given project, contest, or activity.
- e) Failure to comply with directions of 4-H officials acting in the proper performance of their duties.
- f) Inhumane treatment of 4-H animal projects.

There are many opportunities for 4-H members, volunteers, parents and the public to participate in 4-H events and activities. When involved in such experiences, members, volunteers, parents and the public are expected to follow all rules and regulations as outlined by those responsible for the specific program or activity. In all such 4-H activities, the following constitute a violation of behavioral expectations:

- 1. Possession or use of fire crackers, gun powder, firearms, chemicals or other materials that can be used to create an explosive mixture.
- 2. Misuse of fire equipment or sounding a false fire alarm.
- 3. Having a guest of a different gender in your sleeping guarters, or inappropriate sexual behavior.
- 4. Physical or verbal abuse of any person or conduct which threatens or endangers the health or safety of any person.
- 5. Theft of or malicious damage to property.
- 6. Possession, use, or distribution of alcohol, illegal drugs, tobacco and tobacco-like products, electronic smoking devices (including, but not limited to e-cigs, vapes, juuls), or other dangerous substances.
- 7. Inappropriate displays of affection towards another person(s).
- 8. Distribution, misuse, or abuse of over-the-counter, homeopathic (including supplements and vitamins), or prescription medications.
- 9. Inappropriate clothing or lack of clothing during the event or activity.
- 10. Lewd, indecent, or obscene conduct or language.
- 11. Unauthorized entry, use or occupancy of any facility.
- 12. Any conduct which threatens or interferes with maintenance of appropriate order and discipline or invades the rights of others.
- 13. Unwillingness to follow appropriate health and safety procedures.
- 14. Reckless or inappropriate behavior.

When violations occur at out-of-county, district, area, and/or state and/or national 4-H events, the following procedures will be followed.

- a) The parents/legal guardians may be contacted to arrange transportation home for the violator(s) and
- b) The local extension educator may be notified.

2021 Adult Behavioral Expectations

To Promote the Well-Being of Youth for Faculty, Extension Educators, Staff and Volunteers Who Work With 4-H Youth Development Programs in Indiana

"Those who believe in and work with youth have confidence in our future."

These Adult Behavioral Expectations give faculty, educators, staff and volunteers the opportunity to reaffirm their commitment and dedication to the well-being of young people. When all faculty, educators, staff and volunteers sign a copy of this document, individuals are making a collective statement that youth in the 4-H Youth Development Program are being treated with respect, dignity, and attention to individual needs. The faculty, educators, staff and volunteers who work with the 4-H Youth Development Program in Indiana are proud of the quality educational programs provided to youth of this state and to their personal commitment to nurture the positive growth and development of youth.

In my role as a 4-H Youth Development Program faculty, educator, staff or volunteer I will:

- Respect, adhere to, and enforce the rules, policies, and guidelines established by the Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service including all laws related to child abuse and substance abuse.
- Accept supervision and support from salaried Extension staff or designated management volunteers.
- Be mindful and follow Purdue, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and other state and local health authority guidelines and recommendations related to any epidemic or pandemic illness.
- Participate in orientation and training, which includes youth protection standards, sponsored by the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service.
- Accept my responsibility to represent 4-H Youth Development Programs with dignity and pride by being a positive role model for youth.
- Conduct myself in a courteous, respectful manner, exhibit good sportsmanship, and demonstrate reasonable conflict management skills.
- Be truthful and forthright when representing the 4-H Youth Development Program.

Safety Policy for Mini/Exploring 4-H Members (Cass County – First and Second Grade Only):

The safety and well-being of our 4-H youth is of the utmost importance. Although kindergarten is specified as the time when a child may begin participation in some 4-H events and activities, parents are encouraged to take into consideration their child's physical and mental development before agreeing to let the child begin to show, work with, or care for animals. Each child matures at a different rate, and children in grades K-2 may still be too young to begin showing, working with, or caring for animals.

The State 4-H Youth Department at Purdue University has agreed to allow Mini 4-H members in grades K-2, to participate in some animal projects subject to certain conditions. These conditions are specified below.

Each county may determine its own **NON-COMPETITIVE** programs, classes, and participation requirements subject to the following safety guidelines:

"Mini 4-H members, in grades K through 2, will be allowed to show, work with, or care for animal projects after their parent or legal guardian has signed a liability release. Mini/Exploring 4-H members may independently show, work with, or care for animals that weigh 300 pounds or less. Mini 4-H members may only show, work with, or care for animals over 300 pounds when they are assisted by a parent, legal guardian, or another adult designated in writing by parent or legal guardian." (The word assisted means that the adult has control of the animal at all times.) Mini 4-H members are not required to own the animals they participate with in Mini 4-H. All animals on exhibit should meet the regulations of the Indiana Board of Animal Health Requirements for Exhibition of Domestic Animals in Indiana and meet the vaccination requirements set by Indiana 4-H.

Mini 4-H members exhibiting horses must wear ASTM or SEI standard F1163 (or above) certified helmets whenever mounted. The parent/guardian is responsible to see that this specified headgear is properly fitted with the approved harness in place and fastened whenever a rider is mounted.

If the guidelines stated in this policy are not followed for a particular event or activity, then such event or activity shall not be considered to be a 4-H event or activity and shall not be under the auspices of Extension 4-H educators or covered by Purdue University.

Mini 4-H Non-Competitive Policy

Mini 4-H is a program designed to encourage positive development of children, Kindergarten through second grade. The goal of Mini 4-H is to help young children explore friendships outside the family; explore the way in which things work; practice both small and large muscle control; and think about the ways people work together on projects.

The NON-COMPETITIVE learning environment for Mini 4-H includes:

- 1. Planned learning activities in which children are invited to be active and explore materials and ideas without the pressure of completing a specific product or exhibit.
- 2. Low adult/leader to child ratio that allows time for adults/leaders to provide individual, positive encouragement and assistance.
- 3. Simple, interesting activities that are fun.
- 4. Encouragement of children to participate in a group activity by sharing and or displaying their activity projects.
- 5. Rewards that are identical and/or ribbons of the same color for everyone.

DO NOT JUDGE projects, but instead discuss them with the child.

NOTE: Purdue University and the Indiana 4-H Youth Development Program do not support, endorse, or encourage 4-H programming for children prior to kindergarten 4-H Youth Development. Extension Staff members and 4-H Volunteers may not offer, or encourage other to offer programming for children prior to kindergarten.

Food Safety Rule for Foods Entered into County and Statewide Competitions:

For Food Competitions: Fillings, frostings, glazes, and meringues are not permitted to contain cream cheese, sour cream, heavy cream, or whipped cream if they are not fully cooked/baked. These items are allowed as ingredients in food products IF the final product is cooked/baked. Additionally, raw milk, raw milk products or uncooked eggs/egg whites are not permitted. Eggs/egg whites that have been cooked to 1600 F (i.e. pasteurized or included as part of a batter and baked) are acceptable. No homecanned fruits, vegetables, or meats are permitted as ingredients in food products.

Fresh-cut, uncooked, fruits and/or vegetables are not permitted to be used in food products or used as garnishes for the product. Foods should be transported to the competition in a way that minimizes contamination and maintains the quality of the food (i.e. foods that are judged as frozen should remain frozen at all times).

Recipes <u>must be provided</u> that identifies all ingredients that were used in each part of the product. <u>Any ingredient that could be a potential allergen must be clearly identified.</u> Each food product must be labeled with the following information:

- Name
- Date the food product was made

Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods. If cuts are present, the wound should be bandaged and a single use food service glove worn on the hand during all stages of food production. Contestants should not be preparing food exhibits for competition within 48 hours of recovering from any illness. People experiencing symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, fever, and/or jaundice should not be allowed to prepare food.

Judges and individuals who will consume products from county and/or state competitions should be informed that they are at risk for foodborne illness since the established policy cannot guarantee that an entry has been properly prepared or handled before, during or following the competition. The food products for competitions are home produced and processed and the production area is not inspected by the Indiana State Department of Health. Tasting of a food product is solely at the discretion of the judge and consumers. Judges are NOT to taste any home preserved foods such as low-acid or acidified foods like green beans, tomatoes or tomato products, jams/jellies/fruit preserves or fermented products produced in the home.

THANK YOU

Thank you notes are a polite way of expressing gratitude, but more importantly they are an effective means of building strong relationships and creating good will for you and your organization.

It is surprising how many times those deserving of special thanks are forgotten. Unfortunately, individuals sometimes stop doing good deeds because they have never received a thank you note for their generosity of time, money and support.

Writing a thank you note is an expression of one's personality and each individual will express thoughts differently - thus, developing a distinctive style of writing. While there is not a right or wrong way to write a thank you letter, there are a few guidelines to follow:

- Write the thank you on nice note paper.
- These notes should be handwritten and should become an automatic reaction to the nice things people do for you.
- Always find out the person's name if you don't know. Never send a thank you letter to "Dear Sir".
- ❖ Tell the individual what you're thanking them for.
- Explain what their help or sponsorship meant to you.
- ❖ Make it a personal note so the person receiving it feels you're sincere about the thank you. Believe it or not, the receiver of a thank you can tell if your mom is standing over you forcing you to write it.
- Short and simple thank you notes are the best.
- The stilted, long winded styles of writing thank you notes make you sound insincere.
- Always write a personal hand written message. Never just sign a printed thank you card.
- ❖ Deliver the card in person if it goes to a local person. Bake goods or craft items are a nice touch and are always appreciated by the recipient.

Learn to write other kinds of personal notes to reinforce your personal friendships. React to what happens to people. Write to congratulate someone on good news and console someone on bad news.

Remember, the written word puts your friendship and appreciation on record.




Poster Requirements


For All Projects that Require a Poster for Exhibition

1. Each exhibit must have an exhibit card in the lower right hand corner. **The card will be furnished.**

The 4-H Exhibit card will provide this information: (unless specified differently in project manual)

- a. Name
- b. Club
- c. Grade
- d. Project Name
- e. Division/level or year in project
- 2. Poster exhibits will be 22 inches by 28 inches (Mini 4-H poster exhibits will be 14 inches by 22 inches), unless specified differently in the project manual or project section in the 4-H Handbook and displayed horizontally.

- 3. Poster exhibits MUST be covered with clear plastic to protect them from being soiled unless stated otherwise in the project guidelines or manual.
- 4. Posters must be mounted on foam board, heavy cardboard, paneling, plywood or other stiff substance to add stiffness for exhibiting.
- 5. All posters, notebooks, and display boards <u>MUST</u> include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.
- 6. For suggestions on poster layout and design, contact the County Extension Office for the bulletin "Poster Pointers".

^{***} If the above requirements are not met, the exhibit will be dropped one ribbon grade at time of judging and will not be eligible for Judges Award.

4-H ACTIVITIES

Verbal Communication Events and Activities

Effective communications drives all aspects of day-to-day life. Youth are to learn about the process of communications, to learn about different modes of communications and to strengthen their own communications skills. As you explore the world of communications and the manuals, you will enjoy learning more about yourself and others.

In the Indiana 4-H Youth Development program, we offer a few avenues to learn and build skills on communications with others. The following verbal communication events and activities are offered to 4-H members as a way to teach presentation and public speaking skill development. They are often used in 4-H meetings, and a county 4-H youth development program may choose to offer these as competitive events. While the interactive demonstration is a non-competitive event at the Indiana State Fair, the demonstration, informative presentation, professional persuasive presentation, public speaking, and illustrated talk are competitive events.

- Interactive demonstration
- Demonstration

Requirements

Level: Interactive Demonstration

Interactive Demonstration

- Any 4-H member may participate in the Interactive Demonstration.
- This is designed for the novice person, and the topic can be related to any 4-H project. The 4-H member will provide a short demonstration of no more than 3 minutes that will actively engage members of the audience in a how-to-do skill development.

- An Interactive Demonstration can be on almost any topic. Here are some questions to ask
 yourself when choosing a topic.
 - Is it something that can be given in 3-5 minutes?
 - Is it something that would interest the general public?
 - Is there something "hands on" for the audience to do?
 - Can the supplies for the "hands on" activity be used over and over again, or will they have to be replaced every time? (Note: If they have to be replaced, this will add to the cost.)
- Examples include, but are not limited to, how to use a measuring cup, how to use a ruler, how to knead dough, how to clean grooming clippers, how to crop a photo, etc.
- Props are permitted.
- Live animals and PowerPoint displays are not permitted.
- Although participants will not be judged, an adult will watch the 4-H member's interactive demonstration and will provide feedback to the member.
- The 4-H member will continually repeat their how-to interactive demonstration for the designated time period, typically 45-60 minutes.

Demonstration

- This contest allows the 4-H member to show the audience step-by-step procedures how to do something.
- Examples of a demonstration include how to take a prize winning photograph, how to give an intramuscular antibiotic injection or shot, how to design a mini-barn blueprint, how to construct a garment, how to develop a wildlife rehabilitation plan, how to treat a cat for fleas, etc.

- Members may use a PowerPoint, Prezi, or other digital presentation, signs, and other props that will enhance their presentation when giving their how-to demonstration to the audience from a stage or stage-like setting.
- If digital media will be used to enhance the presentation, contestants are encouraged to provide their own laptop computer. If the laptop is not equipped with a standard VGA external video connection, the contestant will need to supply an appropriate adapter. While a standard PC laptop will be available, the quality and compatibility of the digital media cannot be guaranteed as PowerPoint will be the only digital media available.
- Live animals are not permitted.
- There is no interaction with the audience.

Clover Members:

- 1) Grades 3 through 5 as of January 1 of the current calendar year (County Only).
- 2) Will have 3 to 5 minutes to present their demonstration.

• Junior Division:

- 1) Grades 6 through 8 as of January 1 of current calendar year.
- 2) Will have 5 to 7 minutes to present their demonstration.

Senior Division:

- 1) Grades 9 through 12 as of January 1 of current calendar year.
- 2) Will have 5 to 10 minutes to present their demonstration
- The State Fair Achievement Trip may be awarded by the judges to a maximum of the top three
 (3) blue merit senior individual members at the discretion of the judges. Trip winners must be of blue merit quality.
- A county may have no more than three (3) entries in each of the categories.

Level: Informative 4-H Presentation

Informative 4-H Presentation

- This contest allows the 4-H member to present a topic of their choice related to a 4-H event, project, or activity to the audience.
- Examples of an informative 4-H presentation include the benefits of attending 4-H Round-Up, State 4-H Junior Leader Conference, Science Workshops, or Citizenship Washington Focus; the impact of a community service project on the 4-H members involved and their community; why a family should enroll their children in 4-H; how 4-H prepares a young person for the workforce or college, etc.
- Members may use a PowerPoint, Prezi, or other digital presentation, signs, and other props that will enhance their presentation when giving it to the audience from a stage or stage-like setting. If digital media will be used to enhance the presentation, contestants are encouraged to provide their own laptop computer. If the laptop is not equipped with a standard VGA external video connection, the contestant will need to supply an appropriate adapter. While a standard PC laptop will be available, the quality and compatibility of the digital media cannot be guaranteed as PowerPoint will be the only digital media available.
- Live animals are not permitted.
- There is no interaction with the audience.
- Junior members (grades 6-8) have 5-7 minutes to present their informative presentation, while senior members (grades 9-12) will present their informative presentation in 5-10 minutes.
- Questions may be asked of the contestants by the judges following the informative 4-H
 presentation.
- Categories will be Junior Individual and Senior Individual.
- The State Fair Achievement Trip may be awarded by the judges to a maximum of the top three (3) blue merit senior individual members at the discretion of the judges. Trip winners must be of blue merit quality.
- A county may have no more than three (3) entries in each of the categories.

Level: Professional Persuasive Presentation

- Contestants will be required to research a public issue in their community, collect data showing
 how this issue is or could affect their community, formulate a plan to address this issue, and
 present it in a professional manner using electronic digital media such as PowerPoint, Prezi, etc.
- Contestants are to submit three (3) sets of accompanying handouts at registration. These handouts will be provided to the judges.
- It is suggested that youth practice by presenting their professional presentation to service clubs, 4-H council or fair board, government officials, or other boards.
- Examples of public issues could be the lack of accessibility to trails or public parks, congested traffic locations, public health issues, impoverished neighborhoods, school dropout rates, the size of farm machinery outgrowing the size of roads, etc.
- Members must use a PowerPoint, Prezi, or other digital media presentation when giving it to the audience from a stage or stage-like setting.
- Other props may be used to enhance the presentation but are not required.
- Live animals are not permitted.
- There is no interaction with the audience.
- Junior members (grades 6-8) and senior members (grades 9-12) will present their professional presentation in 5-10 minutes.
- Questions may be asked by the judges following the professional presentation.
- Categories will be Junior Individual, Senior Individual, Junior Team, and Senior Team.
- The team category is for two (2) people and will be determined by the highest grade level of any member of that team. If a team is awarded the State Fair Achievement Trip, only those team members who are 14 years of age or older as of January 1 will be permitted to attend the trip. Those members of the winning team who are younger than 14 years of age will not be able to compete in a team professional persuasive presentation in future years.
- Contestants are encouraged to provide their own laptop computer. If the laptop is not equipped
 with a standard VGA external video connection, the contestant will need to supply an
 appropriate adapter. While a standard PC laptop will be available, the quality and compatibility of
 the digital media cannot be guaranteed as PowerPoint will be the only digital media available.
- A wireless internet connection will be available.
- The State Fair Achievement Trip may be awarded by the judges to a maximum of the top three
 (3) blue merit senior individual members at the discretion of the judges. Trip winners must be of blue merit quality.
- A county may have no more than three (3) entries in each of the categories.

Level: Public Speaking

Public Speaking

- This contest allows the 4-H member to give their prepared speech to an audience from a stage or stage-like setting.
- There is no interaction with the audience.
- Props, signs, and PowerPoint presentations are not permitted.
- The topic can be of the 4-H members choice and must be related to 4-H.
- Clover Members (County Only):
 - 1) Grades 3 through 5 as of January 1 of the current calendar year.
 - 2) Will have 3 to 5 minutes to give their speech.

• Junior Division:

- 1) Grades 6 through 8 as of January 1 of current calendar year.
- 2) Will have 3 to 5 minutes to give their speech.

Senior Division:

- 1) Grades 9 through 12 as of January 1 of current calendar year.
- 2) Will have 5 to 7 minutes to give their speech.
- Questions may be asked by the judges following the speech.

Level: Illustrated Talk

An illustrated talk is offered at the Indiana State Fair in poultry and rabbits.

Illustrated Talk

- All participants must complete the Indiana State Fair Rabbit or Poultry entry form. This
 completed form is to be submitted to the rabbit or poultry barn office, respective to the contest,
 at check-in. There is no Indiana State Fair entry fee for this event.
- Categories will be Novice (grades 3-4), Junior (grades 5-6), Intermediate (grades 7-8), Senior (grades 9-10), and Master (grades 11-12).
- An illustrated talk is for any 4-H member and allows the member to present a 5-7 minute speech to the audience on a topic related to that project while using props and/or a PowerPoint, Prezi, or other digital presentation.
- There is no interaction with the audience.
- Check the Indiana State Fair 4-H Premium book for the time, date, and location of this event.
- Entries will be accepted through the county Purdue Extension office or on-site at the poultry or rabbit show for the respective event. Check the Indiana State Fair 4-H Premium book for the time, location, and deadline to enter if entering on-site.
- Live animals that would be eligible to show in that project may be used in the illustrated talk.
- The State Fair Achievement Trip may be awarded by the judges to a maximum of the top three
 (3) blue merit senior individual members at the discretion of the judges. Trip winners must be of blue merit quality.
- A county may have no more than three (3) entries in each of the categories.

<u>RIBBONS</u>: (A-B-C) are presented. There will be a Champion and Reserve Champion selected in each Division – Clover, Junior, and Senior at the county level for each type of demonstration or speech.

PERFORMING ARTS

Curtain acts (four or less entertainers) and group acts (five or more) are eligible to compete. The County/Area Invitational Contest is usually held the latter part of April or the first part of May. Area winners perform at 4-H Round-Up. Curtain acts are limited to five minutes in length, and group acts to eight minutes.

STATE FAIR WORKERS

4-H Junior Leaders, ages 15-19, have the opportunity to work at the 4-H Exhibit hall and the Ag-Hort Building before and during the Indiana State Fair. Responsibilities would include helping display and supervise exhibits. Application forms are due April 1 to State 4-H Office.

4-H AND FFA JUDGING

Anyone who can size up a situation, consider its different angles, and reach a sound decision about what needs to be done, is usually recognized and accepted as a leader. Judging develops leadership in this way. Agricultural Judging activities are an important part of 4-H and effective way to train 4-H'ers to recognize and identify quality agricultural products and be able to answer questions or solve problems on agricultural subjects. Judging helps to teach decision making. 4-H'ers may participate as individuals or as members of a team. If you are interested, contact your leader or the Extension Office.

Contests are held for the following areas of interest: 1) Crops, 2) Horse & Pony, 3) Poultry and Eggs, 4) Dairy, 5) Livestock Skill-a-thon, 6) Horticulture, 7) Soils, 8) Entomology, 9) Livestock, 10) Forestry, 11) Meat Identification, and 12) Milk Quality and Products. Further information is available in "4-H/FFA Ag Judging Handbook", 4-H 98, obtained from the Extension Office.



AWARDS

<u>TENURE</u> - Indiana Farm Bureau, Inc. and Farm Bureau Insurance Companies sponsor this award to encourage 4-H members to remain in club work. Two 4-H members per county are honored annually. Selection is based on years in 4-H, projects taken, age, and achievements.

<u>ACHIEVEMENT MEDALS</u> – Local organizations and foundations support the 4-H program by sponsoring achievement medals each year to outstanding county 4-H'ers in their individual projects and activities.

<u>ELECTRIC AWARDS</u> - The State 4-H Electric Program Committee furnishes several awards for 4-H electric project members each year. Financing of these awards is done jointly by the REMC's and public utilities.

LOCAL 4-H SCHOLARSHIPS

<u>4-H JUNIOR LEADER SCHOLARSHIPS</u> – Awarded to 4-H Junior Leaders in their Senior year with at least 3 years of 4-H Junior Leader Club work. **Applications are due August 15**th to the Extension Office.

<u>CASS COUNTY COMMUNITY FOUNDATION 4-H MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP</u> – (Application only available from the Cass Co. Community Foundation scholarship sessions.) Must be a Cass County 4-H member in good standing, currently enrolled in last year of 4-H and graduate of any Cass County high school. **Due by 11:59 p.m. on Jan. 29 to the Cass County Community Foundation.**

<u>THE BLANK 4-H SCHOLARSHIP</u> – Awarded to an outstanding 4-H 10 year member residing in Cass County who has also completed 3 years of 4-H Junior Leader Club work. **Applications are due February 1**st to the **Extension Office.**

<u>BRAD SCOTT SCHOLARSHIP</u> – (Application only available from the Cass Co. Community Foundation scholarship sessions.) Must be a Cass County resident graduating from Caston, Lewis Cass, Logansport or Pioneer High School with a GPA of 2.0 or higher. Must be a present or former Cass County 4-H member and have documented need for financial assistance. **Due by 11:59 p.m. on Jan. 29 to the Cass County Community Foundation.**

<u>HELMS FAMILY SCHOLARSHIP</u> - (Application only available from the Cass Co. Community Foundation scholarship sessions.) Must participate in 4-H for 10 years. Must reside in Cass County and be graduating from Logansport, Lewis Cass, Pioneer or Caston High School. Must demonstrate financial need. **Due by 11:59 p.m. on Jan. 29 to the Cass County Community Foundation.**

<u>JACK PENTLAND FAMILY / CASS COUNTY 4-H HORSE & PONY SCHOLARSHIP</u> – Must be an active member in the Cass County 4-H Horse & Pony project for a minimum of 5 years. Must have a total of 9 or 10 years of 4-H participation and be enrolled at a tax-exempt post-high school educational institution. **Due by 4 p.m. on June 1 to the Extension Office.**

<u>CERES SOLUTIONS COOPERATIVE SCHOLARSHIP</u> – (Sponsored by Ceres Solutions Cooperative) Student must reside in Ceres Solutions' trade area and demonstrate leadership thru 4-H, FFA, or volunteering. Students must have a parent or grandparent who is a member or an employee of the Cooperative. Children and grandchildren of current directors are ineligible. **Due March 1 to Ceres Solutions Cooperative.**

KANDY GREER VERMEERSCH MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP-(Application only available from the Cass Co. Community Foundation scholarship sessions.) Must be a graduating from Lewis Cass or Pioneer High School. CASS COUNTY 4-H RULES

Grievance/Appeal Guidelines for County 4-H Program Issues: (Activities, Programs, Projects)

The grievance procedures outlined in this document are utilized as part of an internal process of the Indiana 4-H Youth Development program for use when grievances of 4-H members, their parents/guardians, or 4-H volunteers cannot be resolved via reasonable conversation. This policy affords the opportunity in those unique situations to allow voice or opinion to be heard when there is a dispute regarding 4-H participation, activities or programs. This is not a mechanism for complaints against individual 4-H members (or their families), 4-H volunteers, judging officials for competitive events, or Purdue Extension staff. All resulting decisions will be made in accordance with the Indiana 4-H Program's stated mission to be an inclusive organization designed to encourage and maximize youth participation. The rights of the individual filing the grievance are limited to those provided by Indiana 4-H Program policy.

Purdue University, as the Land Grant University in Indiana, is charged (by the United States Department of Agriculture) with implementing the 4-H Program in communities across the State of Indiana. Purdue Extension Educators in each Indiana county represent the university in local communities and have the responsibility of assuring all 4-H volunteers meet basic university criteria as they serve as representatives of the university. Purdue Extension Educators additionally provide oversight to 4-H volunteers including the assurance that Indiana 4-H Policies and Procedures are appropriately implemented in 4-H Program delivery.

Individual county 4-H policies and procedures should be created and reviewed to assure they do not contradict established statewide 4-H policies and procedures. If a contradiction is discovered during the grievance process, Indiana 4-H Program policy shall be followed in determining the grievance outcome.

- 1. Grievances are made by completing the Indiana 4-H Grievance/Appeal form with the burden of proof being the responsibility of the individual filing the grievance. The completed grievance/appeal form and supporting documentation shall be presented to the president of the 4-H policy-making body (e.g., 4-H Council) or the Purdue Extension Educator who works with the 4-H Program. (NOTE: concerns regarding staff, volunteers, members, or other individuals are not issues for which a grievance may be filed. 4-H volunteers are assigned by the 4-H Extension Educator. Concerns regarding 4-H volunteers, members, or other individuals should be addressed directly with the Purdue 4-H Extension Educator.)
- 2. Grievances pertaining to 4-H activities, programs or projects shall be filed within 14 days of an incident or occurrence. Grievances pertaining to county fair related issues are often time-sensitive and must be filed within 24 hours of the incident.
- 3. The grievance process occurs in the county where the issue or concern arises and offers three opportunities for a concern to be heard and reviewed.
 - A. The grievance is initially heard by an unbiased, representative grievance sub-committee. It is the Purdue Extension Educator assigned to 4-H Programming who shall annually work with the chair of the county 4-H Council to determine this committee's membership to include the following individuals: one representative of the 4-H Council; two 4-H volunteers serving as a 4-H club organizational leader; one member of the County Extension Board; and one 4-H volunteer knowledgeable in the subject matter (project) of concern (this individual will vary dependent on issue raised with the grievance). The Purdue Extension Educator assigned to 4-H shall convene the group.
 - B. The person filing the grievance may appeal the decision of the grievance sub-committee to the 4-H policy-making body, which will then review the facts in evidence and render a decision.
 - C. The person filing a grievance may appeal a decision of the 4-H policy-making body to the County Extension Board. The Extension Board will review the facts in evidence and render a decision. This is the **final level** in the appeal process.

**While there is no doubt some overlap in who serves on these committees, the intent of a three level process is to assure different individuals have the opportunity to hear and act on the grievance. ALL individuals involved at any level of the grievance procedure are reminded of the importance of keeping discussions regarding grievances confidential.

To maintain the confidentiality of the parties involved, the grievance hearings at each level will be closed to the public. Only the individuals who have filed the grievance, the members of the grievance committee, and the Purdue Extension Educators will be present during each level of the grievance process, ***The grievance process is internal to the Indiana 4-H Youth Development Program and meetings of the grievance committees are not subject to Indiana's Open Door Policy.

The Purdue Extension Educator assigned to work with the 4-H Program has the obligation to inform all parties that there is a grievance procedure if there are disagreements with policies.

The practice of charging fees from those filing grievances shall be eliminated and all counties will utilize the Indiana 4-H Grievance/Appeal Form as part of the grievance process.

"MY RECORD OF 4-H ACHIEVEMENT"

- 4-H record keeping is an important part of the 4-H Program. 4-H'ers are encouraged to keep as complete and accurate records as possible. 4-H awards, trips and other recognition may be based on the 4-H member's record, participation, interests, and Leaders Recommendation.
- 1) Each year, the 4-H Club leader will complete and/or update 4-H achievements & activities for each 4-H member. This will be completed and in the Extension Office by September 15th. This information will be entered on the 4-H database for each member's permanent record.
- 2) Records for achievement points will be maintained by the Extension Staff.
- 3) Member's accomplishments and participation as listed on these records will be evaluated by a points system as described herein. Each record will have a cumulative total as it is brought up to date after the county and state fairs. Trip delegates and certain county medal winners will be considered by the awards committee on the basis of this cumulative point's total. The awards committee may prescribe a minimum number of points that a member will have before he/she is considered for a particular trip or award.

"GENERAL 4-H GUIDELINES"

1) ACTIVITY PROJECT

4-H'ers enrolling in TRACTOR MAINTENANCE must be enrolled in at least one other project and be a member of a local club. 4-H JUNIOR LEADERS <u>must</u> enroll in at least one other project and be a member of a local or county club.

2) CHECK OUT TIME

COMMUNITY CENTER WILL BE OPEN FOR PROJECTS TO BE PICKED UP BY THE 4-H MEMBER OR PARENT ON FRIDAY OF THE FAIR FROM 8:30 – 9:30 P.M. AND SATURDAY OF THE 4-H FAIR BETWEEN 9:00 – 10:00 A.M. "NO PROJECTS WILL BE RELEASED UNTIL THEIR SCHEDULED TIME."



3) COUNTY MEDAL AWARDS

All county winners should have completed at least three years of 4-H club work including the current club year. They must be enrolled during the current club year and in the project or activity with which the awards program is concerned, and it is recommended that the winners have a minimum three-year record in the project or activity which related to this awards program. Records of all county winners should show evidence of project development and educational growth in the subject matter area involved. There need not be any limit on the awards an individual may receive during a club year; however, some county awards may be received only once.

Nominees for available county medals shall be selected on the basis of their overall project and activity record pertaining to the area of the award.

Nominees for county medal awards may be requested to complete a required form containing specific information relating to their work in a particular award. (IF THE 4-H'ER CHOOSES NOT TO FURNISH THE ADDITIONAL INFORMATION, FURTHER CONSIDERATION FOR THE AWARD NEED NOT BE GIVEN.)

Project achievement points will be considered in making final award winner determination. These points are reviewed by the 4-H Awards Committee.

4) COUNTY CLUBS

- A. The <u>DOG</u>, <u>RABBIT</u>, <u>HORSE & PONY</u>, and <u>SHOOTING SPORTS</u> as projects are considered as "COUNTY CLUBS" and considered the same as any township club and shall meet all requirements of a township 4-H Club. Enrollment in these projects will require enrollment in these clubs.
- B. Enrollment in other projects can be done through the county club membership <u>OR</u> joining a local township club and compliance with the rules thereof.
- C. Other project clubs may be recognized as a county club provided that:
 - 1. There is reasonable indication of interested, qualified leadership.
 - 2. Assurance is given that the group will follow the recommendations set forth for a "4-H Club" as defined in this handbook.
- D. The formation of county clubs shall be governed as follows:
 - 1. The interested group shall define their intentions in writing.
 - 2. They will then make their proposal and request to the adult 4-H Leaders Organization.
 - 3. The adult 4-H Leaders may make suggestions for revision and may either present the proposal to the 4-H Directors or request that the interested group make their own proposal to the 4-H Directors.
 - 4. Final decision rests with the 4-H Directors of the 4-H Council. Interested groups must be willing to abide by any regulations so desired by the 4-H Directors.

CLUBS DEFINED

4-H Club - have a local 4-H Leader in charge; have project and junior leader assistance as can be developed; have at least five members; have a club organization with officers, a constitution and by-laws. Have a well-planned 4-H program developed by the program committee and adopted by the club; have at least one demonstration given before the club or a general public meeting; participate in a local or county 4-H achievement program; hold six to ten regular 4-H club meetings during the year; have at least 75% of the members complete one or more projects; have an average of 75% attendance at regular meetings.

5) DEMONSTRATIONS

Each 4-H'er giving a demonstration in the county contest shall be given a ribbon of his/her earnings and the best in each category be champion with a champion ribbon. All county contest participants are encouraged to participate in the state competition if eligible. All 4-H'ers should be encouraged to give at least one local demonstration or project talk before their local club.

6) ENROLLMENT

4-H Members enrolled only in the Cass County 4-H Club during the current year (following all club and project requirements) are eligible to exhibit. Membership Requirements: 4-H enrollment in Cass County will be from grades 3-12. Youth may become 4-H members when they enter grade 3 and may continue as a member through grade 12, regardless of age, with a maximum of 10 consecutive years participation. Cass County Mini 4-Her's will be 1st and 2nd grades only.

7) 4-H ENROLLMENT PERIOD

Enrollment period for 4-H begins October 1 – and preference to receive enrollments by January 15 with either a paper form or through the 4-H Online Process. NOTE: Enrollments accepted after January 15th. **4-H Project Drop and Add deadline is May 15th.**

8) Project Enrollment

4-H'ers should enroll in the township club of their choice and select which 4-H projects they wish to be involved in.

9) Indiana State 4-H Program Fee

Members in grades 3-12 pay \$15 each with a maximum payment of \$45 per family household address. Payment options: debit/credit card (online enrollment only), check or cash. Please make checks payable to **Purdue CES Ed Fund**. All youth <u>MUST</u> complete an enrollment form (online or paper) with permissions indicated and pay the State 4-H Program Fee by to be officially enrolled in 4-H.

10) EXHIBITS

Entry sheets for each project for the 4-H Fair and for community judging will be made up by the Extension Staff in advance of the show. To exhibit in a 4-H project, the 4-H member must have enrolled in that project or added the project by May 15th.

- 11) All exhibits must be products of the current, club year project work.
- 12) <u>Late 4-H exhibit entries will receive a dropping of one ribbon grade. Late entries brought on a different day will receive a "green completion ribbon".</u>
- 13) <u>ALL PROJECTS IN THE 4-H COMMUNITY CENTER:</u> If the exhibit of this project does not follow instructions as specified in the member's manual or this handbook, including size and shape, the project will be lowered one place. All posters "MUST" be mounted on stiff materials, displayed horizontally, covered and include a 4-H exhibit label in the lower right hand corner! Size: 22" x 28" except as noted in project manual! Check your project manual for exceptions! **Judges Award exhibit MUST meet minimum project exhibit requirements.**
- 14) The Community Judging will be on **TUESDAY**, **JULY 6**th at Fairview Elementary School. Community judging is for all Foods, Food Preservation, Bake With A Mix, Sewing, Microwave, Cake Decorating, 4-H Memories, Theme Scrapbook, and Genealogy.

ALL RECIPES FOR FOODS PROJECTS ARE TO BE COMPLETE, LISTING INGREDIENTS AND DIRECTIONS, COPIED ON 5" x 8" CARDS.

- 15) The 4-H Project Judging will be done at the 4-H Community Center on **FRIDAY**, **JUNE 25**th. This is the day 4-H electric, photography, toy farm scene/miniature dollhouse, and woodworking will be judged. Exhibits will remain in the building for display.
- 16) When there is only one exhibit in a class or division, the exhibit receives the judge's consideration and a ribbon reflecting exhibit quality.
- 17) STATE FAIR CATEGORIES are to be filled according to judges' decisions. In accordance with judges' decisions, if a red, white or green ribbon is awarded, a champion ribbon will not be placed on the exhibit. If blue, a champion ribbon may be awarded.
- 18) Check marks are to be used instead of numerical scores on score cards.
- 19) No overnight or daytime camping is allowed at the Cass County 4-H fairgrounds.
- 20) ALL 4-H Committees/Volunteers work in cooperation with the 4-H Youth Educator, the Extension Office, and follow Purdue Extension guidelines.



GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES -

ALSO CHECK RULES UNDER EACH SPECIES OF LIVESTOCK

4-H members must make stall and pen requests for livestock projects to be exhibited at the Cass County 4-H Fair. Stall and pen request forms will be mailed to 4-H members in May.

2) Deadline for Livestock Enrollments are as follows:

<u>Beef Steers, Commercial Heifers, Market Heifers, and Dairy Steers</u> – enter through the State On-line System by May 15th. Tagging/ID day will be ahead of that on March 6th, but families will still have to enter on-line to complete the enrollment for eligibility at County and State Fair.

Sheep, Swine, Goats, Rabbits, Horses, Llamas, Dairy Feeders, Dairy Females, Beef Purebred Heifers, Beef Cow-Calf and Beef Jr. Commercial Heifer/Jr. Beef Feeder – enter through the State Online system by May 15th. Goats/Sheep/Dairy Feeders will have a tagging/ID day ahead of that but families will still have to enter on-line to complete the enrollment for eligibility at county and state fair.

Poultry – completed livestock enrollment form due May 15th in the Extension Office.

NOTE – Animal enrollments received May 16th thru May 22nd will be considered late and will be charged a \$25.00 late fee <u>per person/per specie</u> (exception given to hardship cases). These enrollments will not be eligible for State Fair. Any animal enrollments received after these dates will be considered VOID and the livestock entered therein will not be exhibited at the current year's Cass County 4-H Fair.

WARNING: <u>If all necessary animal information is not enrolled through the State On-line system by the respective date(s) listed above, you have made yourself ineligible for State Fair.</u>

- 3) RESIDENCE OF 4-H MEMBERS

 4-H'ERS SHOWING CATTLE, EXCEPT JUNIOR OR SENIOR CALVES, MUST RESIDE
 CONTINUOUSLY FROM 4-H BEEF ENROLLMENT DEADLINE THROUGH THE 4-H FAIR WITH
 PARENT OR GUARDIAN AT THE LOCATION WHERE THE LIVESTOCK IS HOUSED. 4-H'ERS
 SHOWING OTHER LIVESTOCK MUST BE IN LOCAL RESIDENCE WITH PARENT OR
 - GUARDIAN, CARING FOR THEIR LIVESTOCK BY MAY 15TH OR BY MAY TAGGING DATE FOR SHEEP, GOATS AND DAIRY FEEDER STEER CALF, UNLESS OTHERWISE APPROVED BY THE 4-H BOARD OF DIRECTORS.
- 4) MINI LIVESTOCK RULES ARE DIFFERENT. YOU MUST CHECK WITH YOUR LEADER OR THE CASS COUNTY EXTENSION OFFICE FOR THE EXCEPTIONS.
- 5) Farm visits may be conducted randomly by committee members during the time between May 15th and fair week to verify animal welfare and wellness. Families will be notified of visits at least 24 hours in advance.
- 6) To complete a livestock project, the 4-H member must: enroll in Cass County 4-H; enroll animals by animal enrollment deadline; be caring for your own animals on a regular basis; and turn in a completed record sheet.
- 7) Strollers or wagons are discouraged in the barns (show day and auction).
- 8) All livestock must be owned (or in family partnership), cared for throughout the whole year including the week of the fair by the 4-H'er and also must be shown by the club member. In cases of illness or similar extreme cases, the animal may be shown by another 4-H'er from Cass County. Substitutions must be approved by the Livestock Committee Chairman of that livestock species.
- 9) All 4-H animals must remain in the care of the 4-H member and within Cass County during the entire 4-H enrollment year unless the 4-H Directors have approved otherwise. Example: Time of enrollment deadline through Indiana State Fair.
- Livestock residing away from the 4-H'ers home (off premise) and those wanting to join 4-H in Cass County from another county must complete a "2021 Cass County 4-H Special Request Form" (subject to approval by the 4-H Board of Directors). This is to be completed EVERY year.
- Dairy, goats, swine, sheep, and beef animals to be shown in the purebred classes MUST be accompanied by registration papers showing that the exhibitor owns the animal entirely or in family partnership. There will be classes for grade dairy animals.

12) Bedding and equipment may be brought to the 4-H Fairgrounds between the hours of 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. or after 9 p.m. Sunday of the 4-H Fair. NO STRAW BEDDING ALLOWED – Only shavings and/or bark is to be used in pens, stalls or cages. NO TACK ON SATURDAY BEFORE THE FAIR. Tack must be out by 8 a.m. on Saturday morning the last day of the fair, exception – feed pan for the auction.

(THANK YOU FOR THE QUIET HOURS DURING THE 4-H VESPER SERVICE.)

NO ANIMALS WILL BE BROUGHT TO THE 4-H PARK BEFORE 5:00 A.M., MONDAY OF THE 4-H FAIR. 4-H ANIMALS WILL BE CHECKED-IN AT THE 4-H EXHIBIT BARNS BETWEEN 5:00 A.M. AND 10:00 A.M. ON MONDAY OF THE 4-H FAIR. (See Fair Schedule.) EXCEPTIONS FOR RABBIT AND POULTRY. A COMMITTEE MEMBER **MUST** BE PRESENT TO UNLOAD ANIMALS.

- 13) NO EXHIBITORS WILL BE PERMITTED TO USE POWER WASHERS ON THE 4-H GROUNDS.
- 14) IF LIVESTOCK PULLS OUT BEFORE THE FAIR WEEK IS OVER, THE 4-H'ER WILL RECEIVE AN INCOMPLETE AND ARE NOT ELIGIBLE TO SELL ANY ANIMAL IN THE 4-H AUCTION. THE 4-H'ER WILL ALSO NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW AT THE STATE FAIR, AND WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW IN CASS COUNTY THE FOLLOWING YEAR.
- 15) <u>Livestock General</u>

*Animal Entry – This is declared on Monday on what sibling is showing what animal. After that, dual enrollment is no longer valid. Each member must show their own animal in class and in showmanship unless there is two in a class or extending circumstances such as illness, etc. approved by the 4-H Directors.

16) 4-H LIVESTOCK AND PROJECT COMMITTEES

A. <u>Membership</u> - Committee may consist of parents of 4-H members, 4-H leaders or friends of 4-H. Committees should name their own members and chairmen; however, each member should have the opportunity to rotate through committee leadership.

- B. <u>Function</u> Committees should function on a year-round basis to promote interest and enthusiasm in their area of responsibility. Committeemen should be willing to assist in educational endeavors such as field days, tours, and/or demonstrations. During the time of exhibit, members should communicate and cooperate to provide for an efficient, impartial judging. All effort should be made to cooperate with and assist the judge in the performance of his duties, with all due respect and consideration being shown to the 4-H Member. All committees must work in cooperation with the 4-H Extension Educator, the Extension Office and follow Purdue Extension guidelines.
- C. <u>Policy</u> Committees should meet in regular session at least biannually, before and after the 4-H Fair to determine responsibilities and duties of committeemen. Any changes in committee membership or the regulations pertaining to the area of interest of a committee may be suggested by the committee with a simple majority (one more than half) of the committee members listed in the present 4-H Fair Handbook. In the event a majority is not present, absent committeemen may be polled in writing (mail, email or text. If by email or text all committee members must be copied) concerning any proposed revision deemed necessary by those members present. A majority decision is necessary before proposed changes may be presented to the 4-H Board of Directors of the 4-H Association. Proposed changes would be presented at the regular 4-H Board meeting and the 4-H Board would take action in order to meet with January 1 ruling.

17) RULE REVISION

Procedure - After JANUARY 1, no rule revision for that particular 4-H Fair year can be made. Project committees will make recommendations for revisions. 4-H Leaders will vote to accept or reject the recommendations. Rules can be revised in the Fall for the coming year. Final decisions rest with the 4-H Directors. State Fair Rules are utilized as guidelines.

- 18) Special Requests shall be brought to the 4-H Director's attention no later than the last 4-H Directors meeting before the fair. The local leader and the 4-H Club Member (with or without his parents) will appear separately. REQUESTS FOR EXCEPTIONS MUST BE MADE BY THE 4-H MEMBER IN WRITING AND RECEIVED NO LATER THAN MAY 1.
- 19) Livestock record sheets are to be turned in during weigh-in or check-in of animals at the fair (Sunday or Monday) to be eligible to show an animal. They must be reviewed and signed by your 4-H leader before the county fair and initialed by a project committee chair.
- 20) **Fitting Rule –** At the Cass County Fair, the 4-H animal exhibitor may receive clipping and grooming assistance from their immediate family which is defined as a father, mother, stepfather, stepmother,

legal guardian, brother, sister, stepbrother, stepsister, grandfather, grandmother, step-grandfather, step-grandmother, aunt or uncle. In addition, grooming assistance can come from any past/present Cass County 4-H'er, and/or 4-H Director, 4-H Council member, 4-H Leader, any Cass County Committee member or from another current Indiana 4-H exhibitor.

- 21) DRESS CODE FOR EXHIBITING AND SELLING 4-H LIVESTOCK
 - 4-H'ers should dress appropriately for the 4-H livestock shows and 4-H livestock auction. Appropriate dress includes being neat and clean, no midriff showing, no shoulders showing, no shorts or pants with holes above the knees and no open toed shoes. Commercial advertisement of names or insignia, farm names and family names on 4-H exhibitors or exhibits while showing, is prohibited. No low cut shirts or short shorts, no tank tops, no cleavage showing and no cracks showing. Violations could be subject to animal/4-H'er dismissal from class.
- 22) If any animal medical concerns arise during the Fair, please see barn chairman before proceeding with any preventatives.
 - Any contagious medical condition should be brought to the species committee before unloading or as soon as it is noted. If the committee feels it is a contagious condition, the 4-H'er will be given 2 choices. They can take the animal home or have a Veterinarian come and diagnose the condition at the cost of the 4-H'er.
- 4-H members must accompany their animal into the auction ring. If the 4-H member is not at their pen at time of line up in the 4-H auction, then the 4-H auction animal will be scratched from the auction and will not have another chance to sell. The animal will be the responsibility of the family to remove from the fairgrounds by 6:00 p.m., Saturday of the fair.
- 24) (Auction Rule) For each 4-H item or animal that is sold in the auction, 10% of the premium will be assessed for the auction fee with a maximum of \$300.
- 25) No bales of shavings for bedding will be offered for sale at the fairgrounds.
- 26) 4-H Animal Ownership
 - 4-H breeding beef, Boer goats, dairy goats, sheep and swine <u>must be registered</u> in one of the following ownership methods: (1) in the 4-H members' name, (2) John Smith & Sons, (3) John Smith, Sons & Daughters, (4) John Smith & Family (family includes sons, daughters, and legal guardian youth only), (5) Mark Smith (brother) & Mary Smith (sister), (6) Family Corporations, where the 4-H members' name appears as a holder of stock in the corporation, and proof of same must be supplied on or before the enrollment date, (7) Family partnership where the 4-H member's father, mother, brother, sister, aunt, uncle, grandparent, and/or legal guardian is also in the family partnership and the 4-H member's name appears on the legal, notarized partnership. A copy of the written document must be on file with the Extension Office before the enrollment deadline. A single animal can only be included in one 4-H online family profile. 4-H breeding beef, Boer goats, dairy goats, sheep and swine will NOT be accepted in the State Fair 4-H show if they are registered in a father's name only, farm name only, or partnerships with unrelated persons (such as "Smith View", "Smith Oak", "John Doe & William Smith (4-H member)", "Long Oak & William Smith (4-H member)", etc.)
 - For 4-H dairy cattle, partnerships of the 4-H member with unrelated persons or dairy operations are acceptable (i.e. John Doe and William Smith (4-H member) or Long Oak and William Smith). Dairy cows and heifers, owned in a partnership, may not be exhibited by more than one person from May 15th until the conclusion of the State Fair Dairy Show. This person must be the exhibitor of the animal in the current State Fair 4-H Dairy Show or the animal will be ineligible for this show. 4-H dairy cattle will not be accepted in 4-H classes at the State Fair if they are registered in the father's name only or in a farm name, such as "Smith View", "Smith Oak", etc., unless the 4-H member has a lease agreement for this animal.
- 27) If a breed champion does not return to the Grand Champion Drive, the Reserve Champion of that breed/category has the opportunity to represent that breed/category in the Grand Champion Drive.
- Any medication given to an animal on the Fairgrounds must be administered by a veterinarian professional with a 4-H Director present.
- When rule infractions occur, the following protocol will be followed.

 First Offense Two committee members will speak with the 4-H'er with a parent present to determine what happened and determine if a rule was broken. A warning will be given at this time.

Second Offense – Two committee members and fair board member will speak with the 4-H'er and parent to determine again if rules were broke. If a rule is broken for the second time, the animal will be disqualified from the show.

ANIMAL SHOWMANSHIP

The purpose of showmanship is to present an animal in the show ring in a manner that will develop the most favorable impression possible on the judge. Showing animals properly in the show ring is a very important, challenging and interesting part of a 4-H animal project and is an extremely rewarding experience for the 4-H'er.

The primary reason for showing an animal in a show ring is to present that animal at all times to the judge in the best possible manner. This is not necessarily difficult, but it does require of a 4-H'er a certain degree of interest, concentration, effort, patience, experience, talent, knowledge, physical skill, practice, equipment and preparation, plus the proper mental attitude and desire to be the best at what they do. Top showmen take enough pride in their animals to want them to always look their very best in the show ring.

Animal showmanship not only helps generate enthusiasm and competition within the show ring, but it also teaches other valuable lessons that can be applied to everyday life. These essential lessons include accepting responsibilities, winning graciously, losing with dignity, and learning the great amount of work and determination it takes to become a winner and to be successful.

Success in showmanship begins at home for 4-H'ers and involves fitting, training, preparing, and presenting themselves and their animals in the best and most appropriate manner in the show ring. To be a winner at showmanship requires that the 4-H'er know and be skilled at using a halter and other show ring equipment, at entering and setting up the animal in the show ring, at proper show ring procedures, at presenting the animal during the class to the judge, at moving the animal in the show ring during class, at properly presenting the animal to the judge during close inspection, at properly positioning oneself and one's animal at all times in the show ring in relation to where the judge is, at answering all question that the judge might ask of the showman, at accepted and proper show ring courtesy, at leaving the show ring, and at good sportsmanship.

Being a top animal showman is not easy, and it requires considerable work and dedication. But, it can be learned, and 4-H'ers learn by doing.

SHOWMANSHIP (ALL SPECIES)

- 1. Previous winners in a particular division are not eligible to participate in that division again.
- 2. Showmanship When the 4-H showman has won a showmanship class they MUST move to the next showmanship class the next year (not in the same year) Exception if the member wins Senior Showmanship, he/she will automatically move up into the Master Showmanship division for Master Competition, in the current year.
- 3. Contestants must show one of their own animals in a showmanship class. Sibling's animals enrolled and exhibited are not eligible.
- 4. Each Showmanship class will have a winner, plus up to 5 honor group selections.

PREMIER LIVESTOCK SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST AND ROYAL SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST

Premier Livestock Showmanship Contest - Friday Evening of the Fair


- 1. A showmanship winner from Beef, Sheep, Swine, Horses, Dairy Goats, Dairy Steer/Feeder and Meat Goats will participate in this contest. (7 contestants)
- 2. If a member wins more than one specie, the member will choose which specie to represent in the premier showman contest.
- 3. Each member will show one animal in each of the six (6) species. (Beef and Dairy Steer/Feeder are considered the same specie for showmanship.)
- 4. The Premier Showmanship Committee will select seven (7) animals of nearly equal size and disposition. The animals will not belong to any of the seven (7) showmen, or their immediate family member.
- 5. There will be one (1) judge per specie to evaluate the showmen. The committee members will select Judges.
- 6. Specie must have ten (10) members in the project to have a representative in the Premier Showman Contest
- 7. Premier Committee members will not have any family members showing 4-H livestock at the Cass County Fair.

- 8. Animals will be numbered and the contestants will draw a number in the show ring for the animal they will be showing.
- 9. Order of Show: Horses, Swine, Beef, Dairy Goat, Meat Goat and Sheep.
- 10. It is the responsibility of each showman to obtain their own equipment.
- 11. 4-H member may win this contest only once.
- 12. Judge will evaluate and rank each contestant from 1-7.

Royal Showmanship Contest – Thursday Evening of the Fair.

Coordinators: Specie Chairman

- 1. Species Include: Rabbits, Poultry, Llama, Pygmy Goat, and Myotonic Goat (1 representative per specie for a total of 5 contestants.)
- 2. If a member wins more than one specie, the member will choose which specie to represent in the Royal Showman contest.
- 3. Each member will show one animal in each of the five (5) species.
- 4. Two (2) will work together to judge this contest.
- 5. 4-H member may win this contest only once.
- 6. Judges will evaluate and rank each contestant 1-5. Tie breaker the most number of 1st places, then 2nd places.
- 7. Order of Show: Rabbits and Poultry will start the contest and go simultaneously. Specie chairman can determine the rest of the order.



YQCA

•To exhibit beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, meat goats, dairy goats, poultry and rabbits, 4-H members must be certified through the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals. This is an annual program that can be completed via online modules or in-person trainings. For more information about in-person trainings, please contact your County Extension Office. More information about YQCA is available at http://yqca.org. While this is a requirement, it should not be viewed as just another rule but rather as an important educational opportunity for 4-H livestock members. Making this an exhibition rule is how we are ensuring that 4-H members learn about quality assurance, but it really has nothing to do with animal exhibition. The real reason we are requiring this is so youth learn best management practices with their animals. The goals of having 4-H members complete the YQCA program include ensuring that

- Youth will be more prepared to be ambassadors for animal agriculture in their role as youth livestock exhibitors.
- Animals from youth livestock programs are treated with the utmost care.
- 4-H members are contributing to a safe, wholesome food supply.

More information will be given to livestock members. If members are PQA certified and expiration is not before the county fair, then they are exempt from YQCA for this year for all specie.

2021 4-H AUCTION

"AUCTION COMMITTEE"

MEMBERS: Co-Chairs: Mark Mettler and Mark Musall. Also, Mark Guckien, Sheila Knight, Erica Heater plus 2 representatives per species

THE 4-H AUCTION COMMITTEE WILL PREPARE SALE RING, SET UP TABLES FOR CLERKS, AUCTIONEER STAND, AND ARRANGE GATES AS NEEDED. "Spotters" and "Runners" are needed during the auction.

<u>Participating in the 4-H Livestock Auction is an optional part of the 4-H Livestock projects with market classes.</u>
<u>If a 4-H member decides to make an entry in the 4-H Livestock Auction these are the requirements:</u>

- 1. Exhibit a 4-H animal that qualifies by 4-H Auction guidelines for that species, i.e. gender, weight, etc.
- 2. Sign up for your auction entry from 11 a.m. 4 p.m., in the Exhibition Building on Monday of the fair. ONLY SIGN UP FOR ONE SPECIE.
- 3. Be present to exhibit your 4-H animal entry during judging of the show.
- 4. Be present to offer your animal to prospective buyers during the 4-H Auction at your assigned time.
- ❖ Each Specie Committee involved with the sale is responsible for supplying "runners" during the sale of their specie during the auction.
- Swine committee to put hog in pens after auction.
- ❖ Each Specie Committee is responsible for the delivery of their sale animals, etc., to the satisfaction of the buyer. Committees should stay with their livestock until loaded out.



ATTENTION 4-H MEMBERS

- 1) Each 4-H Exhibitor will be limited to one consignment in the 4-H Auction.
- 2) Drawing for Sale Order in 4-H Livestock Auction Each exhibitor must draw for number in order to sell in the 4-H Auction. Eligible animals must sell as no substitution for eligible animals are allowed. See "Special 4-H Livestock Auction Rules" for details concerning eligible animals.

When 4-H animals are checked in on Monday of the 4-H Fair, 4-H members must decide which species of livestock they intend to sell and designate the animal (ear tag, tattoo, ear notch, etc.) as they draw their sale order number during specie check-in. Only those 4-Her's receiving a Grand Champion or Reserve Grand Champion or top 5 overall that would sell are eligible to change. Sale order numbers will be drawn during the respective specie's "check-in" process on Monday. Auction numbers cannot be drawn after livestock check-in's have concluded.

- 3) During the auction absolutely **NO hats, glitter, signs, ribbons, or any form of advertising on animals** or 4-H'ers will be allowed.
- 4) The 4-H Auction Sale will be held in the Exhibition Building on Saturday, of the fair, starting at 1:00 p.m.
- 5) The 4-H auction sale order will be Swine, Rabbits, Poultry, Goats, Sheep, Milk, Market Beef, Dairy Steers and Dairy Feeder Steers.
- 6) 4-Her's must accompany their animal into the auction ring. If the 4-H member is not with their animal at the time their animal is scheduled to sell in the 4-H auction, then the 4-H auction animal will be scratched from the auction and will not have another chance to sell. The animal will be the responsibility of the family to remove from the fairgrounds by 6:00 p.m. Saturday of the fair.
- 7) 4-H animals purchased, sold or offered for sale after the enrollment deadline and prior to the Indiana State Fair (including those animals that have gone through a "Premium Only Auction") shall not be eligible to show in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. Sale of products of animals (milk, cheese, wool, etc.) in lieu of the animal, are considered equivalent to a "Premium Only Auction".



SPECIAL 4-H LIVESTOCK AUCTION RULES

ALL livestock in the 4-H Auction will have an "Appraised" value.

10% of the premium will be assessed for the auction fee with a maximum of \$300 (auction fee) and will be deducted from the 4-Her's check, along with check-off fees for those selling beef, sheep and swine. Cass County producers groups may elect to pay check-off fees for the 4-Her in certain species. **NOTE**: 5% of the total price will be the auction fee for non-appraised animals such as Rabbits, Poultry, Cheese and Milk.



BEEF and DAIRY STEERS/DAIRY FEEDER STEERS

Market beef cattle will be sold on Monday's weight. No re-weighs before the auction. Market Steers, Market Heifers, and Dairy Beef Steers must weigh 850 lbs. at the Monday weigh-in to be eligible to sell in the auction. Dairy Feeder Steer Calves have an upper weight limit of 650 lbs and Male Beef Feeder Calves have an upper weight limit of 600 lbs. An overage Market Beef is not eligible to sell unless the exhibitor has no other eligible animal.

DAIRY

The exhibitor of the Grand Champion Dairy Cow may sell one gallon of milk.

RABBITS

Only meat pens of three rabbits are eligible to sell, minimum weight, 3 pounds each and a maximum weight of 5 pounds each.

POULTRY

The Grand Champion *Commercial* Poultry Exhibit and the Grand Champion *Exhibition* Poultry Exhibit may sell in the 4-H Auction. If the Grand exhibit does not sell, the Reserve Grand has an option to sell. In the event that a Grand Champion Commercial and Grand Champion Exhibition are shown by the same person, the 4-H'er will have to choose one to sell. The Reserve Grand Champion then has the option to sell but as a Reserve Grand Champion. All other poultry exhibits (commercial or exhibition) are eligible to sell as a poultry entry in the auction.

GOAT

Goat Wethers and Market Does are eligible to sell, with no weight restrictions. Goat wethers will be sold by the pound. Best Senior Doe exhibitor is eligible to sell a collection of goat products. If the Best Senior Doe exhibitor does not want to sell the goat items the reserve exhibitor is eligible. If neither can nor wishes to sell the goat items, goat items will sell and the money donated to the fair for improvement of goat facilities. Goat milk will not sell in the 4-H Auction. Market Does will not receive special recognition in the auction listing.

SHEEP

Market Lambs exhibited in regular 4-H classes may sell through the 4-H Auction if they weigh 80 pounds or more on the weigh-in date for show classifications.

SWINE

Any Barrow or Gilt weighing 220-280 lbs. will be eligible to sell in the 4-H Livestock Auction. There will be <u>no</u> changes once the choice is made. Swine weighing under 220 lbs. are **ineligible** to sell in the 4-H Auction.

Top swine sale weight without penalty will be determined by the processor's top weight that week.

Swine auction animals need to be declared with tag number, sex, and ear notch.

A minimum of ½ inch hair in length on the body is preferred by packers that purchase and process the animals. Animals having less that ½ inch body hair length may be condemned by the processor. 4-H'ers will not receive carcass value for auction animals that are condemned by the processor.

Grand, Reserve or top 5 gilts will not receive special recognition in the auction.

In addition to its regular duties, this committee should get the cattle to the auction ring, back to the stall, & stay with the cattle until they are loaded!!

IF LIVESTOCK PULLS OUT BEFORE THE FAIR WEEK IS OVER, THE 4-H'ER WILL RECEIVE AN INCOMPLETE, AND ARE INELIGIBLE TO SELL AN ANIMAL AT THE 4-H AUCTION. THE 4-H'ER WILL ALSO NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW AT THE STATE FAIR, AND NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW IN CASS COUNTY THE FOLLOWING YEAR.

NOTE: DUPLICATION OF RULES HAVE BEEN ELIMINATED IN THE ANIMAL SECTIONS SO <u>PLEASE</u> READ THE GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES SECTION, AND THE 4-H LIVESTOCK AUCTION RULES. MINI 4-H BEEF MEMBERS SHOULD READ THE MINI 4-H RULES SECTION.

- 1) When stall request forms are filled out and the number of stalls asked for does not correspond with the exact number of calves exhibited, a \$25.00 fee per empty stall will be charged and the exhibitor will lose the stall. If not paid, the exhibitor will not be able to show. The only exceptions will be death, injury or very special cases. The Beef Chairman must be notified of exceptions before the Monday prior to the fair. There will be a stall/bark fee per head exhibited at the fair (amount TBA).
- 2) BEEF CATTLE MUST ARRIVE AFTER 5:00 A.M. AND BEFORE 10 A.M., ON MONDAY, of the fair. NO LIVESTOCK IS TO BE BROUGHT BEFORE 5:00 A.M. A COMMITTEE MEMBER MUST BE PRESENT TO UNLOAD. BEEF JUDGING: WEDNESDAY, of the fair, FOLLOWING DAIRY BEEF JUDGING. RELEASE TIME: All animals not to be sold in the 4-H Auction will be released from 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. or after 10:00 p.m. on Friday to 8:00 a.m., Saturday of the fair.
- 3) Monday at 4:00 p.m. there will be a meeting to go over the rules and expectations of the cattle barn and show day. All beef exhibitors and parents are highly recommended to attend. Meeting will take place at the weigh-in scales.
- 4) (Steer Breed Classes) Steer breeds will be the same as State Fair steer breeds. All 4-H Beef steer breeds need to be Registered with papers, and tattoos except crossbred steers. All breeds must follow breed characteristics as determined by the State Fair Breed Guidelines and/or the Cass County Beef Committee. Any Angus steer with horns or surgical lines will not be allowed to show as an Angus. If for any reason an Angus, Hereford, or Shorthorn steer has been declared ineligible by a state or national association, the beef committee reserves the right to disqualify the steer in question from competition in the breed class, but would be allowed to show as crossbred. There will be NO black shorthorns.
- 5) A 4-H member may enroll no more than six 4-H beef steers and two market heifers. Each member may show not more than two calves in any steer class.

- 6) All market beef entered at the Cass County 4-H Fair must be owned, at the home farm and under the care of the 4-H Exhibitor, no later than *March 6th*. Steers not officially enrolled by *March 6th* are not eligible to show or sell. Families have until May 15th to officially enroll animals on-line to be eligible for County and State Fair. Two Beef Committee members and/or Extension Educator can inspect all beef animals at any time.
- 7) All animals must have RFID and county tags to show. Cass County will still use the electronic ear tags, and 5 digit county tags. If these are not present then the animal is disqualified, no exceptions.
- 8) For State Fair, all Beef animals must have DNA collected (hair samples) to Extension Office by May 15th.
- 9) All market beef are to be dehorned. Dehorning of 4-H breeding beef heifers of horned breeds is recommended for safety.
- 10) All market steers must be castrated. No visible signs of being a bull, decided by beef committee. No stags. The animal will be checked at February weigh-in and the final decision will be made at fair weigh-in. If there are any visible signs the animal will be asked not to show.
- 11) There is NO fitting or chutes allowed in the Sheep/Goat/Lama barn.
- 12) Champion and reserve champion rate of gain winners will be selected from the 4-H market beef exhibited at the County 4-H Fair.
- 13) Violation of the following rules will cause exhibitors to be disqualified from the beef show!!!
 - ▶ No grooming chutes in cattle barn aisle way any time!
 - ▶ No grooming chutes set up in driveway between barns except on Wednesday.
 - ► Fans are limited to 1 per 2 head of cattle <u>per family</u> (but no more than 3 fans per family) and must have fans facing the same direction except on show day.
 - ► All fans will be placed on tie side of cattle.
 - ▶ No fans in cattle barn aisle way at anytime!
 - ▶ No cooling systems other than fans allowed in barn.
 - ▶ The cattle tie-out area will be near the barn for Fair Week. Cattle will not be tied to trailers. There will be a roped off area designated for livestock trailers to park during the week of the Fair.
 - ▶ No radios playing in cattle barn during beef show!
 - ▶ Portable generators can be used for show preparations, <u>but must be kept west or north of beef barn and at least 50 feet from perimeter of been barn!</u>
 - ▶ All grooming is to be done within 100' of barns or in designated area.
 - ▶ no artificial fill or stomach pumps3.
 - ► Tie out after 9:00 p.m., tie in by 8:00 a.m.
 - ▶ Fitting rule At the Cass County Fair, the 4-H animal exhibitor may receive clipping and grooming assistance from their immediate family which is defined as a father, mother, stepfather, stepmother, legal guardian, brother, sister, stepbrother, stepsister, grandfather, grandmother, stepgrandfather, stepgrandmother, aunt or uncle. in addition grooming assistance can come from any past/present Cass County 4-H'er, and/or 4-H Director, 4-H Council Member, 4-H Leader, any Cass County Beef Committee Member or from another current Indiana 4-H Exhibitor.
- 14) ALL 4-H market beef MUST BE ear tagged and weighed at the 4-H Exhibition Bldg. on March 6th. Any 4-H market beef not ear tagged by the 4-H Beef Committee will not be eligible to show at the 2021 Cass County 4-H Fair or the 2021 Indiana State Fair. If an animal loses either the county tag or RFID tag, the exhibitor must contact the Extension Office or the Beef Committee chairman to get a replacement tag. Not doing so will result in the calf being deemed ineligible to show. This must be done before Monday of the fair.
- 15) No artificial hair is permitted in grooming any beef animal. <u>False switches will not be permitted on animals</u>. Exhibitors using powder dyes or hair coloring agents will be disqualified from showing or selling in the 4-H Auction if determined after exhibition.



- 16) BREEDING BEEF HEIFER CLASS An exhibitor may enroll and show more than one breed, with a maximum combined total of 6 breeding beef heifers. All commercial breeding heifers must be owned, and tagged on <u>March 6th</u>, and under the care of the 4-H exhibitor no later than <u>March 6, 2021</u>. Registered heifers that do not meet their breeds' purity requirements and have a valid registration paper, CAN ONLY show as a commercial heifer if they have an RFID tag that is recorded on-line by May 15th. Jr. Commercial heifers' calves must be owned, tagged, enrolled, and under the care of 4-H exhibitor by May 15.
- 17) JR. COMMERCIAL HEIFER CALF: A calf born before April 30th, of current year and weigh at least 250 pounds. Jr. Commercial heifer calves <u>must be enrolled by a county tag and an RFID tag that is recorded on-line by May 15th. The Jr. Commercial Heifer Calf can be from the Cow-Calf pair if proper entry is made. Nurse cows will not be allowed unless they are part of the cow/calf class entry at the fair.</u>
- 18) **All registered breeding beef heifers** entered in Cass County 4-H classes must have been enrolled on-line and be owned, and at the home farm, under the care of the 4-H Exhibitor no later than May 15th. Animals not officially enrolled on May 15th are not eligible to show. A 4-H Member may not enroll more than a total of six heifers. Registered heifers that do not meet their breeds' purity requirements and have a valid registration paper, CAN show as a commercial heifer. ALL cattle must have an RFID tag that is recorded online by May 15th.
- 19) All registered breeding heifers will be exhibited in the following age groups



- 20) <u>ALL</u> beef breeding heifers must have an RFID tag to exhibit including purebred heifers and recorded online by May 15th.
- 21) For breeding heifers, a club member may show only two animals per class. All purebred heifer breeds will be the same as State Fair heifer breeds. All registered heifers must have registration papers. Percentage heifers may be shown in breed classes if they are recorded in their breed registry. All others will show as commercial heifers.
- 22) **All breeding heifers** must have a readable ear tattoo identical to the one recorded on their registration. Only one (1) number sequence per ear will be permitted. At check-in, any animal which does not have a legible tattoo corresponding to its registration certificate is ineligible to show in breed classes. Once disqualified from breed classes due to an incorrect or illegible tattoo, animals cannot be re-tattooed and rechecked at the show. Likewise, new registration papers being sent by a breed association will not change the status of the disqualified animal.
- 23) Registered heifers must be in the exhibitor's name, in family partnership or in family name. Example: John Jones or John Jones and Family. See ownership rules on page 40.
- 24) COW-CALF CLASS: Each 4-H Member may exhibit one cow and calf. The cow must be owned by January 1st and have permanent ID. Calves have to be born from January 1 to May 15. In Cow-Calf pairs, the calf must be nursing the wet cow as its mother. Cow-Calf entry must be enrolled by a tag or tattoo and a RFID tag that is recorded on-line by May 15th. The Cow-Calf will be shown as one class with a Grand Champion being chosen. The Grand Champion Cow-Calf will not be exhibited for grand Champion female. Calves will need to be identified (tagged and/or tattooed).

<u>NOTE:</u> A Calf from a Cow/Calf pair can be shown as a Jr. Heifer Calf or Beef Feeder Steer if proper entry is made in those divisions.

25) No nurse cows, other than cow/calf pairs meant for exhibition will be allowed.

 - 26) BEEF MALE FEEDER CALVES Born between Jan 1 May 15, of the current year. A 250-650 pound weight limit will be shown. Calves will be shown by weight. Beef Feeder calves will not be brought to the 4-H fairgrounds to be tagged. Male Feeder calves <u>must be enrolled by a county tag and a RFID tag that is recorded on-line by May 15th.</u> The feeder male calf can be from the Cow-Calf Pair if proper entry is made.
 - 27) Showmanship: (The first 5 places in each class to receive blue ribbons. Champion ribbon will be awarded in each class.)

BEGINNER: 3rd grade only JUNIOR: 4th and 5th grades

INTERMEDIATE: 6th, 7th and 8th grades

SENIOR: Freshmen and older

MASTER: Any previous senior showmanship winner is eligible.


EACH 4-H MEMBER MUST SHOW HIS/HER OWN ANIMAL. Winners will move up to the next division the following year. Exception – Senior winner will move into Master Showmanship.

- 28) If a breed champion does not return to the Grand Champion Drive, the Reserve Champion of that breed/category has the opportunity to represent that breed/category in the Grand Champion Drive.
- 29) Herdsman Award: A champion and reserve champion award will be made for the most well-kept stall by family and overall participation in the beef project. There will be no age separation or limiting of one year winning.
- 30) **To be able to exhibit and complete beef** the 4-H member must: enroll in Cass County 4-H; enroll animals by animal enrollment deadline; be caring for your own animals on a regular basis; and turn in a completed record sheet. ** All completed record books be brought when animals are being weighed on Monday morning to be checked by Beef Committee.
- 31) All Substitute Showmen must be approved by Beef Chairman or their delegate at announcers stand before the beef show begins.
- 32) NOTICE TO STATE FAIR EXHIBITORS On each livestock enrollment information there will be a warning statement "If all necessary information is not entered on-line by the enrollment date and the animal has not been tagged with a 5 digit county tag and RFID tag (on tagging day) the 4-H'er has made himself/herself ineligible for State Fair."
- 33) Unruly beef animals can be disqualified and sent home at any time during the county fair including from the show and sale by a majority consensus of the beef committee members present.
- 34) The Top 5 market animals and Top 5 heifers overall will be recognized. All reserves as needed will be eligible for Top 5 recognition
- 35) YQCA Youth for the Quality Care of Animals This is required for county and state fair.
 - ◆ To exhibit beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, meat goats, dairy goats, poultry and rabbits, 4-H members must be certified through the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals. This is an annual program that can be completed via online modules or in-person trainings. For more information about in-person trainings, please contact your County Extension Office. More information about YQCA is available at http://yqca.org. While this is a requirement, it should not be viewed as just another rule but rather as an important educational opportunity for 4-H livestock members. MARKET BEEF HEIFER

 Market Heifers at the Cass County 4-H Fair must have been enrolled on-line and be owned, at the home farm and under care of the 4-H Exhibitor, no later than <u>March 6th</u>. Market Heifers not officially enrolled by <u>March 6th</u> are not eligible to show.

- 2. Market Heifers must be ear tagged, and weighed at the 4-H Exhibition Building on <u>March 6th</u> to be eligible to show. A 4-H member may enroll and show no more than two market heifers. ALL 4-H Market Heifers must have a RFID tag and a county tag to show at the county fair and be entered in 4-H online by May 15th.
- 3. Market Heifers will be weighed at the county fair and will be shown by weight regardless of breed. The beef committee will determine class or classes after weigh in at the fair.
- 4. Market Heifers are eligible for the livestock auction. If you elect to sell your Market Heifer in the livestock auction, this will be your one animal to sell.
- 5. Market Heifers are eligible to compete for Grand Champion Market Beef. A trophy will be awarded for the Champion Market Heifer.
- 6. Market Heifers are eligible for the Rate-of-Gain contest.
- An individual heifer cannot be shown in both market and breeding heifer classes. Heifers must be
 designated as a market or breeding heifer at the time of enrollment, as they cannot be changed or
 switched after enrollment.



"MINI 4-H BEEF"

Welcome to the Mini 4-H Beef Project. This project is designed to introduce you to the 4-H Beef project. You

do not need to own beef or even live on a farm to take this project.

CURRICULUM - Mini 4-H Beef Manual/Record Sheet.

GENERAL MINI 4-H RULES:

- 1. You must be in the 1st or 2nd grade at the time you sign up for this project.
- 2. You must enroll in the Mini 4-H Beef project.
- 3. Complete the mini 4-H Beef enrollment form by May 15th. (This will be sent to each member who enrolls in Mini 4-H Beef in April.)
- 4. As you exhibit your mini 4-H Beef animal (that belongs to a regular 4-H member), you will receive a mini 4-H ribbon.
- 5. Be sure to check out the Indiana State Fair 4-H Beef Show. When in the 3rd grade as a 4-H Beef member, you will be eligible to exhibit in the 4-H Beef classes at the State Fair.
- 6. You are encouraged to attend 4-H club meetings and/or project workshops.

ACTIVITIES TO COMPLETE:



DAIRY STEERS WILL BE JUDGED WEDNESDAY, OF THE FAIR, FOLLOWING THE DAIRY FEEDER CALVES. (Beef judging will follow Dairy Steer judging.)

RELEASE TIME: All animals not to be sold in the 4-H Auction will be released from 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. and after 10:00 p.m. on Friday, to 8:00 a.m., Saturday of the fair.

 All Dairy Steers must be from grade or purebred dairy cows and sired by dairy bulls of the same breed, showing that breed's characteristics and markings. No Dairy Breed crossing or Dairy/Beef breed crosses allowed. A sifting committee will be used to determine individual animal eligibility for the dairy steer division. Committee members will do sifting up to weigh-in time of the fair. All dairy steers will be entered as determined by the sifting Committee and exhibited as entered at enrollment.

Dairy Steer Sifting Committee: Bob or Ed McKaig, Terry Snyder, Mark Mettler, Elizabeth Hotsinpiller and Scott or Darla Foerg

- 2. All Dairy Steers must be ear tagged, and weighed at the 4-H Exhibition Building on *March 6th*. Any 4-H Dairy Steer not tagged by *March 6, 2021* and enrolled on-line by May 15th will not be eligible to show at the 2021 Cass County 4-H Fair.
- 3. Each 4-H Member may enroll and show up to 3 steers.
- 4. All DAIRY STEER animals MUST be brought to tagging day, *March 6th and* enrolled on-line by May 15th. LATE ENROLLMENTS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED!
- 5. All breeds will show in same class. Steers must weigh more than 830 pounds to be eligible for the 4-H Auction. The dairy committee will determine the classes by weight.
- 6. All steers must be castrated and have no horns by tag and weigh-in day on *March 6th*. Steers not meeting these requirements may be shown at the fair if they are castrated and/or have no horns within 30 days after the tag and weigh-in day and the Extension Office receives a letter from their licensed veterinarian that states they now meet the requirements.
- 7. After the Grand Champion Steer has been selected, the second place steer from the Grand Champion's class will advance to show for Reserve Grand Champion.

"DAIRY STEER" - continued

- 8. There will be 4 showmanship divisions for the Dairy Steer/Dairy Feeder Steer Calf members.
 - a) Beginner Showmanship grade 3
 - b) Junior Showmanship grades 4th and 5th
 - c) Intermediate Showmanship grades 6th thru 8th
 - d) Senior Showmanship grades 9th and older
 - e) Master Showmanship any previous Senior Showmanship winner is eligible
 - **Note** No previous champions are eligible in the same division

Showmanship – When the 4-H Showman has won a showmanship class they MUST move to the next showmanship class he next year (not in the same year) – EXCEPTION – if the member wins Senior Showmanship, he/she will automatically move up into Master Showmanship division for the Master Competition, in the current year.

- 9. County Project CO-CHAIRMEN AND COMMITTEE MEMBERS: SAME AS "DAIRY"

Dairy Feeder Steer Calves must arrive after 5:00 a.m. and before 10 a.m. on Monday of the fair. A committee member must be present to unload animals.

Dairy Feeder Steer Calves WILL BE JUDGED WEDNESDAY, of the fair, prior to the Dairy Steer Show. (Beef judging will follow Dairy Steer Calves judging.)

RELEASE TIME: All animals not to be sold in the 4-H Auction will be released from 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. and after 10:00 p.m. on Friday to 8:00 a.m., Saturday, of the fair.

All Dairy Feeder Steer Calf entries must be from grade or purebred dairy cows and sired by dairy bulls of the same breed, showing that breed's characteristics and markings. NO Dairy Breed crossing or Dairy/Beef crosses allowed. A Dairy Feeder Steer Calf sifting committee (same as Dairy Steer) will be used to determine individual animal eligibility for the Dairy Feeder Steer Calf Division.

Dairy Beef Sifting Committee: Chairman - Bob McKaig, Mark Musall, Terry Snyder, Elizabeth Hotsinpiller and Mark Mettler

- 1. All sifting committee decisions are final. A 4-H'er may obtain a blood test on sifted animals. The 4-H'er will be responsible for the blood test expenses. However, if the test results show that the animal in question is confirmed to be a full-blooded dairy breed, the committee will reimburse the 4-H'er.
- 2. Classes will be made up by weight, with an upper weight limit being 600 lbs. and a minimum weight of 220 lbs. Animals over 600 lbs. will be shown in an overweight class but not eligible for Grand Champion or to sell in the 4-H Auction unless exhibitor has no other eligible animal. However overweight animals can be used in showmanship classes.
- 3. Each exhibitor may enroll and show up to 3 steers.
- 4. All dairy feeders must be castrated and have no horns and be healed by Monday, weigh-in day of the fair.

- 5. There will be 4 showmanship divisions for the Dairy Steer/Dairy Feeder Steer Calf members.
 - a) Beginner Showmanship grade 3
 - b) Junior Showmanship grades 4th and 5th

 - d) Senior Showmanship grades 9th and older
 - e) Master Showmanship any previous Senior Showmanship winner is eligible

1. MAY 8, 2021 – TAGGING, AND WEIGH-IN WILL BE DONE AT THE 4-H FAIRGROUNDS.

NOTICE TO STATE FAIR EXHIBITORS - On each livestock information page there will be a warning statement, "If all necessary information is not entered on-line by the enrollment date, you have made yourself ineligible for State Fair." ALL MARKET LAMBS AND COMMERCIAL EWES MUST BE EAR TAGGED WITH A COUNTY TAG BY MAY 8th TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR EXHIBITION AT THE COUNTY FAIR AND INDIANA STATE FAIR. ALL PUREBRED EWES MUST HAVE PERMANENT IDENTIFICATION TAGS THAT WILL MATCH THE REGISTRATION PAPERS. COUNTY TAGS ARE OPTIONAL FOR PUREBRED EWES. STATE FAIR BOUND ANIMALS WILL NEED DNA SUBMITTED. FAMILIES MUST THEN ENROLL THEIR ANIMAL ON-LINE BY MAY 15TH TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR COUNTY AND STATE FAIR.

- Farm visits may be conducted randomly by committee members during the time between May 15TH and fair week.
- 3. JUDGING WILL BEGIN AT APPROX. 3:30 P.M. OR 30 MINUTES AFTER THE CONCLUSION OF THE GOAT SHOW, TUESDAY, of the fair. Showmanship classes will be at the end of the show.
- 4. **RELEASE TIME**: All animals not to be sold in the 4-H Auction will be released from 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. and after 10:00 p.m. on Friday to 8:00 a.m., Saturday, of the fair.
- 5. All sheep must arrive after 5:00 a.m. and before 10:00 a.m. on Monday, of the fair. Weigh-in will be 9 11 a.m., Monday of the fair. NO unloading of sheep until they are health checked. Appeals may be made by a vet at the 4-H'ers expense.
- 6. At the time of animal check-in and weighing, all animals will be sifted/evaluated for breed classification, "using State Fair breed guidelines". This will be done by the 4-H Sheep Committee with at least 3 committee members in agreement with any decision.
- 7. Breeder identification on tags needs to be covered by Monday fair weigh-in. If ID is not covered, the sheep committee will cover the names at the scales. Black electrical tape is recommended and will be available..

- 8. Lambs must be born after September 1, 2020. Yearling ewes must be more than 1 year old, but less than 2 years old at the time of the show.
- 9. No animals will be permitted to be exhibited in more than one class.
- 10. All sheep must be shown by the 4-H'er. Helpers (current 4-H'er from Cass County) may be used with yearling ewes to set feet. The 4-H'er must be at the head of sheep.
- 11. Exhibitor is allowed to show in both commercial and purebred ewe classes. Commercial ewes (both lambs and yearlings) will be divided into white face and black face classes. YOU MAY ENROLL AND IDENTIFY A MAXIMUM OF 10 MARKET LAMBS, 10 EWE LAMBS, AND 10 YEARLING (COMMERCIAL AND/OR PUREBRED) EWES. At time of sheep ewe enrollment, breeder's tags or tattoos are required. Registration papers are required on Monday at weigh-in or ewes will show in commercial classes.
- 12. Each exhibitor is limited to two entries in each single class for breeding ewes. No limit of number of animals in a market lamb class.



CURRICULUM - Mini 4-H Sheep Manual/Record Sheet.

GENERAL MINI 4-H RULES:

- 1. You must be in the 1st or 2nd grade at the time you sign up for this project.

- 2. All 4-H swine must arrive after 5:00 a.m. and before 10:00 a.m. on Monday, of the fair. No animals are to be brought before 5:00 a.m.! A COMMITTEE MEMBER MUST BE PRESENT TO UNLOAD ANIMALS. All swine will be weighed for classes Monday of the Fair from 10:00 a.m. until finished. Exhibitors must be with swine at weigh-in. Animals must be able to walk to the scale under their own power. No washing pigs during weigh-in. Swine will be judged on Thursday of the Fair starting at 7:30 a.m. RELEASE TIME: All animals not to be sold in the 4-H Auction will be released from 10:00 p.m., Thursday to 8:00 a.m., Friday of the Fair and pens cleaned. If hogs are not removed by 8:30 a.m. on Friday, a pen clean up fee of \$25.00 will be charged. No transportation will be provided! DO NOT take home any hog with a "Sale Tag" in its ear.
- 3. Tack needs to be removed by 8 a.m. on Saturday. Any tack left after this time will be donated to the Swine Committee.
- 4. There will be a swine exhibitor's orientation meeting 15 minutes before weigh-in. Location to be announced.
- 5. Health papers are <u>not</u> required. Because of this change the Swine Committee wants to emphasize the importance of correct ear notch registration with 4-H'ers. Incorrectly notched pigs will not be allowed to unload. Decision of the committee at unloading will be final. Committee will also check for illness and parasites at unloading.

- 6. All medications, oral or injected, must be approved by the co-chairs prior to being given. Also, no injection unless witnessed by a co-chair or designated swine committee member. Any injectable drug must have a written approval with appropriate dosage from a vet. Withdrawals may make the animal ineligible for the 4-H auction. If found to be given without approval, it will result in immediate automatic dismissal from the show and auction.
- 7. Barrows and gilts MUST BE OWNED and in the 4-H member's possession by May 15. **ALL**BARROWS AND GILTS MUST BE EAR NOTCHED PRIOR TO ENROLLMENT. No two crossbred hogs of the same gender from the same 4-H family may have the same ear notches. Swine animal enrollment must be completed in the 4-H online by May 15th to be eligible for County and State fair. Enrollment must show breed and ear notches.
- 8. A 4-H member may enter a total of 15 barrows and 15 gilts on May 15, but may only bring a total of 4 head to the Fair. 4-H'er may bring no more than a total of 3 pigs of any sex. If any breed has more than 25 animals, then more than two weight classes will be established for that breed.
- 9. A given pig may not be enrolled by more than one 4-H member, except for brothers and sisters and must follow 4-H online rules. No co-enrolling of an animal by friends, cousins, etc.
- 10. Pens must be kept clean all week. The Swine Committee reserves the right to request that swine pens be cleaned, and failure to comply may result in disqualification from showing swine and selling an animal in the 4-H Auction. Clean pens are an important part of exhibiting swine and showmanship. Pens should be cleaned and clean shavings left in your pens so 4-H Auction pigs can be put in pens in sale order on Friday. If in doubt about your pens being clean enough, ask a Swine Committee member.

- 16. Ownership of pigs must be declared prior to weigh-in.
- 17. "House Type" fans ONLY! All fans must face North.
- 18. All 4-H Swine exhibitors MUST have an Indiana Board of Animal Health "Premise ID" number for the location of their 4-H swine. Contact the Extension Office for more information.

DRESS CODE FOR EXHIBITING AND SELLING 4-H LIVESTOCK

4-H'ers should dress appropriately for the 4-H livestock shows and 4-H livestock auction. Appropriate dress includes being neat and clean, no midriff showing, no shoulders showing, and no sandals. Commercial advertisement of names or insignia, farm names and family names on 4-H exhibitors or exhibits while showing, is prohibited. No low cut shirts or short shorts, no tank tops, no cleavage showing and no cracks showing. Violations could be subject to animal/4-H'er dismissal from class.

"MINI 4-H SWINE"

Welcome to the Mini 4-H Swine Project. This project is designed to introduce you to the 4-H Swine project. You do not need to own swine or even live on a farm to take this project.

CURRICULUM - Mini 4-H Swine Manual/Record Sheet.

GENERAL MINI 4-H RULES:

- 1. You must be in the 1st or 2nd grade at the time you sign up for this project.
- 2. You must enroll in the Mini 4-H Swine project.
- 3. <u>Complete the mini 4-H Swine enrollment form by May 15th.</u> (This will be sent to each member who enrolls in Mini 4-H Swine in April)
- As you exhibit your mini 4-H Swine animal (that belongs to a regular 4-H member), you will receive a mini 4-H ribbon.
- 5. Be sure to check out the Indiana State Fair 4-H Swine Show. When in the 3rd grade as a 4-H Swine member, you will be eligible to exhibit in the 4-H Swine classes at the State Fair.
- 6. You are encouraged to attend 4-H club meetings and/or project workshops.

ACTIVITIES TO COMPLETE:

- 1. You will need to work with an older 4-H Swine member who will be exhibiting 4-H Swine at the fair. You should help with the project at least three times before the fair.
- 2. When talking to a 4-H'er enrolled in the 4-H Swine project, find out what is involved in caring for and showing Swine.
- 3. Watch the 4-H Swine show at the fair this year.

COMPLETION GUIDELINES:

To complete your Mini 4-H Swine Project you must:

- 1. Complete the Mini 4-H Swine record sheet and turn it in to the 4-H Swine Committee when the swine are checked-in at the 4-H Fair.
- 2. Exhibit a regular Cass County 4-H Club member's gilt or barrow at the county 4-H Fair. (Optional)
- 3. Reminder Any animal weighing over 300 pounds must be led and controlled by an adult 18 years or older, mini 4-H'er will assist.

CURRICULUM – 4-H Goat Resource Handbook (1 per family if requested), 4-H Livestock Record Sheet.

GOATS MUST BE CHECKED IN after 5:00 a.m. and before 10:00 a.m., Monday, of the fair. (No animals are to be brought to the 4-H fairgrounds before 5:00 a.m.) A COMMITTEE MEMBER MUST BE PRESENT TO UNLOAD ANIMALS. ANY GOAT NOT CHECKED IN BY A COMMITTEE MEMBER WILL BE SENT HOME AFTER 10:00 A.M.

There will be a goat parent/member meeting at the fair to go over rules and expectations. All members recommended to attend. Date and time TBA.

GOATS WILL BE JUDGED on Tuesday of the fair, beginning at 7:30 a.m. Order of the show will be Dairy 7:30 a.m., Pygmy 8:00 a.m., and Meat (Boer & Myotonic) 10:00 a.m. or 15 minutes following the conclusion of either the Dairy or Pygmy Show, whichever is later. Mini 4-H Goat Class will show at 9:30 a.m. the day of the show. All goat breeds/categories will show together.

RELEASE TIME: All goats not to be sold in the 4-H Auction will be released from 9:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. and after 10:00 p.m. on Friday to 8:00 a.m., Saturday, of the fair.

IF LIVESTOCK PULLS OUT BEFORE THE FAIR WEEK IS OVER, THE 4-H'ER WILL RECEIVE AN INCOMPLETE, AND ARE INELIGIBLE TO SELL AN ANIMAL AT THE 4-H AUCTION. THE 4-H'ER WILL ALSO NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW AT THE STATE FAIR, AND NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW IN CASS COUNTY THE FOLLOWING YEAR.

NOTE: DUPLICATION OF RULES HAVE BEEN ELIMINATED IN THE ANIMAL SECTIONS SO <u>PLEASE</u> READ THE GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES SECTION, AND THE 4-H LIVESTOCK AUCTION RULES. MINI 4-H GOAT MEMBERS SHOULD READ THE MINI 4-H RULES SECTION.

- 1. In the event of a conflict of the general rules, the 4-H Directors will govern. All decisions regarding show eligibility shall be decided by the Goat Committee.
- 2. All Goat Committee members are on the committee, with a rotation of 4 years co-chairman and the following year chair. (Dairy, Boer, Pygmy and Myotonic)
- 3. Project animals must be in possession of the 4-H member by May 15TH. <u>ALL</u> 4-H Goat enrollment will be <u>ON-LINE</u> and must be completed by <u>May 15th</u> in 4-H online unless otherwise stated.
- 4. Animal enrollment information must be completely filled out or animal will not be eligible to show (i.e. registration number or dam registration number, tattoo, microchip number, or tag number, DOB, class letter) at either the County or State Fair.
- 5. Identification:
 - All goats needing county ear tags must be brought to the fairgrounds on May 14th from 6-8 p.m.
 - Dairy Wethers will be weighed, breed verified and tagged.
 - Meat Wethers will be weighed and tagged. Any meat wether that may be shown at State Fair must provide DNA and have a RFID tag.
 - Commercial Boer Does MUST have a Cass County 4-H ear tag in order to show at the county fair (tattoos null and void). If the Commercial Boer Doe does not have a Cass County 4-H ear tag she must be brought to the fairgrounds on May 14th from 6-8 p.m. to be tagged. If the Commercial Boer Doe has a Cass County 4-H ear tag from previous years, she does NOT need to be brought to the fairgrounds on May 14th.
 - Meat Goat Market Does must be brought to the fairgrounds to be tagged on May 14th from 6-8 p.m.
 - Pygmy Wethers will be permitted to have a tattoo, microchip, or Cass County 4-H ear tag. (If you
 want your pygmy wether tagged, you MUST bring it to the fairgrounds on May 14th from 6-8 p.m.
 - Myotonic Wethers must have a Cass County 4-H ear tag and must be brought to the fairgrounds on May 14th from 6-8 p.m. Any Myotonic Wether that may show at the State Fair must provide DNA and have a RFID tag.

- Myotonic Does can have a tattoo, microchip or Cass County 4-H ear tag. If you need your Myatonic Doe to have a Cass County 4-H ear tag, you must bring her to the fairgrounds on May 14th from 6-8 p.m. Any Myotonic Doe that may show at the State Fair must provide DNA, have a RFID tag and a county tag.
- 6. All goats will be penned. If necessary, goats should be tied to keep in pen.
- 7. No solid pen dividers over 4 feet tall will be allowed. No decorating of pens.
- 8. No bucks or Hermaphrodites will be exhibited. Wethers should be castrated, banded or clamped at least 60 days before the show. Any animal with traditional buck appearances or odors will not be permitted to be exhibited.
- 9. ALL fans in the barn MUST face NORTH.
- 10. Meat and Dairy Wethers must have no horns. Horns must be removed 30 days before and healed by the fair. Pygmy Wethers <u>will be</u> permitted to have horns.
- 11. Age of animals shall be computed from actual date of judging.
- 12. Goat Wethers and Market Does are eligible to sell with no weight restrictions. Wethers and Market Does will be sold by the pound.
- 13. HERDSMAN AWARD An award will be made for the most well-kept pens. This may be awarded to a family or individual since animals are penned together. There will be no age separation or limiting to one year winning. This will be a joint award with the Dairy, Meat, Myotonic and Pygmy Goat project.
- 14. Record sheets must be turned in by noon on Monday to be allowed to show. If the 4-H'er is taking more than one goat projects only one record sheet is required to be completed since they are the same record sheet.
- 15. The 4-H'er, 4-H family member, or designated person must be present with animal for weigh-in and auction number drawing. Weigh-in for goat wethers will be on Monday following the sheep weigh-in. Wethers not weighed-in will not be allowed to show. **No weigh-in for Pygmy Wethers.**
- 16. If any animal medical concerns arise, please see barn chairman before proceeding with preventatives.
- 17. Animals may be drenched under supervision of the barn chairman or committee member in the goat washracks only from 8-9 a.m., 2-3 p.m., and 9-10 p.m. daily. A committee member must be present.
- 18. If a breed champion does not return to the Grand Champion Drive, the Reserve Champion of that breed/category has the opportunity to represent that breed/category in the Grand Champion Drive.

YQCA - Youth for the Quality Care of Animals - This is required for county and state fair.

- ◆ To exhibit beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, meat goats, dairy goats, poultry and rabbits, 4-H members must be certified through the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals. This is an annual program that can be completed via online modules or in-person trainings. For more information about in-person trainings, please contact your County Extension Office. More information about YQCA is available at http://yqca.org. While this is a requirement, it should not be viewed as just another rule but rather as an important educational opportunity for 4-H livestock members. Making this an exhibition rule is how we are ensuring that 4-H members learn about quality assurance, but it really has nothing to do with animal exhibition. The real reason we are requiring this is so youth learn best management practices with their animals. The goals of having 4-H members complete the YQCA program include ensuring that
 - Youth will be more prepared to be ambassadors for animal agriculture in their role as youth livestock exhibitors.
 - Animals from youth livestock programs are treated with the utmost care.
 - 4-H members are contributing to a safe, wholesome food supply.
- ♦ NOTE: There is a cost for the on-line and in-person training required by the national organization. The Cass County 4-H Association will cover the cost of "in-person" YQCA Training by purchasing a code for each livestock youth. When youth attend the trainings a code will be given.

SHOWMANSHIP - the first 5 places in each class to receive blue ribbons. Champion and Honor Group ribbons will be awarded in each class.

Showmanship shall be the last class of the day for each breed. Showmanship animal must be enrolled by the 4-H'er showing it and must have been shown in a previous class.

NOTE – When the 4-H Showman has won a showmanship class they MUST move to the next showmanship class the next year (not in the same year) – EXCEPTION – if the member wins Senior Showmanship, he/she will automatically move up into Master Showmanship division for the Master Competition, in the current year.

Showmanship:

Junior - Grades 3-5

Intermediate – Grades 6-8 and previous Junior winner.

Senior – Grades 9-12 and previous Intermediate winner.

Master – previous Senior Showmanship winners and Master Showmanship participants – Senior winner is eligible to move up on show day.

NOTE: The Meat Goat and Dairy Goat Master Showmen will represent the Goat Barn in Premier Showmanship Contest. The Pygmy and Myotonic Master Goat Showmen will represent the Goat Barn in the Royal Showmanship Contest.

- 1. All Dairy Does (milking and dry) must be accompanied by registration papers showing that the exhibitor owns the animal entirely, in family partnership, or leased animals. Animals must be of Purebred, American or Recorded Grade Stock. Senior Doe title stays with the doe. Doe may show in Dam and Daughter.
- 2. All dry stock must be under 2 years of age and never freshened. All milking does must be in milk.
- 3. EXHIBIT CLASSES: Classes will be divided by breed, except wethers.
 - A. Junior Kid-born on or after April 1, current year. Kids born after May 15th, the dam must be registered and enrolled by May 15th.
 - B. Intermediate Kid born March 1 March 31, current year
 - C. Senior Kid born January 1 February 28, current year
 - D. Junior Yearling born June 1 December 31, previous year Never fresh
 - E. Senior Yearling one year and under two years Never fresh
 - F. Doe 1 year and under 2 (milking)
 - G. Doe 2 years and under 3 (milking)
 - H. Doe 3 years and under 5 (milking)
 - I. Doe 5 years and over (milking)
 - J. Champion Challenge Previous Best Senior Doe in show winners.
 - K. Wethers Only 3 wethers may be shown by any one exhibitor. These animals must be 100% dairy. Wethers must have milk teeth in place to be shown.
 - L. Dam and Daughter Animal MUST be shown in an above class, but both animals must be enrolled at the fair by the same 4-H member, and shown by the same 4-H member.
- 4. Separate Dairy goat and Meat goat wether Rate of Gain contests will be conducted.
- 5. Dress code shall follow ADGA: White shirt with sleeves and White or Black pants are recommended. Shorts are not recommended for showing.
- 6. Milk out will be no earlier than 18 hours prior to show time and will be posted.



"DAIRY GOATS" – continued

- 7. For a breed to be recognized and judged separately, there must be at least 3 animals dry or 3 animals milking and two (2) exhibitors showing the breed. All others will show in AOP class.
- 8. Best Senior Doe will be eligible to sell a collection of local goat products. Goat milk will not sell in the 4-H Auction. If Best Senior Doe does not wish to sell, the Reserve has the option to sell the collection of items. If neither can or wish to sell, the collection will sell and money donated to the fair for improvement of goat facilities.
- Milking contest will be on Thursday. Milk-out times for the contest will be posted on Tuesday of the fair.
- 10. An exhibitor is limited to a maximum of 2 breeds with 2 entries per class and 1 entry in group classes, except a maximum of 3 wethers can be exhibited per exhibitor. Maximum number will be assigned at pen set, if warranted. This limitation is at the time of exhibition not enrollment.
- 11. No Boer/Dairy cross goats Dairy wethers must be 100% dairy.
- 12. **GENERAL GROOMING:** Full body trimming.



- 1. Boer Does, purebred and percentage must have registration papers to be shown at the county fair. **NOTE:** State Fair does require registration papers on does, also.
- 2. Wethers must have a county tag.
- 3. Full blood and percentage does must be registered in one of the following ownership methods:
 - 8. In the 4-H members' name.
 - 9. John Smith & Sons.
 - 10. John Smith, Sons & Daughters.
 - 11. John Smith & Family (family includes sons, daughters, and legal guardian youth only).
 - 12. Mark Smith (brother) & Mary Smith (sister).
 - 13. Family Corporations, where the 4-H members' name appears as a holder of stock in the corporation, and proof of same must be supplied on or before the enrollment date.
 - 14. Family partnership where the 4-H member's father, mother, brother, sister, aunt, uncle, grandparent, and/or legal guardian is also in the family partnership and the 4-H member's name appears on the legal notarized partnership. A copy of the written document must be attached to the enrollment form before the enrollment deadline.
 - 15. Boer Does will NOT be accepted to show if they are listed in a father's name only, farm name only, or partnerships with unrelated persons (such as "Smith View", "Smith Oak", "John Doe & William Smith (4-H member)", "Long Oak & William Smith (4-H member)", etc.)
- 4. Full Blood, Purebred and Percentage Boer Does must have a readable permanent tattoo in the ear or tail web identical to the one recorded on their registration paper and online 4-H enrollment. Only one (1) number sequence per ear will be permitted. At check-in, any animal which does not have a legible tattoo corresponding to its registration certificate is ineligible to show. Once disqualified due to an incorrect or illegible tattoo, animals cannot be re-tattooed and rechecked at the show. Likewise, new registration papers being sent by a breed association will not change the status of the disqualified animal.

- 5. EXHIBIT CLASSES:
 - A) Registered Does (Full blood, Purebred and Percentage)—will be broken into classes by age. The date of the goat show at the Cass County Fair will be used to determine age.
 - 0 to under 3 months
 - 3 to under 6 months
 - 6 to under 9 months
 - 9 to under 12 months
 - 12 to under 16 months
 - 16 to under 20 months
 - 20 to under 24 months
 - 24 to under 36 months
 - 36 plus months
 - B) Commercial does will be shown by weight. There is no age limit for Commercial Does. There will be three weight divisions: Light, Middle, and Heavy Weights. Champion and Reserve will show for Grand and Reserve Grand.
 - C) Wethers—will be broken into classes according to weight. They may be 100% Boer or Boer Crossbred animals. <u>Wethers must have milk teeth in place to be shown.</u> There will be three weight divisions: Light, Middle, and Heavy Weights. Champion and Reserve will show for Grand and Reserve Grand.
 - D) Market Does will be broken into classes according to weight. They may be 100% Boer or Boer Crossbred animals. <u>Must have milk teeth in place to be shown.</u>
 <u>NOTE</u>: At May weigh-in date, all exhibitors must determine whether a doe is being exhibited as a commercial doe or a market doe.
- 6. General Grooming: Body Trimming/clipping is allowed but not required.
- 7. Any one exhibitor may exhibit a maximum of 10 does.
- 8. Any one exhibitor may exhibit a maximum of 3 wethers.
- 9. Any one exhibitor may exhibit a maximum of 3 market does.
- 10. Market Does can ONLY be shown in Market Doe classes.

GOAT PARTNERSHIP PROJECT

Cass County is offering a Goat Partnership Program for 4-H'ers who may not normally consider a goat project. The purpose of the additional project is to involve new 4-H members with hands on experience to the goat industry.

The 4-H'er does not house or keep in his possession during the calendar year the animals he/she would enroll in the goat project. Instead, they create a working relationship with a Cass County Dairy Goat, Boer Goat Breeder, or Pygmy Goat Breeder who wishes to participate with the 4-H'er and abide by the guidelines set up by the Cass County Goat Partnership Contract.

- Only 4-H'ers enrolled in Cass County 4-H are eligible (NOT a state fair project).
- Only Cass County Dairy Goat, Boer Goat Breeder, or Pygmy Goat Breeders are eligible.
- Each 4-H'er is limited to 5 leased female Dairy and/or Boer and/or Pygmy Goats to be shown and up to 10 animals enrolled.
- Ownership stays with the goat owner as the animal is used for 4-H educational purposes only.
- Upon showing the animals at the county fair, any and all trophies, ribbons, and premium money will belong to the 4-H member showing the animals. If a leased doe should win Best Senior Milking Doe, the 4-H'er may not sell the cheese in the auction, the honor will go to the next highest placing non-leased doe.
- Experience is the best teacher and proper care of the animal during the 4- H fair is essential, therefore, further agreements between the farmer and the 4-H'er should be considered.
- · 4-H'er provides the care and equipment for the show.
- The owner provides housing and care for the animal until fair time, and then the responsibility for the animals care is transferred to the 4-H'er.
- The small-suggested fee, not to exceed \$20, paid by the 4-H'er to the owner covers cost of health papers and transportation to and from the fair.
- All goat rules in the handbook still apply including enrollment dates, checking in and out of the 4-H fairgrounds.
- Goat partnership participants may <u>purchase</u> a goat wether and house it with their leased doe(s) with approval from the goat breeder. This animal would be eligible to sell in the 4-H auction.

We, the Goat committee invite any and all 4-H'ers to consider this project, remembering, first of all that every project requires work and effort. Secondly, it is the owner that is offering his/her animals for your experience, so treat them with respect, both the owner and the animals.

Cass County 4-H Goat Partnership Contract ____, agree to follow all the listed items relating to the Cass County 4-H Goat Partnership Program. - 4) Birds for county fair should be hatched by May 15, except for the meat class. Proof of hatching date must accompany the entry.

OWNERSHIP

- 1) All animals must be owned by the 4-H member.

RECORDS

- 3) A Poultry record sheet must be turned in at the time of project check-in even if the 4-H'er chooses not to exhibit.

HEALTH CERTIFICATE

- 2) All poultry for exhibition shall have passed a negative test for pullorum-typhoid for exhibition within 90 days prior to the date of their exhibition or originate from NPIP approved flocks, hatched from eggs origination from NPIP approved flocks, or the entire flock must be certified NPIP pullorum-typhoid clean. THIS IS A MUST! Waterfowl (ducks and geese) and pigeons do not have to be blood tested.
- 3) All birds that were purchased from NPIP flocks prior to last year's fair MUST be re-blood tested 90 days before exhibiting.
- 4) NO poultry may be exhibited showing excessive signs of infectious disease.
- 5) NO poultry may be exhibited showing excessive signs of external parasites.
- 6) Animals must not show signs of communicable disease or lice. Any animals that show signs of disease or lice will be sent home immediately.
- 7) For more information on poultry health requirements, call the Indiana Poultry Association at 765/494-8517.
- 8) Must have health papers **BEFORE** unloading poultry.

BARN RULES

- 1) The 4-H'er is responsible for caring for their birds during the fair (feed, feeders, water and pans are the exhibitors responsibility).

EXHIBIT

CLASSES

An Overall Commercial Champion in show and Overall Exhibition Champion in show will be chosen from the following classes:

NOTE: Reserve Champion winners for Exhibition and Commercial (banner classes) are eligible to compete for the Reserve Grand Champion award for Exhibition and Commercial poultry.

COMMERCIAL

Pullets: Two females = exhibit hatched between January 1 and May 1 of current year. 1 exhibit per breed, maximum of 3 breeds. Classes will be split into 3 categories – brown egg, white egg and all other egg shell.

Roasters: (Meat Pen) Two birds = 1 entry. 2 birds of same sex, 8 to 12 weeks of age, weighing between $5\frac{1}{2}$ – 10 lbs.



- 1) 4-H'ers taking the 4-H Rabbit Ambassador Contest must be enrolled in the Rabbit project of Cass County and a member of the Cottontails 4-H Club.
- 2) Rabbits must be purebred and tattooed.
- 3) Taking the Rabbit Ambassador Contest requires you to enter and show your rabbit(s) at the Cass County 4-H fair on judging day, Monday, July 5, 2021.

Rabbit Ambassador Procedures:

- 1) Written Test 100 pts
 - a) Novice and Junior: 25 questions (true and false)
 - b) Intermediate, Senior, and Master: 50 questions (true and false, multiple choice, matching, or a combination of those mentioned)
- 2) Breed Identification 60 pts
 - identify and classify 10 rabbits according to showroom classification and class.
 - b) Show room classification refers to the term used to enter the rabbit in a show thereby indicating how it is shown. Specifically, the Netherland Dwarf rabbit is shown by variety and should be identified by variety only. The Jersey Wooly is shown by groups and should be identified by group only.
- 3) Showmanship 100 pts

Each contestant must furnish his/her own rabbit and bring the rabbit to the judge in a carrier. Rabbit must be purebred and tattooed. Contestants should refer to the 4-H Rabbit Ambassador Showmanship Score Sheet as a resource. This form will be available in Extension Offices or on the Purdue University website.

- 4) The rabbit should be in a solid bottom container.
- 5) The following requirements will be observed by the judge(s):
 Remove the rabbit from its show pen, carry it to the judging table and return it to the show pen.
 Position the rabbit on the table to display its best qualities and as the judge requires. The rabbit should be between the exhibitor and judge at all times. The participants should be prepared to answer questions about their breed exhibited and the varieties within the breed. The participants are suggested to wear long sleeves for showroom dress, neatness in appearance and attitude are important. Also important are being alert, showing poise and courtesy, and being able to communicate their experiences in the 4-H rabbit project.

HORSES MUST BE CHECKED IN 5:00 A.M. – 10:00 A.M., MONDAY, OF THE FAIR, AND WILL BE RELEASED 10:00 P.M., FRIDAY TO 8:00 A.M., SATURDAY, OF THE FAIR. **A COMMITTEE MEMBER MUST BE PRESENT TO UNLOAD ANIMALS.**

IF LIVESTOCK PULLS OUT BEFORE THE FAIR WEEK IS OVER, THE 4-H'ER WILL RECEIVE AN INCOMPLETE. THE 4-H'er WILL ALSO NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW AT THE STATE FAIR, AND NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW IN CASS COUNTY THE FOLLOWING YEAR.

All 4-H members and parents/guardians are responsible for following the rules and regulations explained in the "Indiana 4-H Horse and Pony Handbook".

NOTE: DUPLICATION OF RULES HAVE BEEN ELIMINATED IN THE ANIMAL SECTIONS SO PLEASE READ THE GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES SECTION, AND THE 4-H LIVESTOCK AUCTION RULES. MINI 4-H BEEF MEMBERS SHOULD READ THE MINI 4-H RULES SECTION.

- 1. Horse and Pony members are encouraged to attend 4 meetings. Demonstrations need to be presented by the last meeting!
- All animals must be sound and healthy. Any questionable animal may be removed by a licensed veterinarian or by the adult advisory committee.
- 3. Record sheets are to be turned into any leader on or before animal check-in at the fair. If record sheets are not turned in, the 4-H'er will be ineligible to show at the County and State Fairs. NO EXCEPTIONS!!
- 4. A Horse Certificate of Vaccination is required for each horse for 4-H Exhibition. 5 vaccinations are required. Form 4-H-1031-W must be completed before any show.
- 5. THE 4-H HORSE & PONY SHOW WILL BE HELD OVER 2 DAYS. JUDGING FOR CONTESTING CLASSES WILL BE HELD ON, MONDAY OF THE FAIR. HALTER AND PERFORMANCE CLASSES WILL BE ON WEDNESDAY OF THE FAIR.
- 6. All 4-H Horse & Pony project members MUST be members of the County 4-H Horse & Pony Club.
- 7. Animals should be in the 4-H member's possession and records started by May 15. 4-H Horse & Pony enrollment forms must be completed ON-LINE by May 15. No animal may be substituted or traded for after May 15. Any animal enrollment forms received May 16th thru May 22nd will be considered late and will be charged a \$25.00 per form late fee. Any enrollment forms received after May 22nd will be considered VOID and the livestock entered therein may not be exhibited at the current year's Cass County 4-H Fair. Incomplete forms will not be accepted.

"HORSE AND PONY" - continued

- 8. First and foremost, all exhibitors, parents and spectators will conduct themselves as ladies and gentlemen. They will be expected to conduct themselves in such a manner as to set a good example for other 4-H exhibitors and other spectators at the show. Inhumane treatment of animals, impolite behavior, poor sportsmanship, or disruptive actions (as deemed by the Advisory Committee) will result in disqualification and/or removal from the grounds.
- 9. If an exhibitor gets disqualified for safety reasons (i.e. equipment failure or improper adjustment causing an unsafe condition; falling of animal or rider while in the arena, etc.) in two (2) or more classes, they will not be able to participate as an exhibitor the rest of the day.
- 10. A \$10 stall fee is due when Pen Request forms are returned. The \$10 fee will be returned when the stall is cleaned after the fair. All forfeited money will go into the horse and pony general fund.
- 11. No Halter or hay bags are to be left inside of stalls overnight
- 12. Only bark, bedding pellets and/or shavings are to be used as bedding at the fairgrounds.
- 13. If a horse is left without water for an extended period of time, you will receive a warning. On the second occurrence, you will not show for the day. On the third occurrence, you will receive an incomplete for the year.
- 14. No sitting on horses in stall or when tied to tie posts. No riding in barn.
- 15. All classes will not be considered complete until the animal is safely out of the arena or placings are announced.

BARN RULES WILL BE POSTED AND ENFORCED BY ADULT LEADERS.

- 16. Minimum of 2 exhibitors in classes with additional equipment set-up.
- 17. Highest placing person in Senior Western Showmanship with at least 100 club points will represent the horse club in Premier Showmanship.
- 18. NO ANIMALS ARE TO BE RIDDEN ANY PLACE AT THE 4-H FAIRGROUNDS EXCEPT IN THE MAKE-UP ARENA AND THE SHOW RING. IF FOUND RIDING ANYWHERE ELSE, THE 4-H'ER WILL BE SENT HOME.
- 19. Any animal exhibited must be owned by the member or in family partnership with the member's father, mother, sister, brother, grandparent or guardian or a leasing agreement approved by the 4-H Leader and Youth Educator.
- 20. 4-H Horse & Pony members MUST show their own animals! Each animal may be entered and shown by only one 4-H member. Exception: Mini 4-H.
- 21. Registered and/or grade animals may be shown in all classes.
- 22. All classes shall be judged by the INDIANA STATE 4-H HORSE & PONY RULES.
- 23. Exhibitor must wear exhibit number in the show ring on his/her back or on both sides of the saddle pad.
- 24. Chaps are optional in Horsemanship Classes.
- 25. Helmet Safety Policy All 4-H members are required to wear a properly fitted ASTM or SEI standard F1163 (or above) certified helmet whenever mounted, or driving, at a 4-H Horse and Pony event, show or activity. The 4-H member is responsible to see that this specified headgear is properly fitted with the approved harness fastened in place whenever mounted. This policy became effective beginning with the 2003 program year and applies to all county, area, and state 4-H Horse and Pony events, shows, and activities.
- 26. No 4-H member may ride another member's animal on the fairgrounds the week of the fair. The 4-H'er will not be allowed to show and will be sent home.
- 27. A curb strap or chain must be used on a shanked bit and must be at least one-half inch wide and lay flat against the animal's jaw.

"HORSE AND PONY" - continued

- 28. Hackamore, draw reins, martingales or tie downs are not allowed except in contest classes. NO cavesons with western bridles. *NO RIDING IN HALTERS.*
- 29. No stallions are eligible to show except weanling.
- 30. Junior Age: Grades 3 7 Senior Age: Grades 8 12 For horse show purposes, the grade of the 4-H member will be as of January 1 of the year of show.
- 31. Horses are to be ridden and handled by club members. Family members or guardian may ride or handle in case of an unruly animal.
- 32. Mares with foals are not required to stay at fair. 4-H'ers may bring them the day of the show and take them home.
- 33. Each 4-H'er is encouraged to participate in at least one money-making project during the year
- 34. A horse can only be shown in one county 4-H show.

"MINI 4-H HORSE AND PONY"

Welcome to the Mini 4-H Horse and Pony Project. This project is designed to introduce you to the world of horses. You do not need to own horses or even live on a farm to take this project.

CURRICULUM – Mini 4-H Horse and Pony Manual/Record Sheet.

GENERAL MINI 4-H RULES:

- 1. You must be in the 1st and 2nd grade at the time you sign up for this project.
- 2. You must enroll in the Mini 4-H Horse and Pony project.
- 3. Complete the mini 4-H Horse and Pony enrollment form by May 15th. (This will be sent to each member who enrolls in Mini 4-H Horse and Pony in April)
- 4. As you exhibit your mini 4-H Horse and Pony animal (that belongs to a regular 4-H member), you will receive a mini 4-H ribbon.
- 5. Be sure to check out the Indiana State Fair 4-H Horse Show. When in the 3rd grade as a 4-H Horse & Pony member, you will be eligible to exhibit in the 4-H Horse & Pony classes at the State Fair.
- 6. You are encouraged to attend 4-H Horse and Pony Club meetings and/or project workshops.
- 7. Must use a current 4-H member's horse.

ACTIVITIES TO COMPLETE:

- 1. You will need to work with an older 4-H member or a family 4-H member who will be exhibiting a 4-H horse(s) at the fair. You should help with the project at least three times before fair time.
- 2. When talking to a 4-H'er enrolled in the horse and pony project, find out what is involved in caring for and showing horses.
- 3. Watch the 4-H Horse and Pony show at the fair this year.

EXHIBITION & COMPLETION REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Read and do the activities in the mini 4-H Horse & Pony Book.
- 2. EXHIBIT OPTIONS:
 - Exhibit a regular Cass County 4-H Club member's horse or pony at the county fair.(Optional)

AND/OR

- Make a poster measuring 14" X 22", displayed horizontally, and covered with clear plastic. (optional) Include a green Mini 4-H exhibit label in the lower right hand corner. What do you put on your poster? Any topic on Horses. Below are some suggestions:
 - (a) Pictures (snapshots, magazine pictures, drawings, etc.) of horses.
 - (b) A picture of your favorite breed of horse and a short description of why it is your favorite.
- 3. NOTE: SEE MINI 4-H SAFETY RULES ON PAGE 13.
- 4. Complete the Mini 4-H Horse & Pony record sheet and turn it in to the 4-H Horse Committee when the horses are checked-in at the 4-H Fair.

4-H DOG PROGRAM GUIDELINES

GUIDELINES

- 1. Dogs being entered in the 4-H Dog Project MUST have current vaccinations, a current Certification of Vaccination Form (Form 4H 671) and a Rabies Immunization Certificate, completed by their veterinarian and turned in to the dog project leader before participating in dog club training, events or activities.
- 2. Dogs being entered into the 4-H Dog Project must be owned by the exhibitor or a member of his/her immediate family and/or household by May 15th of the project year. Dogs must be born by or before December 1st of the previous year, making them at least 15 weeks of age prior to March 15th of the project year to be entered into the Dog Project. 4-H project dogs are expected to be in the personal possession and regular care of the 4-H member who owns them from the animal enrollment deadline until the conclusion of the County and/or State Fair.
- 3. If a 4-H member is interested in participating in the dog project, but does not own a dog, contact the Cass County dog project leader, before April 15th, for the possibility of fostering a dog in conjunction with A Cause for Paws animal rescue. The dog would be required to be in the personal possession and regular care of the 4-H member registered for the dog project, from the animal enrollment deadline until the conclusion of the County and/or State Fair. Allow time to be matched with a suitable dog for the member's situation, in order to have the dog in place before May 15th.
- 4. All dogs must wear a well fitted slip, buckle, or martingale collar, and have a leash that is 6 ft. long made of leather or cloth to be exhibited in any 4-H Dog Show or Match. While head halters and prong collars are useful training tools, they are not permitted in the show ring. (No tags are allowed on the collar while the dog is being shown or during training.)
- 5. Excessive and/or inhumane treatment of a 4-H dog by an exhibitor and/or family member will be grounds for immediate disgualification from the show, and training session in which the incident occurs. Other disciplinary actions may be taken in accordance to 4-H rules and regulations governing livestock projects.
- In order to compete at the Cass County 4-H dog show, 4-H members must turn in to the dog project leader a completed Certificate of Vaccination Form (Form 4H 671), a copy of the Rabies Immunization Certificate provided by your veterinarian, and complete written confirmation of entry information (provided by dog project leader) by June 1st of the show year. After the June 1st deadline, the member may complete the project by returning the Dog Record (4-H-390-W) by the project completion deadline, but may not participate in the county dog show.
- 7. Completion of the dog project is attained by completing and returning to the dog project leader the Dog Record (4-H-390-W). The deadline for returning this form to the dog project leader is the day of the Cass County 4-H Dog Show. The Dog Record (4-H-390-W) will be accepted as early as the June business meeting. Failure to complete the Dog Project disgualifies the 4-H member and dog from participating in the Cass County and State Fair Dog Shows.

- 8. It is recommended that members attend at least 9 training sessions and 4 business meetings to be considered ready to exhibit their dog in the County Fair Dog Show.
- 9. A dog may be used by only one 4-H member to complete the dog project in any given 4-H membership year. Dogs may be shown by only one 4-H member.
- 10. A member may show more than one dog so long as they are entered into separate classes. A 4-H member may enter only one dog in the State Fair.
- 11. A dog shown by a member for another dog club member will be given only a green participation ribbon regardless of the dog's placing.
- 12. All dogs must be crated or on leash unless showing or otherwise instructed.
- 13. Only dogs currently entered in the Cass County Dog Project may be in attendance at the County Show or any dog club training or event. All dogs visiting a training session or business meeting or any dog club event must have prior permission from the leader and present current vaccination history before the visit.
- 14. Female dogs in season will be shown last at the County Dog Show. It is requested that in season females be kept downwind of the exhibiting area until it is their time to show so not to disrupt other exhibitors. **IN SEASON FEMALES ARE NOT PERMITTED AT THE STATE FAIR.**
- 15. Any member wishing to compete for TOP DOG must take a written test given at the June Business Meeting. Taking the test prior to the meeting in June is permitted. It will not be permitted to take the test after the June Business Meeting.
- 16. All 4-H members are required to clean up after their dogs. Pooper scoopers are available, waste should be deposited in the proper containers. Any 4-H member found not cleaning up after their dog may be disqualified from the County Show.
- 17. Anything not covered here will be deferred to the Indiana State Dog Project rules and regulations.

 Any special problems or infractions will be handled by the Advisory Committee/Leaders under the guidelines of the 4-H rules and regulations.

The following classes will be available for judging at the Cass County 4-H Dog Show.

There are no awards presented for exhibition only classes.

OBEDIENCE:

1. Class 1A (Score Sheet # 4-H 498)

For 4-H'ers with no previous formal dog training experiences with a dog which has received no obedience training prior to January 1 of current year. (repeatable for exhibition only)

2. Class 1B (Score Sheet # 4-H 580)

For 4-H'ers with previous dog training experience, (including showing in 1A) or for 4-H'ers with no experience whose dogs have had training which disqualifies them for 1A. (repeatable for exhibition only)

3. Class 2A (Score Sheet # 4-H 499)

For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed 1A or 1B. (repeatable for exhibition only)

4. Class 2B (Score Sheet # 4-H 712)

For 4-H'ers and dogs which have completed 2A. (may repeat until ready for 3A)

5. Class 3A (Score Sheet # 4-H 500 A)

For 4-H'ers and dogs which have mastered Class 2 work. (repeatable for exhibition only)



"DOG" - continued

6. Class 3B (Score Sheet # 4-H 500 B)

For 4-H'ers and dogs which have been in 3A, but are not ready for Class 4 work. (may repeat)

7. Class 4A (Score Sheet # 4-H 501 A)

For 4-H'ers and dogs which have mastered Class 3 work. (repeatable for exhibition only)

8. Class 4B (Score Sheet # 4-H 501 B)

For 4-H'ers and dogs which have been in 4A, but are not ready for Class 5 work. (may repeat)

9. Class 5A (Score Sheet # 4-H 502 A)

For 4-H'ers and dogs which have mastered Class 4 work. (repeatable for exhibition only)

10. Class 5B (Score Sheet # 4-H 502 B)

For 4-H'ers and dogs which have been in 5A, but are not ready for Class 6 work. (may repeat)

11. Class 6A (Score Sheet #4-H 581 A)

For 4-H'ers and dogs which have mastered Class 5 work. (repeatable for exhibition only)

12. Class 6B (Score Sheet # 4-H 581 B)

For 4-H'ers and dogs which have been in 6-A. (may repeat)

13. Veterans - (Score sheet # 4-H 870)

For 4-H members whose dogs are at least seven (7) years-old or are physically challenged. The dog must have completed at least class 2-B in previous years. Dogs that are physically challenged must be accompanied by a letter from a veterinarian stating that the dog is unable to perform jumping and/or retrieving exercises. A dog may not be shown in any other obedience class at the county level or State Fair, once they have competed in the Veteran's Class.

SHOWMANSHIP: Any Dog showing in Showmanship must also show in Obedience.

Once you have won your class, the following year you will be in one class level higher until you reach Senior Showmanship.

1) Junior showmanship

For any 4-H member who is in the 3rd, 4th or 5th grades on January 1 of the current year.

2) Intermediate showmanship

For any 4-H member in the 6th, 7th or 8th grades on January 1 of the current year.

3) Senior showmanship

For any 4-H member in the 9th grade or above on January 1 of the current year.

Proper attire:

Girls-dress, skirt and blouse, culottes, or dress pants.

Boys-dress pants, dress shirts; (coat and tie are optional.)

Inappropriate attire:

Smooth soled boots, high heels, backless slip-on shoes, loose fitting shoes or other unsafe footwear. Any clothing considered too revealing by a Showmanship judge.

See 4-H 716-W (Indiana 4-H Dog Showmanship Guide) available through your County Extension Office for further detail and clarity on attire, patterns, tips and judges guidelines.

A dog fouling in the ring will be placed lower in the class.

AGILITY: Dogs entering in Agility must also be shown in Obedience.

The 4-H Dog Agility Program is based on guidelines from the American Kennel Club. Some modifications to the AKC rules have been made to provide a program suitable for 4-H handlers of all ages.

- 1.Dogs showing in agility are required to have shown in obedience at the current show, must be at least 15-months-old on day of show and must have completed one full year of obedience training. Dogs that have been disqualified in Obedience may not compete in Agility; in situations where the dog completes Agility before they complete Obedience, the Agility Score sheet will be pulled for that exhibitor.
- 2. To compete in agility, the 4-H member must be able to demonstrate to the leader by the June 1st deadline that their dog is able to willingly and safely maneuver through the agility obstacles at their skill level. If unable to demonstrate this, the leader may determine the dog and handler team unfit to compete in agility, or able to compete but unfit to complete specific obstacles and will receive the corresponding point deduction.
- 3. Agility section/classes will be entered as Beginning, Intermediate, Advanced and Excellent. Awards will be granted by that classification, regardless of dog size. The leader will place dogs in the appropriate size division based on the height at the withers as previously measured. Dogs may be measured at the show to verify accuracy of the reported height at the withers.
- 4. Each class will offer five (5) jump height divisions based on the dog's height at the withers. Dogs 7 years and over (Veterans) may jump one jump height lower than their actual height division. Make sure you indicate on your entry form if your dog needs to be scheduled as a Veteran.
 - 4-inch Division dogs up to and including 11" at the withers will have 4" jump heights
 - ❖ 8-inch Division dogs over 11" and up to and including 14" at the withers will have 8" jump heights.
 - ❖ 12-inch Division dogs over 14" and up to and including 18" at the withers will have 12" jump heights.
 - 16-inch Division dogs over 18" and up to and including 22" at the withers will have 16" jump heights.
 - ❖ 20-inch Division dogs over 22" at the withers will have 20" jump heights The Pause Table will be at the hurdle height for each division.
- 5. All agility work will be done on a flat-buckle or quick-release collar.
 - ❖ Beginning level A must use a six (6)-foot lead.
 - All other levels will be off lead at the fair show.
 - Collar tags will not be allowed.
- 6. Once all paws have touched contact equipment, the dog must either complete the obstacle or move to the next one. No additional attempts will be allowed.
- 7. Scores will start with 200 points. Points will be deducted for performance and time faults.
- 8. If a dog fouls in the ring during the walk through there will be a 10-point deduction in the agility score. If a dog fouls in the ring during the scored run, it will be excused immediately.
- 9. Appropriately fitted athletic shoes must be worn for agility.
- 10. Handlers who need the aid of supporting devices (crutches, wheelchair, etc.) may request extra time for completion of the course. This request must be made before classes begin that day; and the amount of time allowed will be determined by the judge.
- 11. In Agility, dogs with qualifying scores will place ahead of dogs with non-qualifying scores. In agility, dogs must successfully complete each obstacle on the course to receive a qualifying score.
- 12. The dog project leader may determine a dog to be unfit for agility for reasons of health and safety of the dog.

Agility Classes

The program offers four (4) levels of competition - Beginning, Intermediate, Advanced and Excellence. The level of competition will be determined by the handler and their county leader based on the dog's ability and training.



Beginning Classes

<u>Beginning A Class</u> - Neither 4-H member nor dog have previously participated in Agility. 4-Her's must use 6' leash. Leash faults will be incurred if the exhibitor uses the leash to either place the dog on, or remove it from the obstacle. This includes, but not limited to pulling the dog into, onto or off an obstacle. (Not Repeatable)

<u>Beginning B Class</u> - 4-H member or dog has participated in Agility before, either with the current dog/handler, or a different dog/handler. Exercises must be off leash. Dog should repeat Beginning B until they can perform intermediate level work.

Intermediate Classes (must be off leash)

<u>Intermediate A Class</u> - 4-H member has not previously participated in Intermediate Agility. Exercises must be off leash. (Not Repeatable)

<u>Intermediate B Class</u> - 4-H member has participated in Intermediate Agility before, either with the current dog, or a different dog. Exercises must be off leash. This Intermediate B class should be repeated until the dog can perform advanced level work.

Advanced Classes (must be off leash)

<u>Advanced A Class</u> - 4-H member has not previously participated in Advanced Agility. Exercises must be off leash. (Not Repeatable)

<u>Advanced B Class</u> - 4-H member has participated in Advanced Agility before, either with the current dog, or a different dog. Exercises must be off leash. This class may be repeated.

Excellent Class (must be off leash)

<u>Excellent Class</u> - 4-H member will exhibit more advanced handling skills over the same obstacles as those in the Advanced Classes. Exercises must be off leash.

"MINI 4-H DOG"

Welcome to the Mini 4-H Dog Project. This project is designed to introduce you to the world of dogs. You do not need to own a dog to take this project.

CURRICULUM – Mini 4-H Dog Manual/Record Sheet.

GENERAL MINI 4-H RULES:

- 4-H DOGS
- 1. You must be in the 1^{st} or 2^{nd} grade at the time you sign up for this project.
- 2. You must enroll in the Mini 4-H Dog project.
- 3. Please read and follow project rules carefully. You will not be training or showing your dog but, you are encouraged to attend dog club meetings, workshops, and special shows.

COMPLETION GUIDELINES:

To complete your Mini 4-H Dog Project you must:

- Complete an optional poster which MUST be displayed horizontally, measure 14" X 22", mounted on firm backing, covered with clear plastic and have a green mini 4-H exhibit label in the lower right hand corner.
- 2. See mini 4-H Dog manual for details and topics.
- 3. In addition to the optional poster mini Dog project members are invited to assist the County Dog Club (Tailwaggers) by serving as Ring Stewards during the County 4-H Judging at the Fair. Your poster is to be turned in at the County Judging at the Fair.
- 4. Complete the Mini 4-H Dog record sheet and turn it in at the dog show at the 4-H Fair.

Indiana 4-H Aggressive Dog Policy

The safety and well-being of 4-H members and volunteers is a primary concern with all Indiana 4-H Program opportunities. Families should err on the side of caution in selecting a dog for the 4-H member to exhibit. A dog that has a known history of aggression or biting is not appropriate for involvement in the 4-H Program. On occasion, the 4-H member may have difficulty managing their dog within the 4-H Program. The following guidance has been provided for the Indiana 4-H Dog Program as the owner/exhibitor of the dog bears responsibility for the dog's actions. In the subsequent policy, the term "4-H Dog Personnel" will include County 4-H Volunteers, County Extension Educators, State 4-H Staff and appropriate County and State Fair Directors.

A dog that bites a human or another dog at any 4-H Dog Event must be immediately removed from that event by the 4-H member and will subsequently be excused from the 4-H Program. The member should be directed by 4-H Dog Personnel on-site to remove the dog if the member does not do so willingly. If a determination is made by the 4-H Dog Personnel that a dog bit in self-defense, it may be allowed to remain at the 4-H Dog Event.

Dogs that display other signs of aggression, including but not limited to barking and standing ground, growling, lunging and snapping will be given one verbal warning. They will be removed from the event after the second violation at the same event. To be removed from a 4-H Dog Event, there must be two violations at the same event.

Any dog that is removed from a 4-H Dog Event due to aggressive behavior will be placed on probation for 2 weeks. Written notification of the probation will be given to the 4-H member. The 2-week period will start upon written notification to the 4-H member. While on probation, the 4-H Dog Personnel and the 4-H member and parents will work together to determine the best course of action for the dog. This may include (but is not limited to) working individually with the dog and 4-H member, asking the 4-H member to use a different dog or having the 4-H member attend events without their dog. At the end of the designated probation period, 4-H Dog Personnel will make a determination regarding the dog's return to 4-H Dog Events.

Dogs that are removed from a 4-H Dog Event twice will be immediately excused from the 4-H program and will not be allowed to re-enter. Excusing a dog from the 4-H Program is rare but could be necessary for the safety of 4-H members, volunteers and other participating dogs. Should a dog be excused from the program, it must be remembered that the action is against the dog and not the 4-H member. 4-H Dog Personnel should look at many solutions and encourage the 4-H member to attend classes without their dog while training it at home or potentially bringing another dog to 4-H events. 4-H members will always be welcome in every other part of the dog project.

In the event that a dog is removed from a 4-H Dog Event or excused from the 4-H Program, 4-H Dog Personnel should report such to the State 4-H Office so that the information is available to all county 4-H dog programs and the Indiana State Fair.

This is a Bench Show. Therefore, the cats will come, show, and then go home. They do not stay at the fair

There will be classes offered for the following categories: Cat Classes, Cage Decorating and Showmanship.

4-H Member Classification:

Junior (Level 1) – Grades 3, 4, 5 on January 1 of current year Intermediate (Level 2) – Grades 6, 7, 8 on January 1 of current year Senior (Level 3) – Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 on January 1 of current year

Cat Classes:

Junior KittenIntermediate KittenSenior KittenJunior ShorthairIntermediate ShorthairSenior ShorthairJunior LonghairIntermediate LonghairSenior Longhair

Note: Kitten Age – Up to 7 months of age.

RULES AND GUIDELINES:

- 1) All cat show exhibitors must have been enrolled in 4-H in the current year.
- 2) All 4-H cats and/or kittens must be owned and cared for by May 15 of current year.
- 3) 4-H cats must be owned, cared for, and shown by the 4-H member.
- 4) A 4-H member may enter and show a maximum of 2 cats in the 4-H Cat Show.
- 5) This is an all-day show, so plan accordingly.
- 6) All cats must be brought to the show and kept in individual cat carriers, provided by the owner, one cat per carrier. They may be removed from the cage/carrier if they are in the cage decorating contest or grooming them before they are judged. If out of the cage/carrier, the cat must have a collar and leash or a harness at all times.
- 7) All 4-H cats must have a valid "2021 Certification of Vaccination for the 4-H Cat Project." (4-H 777) The certification of vaccination must be signed by a licensed, accredited veterinarian. It must be presented at check-in.
- No 4-H cats may be exhibited that test positive for or show any symptoms of any communicable diseases.
- 9) All cats MUST within one year of the date of exhibition:
 - a) be vaccinated for Feline Panleukopenia
 - b) be vaccinated for Feline Rhinotracheitis
 - c) be vaccinated for Calcivirus
- 9) All cats MUST be tested for Feline Leukemia within one hundred eighty (180) days of exhibition.
- 10) All cats over 3 months of age must be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed and accredited veterinarian within one (1) year of exhibition.

- 11) It is recommended but not required that all cats have a negative fecal exam for parasites not more than thirty (30) days prior to exhibition.
- 12) Cats may be purebred or grade animals (household pets).
- 13) No family or friends are allowed at the Judging table during judging.
- 14) Cats do not need to be registered or pedigreed in order to enter the 4-H Cat Show.
- 15) Each 4-H'ers cat will be judged on
 - a) health
 - b) cleanliness
 - c) grooming
 - d) personality
 - e) if all categories are equal, the judge will choose a winner by its "Star Quality."
- 15) After a 4-H cat has been judged, 4-H'ers are to remain in the benching area until they have been released. Cats will be taken home at the end of the show.
- 16) Showmanship and decorated cages are optional activities and will be conducted after the "Cat Classes."
- 17) A 4-H cat will be classified as long-haired if its coat has long top hairs, with a thick wooly undercoat. The length of hair on a cat's tail is often used as a determining factor. Hair length is usually 1½" high or more.
- 18) A 4-H cat will be classified as short-haired if its coat has only short hairs and a smooth, textured coat. Cat tail hair is usually less than 1½" in length.
- 19) Kittens will not be divided into short and long hair classes.
- 20) 4-H'ers should dress appropriately for the show. Appropriate dress includes being neat and clean, no midriff showing, no shoulders showing, and no commercial advertisements at the time of show.
- 21) 4-H Exhibitors must provide appropriate draping whether or not they are entered in the cage decorating class, to prevent cats from coming in contact with one another. This procedure helps to prevent the spread of air borne disease for sneezes or Male/Female attraction.

SHOWMANSHIP RULES AND GUIDELINES:

Junior – Grades 3, 4, 5 on January 1 of current year Intermediate – Grades 6, 7, 8 on January 1 of current year Senior – Grades 9, 10, 11, 12 on January 1 of current year

- 1) Showmanship will be presented in three parts.
 - a) A 20 question written test.
 - b) Identification of cat parts.
 - c) Interview and handling as assessed by the Cat judge.
- 2) Reference materials may not be used during the activity by participants.
- 3) Possible questions and answers, showing guidelines, and a cat parts identification sheet will be furnished to each exhibitor prior to the Cass County fair.
- 4) A Champion will be chosen for each grade group Junior, Intermediate, and Senior. Honor group ribbons will be awarded as merited.



CAGE DECORATING RULES AND GUIDELINES:

One Champion and one Reserve Champion will be awarded for cage decorating regardless of grade. Honor Group ribbons will be awarded as merited.

- Cat cage decorating is an optional activity. 4-H Exhibitors must provide appropriate draping whether
 or not they are entered in the cage decorating class, to prevent cats from coming in contact with one
 another. This procedure helps to prevent the spread of air borne disease from sneezes or
 Male/Female attraction.
- 2) The single cat cage measures 22" H X 22" D X 25 1/2" W.
- 3) The following judging criteria will be used to evaluate each entry:
 - a) color coordination
 - b) originality and imagination
 - c) are the two sides, top, and back appropriately covered? (Front of cage should not be covered.)
 - d) Health and safety of the 4-H Cat (to include water dish, litter, and food with appropriate continuation of theme).

NOTE: 4-H Cat cages are decorated and displayed sitting on tables.

4-Her's who wish to enter/register for the State Fair 4-H Cat Show should consult the State Fair 4-H/FFA handbook (when available at the Extension Office) as to the times rule guidelines for the Cat Show that is held in the Farm Bureau Auditorium. You must bring a completed copy of the "2021 Certificate of Vaccination for the 4-H Cat Project," 4-H 777. ENTRY DEADLINE – JULY 1.



"MINI 4-H CAT"

CURRICULUM - Mini 4-H Cat Manual/Record Sheet.

GENERAL MINI 4-H RULES:

- 1. You must be in the 1st or 2nd grade at the time you sign up for this project.
- 2. You must enroll in the Mini 4-H Cat project.
- 3. Your Mini 4-H project will receive a Mini 4-H ribbon at project judging.
- 4. Be sure to check out the Indiana State Fair 4-H Cat Show. When in the 3rd grade as a 4-H Cat member, you will be eligible to exhibit in the 4-H Cat classes at the Indiana State Fair.
- Your Mini 4-H Cat exhibit can be either a cat that is shown in a special class for Mini 4-H'ers OR
 a Mini 4-H Cat Poster that will be checked in and judged on Saturday before the fair in the 4-H
 Community Center.
- 6. Each Mini 4-H member may show his or her own cat or the family cat.
- 7. For show:
 - a. Cats need to have either a collar or harness AND a leash.
 - b. Cats should be brought to and from the fair in a cage or carrier. Inexpensive, sturdy cardboard carriers are available from your local veterinarian or a pet store.
- 8. Your cat needs to have proper vaccinations. All cats are required to have had feline panleukemia; feline rhinotracheitis; calcivirus and test negative for feline leukemia. All cats over 3 months of age must be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed, accredited veterinarian. If cats do not have proof of inoculations on day of show, they will not be allowed to participate in the show. Therefore the mini 4-H'er needs to bring the "Certificate of Vaccination for the 4-H Cat Project" (4-H 777) with their cat on show day. A licensed veterinarian must complete this form and sign it.

EXHIBIT AND COMPLETION GUIDELINES FOR MINI 4-H CAT PROJECT:

- 1. Complete the Mini 4-H Cat record sheet and turn it in at the 4-H Cat Show judging.
- 2. Bring your cat, certified vaccination form, and completed Mini 4-H record sheet (included in this manual) with you to the Cass County 4-H Cat Show. (optional)

OR

Bring your Mini 4-H Cat Poster and completed Mini 4-H record sheet to the 4-H judging on Saturday before the fair. The poster must be displayed horizontally, 14" X 22", mounted on firm backing, covered in clear plastic and exhibit label in the lower right hand corner. Your poster topic can be about you and your cat or any topic about cats. (optional)

LLAMA GUIDELINES:

1. 4-H members may own or lease a Lama.

- 2. Llama animals must be enrolled **ON-LINE** by May 15th.
- 3. In Cass County, both llamas and alpacas may be entered and exhibited in the Llama project.
- 4. Llamas must be checked in on Monday of the fair from 5 a.m. to 10 a.m. A committee member must be present to unload animals.
- 5. Llama Show will be Monday of the fair at 5 p.m.
- 6. Costume and Leaping Llama Class on Wednesday of the fair at 6 p.m.
- 7. For safety precautions, no intact male llamas over 24 months of age will be allowed. Only llamas more than 5 months of age may be shown.
- 8. Llamas need not be registered to show in Cass County.
- 9. One 4-H'er may show 2 Llamas, but only one per class.

Example: Llama A – Showmanship and Pack class.

Llama B - Obstacle class and Public Relations class.

- 10. A llama can only be shown by one 4-H member.
- 11. Appropriate clothing, jewelry and shoes must be worn in the exhibition area for your safety at the discretion of the committee. Showmanship dress will be black pants and white shirt, closed shoes or boots. No t-shirts or tank tops. No advertising or herd names on shirts.
- 12. While on the fairgrounds, llamas must be kept near the llama exhibition area. No walking of llamas in heavily populated areas or near food stands.
- 13. Llamas must be treated in a humane manner.
- 14. 4-H Llama show will be Monday of the fair at 5:00 p.m. There will be two show rings with two judges simultaneously.
- 15. Completed record sheets must be turned in by NOON on Monday of the fair.
- 16. All 4-H'ers must clean out their own pens at the end of the fair. With the new lime in the building, bedding cannot be pushed out.
- 17. Classes are subject to change per committee.



"LLAMA" - CONTINUED

LLAMA CLASSES:

❖ Showmanship – Member demonstrates the ability to show his/her animal to its best advantage at halter. Judging is based on the exhibitor's basic skill in fitting, grooming, following directions, and style of presenting the animal to the judge for evaluation.

Master - Any previous Senior showmanship winner is eligible.

Senior – Grades 9-12 and previous Intermediate winners.

Intermediate – Grades 6-8 and previous Junior winners.

Junior - Grades 3-5

NOTE – When the 4-H Showman has won a showmanship class they MUST move to the next showmanship class the next year (not in the same year) – EXCEPTION – if the member wins Senior Showmanship, he/she will automatically move up into Master Showmanship division for the Master Competition, in the current year.

❖ Pack – Member and animal are judged on their ability to negotiate obstacles and perform activities in the back country while carrying a pack.

Senior – Grades 9-12.

Intermediate – Grades 6-8.

Junior – Grades 3-5.

❖ Obstacle – Member and animal are judged on their ability to negotiate obstacles.

Senior – Grades 9-12.

Intermediate - Grades 6-8.

<u>Junior</u> – Grades 3-5.

❖ Costumes – The 4-H'er decides on a theme and dresses him/herself and the llama to illustrate the chosen theme. Member and animal are judged on originality, difficulty in training animal to accept and exhibit costume, and suitability to theme (exhibitor's choice). Exhibitors must submit a one (1) minute narrative to be read during their performance.

Senior – Grades 9-12.

Intermediate – Grades 6-8.

Junior – Grades 3-5.

- Public Relations Member and animal are judged on their ability to negotiate obstacles and perform activities in the community.
- ❖ Leaping Llama Senior Grades 9-12. Intermediate Grades 6-8. Junior Grades 3-5.
- ❖ Mini 4-H first and second grade 4-H Llama members.

<u>TROPHIES</u> – will be awarded for 3 showmanship classes, and 3 overall Champions: Senior, Intermediate and Junior. Scores of the other classes will be added to get the top score person. In case of a tie a tiebreaker will be points for meetings, workshops training. Master Showman – trophy and sweatshirt.

"LLAMA PARTNERSHIP"

CASS COUNTY IS OFFERING A LLAMA AND ALPACA PARTNERSHIP FOR 4-H'ERS WHO NOT NORMALLY CONSIDER THE LLAMA AND ALPACA PROJECT. THE PURPOSE OF THE ADDITIONAL PROJECT IS TO INVOLVE NEW 4-H MEMBERS WITH HANDS ON EXPERIENCE TO THE LLAMA INDUSTRY.

Basically explained the 4-H'er does not house or keep in his possession during the calendar year the animals he/she would enroll in the lama project. Instead, they create a working relationship with a Cass County Llama Farmer who wishes to participate with the 4-H'er and abide by guidelines set up by the Cass County Llama Partnership Contract.

Guidelines:

- ♦ any 4-H'er is eligible.
- ♦ Llama leased animals can show in the following classes: SHOWMANSHIP, PACK, OBSTACLE, COSTUMES. AND PUBLIC RELATIONS.
- ◆ Classes are subject to change per committee.
- ♦ Ownership stays with the Llama Farmer as the animal is used for 4-H educational purposes only.
- ♦ Experience is the best teacher, therefore, further agreements between the farmer and the 4-H'er may be considered.
- ♦ Six weeks before the CASS COUNTY 4-H FAIR, the 4-H'er must visit the Farmer Farm at least once a week to work with the animal for at least one hour.
- ♦ 4-H'er provides the equipment pertaining to working with the animal at the farm and the show, including shearing expense.
- ♦ the farmer provides housing and care for the animal until fair time, then the responsibility for the animals care is transferred to the 4-H'er.
- ♦ the small \$75.00 fee paid by the 4-H'er to the farmer covers cost of transporting to and from workshops and to and from the fair. This is to be paid at the signing of the lease.
- ♦ all Llama rules in the handbook still apply including enrollment dates, checking in and out of the 4-H fairgrounds.
- contact the Llama Leaders for a partnership agreement.

We, the Llama committee invite any and all 4-H'ers to consider this project, remembering, first of all that every project encounters work and effort. Secondly, it is the farmer that is offering his animal for your experience, so treat with respect, both the farmer and his animals.



"MINI LLAMA"

Welcome to the Mini 4-H Llama Project. This project is designed to introduce you to the world of llamas. You do not need to own a llama or even live on a farm to take this project.

CURRICULUM - Mini 4-H Llama Manual/Record Sheet.

GENERAL MINI 4-H RULES:

- 1. You must be in the 1st or 2nd grade at the time you sign up for this project.
- 2. You must enroll in the Mini 4-H Llama project.
- 3. Complete the mini 4-H Llama enrollment form by May 15th. (This will be sent to each member who enrolls in Mini 4-H Llama in April.)
- 4. As you exhibit your mini 4-H Llama animal (that belongs to a regular 4-H member), you will receive a mini 4-H ribbon.
- 5. Be sure to check out the Indiana State Fair 4-H Llama Show.
- 6. You are encouraged to attend 4-H Club meetings and/or project workshops.

ACTIVITIES TO COMPLETE:

- ♦ ALL POSTERS must be displayed horizontally, 22" X 28", mounted on firm backing, covered in clear plastic and exhibit label in lower right hand corner.
- ♦ All posters, notebooks, and display boards **MUST** include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.
- Rockets may be exhibited with a base, but launch pads are not permitted. All rockets must weigh less than 3.3 pounds and considered an amateur rocket according to FAA regulations.
- Remote control aircraft or drones may be constructed from a kit or purchased ready to fly.

EXHIBIT:

Level 1 - Grades 3, 4, & 5 -

- Rocket of your choice, Estes Skills Level 1, 2 or comparable difficulty
- A poster or display board on any topic in the manual (for example: construct a paper airplane with a poster board explaining why you designed it the way you did).
- A remote control aircraft or drone of your choice that is age/grade appropriate and compliant with FAA regulations, federal and state laws, and local ordinances. This exhibit choice is to include a notebook or poster including how the aircraft/drone was used and aerospace skills learned. Displaying the aircraft or drone is optional.

STATE FAIR: We can send one rocket, one remote control aircraft, or drone and one poster/display board in each grade category. Therefore, we can send a maximum of six exhibits to the state fair - 3 rockets, remote control aircrafts, or drones and 3 poster/display boards.

"ARTS AND CRAFTS" - State Fair Exhibit

EXHIBIT DUE AT THE 4-H COMMUNITY CENTER, SATURDAY, JUNE 26TH, between 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.

- Each item exhibited in Arts and Crafts must be labeled with name, grade, division, category and a summary of what you did on this project. A card will be provided to you by the Extension Office for this purpose or print from the website.
- There is no limit on the number of craft exhibits a 4-H member may enter, but no more than one entry per craft category.
- All exhibits must be accompanied by a completed record sheet.
- Each article will be given a ribbon of its own merit. A champion and reserve champion will be awarded in each category but that does not mean it will automatically go to state fair **SEE BELOW**.

12 STATE FAIR ENTRIES WILL BE SELECTED FROM CRAFTS

- The craft program was NOT SET UP TO BE "typical", but to encourage imagination and artistic abilities. Judging should be accomplished by grade comparison and work involvement, rather than the actual project itself.

"ARTS AND CRAFTS" - continued

- FINE ARTS Oil, charcoal, pastels, pencil (including colored), ink, acrylic or watercolor on canvas, canvas board or paper framed as a picture prepared for hanging. "Pop tabs" are not acceptable. Canvas art on a wooden frame is considered prepared for hanging provided that frame has a hanger. Matting without a frame is not accepted. No glass painting.
- 2. <u>NEEDLECRAFT</u> (hand work) Knitting, embroidery, crocheting, needlepoint, crewel, candle wicking, chicken scratching, hand quilting, tatting, huck weaving, hemstitching; also pulled, drawn and counted thread work and punch needlework. Does not include latch hook, plastic canvas, machine knitting, machine quilting, or arm knitting/crocheting. If a hanging item it should be ready to hang. "Pop tabs" are not acceptable.
- 3. BASIC CRAFTS Includes wood, reed, leather, metal, enameling and ceramics.
- 4. <u>MISCELLANEOUS</u> All other crafts not suitable for any other category. Includes latch hook, scratch art, 3 D's, macramé and plastic canvas needlepoint.
- 5. MODEL CRAFT The project member will learn assembly, painting, design, construction techniques and also become familiar with the technical terms and vocabulary associated with the representing model.

Exhibits must be a small scale replica and meet the following criteria:

- ★If the model is being built from a kit, include a copy of the instructions with the craft information card.
- ★ Must be of injected styrene plastics
- ★ At least 25% of the exhibit must be painted
- ★ Wood, paper, clay, die-cast, or snap together models are not permitted
- ★ Screws are not permitted
- ★ Pre-painted or pre-decaled factory models are not permitted

NOTE: Definition of **CUSTOMIZE**: Construction of model parts by the 4-H member themselves.

Level 1 (Grades 3-5) – Members are to assemble a simple airplane, car, boat, spaceship, building, or animal made out of plastic. Use only the parts furnished in the simple model kit. Don't use any model kits lower than a "Level 2". Decals may be applied to the model if they are supplied with the model kit. DO NOT DO ANY PAINTING OR CUSTOMIZING OF YOUR MODEL. *Snap together and die cast models ARE NOT permitted.

EXHIBIT:

- 1. One completed model (DO NOT PAINT OR CUSTOMIZE).
- 2. Turn in completed record sheet.
- 3. Attach a craft card to the exhibit describing the project.
- Level 2 (Grades 6-8) Members are to assemble an airplane, boat, car, spaceship, building or animal made out of plastic. The model should be more complex in design that that assembled in Beginner. Use only the parts furnished in the model kit. Paint the exterior of the model but <u>DO NOT CUSTOMIZE THE CONSTRUCTION.</u> *Snap together and die cast models ARE NOT permitted.

EXHIBIT:

- 1. One completed model (DO NOT CUSTOMIZE).
- 2. Turn in completed record sheet.
- 3. Attach a craft card to the exhibit describing the project.
- Level 3 (Grades 9-12) Customized, original and model collections! Members have several options in this advanced division. Note Snap together and die cast models ARE NOT permitted.

Choose one of the following to exhibit:

- **A.** <u>Customized Model</u> Members are to assemble a customized model of their own choice. Project members are to make some parts of their model other than those which are included in the kit. All parts of the model must be painted.
- **B.** Original Model Design and build an original model made of any material desired. THIS IS NOT TO BE A KIT. Dioramas would be included in this category.

C. <u>Collection of Models</u> – Assemble a collection of three (3) customized models of similar type. Example 3 customized cars, or 3 airplanes, or 3 ships etc.

OR

Assemble a collection of three (3) customized models each made from different materials. **EXHIBIT:**

- One completed customized model <u>or</u> an original model <u>or</u> a collection of three (3) customized models.
- 2. Turn in a completed record sheet.
- 3. Attach a craft card to the exhibit describing how you customized or designed the model.

*MODELS NEED TO BE DISPLAYED ON A SOLID NON-FLEXIBLE BASE SUCH AS PLYWOOD OR HEAVY PLASTIC TO PROVIDE STURDINESS FOR THE EXHIBIT. (Do not permanently attach to base as the judge will want to pick up and view parts of the model.



6. <u>LEGO - Type Model</u> - All exhibits in this project must be of "free design" or "original design." NO KITS ALLOWED, create your own design. **THERE IS TO BE NO GLUING OF BLOCKS TOGETHER OR PAINTING OF ANY BLOCKS. LIMITED TO 24" X 24" X 36".** These measurements can be any direction (Height, Width, or Length). For example, the 36" measurement could be the height for a taller exhibit or the width. **NO K'NEX will be allowed in the project.**



- ♣ <u>Level 1-Grade 3, 4, & 5</u>—<u>Exhibit only one (1) item.</u> Build a "fictional" character or "thing." Examples: an animal, a person, a statue, a totem pole, etc. (No vehicles or structures – these are exhibited in the Intermediate division.) Turn in a completed record sheet. (No multiple exhibits put into one.)
- ❖ <u>Level 2-Grades 6, 7, & 8--Exhibit only one (1) item.</u> Build a structure (only one) such as a house, skyscraper, a barn, any type of building or some type of vehicle such as a car, truck, plane, tractor, farm implement, boat, etc. (no multiples). Turn in a completed record sheet.
- ❖ <u>Level 3-Grades 9, 10, 11 & 12--Exhibit only two (2) items.</u> Build and exhibit two of any related objects (new exhibits) from either Beginner or Intermediate. Examples could be two animals, two statues, two cars, etc. Motorized parts may be used in this division. Turn in a completed record sheet.

*LEGO'S NEED TO BE DISPLAYED ON A SOLID NON-FLEXIBLE BASE SUCH AS PLYWOOD, FOAM BOARD, ETC. TO PROVIDE STURDINESS FOR THE EXHIBIT. LEGO – ONLY BASE – NOT ACCEPTED (TOO FLEXIBLE). THEY MUST STAY WITHIN THE SIZE REQUIREMENTS OF THE PROJECT. (Bases need to be neat looking as to enhance the appearance of your project.

 HOLIDAY CRAFT – Holiday craft is a way of using your creative talents and imagination to make something for any possible occasion or holiday you can think of. Examples of holidays or occasions include but not limited to: New Years, Christmas, Easter, Halloween, Thanksgiving/Fall, Fourth of July, Valentines Day, Memorial Day, St. Patrick's Day, Public Occasions such as Festivals, Religious Celebrations, Patriotic Days, Bridal Showers, Weddings, Anniversaries, etc. Exhibit – (include 1, 2, 3 from Holiday Craft manual.)

"BEEKEEPING" - State Fair Exhibit

EXHIBIT DUE AT THE 4-H COMMUNITY CENTER, SATURDAY, JUNE 26TH, between 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. Turn in a completed record sheet with your project.

This project is for boys and girls interested in modern methods of beekeeping. You will study the fundamentals of beekeeping and management of honey.

- ❖ ALL POSTERS must be displayed horizontally, 22" X 28", mounted on firm backing, covered in clear plastic and exhibit label in lower right hand corner. Choose one of the topics listed below for your poster and use that topic for your exhibit title. You can also use a creative sub-title if you wish.
- All posters, notebooks, and display boards <u>MUST</u> include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc.



"BEEKEEPING" - continued

It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.

Notes:

- There are no age specifications for beekeeping exhibits.
- No bee hives may be brought to the state fair.
- Honey water content will be measured.
- Fill level: the honey should be filled to the jar shoulder, not over, nor under.
- Chunk honey should go in a wide-mouth jar, preferably one specially made for chunk honey (see beekeeping catalogs).
- ❖ Be careful to distinguish "chunk honey" (comb in jar) from "cut comb" (comb only in box).
- Honey (including chunk, cut comb and comb) must be collected since the previous county fair.

Division I – May do 1 to 2 years – *Present one of the following topics on a poster, as specified above.*

- 1) Flowers Used To Make Honey display pressed flowers from 10 different Indiana plants that bees use for making honey.
- 2) Uses of Honey and Beeswax.
- 3) Setting up a Bee Hive.
- 4) Safe Handling of Bees.
- 5) Any other Beekeeping related topic.

★Curriculum -Beekeeping 1 Manual (4-H-571-W) Understanding the Honey Bee General Record Sheet



- 1) Extracted honey 2 one pound jars, shown in glass or clear plastic, screw-top jars holding one pound of honey each.
- 2) Chunk honey (comb in jar) 2 one-pound jars (wide-mouth glass or clear plastic).
- 3) Cut-comb honey 2 one pound boxes (this is usually a clear plastic box about 4 ½" X 4 ½"). You will learn about the basic care of a bee hive. You will carry out basic beekeeping operations that result in the production of extracted, chunk, or cut comb honey.
- 4) Working with Honey Bees Present a topic from your manual to teach fairgoers about working with honey bees. Use your knowledge and creativity to display this information on a poster or in a notebook.

★Curriculum - Beekeeping 2 Manual (4-H-586-W) Working With Honey Bees General Record Sheet

Division III and Above – May do multiple years – Exhibit two of the four kinds of honey listed below:

- 1) Extracted Honey 2 one-pound jars (glass or clear plastic).
- 2) Chunk Honey (comb in jar) 2 one-pound jars (wide-mouth glass or clear plastic).
- 3) Cut-comb Honey 2 one-pound boxes. Boxes are usually 4 1/2" x 4 1/2".
- 4) Comb Honey 2 sections (honey built by bees in frames of wood commonly called "sections." Boxes are usually 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " X 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ " in size).
- 5) Prepare an educational display about honey bees or beekeeping.

COUNTY BIKE RODEO: DATE TO BE ANNOUNCED

Exhibit Introduction

The cake decorating subject provides skills-based educational experiences that provide an opportunity for mastery before building on that experience to develop more advanced skills. This subject area is divided into three levels: Beginner (Grades 3-5), Intermediate (Grades 6-8), and Advanced (Grades 9-12). While the defined grades are intended to be a guide, older youth enrolled in this subject for the first time may start in a lower grade skill level with permission by the county extension educator, followed by the appropriate level the following year.

Skills and techniques demonstrated should be age/grade appropriate. While it is not to say a beginner level member cannot master an advanced level skill, it would be rare and unique. Therefore, exhibited cakes must demonstrate the minimum five techniques from their given level outlined in Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills and Techniques, 4-H 710A, but may also include higher/lower level techniques that have been mastered. Any higher/lower level techniques will not be counted as part of the minimum five, but nevertheless will be evaluated for quality. All exhibited cakes must be created using a Styrofoam, foam, or other solid dummy. Unless specified otherwise, cakes are to be iced using Royal icing or buttercream. Youth may practice skills using buttercream, but this type of icing will not withstand environmental conditions when being displayed an extended period of time. When displaying a cut-up cake or tiered cake, the exhibitor must include a diagram and description indicating how the cake was assembled. This diagram and description can be attached to or written on the skills sheet. All exhibits must include a completed Cake Decorating Skills Sheet (4-H 710). This sheet may be attached to the cake board.

"CAKE DECORATING" — continued

Beginner Level (Grades 3-5)

Cakes must be on a cake board approximately 3/8" thick and 2"-4" larger than the cake. For example, if the cake is 8" in diameter, then the cake board must be 10"-12" in diameter. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath. Cakes exhibited in the beginner level are to be a single tier/layer, no more than 5" tall, and may be round, square, or rectangular and the cake board is to be no more than 12"x12". A minimum of **five** beginner skills are to be demonstrated. A list of skills to choose from can be found on the Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills and Techniques, 4-H 710A sheet

Intermediate Level (Grads 6-8)

Cakes must be on a cake board approximately 3/8" thick and 2"-4" larger than the cake. For example, if the cake is 9"x13" rectangular, then the cake board must be 11"x15" to 13"x17" rectangular. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath. Cakes exhibited in the intermediate level are to be a single or double tier/layer, no more than 12" tall and may be any shape. Youth may choose to decorate an inverted (upside down) character pan, create a 3-dimensional cake. It is also permissible to cut-up pieces of Styrofoam, foam, or other solid material to create a new shape, like a butterfly or castle for example. The cake board is to be no more than 24"x24". A minimum of **five** intermediate level skills are to be demonstrated and the cake may include additional skills from the beginner level. A list of skills to choose from can be found on the Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills and Techniques, 4-H 710A sheet.

Advanced Level (Grades 9-12)

Cakes must be on a cake a cake board approximately ½" thick and 4" larger than the base cake. For example, if the cake is 26" in diameter, then the cake board must be 30" in diameter. The cake board must be neatly covered and well taped or otherwise attached underneath. Cakes exhibited in the advanced level may be multiple layer and/or tiered and may include multiple cakes, like a wedding cake. Youth may choose to create a character or 3-dimensional cake by cutting-up pieces of Styrofoam, foam, or other solid material to create a new shape. Dowel rods, plates, etc. should be used to support multiple layers and tiers. Fondant icing, gum, and sugar paste is permissible. Cakes may be any shape, no more than 36" tall and the cake board is to be no more than 36"x36". A minimum of **five** advanced level skills are to be demonstrated and the cake may include additional skills from the beginner and intermediate levels. A list of skills to choose from can be found on the Indiana 4-H Cake Decorating Skills and Techniques, 4-H 710A sheet.



- **1. Prose:** Exhibit is a story (fiction or nonfiction), autobiography, biography, essay, journal, short stories, or any other prose piece and a record sheet.
- 2. Poetry: Exhibit is a poem(s) and a record sheet. (Include what type or kind of poetry.)
- 3. Children's Story: Exhibit is a story written specifically for young children including illustrations and a record sheet.

GENERAL GUIDELINES:

1. Members will enroll in this project by the grade level they were in on January 1 of the current year.

Level 1 - Grades 3-5

Level 2 - Grades 6-8

Level 3 – Grades 9-12

- 2. Only one entry or exhibit is required to complete the Creative Writing project. However, 4-H members may choose to have an entry in each of the following 3 Project Categories: Prose, Poetry, or Children's Story.
- 3. All entries are to be handwritten neatly in ink or typed. Typed entries should be double-spaced using basic font and at least 12 points.
- 4. Children's stories must include illustrations. (See manual for suggestions.) Illustrations are <u>not</u> required for Prose or Poetry entries but are permitted to enhance your exhibit.
- All entries must have been written since the previous year's county fair. All entries must be the
 exclusive work of the 4-H member, NO group projects or collaborations should be submitted for
 judging.
- 6. Each entry is to have a **title page** with the following information: Title, Author, Date, Project Category, Grade in School (just completed), and 4-H Club. See sample in the manual.
- 7. Each entry is to be bound to keep it neat and clean during judging and display at the 4-H Fair. Use any type of three-pronged folder or school report cover available at most department stores. You may decorate the cover, or use a report binder with a plastic front so your title page shows through.
- 8. Neatness counts. Be sure your project is clean, neat, and organized.
- 9. Use any tools available to you to present your exhibit in the best possible way. However, don't neglect the most important part of this project..."Creative Writing." The development of your subject into a poem or story, the creative way you express yourself, and the proper grammatical use of words, are more important to judge than computer printing and expensive laminating and bindings. Make sure you concentrate on the project, before the presentation of it.
- 10. Be sure to site sources used in a "Works Cited" bibliography when quotes, facts, or research information is used in your writing. This follows Copyright Law. An exhibit will be given a lower grade ribbon if a bibliography is not provided and quotes, facts or research is included in their work.
- 11. Double check the order of the paper in your binder.
 - a. Title Page (required)
 - b. Your writing project (required)
 - c. Bibliography (give credit to sources only if you researched)



- 1. The 4-H'er must complete three activities from the Entomology manual before the Fair. At least two of these must be from the "Required Activities" section. The other one can be a required or an optional activity. Different activities must be completed each year. This manual MUST be turned in with the Entomology project.
- 2. A county name label must go in the lower right corner of the display box or the educational poster. On the display box it can go on the glass/plexiglass or on the floor of the box.
- 3. Members may choose to do one or two of the following: a collection, an educational poster.

COLLECTION –Youth in *Grades 3-5* must display their insects in one (1) collection box, members in *Grades 6-8* may use two (2) collection boxes, and youth in *Grades 9-12* may use up to three (3) collection boxes plus one (1) educational box. Educational boxes are in addition to the insect boxes. All insects should be labeled with their common name.

Title

Collection – Insect Collection, Grade X (where X = your grade in school) **Poster** – Choose one of the topics listed below, appropriate for your grade in school, and <u>use that topic for your exhibit title.</u>

Orders:

Use the orders listed in the reference material (above), which are found on page 57 in ID-401 and the Table of Contents in 4-H-764.

• Display:

Collect, mount (pins or vials), and identify insects personally collected in the U.S. only. Display your best specimens in an 18 x 24 inch box(es), orientated horizontally. When multiple boxes are used: list the box order (i.e. "box 1 of 3 boxes") and include your name in each box.

ID 401 A-F cards (for grades 3-8) and 401-I cards (for grades 9 - 12) are to be placed inside the display box in an attractive manner.

Identification:

Collection display boxes are expected to contain the specified number of insects, families, and orders specified (see chart below).

All insects must be in the adult stage and be properly mounted on insect pins or be contained in vials as directed.

Pin Labels: Each pin or vial must contain two labels:

- 1) Top label is to include collection date, location, and collector name.
- 2) Bottom label is to include common name and other optional identification data

Box Labels: Box labels (computer generated or neatly printed) are used for orders and families as

Required (see chart below) and are to be placed flat against the bottom of the box. Insects must be

properly grouped directly under the correct order and family box label. For example, all insects belonging to a particular order must be placed under that order label. Orders to be used are listed in

the reference book ID- 401. If family level identification is required, the insects should be further grouped together under that family label.

Educational Box:

One additional box (educational), based on the specific theme (see chart below), is required for Grades 9-12, in addition to the insect collection boxes. This box can be created in any manner chosen (without the mounting, pinning or identifying restrictions specified above).

Entomology Level 1: Grades 3-5

Display a poster based on the following activities:

- ❖ <u>Big Mouth Bugs</u> -- Show the four (4) different mouth types that you studied. Create a chart listing the four(4) mouth types, an insect with this mouth type, food they eat, and where these insects might be found.
- <u>Pit Stop</u> -- Make two pit traps and use them to collect insects. Exhibit your completed record sheet. You can use the format given for your data collection, or make your own. Include some of the insects, or pictures of your trap and insects collected.
- ❖ <u>Buz-z-zing Around</u> -- Present three to five ways that insects communicate. Include an insect, or picture of each insect that communicates in each of the ways you are describing.
- * FACETnating! -- Show how insects see (compound eyes) and explain how they see colors.
- Ants and Uncles -- Compare insects with their non-insect relatives by completing the chart in your book (copy or make your own). Include some of the insects and their non-insect relatives, or pictures of them, on your poster.
- Chirp, Chirp Watch and listen to the crickets for five minutes, three times a day, for three days. Include day and night observations. Record what you see and hear.

Entomology Level 2: Grades 6-8

Display a poster based on the following activities:

- Collecting Insects -- Use two of the insect collecting traps described in Activity 2 (Berlese Funnel, Indoor Insect Trap), Activity 3 (Modified Wilkinson Trap), Activity 4 (Fruit Bait), or Activity 5 (Light Attractor) to collect insects. Exhibit a picture of your traps and an Insect Collection Data Chart that gives the trap location (for example, in the basement or in the back yard), date collected, and insects collected.
- Spread Your Wings and Fly -- Make and use a spreading board. Exhibit two pictures of your spreading board and three butterflies or moths that you prepared using your board.
- ❖ Insect Experiments -- Complete one of the following activities: Activity 8 (Color My World), Activity 9 (Sowbug Investigations), or Activity 10 (Life's Stages). Exhibit your data sheet and answers to the "Talk It Over" questions. For activities 8 and 9 include your hypothesis and a conclusive statement about your hypothesis (indicate if it was proved or disproved).
- Invasive Species Investigations -- Create an informational exhibit about one (Indiana) invasive insect. Include the information requested in the activity for this insect (first eight (8) questions on page 29).
- ❖ A Sticky Situation --Make and use sticky traps for four weeks as described in Activity 13. Exhibit your data sheet and the answers to "Talk It Over" questions.
- ❖ Footprint Clues -- Study the tracks of 3 different species of insect and one arthropod as described in Activity 14. Exhibit your data sheet and the answers to "Talk It Over" questions.



Entomology Level 3: Grades 9-12

Display a poster based on the following activities:

- **The Scientific Method** Use the scientific method to complete one of the problems listed in Activity 3. Describe what you did to complete the five scientific method steps and include your data and drawings or pictures of your experiment.
- **Transecting for Insects** Compare three habitats using the scientific method to determine which one has the most terrestrial insect activity. Display your transect data sheet for each habitat and answer the "Talk It Over" questions.
- Please Drop In -- Create your own hypothesis and collect insects in five pitfall traps to prove or disprove your hypothesis, as described in Activity 7. Display how you completed your experiment (including each step in the scientific method) and your data for each habitat.
- Aliens Among Us -- Complete the "Natives vs Non-natives Survey Data Sheet" by checking two boxes (Native or non-native and damage or no damage) for five native and five non-native insects as shown in Activity 9. Answer the "Talk It Over" questions.
- **IMP** -- Learning and Teaching Make an informational flier and use it to teach younger 4-H members about five insect pests that might be found in a home or school in your county. Exhibit your flier, lesson plan, and photograph of you teaching. Answer the "Talk It Over" guestions.
- **Meal from a Worm** -- Use the scientific method to study how mealworm larvae grow. Include your hypothesis, data charts, and conclusions. Answer the "Talk It Over" questions.

Level: Independent Study: Grades 9-12 (One State Fair Entry)

- Advanced topic -- Learn all you can about a topic of your choice and present it on a poster or in an entomology box. Include a short manuscript, pictures, graphs, and list the works cited to describe what you did and what you learned. Title your poster, "Advanced Entomology Independent Study"
- Mentoring -- Exhibit a poster that shows how you mentored a younger 4-H member. Include your planning, the time you spent, the challenges and advantages of mentoring, and how the experience might be useful in your life. Photographs and other documentation are encouraged. Title your poster, "Advanced Entomology Mentor".

AREAS FOR CONSIDERATION:

- 1) State Fair entries one collection and one poster for each level.
- 2) Manuals say that 7 activities are required to be completed each year. In Cass County we are going to keep everything consistent with the other projects and require only <u>3 activities</u>.
- 3) There are no additional record sheets required.



"4-H FASHION REVUE" - State Fair Exhibit

(For "Wearable" sewn items)

Fashion revue provides an opportunity for youth to model the outfit constructed in the 4-H sewing project. Fashion revue is limited to youth in grades 8-12. All articles modeled in Fashion Revue must have been constructed by the 4-H member modeling that same garment or outfit. Youth qualifying to exhibit the same garment or outfit in Indiana State Fair Sewing and Fashion Revue must choose which project they wish to participate as one cannot exhibit the same garment or outfit in both projects at state fair.

<u>JUNIOR DIVISION</u> - Members in 3rd to 7th grade <u>SENIOR DIVISION</u> - Members in the 8th to 12th grade as of January 1, of current year and members 15 years and over have to be in senior division.

• See page 19 for Fashion Revue Judging date and details.

SENIOR DIVISION WILL NOT BE JUDGED OR INTRODUCED BY DIVISION BUT WILL MODEL AND BE JUDGED ACCORDING TO THE STATE FAIR CATEGORIES

** The 4-H'er must choose which category her/his garment will be judged in by the definition of the outfit.

FOR PARTICIPATION IN THE STATE FASHION REVUE: A PARTICIPANT MUST BE A 4-H MEMBER IN GRADES 8 – 12 OF THE CURRENT ACADEMIC YEAR.

*Champion and Reserve Champion Fashion Revue Ribbons will be awarded to ALL division winners and to fashion revue category winners.

- 1) Garments designated as state fair entries representing Cass County in the six fashion revue categories are eligible to be reconsidered (judged) with garments which are being judged on the basis of their construction.
- 2) Each county can send six participants to the State 4-H Fashion Revue (maximum two per category). On the county level, if there are no entries in a category, counties may send a second participant to the State Fashion Revue from another category.
- 3) For fashion revue, advise 4-H'ers to dress suitably as to shoes, hats and gloves, as well as purse and jewelry. Better to be underdressed as to accessories than overdressed.
- 4) Any one garment may be worn in only one category; however, other garments would be eligible for other categories as desired in fashion revue.

*NOTE – THE 4-H MEMBER MUST MODEL IN THE PUBLIC REVUE TO BE AWARDED A CHAMPION OR RESERVE CHAMPION IN THIS ACTIVITY.

**non-wearable sewing items – if a member chooses to model with a non-wearable item they have sewn, the judge will score the entry but no awards will be received for this category.

<u>JUNIORS</u> – Participants must be judged in construction with their Sewing project in order to participate in 4-H Fashion Revue.

<u>SENIORS</u> – At least one outfit must be judged for construction to be eligible for modeling in 4-H Fashion Revue



FASHION REVUE CLASSIFICATIONS "STATE FAIR"

HANDCRAFTED GARMENTS SHOULD BE MODELED IN THE APPROPRIATE CLASS

DEFINITION OF AN OUTFIT: An outfit is a garment or garments that when put together make a <u>complete look</u> - such as one or two piece dress, or one or two piece pant suit, or a three piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt.

- <u>Informal or Casual Wear:</u> A complete outfit of one or two pieces suitable for school, weekend, or casual informal activities.
- <u>Dress-up:</u> This is suitable for special, church, or social occasions which are not considered to be formal. It may be an outfit of one or more pieces with or without its own costume coat or jacket (lined or unlined). This is not an outfit which would be worn to school, weekend, or casual, informal activities.
- <u>Free Choice:</u> A complete outfit comprised of garments which do not fit in the other classifications. Examples include: tennis wear, swim wear, athletic or sportswear; lounge wear; riding habits; historic, dance, theatrical, or international costumes; capes and unlined coats.
- <u>Suit or Coat:</u> The suit consists of two pieces including a skirt or pants and its own lined jacket. It is not a dress with jacket as in "dress up wear." The coat is a separate lined coat for your wardrobe. It will be judged separately as a coat with its own accessories.
- <u>Separates:</u> Consists of three garments which must be worn as a coordinated complete outfit. Each piece should be versatile enough to be worn with other garments in your wardrobe.
- <u>Formal Wear:</u> This outfit may be one or more pieces suitable for any formal occasion, such as proms, weddings, and formal evening functions.

INTERPRETATION STATEMENTS:

A wrap (cape, coat, shawl, etc.) which would be worn during the entire formal occasion may be modeled in the formal category. If the wrap is designed to be worn only to and from the occasion, the total outfit can be modeled in free choice. However, if the formal or wrap is to be judged on its own merit, it should be placed in the appropriate category.

If a wedding outfit is considered a formal by the participant, it may be worn in the formal category. However, if the participant considers the outfit to be a costume, it may be worn in free choice.

"4-H MEMORY BOOK" - No State Fair Exhibit

<u>LEVEL 1</u> - Gr. 3, 4, & 5 <u>LEVEL 2</u> - Gr. 6, 7, & 8 <u>LEVEL 3</u> - Gr. 9, 10, 11 & 12

The purpose of this project is to encourage 4-H members to keep <u>accurate records of their projects</u> (<u>include current year's projects</u>), offices held, activities and any other awards, trinkets or potpourri related to 4-H. The object is not to collect the most materials and have the thickest 4-H Memory Book, but to develop a neatly organized and meaningful collection of your 4-H accomplishments and memories. Accomplishment listings will include leadership, citizenship and community service activities.

All 4-H Memory Books **MUST** contain at least one white "4-H Record of Achievement" sheet with both sides completed. If these sheets get full, more should be added. These white record sheets must be at the front of the 4-H Memory Book. See the 4-H Memory Book manual for all pages that must be included in the completed project. 4-H Memory Books can be any dimension or thickness. 4-H Memory Books should be able to come apart, so new pages can be added; **OR** they should have enough pages for additional years in 4-H. You could use an inexpensive three-ring binder to which pages may be added easily. Be sure to attach your 4-H exhibit label to the lower right hand corner of the notebook. All items in the 4-H Memory Book must be securely mounted and labeled. Pages do not need to be covered in plastic, unless the member desires to have them covered or wishes to protect very important items. Be sure to label the pictures. Be creative, imaginative, organized and neat. In return, you will be rewarded with a permanent record of your 4-H activities, which will bring years of memories and enjoyment.

"4-H MEMORY BOOK" - continued

NEW – Add a title page to your project notebook. This page will be exhibited at the fair. Include a picture of your choice (about you and 4-H), your name, grade and 4-H Club on this page.

* Please Note: This project is NOT the same as the "Theme Scrapbook" project.

Your exhibit is due at Community Judging, TUESDAY, JULY 6TH between 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. Judging will start at 9:00 a.m.

"FLORICULTURE" (Flowers) - State Fair Exhibit

Note to youth exhibitors:

Each Level (A, B, C, D) of the Floriculture project serves more than one grade. You should do a DIFFERENT activity and exhibit each year that you are in the project. For example, if in 3rd grade you display a simple bud vase (category 1), in 4th grade you should choose a poster/notebook option or flower/plant exhibit from categories 2-3.

You should pay special attention to size guidelines for Flower and Plant Exhibits. Instructions for exhibits and related activities can be found in the 4-H Floriculture student manuals (Levels A-D).

Notebook and poster guidelines:

All posters, notebooks, and display boards **MUST** include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H members exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.

Notebook Guidelines

- Needs to be a sturdy 3 ring binder (with stiff covers) or a bound type notebook (with stiff covers). No report covers or similar styles.
- Make sure the notebook accurately meets the guidelines and objectives of the activities in the manual.
- Information printed directly off the web will not be accepted.
- Materials included in the notebook need to be educational, both for the youth and the audience, and should demonstrate that the youth was able to take what he or she learned from their research (experiment, or on web, in library, etc) and/or activities to create the notebook.
- Work should include references where appropriate.
- Pictures, graphics, and artwork are encouraged.
- Include your 4-H exhibit label on the front of the notebook in the lower right hand corner.

Poster Guidelines

- Dimensions = 22" x 28" displayed horizontally with stiff backing and must be covered with clear plastic
- Identification included in the lower right corner County 4-H Exhibit Label.
- Poster should "tell a story" or be informative to the audience. Will the viewer of your poster learn something from the exhibit?
- When designing your poster you should consider: lines, shapes, textures, colors and placement of items.
- Pictures, graphics and artwork are encouraged.
- Make sure the poster accurately meets the guidelines and objectives of the activities in the manual.
- Information printed directly off the web will not be accepted.
- Materials included in the poster need to be educational, both for the youth and the audience, and should demonstrate that the youth was able to take what he or she learned from their research (experiment, or on web, in library, etc) and/or activities to create the poster.

COMPLETE AT LEAST 3 ACTIVITIES <u>EACH</u> YEAR IN YOUR 4-H FLORICULTURE MANUAL.

LEVEL A, GRADES 3 AND 4

★Curriculum – Manual 4-H-966

<u>Exhibit Requirements:</u> Choose one (1) exhibit option from either the "Flower and Plant Categories" or from the "Poster or Notebook Exhibits". An Action Demonstration can be done instead of <u>OR</u> in addition to the floriculture exhibit. <u>Turn in your completed manual with your exhibit.</u>

Flower and Plant Exhibit Categories

<u>Category 1.</u> Create flower arrangement in a simple bud vase, provide your own vase, from cut flowers you grew in your garden.

Vase must be no more than 9 inches tall by 3 inches wide, neck opening of vase not to exceed 1.5 inches and be clear or white only. Include 1-3 stems of a main flower, along with appropriate amount of filler flower and greenery.

<u>Category 2.</u> Create flower arrangement in a simple bud vase, provide your own vase, from fresh flowers you purchased.

Vase must be no more than 9 inches tall by 3 inches wide, neck opening of vase not to exceed 1.5 inches and be clear or white only. Include 1-3 stems of a main flower, along with appropriate amount of filler flower and greenery. Flowers should be in their natural state and not wired for display.

<u>Category 3.</u> Create a simple round arrangement (small, compact round cluster of flowers) with fresh flowers (you purchased). Including the vase or container, it must be no larger than 12"x 12".

<u>Category 4.</u> Create a simple round arrangement (small, compact round cluster of flowers) with fresh flowers (you grew). Including the vase or container, it must be no larger than 12"x 12".

Poster or Notebook Exhibits - choose any one (1) of the following topics:

- 1. Chronicle your work in your flower garden (planning, planting, care, harvest, arrangement made with your flowers).
- Describe how you planned or designed your garden, including how you chose the kinds of flowers.
- 3. Explain how you harvested your flowers, cared for them, and used them in an arrangement.
- 4. Explore and explain: pollination what it is, why important, different ways it occurs or transplanting what, how, things to watch out for; or role of insects with flowers (good, bad or both).
- 5. Explore and explain seed germination or how to care for a 'sick' plant.
- 6. Report on interview with a professional (what do they do, types of jobs, type of training, hours worked, etc.).
- 7. Describe an experiment you did and the results.
- 8. Describe a community service project you did related to your flowers project Demonstration Participate in an action demo at state fair or demonstration contest related to topics for this grade level, or any of those listed above.

LEVEL B, GRADES 5 AND 6

★Curriculum – Manual 4-H-967, Level B Plant Record Sheet (4-H-967c)

<u>Exhibit Requirements:</u> Choose one (1) exhibit option from either the "Flower and Plant Categories" or from the "Poster or Notebook Exhibits". An Action Demonstration can be done instead of <u>OR</u> in addition to the floriculture exhibit. <u>Turn in your completed manual with your exhibit.</u>

Flower and Plant Exhibit Categories

<u>Category 1.</u> Display a mixed planter that may include herbs with foliage plants and/or flowering plants. The planter should include 3 or more kinds of plants and have been planted at least two months before the fair. The container exhibit space must not exceed 18"x 18" (height will be variable). Must include 4-H-967c "Level B Plant Record" chronicling the care of your plant.

<u>Category 2.</u> Make an item with dried herbs or dried flowers that you grew yourself. Examples of items to exhibit are, but not limited to a dried flower product, or a simple dried arrangement in a container. *The exhibit must not exceed 18" x 18" (height will be variable).*

<u>Category 3.</u> Display one house plant (foliage and/or flowering) in a container not to exceed 10 inches in diameter. There must be only one specimen plant per pot. A flowering plant may be of any color with single or double flowers. Must include 4-H-967c, "Level B Plant Record" chronicling the care of your plant.

Poster or Notebook Exhibits - choose any one (1) of the following topics:

- 1. Report how you harvested your flowers and/or herbs, cared for them, dried them, and used them.
- 2. Explore and explain: insects and your flowers and/or herbs.
- 3. Explore and explain: starting seeds indoors -- the process and pros and cons.
- 4. Explore and explain: perennials -- what are they, how are they used, benefits or drawbacks.
- 5. Investigate and describe: a butterfly garden -- what types of plants, benefits to insects and butterflies, etc.
- 6. Describe how you planned or designed your garden, including how you chose the kinds of plants, any problems, successes.
- Describe your houseplant how you cared for, transplanted to larger pot, any problems, or successes.
- 8. Explore and explain: plant biology -- form and function, growth, photosynthesis, etc.
- Explore and explain: how to grow plants indoors -- things to consider, common problems and solutions.
- Explore and explain: environmental effects related to plants (such as light, water, soil, or temperature).
- 11. Describe an experiment you did and the results.
- 12. Explore and explain topics from "Imagine That" -- plants around the world, information about different cultural uses of plants, different ways you used your plants/herbs/flowers.

LEVEL C, GRADES 7, 8 AND 9

★Curriculum – Manual 4-H-968

<u>Exhibit Requirements:</u> Choose one (1) exhibit option from either the "Flower and Plant Categories" or from the "Poster or Notebook Exhibits". An Action Demonstration can be done instead of <u>OR</u> in addition to the floriculture exhibit. Turn in your completed manual with your exhibit.

Flower and Plant Exhibit Categories

Category 1. Display a terrarium

 Size of the terrarium should be appropriate for use on a table at home, and no larger than 12" deep, 18" long and 16" high. Must have a cover while on exhibit. See activity information for design.

Category 2. Combination or European planter

♦ Exhibit a container of plants (3 or more kinds of plants) that you have planted and cared for a minimum of 2 months. See activity for information on plants and design. The container should not exceed exhibit space of 18" x 18" (height will be variable).

<u>Category 3.</u> Create one (1) corsage <u>or</u> two (2) boutonnieres made from only fresh flowers. Corsages should contain 3 or more blooms. NO artificial flowers or greenery should be used in this category. Bows and decorative items are okay.

<u>Category 4.</u> Create one (1) corsage <u>or</u> two (2) boutonnieres made from silk or other artificial flowers and greenery. Can be created with mixed fresh and artificial materials, or all artificial. Bows and decorative items are okay.

<u>Category 5.</u> A dried arrangement in a container or a specialty item (such as, but not limited to, a wreath or swag) made with dried flowers and dried plant materials. NO artificial flowers/plant material should be included. Bows and decorative items are okay. Maximum size 24" x 24", height will be variable.

<u>Category 6.</u> Create a flower arrangement using either roses or lilies as the primary component of the arrangement. Arrangement should be made with all fresh materials (NO artificial, flowers/plant material). Bows and decorative items are okay. *The exhibit must not exceed 18" x 18" (height will be variable).*

Poster or Notebook Exhibits - choose any one(1) of the following topics:

- Explain how you planned, chose plants, cared for, transplanted to larger pot, etc. your combination planter or terrarium
- Explore and explain: vegetative propagation -- how to, different types, problems and solutions, different uses of
- 3. Explore and explain: plant nutrients -- what are they, why does the plant need them, what happens if the plant has too much or too little, planters or containers vs. garden.
- 4. Investigate the design of multiple plant containers -- how to, things to considers, selecting plant materials, uses of
- 5. Describe how you created your corsage or boutonnieres; or dried arrangement. Be sure to include appropriate information on design principles and how they are used to create your arrangement.
- 6. Explore and explain: floral tools and materials (how to use, what they are, care of tools, different uses of a tool or material)
- Explore and explain: preserving cut flowers -- how, problems, uses of and/or diseases related to cut flowers
- 8. Illustrate, explore and explain how you dry flowers or other plant materials and/or describe different methods and/or how, why use them.
- 9. Explore and explain: medicinal uses and toxicity of fresh and dried flowers and plants.
- 10. Describe an experiment you did and the results.
- 11. Describe a career exploration activity you did, such as job shadow, interview with a professional.
- 12. Describe a community service activity you did related to your flowers project -- what you did, why, results, etc.

LEVEL D, GRADES 10, 11 AND 12

★Curriculum – Manual 4-H-969

<u>Exhibit Requirements:</u> Choose one (1) exhibit option from either the "Flower and Plant Categories" or from the "Poster or Notebook Exhibits". An Action Demonstration can be done instead of <u>OR</u> in addition to the floriculture exhibit. Turn in your completed manual with your exhibit.

Flower and Plant Exhibit Categories

<u>Category 1.</u> Create a seasonal arrangement from only fresh flower and/or plant materials. Flowers and plant materials specific to a season or holiday should be used. For example, fall mums or spring tulips. *Maximum size 24"x24"x36"*. This category could include a traditional floral arrangement, but also items such as wreaths. Bows and decorative accessories are okay.

<u>Category 2.</u> Create a seasonal arrangement that can include fresh and/or artificial flower/plant material. Flowers and plant materials specific to a season or holiday should be used. *Maximum size 24"x24"x36"*. This category could include a traditional floral arrangement, but also items such as wreaths. Bows and decorative accessories are okay.

<u>Category 3.</u> Create a modern or contemporary style arrangement using fresh flower and plant materials. See manual for suggestions. Maximum size 24"x24"x36". Include a label that states what type of design you have created (botanical, pavè, parallel, free-form, abstract, etc.)

<u>Category 4.</u> Create a bridal bouquet. Proper display of the bouquet should be considered, but only the bouquet will be judged. Bouquet should include <u>only</u> fresh plant materials. Bows and decorative accessories are okay.

<u>Category 5.</u> Create a centerpiece for an event, such as a banquet, party, wedding, funeral, or church. Arrangement should be no larger than 24"x24"x36" and be made from EITHER fresh flower and/or plant materials or artificial or silk flower and/or plant materials. Bows and decorative accessories are okay.

<u>Category 6.</u> Display a plant that you propagated (and grew and cared for) by tissue culture or other vegetative propagation methods, or flowering bulbs that you forced. Maximum pot size should not exceed 10" diameter. Must include 4-H 969c Level D Plant Record chronicling the care of your plant.

Poster or Notebook Exhibits - choose any on one (1) of the following topics:

- 1. Describe how you created your arrangement, include information on the design principles utilized.
- 2. Explore and explain how you utilize different flowers to make a similar style arrangement for different seasons (tulips in spring, mums in fall, etc.) or how to utilize similar flowers to make different styles of arrangements.
- 3. Explore and explain: the cost of arrangement and/or a cost comparison with flowers (different types flowers, different time year, etc.).
- 4. Explore and explain: forcing flowers (bulbs, branches, etc.).
- 5. Explore and explain: marketing in the floral industry (large or small business) and/ or a market survey and results, and how they can benefit the floral industry.
- Explore and explain: how to start a business related to the floral industry and may include a business plan.
- 7. Explore and explain the origins of flowers and/or the floriculture industry around the world.
- 8. Explore and explain: tissue culture, biotechnology, or traditional breeding of new flower types -- what are they, how are they used, pros and cons.
- 9. Explore and explain: be a plant detective -- what kinds of problems might you have in growing and caring for flowers, and how to solve.
- 10. Describe an experiment you did and the results.
- 11. Describe a community service activity you did related to your flowers project: how, why, results.

RECIPE ON INDEX CARD:

1. A recipe on an index card (5"X 8") is required for <u>ALL</u> food products (available at the Extension Office or on our website: https://www.extension.purdue.edu/cass, link is: Cass County Handbook, Forms and Information needed for 4-H). It should be covered in clear wrapping of some kind, i.e., plastic wrap, a baggie, etc. — Include the recipe "source" on the card, i.e., name of cookbook, grandma, etc.

PROJECTS MANUALS:

- 1. Project manuals and record sheet must be included with each exhibit.
- 2. Each year, members MUST complete a minimum of three (3) activities.

FXHIBITS

Each division has an exhibit listed. Instead of or in addition to that exhibit, a 4-H member can do Food Preservation and/or a Action Demonstration. The Action Demonstration will also be judged during the fair. Please contact the Extension Office if you plan to do an Action Demonstration.

HOW TO PREPARE PRODUCTS FOR DISPLAY:

- 1. Most food products should be displayed on a paper or styrofoam plate.
- a) For cakes cut a piece of cardboard about ½ inch larger than the bottom of the cake. Cover this cardboard with wax paper, plastic wrap, or foil before putting the cake on it.
- b) Any other product that may be sticky on the bottom, such as some fancy breads, should be put on round, square, or rectangle cardboard. Cover this board with wax paper, plastic wrap, or foil before putting the food product on it.
- c) Frozen foods are to be taken home after judging. Water resistant labels or pen must be used on frozen exhibits.
- d) Pies must be exhibited in a disposable pie tin. No glass plate for pies.
- e) All canned products MUST have the ring on the jar top to protect the seal.
- f) Cake mixes are not to be used in this project. Recipes are to be from "scratch". See our "Bake With A Mix" project!
- g) Bread machines cannot be used in this project.



"FOODS" & "FOOD PRESERVATION" – continued

*Members are required to complete a minimum of three (3) activities in their manual each year they are in the project. PROJECT MANUAL AND RECORD SHEET MUST ACCOMPANY THE EXHIBIT (COUNTY LEVEL ONLY)

_For food competitions - For Food Competitions: Fillings, frostings, glazes, and meringues are not permitted to contain cream cheese, sour cream, heavy cream, or whipped cream if they are not fully cooked/baked. These items are allowed as ingredients in food products IF the final product is cooked/baked. Additionally, raw milk, raw milk products or uncooked eggs/egg whites are not permitted. Eggs/egg whites that have been cooked to 160oF (i.e. pasteurized or included as part of a batter and baked) are acceptable. No home- canned fruits, vegetables, or meats are permitted as ingredients in food products.

Fresh-cut, uncooked, fruits and/or vegetables are not permitted to be used in food products or used as garnishes for the product. Foods should be transported to the competition in a way that minimizes contamination and maintains the quality of the food (i.e. foods that are judged as frozen should remain frozen at all times).

Recipes must be provided that identifies all ingredients that were used in each part of the product. Any ingredient that could be a potential allergen must be clearly identified. Each food product must be labeled with the following information:

- * Name
- * Date the food product was made

Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods. If cuts are present, the wound should be bandaged and a single use food service glove worn on the hand during all stages of food production. Contestants should not be preparing food exhibits for competition within 48 hours of recovering from any illness. People experiencing symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, fever, and/or jaundice should not be allowed to prepare food.

Judges and individuals who will consume products from county and/or state competitions should be informed that they are at risk for foodborne illness since the established policy cannot guarantee that an entry has been properly prepared or handled before, during or following the competition. The food products for competitions are home produced and processed and the production area is not inspected by the Indiana State Department of Health. Tasting of a food product is solely at the discretion of the judge and consumers. Judges are NOT to taste any home preserved foods such as low-acid or acidified foods like green beans, tomatoes or tomato products, jams/jellies/fruit preserves or fermented products produced in the home.

Purdue Extension Food Safety Policy (revised 10/2020)

Since it is illegal in the State of Indiana for youth under the age of 21 to purchase or consume alcoholic beverages, 4-H members are to use recipes that do not include an alcoholic beverage as an ingredient. A suitable non-alcoholic or imitation product may be substituted.

FOODS EXHIBITS

LEVEL A (Grades 3-4)

<u>Grade 3</u> - Three snack-sized (approximately 2"-3" individual size) drop, molded or bar baked cookies. No glaze or frosting. Include recipe card (covered) and display on a dessert size (suggested 6 inch size) paper or foam plate.

<u>Grade 4</u> - Three standard sized muffins that contain an ingredient that is a source of Vitamin A or Vitamin C (no muffin liners). Include recipe card (covered).





"FOODS" & "FOOD PRESERVATION" - continued

LEVEL B (Grades 5-6)

<u>Grade 5</u> - A square, oblong or round layer reduced-fat cake without frosting. Reduce the amount of fat in the recipe by using a fruit puree or baby food fruit product that does not contain yogurt. Include recipe card (covered). NOTE: Display cake top side up.

<u>Grade 6</u> - Three no-yeast, any shape pretzels with a whole grain flour mixture (shaped, stick, or nugget) OR 3 no-yeast sweet or savory rolled biscuits with a whole grain flour mixture (no drop biscuits.) Include recipe card (covered).

LEVEL C (Grades 7, 8, 9)

<u>Exhibitors may choose one baked product from the following list.</u> It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement.

BAKED PRODUCT OPTIONS:

- Three (3) yeast bread sticks or yeast rolls (any shape, medium size not a sweet roll), using a whole
 grain flour mixture such as whole wheat, rye, oat bran, etc. Include recipe card. Participants are
 expected to learn how to knead bread dough by hand and allow it to rise appropriately. It is NOT
 acceptable to use a home bread maker.
- A yeast bread (can be loaf, braid, but not rolls) using a whole grain flour mixture such as whole wheat, rye, oat bran, etc. Include recipe card. Participants are expected to learn how to knead bread dough by hand and allow it to rise appropriately. It is NOT acceptable to use a home bread maker.
- One package of a non-perishable, invented healthy snack (such as a granola bar, popcorn snack, trail mix, etc.). Your snack must include at least 2 food groups from MyPlate. Exhibit must include your snack product and a separate folder containing a marketing plan with product name, recipe, how it will be packaged, a package design, where it will be sold and suggested selling price. Style your snack for a photo shoot and include the picture in your marketing plan. Label should include product name, date, quantity, and serving size.

LEVEL D (Grades 10, 11, 12)

<u>Exhibitors may choose one baked from the following list.</u> It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement.

BAKED PRODUCT OPTIONS:

- A single or double crust baked fruit pie (no graham cracker crust). Include recipe card (covered). (Note: Custards, cream, cream cheese frosting and fillings, and raw egg white frosting are not acceptable in an exhibit because they are highly perishable when left at room temperatures.)
- A non-perishable baked food product for a catered meal or special event in which organizers have requested low fat and/or reduced sugar items. Exhibit will include your food product and a notebook outlining how this product is to be used at the event, menu, supplies to buy, preparation schedule, equipment, table layout, etc. A table display is optional and should be no larger than 16" deep x 22" wide x 28" high. Include index card with recipe.
- Select a condition in which people have to specifically modify their eating habits (diabetes, heart disease, Celiac disease, food allergies, etc.) Prepare a non-perishable baked food product appropriate for someone with this condition. Exhibit will include your food product and a notebook summarizing the condition or allergy, nutrition considerations involved with the condition, a description of your baked item, and an explanation of how it fits within the nutrition considerations. Make sure to note any ingredients that could cause an allergic reaction. Include index card with recipe (covered).

FOOD PRESERVATION EXHIBITS

PROJECT MANUAL MUST ACCOMPANY THE EXHIBIT (COUNTY LEVEL ONLY)

**All canned products MUST have the ring on the jar top to protect the seal.

LEVEL A (Grades 3-4)

<u>Grade 3</u> - A package of 3 baked, snack-sized (approximately 2"-3" individual size) frozen cookies. Display in freezer bag or freezer container. (NOTE: Freezer containers will not be returned.) Include index card with recipe and instructions for defrosting (covered). <u>Label with name of product, quantity, and date</u> frozen.

<u>Grade 4</u> - One package of frozen berries. Display in freezer bag or freezer container. (NOTE: Freezer containers will not be returned.) Include index card with recipe and instructions for cooking or defrosting (covered). Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.

LEVEL B (Grades 5-6)

Grade 5 - One uncooked frozen mini-pizza using whole-grain pita bread, English muffin, bagel, or already prepared crust (no larger than 7" in diameter) with toppings of your choice. Include at least 4 MyPlate food groups on your pizza. Meat toppings such as hamburger, sausage, bacon, etc. must be cooked. Display on covered cardboard inside freezer bag. Include index card with recipe and instructions for cooking (covered). Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.

<u>Grade 6</u> - One package of any frozen vegetable or combination vegetables. Display in freezer bag or freezer container. (NOTE: Freezer containers will not be returned.) Include index card with instructions for defrosting and cooking (covered). <u>Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen</u>.

LEVEL C (Grades 7, 8, 9)

Exhibitors may choose one preserved product from the following list. It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement.

- One (1) container of freezer jam. Include index card with recipe and instructions for storing (covered). <u>Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.</u>
- One jar of a canned tomato product using the Hot Pack Method for a boiling water bath canner, such as tomato juice, catsup, barbecue sauce, or salsa. Include index card with recipe and instructions for cooking or using the product (covered). <u>Label with name of product, quantity, and date canned.</u> Note: Only food preservation products made using USDA approved or Ball Blue Book recipes are acceptable.
- One jar of a canned pickled product or canned pickles. Include index card with recipe, processing, and storage instructions (covered). (Products using a fancy pack are not accepted.)
 <u>Label with name of product, quantity, and date canned.</u> Note: Only food preservation products made using USDA approved or Ball Blue Book recipes are acceptable.

LEVEL D (Grades 10, 11, 12)

<u>Exhibitors may choose one preserved product from the following list.</u> It is suggested a participant choose a different option each year, but this is not a requirement.

- One jar of pressure canned vegetables, meat or combination product, such as soup, stew, spaghetti sauce with meat, etc. Include index card with recipe and instructions for cooking or using the product (covered). (Products using a fancy pack are not accepted.) <u>Label with name of product, quantity, and date canned.</u> Note: Only food preservation products made using USDA approved or Ball Blue Book recipes are acceptable.
- One package of a combination food frozen entree in freezer container. The combination food should contain 3 food groups from MyPlate. Exhibit should include an index card with recipe and instructions for reheating (covered). Display in disposable containers. No containers will be returned. Label with name of product, quantity, and date frozen.
- A jar of cooked jam or a reduced-sugar fruit spread. See manual about cooking/processing method. Include recipe card (covered). Label with name of product, quantity, and date made.

"FORESTRY" - State Fair Exhibit

The 4-H Forestry project has learning experiences on tree and leaf identification, the uses of forests and tree products, forest management, pruning, tree planting, plant root systems, and tree diseases. The importance of trees in soil and water conservation, wood products, and recreation are stressed. Forestry project posters MUST be covered with plastic or a transparent material, have a stiff backing, be displayed horizontally, and have an exhibit label in the lower right hand corner.

"Forestry Awards" - Cole Hardwood, Inc., will award special cash prizes to the 4-H Forestry exhibits selected by the judge. These awards will be presented at the County 4-H Awards Program.

NOTE: If you are exhibiting leaves they should be free of any damage. Also, if you <u>choose</u> to include the scientific names note that they must be in either italics or under-scored. (Note: scientific names are required for herbariums.) The Genus (first name) must have the first letter capitalized. The species (second name) has no capitalization.

All posters, notebooks, and display boards **MUST** include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H members exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.

For your exhibit, choose one of the topics listed below, appropriate for your grade in school, and use that topic for your exhibit title. **Complete at least 3 activities** <u>each</u> year in your 4-H forestry manual.

★Curriculum: Forestry 1 – Follow The Path (BU-8038)

Forestry 2 – Reach For The Canopy (BU-8039)

Forestry 3 – Explore The Deep Woods (BU-8040)

Forestry 1: Grades 3-5 Turn in your completed manual with your exhibit.

Display a poster board on one of the following activities:

- Leafing Out comparisons (pp 6 & 7). Collect, dry and mount 6 different species of leaves showing leaf differences: one leaf with opposite arrangement and one with an alternate arrangement, two leaves with different leaf margins, a compound leaf, and simple leaf. Use the 50 Trees of Indiana book (4-H 15-80 or CD-FNR-3) as a reference and identify the leaves and group them under the titles of "arrangement," "leaf margins," and "compound or simple." Draw (or copy the picture) and label the parts of a leaf using the diagram from the manual (Level 1). Title your poster, Leafing Out Leaf Differences
- <u>Leafing Out collection</u> (pp 6 & 7). Identify and exhibit leaves from 10 different trees that are listed in 50 Trees of Indiana book (4-H 15-80 or CD-FNR-3). *List at least two unique characteristics of each tree*. Title your poster, Leafing Out Collection.
- Hold on Tight (pp 10 & 11), Dig up a small plant root system and display along with a drawing of the root system with the anchor, lateral, and feeder roots identified and the "Parts of a Tree" diagram (4-H 641B).
- <u>Down in the Dirt</u> (pp 20 & 21), collect roots from 3 different habitats: woods, near a creek, and in a pasture or prairie. (Note: do not use the habitats listed in your manual.) Display the roots along with the completed root test chart (copy or recreate) showing the color, size, and shape information. Include any unique features you noted.
- My Couch is a Tree? (pp 30 & 31), Use pictures (draw, cut from magazines, print, or take photographs) to show 10 things in and around your home that are made from wood.
- <u>Fun in the Forest</u> (pp 32 & 33), Visit a state park or forest, take your 50 Trees of Indiana book (4-H 15-80 or CD-FNR-3), diagram the trails you hiked, and list the types of trees you saw. Photographs of you hiking and some of the trees you saw will help tell your story.

"FORESTRY" - continued

Forestry 2: Grades 6-8 <u>Turn in your completed manual with your exhibit.</u> Display a poster based on one of the following activities:

• The Leaf Machine (pp 8 & 9), copy, draw, or find a picture of a cross-section of a leaf. Label the 7 parts. Give the chemical reaction for photosynthesis, defining the chemicals: CO₂, H₂O, O₂, and C₆H₁₂O₆. Be sure to balance your equation! There should be the same number of Carbon, Oxygen, and Hydrogen molecules on each side of the equal sign. You may need to ask an older (high school) 4-H member or science teacher for help. Draw the tree canopy, trunk, and roots (or use the tree diagram, 4-H 641B) and identify the crown, trunk (with the parts; heartwood, sapwood, cambium, and bark listed on the right), feeder roots, and anchor roots.

- My State's Forests (pp 14 & 15), use a map, draw, or find a picture of Indiana on the Internet (e.g., www.in.gov/igic). Show where your home, your school, and your fairgrounds are located. Choose one of the following options to complete your poster.
 - •Show where Indiana's state forests are located. List a few facts about each. Visit a state forest and have someone take your picture by the sign, if possible.
 - •Show where some state parks and state forests are located (5-15). List some facts about each one. Visit a state park or forest and have someone take your picture by the sign, if possible.
- <u>Someone Call a (Tree) Doctor and Stop Bugging Me</u> (pp 22-25), Collect 10 samples of tree leaves, twigs, stems, or roots damaged by insects or disease and the fruiting body or disease that caused the damage. List information about the insect or disease and the species of tree that was affected.
- <u>Fire in the Forest</u> (pp 26&27), explain the Fire Triangle and describe what happened during and after a famous forest fire. Drawings or pictures will help tell the tale.
- Growing Every Day (pp 30 & 31), Complete the table to calculate the volume of 5 large trees that you can find and measure in your county. Research to find out how to make and use a Tree Measuring Stick (FNR-4) and use that to calculate the volume of each tree. Explain why you think your results varied with the two methods of determining tree volume (the one in your 4-H manual or using a tree measuring stick).
- <u>Tree Planting</u>, Plant 1-3 shade trees. Include information about the tree (or trees) you planted, why you chose the species you did, what are the benefits of this tree, and how tall this tree (or trees) will be when mature. Explain why you chose the planning site that you did, where you found your planting information, what steps you followed, the hole size, care of your tree (watering and weed control), and any other information you can give. Include a picture of your tree (photo or drawing). Reference: FNR-FAQ-18-W.

Forestry 3: Grades 9-12 Turn in your completed manual with your exhibit. Display a poster based on one of the following activities:

- <u>A World of Forests</u> (pp 16&17), indicate the 3 major forest biomes on a copy, drawing, or picture of the world. Complete the table given in the activity.
- <u>City Trees</u> (pp 20&21), complete the questions about Tree City (page 20). Show (draw or use pictures) some trees that are often used in city plantings and explain the benefits of these trees.
- <u>Trim the Trees</u> (pp 26&27), explain the 5 different kinds of tree pruning for urban trees. List some dos and don'ts of proper pruning.
- My Boss is a Tree (pp 34&35), list 5 jobs that require a knowledge of trees and forestry. Explain the training and education that is needed and what types of things you might be doing if you had this job.
- <u>Tree Planting</u> Present a tree planting plan for at least 100 trees. Include the type of trees you planted, pictures, cost, method of planting, weeding, pruning your trees, and any additional information. Your exhibit must have a title, labels, backing, and plastic covering as required in the manual. Reference: FNR-FAQ-18-W



"FORESTRY" - continued

Herbarium Collection - Trees

Collect 25 terminal twigs and at least two leaves, if space allows (only one compound leaf is required), from native forest trees. Mount the specimens on 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 16 $\frac{1}{2}$ " paper. One leaf on the twig must be mounted to show the back side of the leaf. Label each sheet with the following: common name, scientific name, where collected, county where collected, date collected, name of collector, and specimen number. **Cover each specimen.** There are no specific references given for these exhibits. Youth are encouraged to use Extension publications, the Internet, books, and forest specialists to develop these items.

Note: Your herbarium collection must be accessible to the judges. Do not cover it under the plastic that covers your poster. You may want to attach a folder or other holder over your poster to hold the mounted, covered specimens.

Herbarium Collection - Shrubs

Collect 25 terminal twigs, with leaves attached, from native shrubs. Mount the specimens on 11 ½" x 16 ½" paper. One leaf on the twig must be mounted to show the back side of the leaf. Label each sheet with the following: common name, scientific name, where collected, county where collected, date collected, name of collector, and specimen number. **Cover each specimen.** There are no specific references given for these exhibits. Youth are encouraged to use Extension publications, the Internet, books, and forest specialists to develop these items.

Note: Your herbarium collection must be accessible to the judges. Do not cover it under the plastic that covers your poster. You may want to attach a folder or other holder over your poster to hold the mounted, covered specimens.

Level: Independent Study: Grades 9 12. Turn in your completed manual with your exhibit.

Advanced topic - Learn all you can about an Indiana or Eastern Deciduous forestry topic of your choice and present it on a poster. Include a short manuscript, pictures, graphs, and list the works cited to describe what you did and what you learned. Title your poster, "Advanced Forestry - Independent Study."

Mentoring -- Exhibit a poster that shows how you mentored a younger 4-H member. Include your planning, the time you spent, the challenges and advantages of mentoring, and how the experience might be useful in your life. Photographs and other documentation are encouraged. Title your poster, "Advanced Forestry - Mentor. "There are no specific references given for these exhibits. Youth are encouraged to use Extension publications, the Internet, books, and forest specialists to develop these items.

Your exhibit is due at the 4-H Community Center, **SATURDAY**, **JUNE 26**TH, **between 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.**

"FUN WITH FOOD MIXES" - No State Fair Exhibit

(formerly "BAKE WITH A MIX")

This project is designed to allow the use of a purchased box or package mix as one of the ingredients in a recipe. The exhibited product cannot be the result of using the standard ingredients and following the basic instructions with the mix. The mix is to be used as a base with other added ingredients to create a new **non-perishable product**. 4-H'ers may create their own recipe or use suggestions from a box or package mix, cookbook, or project manual.

❖All exhibits are to be baked items.

- ❖The recipe is to be exhibited with the product. Be sure to include ALL ingredients. The recipe should be on an index card (5"X8"). It can be obtained at the Extension Office. It must be covered in some fashion, i.e. clear plastic wrap, baggie, etc.
- ❖All products must be exhibited on a <u>disposable paper or Styrofoam plate, cardboard, etc.</u>
- Products too large for a plate should be exhibited on a sturdy disposable board, covered with foil, freezer paper, waxed paper, etc.
- ❖ Disposable display board or plate should be at least 1 inch larger than exhibited product but suggested no larger than 2 inches more than the product. Be sure to exhibit the whole cake – Do not cut into pieces.

"FUN WITH FOOD MIXES" - continued

- ❖All materials must be disposable including covering. 4-H member may choose a covering but not required.
- ❖The use of fresh fruit garnishes are left to the discretion of the exhibitor.
- ❖No alcoholic beverages are to be used in recipes. Substitutes could be ginger ale, fruit juice, etc.

For Food Competitions - For Food Competitions: Fillings, frostings, glazes, and meringues are not permitted to contain cream cheese, sour cream, heavy cream, or whipped cream if they are not fully cooked/baked. These items are allowed as ingredients in food products IF the final product is cooked/baked. Additionally, raw milk, raw milk products or uncooked eggs/egg whites are not permitted. Eggs/egg whites that have been cooked to 160oF (i.e. pasteurized or included as part of a batter and baked) are acceptable. No home- canned fruits, vegetables, or meats are permitted as ingredients in food products.

Fresh-cut, uncooked, fruits and/or vegetables are not permitted to be used in food products or used as garnishes for the product. Foods should be transported to the competition in a way that minimizes contamination and maintains the quality of the food (i.e. foods that are judged as frozen should remain frozen at all times).

Recipes must be provided that identifies all ingredients that were used in each part of the product. Any ingredient that could be a potential allergen must be clearly identified. Each food product must be labeled with the following information:

- ❖ * Name
- * Date the food product was made

Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods. If cuts are present, the wound should be bandaged and a single use food service glove worn on the hand during all stages of food production. Contestants should not be preparing food exhibits for competition within 48 hours of recovering from any illness. People experiencing symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, fever, and/or jaundice should not be allowed to prepare food.

Judges and individuals who will consume products from county and/or state competitions should be informed that they are at risk for foodborne illness since the established policy cannot guarantee that an entry has been properly prepared or handled before, during or following the competition. The food products for competitions are home produced and processed and the production area is not inspected by the Indiana State Department of Health. Tasting of a food product is solely at the discretion of the judge and consumers. Judges are NOT to taste any home preserved foods such as low-acid or acidified foods like green beans, tomatoes or tomato products, jams/jellies/fruit preserves or fermented products produced in the home.

Purdue Extension Food Safety Policy (revised 10/2020)

<u>★Curriculum</u> –Cass County Fun With Food Mixes manual – first year; Cass County Fun With Food Mixes record sheet & recipe card every year.

Level 1 - Grades 3, 4, 5:

4-H'ers are to exhibit a different cookie or brownie recipe in each year of the Beginner category.

- 1. Using a purchased mix, <u>add at least two ingredients</u> different than those listed on the package directions to create cookies or brownies. (If using fresh fruit and sour cream) and the 2 additional ingredients **MUST BE BAKED IN** the food project exhibit.
- 2. Cookies or brownies may include a **non-perishable** frosting or topping.
- 3. **Exhibit six baked drop, molded or bar cookies or brownies.** Also exhibit the product recipe on a 5"x8" covered recipe card. Note: if a frosting or topping (non-perishable) is used, include ALL ingredients on the recipe card.
- 4. Turn in a completed record sheet with your exhibit.



"FUN WITH FOOD MIXES" - continued

Level 2 - Grades 6, 7, 8:

4-H'ers are to exhibit a different cake or bread recipe in each year of the Intermediate category.

- Using a purchased mix, <u>add at least two ingredients</u> different from those listed on the package directions to create a bread or cake. Cake products may be round, square, rectangle, bundt, single or double layer and may include **non-perishable** topping or frosting. (Yeast may be one of the added ingredients.) Display whole cake or bread – DO NOT cut into pieces. (If using fresh fruit and sour cream) and the 2 additional ingredients **MUST BE BAKED IN** the food project exhibit.
- 2. **Exhibit cake or bread** with the product recipe on a 5"x8" covered recipe card. No cupcakes, rolls, muffins or any other type multiple items can be exhibited in intermediate division. Note: if a frosting or topping (non-perishable) is used, include ALL ingredients on the recipe card.
- 3. Turn in a completed record sheet with your exhibit.

Level 3 - Grades 9, 10, 11, 12

4-H'ers are to exhibit a different recipe in each year of the Advanced category.

- Using a purchased mix, add at least two ingredients different from those listed on the package directions to create a non-perishable baked product. (Yeast may be one of the added ingredients.) (If using fresh fruit and sour cream) and the 2 additional ingredients MUST BE BAKED IN the food project exhibit.
- 2. If exhibiting cookies, muffins, rolls, etc. exhibit **six** items. If exhibiting a cake or bread, display the whole product DO NOT cut into pieces.
- 3. Baked product may include a **non-perishable** topping, or frosting.
- 4. Exhibit baked product with the product recipe on a 5"x8" covered recipe card. Note: if a frosting or topping (non-perishable) is used, include ALL ingredients on the recipe card.
- 5. Turn in a completed record sheet with your exhibit.

ALL DIVISIONS ARE REQUIRED AT COMMUNITY JUDGING - TUESDAY, JULY 6TH.

All food will be returned to the 4-H member if present. Pictures will be taken of the 4-H'er and exhibit for display purposes.

"4-H GARDEN COLLECTION" - State Fair Exhibit

Your exhibit is due at the 4-H Community Center, **SATURDAY**, **JULY10**TH, **between 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.**

All vegetables entered in these classes must have been produced by the 4-H club member in his/her Garden project. Any exhibit which, in the opinion of the judge, has not been produced in a 4-H Club Garden will be disqualified.

NO SILK OR ARTIFICIAL FOLIAGES MAY BE USED IN THE EXHIBIT. NO FLOWERS WILL BE INCLUDED IN THE GARDEN EXHIBIT.

Ribbons will be awarded for each exhibit. NOTE: Each of the singles exhibits contains one type of vegetable and is judged as 1 class. (Example: All tomatoes together, all onions together, etc.)

A collection consists of a group of different vegetables judged as 1 exhibit. Ex: A collection of 3 could have 1 plate of tomatoes, 1 plate of potatoes, and 1 plate of green beans; a collection of 4 would have 4 different vegetables; and a collection of 5 would have 5 different vegetables.

See 4-H garden manuals and 4-H 970-W for suggestions in preparing exhibits.

What can I learn?

You will learn about planning a vegetable garden, planting, fertilizing, different vegetable pests, harvesting, storage techniques and careers.

"4-H GARDEN COLLECTION" - continued

All Division Requirements - Read and study 4-H garden manual, complete at least 3 activities <u>each</u> year, Plan your garden, Select plants and seeds, Plant your garden, Care for your garden, Harvest your produce, Exhibit your produce. In Divisions 5-10 also make an educational exhibit. Try something new--as listed in the manual, Keep a complete record of your garden activities. **Turn in your completed manual** with your exhibit.

Produce Exhibit (All Levels) Options:

- I. <u>Single Vegetable</u> you grew (maximum of 5 different exhibits per exhibitor). Select vegetables from the 4-H Garden Publication list. 4-H 970-W (updated yearly) Single vegetable entries should be labeled with common name, Latin name, and variety of vegetable. The Latin names can be found in 4-H Garden Publication 4-H 970-W. Example: Green Bean (*Phaseolus vulgaris*) 'Blue Lake 47 Bush'
- II. <u>Garden Collection</u> of three (3) plates, four (4) plates, or five (5) plates of different vegetables you grew. Vegetables entries should be labeled with common name and Latin name and variety.
- III. <u>Single Herb Exhibit</u> ALL EDIBLE TYPES A pot (8") maximum of (single kind of) herb you grew (maximum of three exhibits) *in three different pots*. Exhibits must be labeled with both common name and Latin name. Resource: HO-28. *4-H 970W (list of herbs accepted).*

NOTE: 4-H'er can do any combination of I, II, or III produce exhibits.

IV. <u>Garden Education</u> (Judged separately) (Anyone may complete these, but members in Levels C and D of the garden project SHOULD exhibit one (1) of the following activities in addition to the Produce Exhibit.)

Produce Options:

- A. Exhibit four (4) plates containing two cultivars of two different kinds of vegetables in you garden. For example: display tomato *Rutgers* and tomato *Roma* on two plates and spinach *Melody* and *America* on two plates. Label the cultivars you exhibit.
- B. Label and exhibit three unusual vegetables (may or may not be discussed in your 4-H Garden Manual) you grew in your garden this year. If not listed in the vegetable display chart, check with your Extension office. Example: spaghetti squash, head lettuce, cowpea, etc.

Poster Options:

- C. Make a poster of five commonly found diseases in vegetable gardens, the damage caused by each, and the control options for each.
- D. Make a poster of five commonly found vegetable garden insects: beneficial (good guys) and/or injurious (bad guys), benefits or damage caused by each, and the related management practices (how to keep the beneficial, and how to control the injurious insects).
- E. Make a poster of a maximum of ten pests (diseases, insects, weeds and/or rodents) you found in your garden this year, damage caused, control measures used, and results.
- F. Make a poster explaining a Computer Garden Program.
- G. Make a poster showing a picture story of what you did in your garden in this year. Example: how you planned, planted, and maintained your garden.
- H. Make a poster showing your financial record for your garden.
- I. Make a poster of pictures showing your experiences in hydroponics.
- J. Make a poster explaining various career options working with vegetables/herbs and gardening.
- Make a poster explaining types of pollinators and their importance in vegetable and fruit production.
- L. Make a poster that shows the different types of plant parts that are consumed by humans. Be sure to identify the fruit or vegetable and categorize it by root, stem, leaf, or flower.
- M. Make a poster that shows different storage methods for vegetables.
- N. Make a poster showing how to create a raised bed OR container vegetable garden.
- O. Make a poster discussing how herbs listed on the last page of 4-H Garden Publication 4-H 970-W are used and have been used throughout history. Be sure to include both culinary and medicinal uses as well as other unique uses, if any.

Poster Guidelines

All posters, notebooks, and display boards **MUST** include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H members exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.

- - Dimensions = 22" x 28" displayed horizontally with stiff backing and must be covered with clear plastic Identification included in the lower right corner (name, grade, county).
- Poster should "tell a story" or be informative to the audience. Will the viewer of your poster learn something from the exhibit?
- When designing your poster you should consider: lines, shapes, textures, colors and placement
 of items.
- Pictures, graphics and artwork are encouraged.
- Make sure the poster accurately meets the guidelines and objectives of the activities in the manual.
- Information printed directly off the web will not be accepted.
- Materials included in the poster need to be educational, both for the youth and the audience, and should demonstrate that the youth was able to take what he or she learned from their research (experiment, or on web, in library, etc.) and/or activities to create the poster.

"GENEALOGY" - State Fair Exhibit (4 entries)

In the genealogy project, you will learn to:

- 1) Complete a family pedigree for up to nine (8) generations (in the advanced divisions).
- 2) Communicate with family members and close friends of the family about the family's heritage.
- 3) Use county and state historical files for finding information on the family.
- 4) Secure family history information from governmental agencies.
- 5) Document and cite sources for your family history.
- 6) Preserve valuable documents and records.
- 7) Prepare a genealogical notebook for the 4-H fair.

All posters, notebooks, and display boards **MUST** include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H members exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.

★Curriculum – Genealogy Resource Manual (first year)

Forms for this project are found on the Indiana 4-H Web site www.four-h.purdue.edu click on "projects" and then on Genealogy to reach downloadable forms. This project is organized into divisions and not grades for a youth cannot start in Division 3 without first completing Division 1 and Division 2. This is a project that builds on the previous division information in order to be successful in building your family tree. If you are using a genealogical commercial software program, you may need to type in or hand write in information required by the Indiana 4-H genealogy project. See 4-H forms on the 4-H website linked above.

So the notebook exhibit can be displayed to the public and to minimize the potential of identity theft, original legal documents are **NOT** to be included in the exhibit notebook. Instead, a photocopy of any legal document is to be included in the notebook and all identifiable information (like social security numbers) except for names is to be completely marked out. Original legal documents are to be kept in a secure location by the 4-H member and his/her family.

Forms for this project are found on the Indiana 4-H Web site www.extension.purdue.edu/4h click on "projects" and then on Genealogy to reach downloadable forms. This project is organized into divisions and not grades for a youth cannot start in Division 3 without first completing Division 1 and Division 2. This is a project that builds on the previous division information in order to be successful in building your family tree. If you are using a genealogical commercial software program, you may need to type in or hand write in information required by the Indiana 4-H genealogy project. See 4-H forms on the 4-H website linked above.

The exhibit will consist of no more than four (4) notebooks for Division 1-4 and first year Advanced Division. (If a notebook requires additional space, label it as notebook X, continued.) Those notebooks are:

- Book #1 3" D-ring binder, contains introduction sheet, pedigree charts and family group sheets
- Book #2 2" D-ring binder, contains additional information worksheets and diary of work
- Book #3 3" D-ring binder, contains supporting documents, pictures, etc.
- Book #4 3" D-ring binder, contains Advanced Division options only (Begin using this notebook in first year of the advanced division or the fifth year of project enrollment.)
- Another notebook should be maintained and kept in a secure place at home to keep original personal and legal documents as well as previously exhibited work.

Notebooks should be tabbed and in the following order:

Book #1 - Introductory Page; Pedigree Charts; Family Group Sheets

Book #2 - Additional Information Worksheets; Diary of Your Work

Book #3 - Any Other Documents (label with ancestor numbers on tab)

Book #4 – Advanced Division Options (label each tab separately with the specific option); Diary of Your Work (this will be a second diary describing work done for each advanced division option)

Pedigree Charts, Family Group Sheets, Additional Information Worksheets, and Diary Sheets are to be placed in the notebook back-to-back in sheet protectors to save space, reduce the information being damaged, and reduce the number of sheet protectors required.

If information on a family member is unknown, an additional information worksheet for each required ancestor is still required. Write "unknown" or "NIA" (no information available) in PENCIL for each sheet of unknown ancestors or list several ancestors on a page and insert page in proper numerical order.

After exhibiting the 1st year of the ADVANCED Division, only the Advanced Division notebook (Book #4) with ALL OPTIONS (no pedigree charts, no family group sheets, no additional information sheets, no documents from Divisions 1-5) needs to be exhibited each year the genealogy project continues.

 - Any documents or pictures pertaining to these generations; correctly labeled.

Pedigree charts are available on the Indiana 4-H Web site for your additional genealogy research. EACH YEAR FOLLOWING, continue to add ancestors to your pedigree charts. In addition, choose one of the following options that has not been completed previously. Please identify, by letter, the option that you are completing (for example: Advanced Division, Year 1, Option A; Advanced Division, Year 2, Option C; etc.)



Advanced Division Year 2 and beyond – Exhibit Book #4 that contains advanced division options and a second diary of work. If additional ancestry information was found in the seventh and eighth generation, exhibit Book 1 noting ancestors completed this year along with Books 2 and 3 demonstrating this year's work.

EXPLAIN the information received as to how it relates to you and your ancestors. Copies of documents obtained in previous divisions are acceptable and should be utilized in the option chosen if needed.

- A. A migration map of your eight-generation ancestors. You should have at least one map per family line with charts or explanations of the migrations.
- B. A timeline historical report of a family line. Show how this family fits into history. Document your report as well as possible with dates, records, places or maps, pictures, etc. Be sure to include proper labels and sources.
- C. A census history of a family line. Census abstract forms can be found on several websites. Download forms to abstract the census. Your notebook should contain copies of the census and the completed abstract form for each census.
- D. A history of your family's religious background for any family line or lines. Include a brief history of the denomination. Include baptism, confirmation or profession of faith and membership records. Also include information or history of the congregations involved. Be sure to include proper labels and sources.
- E. A history of your family's military service for a family line. Include supporting documents when possible. These documents could include military records, (muster rolls, discharge papers, etc.), pension records, and bounty land records, as well as maps and pictures. Be sure to include proper labels and sources.
- F. A research paper on a famous ancestor. Prove your relationship to this person with documentation. Try to include pictures and anecdotes to enhance your paper.
- G. Complete a family line or lines back as many generations as possible beyond eight generations (ancestors 256 and beyond). Include pictures, maps and documents. Be sure to include proper labels and sources.
- H. A timeline historical report of another family line not previously completed. Document as well as possible as in Option B. You need to state at the beginning that this is a second family historical report on such ancestor.
- I. A history of your family's military service for a family line not previously completed. Include supporting documents as in Option E. You need to state at the beginning that this is a second family military history report on such ancestor.
- J. Family DNA history. (This can be a very expensive option) Please include charts and explanations. i.e. use pie charts, ethnicity estimates, approximate percentage regionally, number of countries searched, genetic percentage, family tree, graphs, etc.

Your exhibit is due at 4-H Community Judging; TUESDAY, JULY 6Th, between 8:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. It is "Open Judging" for this project.

Genealogy without sources is Mythology

"GEOLOGY" - State Fair Exhibit (4 entries)

This project includes the study, collection, identification and exhibit of rocks, minerals and fossils.

Your exhibit is due at the Community Center, **SATURDAY**, **JUNE 26**TH, **between 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.**

Create an exhibit to show the public some of the geology specimens you have collected. Exhibits must be displayed horizontally, sized 22" x 28," mounted on a firm backing (foam-core board or other), and covered in clear plastic or other transparent material. Or, you may display your specimens in an insect display box (18 x 24 inches), orientated horizontally. Include actual specimens in your exhibit, whenever possible. You can make your own labels for your specimens. See the suggested label format found in the Indiana 4-H geology manuals. Boxes make your specimens more secure. Do not put valuable specimens on posters where they can be removed quickly. Be sure to include a label with your name, grade, and county. Choose one of the topics listed below, appropriate for your grade in school, and use that name for your title. Titles must be in the front of the poster or box.

It is recommended/suggested that all posters, notebooks, and display boards include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H members exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed or a lack thereof.

Notes:

- You may purchase your specimens and may display rocks, fossils, and minerals. If you purchase
 your specimen, indicate where and when. If you collect your specimen, indicate the county and
 township where you found your specimen.
- Posters and display boxes will be exhibited "standing up" at the Indiana State Fair. Therefore, you need to secure your specimens securely. Project leaders suggest the following methods: soaking ½ cotton ball in Elmer's glue, hot glue, or clear tub sealant. Place the cotton ball in your box and put your rock (or fossil or mineral) on the cotton ball and let sit. It will take 1-2 weeks for Elmer's glue to fully harden. Specimens mounted with Elmer's glue can be removed by soaking the cotton ball in water. Glue remaining on the rock may be brushed off with an old, damp toothbrush.
- <u>Do not</u> identify your specimens any further than phylum and class. *There is one exception to this for <u>fossils</u> which are identified to phylum OR class. Class should only be used for fossils of mollusks, backboned animals, and arthropods.*
- When exhibiting rocks show a fresh surface to help judges identify the rock.
- Labels Include the specific geographical location where you would <u>expect</u> to find any specimens as well as where you actually acquired it (found, purchased, etc.)

Level 1: Grade 3 – 5 (one State Fair entry)

★Curriculum: Manual – 4-H-985

Exhibit

Display a poster (or use an exhibit box) based on one of the following activities:

- The Rock Cycle. (Activity 2). Explain the rock cycle using both words and pictures.
- Rock Types (Activities 2-4). Display rocks from the three major types: igneous, sedimentary, and metamorphic. Examples of each include: Igneous granite, basalt, gabbro; Sedimentary limestone, dolomite, shale, chert, gypsum; and Metamorphic quartzite, schist, marble, slate.
- How Rocks Change. (Activity 4). Color and display the picture in your book or draw and color your own on your poster. Briefly describe the earth processes that are shown.
- Rock Artwork (Activity 12). Display your rock artwork and the story that you created.
- Collections. (Activity 11). Display and identify 8 rocks.
- Making Crystal Models. (Activities 14 & 15). Display the crystal forms characteristic of most
 minerals (cubic, tetragonal, hexagonal, orthorhombic, monoclimic, triclinic) in a display box with
 their name and mineral with this form. You may color, paint, or use markers on your crystal
 models
- Molds and Casts. (Activities 16 & 17). Display three molds and/or casts in a display box.
 Describe the steps that you followed to create a mold or cast.

<u>Turn in completed manual with your exhibit.</u> Be sure to complete at least 3 activities in your manual <u>each</u> year.

Level 2: Grades 6 – 8 (one State Fair entry)

★Curriculum: Manual 4-H-986

Exhibit

Display a poster (or use an exhibit box) based on one of the following activities:

- Rocks with Different Textures, Identify and display six rocks with three very different textures (two
 rocks of each general type). Include three grades of sandpaper and show how the differences in
 sandpaper is similar to the differences in rock texture.
- Indiana Limestone, Show and label pictures or photographs of ten buildings, sculptures, or monuments made from Indiana limestone.
- Mineral properties and tests. Explain the characteristics: crystal form, cleavage, hardness, appearance, and streak. Explain tests used in identifying specimens. Examples you might include are streak, acid, hardness, chemical analysis, and specific gravity.
- How We Use Minerals, Show 10 common products that contain minerals. Explain the minerals that are contained in these products and the characteristic that makes them useful.
- Geologic Time, Create a display to show the major geologic eras. Indicate the names, specific features, and approximate length of each.
- Indiana's Glaciers, Show the extent of Indiana's three main glaciers.
- Indiana Geology, Exhibit a map or sketch of Indiana showing at least ten sites with interesting geological formations. Describe the formation and sketch or show a picture of the formation.
- Field Trip, Describe a geology field trip that you took. Describe where you went and what you learned. Include photographs (if possible) or sketch what you saw.
- Collections. Display and identify one of the following: 8-16 minerals, fossils, or 4-8 of each (half
 minerals and half fossils). You may exhibit a new collection in subsequent years but not one you
 have already exhibited.

<u>Turn in completed manual with your exhibit.</u> Be sure to complete at least 3 activities in your manual <u>each</u> year.

Level 3: Grades 9 – 12 (one State Fair entry)

★Curriculum: Manual 4-H-987

Exhibit

Display a poster (or use an exhibit box) based on one of the following activities:

- Geology Research, Prepare a display to teach others about the topic you studied. Include an
 appropriate title, abstract (brief description of your topic), and photographs, drawings, charts, or
 graphs that help explain your topic. This activity may be repeated if a new topic is chosen in
 subsequent years.
- Lapidary and Jewelry. Show how stones and minerals are turned into polished stones and jewelry. Show and explain the steps involved.
- Miniatures. Display five miniatures in a display box and explain the benefits of collecting miniatures and how they are prepared.
- Indiana's State Parks or Forests. Create a matching game of Indiana's State Parks or Forests and a brief description. This exhibit option should include geological features of the park or forest.
- Indiana, U.S., or World Geology. Teach others about one Indiana, U.S., or World Geology topic.
- Career Exploration. Prepare a display that explains your interview with someone who needs an
 understanding of geology to do their job.

<u>Turn in completed manual with your exhibit.</u> Be sure to complete at least 3 activities in your manual <u>each</u> year.

Level: Independent Study: Grades 9-12, one state fair entry

Exhibit

Advanced topic - Learn all you can about a geology topic and present it on a poster. Include a
short manuscript, pictures, graphs, and list the works cited to describe what you did and what you
learned. Title your poster, "Advanced Geology – Independent Study."

Mentoring - Exhibit a poster that shows how you mentored a younger 4-H member. Include your planning, the time you spent, the challenges and advantages of mentoring, and how the experience might be useful in your life. Photographs and other documentation are encouraged. Resources must be from educational or government entities. Title your poster, "Advanced Geology - Mentor."

<u>Turn in completed manual with your exhibit.</u> Be sure to complete at least 3 activities in your manual <u>each</u> year.

"GIFT WRAPPING" - No State Fair Exhibit

The 4-H Gift Wrapping Projects are not exhibited at State Fair. However, a 4-H member may do an action demonstration on "gift wrapping" at the State Fair. Contact your 4-H Youth Educator for details.

General Rules: Do NOT put a gift in the wrapped package. The package should contain a baggie of sand or dirt that will help weigh the package down and make it easier to display. Each wrapped package should include an index card containing the following information: 1) theme, 2) occasion for the gift, 3) gender and age of the recipient. A 4-H'er may do an action demonstration in addition to exhibiting a wrapped package each year.

Note: Remember a desired exhibit has no tape showing and all raw edges are folded over/under.

- Enhancements (optional)

Option #2. One wrapped gift that meets <u>all</u> of the following category requirements listed below. Use new techniques or materials each year.

- Shape odd shaped box or tin (i.e., octagon, round, oval, cylinder) (maximum of 24 inches in any direction)
- Wrapping material any pre-printed paper (i.e., commercial wrapping paper, newspaper, comic strip paper, etc.)
- Techniques use any or all of the following techniques (wrapping odd shape or stacking)
- Bows self-made bow (one material)
- Enhancements optional

For the 4-H Home Environment project, 4-H members at each grade level may choose from three possible exhibit categories: •a furniture item and notebook, •a design board (poster and notebook), or •a portfolio (notebook).

Level 3 participants will also have a fourth choice: independent study.

NOTE: Each level has several options per category from which to choose.

We suggest that 4-H members either choose a different option each year or show how they expanded on the same option (portfolio and furniture categories only) used in previous years.

All posters, notebooks, and display boards **MUST** include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H members exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.

Categories

Furniture Item and Notebook -- An actual piece of furniture accompanied by a standard notebook (3-ring binder) explaining the who, what, when, where, why, and how of the chosen project. We suggest including pictures showing where the item will be used. Also, we encourage 4-H members to include pictures of themselves doing the project, but this is not required. Always place your identification information in the notebook and on the furniture.

Design Board and Notebook -- standard 22" x 28" poster, displayed horizontally with a firm backing. Design boards must be covered with plastic to protect and help hold items in place. An identification name tag must be attached in the lower right corner. The notebook is to help explain the who, what, when, where, why, and how of the chosen design. This can be a "before and after project" or "plan in the future" project.

Portfolio -- standard notebook (3-ring binder). If 4-H members choose to do this option more than one year, we suggest that they keep the previous year's materials in the notebook. Place materials for the current year in the front, with the previous year's materials clearly marked or labeled at the back. Always place your identification information in the notebook.

Other information:

Color samples -- These can be paint samples from a paint or hardware store, or color samples the 4-H member makes with paints or colored pencils.

Other samples -- Many hardware or home improvement stores have free samples of wall coverings, flooring, countertops, and cabinet materials that can be used with the 4-H member's design board or portfolio.

Colored pencils -- We suggest using colored pencils when coloring the design board or portfolio. Colored pencils are what professionals use! Keep in mind that the entire area does not need to be colored in, but be sure to apply enough color to adequately express design ideas. Other methods for coloring will also be accepted. These could include (but are not limited to): crayons, watercolor pencils, markers, or printing on the computer.



"MICROWAVE" - No State Fair Exhibit

** COMMUNITY JUDGING - TUESDAY, JULY 6TH **

4-H'ers will be able to describe and perform the basics of microwave cooking, describe what microwaves are and how they function, terminology, nutrition and an opportunity to perform experiments.

EXHIBIT must be wrapped with plastic wrap or bag. **Recipes on a 5" X 8" recipe card** are required for all microwave cooking exhibits. Cards are available in the Extension Office. Cards should be covered in clear wrapping of some kind, i.e., plastic wrap, a baggie, etc.

*** A box mix may be used in this project. ***

For Food Competitions: Fillings, frostings, glazes, and meringues are not permitted to contain cream cheese, sour cream, heavy cream, or whipped cream if they are not fully cooked/baked. These items are allowed as ingredients in food products IF the final product is cooked/baked. Additionally, raw milk, raw milk products or uncooked eggs/egg whites are not permitted. Eggs/egg whites that have been cooked to 160oF (i.e. pasteurized or included as part of a batter and baked) are acceptable. No home-canned fruits, vegetables, or meats are permitted as ingredients in food products.

Fresh-cut, uncooked, fruits and/or vegetables are not permitted to be used in food products or used as garnishes for the product. Foods should be transported to the competition in a way that minimizes contamination and maintains the quality of the food (i.e. foods that are judged as frozen should remain frozen at all times).

Recipes must be provided that identifies all ingredients that were used in each part of the product. Any ingredient that could be a potential allergen must be clearly identified. Each food product must be labeled with the following information:

- * Name
- * Date the food product was made

Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods. If cuts are present, the wound should be bandaged and a single use food service glove worn on the hand during all stages of food production. Contestants should not be preparing food exhibits for competition within 48 hours of recovering from any illness. People experiencing symptoms of vomiting, diarrhea, fever, and/or jaundice should not be allowed to prepare food.

"MICROWAVE" - continued

Judges and individuals who will consume products from county and/or state competitions should be informed that they are at risk for foodborne illness since the established policy cannot guarantee that an entry has been properly prepared or handled before, during or following the competition. The food products for competitions are home produced and processed and the production area is not inspected by the Indiana State Department of Health. Tasting of a food product is solely at the discretion of the judge and consumers. Judges are NOT to taste any home preserved foods such as low-acid or acidified foods like green beans, tomatoes or tomato products, jams/jellies/fruit preserves or fermented products produced in the home.

EXHIBIT REQUIREMENTS:

ALL DIVISIONS - Complete at least 3 activities in your manual each year.

An Action Demonstration – this can be done "instead of" or "in addition to" your 4-H microwave exhibit. Contact the Extension Office for more information.

LEVEL A (Grade 3-4) - Manual - "Bag of Tricks" (BU-8087)

- <u>Grade 3</u> Exhibit one (1) to two (2) cups of a <u>microwave snack</u> in a plastic container or zip close baggie. Turn in your completed manual and a 5"X8" recipe card (covered).
- <u>Grade 4</u> Exhibit <u>6 pieces of fudge</u> 1 inch square on a disposable paper plate or covered cardboard. Turn in your completed manual and a 5"X8" recipe card (covered).

- <u>Grade 5</u> Exhibit <u>6 bar cookies or brownies</u> on a disposable plate, or covered cardboard. <u>Turn in your</u> completed manual and a 5"X8" recipe card (covered).

LEVEL C (Grade 7-9) - Manual - "Amazing Rays" (BU-8089)

- <u>Grade 7</u> Exhibit <u>a fruit crisp</u> of any kind in a microwave safe container. <u>Turn in your completed manual and a 5"X8" recipe card (covered).</u>
- <u>Grade 8</u> Exhibit <u>a coffee cake</u> in a microwave safe dish. <u>Turn in your completed manual and a 5"X8"</u> recipe card (covered).
- <u>Grade 9</u> Exhibit a microwave <u>candy</u> product (other than fudge) on a disposable plate, or covered cardboard. Note: candy that is cut in uniform pieces display 6 items. Other types of candy, exhibit an appropriate amount for an attractive exhibit. <u>Turn in your completed manual and a 5"X8"</u> recipe card (covered).

LEVEL D (Grades 10-12) - Manual - "Presto Meals" (BU-8090)

- Grade 10 Exhibit one double layer or bundt or ring cake on a covered cardboard. (NOTE: Custard, cream, or cream cheese frostings or fillings and raw egg white frosting are not acceptable in an exhibit because they are highly perishable when left at room temperature.) Turn in your completed manual and a 5"X8" recipe card (covered).
- <u>Grade 11</u> Exhibit one microwave <u>fruit and/or nut pie</u> in a microwave safe pie pan. Be sure to pre-bake crust in the microwave as described in the manual. (<u>NOTE:</u> Custard, cream, or cream cheese frostings or fillings and raw egg white frosting are not acceptable in an exhibit because they are highly perishable when left at room temperature.) <u>Turn in your completed manual and a 5"X8" recipe card (covered).</u>
- Grade 12 Exhibit a jar of jam or jelly in a jelly canning jar with a sealed lid. Product must be processed in a boiling water bath. Label with name of product, quantity, and date made. Note: These jars will be opened to taste. Turn in your completed manual and a 5"X8" recipe card (covered).

Exhibits may be from recipes included with the project materials or may be from any recipe the 4-H'er chooses.

THERE IS A LIMIT OF 2 STATE FAIR ENTRIES PER MEMBER IN PHOTOGRAPHY.

Your exhibit is due at the 4-H Community Center, FRIDAY, JUNE 25^{TH.}. Check-in is from 7:30 – 9:00 a.m. Judging will begin at 9:00 a.m. This project will have OPEN judging again this year. Members are encouraged to stay to meet with judge to hear comments on their project.

USE THE CORRECT TITLE FOR YOUR SECTION

The purpose of the 4-H Photography Project is not to make you a professional photographer, but to help you take good pictures. All sections can be completed with a simple box camera. You may use flash if you want and pictures do not have to be of any certain things; however, they should include a variety of subjects.

Photography Project Requirements:

- 1. All images are to be original images taken by the 4-H member.
- 2. Complete a 4-H Photography Record Sheet each year.
- 3. Photos must have been taken since the last project entry date of the county fair.
- 4. All poster exhibits are to be mounted on a background board 22 " X 28", displayed horizontally, mounted on stiff backing (foam board, corrugated board, thin paneling, thin luan board keep it thin and light) and covered with clear acetate/plastic.
- 5. Place identification label in the lower right hand corner on poster boards and salon prints. Place your identification label on your board and if possible, under your plastic. Exhibit label for <u>Salon</u> Prints only may be on the outside of the plastic.
- 6. Photographs may be vertical or horizontal but the poster must be displayed horizontally.
- 7. Number photo prints on your print boards 1 to 10.
- 8. Captions under your photographs are not recommended, nor are fluorescent posters.
- 9. Salon prints are one print, either Black & White or color, printed horizontally or vertically from any size negative. The print must be mounted on a standard 16" X 20" salon mount, displayed vertically and covered with plastic.
- 10. Sepia tone photographs (mono chromatic) are entered under the Black & White classes.
- 11. A 4-H member may do more than one 4-H Photography exhibit but only one in a category (i.e. 1 black and white exhibit and 1 color exhibit).

The poster must carry the title "Capturing Memories". It is recommended that you use and exhibit standard processing size for your prints. See mounting and labeling instructions section. Your prints may be a mix of digital and/or standard development.

LEVEL 1 COLOR PRINTS: "Experiences in Color"

EXHIBIT: 10 color pictures, none of which is larger than 4" X 6", nor smaller than 3½" X 5", any subject, mounted on a background board 22" X 28", displayed horizontally, on stiff backing covered with plastic. The poster must carry the title "Experiences in Color". It is recommended that you use and exhibit standard processing size for your prints. See mounting and labeling instructions section. Your prints may be a mix of digital and/or standard development.

No title recommended. NOTE: <u>MUST</u> include original photograph(s) on the back of the board and a listing of steps and/or procedures used to create the end product.

LEVEL 2 CELL PHONE PRINT: Photograph MUST be captured using only a common cell phone camera.

EXHIBIT: One (1) black & white or color print no smaller than 7" x 9" nor lager than 11" x 14", printed horizontally or vertically, mounted on a standard 16" x 20" salon mount, displayed VERTICALLY and covered with plastic. No title recommended.

EXHIBIT: (Any modified image maybe exhibited as creative/experimental.) One black & white and/or one color print or a combination no smaller than 7" X 9", nor larger than 11" X 14", printed horizontally or vertically, mounted on a standard 16" X 20" salon mount, displayed VERTICALLY and covered with plastic. No title recommended. NOTE: <u>MUST</u> Include original photograph(s) on the back of the display board and a listing of steps and/or procedures used to create the end product.

LEVEL 3 CELL PHONE PRINT: Photograph MUST be captured using only a common cell phone camera. EXHIBIT: One (1) black & white or color print no smaller than 7" x 9" nor lager than 11" x 14", printed horizontally or vertically, mounted on a standard 16" x 20" salon mount, displayed VERTICALLY and covered with plastic. No title recommended.

Digital Photograph Guidelines:

- 1. All images are to be original images taken by the 4-H member. Photography exhibits are to be taken by the 4-H members between county project check-in to the next year county project check-in.
- 2. Creative/Experimental print sizes must meet the size requirements of your chosen exhibit. It is recommended that the digital image be printed on photographic paper or very high quality copier paper. The paper quality will help in clarity and sharpness.
- 3. If a photograph is taken with a digital camera is just a straight forward photograph with no changes or augmentation, then it would be the same as one for the regular print board or salon print classes. To succeed as a digital image (as a separate classification) something more should be done to the photographic image.
- 4. DIGITAL VS. FILM anything that can be done in a dark room, on an enlarger, can be done on a computer, i.e. cropping, color correction, parallax, etc. If an image is digitally altered beyond what can be done on the enlarger, i.e. adding different background, removing buildings or people, adding text, hand-coloring, etc. it should be entered in the "Creative/Experimental" Class.

Mounting and Labeling:

This mounting may be of any color or texture. The pictures are to be neatly and securely mounted. Dry mounting tissue is best.

Salon mounts are available in most photo and art supply stores. They are available either in plain or with a cutout of the picture area. You may make your own. Matting is not required.

Label each exhibit with a Cass County exhibit label. It is recommended that this identification label be placed in the lower right-hand corner of your poster board or salon print and under the plastic. For Salon Prints only – the exhibit label may be on the outside of the plastic. For State Fair entries, do not remove the 4-H member's ID label.

All posters, notebooks, and display boards **MUST** include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H members exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of

a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.

Please be sure to enroll in the correct grade division listed on the Pocket Pet information page. Be sure that your horizontally displayed poster is 22" X 28" and mounted on stiff material, covered with plastic and includes a 4-H exhibit label.

Poster Topics:

Grade 3 – Basic Pet Needs and Grooming of Your Pet

<u>Grade 4</u> – **Animal Body Parts** – Describe your pet's body parts. Do any of these parts serve a purpose or function? i.e. turtle shell (protection), wings (to fly), feathers (to maintain body temperature), etc.

Grade 5 - Diet - Explain your animal's diet, nutritional needs and what you feed your animal.

<u>Grade 6</u> – **Domestication** – Describe how the animal you are exhibiting became a domesticated pet.

<u>Grade 7</u> – **Shopping for Pets** – Show cost comparison for your pet's supplies. You could include items such as: bedding (shavings), food, cage/aquariums, toys, food & water dishes, housing, etc. You could get information from pet stores, books, magazines, etc.

<u>Grade 8</u> – **The Digestive System** – Describe your animal's digestive system by showing and explaining the parts.

 $\underline{\text{Grade 9}} - \text{Diseases} - \text{Explore diseases your animal is susceptible to and the preventative measures to be taken and/or treatments.}$

<u>Grade 10</u> – **Taxonomy** – Are there different breeds or varieties of your kind of pet? Describe the characteristics and traits for your kind of animal. Describe any animals that are similar to yours and share the differences.

<u>Grade 11</u> – **Handling Your Pet** – Since you carry and hold small pets frequently, it is important to know how. Explain the proper handling procedures for your pet. Explain improper handling and why this can have negative effects for your pet.

<u>Grade 12</u> – **Vital Signs** – Explain the normal temperature, pulse rate, and respiratory rates (or ranges) for your pet. Other ideas to include on your poster are: take the body temperature, pulse rate, and respiration rate of your pet one time each week for 8 weeks; graph the results. Select a disease that would affect your pet's vital signs. Write a brief summary about the disease and how it can be prevented.

"SCARECROW" - No State Fair Exhibit

This project was developed to be enjoyed by the whole family, thus came the theme of a "family project." This project promotes family togetherness and creativity. Any 4-H family can enter a scarecrow in the county fair.

★Curriculum: Cass County 4-H Scarecrow Manual (first year), General Record sheet each year.

EXHIBIT RULES:

- 1. A "Family" project may include father, mother, single parent, grandparents, guardian, sisters, brothers, etc.
- 2. All family members are encouraged to work on this project together.
- 3. Limit one scarecrow per family.
- 4. Scarecrows may be made out of any type of building materials; such as wood, metal or plastic. Any type of clothing material may be used.
- 5. SIZE: EXHIBIT SHALL NOT BE TALLER THAN 5 FEET OR WIDER THAN 4 FEET.
- 6. Exhibit must be constructed so that it can be hung with an appropriately attached hanger or design your own stand to support <u>or</u> hold your scarecrow.

- 7. Must be functional for field or other outdoor use such as "decorative". Traditional farm apparel may be used. A "T" type construction is easiest and recommended.
- 8. A new scarecrow must be made each year. The stand can be reused.
- 9. All scarecrows will be judged together. A "one division for all" theme will be incorporated.
- 10. 4-H'ers must enroll in the scarecrow project on the 4-H enrollment form.
- 11. <u>Turn in completed record sheet with the project.</u> (One per scarecrow.)

Build yourself a good reference library. Many good resources are available. Examples: Coats and Clark, Vogue, McCalls, Simplicity, Butterick, Purdue publications.


Each garment will be given a ribbon of its earnings and then a champion and reserve champion ribbon will be given in Grades 3 - 7; upper divisions will be given a champion and a reserve champion according to state fair categories: informal or casual wear, suit or coat, dress-up wear, separates, formal wear, free choice.

- 1) ALL divisions follow manuals for requirements.
- 2) Interfacing to be used where necessary.
- 3) Material should be "on the grain".
- 4) **Stitch In The Ditch** It is basically a top-stitching method used where two pieces of fabric create a seam. The stitch is sew on the right side of the garment directly over the seam where two pieces of fabric have been sewn together. The stitch goes through all layers and is most commonly done to reinforce or hold something in place.
- 5) Any 4-H'er may have a choice of wearing a different garment for fashion revue other than the one judged for construction.
- 6) Second year 4-H'ers are to use a washable fabric.
- 7) You may make more garments and articles than those listed.
- 8) In the advanced divisions a 4-H member may enter and exhibit in more than one category.
- 9) Complete your 4-H sewing record sheet and techniques card and turn in with your project.

Skills to Learn and Include in Exhibit

Advanced Sewing Wearable Exhibits (Level C & D) (Fashion Revue Categories)

- 1. All senior sewing wearable exhibits (Grades 8-12) are to be made so it can be worn by the exhibitor or another person. All senior sewing (Grades 8-12) outfits exhibited in Fashion Revue must be made and worn by the exhibitor.
- 2. Make a garment that meets the exhibit category requirement.
- 3. Make or select one or more additional garments
- 4. Show and tell others what you have learned.
- 5. Complete your record and skills card to turn in with exhibit.

A definition of an outfit: An outfit is a garment or garments that when put together make a <u>complete look</u> - such as one or two piece dress, or one or two piece pant suit, or a three piece combination, such as pants, vest, and blouse or shirt.

- Informal or Casual Wear: A complete outfit of one or two pieces suitable for school, weekend, or casual, informal activities.
- <u>Dress-up:</u> This is suitable for special, church, or social "dress up" occasions which are not considered to be formal. It may be an outfit of one or more pieces with or without its own costume coat or jacket (lined or unlined). This is not an outfit which would be worn to school, weekend, or casual, informal activities.
- <u>Free Choice:</u> A complete outfit comprised of garments which do not fit in the other classifications. Examples include: tennis wear, swim wear, or athletic or sportswear; lounge wear; riding habits; historic, dance, theatrical, or international costumes; capes and unlined coats.
- <u>Suit or Coat:</u> The suit consists of two pieces including a skirt or pants and it's own lined jacket. It is not a dress with jacket as in "dress up wear." The coat is a separate lined coat. It will be judged separately as a coat with its own accessories.
- <u>Separates:</u> Consists of three garments which must be worn as a coordinated complete outfit. Each piece should be versatile enough to be worn with other garments.
- <u>Formal Wear:</u> This outfit may be one or more pieces suitable for any formal occasion, such as proms, weddings, and formal evening functions.

INTERPRETATION STATEMENTS:

Handcrafted garments should be modeled in the appropriate class.

A wrap (cape, coat, shawl, etc.) which would be worn during the entire formal occasion may be modeled in the formal category. If the wrap is designed to be worn only to and from the occasion, the total outfit can be modeled in free choice. However, if the formal or wrap is to be judged on its own merit, it should be placed in the appropriate category.

If a wedding outfit is considered a formal by the participant, it may be worn in the formal category. However, if the participant considers the outfit to be a costume, it may be worn in free choice.

- 1) All exhibitors must be enrolled in the Shooting Sports Club and meet County and Club guidelines.
- 2) It is recommended that 1st year members (in lower grades) enroll in only the rifle and/or archery disciplines.
- 3) The objectives of this organization are to improve the knowledge relating to the proper care and safe handling of firearms and archery equipment, the management of target areas and competitions and the concepts of hunting and conservation.
- 4) Membership is open to boys and girls under the general 4-H rules and club by-laws within the available instructor's capacity to handle them and the capability of the 4-H'ers to handle equipment properly and safely within each discipline.
- 5) <u>Required Annually</u>, a signed "Projects, Events, and Activities Release Form" must be on file in the Extension Office for each 4-H Shooting Sports project member in order for the 4-H'er to participate in any part of the Shooting Sports project.
- 6) No member may bring firearms, archery equipment, or their components to any meeting unless they have received permission from an instructor to do so.
- 7) Firearms brought to meetings with instructor's permission shall be turned over to the instructors immediately upon arrival.
- 8) All members must use eye and hearing protection in the area of the firing line.
- 9) Member divisions will be: Level 1 Grades 3- 5, Level 2 Grades 6-8, Level 3 Grades 9-12
- 10) All posters "MUST" be 22" x 28" mounted on stiff material, displayed horizontally, and covered with plastic and have a 4-H exhibit label in the lower right hand corner.
- 11) All exhibits must be turned in by fair entry deadline to the sign-in location.
- 12) All completed Shooting Sports manuals and record sheets MUST be turned in by the last general meeting or to an instructor or the Extension Office <u>AHEAD OF</u> the general meeting. If not received by then, the member will forfeit those points towards the overall award selections.
- 13) These rules and others as noted in our by-laws remain in effect at all times.
- 14) A 4-H member may enroll in more than one discipline but only needs to complete one exhibit in their grade level (**NOT** per discipline).

- <u>A Different Spin</u> Display a picture of you while casting and a completed Casting Record and Spinning Reel Parts diagram. Also, answer the Working the Lure and Setting the Hook questions. (You may copy the ones in your manual or make your own.)
- A Fine Kettle of Fish Show a drawing or photograph of you cooking fish. Include your recipe and, if
 possible, pictures of you cleaning and/or cooking your fish.
- <u>Clean up the Litterbug</u> Complete and display the chart shown on page 16. Draw or take a photo of the fishing place that you cleaned up (before and after).
- <u>The Woolly Bugger</u> Take pictures or make drawings to show how a wooly bugger is made. Answer the Casting Out and Working the Lure questions.
- <u>A Fish by Design</u> Draw, take pictures, or find pictures on the Internet or in magazines to show (and identify) different mouth/feeding fish, body shapes, and fish with different coloration. Briefly explain (3-5 sentences or bullet points) why fish have different mouths, body shapes, and coloration.

Level 3 (Grade 9 to 12)

Exhibit a poster based on one of the following activities from your manual.

- <u>A Reel Mess</u> Draw, take photos, or copy the reels shown in Cleaning a Reel. Label the reels, the parts of each reel, and where you might use it. Show how you cleaned a reel using pictures or drawings.
- <u>Designing a Skillathon Station</u> Make two skillathon stations (you may use the suggestions on page 9 or another fishing topic of your choice). List the topic, realistic situation, task, and materials needed. Take photographs of younger 4-H members using your stations.
- <u>Beads, Dog Hair, and Feathers</u> Collect materials and tie a fly. You can display your fly or a picture of the fly. Also, list and draw or take pictures of the 7 materials in the matching game and indicate their potential use.
- <u>Collecting Aquatic Insects</u> Complete and display the chart on page 18 (you may copy the chart in your book or make your own). Draw or take pictures of your kick net and your sampling procedures. Answer the questions in Casting Out and Working the Lure.
- <u>Cast Into the Future</u> Complete the Career Investigation Record after talking with someone currently working in an area related to fish or fishing. Include a picture of the person you interviewed and answer the questions in Casting Out, Working the Lure, Setting the Hook, and Landing the Fish.
- <u>Keep a Field Journal</u> Reproduce or copy 3-5 Field Journal entries on your display. Include photographs that show where you had the fishing experience, if possible.
- <u>Playing Know Your Fish</u> Make a "flap" quiz to teach fish facts. Show a picture or ask a question about a fish. Give the answer(s) under the flap. Choose 5 10 fish using at least 5 fish from your manual. Be sure to list multiple species if the information you provide applies to more than one of the species you choose.

Level: Independent Study: Grades 9-12, One State Fair

- Advanced Topic Learn all you can about a sport fishing topic of your choice and present it on a poster.
 Include a short manuscript, pictures, graphs, and list the references you used to describe what you did and what you learned. Title your poster, "Advanced Sport Fishing-Independent Study."
- Mentoring Exhibit a poster that shows how you mentored a younger 4-H member. Include your planning, the time you spent, the challenges and advantages of mentoring, and how the experience might be useful in your life. Photographs and other documentation are encouraged. Title your poster, "Advanced Sport Fishing Mentor."

Your exhibit is due at the 4-H Community Center, **SATURDAY**, **JUNE 26**TH, **between 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.**

"THEME SCRAPBOOK" - No State Fair Exhibit

The purpose of the scrapbook project is to allow you to preserve your memories in an organized and creative way. Your scrapbook must have a theme.

★Curriculum: County 4-H Theme Scrapbook Manual – first year, Record Sheet – each year Skills Card – each year

<u>Level A</u> – Grades 3-4 <u>Level B</u> – Grades 5-6 <u>Level C</u> – Grades 7-9 <u>Level D</u> – Grades 10-12 Project Guidelines:

- This is a project that teaches you how to preserve memories. Choose ONE theme other than 4-H for the
 focus of your scrapbook. This can be about your life or about something in someone else's life.
 Example: pets, friends, family, new baby, special events, school hobbies, sports, holiday, special
 person, etc. A new theme may be chosen each year if desired.
- 2. Each scrapbook will have a front and back cover. Scrapbooks may be any dimension or thickness, but cannot be larger than 12" X 12" and must be able to have additional pages added. If you choose a book smaller in dimension than 8 ½" X 11", then you must do 2 pages for each page required. Example for Level D you would need to complete 12 pages (6 front and back) plus a title page.
- 3. Pages may be numbered if desired, but are not required to be numbered.
- 4. Each scrapbook <u>must include a complete and signed record sheet</u> in a plastic sleeve. Also, include your completed skills card in a plastic sleeve. Both of these should be in the back of your scrapbook.

"THEME SCRAPBOOK" - continued

- 5. Each scrapbook must contain the minimum number of new "scrapbook" pages per your level for judging. Previously exhibited pages will not count as part of your current year's minimum. These pages are in addition to the title page, record sheet and skills card. All pages must be in protective plastic sleeves or covers. Mark the pages that are to be judged with post-it flags and number the flags to show the new pages. Only the required number of pages will be judged. If pages are not marked, the pages will be judged starting at the front of the book until the number required has been met and points will be deducted from the score. Do not include any incomplete or unfinished pages. 5 pages completed on front and back fulfill a 10 page minimum requirement.
- 6. Each book <u>must</u> contain a title page at the front of the book. <u>This page must be decorated to represent the theme chosen for the book.</u> Also included on this page should be your title, and <u>a handwritten or typed short paragraph describing the theme and contents of your book.</u> Also the county tag must be included on the lower right corner of this page and this page should be covered the same as all other pages. Do <u>NOT</u> use a tag attached with a string for a label. The main function of this page is for display at the county fair. As only the champion books will be displayed in their entirety. <u>This is a judged page</u> and counts into your total score but is in addition to your total pages required.

Level A (grades 3-4) Complete 6 new pages (plus a title page). Include 4 different skills or techniques.

- · Include record sheet.
- · Include skills card.
- · Level A Journaling—Use phrases or bullet journaling written in only straight lines.
- · Level A Cropping (for pictures) Use straight line cuts only (square, rectangle, star or triangle.

Level B (grades 5-6) Complete 8 new pages (plus a title page). Include 6 different skills or techniques.

- · Include record sheet.
- · Include skills card.
- Level B Journaling—Use phrases or bullet journaling. Journaling must include at least one sentence per completed page. Journaling done in straight lines or shapes made with templates.
- Level B Cropping (for pictures) Use straight line cuts, also circles and ovals created with templates.

Level C (grades 7-9) Complete 10 new pages (plus a title page). Include 8 different skills or techniques.

- · Include record sheet.
- · Include skills card.
- Level C Journaling—Use phrases, bullet journaling, complete sentences, and must include one short paragraph per layout. Journaling may be done in straight lines, shapes made with templates, or around photos.
- Level C Cropping (for pictures) Use straight line cuts, circles, ovals, shapes created with templates, or silhouette (cutting around the outline of the people in photos).

Level D (grades 10-12) Complete 12 new pages (plus a title page). Include 10 different skills or techniques.

- · Include record sheet.
- · Include skills card.
- Level D Journaling Use phrases, bullet journaling, complete sentences, and short
 paragraphs on each layout. You must include one page of journaling telling the story of what your
 theme is. Journaling may be done in any shape or style that you desire.
- Level D Cropping (for pictures) Use straight line cuts, circles, ovals, shapes created with templates, or silhouette (cutting around the outline of the people in photos).
- 7. Photos and memorabilia must be included in each scrapbook, but not necessarily on each page. Some pages may contain only photos, while others may contain only memorabilia. Examples of memorabilia: brochures, ticket stubs, programs, certificates, etc. Be sure to include a variety in your list of pages to be judged. Keep in mind that the main goal is good preservation of your memories. Memorabilia must be encased in a separate plastic sleeve if added to a page with photos. If a photo is included on a page with a lot of memorabilia, the photo should be encased in a separate plastic sleeve. Newspaper articles must be photocopied onto acid free paper or sprayed with archival spray. Newspaper articles can also be laminated to make them photo safe and to preserve them.
- 8. All items must be securely mounted and labeled. Labels may be done using any media (stamps, handwritten, computer generated, typed, etc.) Be creative, imaginative, neat, and organized. Journaling is a must; without it photos and memorabilia will become less meaningful. <u>Journaling should be handwritten as neatly as possible. Handwriting is a part of your heritage please use it often.</u>
 <u>Each page must contain some handwritten journaling but may have some typed journaling as an option.</u> Example of labeling: "My Friends at the Zoo." Example of journaling: "My friend, Jessica, loved the giraffes the best." Do not use pencils, ballpoint pens, watercolor makers, construction paper, or page covers or sleeves that contain PVC's. When purchasing materials to use in your scrapbook, choose only those labeled "photo safe."
- 9. Remember you are telling a story. Use chronological order (the order in which events happened) to organize your album The scrapbook album must demonstrate a good sense of the entire project and what it means to preserve your memories.

"THEME SCRAPBOOK" - continued

- 10. Photo quality will NOT be a factor in judging. Try to use good photographs; however this is NOT the photography project.
- 11. Neatness Counts! Neatness is very important. Exhibit clean pages (i.e. no smudges, spills, crossing out).
- 12. Each single page or double page layout must include who, what, when and where. Double page layouts must use the same background paper and carry the same theme through both pages.
- 13. Fancy cuts such as decorative scissors must be used only on background paper not on pictures.
- 14. Corner rounders may be used on photos and papers at any level.
- 15. When using busy background paper, remember journaling should be in a journaling box on a separate piece of paper and then attached to your page.
- 16. Be sure to use materials that are acid-free, lignin-free, or buffered including your page sleeves or covers. No crayon, pencil, ballpoint pen, watercolor markers, construction paper or products containing PVC's should be used. Make sure to read labels for photo safe products. Remember, you want your hard work to last a lifetime.
- 17. Be creative—all work should be your own.

Note: If you are late with entering your scrapbook and judging has started, your project will be counted down.

GENERAL RULES:

- 1. Projects will be judged by Beginner, Intermediate, or Advanced divisions.
- 2. Exhibit your display according to the guidelines listed below.
- 3. Complete the attached record sheet, have your leader sign it, and turn it in with your exhibit.
- 4. Exhibits will be judged according to the following criteria: artistic arrangement of exhibit; detail of exhibit; and realistic setting around toys, furniture and decorations.
- 5. Toys used in your display can be scale desired; the preferred size is 1/64 or 1/16.
- 6. Farm toys can be obtained at farm equipment dealers, department stores, farm stores and farm toy shows. Farm toy shows probably offer the widest selection of toys.
- 7. Landscape supplies and doll house miniatures can be obtained at hobby shops, craft supply stores, and even in your own back yard.
- 8. Fencing, land and roadways are not included in the maximum number of items that may be included in each division (for toy farm scenes).
- 9. Every effort will be made to keep your exhibit safe, but the Cass County 4-H Club Association is not responsible for lost or damaged items from your exhibit.
- 10. It is suggested that projects be secured by enclosing your exhibit with Plexiglas or other material. If the doll house has an open side, a clear protective shield of some type could be added for security.

- 1. Prepare a farm scene layout that is no larger than: 3' wide X 2' deep X 2' high (outside dimensions). This includes any and all "protection" in the total measurements, i.e. plexiglass case.
- 2. Any scale of toys may be used, the preferred size is 1/64 or 1/16.
- 3. Display must be built on rigid wood (i.e.: plywood)
- 4. This division is open to create any type of farm. Example: Farmstead (buildings, grain handling equipment, field work, harvesting, or crops and animals); Farm Equipment Stores; Historical Layout; Farm Business Layout; or Specialty Agriculture Area Layout.

Actual ownership of an animal is not required, but you should have easy access to some type of animal. 4-H Veterinary Science exhibits should be educational in nature covering one (1) or more of the topics presented in the members' manual and/or found in the 4-H Veterinary Science Leaders Guide. An educational exhibit is one that should be able to teach other people about your topic. Chose a topic you think is interesting and apply your imagination. All 4-H members developing Veterinary Science 4-H fair exhibits should consult with their 4-H Veterinary Science leaders for further details, helpful ideas, and additional sources for reference.



COLLECTIONS: (choose one to exhibit)

- Collect and exhibit 5 items or 5 pairs of items. These articles can be rocks, coins, insects, salt and pepper shakers, pencils, or any kind of fun collection. Attach a 3x5-inch card that tells what you collected and why you collected the items.

 road, across a field, through the water or the air.
- Make a model using any type of Legos, Keep it simple and no larger than 10" X 10". <u>Please Note:</u>
 The use of the word "Lego" is used only as a guide for the project. You are free to use any brand of plastic snap-together or connecting pieces to complete your project.

READING: (choose one to exhibit)

- Draw a picture of your favorite book character. Display this on a poster.
- Create a model or diorama of a scene from your favorite book.
- Write a short book report about your favorite book. List the name of the book and the author. Display in a notebook or on a poster.
- Design a new book cover for your favorite book. Display on a poster
- Create a paper bag book report. Decorate a paper bag to show your favorite book, then fill it with 5 items to represent characters or what happens in the book.
- Make a map of your library, to help others find their way around. Display this on a poster.
- Make a poster about your book.
- There are lots of ideas on the Internet. Be creative and use your imagination!

In this project, you should obtain/purchase a grade specific kit from the Extension Office. With the help of an adult, assemble the kit.

- a) First Grade: Tin Can Robot and record sheet. (Kit is \$11.00 from the Extension Office.)

- c) <u>If choosing not to obtain a kit</u>, exhibit <u>one</u> of your activity pages from your manual and your record sheet.

- Make a poster about your own make-believe planet. Be creative. If you were going to visit this planet, what would you find?


