



## CLAY COUNTY 4-H SHEEP

### ENROLLMENT:

- a) Premise ID numbers are required
- b) Enrolled animals must be owned by the 4-H exhibitor by said deadline of **May 15, 2023** and must be under the continuous care, responsibility, and ownership through the date of the show, except where change of ownership was to 4-H member's complete ownership. Siblings will be allowed to co-enroll sheep on 4HOnline.
- c) 4-H members must be enrolled in Clay County 4-H and in the Sheep Project on 4HOnline by the annual Spring ID Day (**May 6, 2023**).
- d) All 4-H market lambs and ewes must be enrolled on [4HOnline](#) and identified with a county ID tag by the Annual Spring ID Day (**May 6, 2023**). Registered ewes may use a flock tag for identification, but must be identified at tag-in. All market lambs will be weighed at this time for the Rate of Gain competition also.
- e) All market lambs and commercial ewes exhibiting at the Indiana State Fair must be RFID tagged at Tag Day. All sheep must have a DNA Hair Sample turned into the Extension Office by **May 15<sup>th</sup>, 2023** at 4:00 p.m. to be eligible for State Fair.
- f) County Fair class entries will be due by **July 1, 2023** on [FairEntry.com](#).

### HEALTH:

- a) All sheep must be unloaded outside of the barn.
- b) All sheep must be free of blankets when unloaded at the fair.
- c) No animal may enter the barn until inspection of the animal is completed by a veterinarian or the Sheep Superintendent(s).
- d) All sheep must have no more than 1/4" wool growth at county fair check-in with the exception of breeding stock intended to be shown as fitted.
- e) No sheep may be exhibited that are showing signs of being infected with ringworm.
- f) No sheep may be exhibited that are showing signs of prolapsing.
- g) Health rules as provided by the Indiana State Board of Animal Health will be followed. In case of a health question, a veterinarian will be contacted.
- h) All female 4-H sheep projects (regardless of age) must be identified with the USDA approved plastic ear tag in order to be exhibited at shows unless it is registered and has a registration tag.
- i) **SCRAPIES CONTROL IN SHEEP.** All sheep from an area not declared scrapies free by the U.S.D.A. must be treated by a method approved by the U.S.D.A. and the board of animal health within fifteen (15) days prior to the opening date of the exhibition.

### GROOMING:

4-H Exhibitors may receive clipping and grooming assistance from members of their immediate family (father, mother, and siblings), from a legal guardian, from a current Indiana 4-H member, and from individuals enrolled in the Indiana 4-H Approved Animal Grooming Assistance Program. **Please contact the Extension Office with questions on how to be approved or to see if you are already on the approved groomers list.**

### PENNING:

- a) The Superintendent will assign stall space prior to bringing sheep to the Fairgrounds.
- b) Sheep exhibitors will furnish bedding materials.
- c) No muzzles are allowed on the sheep at any time.
- d) Pens must be cleaned and inspected by the superintendent or a member of the barn committee on the night of release.**
- e) There will be a pen/stall fee of no more than \$5 per pen/stall due at the beginning of fair. Please see your leader for further communication on this closer to fair.



## **SHOW:**

- a) All 4-H Livestock must be shown by a current Clay County 4-H member.
- b) Mini 4-H'ers will show at the beginning of showmanship. The Mini 4-H Show will include Kindergarten, 1st, and 2nd graders that are enrolled in the Clay Co. Mini 4-H program and entered in the sheep project by **June 15, 2023**.
- c) If two animals are in the same class, a substitute showman (current Clay County 4-H member) may be selected by the 4-Her. Members must notify the leaders of all substitutions before the show begins.
- d) No ice to be used on lambs. Cold, wet towels can be used. Ice can be used under the sheep's chin if sheep is overheated. This is with the approval of the Sheep Superintendent.
- e) No foreign objects are to be inserted or placed inside the sheep, except by a licensed veterinarian at the fairgrounds and/or approved by the Sheep Superintendent.
- f) Two lambs, two yearling ewes, one pair of ewe lambs, and one pair of yearling ewes may be exhibited per breed.
- g) All breeding animals shown in breeding classes must be ewes.
- h) Breeding classes for registered breeding stock will be provided for all recognized breeds.
- i) **Clay County show does not require registration papers; however, the State Fair does and breeds will need to pass classification.**
- j) Market Class Lambs can be wethers or ewes (No Rams!). Market lambs will be divided into classes by breed, and then by weight at the superintendent's discretion.
- k) Exhibitors may show a total of six market lambs.
- l) If an exhibitor has two animals that fall in the same weight class, they may show one animal in the next heavier class providing they have no other entry in that class.
- m) Ewe lambs may be shown in breeding class or market class, NOT in both classes
- n) The Grand Champion Market Lamb will be selected from all the breed champion market lambs. A Reserve Grand Champion Market Lamb will be selected from the remaining breed champions and the reserve breed champion to the Grand Champion.
- o) The Grand Champion Ewe will be selected from all the breed champion ewes. A Reserve Grand Champion Ewe will be selected from the remaining breed champions and the reserve breed champion to the Grand Champion.
- p) For market lambs, including wethers and ewes only Clay County tags will be allowed during the time of exhibit. Clay County tags are a five-digit tag.

## **BORN & RAISED:**

- a) The Born and Raised sheep must be raised by a Clay County 4-H member and immediate family's herd — NOT grandparent(s) or aunt(s) or uncle(s) family's herd. **Exhibitor must notify sheep Superintendent at time of tagging weigh-in/tagging if their animal is homegrown.**
- b) The Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Born and Raised selection will be held immediately following the selection of the Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion.
- c) Exhibitor may show a maximum of six market lambs, which includes any market lamb shown as Born and Raised.
- d) Classes for the Born and Raised will be determined by weight.
- e) The number of classes will be determined by the sheep superintendents.
- f) If a 4-H member has two animals that fall in the same weight class, he or she may show one animal in the next heavier class providing that he or she has no entry in that class. If both fall in the heavier class, both may be shown in that class.



## **RATE OF GAIN:**

The Rate of Gain award will be presented to the market animal that has gained the most weight from tag-in day to the weigh-in at the fair.

## **SHOWMANSHIP:**

4-H members who participate in 4-H sheep showmanship classes may only show their own animals that will be exhibited by them in a regular 4-H class.

- a) **Junior Showmanship – 3<sup>rd</sup> through 5<sup>th</sup> graders** as of January 1, 2023 are eligible. Once an exhibitor is the overall Junior showman, the 4-Her is only eligible to compete in the Intermediate showmanship class the following year.
- b) **Intermediate Showmanship – 6<sup>th</sup> through 8<sup>th</sup> graders** as of January 1, 2023 and anyone who was won Junior Showmanship. Once an exhibitor is the overall Intermediate showman, the 4-Her is only eligible to compete in the Senior showmanship class the following year.
- c) **Senior Showmanship – 9<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> graders** as of January 1, 2023 and anyone who has previously won Intermediate Showmanship. The winning 4-Her is eligible to compete in the Champion of Champions classes in the same year and future years once he or she has won senior.
- d) **Champion of Champions Showmanship** – All previous Senior Division Champions, including the 2023 Senior Division Champion.

## **STATE FAIR INFORMATION:**

- a) Entries required by June 1st or by the date set by the Indiana State Fair on the Exhibitor Corners website (<https://bit.ly/3SMqDra>).
- b) All market lambs and crossbred ewes must have an RFID tag, 5-digit county ear tag and a DNA sample.
- c) 4-H/FFA Wool Show and Trimming Contest entries are made in July and on the State Fair online site.
- d) All registered ewes must have an RFID tag, can be identified by the ear tag that corresponds to the tag number listed on the Ewes registration paper and a DNA sample.

## **YQCA**

To exhibit beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, goats, poultry and rabbits, 4-H members must be certified through the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals. This is an annual program that can be completed via online modules or in-person trainings. More information about YQCA is available at <http://yqca.org> or via the Extension Office.

## **CLAY COUNTY 4-H LIVESTOCK AUCTION:**

Only animals in market classes may sell.

The Livestock Auction/Benefit for the Barns Event will be held upon the conclusion of the fair. In order to be eligible, you must show an animal at the fair and have a designated animal for auction. A small percentage auction fee will be deducted from each member's check. Detailed auction information will be finalized closer to fair.

## **ACTION DEMONSTRATION:**

An Action Demonstration is a way of showing off your sheep skills and abilities. You will be judged during the sheep judging.

## **WOOL SHOW**

- a) Each exhibitor is limited to two (2) fleeces in the show. Fleeces will be placed in proper class by the wool judge.
- b) Fleeces will be displayed at the Exhibit Hall except when being judged at the sheep show.
- c) Fleeces must be from the member's sheep flock animal. All fleeces for exhibit must be tied with paper twine (Standard wool twine).
- d) Exhibitor must sign fleece(s) in with superintendent on same day of Livestock check in.

## **IMPORTANT SHEEP DATES:**



<b>May 6, 2023 (9 a.m. - Noon)</b>	Sheep ID Day at the Fairgrounds
<b>May 15, 2023</b>	Deadline to enroll sheep online—The enrollment will not be complete if the sheep are not enrolled online. Exhibitors who fail to register their animals online before the May 15th deadline will not be enrolled and therefore will not exhibit sheep at the county or state fair.
<b>May 15, 2023</b>	DNA Samples must be returned to office if going to State Fair.
<b>June 15, 2023</b>	Mini 4-Her's must be signed up to participate in sheep show.
<b>July 1, 2023</b>	Fair Entry due
<b>TBD</b>	Deadline to register Sheep online for the State Fair.
<b>July 15-22, 2023</b>	Clay County Fair
<b>July 15, 2023 (6 a.m. - Noon)</b>	Sheep check-in at Clay County Fair
<b>July 18, 2023 (9 a.m.)</b>	Sheep show at Clay County Fair
