Tuesday, October 4, 2022 Location: Hendricks County 4-H Fairgrounds & Conference Complex Sessions:

1:00 pm "Back to Nature" by Amanda Veenhuizen: Being outside has countless benefits for our overall well-being. Being in nature does not always require an extreme amount of physical exertion. There are several activities, such as reading a book outdoors, that you can do to reap the benefits! Some of the benefits include: improved short term memory, reduced stress, increased levels of Vitamin D, improved sleep and much more! In this lesson, we are going to explore the benefits of connecting with nature and ways to help you achieve those!



2:00 pm "Food & Mood" with Mandy Gray: Learn what research tells us about how the food we consume affects our mood. What changes you can make in the types of food you eat as well as when you eat them to change your mood in a positive way!

3:00 pm "Creating a Friendly & Fun Environment Can Lead to Open Communication" by Pandora Taylor: Creating a friendly and fun environment can lead to open communications between people of all



ages. Whether it is with a group of friends, family members or children, crafting can be a great way for you to strengthen your relationship with others. In this session you will learn different ways to introduce crafts into your social life, where to find craft ideas for all age groups and how to craft on a budget. Our first Helping Hands Day this fall happened on September 8th and was a great success. Fourteen ladies attended and we were able to finish 15 fleece blankets for Riley. We also made 22 washcloths for hygiene kits that will be filled later. Fabric was ironed and folded for bags at a later time for Riley. They need the fleece blankets now and are in great shape on bags. We will resume making bags when needed. We met at Bartlett Chapel United Methodist Church on old 36. The fellowship hall was fantastic and allowed us to spread out and get so many projects done. Thank you, Joanna Sells, for arranging the fellowship hall for us.

After the blankets were all cut and tied we discussed what projects we would like to do for October's Helping Hands Day. Because of the wonderful ladies we have in Homemakers who have such giving hearts, fleece, washcloths, felt, pillow shams and many other things came in that day. This will allow us to use pillow shams to make quilts. Sandy Kelley said she would be glad to demonstrate how to Quilt As You Go at the October meeting. We have indoor/outdoor fabric that Martha Sellers suggested we could make into sling type bags with a drawstring for the homeless. Deloris Elza brought in felt and it was decided that it could be made into bags for a low income women and children's clinic in inner city Indianapolis. We are also going to make hygiene kits for the clinic.

Thank you ladies for all that you did and donated. It doesn't stop there. We still need 2 yd lengths of fleece washed in free and clear detergent with no softener. We will use most of the items donated for the hygiene kits after we fill 140 washcloths that are sewn up. That is travel size toothpaste, shampoo. conditioner, bars of soap, toothbrushes, and combs. The Lord is giving us an opportunity to bless those around us and even some that aren't in our neighborhood. Please look into your heart and see what you can do.

- Fleece, 2 yd lengths <u>ONLY</u> for this time. The fleece can either be Blizzard or "anti-pill", but should be washed in free and clear detergent with no softener. (HINT: If you decide to purchase enough fleece of one pattern to make multiple blankets, ask the store pre-cut the fabric into 2 yard lengths. It will not only make it easier for you to wash the fabric, but it will be much easier and quicker for our "cutters".)
- Tolietry Items: travel size toothpaste, shampoo, conditioner and bars of soap; toothbrushes; and combs.



Caramel Apple Strudel

Ingredients

- 5 medium Apples, peeled and chopped (5 cups)
- 3/4 cup apple cider
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2-3/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground allspice
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 frozen puff pastry sheet, thawed
- 1/4 cup caramel ice cream topping
- 1 egg
- 1 tablespoon water
- 1 tablespoon coarse sugar
- Sweetened whipped cream and additional caramel ice cream topping, optional

Directions

- Preheat oven to 375°. In a large saucepan, combine the first six ingredients. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, 15-20 minutes or until apples are tender, stirring occasionally. Cool completely.
- Unfold puff pastry onto a large sheet of parchment paper; roll into a 16x12-in. rectangle. Transfer paper and pastry to a baking sheet, placing a short side of the rectangle facing you. Using a slotted spoon, arrange apples on bottom half of pastry to within 1 in. of edges. Drizzle apples with caramel topping. Roll up jelly-roll style, starting with the bottom side. Pinch seams to seal and tuck ends under.
- In a small bowl, whisk egg with water; brush over pastry. Sprinkle with coarse sugar. Cut slits in top. Bake 25-30 minutes or until golden brown. If desired, serve with whipped cream and additional caramel topping. Yield: 8 servings.
