

ServSafe Food Manager Class & Examination

ServSafe educates food service workers about food safety.

ServSafe Food Protection Manager is their highest certification. It satisfies Indiana requirements to become a Certified Food Protection manager and focuses onfive aspects:

- Foodborne microorganisms and allergens
- · Personal hygiene
- · Purchasing, receiving, and storage
- · Preparing, cooking, and serving
- Facilities, cleaning/sanitation, and managing pests

The training includes a manual and proctored exam. You must score 75 percent or greater to earn the certificate. The certification is valid for five years. . A photo ID with signature is required to take the exam (driver license, state ID, student ID, military ID, employee ID, U.S. green card, or valid passport).

Jennings County to Develop a Bike and Pedestrian Master Plan

VERNON, Indiana – Jennings County has been awarded a Bike and Pedestrian Planning Grant from the Indiana Department of Health for \$20,000. Grant funds will be used to hire a consulting firm to work alongside a project advisory committee of county residents to create a Bike and Pedestrian Master Plan. Receiving this grant was made possible by \$20,000 in match funding committed by Jennings County Parks, North Vernon City Council, and Jennings County Council.

The project advisory committee will meet in the next several weeks to finalize the grant agreement and create a Request for Qualifications from firms interested in leading the planning process. There will be many opportunities for Jennings County residents to provide input through surveys and public input meetings at different locations around Jennings County. The process should take a year and will result in the adoption of a Bike and Pedestrian Master Plan by the Jennings County Commissioners.

A Bike and Pedestrian Master Plan is a public document adopted by local governments that incorporates residents' opinions on planned improvements, infrastructure changes, education programs, and other ways of making a community more bike and pedestrian-friendly. These plans are useful in guiding local decision-making and in securing grant funding for trail and sidewalk construction projects. This is the next step towards a future when Jennings County residents can commute, run errands, go to school, and explore the community in an active way.


How Do Invasive Species Spread?

- Unintentional Movement by people on their clothes or vehicles
- Birds might disperse seeds when they eat the fruit or seed of the invasive species
- Wind carries seeds throughout the forest
- Water current can also carry the seeds throughout the forest
- Animals and wildlife can disperse invasive species seeds from their bodies like people can with their clothes
- Before Forest Service acquisition, landowners were planting these invasive species without knowing the harm they cause our native species



Invasive Species Spread by Following These Simple Steps!

- Remove Plants, animals, and mud from boots, gear, pets, and vehicle
- Clean your gear before entering and leaving the recreation site
- Stay on designated roads and trails
- Use certified or local firewood
- Follow Indiana General Chemical Control Recommendations

FECAL EGG COUNTS



WHAT IS A FECAL EGG COUNT?

 A quantitative assessment and identification of the number of parasite eggs an animal is shedding at the time of sample collection

WHY SHOULD I GET A FECAL EGG COUNT ON MY LIVESTOCK?

 Fecal Egg Counts assess your livestock's parasite burden and target the parasite your livestock might be suffering from at the time of collection.

SAMPLE COLLECTION INSTRUCTIONS

- Use gloves to collect a fresh sample of feces from your livestock. The sample should still be both moist
 and soft. It should be collected and turned into the office no more than 6 hours from the time of
 defecation
- Collect at least 1/2 cup or 4oz. of feces and place in a clean ziplock bag.
- Label the bag with the species of livestock that the sample came from and the animal's identification.

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
