Exhibit Requirements

Beginner Grades 3-5:

Exhibit a poster or notebook on one of the following topics, do not repeat topics:

- The rules and precautions used in a particular sport. Include one to three pictures of the sport.
- Importance of safety equipment for a particular sport.
- Your personal participation in a sport. Example would be pictures of you and explain how the sport has affected your life.

Intermediate Grades 6-8:

Exhibit a poster or notebook on one of the following topics, do not repeat topics:

- Spotlight a Professional player and the Community Service work they do.
- Explain how the addition of a rule (example: 3-Point Line in Basketball) or option (example: Instant Replay in Football) has affected a sport.
- Your personal participation in a sport. Example would be pictures of you and explain how the sport has affected your life.

Advanced Grades 9-12:

Exhibit a poster or notebook on one of the following topics, do not repeat topics:

- A notebook on a present or past professional sportsman such as a professional football player. The report should be approximately 500 words in length.
- Exhibit a poster on the major rule changes on a particular sport from an elementary level to professional. Example: little league rules to professional baseball rules.
- A poster on the lifestyle an athlete should maintain to keep in shape. Examples: diet, exercise, health, habits, etc.
- Your personal participation in a sport. Example would be pictures of you and explain how the sport has affected your life.

A General Record Sheet should be placed in your Green Record Book and presented at project check-in.

All posters, notebooks, and display boards **must** include a reference list indicating where information was obtained, giving credit to the original author, to complete the 4-H member's exhibit. This reference list should/might include web site links, people and professionals interviewed, books, magazines, etc. It is recommended this reference list be attached to the back of a poster or display board, be the last page of a notebook, or included as part of the display visible to the public. A judge is not to discredit an exhibit for the manner in which references are listed.
