

Health & Safety by Donna McElwain

I have been asked by Dee Kirkham, President of Johnson County Extension Homemakers to write an article about Health and Safety for the Bits and Pieces Newsletter.

Thinking about the upcoming fall season and back to school it is time to get prepared for Back-to-School Safety. Traffic will increase as schools reopen. Summer vacations are over, school buses are running their routes and people may be walking to schools. As fall harvesting season approaches, we will also be sharing the roads with farm equipment.

To keep everyone safe remember the following safety tips:

1) Observe School Speed Zones

Although you should always drive the posted speed limits, it is very important during the school year. Slowing down and watching for children crossing the road going to and from school is critical to keeping children safe.

2) Watch for Children Crossing the Road

Children can become distracted. This can create a dangerous situation on the roadways for drivers. Be attentive and alert when driving. You may need to react quickly to prevent an accident if a small child steps off a sidewalk or from between parked cars.

3) Always Stop for a Crossing Guard

Take extra time to look for children in school zones, near playground, parks and subdivisions.

4) School Buses

Most accidents take the place outside of the bus. When driving near a school bus, please note extra caution is needed. Do not pass the school bus when signal lights are flashing. Allow greater following distance when driving behind a school bus.

5) Farm Equipment

Most farm equipment speed's do not exceed 30-40mph. Remember to slow down, give yourself space between your vehicle and the equipment ahead of you. It is OK to pass the farm equipment, but be sure there are no vehicles approaching from the opposite direction.

6) Be Courteous

Remember to smile and wave to the farmer who is working hard to provide food for all of us.

Take time to enjoy the Fall Season, as the days will become shorter, the air will become cool and crisp and the changing color of the leaves will be beautiful.

Baking Contest Flavor is Cherry for 2023

At the 2023 Johnson County Fair, Cherry will be the flavor for the Baking Contest. Help spread the word about the new flavor for next year! & the categories are Pies, Cookies, Breads, & Miscellaneous

Keep the food safety rules in mind when selecting your recipe. Food safety guidelines state for baked product competitions: Filling, frosting, glazing, pie filling, and meringue, whether uncooked or cooked, are not permitted to contain cream cheese, whipped cream, unpasteurized milk or eggs/egg whites (pasteurized eggs or eggs cooked to 160° F may be used). Home-canned fruits, vegetables, or meats are not permitted in products. Recipes must be provided that show which ingredients were used in each part of the product. Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing food. Whenever possible, baked products should be transported and stored in chilled coolers (41°F).
