TEN TIPS FOR SUMMER SAFETY

- 1. Weather is unpredictable. Prepare for anything by checking the weather forecast. Use your cell phone to check on weather and storm predictions. Stay alert!
- 2. Wear the right clothing, light colored and light weight clothes help to reflect the sun. A wide brimmed hat and sunglasses will help to provide protection for your skin and eyes from the sun.
- 3. Use sunscreen SPF 30 or higher, apply 30 minutes prior to going outside and reapply every 2 hours if swimming.
- 4. Staying hydrated is very important with increased outdoor activities in the summer. Drink plenty of water, do not wait until you are thirsty to drink fluids.
- 5. Know the signs of heat exhaustion: dizziness, muscle cramping, weakness, fatigue, confusion, heart palpitations and nausea. If you notice these symptoms go inside immediately. Rest in a cool place and drink water, blot your skin with cool water to lower your body temperature.
- 6. Water safety awareness, not only at the pool or the beach. Be aware of fountains and ponds and keep a close eye on all children when near the water. Never swim alone. Wear life vests when needed.
- 7. Never leave children or pets in your vehicle. It only takes a few minutes for your vehicle to heat up to lethal levels.
- 8. Pack a first aid kit to help treat summer injuries including: gauze, tape, and antibiotic ointment for minor cuts and scrapes, insect repellent, Aloe Vera to sooth sunburns and Hydrocortisone Cream for relief from insect bites and poison ivy.
- 9. Firework safety. Keep a safe distance once they are lit. Do Not point fireworks toward your face or body. Keep water close to extinguish fireworks if necessary.
- 10.Most importantly... Do What You Love. Find joy in life and your activities in order to keep yourself mentally and physically young. Take time to rest and relax this summer season.

LOOKING BACK IN TIME by Shirley Kirkham

The following information came from Clark Township secretary books, scrap books and program books. (I have program books from 1937 through 2022/23 as well as a 75th anniversary Book, &IEHA History "100 Years of IEHA 1913 – 2013").

INDIANA HOME ECONOMICS ASSOCIATION

Minutes of meeting, January 17, 1913

Miss Mathews called the meeting to order and said that the purpose would be to have a discussion in regards to organizing an Indiana Home Economics Association. It was suggested that Mrs. Lewis Taylor act as temporary chairman and Mrs. Howe as a temporary secretary. Mrs. Taylor took the chair. Mrs. Kline opened the discussion speaking of the good of such an organization, the advantages to be gained from it and the work that could be done.

The subject was discussed generally.

Mrs. Oliver Kline made a suggestion that a temporary constitution be drawn up. A Motion was made and seconded that we proceed to a permanent organization.

Motion carried.

Mrs. Virginia C. Meredith read a skeleton constitution which was afterward adopted through the motion be Mrs. Kline.

Election of officers followed:

President - Mrs. Virginia C. Meredith, Cambridge City

Vice President – Mrs. Flora Meeks, Parker

Secretary – Mrs. Lewis Taylor

Executive Committee Members:

Prof G.I. Christie, Purdue

Prof. Mary Matthews, Purdue

Motion made and seconded that we proceed to obtain

membership and pay dues as per constitution - carried.

Fifty – eight names were placed on the list as members of the organization.

Motion made and seconded that we adjourn – carried.
