MAY DAY BREAKFAST CASSEROLE RECIPE

Biscuits and Gravy Casserole

Ingredients:

8 count tube of Grand Biscuits

6 eggs

1 package of gravy mix (I used Pioneer sausage flavor) if you love gravy prepare another package to use.

1 lb Sausage any flavor

1 cup shredded cheese (I used mild cheddar)

1/2 cup milk

Salt & Pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 350. Grease a 9x13 Pan. Brown the sausage drain thoroughly.

- Cut Biscuits into 1" pieces, line the pan with the pieces.
- 2. Layer cooked sausage over the biscuits,
- 3. Layer shredded cheese over sausage.
- 4. Whisk eggs and milk, add salt & pepper. Pour over.
- 5. Mix gravy according to the package pour over everything.
- 6. Bake for 35-45 minutes. If you find the casserole is getting too brown, put a foil tent over it.

If you choose to prepare the night before, you will need to increase the cooking time by about 20 minutes.

MORE MAY DAY BREAKFAST CASSEROLE RECIPES

POINDEXTER SAUSAGE AND EGG SOUFFLE - submitted by Annie Leser

- 6 eggs, beaten
- 2 cups milk
- 6 slices white bread, cubed
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup Cheddar cheese, shredded
- 1 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 pound sausage

Mix first 6 ingredients together.

Crumble, brown sausage, drain, cool. Add to mixture.

Pour into 13.5 x 8.75 inch Pyrex dish; bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

BAKED FRENCH TOAST - submitted by Sue Morris

Baking Dishes: 1 9x13 or 2 8x8 dishes

- 1. In saucepan, over medium-low heat, mix and melt:
 - a. 1 cup packed brown sugar
 - b. ½ cup butter
 - c. 2 Tbsp. lite or dark corn syrup
- When mixture melts, spray baking dish with non-stick spray.
- Pour well-blended butter-sugar mixture in baking dish
- 4. Take one loaf of Texas Toast or French Bread cut in 1 inch slices, arrange bread slices flat on top of butter-sugar mixture.
- Sprinkle ½ cup brown sugar and 1 tsp. cinnamon on top of bread.
- Add another layer of bread
- 7. In a blender, mix:
 - a.5 eggs
 - b. 2 cups cream
 - c. 1 cup milk
 - d. 1 tsp. vanilla
- Pour over bread slices.
- Cover and refrigerate overnight
- Sprinkle cinnamon on top before baking
- 11. Pre heat oven to 350 F; uncover and back for 30 minutes

FUN FAIR FACTS AND RECORDS:

- The first annual <u>fair</u> in the American colonies was held in 1641 in New Amsterdam (now New York City) to showcase farm products of the local area.
- The USA's first state <u>fair</u> was held in Syracuse, New York in September of 1841.
- What we call "<u>Cotton Candy</u>" was originally called "Fairy Floss" and was invented in 1897 by candy makers William Morris and John C. Wharton of Nashville, Tennessee. It was introduced at the St. Louis <u>World's Fair</u> in 1904. It has also been called "Spun Sugar" and in the United Kingdom it is called "Candy Floss".
- The first World's Fair was held in 1851 in England at London's Crystal Palace. The fair exhibited American machinery of the Industrial Revolution.
- The <u>Ferris wheel</u> was invented by George W. Ferris for the 1893 <u>World's Fair</u>, which was held in Chicago to commemorate the 400th anniversary of Columbus's landing in America.
- The <u>Eiffel Tower</u> was built by Gustave Eiffel for the Paris <u>World's Fair</u> of 1889, which honored the 100th anniversary of the French Revolution.
- The first time that fair goers ate hot dogs and ice cream as they
 walked along the midway was during the Saint Louis World's
 Fair in 1904, thus coining these two foods as the world's
 first "fast foods".


2025 Fair Quilt Block Contest
