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Description | Provide a fun and hands-on learning experience which develops both small animal subject skills (such as nutrition, housing, and health care) and life skills (such as responsibility, decision-making, nurturing and communications) under the direction of caring adult volunteers.

Exhibit Guidelines |

- Members will complete the suggested activities in the LaPorte County Small Animals Manual and exhibit manual in a binder at fair.
- If a 4-H project exists for a particular species then that species must be entered in that project. For example, rabbits should be entered in the rabbit project and not in small mammals. Pigeons likewise, should be entered in the pigeon project and not the bird project. Contact the Extension Office for referral.
- Select and care for one or two small domestic animals for at least 12 weeks.
- Note: Indiana residents over the age of 17 may not collect amphibians or reptiles from the wild in Indiana unless they have a valid hunting or fishing license, unless otherwise exempted by law. For all collectors, there is a possession limit of four on all non-game species except endangered species and eastern box turtles. Collection of endangered species and eastern box turtles is prohibited.

To Be Done In Each Age Group For All Species |

- 1. Complete the small animal record sheets for your exhibited animal.
- 2. Complete the activity sheets for your animal type and age group.
- 3. Exhibit your animal in an appropriate cage. The animal will be brought to judging (consult the fair catalog for check in time, judging, etc.).
- 4. A three ring binder is to be used to hold the record sheets and the activity sheets you choose to do within your age group. This will show how much you learned about taking care of your animal. The animal you exhibit and the binder will constitute your project scoring- not just the animal you exhibit.

You are to keep a record of the kinds of food you use and the results obtained. Be sure you research best practices for the care of your animal in making dietary decisions.


Beginner Activity Option #1 <u>My Pet</u>

Beginner Activity Option #2 <u>My Pet's Home</u>

Directions: All pets need a safe and secure habitat in which to live. Their habitat should match the needs of your pet, and it may require research to know what your pet needs to have a healthy home. In this activity you will describe the habitat that you have created for your pet to life safely in your home. Be sure to describe everything that is in their habitat including any special lighting, filters, bedding, toys, temperature controls, etc. that help ensure your pet is happy and healthy. Beginner Activity Option #3 Pet Care Instructions

Directions: It is important to set-up a healthy habitat for your pet, but it's also important to check on your pet often to ensure that their basic needs are met. Your pet needs food, water, exercise, and a clean area to live in. Beginner Activity Option #4 <u>Pet Safety</u>

Directions: It is your job to make a safe home for your pet. While not all pets leave their habitat that you've created for them, some pets do leave their cages and explore the house. In this activity, you will think about the ways different things in a home might be a danger to a pet and reflect on ways you can help to make your home a safe place for an animal to live. Even if you have an animal that doesn't leave their cage, like a fish, things like temperatures in your home could have an effect on their habitat, so it's always important to consider your environment when bringing a pet into the family.

Beginner Activity Option #5 Parts of Your Animal



Intermediate Activity Option #1 Shopping Comparison

Directions: Go to 4 stores and compare prices on 5 different items associated with your pet. You may include online shopping sites as well. This could be the price of the animal itself, but should also include pricing of other items associated with the care of the pet: cage, bedding, food, cleaning supplies, etc. When possible, try to find the same brand at each store. If an item is on sale, make sure to note the regular price, you may also include the sale price. You do not have to purchase the items (as you may already have them), but just compare the prices.

Activity Option #2 Diet

Directions: All animals need a well balanced diet to make sure that they stay happy and healthy. Each species has unique dietary needs that must be met to ensure that they stay healthy. For some animals, they may require extra vitamins or additives to their food to keep them healthy outside of their natural habitat. Research what foods make up a balanced diet for your animal. Intermediate Activity Option #3 Pet Diseases

Directions: Just like humans, pets need to be cared for in a healthy environment in order to thrive. Without the right diet, environment, and care, disease and sickness may result. When you notice a change in your pet's behavior or physical well being, immediate action is necessary. Diseases and symptoms vary by species. In this activity, you will research the treatment required for diseases and symptoms in different species, and then research 1 disease or symptom common to your pet and how to treat it.

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Intermediate Activity Option #5 Digestive System



Advanced Activity Option #7 FISH ONLY- Breeding

Directions: Begin breeding your fish. Keep a diary of your fish successes, failure, problems, and comments. This diary must include at least 2 months of breeding time. Your will include your diary in your binder to exhibit at fair.

The fish you bring to the fair judging should at least be the breed you bred or tried to breed if the parent fish or babies are not available at fair time. (Fish don't always have babies when we want them to.)

Your diary can include photos of your breeding process or it can just be a written record of your work and observations.
