ARTIFICAL INTELLIGENCE CHALLENGE

The Presidential AI Challenge is a competition for K-12 students and educators! Students who join the Presidential Challenge can access training and resources to help them complete a project that can either be a study or development of an AI method or tool to solve a local community problem.

Educators are also invited to participate and focus on creative approaches to teaching or using AI technologies in K-12 learning.

Participants can access training and resources to create their projects, with the chance to showcase their work at a White House event next summer!

Submissions are due Jan. 20, 2026. In March, state champions will be announced, followed by a national championship in June. Contestants can earn up to \$10,000. Learn more at: purdue.ag/PresidentialAIChallenge4H

10 Frequently asked Questions about the Challenge:

1. WHAT IS THE 4-H PRESIDENTIAL AI CHALLENGE?

The challenge invites K–12 youth to explore artificial intelligence through hands-on learning, ethical decision-making, and real-world problem solving.

2. WHO CAN PARTICIPATE IN THE CHALLENGE?

Any youth in grades K–12, along with educators and mentors. Each team must have 1–4 members and an approved 4-H volunteer mentor.

3. DO PARTICIPANTS NEED PRIOR EXPERIENCE WITH AI OR CODING?

No prior experience is required. The challenge is designed to be accessible to all skill levels and includes guided activities to support learning and development.

4. WHAT KINDS OF AI TOOLS WILL YOUTH EXPLORE?

Participants will learn about chatbots, image generators, recommendation systems, and other AI technologies.

5. HOW DO I FIND A MENTOR OR BECOME ONE?

Contact your local 4-H educator to be matched with a mentor or to learn how to become an approved 4-H volunteer.

6. ARE THERE DIFFERENT TRACKS OR CATEGORIES IN THE CHALLENGE?

Yes, there are three tracks, each tailored to different age groups or experience levels. Details are available from your local 4-H office.

7. WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF PARTICIPATING?

Youth gain digital literacy, problem-solving skills, and national recognition. Teams may also compete for prizes.

8. WHERE CAN I LEARN MORE ABOUT AI BEFORE JOINING?

9. IS THIS CHALLENGE PART OF A LARGER NATIONAL INITIATIVE?

Yes, it aligns with the national celebration of 250 years of U.S. independence and encourages innovation for the next 250 years.

10. HOW DO I REGISTER OR GET STARTED?

Reach out to your local 4-H educator or visit the Purdue Extension 4-H website for guidance on forming a team and joining the challenge.

11. WHEN IS THE CHALLENGE OVER?



IS THIS YOU? DO YOU KNOW FARMERS IN INDIANA, ILLINOIS, OR IOWA?

Interviews are being conducted as part of the *IMPACT*²: *Social-Ecological Memory in Midwest Agriculture* project, a PhD research study at Purdue University. This work explores how memories and experiences of past extreme weather events (floods, droughts, storms) influence today's farming decisions.

Researchers are looking to connect with farmers across Indiana, Illinois, and Iowa whether involved in grain, livestock, or specialty crops. Of particular interest are multi-generational farm families, though farmers of all backgrounds are welcome. Interviews are in-person, last 45–60 minutes, and participants receive a \$100 honorarium.

ANIMAL HEALTH ADVISORY HANDLING EQUINE HERPES VIRUS CASES AND SUSPECTS NOTICE FROM THE INDIANA STATE BOARD OF ANIMAL HELTH: NOVEMBER 20, 2025

Multiple horses from Texas and Oklahoma have been confirmed positive for equine herpesvirus Type 1 after participating rodeo in events in Waco, TX and Guthrie, OK. Hoosier owners of horses that may have been exposed at either event need to monitor their animals closely.

Equine herpes virus (EHV-1) was identified earlier this week in a Texas quarter horse that attended the 2025 Womens Professional Rodeo Association World Final and Elite Barrel Race event (Nov. 5-9) in <u>Waco, Texas</u>.

Two additional cases surfaced this week in Oklahoma during the Barrel Futurities of America World championship in Guthrie, OK. Both horses were previously at the Waco, TX event.

Reporting and Response

As a reminder: EHV-1 diagnosed in a horse with neurologic signs is referred to as EHM (equine herpesvirus myeloencephalopathy), which is reportable to the Indiana State Board of Animal Health. (https://www.in.gov/boah/boah-rules/compliance-issues/reportable-disease-list/)

When a veterinarian receives a positive laboratory result for EHV-1 on a horse showing neurologic signs, he/she will contact BOAH. The BOAH district veterinarian will help manage the situation to lessen spread of the disease.

BOAH's director of equine health is currently attempting to contact Hoosiers who are listed as participants at the affected events, based on traceback information provided by the Oklahoma state veterinarian. Potentially exposed horses will undergo the observation protocol to prevent spread of the virus in Indiana.

Exercise Caution

BOAH's equine director is reaching out to Hoosiers who are listed on the event rosters to arrange for monitoring of potentially exposed horses.

BOAH's goal is to avoid the widespread cases of EHV-1/EHM that we have seen around the country. An important step is for horse owners to respect a self-imposed quarantine on clinical horses until the laboratory test results are returned, and comply with BOAH restrictions if an official quarantine must be imposed.

Restricting movement and contact with others can greatly deter spread of this disease.

About EHV

EHV-1 is common in the horse population and most often clinically manifests as just a mild respiratory illness, especially in young horses, known commonly as equine rhinopneumonitis or "rhino". Less commonly EHV-1 manifests itself as a neurologic form known as EHM. In very rare cases EHM may be caused by EHV-4. Potential signs of EHV-1 include: decreased coordination, urine dribbling, loss of tail tone, **fever**, **hind limb weakness**, leaning against things to maintain balance, **lethargy**, and the inability to get off the ground.

Prevention

Good biosecurity when traveling and interacting with other horses at equine events and boarding facilities is very important. Tack, people's hands, clothing, water buckets and other equipment can spread the virus between animals, so regular cleaning and disinfection are necessary, in addition to avoiding sharing. As always, vaccination is important to keeping horses healthy and supporting good immunity, even though only the respiratory strain is preventable by vaccination.
