Temperatures are coming down and the days are getting shorter, meaning one thing – FALL IS HERE! For farmers, this means harvest and long hours, so please remember to be patient and share the road when you see large equipment come by. Personally, my favorite part about fall is the activities, like making apple cider, corn mazes, and carving pumpkins. Whether you grow pumpkins in your garden, buy them at a store, or carve them too early for Halloween, pumpkins are one of the most recognizable signs of fall.

There are many varieties for you to choose from depending on your goals for the plant. Here are just a few that I found in a seed catalog. Pumpkins should be harvested when they have a deep color and the rinds are hard. They should also be dying back at this point. Don't lift pumpkins by their stem because it may fall off, leaving a wound which would cause your pumpkin to go soft prematurely.

Ag Drone Demonstration Fair Oaks Farms

Come meet Adam Shanks, our Purdue "Drone Guy" while he's at Fair Oaks on October 29. Adam brings a whole van of various Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAV or drones for short) that can be used for multiple different reasons. He will be demonstrating some of the uses and you may even have a chance to fly a drone under supervision.

Featured Insect: Fall Armyworm

Description: Larvae are smooth and can be light tan or green to nearly black. They have three yellow-white hairlines down their backs. On each side of their bodies and next to the yellow lines is a dark stripe. Adults have dark gray, mottled forewings with light and dark splotches, and a noticeable white spot near the end of each.



Symptoms: Larvae feed on corn leaves and may attack the tassels and/or ears of corn. Damage appears as ragged-edged holes on leaves, tassels and/or ears. Severe feeding may give the appearance of corn that has been damaged by hail.

Contributing Factors: Armyworm moths arrive in the Midwest late in the season and are attracted to extremely late corn, which can sustain considerable damage from this pest.

Prevention and Treatment: Insecticide is usually not economical for control of the fall armyworm. Applications when larvae are large and/or hidden in plant structures are ineffective. If larvae are less than 1-1/4" long, and the plants are under stress, treatment may be advisable. Spot treatments are an option for control.

Featured Weed: Poison Hemlock

Identification: Stems are stout, smooth, with distinctive purple spots. Flowers are small, white and found in umbrella-shaped clusters in early summer. The fern-like leaves are pinnately compounded and arranged alternately on the stem. Seeds mature in August/September.

Location: Poison hemlock is found in all 92 counties of Indiana. This is an invasive weed.

Concerns: It has a biennial growth pattern, being a short rosette the first year and bolting to 3-10 feet the second year. Poison hemlock contains highly poisonous alkaloid compounds that can be fatal to humans and livestock

Control: This plant spreads by seed, so mowing before seed heads develop prevents seed production and will exhaust the existing seed bank.
