- Foodborne microorganisms and allergens
- Personal hygiene
- Purchasing, receiving, and storage
- Preparing, cooking, and serving
- Facilities, cleaning/sanitation, and managing pests
 The full 1-day training includes a manual and proctored
 paper exam. You must score 75 percent or greater to earn
 the certificate. The certification is valid for five years. A



Queen of the Prairie

Native Royalty: Queen of the Prairie - Filipendula rubra, member of the Rose Family "The leaves and floures farre excell all other strowing berbes, for to deck up bouses, to straw in chambers, halls, and banqueting bouses in the Summer time, for the smell thereof makes the heart merrie, delighteth the senses." 'Herball, or Generall Historie of Plantes' (1597), John Gerard

Queen of the Prairie, also called Queen of the Meadow (UK) or Meadowsweet is a wonderful native plant that stands 3'-8' tall and 1.5'-4' wide with cloud-like blooms of pink or white towering above the toothed maple-like leaves. The plant was 'strewn' or tossed in the middle ages over the floor for fragrance. Propagated by division (less successful seed) and easily maintained, the seemingly delicate fronds stand up to wind and less than ideal soil conditions. Not only attractive to butterflies and birds, it is also deer resistant! This plant thrives in partial to full sun, preferring moist rich soils that are acidic (ph<6.8). Better Homes and Gardens suggests creating your own meadow and planting Queen of the Prairie toward the back with other natives in front such as beebalm, rudbeckia, aster, little bluestem or blue sedge.

Historically, this "Queen" has been around for centuries! The name Meadow-sweet comes from the Anglo-Saxon Meodu-swete- or meade sweetener — according to folklore author Jo Woolf , in her Hazel Tree blog, Meadow-sweet has long been used in beer, wine and meade. The Irish claim Aine, their goddess of Summer, love, fertility and agriculture, gave meadowsweet its name. Not a goddess to be trifled with, Aine had command of all the crops and animals! Celtic lore does seem to have a history with the plant as the boughs were placed into a bridal wreath with a bit of irony, as the fronds were sweet smelling for the young bride, but when crushed they became bitter and putrid -pointing toward a more "realistic" advice the young woman needed when embarking into marriage! However, an educated religious subset of the Celts, the Druids, believed Meadowsweet to be among the three sacred herbs (along with mint and vervain) and Meadowsweet had the power to "converse with fairies".

He beneath whose sun-kissed feet Daisies rise to kiss the sun, Lily, rose, and meadow-sweet, — Love, that is all flowers in one.

All in all, Queen of the Prairie is a native plant to consider, with a deep history and mythology to enhance the beauty of its majesty.

National Children's Health Month

Children's Health Month reminds us of the importance of protecting our children's health from environmental hazards in places where they live, play, and learn. Children are vulnerable to exposure to environmental contaminants, such as lead. The United States Environmental Protection Agency created a list for ways to improve your child's health.

Get Your Child Tested for Lead: Have your child tested for lead at 12 & 24 months old by their health care provider or your local health department.

Keep Our Air Breathable: Instead of driving your children to school and after-school activities, have them walk, bike, or use public transportation.

Reduce Your Use of Plastic Bags and Bottles: Pack children's school lunches in reusable bags and give them a reusable bottle for water at lunch and during practices.

Help Kids Eat Healthier Food: Feed your kids more fruits and vegetables, less sugar, and fewer carbonated beverages and processed foods. Have regular family meals. Be a role model by eating healthy yourself.

Be Sun Wise: Help kids avoid sunburns with sun-protective clothing, hats and sunscreen, and by seeking shade when the sun's rays are strongest.

Help Children Avoid "Nature Deficit Disorder": Cut back on screen time and help kids enjoy the great outdoors.

Don't Smoke Around Children: Until you quit, choose to smoke outside. Do not smoke in your home or car and do not allow family and visitors to do so.



Bullying Prevention Month

More than 1 out of every 5 students will be bullied this year.

Bullying directly affects a student's ability to learn. Students who are bullied often do not want to go to school, may find it difficult to concentrate, and lose self-esteem and self-confidence.

Apple Cinnamon Baked Oatmeal

Before you begin: Wash your hands

Ingredients:

1½ cups milk
½ cup packed brown sugar
½ cup egg whites
1 tablespoon melted margarine
½ teaspoon cinnamon
2 cups rolled oats (not instant)
1 teaspoon baking powder
1½ cups chopped apples

Serving size: 1 square
Serves 9
Calories: 160
Total fat: 3g
Saturated fat: < 1g
Sodium: 80mg
Carbohydrate: 30g

Sugars: 18g

Instructions:

Preheat oven - 350°F (176°C).

In a bowl, mix milk, brown sugar, egg substitute/whites, margarine and cinnamon.

In another bowl, combine oats and baking powder.

Pour wet mixture into bowl with oats; add apples and stir.

Spoon mixture into a 8x8-inch pan coated with cooking spray and bake for 30 to 40 minutes, until top is firm and a toothpick comes out clean.
