Beef & Dairy Identification Day March 2nd from 8 - 9AM Ohio County Fairgrounds

- All animals must be haltered with lead.
- Steers will be tagged and weighed.
- All steers and all heifers will be RFID tagged. 4-H members MUST provide Premise ID numbers in 4-H Online by May 15th.
- All commercial heifers will be tagged (unless they already have a tattoo) and weighed. Registered heifers will be tagged with RFID tags and must present registration form at tag day and complete livestock enrollment in 4HOnline. All heifers must be permanently identified with a tattoo or 5-digit county tag, in order to meet federal health requirements.
- Cows for the cow/calf project must be enrolled in 4HOnline by May 15. The calf will be tagged at the fair prior to unloading.
- Dairy heifers must be tattooed if not previously done and entered in 4HOnline by May 15.
- All livestock will need to be entered online by the deadline information will be distributed at the ID Day.
- Any beef cattle going to the Indiana State Fair will need DNA samples taken contact the extension office for more information.



Native Plants are plants that have existed in a given area for centuries. They have adapted to local conditions and can withstand local extremes in temperature, drought, and flooding. There are many benefits to native plants.

Some of these are:

• Low maintenance due to being accustomed to local environmental conditions and insects and therefore do not require additional watering, chemical fertilizers, or pesticides to survive.

- Improves the environment by removing harmful toxins from the air, releasing oxygen, and filtering polluted stormwater.
- Have evolved defenses to many diseases and insect pests.
- Native wildlife depends on native plants to meet their needs by providing food and shelter.
- Create deep and extensive root systems, which help to stabilize the soil column and create an environment favorable to building fertile soils rich in organic matter.

Premise Identification For 4-Hers



- Is the premise ID program mandatory?
 Indiana state law requires premise identification for all sites associated with the purchase, sale, or exhibition of livestock in the state of Indiana.
- What species are included in Indiana's premise ID program?


Indiana's rule includes mandatory registration for cattle/bison, cervids, swine, sheep and goats. Poultry and aquaculture are also part of Indiana's plan. Although it is not mandatory, equine and camelids may be registered voluntarily.

Who should register the premise?

The individual who owns the property should register the premise; however, the person who owns or is responsible for the livestock should be listed as the primary contact for the premise. If multiple livestock owners house animals at one premise, the primary caretaker should be listed as the primary contact.

Late Winter and Early Spring Reminders

- Refine plans for pasture use for the upcoming grazing season; consider fencing, seeding, fertilization, herbicide applications, water and shade availability.
- Frost seeding of clovers should be performed between February 1 and March 1.
- Nitrogen fertilizer should be applied in late February to promote early grass growth.
- Before applying Nitrogen: Soil test pastures and use results for application of fertilizer and lime.
- Renovate high traffic areas and bare areas to reduce erosion.
- Purchase seed, inoculant, and fertilizer for upcoming season.
- Check equipment and make repairs where needed.
- During wet periods, consider moving livestock to a barn or sacrifice lot to protect pastures.
- Continually move feeding area to reduce mud, erosion, compaction, and damage to forages.
- Do not graze pastures before cool-season forages reach approximately 6 inches to allow for adequate growth and maximum forage production for the remainder of the grazing season.
- Provide animals with easy access to complete mineral feeders at all times. Supply a mineral high in magnesium (a high "Mag" mineral) to prevent grass tetany in the early spring.

SHEPHERD'S PIE

1 lb. potatoes, cut into 1/2 inch pieces 1/4 cup low-fat vogurt (make sure its not vanilla!) 1 cup fat-free milk, hot 1/4 tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. black pepper 1 Tbsp. fresh chives, rinsed, dried and minced Filing: 4 cups cooked mixed vegetables (carrots, celery, peppers, etc.) 2 cup low-sodium chicken broth 1 cup quick-cooking oats 1 cup grilled or roasted chicken breast, diced 1 Tablespoon fresh parsley, rinsed, dried and chopped or 1 tsp. dried 1/4 tsp. black pepper Non-stick cooking spray Directions: Place potatoes in a medium sauce pan and water. Bring water to boil and cook potatoes until pierced easily with a fork or about 20-30 minutes. While potatoes are cooking, combine vegetables, chicken broth and oatmeal in a medium saucepan. Bring to a boil and simmer gently until oatmeal is cooked (about 5-7 minutes). Add chicken and continue to simmer until heated through. Season with parsley and pepper. Follow by preheating oven to 350 degrees. When potatoes are done, drain them and mash. Add milk, yogurt, salt and chives to potatoes and stir until smooth. Lightly spray an 8 inch baking dish. place filling in the bottom of the dish and top with potatoes, spreading carefully. Bake in preheated oven for about 10 minutes or until the potatoes are browned and chicken is reheated to an internal temp of 165 degrees. Serve immediately and refrigerate any leftovers within 2 hours.
