- 21. Herbs (1 herb per pot, 5 pots maximum, pots must be 6" or smaller in diameter)
- 22. Outdoor planter (flowering or foliage)

Foods (Sections 23-29):

All food exhibits shall be exhibited on a piece of cardboard cut to extend beyond the baked product approximately 1/2" or on a paper or Styrofoam plate. Cover with plastic or other transparent wrap.

All food items minus a small display portion will be sold following judging. Proceeds to go toward Open Class Exhibit expenses.

Recipe must accompany all food exhibits.

- 23. Cakes (frosted, unfrosted or decorated)
- 24. Cookies (6)
- 25. Yeast Breads (1 loaf or 6 rolls)
- 26. Quick Breads (1 loaf or 6 muffins, biscuits, etc.)
- 27. Candy (6)
- 28. Baked Pie: <u>One crust</u>; Fruit, nut, etc. Crumb topping is permitted. No cream, custard or meringue topped pies.
- 29. Baked Pie: Two Crusts; Fruit, nut, etc.

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Food Preservation (Sections 30-34):

Foods must be preserved according to standards set by the Ball Blue Book and/or Kerr Book.

Canned goods should be dated and have bands replaced for protection. Jams, jellies and preserves should be processed using two-piece lids. Paraffin is NOT acceptable. Do not bring frozen foods or frozen jams and/or jellies.
